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Foreword

The years since the first "trial use" liturgies of the Episcopal Church have seen great and diverse experimentation in the forms of worship used in this Church. Many people continue to express a heartfelt preference for "traditional language" in worship, the majesty of which speaks to the soul in a way in

which modern English cannot.

The 1979 Book of Common Prayer emerged in the midst of the liturgical renewal movement which began early in the twentieth century and which produced the liturgical reforms of the Second Vatican Council. While the prayer books of the Anglican Communion from 1549 had already addressed many of the concerns of this movement (such as the use of the vernacular and a daily office for the use of all), the movement did have a profound effect on prayer book revision in this church. The 1979 BCP provides many welcome enrichments to the liturgical life of the church: Compline and the Proper Liturgies for Special Days to name but two.

Two thrusts of the liturgical reform movement have been to emphasize the truths of God's immanence and the importance of the corporate nature of worship; the use of modern, or common language has been an major part of this effort. To a certain degree, however, this has served to de-emphasize the transcendence of God and the importance of the individual relationship between creature and Creator (the call of the individual to holiness). The traditional liturgies of the Church seek to keep these forces in balance, and language plays an important role in this effort as well. For many churchmen, God remains "Thou", familiar, yet other - One who calls us out of our current condition and would raise us to new life in Christ Jesus.

The rubrics of the current prayer book provide for traditional language without providing all of the necessary texts: "In any of the Proper Liturgies for Special Days, and in

other services contained in this Book celebrated in the context of a Rite One service, the contemporary idiom may be conformed to traditional language." and "When it is desired to use music composed for them, previously authorized liturgical texts may be used in place of the corresponding texts in this Book." (page 14, 1979 Book of Common Prayer). These rubrics cannot be followed without the use of "supplemental texts", as the traditional idiom involves more than substituting "thee" and "thou" when addressing God; syntax and cadence are also important. Since 1976, when the proposed book was issued, many parishes have sought to work within the confines of these rubrics, while not having the resources in one book to make this easily possible. Congregations have produced many photocopied drafts of service material and parishioners have had to juggle prayer books, parish mass books, and bulletin inserts. Needless to say, this has not made it easy for newcomers or regular members to follow services.

The purpose of this work is to facilitate corporate worship in the traditional idiom as provided for in the prayer book: it is a devotional enrichment in the tradition of the Anglican and American missals, and St. Augustine's Prayer Book. This book is principally designed to be a pew edition, although individuals will find it helpful in keeping the office and for devotions.

The Anglican Service Book is a compilation of material from a number of sources focused around the structure of the 1979 Book of Common Prayer. It provides all Rite I services, together with rites, offices, and services in traditional language which appear solely in the modern idiom in the 1979 BCP. Additional supplementary service material, commonly used in many parishes, has been included, in the hope that this work might meet devotional needs which are not addressed in the prayer book. Brief essays on the sacraments and services of the Church have been placed before the rites as a teaching tool. The Psalter of the 1928 BCP has also been included to provide the texts in the traditional idiom.

Throughout the book (except in Additional Devotions), material within a rite which is supplementary is delineated by a line along the left hand side of the page or by brackets and italics. In a few places, however, traditional forms of services have been substituted or added (e.g. Communion of the Sick and the Absolution of the Dead). Most of the supplementary material is from the 1928 and older editions of the Book of Common Prayer, The Anglican Missal, and The American Missal. Almost all of it is commonplace in the worship life of many parishes and is therefore included for their convenience. To facilitate corporate worship, effort has been made to make the services as easy to follow as possible and conventions such as bold-face type for all congregational responses have been adopted.

A few elements in the prayer book are beyond the scope of this project, specifically the Lectionary, the Ordination of a Bishop, and the Catechism. Other resources are available for

those items, and hence they are not included here.

This project began at The Church of the Good Shepherd in Rosemont, Pennsylvania, from the need to consolidate service material in a form which would be easy to follow. It quickly became apparent that there were many others in the Church who shared our need, and assistance has come from a number of sources ranging from the editorial advisory board to typesetting, proofreading, and bookkeeping. These contributions are gratefully acknowledged.

The Calendar

Concerning the Calendar

The Calendar of the Saints is a list of those holy men, women, and children whose lives the faithful are drawn to commemorate. A Saint is placed in the Calendar because he or she, by the grace of God, was made holy, a devout disciple of our Lord, of the kind that worshiped regularly, obeyed the Scriptures, and sought to lead the moral life of a Christian in witness to the risen Lord. Some gave their lives in witness to their faith. A Calendar should not include persons simply because of national importance or political prominence. Even notable good works are not a measure of holiness. To use the words of Mother Teresa, a Saint is a Christian who did ordinary things extraordinarily well.

The Calendar of *The Anglican Service Book* is structured around the prayer book Calendar of 1979 with the additions that are commonly followed in the Episcopal Church today. All commemorations in *Lesser Feasts & Fasts* are italicized. Additional Saints, commemorated in many places, have been added from other Anglican Calendars, as well as Calendars of various Western and Eastern Churches. Notable events in the life of Our Lord and his Church are also included. Some parishes and individuals may wish to add their own local commemorations.

For the most part, the Saints are celebrated on their "heavenly birthday," that is to say, the day of death; this has been the custom from the earliest days. In a few cases, where that day and the days near it are filled with more ancient or prominent observances, a translation day is kept. In rare cases, still another day is appointed, such as an ordination day.

This Calendar is put forth to provide the Church with a suitable plan for the faithful offering to God of the daily offices and the daily mass, and as a source for the spiritual growth of the faithful in Christ who are among the saints on earth, and members of his body.

The Calendar of the Church Year

The Church Year consists of two cycles of feasts and holy days: one is dependent upon the movable date of the Sunday of the Resurrection or Easter Day; the other, upon the fixed date of December 25, the Feast of our Lord's Nativity or Christmas Day.

Easter Day is always the first Sunday after the full moon that falls on or after March 21. It cannot occur before March 22 or after April 25.

The sequence of all Sundays of the Church Year depends upon the date of Easter Day. But the Sundays of Advent are always the four Sundays before Christmas Day, whether it occurs on a Sunday or a weekday. The date of Easter also determines the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday, and the feast of the Ascension on a Thursday forty days after Easter Day.

1. Principal Feasts

The Principal Feasts observed in this Church are the following:

Easter Day
Ascension Day
The Day of Pentecost
Trinity Sunday

All Saints' Day, November 1 Christmas Day, December 25 The Epiphany, January 6

These feasts take precedence of any other day or observance. All Saints' Day may always be observed on the Sunday following November 1, in addition to its observance on the fixed date.

2. Sundays

All Sundays of the year are feasts of our Lord Jesus Christ. In addition to the dated days listed above, only the following feasts, appointed on fixed days, take precedence of a Sunday:

The Holy Name, January 1
The Presentation, February 2
The Transfiguration, August 6

The feast of the Dedication of a Church, and the feast of its patron or title, may be observed on, or be transferred to, a Sunday, except in the seasons of Advent, Lent, and Easter.

All other Feasts of our Lord, and all other Major Feasts appointed on fixed days in the Calendar, when they occur on a Sunday, are normally transferred to the first convenient open day within the week. When desired, however, the Collect, Preface, and one or more of the Lessons appointed for the Feast may be substituted for those of the Sunday, but not from the Last Sunday after Pentecost through the First Sunday after the Epiphany, or from the Last Sunday after the Epiphany through Trinity Sunday.

With the express permission of the bishop, and for urgent and sufficient reason, some other special occasion may be observed on a Sunday.

3. Holy Days

The following Holy Days are regularly observed throughout the year. Unless otherwise ordered in the preceding rules concerning Sundays, they have precedence over all other days of commemoration or of special observance:

Feasts appointed on fixed days in the Calendar are not observed on the days of Holy Week or of Easter Week. Major Feasts falling in these weeks are transferred to the week following the Second Sunday of Easter, in the order of their occurrence.

Feasts appointed on fixed days in the Calendar do not take precedence of Ash Wednesday.

Feasts of our Lord and other Major Feasts appointed on fixed days, which fall upon or are transferred to a weekday, may be observed on any open day within the week. This provision does not apply to Christmas Day, the Epiphany, and All Saints' Day.

4. Days of Special Devotion

The following days are observed by special acts of discipline and self-denial:

Ash Wednesday and the other weekdays of Lent and of Holy Week, except the feast of the Annunciation.

Good Friday and all other Fridays of the year, in commemoration of the Lord's crucifixion, except for Fridays in the Christmas and Easter seasons, and any Feasts of our Lord which occur on a Friday.

5. Days of Optional Observance

Subject to the rules of precedence governing Principal Feasts, Sundays, and Holy Days, the following may be observed with the Collects, Psalms, and Lessons duly authorized by this Church:

Other Commemorations, using the Common of Saints
The Ember Days, traditionally observed on the Wednesdays,
Fridays, and Saturdays after the First Sunday in Lent, the
Day of Pentecost, Holy Cross Day, and December 13
The Rogation days, traditionally observed on Monday,
Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension Day
Various Occasions

Provided, that there is no celebration of the Eucharist for any such occasion on Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday; and provided further, that none of the Propers appointed for Various Occasions is used as a substitute for, or as an addition to, the Proper appointed for the Principal Feasts.

The Daily Office

The Daily Office

History

From the beginning, the worship of the people of God has been not just a weekly, but a daily affair. The sanctification of time by acts of prayer and praise at specific times during the day was a practice of venerable age at the beginning of the Christian era, and one can find clear indications of it in the Scriptures of the Old as well as of the New Testament. The writings of the early Fathers of the Church bear abundant witness to the keeping of hours of prayer, both privately and corporately.

Initially, the Daily Office consisted simply of morning and evening prayers, together with the reading of Scripture and portions of the Psalter. As the monastic movement began to gain influence, the Daily Office became more complex, even in parish and cathedral churches. This is not unnatural, given the fact that major churches were frequently, even typically, served by monastic or other regular communities whose members were obliged to say all the offices. (In the classical form, there are seven day offices - Matins, Prime, Terce, Sext, None, Vespers, and Compline - and one night office - Vigils.) Over a period of time, the offices became increasingly complicated. This increased complexity, combined with the abandonment of the vernacular tongue in public prayer, made it exceedingly difficult for ordinary men and women to participate in the daily prayer of the Church.

One of the beneficial effects of the Reformation in England was a deliberate effort to simplify the Daily Office so that both

clergy and laity could participate in its offering. Morning Prayer was based upon the Medieval office of Matins together with elements from Prime. Evening Prayer was, in its essence, a combination of Vespers and Compline. But the Office as a whole was revised around the importance of regular recitation of the Psalter, reading of the whole of Scripture, and set prayer. This gives the Anglican Office its distinctive character. In more recent times, Sext (Noonday Prayer) and Compline have been restored for optional use in various Anglican Prayer Books, such as the American Book of 1979.

By Scriptural example and ancient canonical precept, the clergy are obliged to recite the Office every day, and it is the clear intent of every Anglican prayer book since 1549 that the Office be a daily Office. Local modifications of this precept (such as the implied permission in the 1979 Book of Common Prayer to use only one office in the day) do not overthrow the principle that the recitation should be daily. The establishment of a regular schedule of publicly offered daily offices is an essential element to the fullness of parochial life for the laity as well as the clergy.

Purpose

The purpose of the Daily Office is two-fold: First, it serves to sanctify time, or perhaps more accurately, to remind us in the time it takes for our offering of the office that all time is sacred, since all time belongs to God. Herein is embodied the same principle that lies behind the stewardship of our material resources: All that we have belongs to God, and we render a portion of it to him in sacrificial remembrance of that fact. The consequence of the faithful rendering of this service is the fulfillment of the second purpose of the Daily Office, which is the sanctification, both of those who pray it, and of the Church for which they pray.

The Order for Daily Morning Prayer

The Officiant begins the service with one or more of these sentences of Scripture, or with the versicle "O Lord, open thou our lips" on page 38.

The Collects

The Collects for the Church Year

The Collects comprise a set form of prayer which bring together or "collect" our thoughts on a matter, concentrating our minds on a particular desire or intention, be it stewardship, peace, guidance, adoration, thanksgiving for the life of a saint, or any other matter. The Collect for the Day sets the emphasis for the prayers and liturgy of the day. Many of these prayers are very ancient and are among the great devotional riches of our heritage.

In form, collects address God by calling to mind some aspect of His Being, offer petition or petitions for a stated need, and conclude with a clause acknowledging the mediatorial role of Jesus Christ who is known through the eternal activity of the Blessed Trinity.

First Sunday of Advent

This Collect may be said every day in Advent, following the Collect appointed for the day.

Almighty God, give us grace that we may cast away the works of darkness, and put upon us the armor of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which thy Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the quick and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Preface of Advent

Second Sunday of Advent

Merciful God, who sent thy messengers the prophets to preach repentance and prepare the way for our salvation: Give us grace to heed their warnings and forsake our sins, that we may greet with joy the coming of Jesus Christ our Redeemer; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Preface of Advent

Third Sunday of Advent

Stir up thy power, O Lord, and with great might come among us; and, because we are sorely hindered by our sins, let thy bountiful grace and mercy speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with thee and the Holy Ghost, be honor and glory, world without end. Amen.

The Great Litany

The Great Litany

Litanies as forms of prayer are very old, dating from before the fourth century, and for a long time constituted a major part of the congregation's participation in the Mass. The Great Litany in the Book of Common Prayer derives from the first English litany, compiled by Thomas Cranmer in 1544, drawing from the Sarum rite, the Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom, and a Latin litany composed by Martin Luther. The three invocations of saints that appeared in this litany were deleted before it was included in the 1549 Prayer Book. For much of the history of the Anglican Church, the use of the Great Litany after Morning Prayer on Sundays, Wednesdays, and Fridays has been required.

To be said or sung, kneeling, standing, or in procession; before the Eucharist or after the Collects of Morning or Evening Prayer; or separately; especially in Lent and on Rogation days.

O God the Father, Creator of heaven and earth, Have mercy upon us.

O God the Son, Redeemer of the world, Have mercy upon us.

O God the Holy Ghost, Sanctifier of the faithful, Have mercy upon us.

O holy, blessed, and glorious Trinity, one God, Have mercy upon us.

All holy Angels and Archangels, and all holy orders of blessed Spirits,

Pray for us.

All holy Patriarchs and Prophets; Apostles, Martyrs, Confessors, and Virgins; and all the blessed Company of heaven,

In all time of our tribulation; in all time of our prosperity; in the hour of death, and in the day of judgment, Good Lord, deliver us.

That it may please thee to support, help, and comfort all who are in danger, necessity, and tribulation, We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to have mercy upon all mankind, We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to give us true repentance; to forgive us all our sins, negligences, and ignorances; and to endue us with

the grace of thy Holy Spirit to amend our lives according to thy holy Word,

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to forgive our enemies, persecutors, and slanderers, and to turn their hearts, We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to strengthen such as do stand; to comfort and help the weak-hearted; to raise up those who fall; and finally to beat down Satan under our feet, We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to grant to all the faithful departed eternal life and peace,

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Proper Liturgies for Special Days

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Season of Lent, a time of spiritual warfare, of fasting, penitence, and preparation for the Easter feast. Beginning in the tenth century ashes were imposed on this day upon penitent sinners in preparation for their restoration to full communion with the Church. Since the eleventh century, ashes have been imposed upon all the faithful as a reminder that the wages of sin is death. As God said to Adam, "dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return." (Genesis 3:19b) But as we are marked with ashes in the same manner that we were signed with the cross in our Baptisms, we are also reminded that we only have life in Christ, the second Adam.

Before the service, ashes made from branches of palm or other trees which were blessed in the previous year shall be blessed.

The service may begin with the following introit.

Thou hast mercy upon all, O Lord, and abhorrest nothing which thou hast made, and dost overlook the sins of men, that they may repent, and thou sparest them: for thou art the Lord our God. (Wisdom 11) Be merciful unto me, O God, be merciful unto me: for my soul trusteth in thee. (Psalm 57). Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost. As it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end. Amen. Thou hast mercy...

Then shall the Celebrant say

Let us pray.

Almighty and everlasting God, who hatest nothing that thou hast made, and dost forgive the sins of all those who are penitent: Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of thee, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Psalm 103, or 103:8-14

Epistle 2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10
Gospel Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21

After the Sermon, all stand, and the Celebrant or Minister appointed invites the people to the observance of a holy Lent, saying

Dear People of God: The first Christians observed with great devotion the days of our Lord's passion and resurrection, and it became the custom of the Church to prepare for them by a season of penitence and fasting. This season of Lent provided a time in which converts to the faith were prepared for Holy Baptism. It was also a time when those who, because of notorious sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to the fellowship of the Church. Thereby, the whole congregation was put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have to renew their repentance and faith.

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. And, to make a right beginning of repentance, and as a mark of our mortal nature, let us now kneel before the Lord, our maker and redeemer.

Silence is then kept for a time, all kneeling.

If ashes are to be imposed, the Celebrant says the following prayer

Almighty God, thou hast created us out of the dust of the earth: Grant that these ashes may be unto us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by thy gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

The ashes are imposed with the following words

Remember, O man, that thou art dust, and unto dust shalt thou return.

The following Psalm is then sung or said

Psalm 51 Miserere mei, Deus

- 1 Have mercy upon me, O God, after thy great goodness; * according to the multitude of thy mercies do away mine offenses.
- Wash me throughly from my wickedness, * and cleanse me from my sin.
- 3 For I acknowledge my faults, * and my sin is ever before me.

- 4 Against thee only have I sinned, and done this evil in thy sight; * that thou mightest be justified in thy saying, and clear when thou shalt judge.
- 5 Behold, I was shapen in wickedness, * and in sin hath my mother conceived me.
- 6 But lo, thou requirest truth in the inward parts, * and shalt make me to understand wisdom secretly.
- 7 Thou shalt purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; * thou shalt wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.

- 9 Turn thy face from my sins, * and put out all my misdeeds.
- 10 Make me a clean heart, O God, * and renew a right spirit within me.

- 13 Then shall I teach thy ways unto the wicked, * and sinners shall be converted unto thee.

- 15 Thou shalt open my lips, O Lord, * and my mouth shall show thy praise.
- 16 For thou desirest no sacrifice, else would I give it thee; * but thou delightest not in burnt-offerings.
- 17 The sacrifice of God is a troubled spirit: *
 a broken and contrite heart, O God, shalt thou not despise.

The Celebrant and People together, all kneeling

Most holy and merciful Father:
We confess to thee and to one another,
and to the whole communion of saints

that we have sinned by our own fault
in thought, word, and deed;
by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.

The Celebrant continues

We have not loved thee with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven. Lord, have mercy upon us.

We have not heard thy call to serve, as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved thy Holy Spirit.

Lord, have mercy upon us.

We confess to thee, O Lord, all our past unfaithfulness: the pride, hypocrisy, and impatience of our lives, We confess to thee, O Lord.

Our lust, gluttony, and abuse of others, We confess to thee, O Lord.

Our anger, hatred, malice, and envy, We confess to thee, O Lord.

Our laziness, intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work, We confess to thee, O Lord.

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to commend the faith that is in us, We confess to thee, O Lord.

Accept our repentance, O Lord, for the wrongs we have done: for our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty,

Accept our repentance, O Lord.

For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and for our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us,

Accept our repentance, O Lord.

For our poor stewardship and misuse of thy creation, and our lack of concern for the generations to come,

Accept our repentance, O Lord.

Restore us, good Lord, and let thy anger depart from us; Favorably hear us, for thy mercy is great.

Accomplish in us the work of thy salvation; That we may show forth thy glory in the world.

By the cross and passion of thy Son our Lord, Bring us with all thy saints to the joy of his resurrection.

The Bishop, if present, or the Priest, stands and, facing the people, says

Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desireth not the death of sinners, but rather that they may turn from their wickedness and live, hath given power and commandment to his ministers to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the absolution and remission of their sins. He & pardoneth and absolveth all those who truly repent, and with sincere hearts do believe his holy Gospel.

Therefore we beseech him to grant us true repentance and his Holy Spirit, that those things may please him which we do on this day, and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure and holy, so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

In the absence of a bishop or priest, all that precedes may be led by a deacon or lay reader who remains kneeling and substitutes the prayer for forgiveness appointed at Morning Prayer for the above.

The Peace may then be exchanged.

When Communion follows, the service continues with the Offertory.

Preface of Lent

The Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week. The procession with palms calls to mind the triumphal entry of Jesus, our Lord and King, into Jerusalem. The procession is fundamentally an act of worship, witness, and devotion to our Blessed Lord. The purpose of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem was to fulfill his Father's will; thus it is fitting that this service continues with the singing or reading of the Passion, turning the emphasis to the days which lie ahead in Holy Week. We who hail him as king one moment, may in the next deny him, even joining with the crowd in shouting "Crucify him!"

The Liturgy of the Palms

When circumstances permit, the congregation may gather at a place apart from the church, so that all may go into the church in procession. The branches of palm to be carried in the procession may be distributed to the people after the prayer of blessing or before the service.

One of the following or some other suitable anthem is sung or said, the people standing

Blessed is the King who cometh in the name of the Lord: **Peace in heaven and glory in the highest.**

Hosanna to the Son of David: blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord. O King of Israel: Hosanna in the highest.

Celebrant Let us pray.

Assist us mercifully with thy help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby thou hast given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Here, or following the blessing, • Deacon or other person appointed reads one of the following

People Celebrant

The Celebrant then says the following blessing

It is right to praise thee, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which thou hast redeemed us through thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Let them be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leadeth to

eternal life; who liveth and reigneth in glory with thee and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. Amen.

The following or some other suitable anthem may then be sung or said

Blessed is he who cometh in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

After the distribution of palms, the Priest may pray:

Almighty and everlasting God, who didst ordain that our Lord Jesus Christ should ride upon a colt, the foal of an ass; and didst teach the throngs of people to spread their garments and the branches of trees in the way, and to sing Hosanna in his praise: grant, we beseech thee, that we may follow the example of their innocence, and like them, may render thee a worthy service. Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Procession

Deacon Let us go forth in peace.

People In the name of Christ. Amen.

During the procession, all hold branches in their hands, and appropriate hymns, psalms, or anthems are sung, such as the hymn "All glory, laud, and honor" and Psalm 118:19-29.

At a suitable place, the procession may halt while the following or some other appropriate Collect is said

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: Mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

At services on this day other than the principal celebration, suitable portions of the preceding may be used.

At the Eucharist

When the Liturgy of the Palms immediately precedes the Eucharist, the celebration begins with the Kyrie, the Salutation and the Collect of the Day.

The congregation may be seated for the first part of the Passion. At the verse which mentions the arrival at Golgotha (Matthew 27:33, Mark 15:22, Luke 23:33) all stand.

Preface of Holy Week

Maundy Thursday

This day receives its name from the mandatum or the "new commandment" given by our Lord. At the Last Supper, Jesus washed his disciples' feet and commanded them to love and serve one another as he had done. This service begins with a festal character: white vestments are worn; the Gloria in excelsis is sung; additional candles may be lit. This service has been called "a burst of sunshine in the gathering gloom." We at once remember the joy of the institution of the Eucharist, the love and service which Jesus lived and taught, the agony in the garden of Gethsemene, and the betraval leading to the crucifixion. The bread and wine of the Last Supper are given new meaning by the Body broken and Blood poured out on the cross. Sufficient bread and wine may be consecrated on this day for the Mass of the Pre-sanctified on Good Friday. The Sacrament is then taken to an altar of repose where the faithful are asked to "watch and pray." The altar, symbolic of Christ, is stripped of its vesture and the building is left bare for the solemnity of Good Friday.

The Eucharist begins in the usual manner, using the following Collect, Psalm, and Lessons

Almighty Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, did institute the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: Mercifully grant that we may thankfully receive the same in remembrance of him who in these holy mysteries giveth us a pledge of life eternal, the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord; who now liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit ever, one God, world without end. Amen.

When observed, the ceremony of the washing of feet appropriately follows the Gospel and homily. If it is desired to introduce the ceremony by a brief address, the following may be used.

Fellow servants of our Lord Jesus Christ: On the night before his death, Jesus set an example for his disciples by washing their feet, an act of humble service. He taught that strength and growth in the life of the Kingdom of God come not by power, authority, or even miracle, but by such lowly service. We all need to remember his example, but none standeth more in need of this reminder than those whom the Lord hath called to the ordained ministry.

Therefore, I invite you (who have been appointed as representatives of the congregation and) who share in the royal priesthood of Christ, to come forward, that I may recall whose servant I am by following the example of my Master. But come remembering his admonition that what will be done for you is also to be done by you to others, for "a servant is not greater than his master, nor is one who is sent greater than the one who sent him. If ye know these things, blessed are ye if ye do them."

During the ceremony of the washing of feet, one or more of the following, or other suitable anthems, may be sung or said

The Lord Jesus, after he had supped with his disciples and had washed their feet, said unto them, "Know ye what I, your Lord and Master, have done to you? I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done unto you."

Peace is my last gift to you, my own peace I now leave with you; peace which the world cannot give, I give to you. I give you a new commandment: Love one another as I have loved you.

The service continues with the prayers of the People.

Where it is desired to administer Holy Communion from the reserved Sacrament on Good Friday, the Sacrament for that purpose is consecrated at this service.

Preface of Holy Week

The Sacrament to be reserved should be kept in a separate chapel or other place apart from the main sanctuary of the church, in order that on Good Friday the attention of the congregation may be on the bare main Altar. The Sacrament may be carried in procession to the Altar of Repose at the end of Communion. It is appropriate to sing the hymn "Pange lingua gloriosi" during this procession.

If the custom of stripping the Altar is observed as a public ceremony, it takes place after the Maundy Thursday liturgy. It may be done in silence; or it may be accompanied by the recitation of Psalm 22, p. 466, which is sung or said without Gloria Patri. The following antiphon may be sung or said before and after the Psalm.

Antiphon: They parted my garments among them: and upon my vesture they cast lots.

Good Friday

This most solemn of all days should be marked by fasting, abstinence, and penance, leading us to focus on Jesus upon the cross. The bare, stark appearance of the church serves as a reminder of the solemnity and the sorrow of the day. The Lord of Life was rejected, mocked, scourged, and then put to death on the cross. The faithful need to be mindful of the part which their own sins played in this suffering and agony, as Christ took all sin upon himself, in obedience to his Father's will. By the cross we are redeemed, set free from bondage to sin and death. The cross is a sign of God's never-ending love for us. It is a sign of life, in the midst of death.

The service on this day consists of three parts: lessons and prayers, including the recital of the passion; veneration of the cross, a devotion showing our love and thankfulness for the gift of life given us by Jesus' death; and it may conclude with the Mass of the Pre-sanctified from the Sacrament consecrated on Maundy Thursday.

The Celebrant and assistants enter and go to the Altar and prostrate themselves before it, praying in silence. The Celebrant then says

Almighty God, we beseech thee graciously to behold this thy family, for which our Lord Jesus Christ was contented to be betrayed, and given up into the hands of sinners, and to suffer death upon the cross; who now liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost ever, one God, world without end. Amen.

The Passion Gospel is announced in the following manner

The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

The customary responses before and after the Gospel are omitted.

John 18:1-19:37 or 19:1-37

The Passion Gospel may be read or chanted by lay persons. Specific roles may be assigned to different persons, the choir or congregation taking the part of the crowd.

The congregation may be seated for the first part of the Passion. At the verse which mentions the arrival at Golgotha (John 19:17) all stand.

The Sermon follows.

A hymn may then be sung.

The Solemn Collects

All standing, the Celebrant or Deacon sings or says to the people

Dearly beloved brethren, let us pray for the holy Church of God: that the Lord our God may vouchsafe to preserve it throughout all the world in unity, peace, and safety: making subject unto it all Principalities and Powers: and that he may

grant unto us to dwell in such quiet and tranquility that we may duly show forth the glory of God the Father Almighty.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. (Silence). Arise.

Almighty and everlasting God, who hast in Christ made manifest thy glory unto all mankind: we beseech thee that thou wouldest preserve those things which of thy mercy thou hast created; that thy Church, being spread abroad through all the world, may steadfastly abide in the confession of thy holy Name. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let us pray likewise for N. the chief Bishop: that like as the Lord our God hath appointed him to the office of Bishop, so he may preserve him in all peace and safety for the governance of God's holy People.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. (Silence). Arise.

Almighty and everlasting God, whose judgment upholdeth all things both in heaven and earth: we beseech thee mercifully to have respect unto our prayers, that like as thou hast appointed this thy servant to be our bishop so thou wouldest of thy mercy defend him against all adversities; and that all Christian peoples, acknowledging thee alone to be their author and governor, may so prosper by his care that they may duly increase in bringing forth the fruits of their profession. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let us pray likewise for all Bishops, Priests, and Deacons; for all Subdeacons, Acolytes, (Exorcists), Readers, Doorkeepers, (Confessors, Virgins, and Widows): and for all God's holy People.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. (Silence). Arise.

Almighty and everlasting God, by whose Spirit the whole body of the Church is governed and sanctified: receive our supplications and prayers which we offer before thee for all estates of men in thy holy Church; that every member of the same in his vocation and ministry may truly and godly serve thee. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let us pray likewise for N. the President of the United States, and all in Civil Authority; that they, knowing whose ministers they are, may above all things seek thy honor and glory: and that we and all the People, duly considering whose authority they bear, may faithfully and obediently honor them.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. (Silence) Arise.

Almighty and everlasting God, our Governor, whose glory is in all the world: we commend this nation to thy merciful care, that being guided by thy Providence, we may dwell secure in thy peace. Grant to the President of the United States, and to all in authority, wisdom and strength to know and to do thy will. Fill them with the love of truth and righteousness; and make them ever mindful of their calling to serve this people in thy fear. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let us pray likewise for all them that are catechumens: that the Lord our God may open the ears of their hearts that they may enter in at the gate of his mercy; that by the washing of regeneration they may obtain the remission of all their sins, and be found faithful servants of our Lord, Christ Jesus.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. (silence) Arise.

Almighty and everlasting God, who dost ever increase thy Church with the abundance of a new generation: we beseech thee that thou wouldest multiply in faith and understanding them that are being taught in thy holy word; that being renewed in the water of Baptism they may be numbered among the sons of thine adoption. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Dearly beloved brethren, let us pray likewise to God the Father Almighty, that he would vouchsafe to cleanse the world from all false doctrine: to deliver it from pestilence and famine: to open all prisons: and to set free them that are in captivity: granting unto pilgrims a safe return; to the sick healing; and to them that travel by sea to attain unto the haven that they desire.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. (Silence) Arise.

Almighty and everlasting God, the comforter of them that mourn, the strength of them that travail: We beseech thee to hear the prayers of them that in any necessity make their supplications unto thee; that in all their troubles and adversities they may rejoice in the present succor of thy loving-kindness. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let us pray likewise for all them that are in heresy and schism: that the Lord our God may deliver them from all false doctrines, and vouchsafe to restore them to their holy Mother the Catholic and Apostolic Church.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. (Silence) Arise.

Almighty and everlasting God, who wouldest not that any should perish, but rather that they should be saved: we beseech thee mercifully to look upon them that are deceived

by the crafts of the devil; that the hearts of them which have gone astray may be delivered from their perversities and restored to the way of truth and to the unity of thy holy Church. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let us pray likewise for God's chosen people: that the Lord our God may look graciously upon them and that they may come to acknowledge Jesus Christ our Lord as the redeemer of all mankind.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. (Silence) Arise.

Almighty and everlasting God, who didst give thy promises to Abraham and his seed, hear, we pray thee, the prayers of thy Church that the people chosen by thee of old may come to the fullness of redemption. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let us pray likewise for those who do not yet believe in Christ, that the light of the Holy Spirit may fill them and bring them into the way of salvation.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. (Silence) Arise.

Almighty and everlasting God, who desirest not the death of a sinner but rather that he should turn from his wickedness and live: Mercifully accept our prayers; that all who know thee not as thou art revealed in the Gospel of thy Son may be delivered from the worship of their idols, and by confession of the true faith be united to thy holy Church to the honor and glory of thy Name. Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let us pray likewise for the grace of a holy life, that, with all who have departed this world and died in the peace of Christ,

together with those whose faith is known to God alone, we may enter into the joy of our Lord, and receive the crown of life in the day of resurrection.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. (Silence) Arise.

O God of unchangeable power and eternal light: Look favorably upon thy whole Church, that wonderful and sacred mystery; and by the tranquil operation of thy providence, carry out the work of man's salvation; let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up, and things which had grown old are being made new, and that all things are being renewed unto the perfection of him through whom all things were made, thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ, who liveth and reigneth with thee in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Veneration of the Cross

If desired, a wooden cross may now be brought into the church and placed in the sight of the people. The following antiphon may be sung three times, as the cross is being uncovered.

Communion is now administered from the Reserved Sacrament, the Celebrant first saying

₩ Behold, the Lamb of God; behold him that taketh away the sins of the world.

Celebrant and People

Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof: but speak the word only, and my soul shall be healed.

The service concludes with the following prayer. No blessing or dismissal is added.

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, we pray thee to set thy passion, cross, and death between thy judgment and our souls, now and in the hour of our death. Give mercy and grace to the living; pardon and rest to the dead; to thy holy Church peace and concord; and to us sinners everlasting life and glory; for with the Father and the Holy Spirit thou livest and reignest, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Holy Saturday

There is no celebration of the Eucharist on this day.

When there is a Liturgy of the Word, the Celebrant begins with the Collect of the Day

O God, Creator of heaven and earth: Grant that, as the crucified body of thy dear son was laid in the tomb and rested on this holy Sabbath, so we may await with him the coming of the third day, and rise with him to newness of life; who now liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

After the Gospel (and homily), in place of the Prayers of the People, the following anthem is sung or said

Yet, O Lord God most holy, O Lord most mighty, O holy and most merciful Savior, deliver us not into the bitter pains of eternal death.

Thou knowest, Lord, the secrets of our hearts; shut not thy merciful ears to our prayer; but spare us, Lord most holy, O God most mighty, O holy and merciful Savior, thou most worthy Judge eternal. Suffer us not, at our last hour, through any pains of death, to fall from thee.

The service then concludes with the Lord's Prayer and the Grace.

The Great Vigil of Easter

The Great Vigil of Easter is perhaps the most theologically important service of the Church Year. In it the new fire of God is struck, banishing darkness, and showing forth the victory won on Good Friday; the saving acts of God in history are recounted in the *Exsultet* and in scripture; new Christians are made through the Sacrament of Holy Baptism; the vows made by all Christians at their baptisms are renewed; and with the end of the Lenten observance, the first mass of the joyful season of Easter is celebrated. The Vigil is not a short service. It marks time in the evening, while the people await the announcement of the Resurrection: "Alleluia. Christ is risen!" He is risen indeed, and the Paschal Candle burns as a sign of the presence of the resurrected Christ.

The Lighting of the Paschal Candle

In the darkness, fire is kindled; after which the Celebrant may address the people in these or similar words

Dear friends in Christ: On this most holy night, in which our Lord Jesus passed over from death to life, the Church doth bid her members, dispersed throughout the world, to gather in vigil and prayer. For this is the Passover of the Lord, in which, by hearing his Word and celebrating his Sacraments, we share in his victory over death.

The Lord be with you.

People And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

O God, who through thy Son, who is the true corner-stone, hast bestowed upon thy faithful people the fire of thy brightness: we beseech thee that thou wouldest sanctify this new fire, now struck by us from flint-stone, to be profitable to our service: and grant unto us that by this paschal feast we may be so inflamed with heavenly desires, that we may with pure hearts and minds attain unto the feast of thinr eternal brightness. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

The new fire and the Paschal Candle may be blessed, and the Paschal Candle is then lighted from the newly kindled fire. The Deacon (or the Celebrant if there is no Deacon) bearing the Candle, leads the procession to the chancel, pausing three times and singing or saying

The light of Christ.

People Thanks be to God.

If candles have been distributed to members of the congregation, they are lighted from the Paschal Candle at this time. Other candles and lamps in the church, except for those at the Altar, may also be lighted. The Paschal Candle is placed in its stand.

Then the Deacon, or other person appointed, standing near the Candle, sings or says the Exsultet, as follows. The indicated sections may be omitted if desired.

Rejoice now, all ye heavenly legions of Angels: all high things that pass understanding: for the King that cometh with victory, let the trumpet proclaim salvation.

Sing with joy, O earth, illumed with this celestial radiancy: and enlightened by the eternal God, thy glory, believe and know that thou hast put away the darkness of all mankind.

So likewise let our Mother, his holy Church, welcome the bright beams of light shed upon her: and let his holy courts be filled with the praise of his people.

I pray and beseech you therefore, dearly beloved, that all ye who here are present seeking this heavenly brightness make your supplication with me to the Almighty, that he would show forth his mercy toward me. That he who in my unworthiness numbered me among his ministers and called me to do him service, so may also vouchsafe to lighten my darkness, making me meet to praise this gift of fire with thankfulness. Through Jesus Christ our Mediator and Redeemer: who liveth and reigneth with him and the Holy Ghost, ever one God world without end. Amen.

The Lord be with you.

People And with thy spirit.

Deacon Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them up unto the Lord.

Deacon Let us give thanks unto our Lord God.

People It is meet and right so to do.

Deacon

It is very meet and right, that with the service of our lips we should glorify and should praise with heart and soul God the invisible and almighty, and likewise his only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior, who paid for us to the eternal Father the debt of Adam's transgression: and with his dear blood wiped away the reproach of our former offenses.

Now therefore we sacrifice our Passover, wherein for us the very Lamb of God is slain, by whose blood the doors of the faithful people are made holy.

The night is come, wherein our fathers, the children of Israel, were led forth out of Egypt; thou dividedst the sea, and madest them to pass over as on dry land.

Yea, the night is come, that with the fiery pillar hath purged away the darkness of our condemnation.

The night is come, whereby all that believe in Christ upon the face of all earth, delivered from this naughty world and out of the shadow of death, are renewed unto grace, and are made partakers of eternal life. The night is come, wherein the bonds of death were loosed, and Christ harrowing hell rose again in triumph.

For wherefore should man be born into this world, save that being born he might be redeemed? How wonderful then, O God, is thy loving-kindness unto us thy children! Behold, what manner of love he hath bestowed upon us: who to redeem a servant, delivered up his only Son!

O wonderful providence of Adam's transgression, that by such a death sin might be done away! O blessed iniquity, for whose redemption such a price was paid by such a Savior; O night verily blessed, to thee alone that time and that hour were made manifest, when our Savior Christ rose again from death unto life! The night is come, whereof David said: Behold, the night is as clear as the day: Then shall my night be turned into day.

The mystery therefore of this most holy night putteth to flight the deeds of darkness, purgeth away sin: restoreth innocence to the fallen, and gladness unto them that mourn: casteth out hatred, bringeth peace to all mankind, and boweth down mighty princes. Therefore in this thy favorable time, accept, O holy Father, the evening sacrifice of this lighted candle, which as at this time thy holy Church maketh before thee, and offereth to thee by the hands of thy servants, the work, of the bees thy creatures. Ye hear, brethren, the meaning of this pillar we have set up, whereunto in God's honor the bright flame of fire doth set light. Which though it be never so much divided, yet knoweth not variableness nor loseth aught of its splendor. For the wax that melteth doth but feed the flame, for thereunto have the creatures of God's hand brought it forth, that it should give light in darkness. O night verily blessed, which did spoil the people of Egypt, and magnified the Hebrews!

O night, wherein heaven and earth are joined, and mankind partaketh with the Godhead!

We pray thee therefore, O most merciful: that this candle which we have lighted and consecrated before thee in thy own name, may continue to shine forth without ceasing, and may vanquish all the shades of darkness. That being accepted before thee as a sweet savor, it may be numbered with the lights that thou hast kindled. May the day-star find it burning when he dawneth into day: the day-star that riseth, and knoweth not his going down: but coming forth from the places of darkness gladly giveth forth light unto all creation.

We beseech thee, therefore, O most merciful: that thou wouldest direct and guide us thy servants, and the hearts of all thy faithful family: and all those also that minister in thy service: especially N, our Chief Bishop and thy servant N, our Bishop, so helping us with continual grace, that we may pass our time in rest and quietness, in the glad solemnity of our redemption. Do thou also have respect unto those who rule in authority over us, and by the unspeakable gift of thy

love and pity direct their thoughts unto righteousness and peace, that they, together with all thy people, may come from the toils of this world unto their heavenly country.

Through the same Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord: Who liveth and reigneth with thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

It is customary that the Paschal Candle burn at all services from Easter Day until after the Gospel on Ascension Day, or through the Day of Pentecost.

The Liturgy of the Word

The Celebrant may introduce the Scripture readings in these or similar words

Let us hear the record of God's saving deeds in history, how he saved his people in ages past; and let us pray that our God will bring each of us to the fullness of redemption.

At least two of the following Lessons are read, of which one is always the Lesson from Exodus. After each Lesson, the Psalm or Canticle listed, or some other suitable psalm, canticle, or hymn may be sung. A period of silence may be kept; and the collect provided, or some other suitable Collect, may be said.

Holy Baptism (beginning with the Presentation of the Candidates, page 223, and concluding with the reception of the newly baptized) may be administered here. Confirmation may also be administered. In the absence of candidates for Baptism or Confirmation, the Celebrant leads the people in the Renewal of Baptismal Vows. If desired, the Celebrant may first bless the font in the traditional manner, page 721, or in the form in the service of Holy Baptism provided on page 231. The first part of the Litany, page 210, may be sung here if desired.

The Celebrant may then address the people in these or similar words, all standing

Through the Paschal mystery, dearly beloved, we are buried with Christ by Baptism into his death, and raised with him to newness of life. I call upon you, therefore, now that our Lenten observance is ended, to renew the solemn promises and vows of Holy Baptism, by which we once renounced Satan and all his works, and promised to serve God faithfully in his holy Catholic Church.

Preface of Easter

Holy Baptism

Concerning Holy Baptism

Holy Baptism stands at the beginning of Christian Life, not principally because it is frequently administered to young children, but because it is the beginning of all sacramental grace. This is clear from the fourfold nature of the "inward and spiritual grace" of the sacrament.

Baptism is first of all the washing away of sin. When Baptism is administered to those old enough to know right from wrong, their past sinful actions are forgiven; their actual sins are washed away. Even more, all those who are baptized are forgiven what has been traditionally known as original sin. This means that all of the fallenness of our nature which stands as an obstacle to a true relationship with God is done away. God establishes a relationship with us by removing the guilt of our fallen condition.

This new relationship is God's adoption of Christians as His children. Thus - and this is the second part of the grace of the sacrament - we are reborn. The font is a kind of womb bringing forth the new life in Christ. Just as we were born to a physical life from our earthly mothers, so from the font we are born to a spiritual life. This is a life which partakes of the life of God and thus of immortality. As spiritual birth, it is the beginning of Christian life. That life must still be lived, and there is much growth which must follow the birth. But the birth is real, and like our earthly birth, unrepeatable.

In being reborn we are incorporated into Christ and especially into His death and resurrection. St. Paul has termed it "putting on Christ" and putting off "the old man." Coming to the font, we first renounce the devil, the world, and the flesh, and then turn to Jesus and accept His Lordship over our lives. This incorporation into the death and resurrection of Christ is graphically symbolized when the baptism is by immersion: going down into the waters under which human life cannot survive and being raised up through death to a new life.

As a result of the putting on of Christ, we are made members of His Body, the Church. For all of its profound effects on our individual souls, Baptism is also profoundly corporate. In uniting us with Christ, it unites us also with all other Christians who are similarly united with the Head of the Church. Symbolizing this entrance into the Church, the font is often placed near the door to remind us how it is that we have come here.

All of these four elements of the Sacramental grace of Baptism emphasize God's initiative in the Sacrament. This properly expresses the comfortable Gospel of grace: that God saves us quite apart from any merits or good deeds of our own. In Baptism, God takes us to Himself, establishing by His own sovereign mercy a relationship which is intended to bear fruit both in this life and the next.

Holy Baptism is especially appropriate at the Easter Vigil, on the Day of Pentecost, on All Saints' Day or the Sunday after All Saints' Day, and on the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord (the First Sunday after the Epiphany). It is also appropriate to reserve Baptisms for the visitation of a Bishop.

Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it: thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets.

The Collect of the Day

People Amen.

At the principal service on a Sunday or other feast, the Collect and Lessons are properly those of the Day. On other occasions they are selected from "At Baptism."

The Lessons

The people sit. One or two Lessons, as appointed, are read, the reader first saying

A Reading (Lesson) from ______.

A citation giving chapter and verse may be added.

After each Reading, the reader may say

The Word of the Lord.

People Thanks be to God.

or the Reader may say

Here endeth the Reading (Epistle).

Silence may follow.

A Psalm, hymn, or anthem may follow each Reading.

Then, all standing, the Deacon or a Priest sings or reads the Gospel, first saying

The Lord be with you.

People And with thy spirit.

Reader The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ

according to _____.

People Glory be to thee, O Lord.

After the Gospel, the Reader says

The Gospel of the Lord.

People Praise be to thee, O Christ.

The Sermon

Presentation and Examination of the Candidates

Here the Deacon or Celebrant may say

Beloved in the Lord, we have come together in the presence of Almighty God our heavenly Father to witness the Sacrament of Holy Baptism by which these persons are to be made members of Christ's Body, the Church. By the working of this holy sacrament, ordained by Christ himself, these persons will die to sin and be raised to newness of life, receiving the fullness of God's grace that they may faithfully serve him all the days of their lives.

The Celebrant says

The Candidate(s) for Holy Baptism will now be presented.

Adults and Older Children

The candidates who are able to answer for themselves are presented individually by their Sponsors, as follows

Sponsor

I present N. to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

The Celebrant asks each candidate when presented

Wilt thou be baptized in this Faith?

Candidate That is my desire.

Infants and Younger Children

Then the candidates unable to answer for themselves are presented individually by their Parents and Godparents, as follows

Parents and Godparents
I present N. to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

When all have been presented the Celebrant asks the Parents and Godparents

Wilt thou on thy part take heed that this child whom thou dost present be brought up in the Christian faith and life [learn the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments, and all other things which a Christian ought to know and believe to his soul's health]?

Parents and Godparents I will by God's help.

Celebrant

Wilt thou by thy prayers and witness help this child to grow into the full stature of Christ [and take heed that this child, so soon as sufficiently instructed, be brought to the Bishop to be confirmed by him]?

Parents and Godparents I will by God's help.

Then the Celebrant asks the following questions of the candidates who can speak for themselves, and of the Parents and Godparents who speak on behalf of the infants and younger children.

Celebrant

Dost thou renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God?

Answer
I renounce them all.

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Celebrant

Dost thou renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God?

Answer

I renounce them all.

Celebrant

Dost thou renounce all sinful desires that draw thee from the love of God?

Answer

I renounce them all.

If it is desired to anoint the candidate(s) with the Oil of the Catechumens, the priest says the following.

I anoint thee with the Oil of salvation, in Christ Jesus our Lord, that thou mayest have eternal life.

Celebrant

Dost thou turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as thy Savior?

Answer

I do.

Celebrant

Dost thou put thy whole trust in his grace and love?

Answer

I do.

Celebrant

Dost thou promise to follow and obey him as thy Lord and Master?

Answer
I do.

When there are others to be presented, the Bishop says

The other Candidate(s) will now be presented.

Presenters

Right Reverend Father-in-God: I present these persons for Confirmation.

or I present these persons to be received into this Communion.

or I present these persons who desire to reaffirm their baptismal vows.

The Bishop asks the candidates

Dost thou reaffirm thy renunciation of evil?

Candidate I do.

Bishop Dost thou renew thy commitment to

Jesus Christ?

Candidate I do, and with God's grace I will follow him

as my Savior and Lord.

After all have been presented, the Celebrant addresses the congregation, saying

Will ye who witness these vows do all in your power to support these persons in their life in Christ?

People We will.

The Celebrant then says these or similar words

Dearly beloved, let us join with *those* who *are* now committing *themselves* to Christ Jesus and here renew our own baptismal covenant.

The Baptismal Covenant

Celebrant Dost thou believe in God the Father?

People I believe in God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

Celebrant Dost thou believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

People I believe in Jesus Christ his only Son our Lord; who was conceived by the Holy Ghost,

born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried. He descended into hell.

He descended into nen.

The third day he rose again from the dead.

He ascended into heaven,

and sitteth on the right hand of God

the Father almighty.

From thence he shall come to judge

the quick and the dead.

Celebrant Dost thou believe in God the Holy Ghost?

People I believe in the Holy Ghost,

the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body,

and the life everlasting.

Celebrant Wilt thou continue in the apostles' teaching

and fellowship, in the breaking of bread,

and in the prayers?

People I will, by God's help.

Celebrant Wilt thou persevere in resisting evil, and,

whenever thou dost fall into sin, repent and return unto the Lord?

People I will, by God's help.

Celebrant Wilt thou proclaim by word and example

the Good News of God in Christ Jesus?

People I will, by God's help.

Celebrant Wilt thou seek and serve Christ in all men,

loving thy neighbor as thyself?

People I will, by God's help.

Celebrant Wilt thou strive for justice and peace

among all men, and respect the dignity

of every person?

People I will, by God's help.

Prayers for the Candidates

The Celebrant then says to the congregation

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Beloved in the Lord, let us now pray for these persons who are to receive the Sacrament of new birth (and for these persons who have renewed their commitment to Christ).

or the Celebrant may say

Dearly beloved, forasmuch as our Savior Christ saith, None can enter into the kingdom of God, except he be regenerate and born anew of Water and of the Holy Ghost; I beseech you to call upon God the Father, through our Lord Jesus Christ, that of his bounteous mercy he will grant to these persons that which by nature they cannot have; that they may be baptized with Water and the Holy Ghost, and received into Christ's holy Church, and be made (a) living member(s) of the same.

Deliver them O I and from the way of sin

A Person appointed leads the following petitions

Deliver them, O Lord, from the way or sin
and death.
Lord, hear our prayer.
Open their hearts to thy grace and truth.
Lord, hear our prayer.
Fill them with thy holy and life-giving Spirit.
Lord, hear our prayer.
Keep them in the faith and communion of thy
holy Church.
Lord, hear our prayer.
Teach them to love others in the power of
the Holy Ghost.
Lord, hear our prayer.
Send them into the world in faithful witness to

thine abounding love.

Lord, hear our prayer.

People

Leader Bring them to the fullness of thy peace and glory.

People Lord, hear our prayer.

The Celebrant says

Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ thy Son may live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who liveth and reigneth now and for ever. Amen.

or one of the following

Almighty and everlasting God, mercifully look upon the devout prayers of thy servants now seeking regeneration and desiring the fountain of thy waters, even as the hart desireth the water-brooks; and of thy goodness grant that they who thirst after thy faith may in this mystery of thy Holy Baptism obtain sanctification both of body and soul. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Almighty and immortal God, the aid of all who need, the helper of all who flee to thee for succor, the life of those who believe, and the resurrection of the dead: We call upon thee for these thy *Servants* (*Children*), that *they* coming to thy holy Baptism, may receive remission of sin, by spiritual regeneration. Receive *them*, O Lord, as thou hast promised by thy well-beloved Son, saying, Ask, and ye shall have; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you. So give now unto us who ask; let us who seek, find; open the gate unto us who knock; that *these* thy *Servants* (*Children*) may enjoy the everlasting benediction of thy heavenly washing, and may come to the eternal kingdom which thou hast promised by Christ our Lord. Amen.

If blessed salt is to be given, it is given here, with these words

Receive the salt of wisdom: may it be unto thee a pledge of everlasting life. Amen.

Thanksgiving over the Water

The Celebrant blesses the water, first saying

The Lord be with you.

People
And with thy spirit.

Celebrant
Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them up unto the Lord.

Celebrant Let us give thanks unto our Lord God.

People It is meet and right so to do.

The Celebrant continues

We give thee thanks, Almighty God, for the gift of water, over which thy Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation; through which thou didst lead the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise; in which thy Son Jesus Christ received the baptism of John and the anointing of the Holy Spirit, being manifested thereby as the Messiah, the Christ, who leadeth us, through his precious death and mighty resurrection, from the bondage of sin unto life everlasting.

We give thee thanks, O Father, for the water of Baptism, in which we are buried with Christ in his death; by which we partake of his resurrection; through which we are made regenerate of the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to thy Son, we bring into his fellowship them that come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

At the following words, the Celebrant touches the water

Now sanctify this water, we beseech thee, by thy Holy Spirit, that those here cleansed from sin and made regenerate may continue forever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior, to whom, with thee and the same Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and forever. Amen.

Consecration of the Chrism

The Bishop may then consecrate oil of Chrism, placing a hand on the vessel of oil, and saying

Eternal Father, whose blessed Son was anointed by the Holy Ghost to be the Savior and servant of all, we beseech thee of thy mercy so as to consecrate this oil, that those who are sealed by it may share in the royal priesthood of Jesus Christ; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

The Baptism

| Celebrant Name this child (person).

The Parents and Godparents or other presenters state the child's or person's name. The Celebrant, or an assisting priest or deacon, then immerses, or pours water upon the candidate, saying

N., I baptize thee in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

The Celebrant continues

We receive this Child (Person) into the congregation of Christ's flock; and do sign him with the sign of the Cross, in token that

hereafter *he* shall not be ashamed to confess the faith of Christ crucified, and manfully to fight under his banner, against sin, the world, and the devil; and to continue Christ's faithful soldier and servant unto *his* life's end. Amen.

Then the Bishop or Priest places a hand on the person's head, marking the forehead with the sign of the cross [using Chrism if desired] and saying to each one

N., thou art sealed by the Holy Ghost in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever. Amen.

If desired, a white garment may be given, the Priest saying

We give this white vesture, for a token of the innocency bestowed upon thee, and for a sign whereby thou art admonished to give thyself to pureness of living, that after this transitory life, thou mayest be partaker of the life everlasting. **Amen**.

A Baptismal Candle may be lighted from the Paschal Candle and presented, the Celebrant saying

Receive the light of Christ, so that when the Bridegroom cometh, thou mayest go forth with all the saints to meet him; and see that thou dost keep the grace of thy Baptism. Amen.

or

Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven.

When this action has been completed for all candidates, the Bishop or Priest, at a place in full sight of the congregation, prays over them saying

Let us pray: We most heartily thank thee, O heavenly Father, that by water and the Holy Spirit thou hast bestowed upon these thy servants the forgiveness of sin, and hast raised them unto the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in thy Holy Spirit. Give unto them (an) inquiring and discerning heart(s), the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love thee, and the gift of joy and wonder in all thy works. Amen.

When all have been baptized, the Celebrant says

Let us welcome the newly baptized.

Celebrant and People

We receive you into the household of God: Confess the faith of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection and share with us in his eternal priesthood.

If Confirmation, Reception, or the Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows is to follow, the prayers which begin on page 396 are used. The Peace may now be exchanged.

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People

And with thy spirit.

The service then continues with the Offertory.

Whenever possible, Baptism should take place within the context of the Eucharist. At other times, the service may conclude with the Lord's Prayer, other suitable prayers, a blessing and dismissal.

The Holy Eucharist

Concerning the Mass

The words of God are words of power. They bring to pass what they declare. At creation God said, "Let there be light", and there was light. In the Mass, God says, "This is my Body, This is my Blood," and it is so. Although it is the priest who stands at the altar, it is still Christ who speaks the words of power; the bread and wine become his body and blood, his real and true presence. (St. Augustine's Prayer Book)

This Sacrament was instituted by Christ at the Last Supper with his disciples. There he gave new meaning to the Passover meal by identifying himself with the sacrificial lambs, declaring that the bread and wine were his own body and blood, and that henceforth, this was to be done "in remembrance of me." Was ever a command so obeyed? The Mass has been offered for every conceivable human need and circumstance from the birth of a child to the repose of departed souls. Over and over, day by day, the Mass is offered at altars around the world in thanksgiving and supplication, strengthening the people of God. It is holy food for a people being made holy.

The Mass is "our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving." By acknowledging the Mass as sacrifice, we remember that Jesus freely gave of himself in love that we might have true life in him. The sacrifice of the Mass "participates" in the offering of Jesus at the Last Supper, in the offering of Jesus on the Cross, and in the continual offering of Jesus to his Father in Heaven. It also reminds us that we, too, are to live sacrificially.

We also speak of the Mass as the Holy Eucharist, as thanksgiving. We are reminded that Jesus "gave thanks" at the Last Supper. The Mass is the supreme act of Christian thanksgiving, whereby we recall what God has done for us in Christ. We come to Mass not only for what we receive, but because we need to worship.

Other common names for the Mass include the Holy Mysteries, because the fullness of the gift surpasses our

understanding; Holy Communion because we corporately share in the reception of his presence; the Blessed Sacrament because

it is the greatest and holiest of Spiritual joys.

When we take bread and wine (the Offertory), give thanks (the Eucharistic Prayer), break the bread (the Fraction), and then receive Christ's Body and Blood (Communion), we are following Christ's command. It is a command of love, as we are fed by grace and united with him. It is as important that our souls be nourished with the Bread of Heaven and Cup of Salvation as it is for our earthly bodies to be nourished by food and drink. Holy Communion should be received regularly and often; for some that will mean daily, for others weekly, for others once or twice a month. Additionally, major days in the Church Year (such as Christmas, Easter, Pentecost, All Saint's Day) and in one's own life should be celebrated by reception of Holy Communion.

Careful preparation by prayer and self-examination are required before receiving Communion (1 Corinthians 11:27-29). Intending communicants must be free from willful sin, in charity with all, and in reverent fear of God, clean both in heart and soul, with full purpose to remain so. When a communicant's conscience is not clear, before approaching the Sacrament the communicant should first seek counsel, penance, and absolution from a priest in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Fasting is another traditional method of preparation by which we empty ourselves physically so that we may receive him spiritually.

In the Eucharist, we most clearly find ourselves transformed into the holy people of God. We are not to be "as gods," a competing horde of rivals to the One Living God; rather we are his creatures, fallen, yet redeemed in love; his own dear children, whom he willed to make "partakers of the divine nature." We come to adore him and we leave strengthened by

the Word of God to do his will.

Preparation for Mass

The following are traditional prayers said before Mass. Worshipers may wish to pray any of the following or Psalms 82, 83, and 84.

Let us pray.

Graciously hear us, O Lord, Holy Father Almighty, Everlasting God; and may it please Thee to send thy holy Angel from heaven to guard and cherish, to protect and visit, and to defend all who dwell in this thy holy habitation. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

An Exhortation

This Exhortation may be used, in whole or in part, either during the Liturgy or at other times. It may also be used in place of an invitation to confession. It is customary that the Exhortation be said on the First Sunday in Advent, the First Sunday in Lent, and on Trinity Sunday.

Beloved in the Lord: Our Savior Christ, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood as a sign and pledge of his love, for the continual remembrance of the sacrifice of his death, and for a spiritual sharing in his risen life. For in these holy Mysteries we are made one with Christ, and Christ with us; we are made one body in him, and members one of another.

Having in mind, therefore, his great love for us, and in obedience to his command, his Church renders to Almighty God our heavenly Father never-ending thanks for the creation of the world, for his continual providence over us, for his love for all mankind, and for the redemption of the world by our Savior Christ, who took upon himself our flesh, and humbled himself even to death on the cross, that he might make us the children of God by the power of the Holy Spirit, and exalt us to everlasting life.

But if we are to share rightly in the celebration of those holy Mysteries, and be nourished by that spiritual Food, we must remember the dignity of that holy Sacrament. I therefore call upon you to consider how Saint Paul exhorts all persons to prepare themselves carefully before eating of that Bread and drinking of that Cup.

For, as the benefit is great, if with penitent hearts and living faith we receive the holy Sacrament, so is the danger great, if we receive it improperly, not recognizing the Lord's Body.

Judge yourselves, therefore, lest you be judged by the Lord. Examine your lives and conduct by the rule of God's commandments, that you may perceive wherein you have offended in what you have done or left undone, whether in thought, word, or deed; and acknowledge your sins before Almighty God, with full purpose of amendment of life, being ready to make restitution for all injuries and wrongs done by you to others; and also being ready to forgive those who have offended you, in order that you yourselves may be forgiven. And then, being reconciled with one another, come to the banquet of that most heavenly Food.

And if, in your preparation, you need help and counsel, then go and open your grief to a discreet and understanding priest, and confess your sins, that you may receive the benefit of absolution, and spiritual counsel and advice; to the removal of scruple and doubt, the assurance of pardon, and the strengthening of your faith.

To Christ our Lord who loves us, and washed us in his own blood, and made us a kingdom of priests to serve his God and Father, to him be glory in the Church evermore. Through him let us offer continually the sacrifice of praise, which is our bounden duty and service, and, with faith in him, come boldly before the throne of grace (and humbly confess our sins to Almighty God).

The Decalogue

God spake these words, and said: I am the Lord thy God who brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage. Thou shalt have none other gods but me.

After each commandment, the people respond

Lord, have mercy upon us, and incline our hearts to keep this law.

Thou shalt not make to thyself any graven image, nor the likeness of any thing that is in heaven above, or in the earth beneath, or in the water under the earth; thou shalt not bow down to them, nor worship them.

Thou shalt not take the Name of the Lord thy God in vain.

Remember that thou keep holy the Sabbath day.

Honor thy father and thy mother.

Thou shalt do no murder.

Thou shalt not commit adultery.

Thou shalt not steal.

Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.

Thou shalt not covet.

Lord, have mercy upon us, and write all these thy laws in our hearts, we beseech thee.

A Penitential Order

The following may be used at the beginning of the Liturgy, if desired.

A hymn, psalm, or anthem may be sung.

The people standing, the Celebrant says

People

Blessed be God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

And blessed be his kingdom, now and for ever.

Amen.

In place of the above, from Easter Day through the Day of Pentecost

Celebrant

→ Alleluia. Christ is risen.

People

The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia.

In Lent and on other penitential occasions

Celebrant Bless the Lord who forgiveth all our sins; People His mercy endureth for ever.

The Decalogue, page 244, may be said, the people kneeling.

The Celebrant may read one of the following sentences

Hear what our Lord Jesus Christ saith:

Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets. *Matthew* 22:37-40

If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us; but if we confess our sins, God is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. I John 1:8, 9

Through thy dearly beloved Son Jesus Christ our Lord; who after his glorious resurrection manifestly appeared to his disciples; and in their sight ascended into heaven, to prepare a place for us; that where he is, there we might also be, and reign with him in glory.

Pentecost

Through Jesus Christ our Lord; according to whose true promise the Holy Ghost came down [on this day] from heaven,

For all who have Ξ died in the communion of thy Church, and those whose faith is known to thee alone, that, with all the saints, they may have rest in that place where there is no pain or grief, but life eternal, we pray to thee, O Lord.

Rejoicing in the fellowship of [the ever-blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God, (Blessed N.) and] all the saints, let us commend ourselves, and one another, and all our life to Christ our God. To thee, O Lord our God.

Silence

The Celebrant adds a concluding Collect, or this doxology:

For thine is the majesty, O Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Form VI

The Leader and people pray responsively.

In peace, we pray to thee, Lord God.

Silence

For all people in their daily life and work; For our families, friends, and neighbors, and for those who are alone.

For this community, the nation, and the world; For all who work for justice, freedom, and peace.

For the just and proper use of thy creation; For the victims of hunger, fear, injustice, and oppression.

For all who are in danger, sorrow, or any kind of trouble; For those who minister to the sick, the friendless, and the needy.

For the peace and unity of the Church of God; For all who proclaim the Gospel, and all who seek the Truth.

For [N. our Chief Bishop, and N. (N.) our Bishop(s); and for] all bishops and other ministers;
For all who serve God in his Church.

For the special needs and concerns of this congregation.

Silence

The people may add their own petitions.

Hear us. O Lord: For thy mercy is great.

We thank thee, O Lord, for all the blessings of this life [especially for the faithful witness of the Blessed Virgin Mary, (of Blessed , whom we remember this day,) and of all thy saints].

Silence

The people may add their own thanksgivings.

We will exalt thee. O God our King: And praise thy Name for ever and ever.

We pray for \(\mathbf{H} \) all who have died, that they may have a place in thine eternal kingdom.

Silence

The people may add their own petitions

Lord, let thy loving-kindness be upon them; Who put their trust in thee.

We pray to thee also for the forgiveness of our sins.

Silence may be kept.

Leader and people

Have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; (for we have sinned most grievously against thee;) in thy compassion forgive us our sins, known and unknown,

things done and left undone; and so uphold us by thy Spirit that we may live and serve thee in newness of life, to the honor and glory of thy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Celebrant concludes with an absolution or, if the Confession has not been said, with a suitable Collect.

Prayer for the Whole State of Christ's Church

Let us pray for the whole state of Christ's Church.

Almighty and everliving God, who by thy holy Apostle hast taught us to make prayers, and supplications, and to give thanks for all men; We humbly beseech thee most mercifully to accept our [alms and] oblations, and to receive these our prayers, which we offer unto thy Divine Majesty; beseeching thee to inspire continually the Universal Church with the spirit of truth, unity, and concord: And grant that all those who do confess thy holy Name may agree in the truth of thy holy Word, and live in unity and godly love.

We beseech thee also so to direct and dispose the hearts of all Christian Rulers, that they may truly and impartially administer justice, to the punishment of wickedness and vice, and to the maintenance of thy true religion, and virtue.

Give grace, O heavenly Father, to all Bishops and other Ministers, that they may, both by their life and doctrine, set forth thy true and lively Word, and rightly and duly administer thy holy Sacraments.

And to all thy People give thy heavenly grace; and especially to this congregation here present; that, with meek heart and due reverence, they may hear, and receive thy holy Word; truly serving thee in holiness and righteousness all the days of their life.

And we most humbly beseech thee, of thy goodness, O Lord, to comfort and succor all those who, in this transitory life, are in trouble, sorrow, need, sickness, or any other adversity.

And we also bless # thy holy Name for all thy servants departed this life in thy faith and fear; beseeching thee to grant them continual growth in thy love and service, and to give us grace so to follow their good examples, that with them we may be partakers of thy heavenly kingdom. Grant this, O Father, for Jesus Christ's sake, our only Mediator and Advocate. Amen.

The Collect at the Prayers

For the concluding Collect, the Celebrant selects

- (a) Collect appropriate to the season or occasion being celebrated:
- (b) a Collect expressive of some special need in the life of the local congregation; (c) Collect for the mission of the Church; (d) a general Collect such as the following:

Heavenly Father, thou hast promised to hear what we ask in the Name of thy Son: Accept and fulfill our petitions, we pray thee, not as we ask in our ignorance, nor as we deserve in our sinfulness, but as thou knowest and lovest us in thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Almighty God, to whom our needs are known before we ask: Help us to ask only that which is in accordance with thy will; and those good things which we dare not, or in our blindness we cannot ask, grant us for the sake of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Almighty and eternal God, ruler of all things in heaven and earth: Mercifully accept the prayers of thy people, and strengthen us to do thy will; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lord, hear the prayers of thy people; and what we have asked faithfully, grant that we may obtain effectually, to the glory of thy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

O Lord our God, accept the fervent prayers of thy people; in the multitude of thy mercies, look with compassion upon us and all who turn to thee for help; for thou art gracious, O lover of souls, and to thee we give glory, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and for ever. Amen.

O Lord Jesus Christ, who saidst unto thine Apostles, Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: Regard not our sins, but the faith of thy Church; and grant to us the peace and unity of that heavenly City, where with the Father and the Holy Ghost thou livest and reignest, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

Hasten, O Father, the coming of thy kingdom; and grant that we thy servants, who now live by faith, may with joy behold thy Son at his coming in glorious majesty; even Jesus Christ, our only Mediator and Advocate. Amen.

An Order for the Communion of the Sick from the Reserved Sacrament

All kneel, except the sick person, as the minister enters the room with the Blessed Sacrament:

Minister Peace be to this house and to all who dwell in it.

The Lord be with you. And with thy Spirit.

Minister Let us pray: Graciously hear us, O Lord, Holy Father Almighty, Everlasting God; and may it please thee to send thy Holy Angel from heaven, to guard and cherish, to protect and visit, and to defend all who dwell in this habitation, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

If desired, the minister may read an appropriate passage of Scripture and comment on it briefly.

If the sick person desires to make sacramental confession, it shall be done in private and the following confession and absolution shall be omitted. In extreme circumstances, the Confession and Absolution may be omitted.

Minister Let us humbly confess our sins unto Almighty God.

Minister and People

People

Almighty God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, maker of all things, judge of all men: We acknowledge and bewail our manifold sins and wickedness,

which we from time to time most grievously have committed,

by thought, word, and deed, against thy divine Majesty, provoking most justly thy wrath and indignation against us. We do earnestly repent,

and are heartily sorry for these our misdoings; the remembrance of them is grievous unto us, the burden of them is intolerable.

Have mercy upon us, have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may ever hereafter serve and please thee in newness of life, to the honor and glory of thy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The minister, if a priest, now pronounces absolution. If the minister is deacon or layman, he now gives a declaration of forgiveness, substituting "us" and "our" for "you" and "your".

Minister

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, Who of his great mercy hath promised forgiveness of sins to all those who with hearty repentance and true faith turn unto Him: Have mercy upon you; A pardon and deliver you from all your sins; confirm and strengthen you in all goodness; and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

Minister Let us pray: And now, as our Savior Christ hath taught us, we are bold to say:

Minister and People

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses,

as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Then follows

O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us.

O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us.

O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, grant us thy peace.

The following prayer may be said.

We do not presume to come to this thy Table, O merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in thy manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under thy Table. But thou art the same Lord whose property is always to have mercy. Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of thy dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink his blood, [that our sinful bodies may be made clean by his body, and our souls washed through

his most precious blood, and] that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. Amen.

The minister shall administer the Blessed Sacrament, first saying the following Invitation

The Gifts of God for the People of God and may add Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

or the following

₩ Behold the Lamb of God; behold him that taketh away the sins of the world.

Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof: but speak the word only, and my soul shall be healed.

The Blessed Sacrament is then administered in one or both kinds, the minister saying

The Body of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was given for thee, preserve thy body and soul unto everlasting life. Take and eat this in remembrance that Christ died for thee, and feed on him in thy heart by faith, with thanksgiving.

The Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was shed for thee, preserve thy body and soul unto everlasting life. Drink this in remembrance that Christ's Blood was shed for thee, and be thankful.

Priest The Lord be with you. People And with thy spirit.

Priest Let us pray.

Almighty and everliving God, we most heartily thank thee for that thou dost vouchsafe to feed us who have duly received these holy mysteries, with the spiritual food of the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ: and dost assure us thereby of thy favor and goodness towards us; and that we are very members incorporate in the mystical body of thy Son, which is the blessed company of all faithful people; and are also heirs, through hope, of thine everlasting kingdom by the merits of his most precious death and passion. And we humbly beseech thee. O heavenly Father, so to assist us with thy grace, that we may continue in that holy fellowship, and do all such good works as thou hast prepared for us to walk in; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with thee and the holy Ghost, be all honor and glory, world without end. Amen.

The Priest gives the blessing

The peace of God, which passeth all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of his Son Jesus Christ our Lord; and the blessing of God Almighty, the 🗜 Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, be amongst you, and remain with you always. Amen.

A deacon or layman says

The # grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Ghost, be with us all evermore.

Amen.

Pastoral Offices

Concerning Marriage

Holy Matrimony is unique. In the other Sacraments the priest pours the water on the child; he breaks the Bread; he anoints with oil; he says the words of pardon; the Bishop lays his hands on persons to be confirmed or ordained. But in Holy Matrimony it is the couple who *make* the Sacrament by *their* vows before God, who gives them the grace to keep them.

Marriage is not a party, it is not a feast, not a filming and not a parade. It is not a "doing something" event; it is very simply, very profoundly a willing. The bride and groom will to live according to God's Holy Word and ordinance. A summation of the teaching of Holy Scripture concerning Marriage is found at the end of the Order for Marriage (1549).

The courtship is easy, for then each party is free. But Marriage is not a competition; rather it is a joint operation, a cooperative enterprise, a partnership on equal terms. After the vows are exchanged the very hard work of married life, the endless (till death us do part) task, the nothing thought, the nothing said, the nothing done - without first considering the spouse - begins.

Marriage is a union which, like all Sacraments, has two aspects - one physical, the other spiritual. It is a marriage of bodies and minds: broader horizons to be glimpsed, new depths of insight to be followed, and surely joy, patience and love developed.

Each day is new; "Let not the sun go down upon your wrath."

The Celebration and Blessing of a Marriage

At the time appointed, the persons to be married, with their witnesses, assemble in the church or some other appropriate place. During their entrance, a hymn, psalm, or anthem may be sung, or instrumental music may be played.

Then the Celebrant, facing the people and the persons to be married, with the woman to the right and the man to the left, addresses the congregation and says

Dearly beloved: We have come together in the presence of God to witness and bless the joining together of this man and this woman in Holy Matrimony. The bond and covenant of marriage was established by God in creation, and our Lord Jesus Christ adorned this manner of life by his presence and first miracle at a wedding in Cana of Galilee. It signifieth unto us the mystery of the union betwixt Christ and his Church, and Holy Scripture commendeth it to be honored among all people.

The union of husband and wife in heart, body, and mind is intended by God for their mutual joy; for the help and comfort given one another in prosperity and adversity; and, when it is God's will, for the procreation of children and their nurture in the knowledge and love of the Lord. Therefore marriage is not to be entered into unadvisedly or lightly, but reverently, deliberately, and in accordance with the purposes for which it was instituted by God.

Into this holy union N. N. and N. N. now come to be joined. If any of you can show just cause why they may not lawfully be married, speak now; or else for ever hold your peace.

Then the Celebrant says to the persons to be married

I require and charge ye both, here in the presence of God, that if either of ye know any reason why ye may not be united in marriage lawfully, and in accordance with God's Word, ye do now confess it.

The Declaration of Consent

The Celebrant says to the man

N., wilt thou have this woman to be thy wife; to live together in the covenant of marriage? Wilt thou love her, comfort her, honor and keep her, in sickness and in health; and, forsaking all others, be faithful unto her as long as ye both shall live?

The Man answers

I will.

The Celebrant says to the woman

N., wilt thou have this man to be thy husband; to live together in the covenant of marriage? Wilt thou love him, comfort him, honor and keep him, in sickness and in health; and, forsaking all others, be faithful unto him as long as ye both shall live?

The Woman answers

I will.

The Celebrant then addresses the congregation, saying

Will all of you witnessing these promises do all in your power to uphold these two persons in their marriage?

People

We will.

If there is to be a presentation or a giving in marriage, it takes place at this time.

Celebrant

Who giveth this woman to be married to

this man?

Presenter(s)

I do.

A hymn, psalm, or anthem may follow.

The Ministry of the Word

The Celebrant then says to the people

The Lord be with you.

People

And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

O gracious and everliving God, who hast created us male and female in thine image: Look mercifully upon this man and this woman who come unto thee seeking thy blessing, and so assist them with thy grace, that with true fidelity and steadfast love they may honor and keep the promises and vows they make; through Jesus Christ our Savior, who liveth and reigneth with thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Then one or more of the following passages from Holy Scripture is read. If there is to be a Communion, a passage from the Gospel always concludes the Readings.

Genesis 1:26-28 (Male and female he created them)

Genesis 2:4-9, 15-24 (A man cleaves to his wife and they become one flesh)

Song of Solomon 2:10-13; 8:6-7 (Many waters cannot quench love) Tobit 8:5b-8 (New English Bible) (That she and I may grow old together)

I Corinthians 13:1-13 (Love is patient and kind)

Ephesians 3:14-19 (the Father from whom every family is named)

Ephesians 5:1-2, 21-33 (Walk in love, as Christ loved us)

Colossians 3:12-17 (Love which binds everything together in harmony)

I John 4:7-16 (Let us love one another for love is of God)

Between the Readings, a Psalm, hymn, or anthem may be sung or said. Appropriate Psalms are 67, 127, and 128.

When a passage from the Gospel is to be read, all stand, and the Deacon or Minister appointed says

The Lord be with you.

People And with thy spirit.

The Marriage

People

The Man, facing the woman and taking her right hand in his, says

In the Name of God, I, N., take thee, N., to be my wife, to have and to hold from this day forward, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, until we are parted by death. This is my solemn vow.

Then they loose their hands, and the Woman, still facing the man, takes his right hand in hers, and says

In the Name of God, I, N., take thee, N., to be my husband, to have and to hold from this day forward, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, until we are parted by death. This is my solemn vow.

They loose their hands.

The Priest may ask God's blessing on a ring or rings as follows

Bless, O Lord, this ring to be a sign of the vows by which this man and this woman have bound themselves to each other; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The giver places the ring on the ring-finger of the other's hand and says

N., I give thee this ring as a symbol of my vow, and with all that I am, and all that I have, I honor thee, in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Then the Celebrant joins the right hands of husband and wife and says

Now that N. and N. have given themselves to each other by solemn vows, with the joining of hands and the giving and receiving of a ring, I pronounce that they are husband and wife, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

Those whom God hath joined together let no man put asunder.

People Amen.

The Prayers

The Lord's Prayer may be said, the Celebrant first saying "And now, as our Savior Christ hath taught us, we are bold to say...".

The Deacon or other person appointed reads the following prayers, to which the People respond, saying, Amen.

Let us pray.

Eternal God, who art the creator and preserver of all life, the author of salvation, and the giver of all grace: Look with favor upon the world thou hast made, and for which thy Son gave his life, and especially upon this man and this woman whom thou dost make one flesh in Holy Matrimony. Amen.

Give them wisdom and devotion in the ordering of their common life, that each may be unto the other a strength in need, a counselor in perplexity, a comfort in sorrow, and a companion in joy. Amen.

Grant that their wills may be so knit together in thy will, and their spirits in thy Spirit, that they may grow in love and peace with thee and with one another all the days of their life.

Amen.

Give them grace, when they hurt each other, to recognize and acknowledge their fault, and to seek one another's forgiveness and thine. Amen.

Make their life together a sign of Christ's love unto this sinful and broken world, that unity may overcome estrangement, forgiveness heal guilt, and joy conquer despair. Amen.

Bestow upon them, if it be thy will, the gift and heritage of children, and the grace to bring them up to know thee, to love thee, and to serve thee. Amen.

Give them such fulfillment of their mutual affection that they may reach out in love and concern for others. Amen.

Grant that all married persons who have witnessed these vows may find their lives strengthened and their loyalties confirmed.

Amen.

Grant that the bonds of our common humanity, by which all thy children are united one to another, and the living to the dead, may be so transformed by thy grace, that thy will may be done on earth as it is in heaven; where, O Father, with thy Son and the Holy Ghost, thou livest and reignest in perfect unity, now and forever. Amen.

The Blessing of the Marriage

The people remain standing. The husband and wife kneel, and the Priest says one of the following prayers

Most gracious God, we give thee thanks for thy tender love in sending Jesus Christ to come among us, to be born of a human mother, and to make the way of the cross to be the way of life. We thank thee, also, for consecrating the union of man and woman in his Name. By the power of thy Holy Spirit, pour out the abundance of thy blessing upon this man and this woman. Defend them from every enemy. Lead them into all peace. Let their love for each other be a seal upon their hearts, a mantle about their shoulders, and a crown upon their foreheads. Bless them in their work and in their companionship; in their sleeping and in their waking; in their joys and in their sorrows; in their life and in their death. Finally, in thy mercy, bring them to that table where thy saints feast for ever in thy heavenly home; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with thee and the Holy Spirit liveth and reigneth, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

or this

O God, who hast so consecrated the covenant of marriage that in it is represented the spiritual unity betwixt Christ and his Church: Send therefore thy blessing upon these thy servants, that they may so love, honor, and cherish each other in faithfulness and patience, in wisdom and true godliness, that their home may be a haven of blessing and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

The husband and wife still kneeling, the Priest adds this blessing

God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Spirit, bless, preserve, and keep you; the Lord mercifully with his favor look upon you, and fill you with all spiritual benediction and grace; that ye may so live together in this life, that in the world to come ye may have life everlasting. Amen.

The Peace

The Celebrant may say to the people

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And with thy spirit.

The newly married couple then greet each other, after which greetings may be exchanged throughout the congregation.

When Communion is not to follow, the wedding party leaves the church. A hymn, psalm, or anthem may be sung, or instrumental music may be played.

At the Eucharist

The liturgy continues with the Offertory, at which the newly married couple may present the offerings of bread and wine.

Preface of Marriage

Communion of the People

At the Communion, it is appropriate that the newly married couple receive Communion first, after the ministers.

In place of the usual postcommunion prayer, the following is said

O God, the giver of all that is true and lovely and gracious: We give thee thanks for binding us together in these holy mysteries of the Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ. Grant that by thy Holy Spirit, N. and N., now joined in Holy Matrimony, may become one in heart and soul, live in fidelity and peace, and obtain those eternal joys prepared for all who love thee; for the sake of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

As the wedding party leaves the church, a hymn, psalm, or anthem may be sung; or instrumental music may be played.

The Blessing of a Civil Marriage

The Rite begins as prescribed for celebrations of the Holy Eucharist, using the Collect and Lessons appointed in the Marriage service.

After the gospel (and homily), the husband and wife stand before the Celebrant, who addresses them in these or similar words

N., and N., ye have come here today to seek the blessing of God and of his Church upon your marriage. I require, therefore, that ye promise, with the help of God, to fulfill the obligations which Christian Marriage demands.

The Celebrant then addresses the husband, saying

N., thou hast taken N. to be thy wife. Dost thou promise to love her, comfort her, honor and keep her, in sickness and in health; and, forsaking all others, to be faithful to her as long as ye both shall live?

The Husband answers I do.

The Celebrant then addresses the wife, saying

N., thou hast taken N. to be thy husband. Dost thou promise to love him, comfort him, honor and keep him, in sickness and in health; and, forsaking all others, to be faithful to him as long as ye both shall live?

The Wife answers I do.

The Celebrant then addresses the congregation, saying

Will ye who have witnessed these promises do all in your power to uphold these two persons in their marriage?

People We will.

If a ring or rings are to be blessed, the wife extends her hand (and the husband extends his hand) toward the Priest, who says

Bless, O Lord, this ring to be a sign of the vows by which this man and this woman have bound themselves to each other; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Celebrant joins the right hands of the husband and wife and says

Those whom God hath joined together let no man put asunder.

The Congregation responds Amen.

The service continues with The Prayers on page 316.

Concerning the Service

The following is an adaptation of the Form of Solemnization of Matrimony from the First English Book of Common Prayer (1549). The service may be used in its entirety, or it may be used as a resource. The exhortation found at the end concerning the teaching of Holy Scripture on Marriage is particularly beneficial.

An Order for Marriage

At the time appointed, the persons to be married, with their witnesses, assemble in the church or some other appropriate place.

During their entrance, a hymn, psalm, or anthem may be sung, or instrumental music may be played.

Then the Celebrant, facing the people and the persons to be married, with the woman to the right and the man to the left, addresses the congregation and says

Dearly beloved friends: We are gathered together here in the sight of God and in the face of this congregation to join together this man and this woman in Holy Matrimony, which is an honorable estate instituted of God in paradise, in the time of man's innocence, signifying unto us the mystical union that is betwixt Christ and his Church, which holy estate Christ adorned and beautified with his presence and first miracle that he wrought in Cana of Galilee, and is commended of Saint Paul

to be honored among all men. It therefore is not to be entered into or undertaken unadvisedly, lightly, or wantonly, to satisfy men's carnal lusts and appetites, like brute beasts that have no understanding, but reverently, discreetly, advisedly, soberly, and in the fear of God, duly considering the causes for which matrimony was ordained.

The union of husband and wife in heart, body, and mind is intended by God for the procreation of children, who are to be brought up in the fear and nurture of the Lord and in praise of God. It was ordained also as a remedy against sin, and to avoid fornication, that such persons as be married might live chastely in matrimony and keep themselves undefiled members of Christ's body. Thirdly, it was ordained for the mutual society, help, and comfort that the one ought to have of the other, both in prosperity and adversity.

Into this holy estate N. N. and N. N. come now to be joined. Therefore if any man can show just cause why they may not lawfully be joined so together, let him now speak, or else hereafter for ever hold his peace.

Then the Celebrant says to the persons to be married

I require and charge you both, here in the presence of God (as you will answer at the dreadful day of judgment, when the secrets of all hearts shall be revealed) that if either of you do know any impediment why ye may not be lawfully joined together in matrimony, and in accordance with God's Word, ye do now confess it. For be ye well assured, that so many as be coupled together otherwise than God's word doth allow are not joined of God, neither is their marriage lawful.

The Declaration of Consent

The Celebrant says to the man

N, wilt thou have this woman to thy wedded wife, to live together after God's ordinance in the holy estate of matrimony? Wilt thou love her, comfort her, honor and keep her, in sickness and in health; and, forsaking all others, keep thee only to her so long as you both shall live?

The Man answers

I will.

The Celebrant says to the woman

N., wilt thou have this man to thy wedded husband; to live together after God's ordinance in the holy estate of matrimony? Wilt thou obey him, and serve him, love, honor, and keep him in sickness and in health; and, forsaking all others, keep thee only to him so long as ye both shall live?

The Woman answers

I will.

Then shall the Celebrant say

Who giveth this woman to be married to this man?

Presenter(s) I do.

The Marriage

The Man, facing the woman and taking her right hand in his, says

I, N., take thee, N., to my wedded wife, to have and to hold from this day forward, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part, according to God's holy ordinance; and thereto I plight thee my troth.

Then they loose their hands, and the Woman, still facing the man, takes his right hand in hers, and says

I, N., take thee, N., to my wedded husband, to have and to hold from this day forward, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love, cherish, and to obey, till death us do part, according to God's holy ordinance; and thereto I give thee my troth.

They loose their hands.

The Priest may bless the ring(s), after which the giver places the ring on the ring-finger of the other's hand and says

With this ring I thee wed, with my body I thee worship, and with all my worldly goods I thee endow: In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Then shall the man and the woman kneel down; and the Celebrant shall say

Let us pray.

O Eternal God, Creator and Preserver of all mankind, Giver of all spiritual grace, the Author of everlasting life: Send thy

blessing upon these thy servants, this man and this woman, whom we bless in thy name, that as Isaac and Rebecca (after bracelets and jewels of gold given of the one to the other for tokens of their matrimony) lived faithfully together; so these persons may surely perform and keep the vow and covenant betwixt them made, whereof this ring given and received, is a token and pledge. And may ever remain in perfect love and peace together; and live according to thy laws; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then the Celebrant joins the right hands of husband and wife and says

Those whom God hath joined together let no man put asunder.

Forasmuch as N. and N. have consented together in holy wedlock, and have witnessed the same before God and this company, and thereto have given and pledged their troth either to other, and have declared the same by the giving and receiving of a ring, I pronounce that they be Man and Wife together, in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

And the Priest, or Bishop, if present, shall add this blessing

God the Father bless you. A God the Son keep you: God the Holy Ghost lighten your understanding: The Lord mercifully with his favor look upon you, and so fill you with all spiritual benediction, and grace, that you may have remission of your sins in this life, and in the world to come life everlasting. Amen.

Then shall be said or sung Psalm 128 or Psalm 67.

The man and woman kneeling before the altar the Celebrant shall say

Lord, have mercy upon us.

Christ, have mercy upon us.

Lord, have mercy upon us.

Our Father, who art in heaven, Hallowed be thy Name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, As we forgive those that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation;

R. But deliver us from evil. Amen.

- V. O Lord, save thy servant and thine handmaid;
- R. Who put their trust in thee.
- V. O Lord, send them help from thy holy place;
- R. And evermore defend them.
- V. Be unto them a tower of strength,
- R. From the face of their enemy.
- V. O Lord, hear our prayer.
- R. And let our cry come unto thee.

Let us pray.

O God of Abraham, God of Isaac, God of Jacob, bless these thy servants, and sow the seed of eternal life in their minds, that whatsoever in thy holy word they shall profitably learn, they may in deed fulfill the same. Look, O Lord, mercifully upon them from heaven, and bless them. And as thou didst send thy Angel Raphael to Tobias and Sara, the daughter of Raguel, to their great comfort; so vouchsafe to send thy blessing upon these thy servants, that they, obeying thy will and always being in safety under thy protection, may abide in thy love unto their life's end, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The prayer following shall be omitted where the woman is beyond child-bearing age.

O merciful Lord and heavenly Father, by whose gracious gift mankind is increased: We beseech thee, assist with thy blessing these two persons, that they may both be fruitful in procreation of children, and also live together so long in godly love and honesty that they may see their children's children, unto the third and fourth generation, unto thy praise and honor, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

O God who by thy mighty power hast made all things of naught, who also after other things set in order didst appoint that out of man (created after thine own image and similitude) woman should take her beginning, and, knitting them together, didst teach that it should never be lawful to put asunder those whom thou by matrimony hadst made one. O God, who hast consecrated the state of matrimony to such an excellent mystery that in it is signified and represented the spiritual marriage and unity betwixt Christ and his Church, look mercifully upon these thy servants, that both this man may love his wife, according to thy word (as Christ did love his spouse the Church, who gave himself for it, loving and cherishing it even as his own flesh) and also that this woman may be loving and amiable to her husband as Rachel, wise as Rebecca, faithful and obedient as Sara; and in all quietness, sobriety, and peace, be a follower of holy and godly matrons. O Lord, bless them both and grant them to inherit thy everlasting kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then shall the Priest bless the man and the woman, saying

Almighty God, who at the beginning did create our first parents Adam and Eve, and did sanctify and join them together in marriage: pour upon you the richness of his grace, sanctify and H bless you, that ye may please him both in body and soul, and live together in holy love unto your lives' end. Amen.

Then follows the Eucharist in the usual manner. The following exhortation declaring the teaching of Holy Scripture concerning Holy Matrimony may be read in place of a sermon.

All ye which be married, or which intend to take the holy estate of Matrimony upon you: Hear what Holy Scripture saith concerning the duty of husbands toward their wives, and wives toward their husbands.

Saint Paul, in the fifth chapter of his Epistle to the Ephesians, giveth this commandment to all married men:

Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ loved the Church and hath given himself for it, to sanctify it, purging it in the fountain of water through the word, that he might make it unto himself a glorious congregation, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing; but that it should be holy and blameless. So men are bound to love their own wives as their own bodies. He that loveth his own wife loveth himself. For never did any man hate his own flesh, but nourisheth and cherisheth it, even as the Lord doth the Church, for we are members of his body, of his flesh and of his bones. For this cause shall a man leave father and mother, and shall be joined unto his wife, and they two shall be one flesh. This mystery is great, but I speak of Christ and the Church. Nevertheless let every one of you so love his own wife, even as himself.

Likewise, Saint Paul (writing to the Colossians) speaketh thus to all men that be married:

Men, love your wives and be not bitter unto them. [Coloss. 3]

Hear also what Saint Peter the apostle of Christ, who was himself a married man, saith to all married men:

Husbands, dwell with your wives according to knowledge, giving honor unto the wife as unto the weaker vessel, and as heirs together of the grace of life, so that your prayers are not hindered. [I Peter 3]

Hitherto you have heard the duty of the husband toward the wife. Now likewise, ye wives, hear and learn your duty toward your husbands, as it is plainly set forth in Holy Scripture:

Saint Paul (in the Epistle to the Ephesians) teacheth you thus:

Ye women submit yourselves unto your own husbands as unto the Lord, for the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the Church, and he also is the savior of the whole body. Therefore as the Church is subject to Christ, so likewise let the wives be in subjection unto their own husbands in all things. [Ephesians 5]

And again he saith

Let the wife reverence her husband.

And, in his Epistle to the Colossians, Saint Paul giveth you this short lesson:

Ye wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as is fitting in the Lord. [Coloss. 3]

Saint Peter also instructeth you in a truly godly manner, saying,

Let wives be subject to their own husbands, so that if any do not obey the word, they may be won without a word by the conduct of their wives when they behold your chaste conduct, coupled with fear. Let not your adornment be merely outward, with embroidery and trimming of gold and the putting on of gorgeous apparel, but let the hidden person in the heart be without corruption, so that the spirit is mild and quiet, which is a precious thing in the sight of God. For after this manner, in the old time, did the holy women who trusted in God clothe themselves, being subject to their own husbands, as Sarah obeyed Abraham, calling him lord. You are her daughters, if you do well and are not dismayed with any fear. [I Peter 3]

Concerning The Thanksgiving for a Child

The first commandment given by God to man was, "Be fruitful and multiply..." (Genesis 1:28). Procreation and the accompanying care of children is a sacred gift and responsibility calling for a human, religious act of thanksgiving.

Having its origin in the Jewish purification rituals (Leviticus 12) and in the Gospel account of the purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the presentation of Christ in the temple in Jerusalem (Luke 2:22-38), this pastoral office of the Church provides parents and other family members and friends with a service in which prayers, praise, and thanksgiving may be offered to Almighty God for the gift of a child. The service is an opportunity for a mother to give thanks for a safe delivery from the dangers and pain of childbirth. Whether by birth or adoption, a child is a merciful gift of a loving Father who calls us to be stewards of life itself.

Thanksgiving for the Birth of a Child

As soon as convenient after the birth of a child the parents, with other members of the family, should come to the church to be welcomed by the congregation and to give thanks to Almighty God.

A passage from Scripture may first be read. Either Luke 2:41-51, or Luke 18:15-17, is appropriate.

The Celebrant addresses the congregation in these or similar words

Dear Friends in Christ: The birth of a child is a joyous and solemn occasion in the life of a family. It is also an occasion for rejoicing in the Christian community. I bid you, therefore, to join this family in giving thanks to Almighty God our heavenly Father, the Lord of all life, for the gift of this child, N. Let us say together:

Magnificat

My soul doth magnify the Lord, *
 and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior.

For he hath regarded *

the lowliness of his handmaiden.

For behold from henceforth *

all generations shall call me blessed.

For he that is mighty hath magnified me, * and holy is his Name.

And his mercy is on them that fear him * throughout all generations.

He hath showed strength with his arm; * he hath scattered the proud in the imagination of their hearts.

He hath put down the mighty from their seat, * and hath exalted the humble and meek.

He hath filled the hungry with good things, * and the rich he hath sent empty away.

He remembering his mercy hath holpen his servant Israel, * as he promised to our forefathers,

Abraham and his seed for ever.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, * and to the Holy Ghost.

As it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, * world without end. Amen.

The Celebrant then says

The Lord be with you.

People And with thy spirit.

Let us pray: O God, who hast taught us through thy blessed Son that whoever receives a little child in the name of Christ receives Christ himself: We give thee thanks for the blessing thou hast bestowed upon this family in giving them a child. Confirm their joy by a lively sense of thy presence with them, and give them calm strength and patient wisdom as they seek to bring this child to love all that is true and noble, just and pure, lovable and gracious, excellent and admirable, following the example of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

The Celebrant may then say to the Mother

Forasmuch as it hath pleased Almighty God, of his goodness, to give thee safe deliverance, and to preserve thee in the great danger of childbirth; thou shalt therefore give hearty thanks unto God, saying

All join with the Celebrant and the Mother in the following

My delight is in the Lord; *

because he hath heard the voice of my prayer;

Because he hath inclined his ear unto me; *

therefore will I call upon him as long as I live.

I found trouble and heaviness; then called I upon the Name of the Lord; *

O Lord, I beseech thee, deliver my soul.

Gracious is the Lord, and righteous; * vea, our God is merciful.

What reward shall I give unto the Lord *

for all the benefits that he hath done unto me?

I will receive the cup of salvation, * and call upon the Name of the Lord.

I will pay my vows now in the presence of all his people, * in the courts of the Lord's house; even in the midst of thee, O Jerusalem. Praise the Lord.

Then shall the Celebrant say

Let us pray: O Almighty God, we give thee humble thanks for that thou hast been graciously pleased to preserve, through the great pain and peril of childbirth, this woman, thy servant, who desireth now to offer her praises and thanksgivings unto thee. Grant, we beseech thee, most merciful Father, that she, through thy help, may faithfully live according to thy will in this life, and also may be partaker of everlasting glory in the life to come; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Grant, we beseech thee, O heavenly Father, that the child of these thy servants may daily increase in wisdom and stature, and grow in thy love and service, until *he* come to thy eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Celebrant may then bless the family saying,

May God the Father, who by baptism hath adopted you as his children, grant you his grace; may God the Son, who sanctified a home at Nazareth, fill you with his love; may God the Holy Ghost, who hath united you in one family, keep you in his peace. And the blessing of God Almighty, the A Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, be with you, and remain with you always. Amen.

The Peace may be exchanged.

Thanksgiving for the Adoption of a Child

As soon as convenient after the adoption of a child the parents, with other members of the family, should come to the church to be welcomed by the congregation and to give thanks to Almighty God.

A passage from Scripture may first be read. Luke 18:15-17 is appropriate.

The Celebrant addresses the congregation in these or similar words

Dear Friends in Christ: It has pleased God our heavenly Father to answer the earnest prayers of this Christian family for the gift of a child. I bid you join with them in offering heartfelt thanks for the joyful and solemn responsibility which is theirs by the coming of N. to be a member of their family.

The Celebrant first asks the parents

Do you take this child for your own?

Parents I do.

Then if the child is old enough to answer, the Celebrant asks

N., do you take this woman as your mother?

Child I do.

Celebrant Do you take this man as your father?

Child I do.

Then the Celebrant, holding or taking the child by the hand, gives the child to the mother or father, saying

As God the Father hath made us his children by adoption and grace, may you receive N. as your own son (daughter).

Then one or both parents say these or similar words

May God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, of whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named, bless this child N., and us; and may our name be named upon him that we may live together in love and affection; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Celebrant says

Since it hath pleased God to bestow upon this family the gift of a child, let us now give thanks to him, and say together:

Magnificat

₩ My soul doth magnify the Lord, *
and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior.

For he hath regarded *

the lowliness of his handmaiden.

For behold from henceforth *

all generations shall call me blessed.

For he that is mighty hath magnified me, * and holy is his Name.

Confirm their joy by a lively sense of thy presence with them, and give them calm strength and patient wisdom as they seek to bring this child to love all that is true and noble, just and pure, lovable and gracious, excellent and admirable, following the example of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Grant, we beseech thee, O heavenly Father, that the child of these thy servants may daily increase in wisdom and stature, and grow in thy love and service, until *he* come to thy eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Celebrant may then bless the family saying,

May God the Father, who by baptism hath adopted you as his children, grant you his grace; may God the Son, who sanctified a home at Nazareth, fill you with his love; may God the Holy Ghost, who hath united you in one family, keep you in his peace. And the blessing of God Almighty, the H Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, be with you, and remain with you always. Amen.

The Peace may be exchanged.

Additional Prayers

For Families

O Lord Jesus Christ, who by thy wondrous holiness didst adorn a human home, and by thy subjection to Mary and Joseph didst consecrate the order of earthly families: Grant that we, being enlightened by the example of their life with thee in thy holy family and assisted by their prayers, may at last be joined with them in thine eternal fellowship; who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who settest the solitary in families: We commend to thy continual care the homes in which thy people dwell. Put far from them, we beseech thee, every root of bitterness, the desire of vainglory, and the pride of life. Fill them with faith, virtue, knowledge, temperance, patience, godliness. Knit together in constant affection those who, in holy wedlock, have been made one flesh. Turn the hearts of the parents to the children, and the hearts of the

children to the parents; and so enkindle fervent charity among us all, that we may evermore be kindly affectioned one to another; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

For the Gift of a Child

Heavenly Father, who didst send thine own Son into this world: We thank thee for the life of this child, N., entrusted to our care. Help us to remember that we are all thy children, and so to love and nurture him, that he may attain to that full stature intended for him in thy eternal kingdom; for the sake of thy dear Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Concerning Reconciliation or Confession

The power to forgive sins was given to the Church by our risen Lord on the first evening of Easter: "Jesus breathed on the disciples, and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.'" (John 20:22-23) At the heart of the Gospel is the call to repentance, the call to turn from sin toward God. (Mark 1:14-15) In the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we have the means for forgiveness of sin committed after Baptism.

In its essence, Penance is something extremely simple - we kneel beside another and confess to God our sins, laying bare the real failures of every day which honest thinking compels us to admit. A confession is not a portrait of vague disgust with ourselves, but revealing those concrete occasions in which we have sinned. Confession and the granting of God's forgiveness, or Absolution, not only gives us, but also compels us to seek a new and enriched relationship with the Savior of the world, with our neighbors, and with ourselves. By our penance, we enter into the joy of our Lord.

The four stages of this Sacrament of the Gospel of grace are: Contrition, or sorrow for our sins. By careful self-examination, we know what our sins are and the extent to which we have offended God's love and goodness. Confession: we own up to our sins simply, honestly, and completely. We make our confession to a Priest as a minister of God and as a representative of his holy Church. Absolution: God washes away the stain of sin from our souls and gives us strength to resist sin in the future. Satisfaction: we do our penance as a sign that we will try to do God's holy will in the future, resolving not to sin again, by the help of God's grace.

Reconciliation of a Penitent or Confession

The Penitent, kneeling, begins

Bless me, Father, for I have sinned.

The Priest says

The Lord be in thy heart and upon thy lips, that thou mayest truly and humbly confess all thy sins: In the Name of the Father, and of the \(\mathbb{H}\) Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Penitent

I confess to Almighty God,	to his Church, and to thee Father,
that I have sinned by my own fault in thought, word, and deed,	
in things done and left undone; especially since my last	
	, I have committed these
sins: For thes	e and all other sins which I cannot
	orry. I pray God to have mercy
upon me. I firmly intend amendment of life, and I humbly beg	
forgiveness of God and his Church, and I ask thee for penance,	
counsel, and absolution.	

Here the Priest may offer counsel, direction, and comfort.

The Priest then pronounces this absolution

Our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath left power to his Church to absolve all sinners who truly repent and believe in him, of his great mercy forgive thee all thine offenses; and by his authority committed unto me, I absolve thee from all thy sins: In the Name of the Father, and of the \(\mathbb{H} \) Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

or this

Our Lord Jesus Christ, who offered himself to be sacrificed for us to the Father, and who conferred power on his Church to forgive sins, A absolve thee through my ministry by the grace of the Holy Spirit, and restore thee in the perfect peace of the Church. Amen.

The Priest adds

The Lord hath put away all thy sins.

Penitent Thanks be to God.

The Priest concludes

Go (or abide) in peace, and pray for me, a sinner.

Another Form for Confession

The Penitent, kneeling, begins:

Bless me, Father, for I have sinned.

The Priest responds:

The Lord be in thy heart and upon thy lips, that so thou mayest worthily confess all thy sins; In the Name of the Father, and of the A Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

The Penitent then makes his Confession, using the following or a similar formula:

I confess to Almighty God, to all the Saints, and to thee, Father, that I have sinned very much, in thought, word, deed, and omission, by my own great fault. Since my last confession which was _____, when I received absolution and performed my penance, I have committed these sins:

He confesses his sins and continues:

For these and all other sins which I cannot now remember, I am very sorry. I will try to do better, and I humbly ask pardon of God; and of you Father, I ask for penance, advice and absolution. Amen.

After the Confession is ended, the Priest may address a few words of counsel to the penitent, and will then assign a suitable penance.

Penance having been enjoined and accepted, the Priest shall say

Almighty God have mercy upon thee, forgive thee thy sins, and bring thee to everlasting life. Amen.

The Almighty and merciful Lord grant thee pardon, absolution, and remission of thy sins. Amen.

Our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath left power to his Church to absolve all sinners who truly repent and believe in him, of his great mercy forgive thee thine offenses: And by his authority committed unto me, I absolve thee from all thy sins, In the Name of the Father, and of the Ason, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

May the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ, the merits of his holy Mother the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of all the Saints, together with whatsoever good thou hast done, or evil thou hast endured, be unto thee for the forgiveness of sins, the increase of grace, and the reward of eternal life: And the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the \(\mathbb{Y}\) Son, and the Holy Ghost, be upon thee and remain with thee always. Amen.

Go in peace, the Lord hath put away all thy sins. And pray for me, a sinner.

Concerning Healing and the Laving on of Hands

The Church's ministry to those who are ill in body, mind, or spirit is commanded by Holy Scripture (James 5:14-16). It is also understood as the continuation of the ministry of the risen Lord, Jesus Christ, into whose Body we are grafted by our Baptism. The Church's sacramental ministry to the sick includes Confession and Absolution, Unction (anointing with blessed oil), and Holy Communion together with prayer and the Laying on of Hands. Our Lord often touched those whom he healed, and even modern social science acknowledges the healing power of touch.

When the healing sacraments are administered to a sick person, with prayer, both the Church's Minister and the sick person will approach the ministry with faith in the reality of God's action through Christ. The sick person, by faith, places himself in God's hands to receive whatever He may give. To not believe in the power of God to heal is to become an obstacle to His desire to heal. However, such faith, and even sacramental ministries, are not spiritual magic, nor some attempt to manipulate the supernatural power of the Holy Trinity. God does act, but in His own way and in His own time. We are certain, however, through the witness of Jesus Christ, of God's love and compassion, and His desire for the salvation of every soul: a desire to make whole or perfect that which is ill or broken.

While the medical profession concentrates on the physical side of a human being, the Church concentrates on the spiritual side. These are not mutually exclusive ministries, however, but equally important parts of God's care of His people. It is incumbent upon all Christians in need to seek healing of mind and soul, as well as body, and equally to seek God's will in the midst of suffering and illness. Ministry to the sick, of course, also involves ministry to the dying; and for the Christian, this involves preparation for death with the promise of eternal life.

Ministration to the Sick

In case of illness, the Priest is to be notified.

The service of Communion of the Sick may be found on page 304.

If desired, the Laying on of Hands and Anointing may take place either after the Prayers of the People or after the Post-Communion prayer before the Blessing at services of Holy Communion. They may also occur as a separate ministration.

Laying on of Hands and Anointing

If oil for the Anointing of the Sick is to be blessed, the Priest says

O Lord, holy Father, giver of health and salvation: Send thy Holy Spirit to sanctify this oil; that, as thy holy apostles anointed many that were sick and healed them, so may those who in faith and repentance receive this holy unction be made whole; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The following anthem may be said

Savior of the world, who by thy cross and precious blood hast redeemed us;

Save us and help us, we humbly beseech thee, O Lord.

The Priest then lays hands upon those who desire it and says one of the following

N., I lay my hands upon thee in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, beseeching our Lord Jesus Christ to sustain thee with his presence, to drive away all

sickness of body and spirit, and to give thee that victory of life and peace which will enable thee to serve him both now and evermore. Amen.

or this

N., I lay my hands upon thee in the Name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, beseeching him to uphold thee and fill thee with his grace, that thou mayest know the healing power of his love. Amen.

or this

N., I lay my hands upon thee in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; beseeching the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all thy pain and sickness of body, mind, and spirit being put to flight, the blessing of health may be restored unto thee. Amen.

If the person is to be anointed, the Priest dips a thumb in the holy oil, and makes the sign of the cross on the sick person's forehead, saying

N., I anoint thee with oil in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Priest may add

As thou art outwardly anointed with this holy oil, so may our heavenly Father grant thee the inward anointing of the Holy Spirit. Of his great mercy, may he forgive thee thy sins, release thee from suffering, and restore thee to wholeness and strength. May he deliver thee from all evil, preserve thee in all goodness, and bring thee to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Priest concludes

The Almighty Lord, who is a strong tower to all who put their trust in him, to whom all things in heaven, on earth, and under the earth bow and obey: Be now and evermore thy defense, and make thee know and feel that the only Name under heaven given for health and salvation is the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

Here a blessing and dismissal may be given.

Prayers for the Sick

For Sick Person

O Father of mercies and God of all comfort, our only help in time of need: We humbly beseech thee to behold, visit, and relieve thy sick servant N. for whom our prayers are desired. Look upon him with the eyes of thy mercy; comfort him with a sense of thy goodness; preserve him from the temptations of the enemy; and give him patience under his affliction. In thy good time, restore him to health, and enable him to lead the residue of his life in thy fear, and to thy glory; and grant that finally he may dwell with thee in life everlasting; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

For Recovery from Sickness

O God, the strength of the weak and the comfort of sufferers: Mercifully accept our prayers, and grant to thy servant N. the help of thy power, that his sickness may be turned into health, and our sorrow into joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

or this

O God of heavenly powers, who, by the might of thy command, drivest away from our bodies all sickness and all infirmity: Be present in thy goodness with thy servant N., that his weakness may be banished and his strength restored; and that, his health being renewed, he may bless thy holy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

For a Sick Child

Heavenly Father, watch with us over thy child N., and grant that he may be restored to that perfect health which it is thine alone to give; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

or this

Lord Jesus Christ, Good Shepherd of the sheep, who gatherest the lambs in thy arms and carriest them in thy bosom: We commend to thy loving care this child *N*. Relieve *his* pain, guard *him* from all danger, restore to *him* thy gifts of gladness and strength, and raise *him* up to a life of service to thee. Hear us, we pray, for thy dear Name's sake. Amen.

Before an Operation

Almighty God our heavenly Father, graciously comfort thy servant N. in his suffering, and bless the means provided for his cure. Fill his heart with confidence that, though at times he may be afraid, he yet may put his trust in thee; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

or this

Strengthen thy servant N., O God, to do what he has to do and bear what he has to bear; that, accepting thy healing gifts through the skill of surgeons and nurses, he may be restored to service in thy world with a thankful heart; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

For Strength and Confidence

Heavenly Father, giver of life and health: Comfort and relieve thy sick servant N., and give thy power of healing to those who minister to his needs, that he may be strengthened in his weakness and have confidence in thy loving care; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

For the Sanctification of Illness

Sanctify, we beseech thee, O Lord, the sickness of this thy servant; that the sense of his weakness may add strength to his faith, and seriousness to his repentance; and grant that he may dwell with thee in life everlasting; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

For the Despondent

Comfort, we beseech thee, most gracious God, this thy servant, cast down and faint of heart amidst the sorrows and difficulties of the world; and grant that, by the power of thy Holy Spirit, he may be enabled to go upon his way rejoicing, and give thee continual thanks for thy sustaining providence; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

For Doctors and Nurses

Sanctify, O Lord, those whom thou hast called to the study and practice of the arts of healing, and to the prevention of disease

and pain. Strengthen them by thy life-giving Spirit, that by their ministries the health of the community may be promoted and thy creation glorified; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Thanksgiving for a Beginning of Recovery

O Lord, thy compassions never fail and thy mercies are new every morning: We give thee thanks for giving our brother, N. both relief from pain and hope of health renewed. Continue in him, we pray, the good work thou hast begun; that he, daily increasing in bodily strength, and rejoicing in thy goodness, may so order his life and conduct that he may always think and do those things that please thee; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prayers for use by a Sick Person

For Trust in God

O God, the source of all health: So fill my heart with calm faith in thee, that with patient hope I may allow thy love to heal me; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

In Pain

Lord Jesus Christ, who by thy patience in suffering, didst both sanctify earthly pain and give us the example of obedience to thy Father's will: When I am weak and in pain, be near me; when I doubt, invite me to touch thy wounds; when I am ill, heal me according to thy will; and whatever the circumstances, grant that I may acknowledge thee my Lord and my God, who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. Amen.

For Sleep

O heavenly Father, who givest thy beloved sleep: Keep me, I beseech thee, in that perfect peace which thou hast promised to those whose minds are stayed on thee; that in the hours of silence I may be still and know that thou art God; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

In the Morning

O Lord, who dost see the end from the beginning: Grant that I may be ready for whatever this day may bring forth; if I am to stand up, that I may stand bravely; if I am to sit still, that I may sit quietly; if I am to lie down, that I may do it patiently; if I am to do nothing, that I do it as an offering to thee; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Appropriate Psalms for use by sick persons in their devotions include Psalm 20, 27, 42, 43, 91, 103, 121, 138, and 146.

Ministration at the Time of Death

When a person is near death, the Priest should be notified, in order that the ministrations of the Church may be provided.

Prayers at the Time of Death

O Almighty God, with whom do live the spirits of just men made perfect, after they are delivered from their earthly prisons; we humbly commend the soul of this thy servant, our dear brother, into thy hands, as into the hands of a faithful Creator, and most merciful Savior; beseeching thee, that it may be precious in thy sight. Wash it, we pray thee, in the blood of that immaculate Lamb, that was slain to take away the sins of the world; that whatsoever defilements it may have contracted, through the lusts of the flesh or the wiles of Satan, being purged and done away, it may be presented pure and without spot before thee; through the merits of Jesus Christ thine only Son our Lord. Amen.

Almighty and merciful God, who bestowest upon mankind both the remedies of health and the gifts of life everlasting: Look mercifully upon thy servant N., now laboring under great weakness of body, and comfort the soul which thou hast created; so that at the hour of his departure, he may be presented without spot by the hands of thy holy Angels unto thee, his Creator. Through thy Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who with thee, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, liveth and reigneth God, world without end. Amen.

For a dying child

O Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, who for our sakes didst become a babe in Bethlehem: We commit unto thy loving care this child whom thou art calling to thyself. Send thy holy angel to lead him gently to those heavenly habitations where the souls of those who sleep in thee have perpetual peace and joy, and fold him in the everlasting arms of thine unfailing love; who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, one God world without end. Amen.

Entering the sick person's room, the Priest shall say

Peace be to this house and to all who dwell in it.

Then he may sprinkle the sick person and others present with holy water, saying

Thou shalt purge me with hyssop, O Lord, and I shall be clean: Thou shalt wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.

Litany at the Time of Death

O God the Father, Have mercy upon the soul of thy servant.

O God the Son, Have mercy upon the soul of thy servant.

O God the Holy Ghost; Have mercy upon the soul of thy servant.

356 At Time of Death

From all evil, from all sin, from all tribulation; Good Lord, deliver him.

By thy holy Incarnation, by thy Cross and Passion, by thy precious Death and Burial; Good Lord, deliver him.

By thy glorious Resurrection and Ascension, and by the coming of the Holy Ghost; Good Lord, deliver him.

We sinners do beseech thee to hear us, O Lord God; that it may please thee to deliver the soul of thy servant from the power of the evil one, and from eternal death;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

Amen.

Here the Priest may say

The almighty and merciful Lord grant thee # pardon and remission of all thy sins, and the grace and comfort of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

If Holy Unction is desired, it may follow here, the form for anointing on page 349, or the following, any of which may be omitted for reasonable cause.

At the eyes (which should be closed)

By this holy Unction, and by his most gracious mercy, the Lord pardon thee whatsoever thou hast done amiss by seeing. Amen.

At the ears

By this holy Unction, and by his most gracious mercy, the Lord pardon thee whatsoever thou hast done amiss by hearing. Amen.

At the nostrils

By this holy Unction, and by his most gracious mercy, the Lord pardon thee whatsoever thou hast done amiss by smelling.

Amen.

At the lips (which should be closed)

By this holy Unction, and by his most gracious mercy, the Lord pardon thee whatsoever thou hast done amiss by tasting and speaking. Amen.

At the hands

By this holy Unction, and by his most gracious mercy, the Lord pardon thee whatsoever thou hast done amiss by touching. Amen.

At the feet

By this holy Unction, and by his most gracious mercy, the Lord pardon thee whatsoever thou hast done amiss by walking. Amen.

A Commendation at the Time of Death

Depart, O Christian soul, out of this world;
In the Name of God the Father Almighty who created thee;
In the Name of Jesus Christ who redeemed thee;
In the Name of the Holy Ghost who sanctifieth thee.
[In communion with the blessed saints, and aided by angels and archangels, thrones and dominations, principalities and powers, and all the armies of the heavenly host:]
May thy rest be this day in peace,

and thy dwelling place in the Paradise of God.

A Commendatory Prayer

Into thy hands, O merciful Savior, we commend the soul of thy servant, N., now departed from the body. Acknowledge, we humbly beseech thee, a sheep of thine own fold, a lamb of thine own flock, a sinner of thine own redeeming. Receive him into the arms of thy mercy, into the blessed rest of everlasting peace, and into the glorious company of the saints in light. Amen.

A May his soul and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

Here may be added

Almighty God, look with pity upon the sorrows of thy servants who mourn. Remember them, Lord, in thy mercy; nourish them with patience; comfort them with a sense of thy goodness; lift up thy countenance upon them; and give them peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Concerning Christian Death and Burial

From the beginning of the Church, Christian burial has been an important and integral part of catholic life. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ put an end to the power of death: thus followers of the Good Shepherd believe that death is but the entrance to new and eternal life with Him. We hope for the final resurrection; and for the body which awaits that resurrection we show a proper reverence.

For one who has lived in Christ and with Christ, death is the beginning of eternal joy with our God and Father. Since the Holy Eucharist is the Church's principal offering of sacrifice, prayer, and praise, it is most appropriate that a Mass of Requiem be celebrated in connection with every Christian's death. This liturgy is a service of thanksgiving (eucharistia) to God for His redemption of an earthly life that has come to an end. It is equally a commitment of one we love to the mercies of God in the faith the He will preserve our loved one in peace. It is an offering in which joy and sorrow are mixed, for while we say an earthly farewell, we know that the dead live in Christ. The Mass points us to the One in whom there is life, for in it we "do show the Lord's death till he come." (I Cor. 11:26)

A Requiem is a testament of triumph and hope, for those of us who remain know that we also journey toward the same eternal home. In the communion of saints we, the Church on earth, are joined with the Church Triumphant and Expectant in worshiping before the same Throne of Grace. In the Holy Eucharist, which transcends all time and space, we are closest to our faithful departed loved ones, joining our prayers and praises to theirs. We pray for them, as we believe that they pray for us, so that all may be strengthened in their lives of service.

The Requiem Mass

At the entrance of the ministers, one or more of the following anthems are sung or said

I am the resurrection and the life, saith the Lord; he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die.

I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth; and though this body be destroyed, yet shall I see God; whom I shall see for myself and mine eyes shall behold, and not as a stranger.

For none of us liveth to himself, and no man dieth to himself. For if we live, we live unto the Lord; and if we die, we die unto the Lord. Whether we live, therefore, or die, we are the Lord's.

Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord; even so saith the Spirit, for they rest from their labors.

or the following Introit

Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord: and let light perpetual shine upon them. (Psalm 65) Thou, O God, art praised in Zion, and unto thee shall the vow be performed in Jerusalem: thou that hearest the prayer, unto thee shall all flesh come. Rest eternal...

Then may be sung or said

Lord, have mercy upon us. Kyrie eleison. Christ, have mercy upon us. Christe eleison. or Lord, have mercy upon us. Kyrie eleison.

The Celebrant says one of the following Collects, first saying

The Lord be with you.

And with thy spirit. People

Celebrant Let us pray.

At the Burial of an Adult or at a votive Requiem

or one of the prayers beginning on page 141 may be used.

O God, whose mercies cannot be numbered: Accept our prayers on behalf of thy servant(s) N., and grant him an entrance into the land of light and joy, in the fellowship of thy saints; through Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

At the Burial of a Child

O God, whose beloved Son did take little children into his arms and bless them: Give us grace, we beseech thee, to entrust this child N, to thy never-failing care and love, and bring us all to thy heavenly kingdom; through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

The people sit. One or two Lessons, as appointed, are read, the Reader first saying

A citation giving chapter and verse may be added. After each Reading, the Reader may say

After the Gospel, the Reader says

The Gospel of the Lord.

People Praise be to thee, O Christ.

A homily may be preached, the people being seated.

Then is said the following form of the Prayers of the People, the Deacon, or other Leader saying

In peace, let us pray to the Lord.

Almighty God, who hast knit together thine elect in one communion and fellowship, in the mystical body of thy Son Christ our Lord: Grant, we beseech thee, to thy whole Church in paradise and on earth, thy light and thy peace. Amen.

Grant that all who have been baptized into Christ's death and resurrection may die to sin and rise to newness of life, and that through the grave and gate of death we may pass with him to our joyful resurrection. Amen.

Grant to us who are still in our pilgrimage, and who walk as yet by faith, that thy Holy Spirit may lead us in holiness and righteousness all our days. Amen.

Grant to thy faithful people pardon and peace, that we may be cleansed from all our sins, and serve thee with a quiet mind.

Amen.

Grant to all who mourn a sure confidence in thy fatherly care, that, casting all their grief on thee, they may know the consolation of thy love. Amen.

Give courage and faith to those who are bereaved, that they may have strength to meet the days ahead in the comfort of a reasonable and holy hope, in the joyful expectation of eternal life with those they love. Amen.

Help us, we pray, in the midst of things we cannot understand, to believe and trust in the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, and the resurrection to life everlasting. Amen.

Grant us grace to entrust *N*. to thy never-failing love; receive *him* into the arms of thy mercy, and remember *him* according to the favor which thou bearest unto thy people.

Amen.

Grant that, increasing in knowledge and love of thee, he may go from strength to strength in the life of perfect service in thy heavenly kingdom. Amen.

Grant us, with all who have died in the hope of the resurrection, to have our consummation and bliss in thy eternal and everlasting glory, and, with [the Blessed Virgin Mary, Blessed N. and] all thy saints, to receive the crown of life which thou dost promise to all who share in the victory of thy Son Jesus Christ; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

A Confession of Sin may be said here, the Deacon or Celebrant saying

Ye who do truly and earnestly repent you of your sins, and are in love and charity with your neighbors, and intend to lead a new life, following the commandments of God, and walking from henceforth in his holy ways: Draw near with faith, [and take this holy Sacrament to your comfort, and make your humble confession to Almighty God, devoutly kneeling.

or this

Let us humbly confess our sins unto Almighty God.

Silence may be kept.

Minister and People

Almighty God,

Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. maker of all things, judge of all men: We acknowledge and bewail our manifold sins and wickedness. which we from time to time most grievously have committed. by thought, word, and deed, against thy divine Majesty, provoking most justly thy wrath and indignation against us. We do earnestly repent, and are heartily sorry for these our misdoings; the remembrance of them is grievous unto us. the hurden of them is intolerable. Have mercy upon us. have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may ever hereafter serve and please thee in newness of life, to the honor and glory of thy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. The Bishop when present, or the Priest, stands and says

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of his great mercy hath promised forgiveness of sins to all those who with hearty repentance and true faith turn unto him, have mercy upon you, & pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Peace traditionally occurs following the Fraction; or, if desired, it may be said here. All stand, the Celebrant saying to the people

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And with thy spirit.

At the Offertory, the following or some other suitable hymn, psalm, or anthem may be said or sung

O Lord Jesus Christ, King of Majesty, deliver the souls of all the faithful departed from the hand of hell, and from the pit of destruction: deliver them from the lion's mouth, that the grave devour them not; that they go not down to the realms of darkness: but let Michael, the holy standard-bearer, make speed to restore them to the brightness of glory: which thou hast promised in ages past to Abraham and his seed. Sacrifice and prayer do we offer to thee. O Lord: do thou accept them for the souls departed, in whose memory we make this oblation: and grant them, Lord, to pass from death unto life: which thou hast promised in ages past to Abraham and his seed.

The Celebrant may then face the people and say

Pray, brethren, that this my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the Father Almighty.

People

May the Lord receive this sacrifice at thy hands, to the praise and glory of his Name, both to our benefit and that of all his holy Church.

The people remain standing. The Celebrant, whether bishop or priest, faces them and sings or says

The Lord be with you. And with thy spirit. People Lift up your hearts. Celebrant

Then, facing the Altar, the Celebrant proceeds

It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, O Lord, holy Father, almighty, everlasting God.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord; who rose victorious from the dead, and doth comfort us with the blessed hope of everlasting life; for to thy faithful people, O Lord, life is changed, not ended; and when our mortal body doth lie in death, there is prepared for us a dwelling place in the heavens.

Therefore with Angels and Archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we laud and magnify thy glorious Name, evermore praising thee, and saying,

The people kneel. Then the Celebrant continues

All glory be to thee, Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for that thou of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption; who made there, by his one oblation of himself once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to he consecrated

For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took bread; and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, after supper, he took the cup; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink ye all of this; for this is my Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you and for many, for the remission of sins. Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me."

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of thy dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we, thy humble servants, do celebrate and make here before thy divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; rendering unto thee most hearty thanks for the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same.

And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us; and of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be # filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

Here may be added

Remember, Lord, also the souls of thy servants and handmaidens, which are gone before us with the mark of faith, and rest in the sleep of peace, [N. (and N.)]. We beseech thee, O Lord, that unto them, and unto all such as rest in Christ, thou wilt grant a place of refreshing, of light, and of peace. And vouchsafe to give unto us some portion and fellowship with thy holy Apostles and Martyrs..., and with all thy Saints; within whose fellowship we beseech thee to admit us.

And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice, yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord; By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. Amen.

And now, as our Savior Christ hath taught us, we are bold to say,

People and Celebrant

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses,

as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.

A period of silence is kept.

Then may be sung or said

[Alleluia.] Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; Therefore let us keep the feast. [Alleluia.]

In Lent, Alleluia is omitted, and may be omitted at other times except during Easter season.

or the following

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And with thy spirit.

The following is then sung or said

- O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, grant them rest.
- O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, grant them rest.
- O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, grant them rest eternal.

The following prayer may be said. The People may join in saying this prayer

We do not presume to come to this thy Table, O merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in thy manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under thy Table. But thou art the same Lord whose property is always to have mercy. Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of thy dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink his blood, [that our sinful bodies may be made clean by his body, and our souls washed through his most precious blood, and] that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. Amen.

Facing the people, the Celebrant may say the following Invitation

The Gifts of God for the People of God

and may add Take them in remembrance that Christ died for
you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith,
with thanksgiving.

or the following

He Behold the Lamb of God; behold him that taketh away the sins of the world.

Celebrant and People

Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof: but speak the word only, and my soul shall be healed.

The ministers receive the Sacrament in both kinds, and then immediately deliver it to the people. During the ministration of Communion, the following, or other suitable hymns, Psalms, or anthems may be sung.

May light eternal shine, O Lord, upon them, for endless ages with thy blessed ones, for thou art gracious. Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord: and let light perpetual shine upon them, for endless ages with thy blessed ones, for thou art gracious.

After Communion the Celebrant says

The Lord be with you. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

The People may join in saying this prayer

Almighty God, we thank thee that in thy great love thou hast fed us with the spiritual food and drink of the Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, and hast given unto us a foretaste of thy heavenly banquet. Grant that this Sacrament may be unto us a comfort in affliction, and a pledge of our inheritance in that kingdom where there is no death, neither sorrow nor crying, but the fullness of joy with all thy saints; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen. If the body is not present, the service continues with the following dismissal. If the body is present, unless the Committal follows immediately in the church, the following Commendation is used, or the Absolution of the Dead, page 378.

Priest The Lord be with you.
People And with thy spirit.
Priest May they rest in peace.

People Amen.

The Commendation

The Celebrant and other ministers take their places at the body.

This anthem, or some other suitable anthem, or a hymn, may be sung or said.

Give rest, O Christ, to thy servant(s) with thy saints, where sorrow and pain are no more, neither sighing, but life everlasting.

Thou only art immortal, the creator and maker of mankind; and we are mortal, formed of the earth, and unto earth shall we return. For so thou didst ordain when thou createdst me, saying, "Dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return." All we go down to the dust; yet even at the grave we make our song: Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia.

Give rest, O Christ, to thy servant(s) with thy saints, where sorrow and pain are no more, neither sighing, but life everlasting.

The Celebrant, facing the body, says

Into thy hands, O merciful Savior, we commend the soul of thy servant N. Acknowledge, we humbly beseech thee, a sheep of thine own fold, a lamb of thine own flock, a sinner of thine own redeeming. Receive him into the arms of thy mercy, into the blessed rest of everlasting peace, and into the glorious company of the saints in light. Amen.

The people are dismissed in the following manner

Priest The Lord be with you.

People And with thy spirit.

Priest May they rest in peace.

People Amen.

As the body is borne from the church, a hymn, or one or more of these anthems may be sung or said

Christ is risen from the dead, trampling down death by death, and giving life to those in the tomb.

The Sun of Righteousness is gloriously risen, giving light to those who sat in darkness and in the shadow of death.

The Lord will guide our feet into the way of peace, having taken away the sin of the world.

The Celebrant and other ministers take their places at the body. The Celebrant then says

Enter not into judgment with thy servant, O Lord, for in thy sight shall no man living be justified, unless thou grant him remission of all his sins. We therefore beseech thee, let not the sentence of thy judgment press hard upon him, whom the reasonable prayer of thy faithful Christian people commendeth unto thee: but grant that by the succor of thy grace, he who while living was sealed with the sign of the Holy Trinity, may be counted worthy to escape thine avenging judgment. Who livest and reignest, world without end. Amen.

This Responsory is then sung or said.

Deliver me, O Lord, from death eternal in that day of trembling: when heaven and earth shall be shaken: when thou shalt come to judge the world by fire.

Episcopal Services

Concerning Confirmation

Confirmation is a necessary Sacrament wherein the Bishop, a direct descendant of Christ's Apostles, bestows the empowering gifts of the Holy Ghost for a life of ministry as Christ's servant. Confirmation can also be seen as an extension of Baptism, as an adult acceptance of promises, usually made by parents and godparents on behalf of an infant.

At this stage in the Church's life there are at least two different ways of understanding Confirmation and its place in Christian life. One view holds that it is properly understood as a part of Baptism. It is then understood as an adult profession of faith in the presence of the Bishop, which does not add to the grace already received in the font. It is simply an important opportunity for those baptized in tender years to "own" their faith.

At the same time, this view has not been universally accepted, and some bishops in particular wish to stress the necessity of Confirmation as an independent Sacrament. It is considered to be a vital sacramental connection with the laity and their Bishop by which the gifts of the Spirit are bestowed, confirming and strengthening the grace received in Baptism.

Perhaps the most fruitful way to understand the Sacrament of Confirmation is to see it in connection with our appreciation of the ministry of the laity. Confirmation confers the particular gifts of the Holy Spirit to the lay person, to enable and equip him for the fullness of his particular ministry as an adult lay member of Christ's Body, the Church. It is then a kind of "ordination to the laity." As in his ordination a Deacon, Priest, or Bishop receives the promise of God's grace to fulfill that particular ministry, so also in Confirmation the layman receives that which he needs to fulfill his ministry. This need not, of course, imply that Baptism is in any way incomplete in the incorporation of the Christian into Christ. Rather, it takes seriously, in a spiritual and sacramental way, the ministry to which all are called.

Bishop Dost thou renew thy commitment to Jesus Christ?

Candidate I do, and with God's grace I will follow him as my Savior and Lord.

After all have been presented, the Bishop addresses the congregation saying

Will ye who witness these vows do all in your power to support these persons in their life in Christ?

People We will.

The Bishop then says these or similar words

Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own baptismal covenant.

The Baptismal Covenant

Bishop Dost thou believe in God the Father?
People I believe in God, the Father almighty,
maker of heaven and earth.

Bishop Dost thou believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

People I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord;

For Reaffirmation

N., may the Holy Ghost, who hath begun a good work in thee, direct and uphold thee in the service of Christ and his kingdom. Amen.

Concerning Holy Orders

The Anglican Church, while deeply influenced by many of the principles of the Reformation, has carefully maintained the historic threefold order of catholic Christian ministry - Bishop, Priest, and Deacon. It understands this order as a gift to the Church from above, directly flowing from the ministry of Christ. Bishops, in their apostolic work of ordaining other bishops, priests, and deacons, solemnly invoke the presence of the Holy Spirit. The authority of this ministry is not of man, but of God.

The Ordinal, as this part of the Prayer Book is called, has frequently been a controversial issue for the Church. In every age, a distinctive part of the Church's ministry tends to be emphasized, sometimes at the expense of other elements. At times the priesthood has been understood solely in terms of the offering of the Mass; it is reduced by some to one of the so-called helping professions.

The traditional Anglican Ordinal avoids such one-sided views of the ordained ministry. It seeks to awaken in the Church's self-understanding a vision of ministry that is Apostolic, founded directly upon New Testament teaching and established in the work of the early Church fathers. In particular, the Ordinal stresses the work of preaching and teaching the Gospel, caring for the spiritual needs of the people, and abiding faithfully in the fellowship of Christ and the Apostles.

While the services which follow represent in all essential matters the authorized forms in the Book of Common Prayer, they also restore several traditional elements from earlier Anglican and other Western Ordinals. The Litany of Saints

reminds us of the *cloud of witnesses* which surrounds and upholds in a special sense those who are set apart for the work of God. The ordination prayer beginning "Almighty God, and heavenly Father, ..." is the classical Anglican expression of the dignity and divine origin of the apostolic calling. The "tradition of the instruments," the ceremony of vesting the newly ordained with the instruments of his work is here expanded to its historic fullness.

The Consecration of the Priest

All now stand except the Ordinand, who kneels facing the Bishop.

The hymn, Veni Creator Spiritus, or the hymn, Veni Sancte Spiritus, is now sung.

A period of silent prayer follows, the people still standing.

The Bishop then says this Prayer of Consecration

God and Father of all, we praise thee for thine infinite love in calling us to be a holy people in the kingdom of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who is the image of thine eternal and invisible glory, the firstborn of many brethren, and the head of the Church. So that as well by these thy Ministers, as by them over whom they shall be appointed thy Ministers, thy holy Name may be for ever glorified, and thy blessed kingdom enlarged; through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee in the unity of the same Holy Spirit, world without end. Amen.

Here the Bishop lays hands upon the head of the Ordinand, the vested Priests who are present also laying on their hands. At the same time the Bishop prays

Receive the Holy Ghost for the Office and Work of a Priest in the Church of God, now committed unto thee by the Imposition of our hands. Whose sins thou dost forgive, they are forgiven; and whose sins thou dost retain, they are retained. And be thou a faithful Dispenser of the Word of God, and of his holy Sacraments; in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

The Bishop then continues

May he exalt thee, O Lord, in the midst of thy people; offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to thee; boldly proclaim the

gospel of salvation; and rightly administer the sacraments of the New Covenant. Make him a faithful pastor, a patient teacher, and a wise counsellor. The Examination

All are seated except the ordinand, who stands before the Bishop. The Bishop addresses the ordinand as follows

At all times, thy life and teaching are to show Christ's people that in serving the helpless they are serving Christ himself.

The Consecration of the Deacon

All now stand except the Ordinand, who kneels facing the Bishop. The hymn, Veni Creator Spiritus, or the hymn, Veni Sancte Spiritus, is now sung. A period of silent prayer follows, the people still standing.

The Bishop then says this Prayer of Consecration

O God, most merciful Father, we praise thee for sending thy Son Jesus Christ, who took upon himself the form of a servant, and humbled himself, becoming obedient even unto death on the cross. We praise thee that thou hast highly exalted him, and made him Lord of all; and that, through him, we know that whoever would be great must be the servant of all. We praise thee for the many ministries in thy Church, and for calling this thy servant to the order of deacons.

Here the Bishop lays hands upon the head of the Ordinand, and prays

Therefore, Father, through Jesus Christ thy Son, give thy Holy Spirit to N.; fill him with grace and power, and make him a deacon in thy Church.

The Bishop then continues

Make him, O Lord, modest and humble, strong and constant, to observe the discipline of Christ. Let his life and teaching so reflect thy commandments, that through him many may come to know thee and love thee. As thy Son came not to be served but to serve, may this deacon share in Christ's service, and come to the unending glory of him who, with thee and the holy Spirit, liveth and reigneth, one God, for ever and ever.

The People, in a loud voice, respond Amen.

The new Deacon is now vested according to the order of deacons.

As the Deacon is vested with the stole, the Bishop shall say

Receive this noble stole from the hand of God; fulfill the work of thy ministry. May God who is mighty assist thee with his grace, who liveth and reigneth world without end. Amen.

As the Deacon is vested with the Dalmatic, the Bishop shall say

May the Lord clothe thee with the garment of salvation and the vesture of gladness; may the Dalmatic of righteousness alway cloak thee in the Name of the Lord. Amen.

The Bishop gives a Bible to the newly ordained, saying

Receive this Bible as the sign of thine authority to proclaim God's Word and to assist in the ministration of his holy Sacraments. In the Name of the Lord. Amen.

The Peace

The Bishop greets the newly ordained Deacon.

The Peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And with thy spirit.

Greetings and necessary announcements are now made.

The Liturgy continues with the Offertory of the Mass, page 259.

After Communion

In place of the usual postcommunion prayer, the people kneel, and the Bishop and people pray

Almighty Father, we most heartily thank thee for that thou dost feed us, in these holy mysteries, with the spiritual food of the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ, and that thou dost make us one body through him in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit. We thank thee for raising up among us faithful servants for the ministry of thy Word and Sacraments. We pray that N. may be unto us an effectual example in word and action, in love and patience, and in holiness of life. Grant that we, with him, may serve thee now and always rejoice in thy glory; through Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

The Bishop then blesses the people

The new Deacon then dismisses the people, who respond "Thanks be to God." From Easter Day through the Day of Pentecost "Alleluia, alleluia" may be added to the dismissal and the response.

Celebration of a New Ministry

The Apostle Paul teaches us that in the ministries of the Church, the "pastors and teachers" are "to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ" (Ephesians 4:11-12) This service provides the local church with an opportunity to affirm and celebrate the beginning of a relationship between a church leader (usually a rector) and the people whom he has been called to serve.

A priest undertakes his new ministry reminded that he stands as God's steward before the people and as the people's representative before God. Emphasis in the service is placed upon both the joy and the seriousness of serving Christ and His Church, for the man being inducted and for those who will minister with him for the "building up of the body of Christ." The community that celebrates this new ministry is reminded of its place in the life of its diocese through the presence of the Bishop or his representative.

A hymn, psalm, or anthem may be sung.

The Institution

The Bishop (or his representative) shall be seated in a chair before the Altar. The Wardens, standing before him with the new minister, say these or similar words

Right Reverend Father in God: We present unto thee *N.N.* who has been chosen to serve as *Rector* of this *parish*. We do believe him to be well qualified, and that he has been prayerfully and lawfully selected.

The new Minister shall kneel in front of the Bishop, and the Bishop shall say,

Dearly beloved brethren, N., elected Rector of this Church, is present here to enter upon his office; wherefore we think fit that he shall be examined, according to the rule of the godly Fathers, in those things which belong to our holy religion and to the clerical state. Wherefore, before instituting him thereto, I require that if any of you do know of any just cause or impediment why he should be instituted to this office, ye do now declare it.

If any objection be alleged, the Institutor, according to his discretion, shall suspend or continue the service.

Brother, seeing that the grace of God, and the choice of this congregation and thy former life have called thee to this office, we desire to know from thine own lips, whether thou art willing to dwell with thy flock in this place, to refrain thyself from all evil ways, and to devote thyself to all good works, as God shall grant?

Answer I am willing.

Bishop

Wilt thou diligently observe and keep thy priestly vows and pledges, and instruct those set under thee?

Answer I will, God being my helper.

Bishop

Wilt thou be a good steward of the goods of this Church, and guard them for the benefit of the brethren, the poor, and strangers?

Answer I will, God being my helper.

Bishop

Wilt thou observe holiness and patience, and teach others the like?

Answer I will, God being my helper.

Bishop

Wilt thou busy thyself in holy things, and shun earthly concerns, so far as human frailty suffereth thee?

Answer I will, God being my helper.

Bishop

Wilt thou be courteous and merciful to the poor and the stranger, and to all that are in need, for the honor of God's Name?

Answer I will, God being my helper.

Bishop

Wilt thou yield canonical obedience in all things to thy Mother Church?

Answer I will, God being my helper.

The Bishop may read the Letter of Institution, or else may state the purpose of the new ministry. If the previous examination has not taken place, the Bishop inquires whether the new minister commits himself to this new ministry.

The Bishop then addresses the congregation

Will ye who witness this new beginning support and uphold N. in this ministry?

People We will.

The Bishop, standing, says

Let us humbly confess our sins unto Almighty God.

The following is said, all kneeling,

Almighty God. Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. maker of all things, judge of all men: We acknowledge and bewail our manifold sins and wickedness. which we from time to time most grievously have committed, by thought, word, and deed, against thy divine Majesty, provoking most justly thy wrath and indignation against us. We do earnestly repent, and are heartily sorry for these our misdoings; the remembrance of them is grievous unto us: the burden of them is intolerable. Have mercy upon us. have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may ever hereafter serve and please thee in newness of life. to the honor and glory of thy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Bishop, standing, says

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of his great mercy hath promised forgiveness of sins to all those who with hearty repentance and true faith turn unto him, have mercy upon you, # pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Bishop continues

Let us offer our prayers to God for all his people, for this congregation, and for N, their Rector.

The Litany for Ordinations, page 420, or some other appropriate litany, is led by a person appointed. At the end of the litany, the Bishop, standing, says the following or some other Collect, first saying

The Lord be with you.

People And with thy spirit.

Bishop Let us pray.

Most gracious Father, the giver of all good and perfect gifts, who of thy wise providence hast appointed divers orders in thy Church; give thy grace, we beseech thee, to thy servant, to whom the *charge of this congregation* is now committed; and so replenish him with the truth of thy doctrine, and endue him with innocency of life, that he may faithfully serve before thee, to the glory of thy great name, and the benefit of thy holy Church; through Jesus Christ, our only mediator and redeemer.

Amen.

At the Liturgy of the Word

The Readings are selected from the following list, or the Proper of the Day.

Psalm 43, or 132:1-9, or 146, or 133 and 134 (especially suitable for use in the evening)

The Sermon

The Induction

Representatives of the congregation and of the clergy of the diocese stand before the Bishop with the new minister.

The Senior Warden, or some other lay parishioner, shall deliver the keys of the Church to the new Minister, saying,

In the name of this Parish (or Church), I, N.N., acknowledge you, N.N., as *Priest* and *Rector* of the same, and in token thereof give into your hands the keys of this Church.

Then the new Minister shall answer,

I, N.N., receive these keys of the House of God at your hands, as the pledge of my institution, and of your recognition, and I promise to be a faithful shepherd over you, in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

The Bishop, representatives of the Congregation, and of the diocese then present the new minister with Bible, a Book of Common Prayer, and canons of the Church and the Bishop says

Receive these Books; and let them be the rule of thy conduct in dispensing the divine Word, in leading the devotions of the people, and in exercising the discipline of the Church; and be thou in all things a pattern to the flock committed to thy care.

Other symbols of office may be presented, with appropriate words, if desired.

Then the Bishop shall lead him to his stall, and say

O praise the Lord for his goodness, and declare the wonders that he doeth for the children of men. Exalt him also in the congregation of the people, and praise him in the seat of the elders.

Then shall the Bishop say to the minister

Almighty God be thy Helper, in these and all other good things.

Then shall the Bishop say to the people

People And with thy spirit.
Bishop Let us pray.

Grant, we beseech thee Almighty God, the increase of thy grace to this thy servant, whom we have elected to the cure of souls, that by thy bounty we, and the choice we have made, may be pleasing unto thee; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Bishop may then add one or more of the following

O God, who rulest all the kingdoms of the earth according to thy divine pleasure, we humbly pray and beseech thee to bless with the grace of heavenly sanctification this thy servant N, whom we have chosen as Pastor of this Church; that in his days holy discipline may increase, and that by thy help, he may set a good example to his flock, and carrying on his warfare in thy fear and with gentleness to his people, may be ever peacefully sheltered under the shield of thy majesty. Vouchsafe to

strengthen him with thy divine right hand, that he may be a wise steward, and able to help lovingly all them that need. Be thou his worship, his joy in his home, his companion in his journeys, his comfort in sorrow, his counsel in doubt, his medicine in sickness, his helper in toil, his defense in adversity, his patience in tribulation. Let him learn in thee forethought and wisdom, to rule prudently the flock entrusted to him, that ever prospering and rejoicing in the riches of thy bountiful goodness, he may thankfully enjoy the temporal gifts of this present life, and finally be united in everlasting fellowship with the heavenly citizens and the choirs of angels; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Look down graciously, O Lord, we beseech thee, on this thy servant, and give him true knowledge, unshaken hope, right counsel, and holy doctrine, that he may be meet to receive the grace of thy blessing, and, without offense, may follow the footsteps of thy saints, and cause his flock to follow him by his godly teachings; and that he may bear in mind that whoso taketh on himself the guidance of souls, must give an account for them all in the Judgment Day to our Lord Jesus Christ. Who liveth and reigneth, world without end. Amen.

O Holy Jesus, who hast purchased to thyself an universal Church, and hast promised to be with the Ministers of Apostolic Succession to the end of the world; be graciously pleased to bless the ministry and service of him who is now appointed to offer the sacrifices of prayer and praise to thee in this house, which is called by thy Name. May the words of his mouth, and the meditation of his heart, be alway acceptable in thy sight, O Lord, our strength and our Redeemer. Amen.

O God, Holy Ghost, Sanctifier of the faithful, visit, we pray thee, this congregation with thy love and favor; enlighten their minds more and more with the light of the everlasting gospel; graft in their hearts a love of the truth; increase in them true religion; nourish them with all goodness; and of thy great mercy keep them in the same, O blessed Spirit, whom, with the Father and the Son together, we worship and glorify as one God, world without end. Amen.

The Veni Creator may then be sung, all kneeling. the Bishop returns to his seat before the Altar, addressing the new minister, who kneels before him.

In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

I, N., Bishop of the Diocese of ______, by the authority committed to me, do hereby give thee, N., Institution and Mission (and cure of souls as Pastor of this Church or parish) and authority to preach the Word, and to administer the Sacraments herein.

The Bishop, standing and facing the people, says

O God, the author of all good things, who by thine apostle Paul didst ordain elders to bear rule in every Church, we humbly beseech thee to guard with thy gracious protection this thy servant N., instituted this day as pastor over thy sheep in this place, and grant him, we pray thee, so to rule those set under him, that he and they all may attain the kingdom of heaven, and that ever aided by thy help, and stayed by the doctrine of thine apostles, he may joyfully enter the gates of Paradise, bearing fruit an hundredfold, and there hear thy commendation, well done, good and faithful servant, thou hast been faithful over a few things; I will set thee over many things, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord. Fill my memory with the words of thy Law; enlighten my understanding with the illumination of the Holy Ghost; and may all the wishes and desires of my will center in what thou hast commanded. And, to make me instrumental in promoting the salvation of the people now committed to my charge; grant that I may faithfully administer thy holy Sacraments, and by my life and doctrine set forth thy true and lively Word. Be ever with me in the performance of all the duties of my ministry: in prayer, to quicken my devotion; in praises, to heighten my love and gratitude; and in preaching, to give a readiness of thought and expression suitable to the clearness and excellency of thy holy Word. Grant this for the sake of Jesus Christ thy Son our Savior, Amen.

The Bishop then presents the new minister to the congregation. When appropriate, the family of the new minister may also be presented at this time.

The new Minister then says to the people

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And with thy spirit.

At the Eucharist

The service continues with the Offertory.

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The Psalter

Concerning the Psalter

The Psalter used in this book is that of the American Book of Common Prayer 1928. A version of the Psalter in the Great Bible of 1539, itself an adaptation of Miles Coverdale's translation of 1535, it is essentially the same translation used in Anglican Churches around the world.

The Psalter was the prayer book of the old Israel. As such our Lord used it for his own prayer. He did this most dramatically when he was on the cross, and began to pray Psalm 22: "My God, my God ... why hast thou forsaken me?". For this reason, if for no other, the Psalter is the first

prayer book of the Church.

There are many ways of praying the psalms. Most importantly they are hymnody: they are meant to be sung. Jews, and Christians throughout most of their history, considered the psalms, like all of Scripture, too important to be prayed in an ordinary speaking voice. It is one of the blessings of liturgical renewal that more and more parishes have begun to learn and practice the singing of psalms. The psalms may be sung or said antiphonally by verse, responsorially with the cantor or lector reciting the verses, responsively between minister and people, or in unison. The early Church added the Trinitarian doxology "Glory be to the Father..." to place the psalms in the context of Christian prayer.

The Psalms satisfy a great variety of prayer needs. There is considerable benefit to praying the psalms through in course (eg. Morning Prayer, Day One ...); thereby touching upon all of the human condition. Specific psalms may be memorized until they become a permanent part of one's prayer life and a support of the architecture of the soul. Psalm 63 is a traditional morning prayer; Psalm 141 for the evening. The Penitential Psalms are 6, 32, 38, 51, 102, 130, and 143. Psalms 43, 84, 122, and 130 are appropriate before receiving Holy Communion. Some people find Psalm 68 an excellent

way to pray through anger.

Book One

First Day: Morning Prayer

1 Beatus vir qui non abiit

- BLESSED is the man that hath not walked in the counsel of the ungodly, nor stood in the way of sinners, * and hath not sat in the seat of the scornful.
- 2 But his delight is in the law of the Lord; * and in his law will he exercise himself day and night.
- 3 And he shall be like a tree planted by the water-side, * that will bring forth his fruit in due season.
- 4 His leaf also shall not wither; * and look, whatsoever he doeth, it shall prosper.
- 5 As for the ungodly, it is not so with them; * but they are like the chaff, which the wind scattereth away from the face of the earth.
- 6 Therefore the ungodly shall not be able to stand in the judgment, * neither the sinners in the congregation of the righteous.
- 7 But the Lord knoweth the way of the righteous; * and the way of the ungodly shall perish.

2 Quare fremuerunt gentes?

W HY do the heathen so furiously rage together? * and why do the people imagine a vain thing?

- 2 The kings of the earth stand up, and the rulers take counsel together * against the Lord, and against his Anointed:
- 3 Let us break their bonds asunder, * and cast away their cords from us.
- 4 He that dwelleth in heaven shall laugh them to scorn: * the Lord shall have them in derision.

- 5 Then shall he speak unto them in his wrath, * and vex them in his sore displeasure:
- 6 Yet have I set my King * upon my holy hill of Zion.
- 7 I will rehearse the decree; * the Lord hath said unto me, Thou art my Son, this day have I begotten thee.
- 8 Desire of me, and I shall give thee the nations for thine inheritance, * and the utmost parts of the earth for thy possession.
- 9 Thou shalt bruise them with a rod of iron, * and break them in pieces like a potter's vessel.
- 10 Be wise now therefore, O ye kings; * be instructed, ye that are judges of the earth.
- 11 Serve the Lord in fear, * and rejoice unto him with reverence.
- 12 Kiss the Son, lest he be angry, and so ye perish from the right way, if his wrath be kindled, yea but a little * Blessed are all they that put their trust in him.

3 Domine, quid multiplicati?

- ORD, how are they increased that trouble me! * many are they that rise against me.
- 2 Many one there be that say of my soul, * There is no help for him in his God.
- 3 But thou, O Lord, art my defender; * thou art my worship, and the lifter up of my head.
- 4 I did call upon the Lord with my voice, * and he heard me out of his holy hill.
- 5 I laid me down and slept, and rose up again; * for the Lord sustained me.
- 6 I will not be afraid for ten thousands of the people, * that have set themselves against me round about.

7 Up, Lord, and help me, O my God, * for thou smitest all mine enemies upon the cheek-bone; thou hast broken the teeth of the ungodly.

Salvation belongeth unto the Lord; * and thy blessing is upon

thy people.

4 Cum invocarem

HEAR me when I call, O God of my righteousness: * thou hast set me at liberty when I was in trouble; have mercy upon me, and hearken unto my prayer.

2 O ye sons of men, how long will ye blaspheme mine honor, * and have such pleasure in vanity, and seek

after falsehood?

3 Know this also, that the Lord hath chosen to himself the man that is godly; * when I call upon the Lord he will hear me.

- 4 Stand in awe, and sin not; * commune with your own heart, and in your chamber, and be still.
- 5 Offer the sacrifice of righteousness, * and put your trust in the Lord.
- 6 There be many that say, * Who will show us any good?
- 7 Lord, lift thou up * the light of thy countenance upon us.
- 8 Thou hast put gladness in my heart; * yea, more than when their corn and wine and oil increase.
- 9 I will lay me down in peace, and take my rest; * for it is thou, Lord, only, that makest me dwell in safety.

5 Verba mea auribus

P ONDER my words, O Lord, * consider my meditation.

2 O hearken thou unto the voice of my calling, my King and my God: * for unto thee will I make my prayer.

3 My voice shalt thou hear betimes, O Lord; * early in the morning will I direct my prayer unto thee, and will look up.

4 For thou art the God that hast no pleasure in wickedness; *

neither shall any evil dwell with thee.

5 Such as be foolish shall not stand in thy sight; * for thou hatest all them that work iniquity.

6 Thou shalt destroy them that speak lies: * the Lord will abhor both the blood-thirsty and deceitful man.

- 7 But as for me, in the multitude of thy mercy I will come into thine house; * and in thy fear will I worship toward thy holy temple.
- 8 Lead me, O Lord, in thy righteousness, because of mine enemies; * make thy way plain before my face.
- 9 For there is no faithfulness in their mouth; * their inward parts are very wickedness.
- 10 Their throat is an open sepulchre; * they flatter with their tongue.
- 11 Destroy thou them, O God; let them perish through their own imaginations; * cast them out in the multitude of their ungodliness; for they have rebelled against thee.
- 12 And let all them that put their trust in thee rejoice: * they shall ever be giving of thanks, because thou defendest them; they that love thy Name shall be joyful in thee;
- 13 For thou, Lord, wilt give thy blessing unto the righteous, * and with thy favorable kindness wilt thou defend him as with a shield.

First Day: Evening Prayer

6 Domine, ne in furore

LORD, rebuke me not in thine indignation, * neither chasten me in thy displeasure.

2 Have mercy upon me, O Lord, for I am weak; * O Lord.

heal me, for my bones are vexed.

3 My soul also is sore troubled: * but, Lord, how long wilt thou punish me?

4 Turn thee, O Lord, and deliver my soul: * O save me, for

thy mercy's sake.

5 For in death no man remembereth thee; * and who will give thee thanks in the pit?

6 I am weary of my groaning; * every night wash I my bed, and water my couch with my tears.

7 My beauty is gone for very trouble, * and worn away because of all mine enemies.

8 Away from me, all ye that work iniquity; * for the Lord hath heard the voice of my weeping.

9 The Lord hath heard my petition; * the Lord will receive

my prayer.

10 All mine enemies shall be confounded, and sore vexed; * they shall be turned back, and put to shame suddenly.

Domine, Deus meus

LORD my God, in thee have I put my trust: * save me from all them that persecute me, and deliver me;

2 Lest he devour my soul like a lion, and tear it in pieces, *

while there is none to help.

3 O Lord my God, if I have done any such thing; * or if there be any wickedness in my hands;

4 If I have rewarded evil unto him that dealt friendly with me; * (yea, I have delivered him that without any cause is mine enemy;)

5 Then let mine enemy persecute my soul, and take me; * yea, let him tread my life down upon the earth, and lay mine

honor in the dust.

6 Stand up, O Lord, in thy wrath, and lift up thyself, because of the indignation of mine enemies; * arise up for me in the judgment that thou hast commanded.

7 And so shall the congregation of the peoples come about thee: * for their sakes therefore lift up thyself again.

- 8 The Lord shall judge the peoples; give sentence with me, O Lord, * according to my righteousness, and according to the innocency that is in me.
- 9 O let the wickedness of the ungodly come to an end; * but guide thou the just.
- 10 For the righteous God * trieth the very hearts and reins.
- 11 My help cometh of God, * who preserveth them that are true of heart.
- 12 God is a righteous Judge, strong, and patient; * and God is provoked every day.
- 13 If a man will not turn, he will whet his sword; * he hath bent his bow, and made it ready.
- 14 He hath prepared for him the instruments of death; * he ordaineth his arrows against the persecutors.
- 15 Behold, the ungodly travaileth with iniquity; * he hath conceived mischief, and brought forth falsehood.
- 16 He hath graven and digged up a pit, * and is fallen himself into the destruction that he made for other.
- 17 For his travail shall come upon his own head, * and his wickedness shall fall on his own pate.
- 18 I will give thanks unto the Lord, according to his righteousness; * and I will praise the Name of the Lord Most High.

OLORD our Governor, how excellent is thy Name in all the world; * thou that hast set thy glory above the heavens!

2 Out of the mouth of very babes and sucklings hast thou ordained strength, because of thine enemies, * that thou mightest still the enemy and the avenger.

3 When I consider thy heavens, even the work of thy fingers; *

the moon and the stars which thou hast ordained;

4 What is man, that thou art mindful of him? * and the son of man, that thou visitest him?

5 Thou madest him lower than the angels, * to crown him with

glory and worship.

- 6 Thou makest him to have dominion of the works of thy hands; * and thou hast put all things in subjection under his feet:
- 7 All sheep and oxen; * yea, and the beasts of the field;
- 8 The fowls of the air, and the fishes of the sea; * and whatsoever walketh through the paths of the seas.
- 9 O Lord our Governor, * how excellent is thy Name in all the world!

Second Day: Morning Prayer

9 Confitebor tibi

I WILL give thanks unto thee, O Lord, with my whole heart; * I will speak of all thy marvelous works.

2 I will be glad and rejoice in thee; * yea, my songs will I make of thy Name, O thou Most Highest.

3 While mine enemies are driven back, * they shall fall and

perish at thy presence.

4 For thou hast maintained my right and my cause; * thou art set in the throne that judgest right.

5 Thou hast rebuked the heathen, and destroyed the ungodly; * thou hast put out their name for ever and ever.

6 O thou enemy, thy destructions are come to a perpetual end; * even as the cities which thou hast destroyed, whose memorial is perished with them.

7 But the Lord shall endure for ever; * he hath also prepared

his seat for judgment.

8 For he shall judge the world in righteousness, * and minister true judgment unto the people.

9 The Lord also will be a defense for the oppressed, * even a

refuge in due time of trouble.

- 10 And they that know thy Name will put their trust in thee; * for thou, Lord, hast never failed them that seek thee.
- 11 O praise the Lord which dwelleth in Zion; * show the people of his doings.

12 For when he maketh inquisition for blood, he remembereth them, * and forgetteth not the complaint of the poor.

- 13 Have mercy upon me, O Lord; consider the trouble which I suffer of them that hate me, * thou that liftest me up from the gates of death;
- 14 That I may show all thy praises within the gates of the daughter of Zion: * I will rejoice in thy salvation.
- 15 The heathen are sunk down in the pit that they made; * in the same net which they hid privily is their foot taken.
- 16 The Lord is known to execute judgment; * the ungodly is trapped in the work of his own hands.
- 17 The wicked shall be turned to destruction, * and all the people that forget God.
- 18 For the poor shall not alway be forgotten; * the patient abiding of the meek shall not perish for ever.
- 19 Up, Lord, and let not man have the upper hand; * let the heathen be judged in thy sight.
- 20 Put them in fear, O Lord, * that the heathen may know themselves to be but men.

10 Ut quid, Domine?

TY HY standest thou so far off, O Lord, * and hidest thy face in the needful time of trouble?

2 The ungodly, for his own lust, doth persecute the poor: * let them be taken in the crafty wiliness that they have imagined.

- 3 For the ungodly hath made boast of his own heart's desire, * and speaketh good of the covetous, whom the Lord abhorreth.
- 4 The ungodly is so proud, that he careth not for God. * neither is God in all his thoughts.
- 5 His ways are alway grievous; * thy judgments are far above out of his sight, and therefore defieth he all his enemies.
- 6 For he hath said in his heart, Tush, I shall never be cast down, * there shall no harm happen unto me.
- 7 His mouth is full of cursing, deceit, and fraud; * under his tongue is ungodliness and vanity.
- 8 He sitteth lurking in the thievish corners of the streets, * and privily in his lurking dens doth he murder the innocent; his eyes are set against the poor.
- 9 For he lieth waiting secretly; even as a lion lurketh he in his den, * that he may ravish the poor.
- 10 He doth ravish the poor, * when he getteth him into his net.
- 11 He falleth down, and humbleth himself, * that the congregation of the poor may fall into the hands of his captains.
- 12 He hath said in his heart, Tush, God hath forgotten; * he hideth away his face, and he will never see it.
- 13 Arise, O Lord God, and lift up thine hand; * forget not the poor.
- 14 Wherefore should the wicked blaspheme God, * while he doth say in his heart, Tush, thou God carest not for it?
- 15 Surely thou hast seen it; * for thou beholdest ungodliness and wrong, that thou mayest take the matter into thy hand.

16 The poor committeth himself unto thee; * for thou art the helper of the friendless.

17 Break thou the power of the ungodly and malicious; * search out his ungodliness, until thou find none.

18 The Lord is King for ever and ever, * and the heathen are perished out of the land.

19 Lord, thou hast heard the desire of the poor; * thou preparest their heart, and thine ear hearkeneth;

20 To help the fatherless and poor unto their right, * that the man of the earth be no more exalted against them.

11 In Domino confido

I N the Lord put I my trust; * how say ye then to my soul, that she should flee as a bird unto the hill?

- 2 For lo, the ungodly bend their bow, and make ready their arrows within the quiver, * that they may privily shoot at them which are true of heart.
- 3 If the foundations be destroyed, * what can the righteous do?
- 4 The Lord is in his holy temple; * the Lord's seat is in heaven.
- 5 His eyes consider the poor; * and his eyelids try the children of men.
- 6 The Lord approveth the righteous: * but the ungodly, and him that delighteth in wickedness, doth his soul abhor.
- 7 Upon the ungodly he shall rain snares, fire and brimstone, storm and tempest: * this shall be their portion to drink.
- 8 For the righteous Lord loveth righteousness; * his countenance will behold the things that is just.

Second Day: Evening Prayer

12 Salvum me fac

HELP me, Lord, for there is not one godly man left; * for the faithful are minished from among the children of men.

- 2 They talk of vanity every one with his neighbor; * they do but flatter with their lips, and dissemble in their double heart.
- 3 The Lord shall root out all deceitful lips, * and the tongue that speaketh proud things;
- 4 Which have said, With our tongue will we prevail; * we are they that ought to speak; who is lord over us?
- 5 Now, for the comfortless troubles' sake of the needy, * and because of the deep sighing of the poor,
- 6 I will up, saith the Lord; * and will help every one from him that swelleth against him, and will set him at rest.
- 7 The words of the Lord are pure words; * even as the silver which from the earth is tried, and purified seven times in the fire.
- 8 Thou shalt keep them, O Lord; * thou shalt preserve them from this generation for ever.
- 9 The ungodly walk on every side: * when they are exalted, the children of men are put to rebuke.

13 Usquequo, Domine?

H OW long wilt thou forget me, O Lord; for ever? * how long wilt thou hide thy face from me?

- 2 How long shall I seek counsel in my soul, and be so vexed in my heart? * how long shall mine enemy triumph over me?
- 3 Consider, and hear me, O Lord my God; * lighten mine eyes, that I sleep not in death;

4 Lest mine enemy say, I have prevailed against him: * for if I be cast down, they that trouble me will rejoice at it.

5 But my trust is in thy mercy, * and my heart is joyful in

thy salvation.

6 I will sing of the Lord, because he hath dealt so lovingly with me; * yea, I will praise the Name of the Lord Most Highest.

14 Dixit insipiens

THE fool hath said in his heart, * There is no God.

2 They are corrupt, and become abominable in their doings; * there is none that doeth good, no not one.

3 The Lord looked down from heaven upon the children of men, * to see if there were any that would understand, and seek after God

4 But they are all gone out of the way, they are altogether become abominable; * there is none that doeth good, no not one.

5 Have they no knowledge, that they are all such workers of mischief, * eating up my people as it were bread, and call not upon the Lord?

6 There were they brought in great fear, even where no fear was; * for God is in the generation of the righteous.

7 As for you, ye have made a mock at the counsel of the poor; * because he putteth his trust in the Lord.

8 Who shall give salvation unto Israel out of Zion? * When the Lord turneth the captivity of his people, then shall Jacob rejoice, and Israel shall be glad.

Third Day: Morning Prayer

15 Domine, quis habitabit?

ORD, who shall dwell in thy tabernacle? * or who shall rest upon thy holy hill?

2 Even he that leadeth an uncorrupt life, * and doeth the thing which is right, and speaketh the truth from his heart.

3 He that hath used no deceit in his tongue, nor done evil to his neighbor, * and hath not slandered his neighbor.

4 He that setteth not by himself, but is lowly in his own eyes, * and maketh much of them that fear the Lord.

- 5 He that sweareth unto his neighbor, and disappointeth him not, * though it were to his own hindrance.
- 6 He that hath not given his money upon usury, * nor taken reward against the innocent.
- 7 Whoso doeth these things * shall never fall.

16 Conserva me, Domine

PRESERVE me, O God; * for in thee have I put my trust.
2 O my soul, thou hast said unto the Lord, * Thou art my God; I have no good like unto thee.

3 All my delight is upon the saints that are in the earth, * and

upon such as excel in virtue.

4 But they that run after another god * shall have great trouble.

5 Their drink-offerings of blood will I not offer, * neither make mention of their names within my lips.

6 The Lord himself is the portion of mine inheritance, and of my cup; * thou shalt maintain my lot.

7 The lot is fallen unto me in a fair ground; * yea, I have a goodly heritage.

I will thank the Lord for giving me warning; * my reins also

chasten me in the night season.

9 I have set the Lord alway before me; * for he is on my right hand, therefore I shall not fall.

10 Wherefore my heart is glad, and my glory rejoiceth: * my

flesh also shall rest in hope.

11 For why? thou shalt not leave my soul in hell; * neither shalt thou suffer thy Holy One to see corruption.

12 Thou shalt show me the path of life: in thy presence is the fullness of joy, * and at thy right hand there is pleasure for evermore.

17 Exaudi, Domine

HEAR the right, O Lord, consider my complaint, * and hearken unto my prayer, that goeth not out of feigned lips.

2 Let my sentence come forth from thy presence; * and let

thine eyes look upon the thing that is equal.

3 Thou hast proved and visited mine heart in the night season; thou hast tried me, and shalt find no wickedness in me; * for I am utterly purposed that my mouth shall not offend.

4 As for the works of men, * by the word of thy lips I have

kept me from the ways of the destroyer.

5 O hold thou up my goings in thy paths, * that my footsteps slip not.

6 I have called upon thee, O God, for thou shalt hear me: * incline thine ear to me, and hearken unto my words.

7 Show thy marvelous loving-kindness, thou that art the Savior of them which put their trust in thee, * from such as resist thy right hand.

8 Keep me as the apple of an eye; * hide me under the shadow of thy wings,

9 From the ungodly, that trouble me; * mine enemies compass me round about, to take away my soul.

10 They are inclosed in their own fat, * and their mouth speaketh proud things.

11 They lie waiting in our way on every side, * watching to cast us down to the ground:

12 Like as a lion that is greedy of his prey, * and as it were a lion's whelp lurking in secret places.

13 Up, Lord, disappoint him, and cast him down; * deliver my soul from the ungodly, by thine own sword;

14 Yea, by thy hand, O Lord; from the men of the evil world; * which have their portion in this life, whose bellies thou fillest with thy hid treasure.

15 They have children at their desire, * and leave the rest of their substance for their babes.

16 But as for me, I shall behold thy presence in righteousness; * and when I awake up after thy likeness, I shall be satisfied.

Third Day: Evening Prayer

18

Part I Diligam te, Domine

WILL love thee, O Lord, my strength. * The Lord is my stony rock, and my defense.

2 My Savior, my God, and my might, in whom I will trust; * my buckler, the horn also of my salvation, and my refuge.

3 I will call upon the Lord, which is worthy to be praised; * so shall I be safe from mine enemies.

4 The sorrows of death compassed me, * and the overflowings of ungodliness made me afraid.

5 The pains of hell came about me; * the snares of death

overtook me.

6 In my trouble I called upon the Lord, * and complained unto my God:

7 So he heard my voice out of his holy temple, * and my complaint came before him; it entered even into his ears.

- 8 The earth trembled and quaked, * the very foundations also of the hills shook, and were removed, because he was wroth.
- 9 There went a smoke out in his presence, * and a consuming fire out of his mouth, so that coals were kindled at it.
- 10 He bowed the heavens also, and came down, * and it was dark under his feet.
- 11 He rode upon the Cherubim, and did fly; * he came flying upon the wings of the wind.
- 12 He made darkness his secret place, * his pavilion round about him with dark water, and thick clouds to cover him.
- 13 At the brightness of his presence his clouds removed; * hailstones and coals of fire.
- 14 The Lord also thundered out of heaven, and the Highest gave his thunder; * hailstones and coals of fire.
- 15 He sent out his arrows, and scattered them; * he cast forth lightnings, and destroyed them.
- 16 The springs of waters were seen, and the foundations of the round world were discovered, * at thy chiding, O Lord, at the blasting of the breath of thy displeasure.
- 17 He sent down from on high to fetch me, * and took me out of many waters.
- 18 He delivered me from my strongest enemy, and from them which hate me; * for they were too mighty for me.
- 19 They came upon me in the day of my trouble; * but the Lord was my upholder.

20 He brought me forth also into a place of liberty; * he brought me forth, even because he had a favor unto me.

Part II Et retribuet mihi

- 21 The Lord rewarded me after my righteous dealing, * according to the cleanness of my hands did he recompense me.
- 22 Because I have kept the ways of the Lord, * and have not forsaken my God, as the wicked doth.
- 23 For I have an eye unto all his laws, * and will not cast out his commandments from me.
- 24 I was also uncorrupt before him, * and eschewed mine own wickedness.
- 25 Therefore the Lord rewarded me after my righteous dealing, * and according unto the cleanness of my hands in his eyesight.
- 26 With the holy thou shalt be holy, * and with a perfect man thou shalt be perfect.
- 27 With the clean thou shalt be clean, * and with the froward thou shalt be froward.
- 28 For thou shalt save the people that are in adversity, * and shalt bring down the high looks of the proud.
- 29 Thou also shalt light my candle; * the Lord my God shall make my darkness to be light.
- 30 For in thee I shall discomfit an host of men, * and with the help of my God I shall leap over the wall.
- 31 The way of God is an undefiled way: * the word of the Lord also is tried in the fire; he is the defender of all them that put their trust in him.
- 32 For who is God, but the Lord? * or who hath any strength, except our God?

33 It is God that girdeth me with strength of war, * and maketh my way perfect.

34 He maketh my feet like harts' feet, * and setteth me

upon high.

35 He teacheth mine hands to fight, * and mine arms shall bend even a bow of steel.

- 36 Thou hast given me the defense of thy salvation; * thy right hand also shall hold me up, and thy loving correction shall make me great.
- 37 Thou shalt make room enough under me for to go, * that my footsteps shall not slide.
- 38 I will follow upon mine enemies, and overtake them; * neither will I turn again till I have destroyed them.
- 39 I will smite them, that they shall not be able to stand, * but fall under my feet.
- 40 Thou hast girded me with strength unto the battle; * thou shalt throw down mine enemies under me.
- 41 Thou hast made mine enemies also to turn their backs upon me, * and I shall destroy them that hate me.
- 42 They shall cry, but there shall be none to help them; * yea, even unto the Lord shall they cry, but he shall not hear them.
- 43 I will beat them as small as the dust before the wind: * I will cast them out as the clay in the streets.
- 44 Thou shalt deliver me from the strivings of the people, * and thou shalt make me the head of the nations; a people whom I have not known shall serve me.
- 45 As soon as they hear of me, they shall obey me; * the strangers shall feign obedience unto me.
- 46 The strangers shall fail, * and come trembling out of their strongholds.
- 47 The Lord liveth; and blessed be my strong helper, * and praised be the God of my salvation;
- 48 Even the God that seeth that I be avenged, * and subdueth the people unto me.

- 49 It is he that delivereth me from my cruel enemies, and setteth me up above mine adversaries: * thou shalt rid me from the wicked man.
- 50 For this cause will I give thanks unto thee, O Lord, among the Gentiles, * and sing praises unto thy Name.
- 51 Great prosperity giveth he unto his King, * and showeth loving-kindness unto David his anointed, and unto his seed for evermore.

Fourth Day: Morning Prayer

19 Caeli enarrant

THE heavens declare the glory of God; * and the firmament showeth his handy-work.

2 One day telleth another; * and one night certifieth another.

3 There is neither speech nor language; * but their voices are heard among them.

4 Their sound is gone out into all lands; * and their words into the ends of the world.

- 5 In them hath he set a tabernacle for the sun; * which cometh forth as * bridegroom out of his chamber, and rejoiceth as a giant to run his course.
- 6 It goeth forth from the uttermost part of the heaven, and runneth about unto the end of it again; * and there is nothing hid from the heat thereof.

7 The law of the Lord is an undefiled law, converting the soul; * the testimony of the Lord is sure, and giveth wisdom unto the simple.

8 The statutes of the Lord are right, and rejoice the heart; * the commandment of the Lord is pure, and giveth light unto the eyes.

9 The fear of the Lord is clean, and endureth for ever; * the judgments of the Lord are true, and righteous altogether.

10 More to be desired are they than gold, yea, than much fine gold; * sweeter also than honey, and the honeycomb.

11 Moreover, by them is thy servant taught; * and in keeping of them there is great reward.

12 Who can tell how oft he offendeth? * O cleanse thou me

from my secret faults.

13 Keep thy servant also from presumptuous sins, lest they get the dominion over me; * so shall I be undefiled, and innocent from the great offense.

14 Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart, be alway acceptable in thy sight, * O Lord, my

strength and my redeemer.

20 Exaudiat te Dominus

THE Lord hear thee in the day of trouble; * the Name of the God of Jacob defend thee:

- 2 Send thee help from the sanctuary, * and strengthen thee out of Zion:
- 3 Remember all thy offerings, * and accept thy burnt-sacrifice:

4 Grant thee thy heart's desire, * and fulfill all thy mind.

- 5 We will rejoice in thy salvation, and triumph in the Name of the Lord our God: * the Lord perform all thy petitions.
- 6 Now know I that the Lord helpeth his anointed, and will hear him from his holy heaven, * even with the wholesome strength of his right hand.
- 7 Some put their trust in chariots, and some in horses; * but we will remember the Name of the Lord our God.
- 8 They are brought down and fallen; * but we are risen and stand upright.

9 Save, Lord; and hear us, O King of heaven * when we call upon thee.

21 Domine, in virtute tua

THE King shall rejoice in thy strength, O Lord; * exceeding glad shall he be of thy salvation.

2 Thou hast given him his heart's desire, * and hast not denied

him the request of his lips.

3 For thou shalt meet him with the blessings of goodness, * and shalt set a crown of pure gold upon his head.

4 He asked life of thee; and thou gavest him a long life, * even for ever and ever.

5 His honor is great in thy salvation; * glory and great worship shalt thou lay upon him.

6 For thou shalt give him everlasting felicity, * and make him

glad with the joy of thy countenance.

- 7 And why? because the King putteth his trust in the Lord; * and in the mercy of the Most Highest he shall not miscarry.
- 8 All thine enemies shall feel thine hand; * thy right hand shall find out them that hate thee.
- 9 Thou shalt make them like a fiery oven in time of thy wrath: * the Lord shall destroy them in his displeasure, and the fire shall consume them.
- 10 Their fruit shalt thou root out of the earth, * and their seed from among the children of men.
- 11 For they intended mischief against thee, * and imagined such a device as they are not able to perform.
- 12 Therefore shalt thou put them to flight, * and the strings of thy bow shalt thou make ready against the face of them.
- 13 Be thou exalted, Lord, in thine own strength; * so will we sing, and praise thy power.

Fourth Day: Evening Prayer

22 Deus, Deus meus

Y God, my God, look upon me; why hast thou forsaken me? * and art so far from my health, and from the words of my complaint?

2 O my God, I cry in the day-time, but thou hearest not; * and

in the night season also I take no rest.

3 And thou continuest holy, * O thou Worship of Israel.

- 4 Our fathers hoped in thee; * they trusted in thee, and thou didst deliver them.
- 5 They called upon thee, and were holpen; * they put their trust in thee, and were not confounded.
- 6 But as for me, I am a worm, and no man; * a very scorn of men, and the outcast of the people.
- 7 All they that see me laugh me to scorn; * they shoot out their lips, and shake their heads, saying,
- 8 He trusted in the Lord, that he would deliver him; * let him deliver him, if he will have him.
- 9 But thou art he that took me out of my mother's womb; * thou wast my hope, when I hanged yet upon my mother's breasts.
- 10 I have been left unto thee ever since I was born; * thou art my God even from my mother's womb.
- 11 O go not from me; for trouble is hard at hand, * and there is none to help me.
- 12 Many oxen are come about me; * fat bulls of Bashan close me in on every side.
- 13 They gape upon me with their mouths, * as it were a ramping and a roaring lion.
- 14 I am poured out like water, and all my bones are out of joint; * my heart also in the midst of my body is even like melting wax.

- 15 My strength is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue cleaveth to my gums, * and thou bringest me into the dust of death.
- 16 For many dogs are come about me, * and the council of the wicked layeth siege against me.
- 17 They pierced my hands and my feet: I may tell all my bones: * they stand staring and looking upon me.
- 18 They part my garments among them, * and cast lots upon my vesture.
- 19 But be not thou far from me, O Lord; * thou art my succor, haste thee to help me.
- 20 Deliver my soul from the sword, * my darling from the power of the dog.
- 21 Save me from the lion's mouth; * thou hast heard me also from among the horns of the unicorns.
- 22 I will declare thy Name unto my brethren; * in the midst of the congregation will I praise thee.
- 23 O praise the Lord, ye that fear him: * magnify him, all ye of the seed of Jacob; and fear him, all ye seed of Israel.
- 24 For he hath not despised nor abhorred the low estate of the poor; * he hath not hid his face from him; but when he called unto him he heard him.
- 25 My praise is of thee in the great congregation; * my vows will I perform in the sight of them that fear him.
- 26 The poor shall eat, and be satisfied; they that seek after the Lord shall praise him: * your heart shall live for ever.
- 27 All the ends of the world shall remember themselves, and be turned unto the Lord; * and all the kindreds of the nations shall worship before him.
- 28 For the kingdom is the Lord's, * and he is the Governor among the nations.
- 29 All such as be fat upon earth * have eaten, and worshiped.
- 30 All they that go down into the dust shall kneel before him; * and no man hath quickened his own soul.

31 My seed shall serve him: * they shall be counted unto the Lord for a generation.

32 They shall come, and shall declare his righteousness * unto a people that shall be born, whom the Lord hath made.

23 Dominus regit me

THE Lord is my shepherd; * therefore can I lack nothing. 2 He shall feed me in a green pasture, * and lead me forth beside the waters of comfort.

3 He shall convert my soul, * and bring me forth in the paths

of righteousness for his Name's sake.

4 Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; * for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff comfort me.

5 Thou shalt prepare a table before me in the presence of them that trouble me; * thou hast anointed my head with oil,

and my cup shall be full.

6 Surely thy loving-kindness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life; * and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever

Fifth Day: Morning Prayer

24 Domini est terra

THE earth is the Lord's, and all that therein is; * the compass of the world, and they that dwell therein.

2 For he hath founded it upon the seas, * and stablished it upon the floods.

3 Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? * or who shall rise up in his holy place?

- 4 Even he that hath clean hands, and a pure heart; * and that hath not lift up his mind unto vanity, nor sworn to deceive his neighbor.
- 5 He shall receive the blessing from the Lord, * and righteousness from the God of his salvation.
- 6 This is the generation of them that seek him; * even of them that seek thy face, O God of Jacob.
- 7 Lift up your heads, O ye gates; and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors; * and the King of glory shall come in.

NTO thee, O Lord, will I lift up my soul; my God, I have put my trust in thee: * O let me not be confounded, neither let mine enemies triumph over me.

- 2 For all they that hope in thee shall not be ashamed; * but such as transgress without a cause shall be put to confusion.
- 3 Show me thy ways, O Lord, * and teach me thy paths.
- 4 Lead me forth in thy truth, and learn me: * for thou art the God of my salvation; in thee hath been my hope all the day long.
- 5 Call to remembrance, O Lord, thy tender mercies, * and thy loving-kindnesses, which have been ever of old.
- 6 O remember not the sins and offenses of my youth; * but according to thy mercy think thou upon me, O Lord, for thy goodness.

- 7 Gracious and righteous is the Lord; * therefore will he teach sinners in the way.
- 8 Them that are meek shall he guide in judgment; * and such as are gentle, them shall he learn his way.

- 13 The secret of the Lord is among them that fear him; * and he will show them his covenant.
- 14 Mine eyes are ever looking unto the Lord; * for he shall pluck my feet out of the net.
- 15 Turn thee unto me, and have mercy upon me; * for I am desolate, and in misery.
- 16 The sorrows of my heart are enlarged: * O bring thou me out of my troubles.
- 17 Look upon my adversity and misery, * and forgive me all my sin.
- 18 Consider mine enemies, how many they are; * and they bear a tyrannous hate against me.
- 19 O keep my soul, and deliver me; * let me not be confounded, for I have put my trust in thee.
- 20 Let perfectness and righteous dealing wait upon me; * for my hope hath been in thee.
- 21 Deliver Israel, O God, * out of all his troubles.

26 Judica me, Domine

- B E thou my Judge, O Lord, for I have walked innocently: *
 my trust hath been also in the Lord, therefore shall I
 not fall.
- 2 Examine me, O Lord, and prove me: * try out my reins and my heart.
- 3 For thy loving-kindness is ever before mine eyes; * and I will walk in thy truth.
- 4 I have not dwelt with vain persons; * neither will I have fellowship with the deceitful.
- 5 I have hated the congregation of the wicked; * and will not sit among the ungodly.
- 6 I will wash my hands in innocency, O Lord; * and so will I go to thine altar;

- 11 But as for me, I will walk innocently; * O deliver me, and be merciful unto me.
- 12 My foot standeth right: * I will praise the Lord in the congregations.

27 Dominus illuminatio

THE Lord is my light and my salvation; whom then shall I fear? * the Lord is the strength of my life; of whom then shall I be afraid?

2 When the wicked, even mine enemies and my foes, came upon me to eat up my flesh, * they stumbled and fell.

3 Though an host of men were laid against me, yet shall not my heart be afraid; * and though there rose up war against

me, yet will I put my trust in him.

4 One thing have I desired of the Lord, which I will require; * even that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the fair beauty of the Lord, and to visit his temple.

- 12 When my father and my mother forsake me, * the Lord taketh me up.
- 13 Teach me thy way, O Lord, * and lead me in the right way, because of mine enemies.

14 Deliver me not over into the will of mine adversaries: * for there are false witnesses risen up against me, and such as speak wrong.

15 I should utterly have fainted, * but that I believe verily to see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living.

16 O tarry thou the Lord's leisure; * be strong, and he shall comfort thine heart; and put thou thy trust in the Lord.

28 Ad te. Domine

UNTO thee will I cry, O Lord, my strength: * think no scorn of me; lest, if thou make as though thou hearest not, I become like them that go down into the pit.

2 Hear the voice of my humble petitions, when I cry unto thee; * when I hold up my hands towards the mercy-seat of thy holy temple.

3 O pluck me not away, neither destroy me with the ungodly and wicked doers, * which speak friendly to their neighbors, but imagine mischief in their hearts.

4 Reward then according to their deeds, * and according to the wickedness of their own inventions.

5 Recompense them after the work of their hands; * pay them that they have deserved.

6 For they regard not in their mind the works of the Lord, nor the operation of his hands; * therefore shall he break them down, and not build them up.

Praised be the Lord; * for he hath heard the voice of my

8 The Lord is my strength, and my shield; my heart hath trusted in him, and I am helped; * therefore my heart danceth for joy, and in my song will I praise him.

9 The Lord is my strength, * and he is the wholesome defense

of his anointed.

10 O save thy people, and give thy blessing unto thine inheritance: * feed them, and set them up for ever.

29 Afferte Domino

ASCRIBE unto the Lord, O ye mighty, * ascribe unto the Lord worship and strength.

2 Ascribe unto the Lord the honor due unto his Name; *

worship the Lord with holy worship.

3 The voice of the Lord is upon the waters; * it is the glorious God that maketh the thunder.

- 4 It is the Lord that ruleth the sea; the voice of the Lord is mighty in operation; * the voice of the Lord is a glorious voice.
- 5 The voice of the Lord breaketh the cedar-trees; * yea, the Lord breaketh the cedars of Lebanon.
- 6 He maketh them also to skip like a calf; * Lebanon also, and Sirion, like a young unicorn.
- 7 The voice of the Lord divideth the flames of fire; the voice of the Lord shaketh the wilderness; * yea, the Lord shaketh the wilderness of Kadesh.
- 8 The voice of the Lord maketh the hinds to bring forth young, and strippeth bare the forests: * in his temple doth every thing speak of his honor.

- 12 Thou hast turned my heaviness into joy; * thou hast put off my sackcloth, and girded me with gladness:
- 13 Therefore shall every good man sing of thy praise without ceasing. * O my God, I will give thanks unto thee for ever.

I N thee, O Lord, have I put my trust; let me never be put to confusion; * deliver me in thy righteousness.

2 Bow down thine ear to me; * make haste to deliver me.

3 And be thou my strong rock, and house of defense, * that thou mayest save me.

4 For thou art my strong rock, and my castle: * be thou also

my guide, and lead me for thy Name's sake.

5 Draw me out of the net that they have laid privily for me; * for thou art my strength.

6 Into thy hands I commend my spirit; * for thou hast redeemed me, O Lord, thou God of truth.

- 7 I have hated them that hold of lying vanities, * and my trust hath been in the Lord.
- 8 I will be glad and rejoice in thy mercy; * for thou hast considered my trouble, and hast known my soul in adversities.
- 9 Thou hast not shut me up into the hand of the enemy; * but hast set my feet in a large room.
- 10 Have mercy upon me, O Lord, for I am in trouble, * and mine eye is consumed for very heaviness; yea, my soul and my body.

- 17 My times are in thy hand; deliver me from the hand of mine enemies, * and from them that persecute me.
- 18 Show thy servant the light of thy countenance, * and save me for thy mercy's sake.
- 19 Let me not be confounded, O Lord, for I have called upon thee; * let the ungodly be put to confusion, and be put to silence in the grave.
- 20 Let the lying lips be put to silence, * which cruelly, disdainfully, and despitefully speak against the righteous.
- 21 O how plentiful is thy goodness, which thou hast laid up for them that fear thee, * and that thou hast prepared for them that put their trust in thee, even before the sons of men!

- 24 But in my haste I said, * I am cast out of the sight of thine eyes.
- 25 Nevertheless, thou heardest the voice of my prayer, * when I cried unto thee.
- 26 O love the Lord, all ye his saints; * for the Lord preserveth them that are faithful, and plenteously rewardeth the proud doer.
- 27 Be strong, and he shall establish your heart, * all ye that put your trust in the Lord.

Sixth Day: Evening Prayer

B LESSED is he whose unrighteousness is forgiven, * and whose sin is covered.

2 Blessed is the man unto whom the Lord imputeth no sin, * and in whose spirit there is no guile.

9 I will inform thee, and teach thee in the way wherein thou shalt go; * and I will guide thee with mine eye.

10 Be ye not like to horse and mule, which have no understanding; * whose mouths must be held with bit and bridle, else they will not obey thee.

11 Great plagues remain for the ungodly; * but whoso putteth his trust in the Lord, mercy embraceth him on every side.

12 Be glad, O ye righteous, and rejoice in the Lord; * and be joyful, all ye that are true of heart.

REJOICE in the Lord, O ye righteous; * for it becometh well the just to be thankful.

2 Praise the Lord with harp; * sing praises unto him with the lute, and instrument of ten strings.

3 Sing unto the Lord a new song; * sing praises lustily unto him with a good courage.

4 For the word of the Lord is true; * and all his works are faithful.

5 He loveth righteousness and judgment; * the earth is full of the goodness of the Lord.

6 By the word of the Lord were the heavens made; * and all the host of them by the breath of his mouth.

7 He gathereth the waters of the sea together, as it were upon an heap; * and layeth up the deep, as in a treasure-house.

8 Let all the earth fear the Lord: * stand in awe of him, all ye that dwell in the world.

9 For he spake, and it was done; * he commanded, and it stood fast.

10 The Lord bringeth the counsel of the heathen to nought, * and maketh the devices of the people to be of none effect, and casteth out the counsels of princes.

11 The counsel of the Lord shall endure for ever, * and the thoughts of his heart from generation to generation.

12 Blessed are the people whose God is the Lord Jehovah; * and blessed are the folk that he hath chosen to him, to be his inheritance.

13 The Lord looketh down from heaven, and beholdeth all the children of men; * from the habitation of his dwelling, he considereth all them that dwell on the earth.

14 He fashioneth all the hearts of them, * and understandeth all their works.

15 There is no king that can be saved by the multitude of an host; * neither is any mighty man delivered by much strength.

16 A horse is counted but a vain thing to save a man; * neither shall he deliver any man by his great strength.

17 Behold, the eye of the Lord is upon them that fear him, *

and upon them that put their trust in his mercy;

18 To deliver their soul from death, * and to feed them in the time of dearth.

- 19 Our soul hath patiently tarried for the Lord; * for he is our help and our shield.
- 20 For our heart shall rejoice in him; * because we have hoped in his holy Name.
- 21 Let thy merciful kindess, O Lord, be upon us, * like as we do put our trust in thee.

34 Benedicam Dominum

I WILL alway give thanks unto the Lord; * his praise shall ever be in my mouth.

2 My soul shall make her boast in the Lord; * the humble shall

hear thereof, and be glad.

3 O praise the Lord with me, * and let us magnify his Name together.

- 4 I sought the Lord, and he heard me; * yea, he delivered me out of all my fear.
- 5 They had an eye unto him, and were lightened; * and their faces were not ashamed.
- 6 Lo, the poor crieth, and the Lord heareth him; * yea, and saveth him out of all his troubles.
- 7 The angel of the Lord tarrieth round about them that fear him, * and delivereth them.
- 8 O taste, and see, how gracious the Lord is: * blessed is the man that trusteth in him.
- 9 O fear the Lord, ye that are his saints; * for they that fear him lack nothing.

10 The lions do lack, and suffer hunger; * but they who seek the Lord shall want no manner of thing that is good.

11 Come, ye children, and hearken unto me; * I will teach you

the fear of the Lord.

12 What man is he that lusteth to live, * and would fain see good days?

13 Keep thy tongue from evil, * and thy lips, that they speak no guile.

14 Eschew evil, and do good; * seek peace, and ensue it.

15 The eyes of the Lord are over the righteous, * and his ears are open unto their prayers.

16 The countenance of the Lord is against them that do evil, * to root out the remembrance of them from the earth.

17 The righteous cry, and the Lord heareth them, * and delivereth them out of all their troubles.

18 The Lord is nigh unto them that are of a contrite heart, * and will save such as be of an humble spirit.

19 Great are the troubles of the righteous; * but the Lord delivereth him out of all.

20 He keepeth all his bones, * so that not one of them is broken.

21 But misfortune shall slay the ungodly; * and they that hate the righteous shall be desolate.

22 The Lord delivereth the souls of his servants; * and all they that put their trust in him shall not be destitute.

- 9 And my soul shall be joyful in the Lord; * it shall rejoice in his salvation.
- 10 All my bones shall say, Lord, who is like unto thee, who deliverest the poor from him that is too strong for him; * yea, the poor, and him that is in misery, from him that spoileth him?
- 11 False witnesses did rise up: * they laid to my charge things that I knew not.
- 12 They rewarded me evil for good, * to the great discomfort of my soul.
- 13 Nevertheless, when they were sick, I put on sackcloth, and humbled my soul with fasting; * and my prayer shall turn into mine own bosom.
- 14 I behaved myself as though it had been my friend or my brother; * I went heavily, as one that mourneth for his mother.

- 15 But in mine adversity they rejoiced, and gathered themselves together; * yea, the very abjects came together against me unawares, making mouths at me, and ceased not.
- 16 With the flatterers were busy mockers, * who gnashed upon me with their teeth.
- 17 Lord, how long wilt thou look upon this? * O deliver my soul from the calamities which they bring on me, and my darling from the lions.
- 18 So will I give thee thanks in the great congregation; * I will praise thee among much people.
- 19 O let not them that are mine enemies triumph over me ungodly; * neither let them wink with their eyes, that hate me without a cause.
- 20 And why? their communing is not for peace; * but they imagine deceitful words against them that are quiet in the land.
- 21 They gaped upon me with their mouths, and said; * Fie on thee! we saw it with our eyes.
- 22 This thou hast seen, O Lord; * hold not thy tongue then; go not far from me, O Lord.
- 23 Awake, and stand up to judge my quarrel; * avenge thou my cause, my God and my Lord.
- 24 Judge me, O Lord my God, according to thy righteousness: * and let them not triumph over me.
- 25 Let them not say in their hearts, There! there! so would we have it; * neither let them say, We have devoured him.
- 26 Let them be put to confusion and shame together, that rejoice at my trouble; * let them be clothed with rebuke and dishonor, that boast themselves against me.
- 27 Let them be glad and rejoice, that favor my righteous dealing; * yea, let them say alway, Blessed be the Lord, who hath pleasure in the prosperity of his servant.

28 And as for my tongue, it shall be talking of thy righteousness, * and of thy praise, all the day long.

36 Dixit injustus

MY heart showeth me the wickedness of the ungodly, * that there is no fear of God before his eyes.

2 For he flattereth himself in his own sight, * until his

abominable sin be found out.

3 The words of his mouth are unrighteous and full of deceit: * he hath left off to behave himself wisely, and to do good.

- 4 He imagineth mischief upon his bed, and hath set himself in no good way; * neither doth he abhor any thing that is evil.
- 5 Thy mercy, O Lord, reacheth unto the heavens, * and thy faithfulness unto the clouds.

6 Thy righteousness standeth like the strong mountains: * thy

judgments are like the great deep.

7 Thou, Lord, shalt save both man and beast: how excellent is thy mercy, O God! * and the children of men shall put their trust under the shadow of thy wings.

8 They shall be satisfied with the plenteousness of thy house; * and thou shalt give them drink of thy pleasures, as out of

the river.

9 For with thee is the well of life; * and in thy light shall we see light.

- 10 O continue forth thy loving-kindness unto them that know thee, * and thy righteousness unto them that are true of heart.
- 11 O let not the foot of pride come against me; * and let not the hand of the ungodly cast me down.
- 12 There are they fallen, all that work wickedness; * they are cast down, and shall not be able to stand.

Seventh Day: Evening Prayer

Part I Noli aemulari

FRET not thyself because of the ungodly; * neither be thou envious against the evil doers.

2 For they shall soon be cut down like the grass, * and be withered even as the green herb.

3 Put thou thy trust in the Lord, and be doing good; * dwell in the land, and verily thou shalt be fed.

4 Delight thou in the Lord, * and he shall give thee thy heart's desire.

5 Commit thy way unto the Lord, and put thy trust in him, * and he shall bring it to pass.

6 He shall make thy righteousness as clear as the light, *

and thy just dealing as the noon-day.

- 7 Hold thee still in the Lord, and abide patiently upon him: * but grieve not thyself at him whose way doth prosper, against the man that doeth after evil counsels.
- 8 Leave off from wrath, and let go displeasure: * fret not thyself, else shalt thou be moved to do evil.
- 9 Wicked doers shall be rooted out; * and they that patiently abide the Lord, those shall inherit the land.
- 10 Yet a little while, and the ungodly shall be clean gone: * thou shalt look after his place, and he shall be away.
- 11 But the meek-spirited shall possess the earth, * and shall be refreshed in the multitude of peace.
- 12 The ungodly seeketh counsel against the just, * and gnasheth upon him with his teeth.
- 13 The Lord shall laugh him to scorn; * for he hath seen that his day is coming.

14 The ungodly have drawn out the sword, and have bent their bow, * to cast down the poor and needy, and to slay such as be upright in their ways.

15 Their sword shall go through their own heart, * and their

bow shall be broken.

16 A small thing that the righteous hath, * is better than great riches of the ungodly.

17 For the arms of the ungodly shall be broken, * and the Lord

upholdeth the righteous.

Part II Novit Dominus

- 18 The Lord knoweth the days of the godly; * and their inheritance shall endure for ever.
- 19 They shall not be confounded in the perilous time; * and in the days of dearth they shall have enough.
- 20 As for the ungodly, they shall perish, and the enemies of the Lord shall consume as the fat of lambs: * yea, even as the smoke shall they consume away.
- 21 The ungodly borroweth, and payeth not again; * but the righteous is merciful and liberal.
- 22 Such as are blessed of God, shall possess the land; * and they that are cursed of him, shall be rooted out.
- 23 The Lord ordereth a good man's going, * and maketh his way acceptable to himself.
- 24 Though he fall, he shall not be cast away; * for the Lord upholdeth him with his hand.

- 26 The righteous is ever merciful, and lendeth; * and his seed is blessed.
- 27 Flee from evil, and do the thing that is good; * and dwell for evermore.

28 For the Lord loveth the thing that is right; * he forsaketh not his that be godly, but they are preserved for ever.

29 The unrighteous shall be punished; * as for the seed of the

ungodly, it shall be rooted out.

30 The righteous shall inherit the land, * and dwell therein for ever.

- 31 The mouth of the righteous is exercised in wisdom, * and his tongue will be talking of judgment.
- 32 The law of his God is in his heart, * and his going shall not slide.
- 33 The ungodly watcheth the righteous, * and seeketh occasion to slay him.
- 34 The Lord will not leave him in his hand, * nor condemn him when he is judged.
- 35 Hope thou in the Lord, and keep his way, and he shall promote thee, that thou shalt possess the land: * When the ungodly shall perish, thou shalt see it.
- 36 I myself have seen the ungodly in great power, * and flourishing like a green bay-tree.
- 37 I went by, and lo, he was gone: * I sought him, but his place could no where be found.
- 38 Keep innocency, and take heed unto the thing that is right; * for that shall bring a man peace at the last.
- 39 As for the transgressors, they shall perish together; * and the end of the ungodly is, they shall be rooted out at the last.
- 40 But the salvation of the righteous cometh of the Lord; * who is also their strength in the time of trouble.
- 41 And the Lord shall stand by them, and save them: * he shall deliver them from the ungodly, and shall save them, because they put their trust in him.

21 Forsake me not, O Lord my God; * be not thou far

22 Haste thee to help me, * O Lord God of my salvation.

39 Dixi, Custodiam

T SAID, I will take heed to my ways, * that I offend not in I my tongue.

2 I will keep my mouth as it were with a bridle, * while the

ungodly is in my sight.

3 I held my tongue, and spake nothing: * I kept silence, yea, even from good words; but it was pain and grief to me.

4 My heart was hot within me: and while I was thus musing the fire kindled, * and at the last I spake with my tongue;

5 Lord, let me know mine end, and the number of my days; * that I may be certified how long I have to live.

6 Behold, thou hast made my days as it were a span long, and mine age is even as nothing in respect of thee; * and verily every man living is altogether vanity.

- 12 When thou with rebukes dost chasten man for sin, thou makest his beauty to consume away, like as it were a moth fretting a garment: * every man therefore is but vanity.
- 13 Hear my prayer, O Lord, and with thine ears consider my calling; * hold not thy peace at my tears;
- 14 For I am a stranger with thee, and a sojourner, * as all my fathers were.
- 15 O spare me a little, that I may recover my strength, * before I go hence, and be no more seen.

40 Expectans expectavi

- WAITED patiently for the Lord, * and he inclined unto me, and heard my calling.
- 2 He brought me also out of the horrible pit, out of the mire and clay, * and set my feet upon the rock, and ordered my goings.

- 14 Withdraw not thou thy mercy from me, O Lord; * let thy loving-kindness and thy truth alway preserve me.
- 15 For innumerable troubles are come about me; my sins have taken such hold upon me, that I am not able to look up; * yea, they are more in number than the hairs of my head, and my heart hath failed me.
- 16 O Lord, let it be thy pleasure to deliver me; * make haste, O Lord, to help me.
- 17 Let them be ashamed, and confounded together, that seek after my soul to destroy it; * let them be driven backward, and put to rebuke, that wish me evil.

- 25 For our soul is brought low, even unto the dust; * our belly cleaveth unto the ground.
- 26 Arise, and help us, * and deliver us, for thy mercy's sake.

Y heart overfloweth with a good matter; I speak the things which I have made concerning the King. * My tongue is the pen of a ready writer.

2 Thou art fairer than the children of men; * full of grace are thy lips, because God hath blessed thee for ever.

3 Gird thee with thy sword upon thy thigh, O thou Most Mighty, * according to thy worship and renown.

4 Good luck have thou with thine honor: * ride on, because of the word of truth, of meekness, and righteousness; and thy right hand shall teach thee terrible things.

5 Thy arrows are very sharp in the heart of the King's enemies. * and the people shall be subdued unto thee.

2 The hill of Zion is a fair place, and the joy of the whole earth; * upon the north side lieth the city of the great king:
God is well known in her palaces as a sure refuge.

3 For lo, the kings of the earth * were gathered, and gone

by together.

- 4 They marvelled to see such things; * they were astonished, and suddenly cast down.
- 5 Fear came there upon them; and sorrow, * as upon a woman in her travail.
- 6 Thou dost break the ships of the sea * through the east-wind.
- 7 Like as we have heard, so have we seen in the city of the Lord of hosts, in the city of our God; * God upholdeth the same for ever.
- 8 We wait for thy loving-kindness, O God, * in the midst of thy temple.
- 9 O God, according to thy Name, so is thy praise unto the world's end; * thy right hand is full of righteousness.
- 10 Let the mount Zion rejoice, and the daughters of Judah be glad, * because of thy judgments.

THE Lord, even the Most Mighty God, hath spoken, * and called the world, from the rising up of the sun unto the going down thereof.

2 Out of Zion hath God appeared * in perfect beauty.

3 Our God shall come, and shall not keep silence; * there shall go before him a consuming fire, and a mighty tempest shall be stirred up round about him.

4 He shall call the heaven from above, * and the earth, that he

may judge his people.

5 Gather my saints together unto me; * those that have made a covenant with me with sacrifice.

6 And the heavens shall declare his righteousness; * for God is

Judge himself.

12 If I be hungry, I will not tell thee; * for the whole world is mine, and all that is therein.

13 Thinkest thou that I will eat bulls' flesh, * and drink the

blood of goats?

14 Offer unto God thanksgiving, * and pay thy vows unto the Most Highest.

- 15 And call upon me in the time of trouble; * so will I hear thee, and thou shalt praise me.
- 16 But unto the ungodly saith God, * Why dost thou preach my laws, and takest my covenant in thy mouth;
- 17 Whereas thou hatest to be reformed, * and hast cast my words behind thee?
- 18 When thou sawest a thief, thou consentedst unto him; * and hast been partaker with the adulterers.
- 19 Thou hast let thy mouth speak wickedness, * and with thy tongue thou hast set forth deceit.
- 20 Thou sattest and spakest against thy brother; * yea, and hast slandered thine own mother's son.
- 21 These things hast thou done, and I held my tongue, and thou thoughtest wickedly, that I am even such a one as thyself; * but I will reprove thee, and set before thee the things that thou hast done.
- 22 O consider this, ye that forget God, * lest I pluck you away, and there be none to deliver you.
- 23 Whoso offereth me thanks and praise, he honoreth me; * and to him that ordereth his way aright, will I show the salvation of God.

51 Miserere mei, Deus

- H AVE mercy upon me, O God, after thy great goodness; * according to the multitude of thy mercies do away mine offenses.
- 2 Wash me throughly from my wickedness, * and cleanse me from my sin.
- 3 For I acknowledge my faults, * and my sin is ever before me
- 4 Against thee only have I sinned, and done this evil in thy sight; * that thou mightest be justified in thy saying, and clear when thou shalt judge.

- 5 Behold, I was shapen in wickedness, * and in sin hath my mother conceived me.
- 6 But lo, thou requirest truth in the inward parts, * and shalt make me to understand wisdom secretly.
- 7 Thou shalt purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; * thou shalt wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.

- 9 Turn thy face from my sins, * and put out all my misdeeds.
- 10 Make me a clean heart, O God, * and renew a right spirit within me.

- 12 O give me the comfort of thy help again, * and stablish me with thy free Spirit.
- 13 Then shall I teach thy ways unto the wicked, * and sinners shall be converted unto thee.
- 14 Deliver me from blood-guiltiness, O God, thou that art the God of my health; * and my tongue shall sing of thy righteousness.
- 15 Thou shalt open my lips, O Lord, * and my mouth shall show thy praise.
- 16 For thou desirest no sacrifice, else would I give it thee; * but thou delightest not in burnt-offerings.
- 17 The sacrifice of God is a troubled spirit: * a broken and contrite heart, O God, shalt thou not despise.
- 18 O be favorable and gracious unto Zion; * build thou the walls of Jerusalem.

- 5 He shall reward evil unto mine enemies: * destroy thou them in thy truth.
- 6 An offering of a free heart will I give thee, and praise thy Name, O Lord; * because it is so comfortable.

3 But let the righteous be glad, and rejoice before God; *

let them also be merry and joyful.

4 O sing unto God, and sing praises unto his Name; magnify him that rideth upon the heavens; * praise him in his Name JAH, and rejoice before him.

5 He is a Father of the fatherless, and defendeth the cause of

the widows; * even God in his holy habitation.

6 He is the God that maketh men to be of one mind in an house, and bringeth the prisoners out of captivity; * but letteth the runagates continue in scarceness.

7 O God, when thou wentest forth before the people; * when

thou wentest through the wilderness,

The earth shook, and the heavens dropped at the presence of God; * even as Sinai also was moved at the presence of God, who is the God of Israel.

9 Thou, O God, sentest a gracious rain upon thine inheritance, * and refreshedst it when it was weary.

10 Thy congregation shall dwell therein; * for thou, O God, hast of thy goodness prepared for the poor.

11 The Lord gave the word; * great was the company of

women that bare the tidings.

12 Kings with their armies did flee, and were discomfited, * and they of the household divided the spoil.

- 13 Though ye have lain among the sheep-folds, yet shall ye be as the wings of a dove * that is covered with silver wings, and her feathers like gold.
- 14 When the Almighty scattered kings for their sake, * then were they as white as snow in Salmon.
- 15 As the hill of Bashan, so is God's hill; * even an high hill, as the hill of Bashan.
- 16 Why mock ye so, ye high hills? this is God's hill, in the which it pleaseth him to dwell; * yea, the Lord will abide in it for ever.
- 17 The chariots of God are twenty thousand, even thousands of angels; * and the Lord is among them as in the holy place of Sinai.
- 18 Thou art gone up on high, thou hast led captivity captive, and received gifts from men; * yea, even from thine enemies, that the Lord God might dwell among them.
- 19 Praised be the Lord daily, * even the God who helpeth us, and poureth his benefits upon us.
- 20 He is our God, even the God of whom cometh salvation: * God is the Lord, by whom we escape death.
- 21 God shall wound the head of his enemies, * and the hairy scalp of such a one as goeth on still in his wickedness.
- 22 The Lord hath said, I will bring my people again, as I did from Bashan; * mine own will I bring again, as I did sometime from the deep of the sea.
- 23 That thy foot may be dipped in the blood of thine enemies, * and that the tongue of thy dogs may be red through the same.
- 24 It is well seen, O God, how thou goest; * how thou, my God and King, goest in the sanctuary.
- 25 The singers go before, the minstrels follow after, * in the midst of the damsels playing with the timbrels.
- 26 Give thanks unto God the Lord in the congregation, * ye that are of the fountain of Israel.

27 There is little Benjamin their ruler, and the princes of Judah their council; * the princes of Zebulon, and the princes of Naphthali.

28 Thy God hath sent forth strength for thee; * stablish the thing. O God, that thou hast wrought in us,

29 For thy temple's sake at Jerusalem; * so shall kings bring presents unto thee.

30 Rebuke thou the dragon and the bull, with the leaders of the heathen, so that they humbly bring pieces of silver; * scatter thou the peoples that delight in war;

31 Then shall the princes come out of Egypt; * the Morians' land shall soon stretch out her hands unto God.

32 Sing unto God, O ye kingdoms of the earth; * O sing praises unto the Lord;

33 Who sitteth in the heavens over all, from the beginning: * lo, he doth send out his voice; yea, and that a mighty voice.

34 Ascribe ye the power to God over Israel; * his worship and strength is in the clouds.

35 O God, wonderful art thou in thy holy places: * even the God of Israel, he will give strength and power unto his people. Blessed be God.

Thirteenth Day: Evening Prayer

69 Salvum me fac

S AVE me, O God; * for the waters are come in, even unto my soul.

2 I stick fast in the deep mire, where no ground is; * I am come into deep waters, so that the floods run over me.

3 I am weary of crying; my throat is dry; * my sight faileth me for waiting so long upon my God.

4 They that hate me without a cause are more than the hairs of my head; * they that are mine enemies, and would destroy me guiltless, are mighty.

5 I paid them the things that I never took: * God, thou knowest my simpleness, and my faults are not hid from thee.

6 Let not them that trust in thee, O Lord God of hosts, be ashamed for my cause; * let not those that seek thee be

confounded through me, O Lord God of Israel.

7 And why? for thy sake have I suffered reproof; * shame hath covered my face.

8 I am become a stranger unto my brethren, * even an alien unto my mother's children.

9 For the zeal of thine house hath even eaten me; * and the rebukes of them that rebuked thee are fallen upon me.

- 10 I wept, and chastened myself with fasting, * and that was turned to my reproof.
- 11 I put on sackcloth also, * and they jested upon me.
- 12 They that sit in the gate speak against me, * and the drunkards make songs upon me.
- 13 But, Lord, I make my prayer unto thee * in an acceptable time.
- 14 Hear me, O God, in the multitude of thy mercy, * even in the truth of thy salvation.
- 15 Take me out of the mire, that I sink not; * O let me be delivered from them that hate me, and out of the deep waters.
- 16 Let not the water-flood drown me, neither let the deep swallow me up; * and let not the pit shut her mouth upon me.

17 Hear me, O Lord, for thy loving-kindness is comfortable; * turn thee unto me according to the multitude of thy mercies.

18 And hide not thy face from thy servant; for I am in trouble; * O haste thee, and hear me.

19 Draw nigh unto my soul, and save it; * O deliver me, because of mine enemies.

20 Thou hast known my reproach, my shame, and my dishonor: * mine adversaries are all in thy sight.

21 Reproach hath broken my heart; I am full of heaviness: *
I looked for some to have pity on me, but there was no
man, neither found I any to comfort me.

22 They gave me gall to eat; * and when I was thirsty they gave me vinegar to drink.

- 23 Let their table be made a snare to take themselves withal; * and let the things that should have been for their wealth be unto them an occasion of falling.
- 24 Let their eyes be blinded, that they see not; * and ever bow thou down their backs.
- 25 Pour out thine indignation upon them, * and let thy wrathful displeasure take hold of them.
- 26 Let their habitation be void, * and no man to dwell in their tents.
- 27 For they persecute him whom thou hast smitten; * and they talk how they may vex them whom thou hast wounded.
- 28 Let them fall from one wickedness to another, * and not come into thy righteousness.
- 29 Let them be wiped out of the book of the living, * and not be written among the righteous.
- 30 As for me, when I am poor and in heaviness, * thy help, O God, shall lift me up.
- 31 I will praise the Name of God with a song, * and magnify it with thanksgiving.
- 32 This also shall please the Lord * better than a bullock that hath horns and hoofs.
- 33 The humble shall consider this, and be glad; * seek ye after God, and your soul shall live.
- 34 For the Lord heareth the poor, * and despiseth not his prisoners.

- 35 Let heaven and earth praise him: * the sea, and all that moveth therein
- 36 For God will save Zion, and build the cities of Judah, * that men may dwell there, and have it in possession.

37 The posterity also of his servants shall inherit it: * and they that love his Name shall dwell therein.

70 Deus, in adjutorium

TASTE thee, O God, to deliver me; * make haste to help I me, O Lord.

- 2 Let them be ashamed and confounded that seek after my soul: * let them be turned backward and put to confusion that wish me evil.
- 3 Let them for their reward be soon brought to shame, * that cry over me, There! there!
- 4 But let all those that seek thee be joyful and glad in thee: * and let all such as delight in thy salvation say alway, The Lord be praised.
- 5 As for me, I am poor and in misery: * haste thee unto me, O God.
- 6 Thou art my helper, and my redeemer: * O Lord, make no long tarrying.

Fourteenth Day: Morning Prayer

7 In te. Domine, speravi

IN thee, O Lord, have I put my trust; let me never be put to confusion, * but rid me and deliver me in thy righteousness; incline thine ear unto me, and save me.

2 Be thou my stronghold, whereunto I may alway resort: * thou hast promised to help me, for thou art my house of defense, and my castle.

3 Deliver me, O my God, out of the hand of the ungodly, * out of the hand of the unrighteous and cruel man.

4 For thou, O Lord God, art the thing that I long for: * thou

art my hope, even from my youth.

- 5 Through thee have I been holden up ever since I was born: * tho art he that took me out of my mother's womb: my praise shall be alway of thee.
- 6 I am become as it were a monster unto many, * but my sure trust is in thee.
- 7 O let my mouth be filled with thy praise, * that I may sing of thy glory and honor all the day long.
- 8 Cast me not away in the time of age; * forsake me not when my strength faileth me.
- 9 For mine enemies speak against me; * and they that lay wait for my soul take their counsel together, saying,
- 10 God hath forsaken him; * persecute him, and take him, for there is none to deliver him.
- 11 Go not far from me, O God: * my God, haste thee to help me.
- 12 Let them be confounded and perish that are against my soul; * let them be covered with shame and dishonor that seek to do me evil.
- 13 As for me, I will patiently abide alway, * and will praise thee more and more.
- 14 My mouth shall daily speak of thy righteousness and salvation; * for I know no end thereof.
- 15 I will go forth in the strength of the Lord God, * and will make mention of thy righteousness only.
- 16 Thou, O God, hast taught me from my youth up until now; * therefore will I tell of thy wondrous works.

- 17 Forsake me not, O God, in mine old age, when I am gray-headed, * until I have showed thy strength unto this generation, and thy power to all them that are yet for to come.
- 18 Thy righteousness, O God, is very high, * and great things are they that thou hast done: O God, who is like unto thee!
- 19 O what great troubles and adversities hast thou showed me! and vet didst thou turn and refresh me; * yea, and broughtest me from the deep of the earth again.

20 Thou hast brought me to great honor, * and comforted me on every side:

21 Therefore will I praise thee, and thy faithfulness, O God, playing upon an instrument of music: * unto thee will I sing upon the harp, O thou Holy One of Israel.

22 My lips will be glad when I sing unto thee; * and so will

my soul whom thou hast delivered.

23 My tongue also shall talk of thy righteousness all the day long; * for they are confounded and brought unto shame that seek to do me evil.

72 Deus, judicium

▶ IVE the King thy judgments, O God, * and thy J righteousness unto the King's son.

2 Then shall he judge thy people according unto right, * and defend the poor.

3 The mountains also shall bring peace, * and the little hills

righteousness unto the people.

4 He shall keep the simple folk by their right, * defend the children of the poor, and punish the wrong doer.

5 They shall fear thee, as long as the sun and moon endureth, * from one generation to another.

6 He shall come down like the rain upon the mown grass, * even as the drops that water the earth.

7 In his time shall the righteous flourish; * yea, and abundance of peace, so long as the moon endureth.

8 His dominion shall be also from the one sea to the other, * and from the river unto the world's end.

- 9 They that dwell in the wilderness shall kneel before him; * his enemies shall lick the dust.
- 10 The kings of Tarshish and of the isles shall give presents; * the kings of Arabia and Saba shall bring gifts.
- 11 All kings shall fall down before him; * all nations shall do him service.
- 12 For he shall deliver the poor when he crieth; * the needy also, and him that hath no helper.
- 13 He shall be favorable to the simple and needy, * and shall preserve the souls of the poor.
- 14 He shall deliver their souls from falsehood and wrong; * and dear shall their blood be in his sight.
- 15 He shall live, and unto him shall be given of the gold of Arabia; * prayer shall be made ever unto him, and daily shall he be praised.
- 16 There shall be an heap of corn in the earth, high upon the hills; the fruit thereof shall shake like Lebanon: * and they of the city shall flourish like grass upon the earth.
- 17 His Name shall endure for ever; his Name shall remain under the sun among the posterities, which shall be blessed in him; * and all the nations shall praise him.
- 18 Blessed be the Lord God, even the God of Israel, * which only doeth wondrous things;
- 19 And blessed be the Name of his majesty for ever: * and all the earth shall be filled with his majesty. Amen, Amen.

Fourteenth Day: Evening Prayer

73 Quam bonus Israel!

TRULY God is loving unto Israel: * even unto such as are of a clean heart.

- 2 Nevertheless, my feet were almost gone, * my treadings had well-nigh slipt.
- 3 And why? I was grieved at the wicked: * I do also see the ungodly in such prosperity.
- 4 For they are in no peril of death; * but are lusty and strong.
- 5 They come in no misfortune like other folk; * neither are they plagued like other men.
- 6 And this is the cause that they are so holden with pride, * and cruelty covereth them as a garment.
- 7 Their eyes swell with fatness, * and they do even what they lust.
- 8 They corrupt other, and speak of wicked blasphemy; * their talking is against the Most High.
- 9 For they stretch forth their mouth unto the heaven, * and their tongue goeth through the world.
- 10 Therefore fall the people unto them, * and thereout suck they no small advantage.
- 11 Tush, say they, how should God perceive it? * is there knowledge in the Most High?
- 12 Lo, these are the ungodly, * these prosper in the world, and these have riches in possession:
- 13 And I said, Then have I cleansed my heart in vain, * and washed my hands in innocency.
- 14 All the day long have I been punished, * and chastened every morning.

- 15 Yea, and I had almost said even as they; * but lo, then I should have condemned the generation of thy children.
- 16 Then thought I to understand this; * but it was too hard for me.
- 17 Until I went into the sanctuary of God: * then understood I the end of these men;
- 18 Namely, how thou dost set them in slippery places, * and castest them down, and destroyest them.
- 19 O how suddenly do they consume, * perish, and come to a fearful end!
- 20 Yea, even like as a dream when one awaketh; * so shalt thou make their image to vanish out of the city.
- 21 Thus my heart was grieved, * and it went even through my reins.
- 22 So foolish was I, and ignorant, * even as it were a beast before thee.
- 23 Nevertheless, I am alway by thee; * for thou hast holden me by my right hand.
- 24 Thou shalt guide me with thy counsel, * and after that receive me with glory.
- 25 Whom have I in heaven but thee? * and there is none upon earth that I desire in comparison of thee.
- 26 My flesh and my heart faileth; * but God is the strength of my heart, and my portion for ever.
- 27 For lo, they that forsake thee shall perish; * thou hast destroyed all them that are unfaithful unto thee.
- 28 But it is good for me to hold me fast by God, to put my trust in the Lord God, * and to speak of all thy works in the gates of the daughter of Zion.

74 Ut quid, Deus?

GOD, wherefore art thou absent from us so long? * why is thy wrath so hot against the sheep of thy pasture?

2 O think upon thy congregation, * whom thou hast purchased, and redeemed of old.

- 3 Think upon the tribe of thine inheritance, * and Mount Zion, wherein thou hast dwelt.
- 4 Lift up thy feet, that thou mayest utterly destroy every enemy, * which hath done evil in thy sanctuary.
- 5 Thine adversaries roar in the midst of thy congregations, * and set up their banners for tokens.
- 6 He that hewed timber afore out of the thick trees, * was known to bring it to an excellent work.
- 7 But now they break down all the carved work thereof * with axes and hammers.
- 8 They have set fire upon thy holy places, * and have defiled the dwelling-place of thy Name, even unto the ground.
- 9 Yea, they said in their hearts, Let us make havoc of them altogether: * thus have they burnt up all the houses of God in the land.
- 10 We see not our tokens; there is not one prophet more; * no, not one is there among us, that understandeth any more.
- 11 O God, how long shall the adversary do this dishonor? * shall the enemy blaspheme thy Name for ever?
- 12 Why withdrawest thou thy hand? * why pluckest thou not thy right hand out of thy bosom to consume the enemy?
- 13 For God is my King of old; * the help that is done upon earth, he doeth it himself.
- 14 Thou didst divide the sea through thy power; * thou brakest the heads of the dragons in the waters.
- 15 Thou smotest the heads of leviathan in pieces, * and gavest him to be meat for the people of the wilderness.

16 Thou broughtest out fountains and waters out of the hard rocks; * thou driedst up mighty waters.

17 The day is thine, and the night is thine; * thou hast

prepared the light and the sun.

18 Thou hast set all the borders of the earth; * thou hast made summer and winter.

- 19 Remember this, O Lord, how the enemy hath rebuked; * and how the foolish people hath blasphemed thy Name.
- 20 O deliver not the soul of thy turtle-dove unto the multitude of the enemies; * and forget not the congregation of the poor for ever.
- 21 Look upon the covenant; * for all the earth is full of darkness and cruel habitations.
- 22 O let not the simple go away ashamed; * but let the poor and needy give praise unto thy Name.
- 23 Arise, O God, maintain thine own cause; * remember how the foolish man blasphemeth thee daily.
- 24 Forget not the voice of thine enemies: * the presumption of them that hate thee increaseth ever more and more.

Fifteenth Day: Morning Prayer

75 Confitebimur tibi

UNTO thee, O God, do we give thanks; * yea, unto thee do we give thanks.

- 2 Thy Name also is so nigh; * and that do thy wondrous works declare.
- 3 In the appointed time, saith God, * I shall judge according unto right.
- 4 The earth is weak, and all the inhabiters thereof: * I bear up the pillars of it.
- 5 I said unto the fools, Deal not so madly; * and to the ungodly, Set not up your horn.

- 6 Set not up your horn on high, * and speak not with a stiff neck.
- 7 For promotion cometh neither from the east, nor from the west, * nor yet from the south.
- 8 And why? God is the Judge; * he putteth down one, and setteth up another.
- 9 For in the hand of the Lord there is a cup, and the wine is red; * it is full mixt, and he poureth out of the same.
- 10 As for the dregs thereof, * all the ungodly of the earth shall drink them, and suck them out.
- 11 But I will talk of the God of Jacob, * and praise him for ever.
- 12 All the horns of the ungodly also will I break, * and the horns of the righteous shall be exalted.

76 Notus in Judaea

- IN Judah is God known; * his Name is great in Israel.

 2 At Salem is his tabernacle, * and his dwelling in Zion.
- 3 There brake he the arrows of the bow, * the shield, the sword, and the battle.
- 4 Thou art glorious in might, * when thou comest from the hills of the robbers.
- 5 The proud are robbed, they have slept their sleep; * and all the men whose hands were mighty have found nothing.
- 6 At thy rebuke, O God of Jacob, * both the chariot and horse are fallen.
- 7 Thou, even thou art to be feared; * and who may stand in thy sight when thou art angry?
- Thou didst cause thy judgment to be heard from heaven; * the earth trembled, and was still,
- 9 When God arose to judgment, * and to help all the meek upon earth.

- 10 The fierceness of man shall turn to thy praise; * and the fierceness of them shalt thou refrain.
- 11 Promise unto the Lord your God, and keep it, all ye that are round about him; * bring presents unto him that ought to be feared.
- 12 He shall refrain the spirit of princes, * and is wonderful among the kings of the earth.

77 Voce mea ad Dominum

I WILL cry unto God with my voice; * even unto God will I cry with my voice, and he shall hearken unto me.

2 In the time of my trouble I sought the Lord: * I stretched forth my hands unto him, and ceased not in the night season; my soul refused comfort.

3 When I am in heaviness, I will think upon God; * when my

heart is vexed, I will complain.

4 Thou holdest mine eyes waking: * I am so feeble that I cannot speak.

5 I have considered the days of old, * and the years that

are past.

- 6 I call to remembrance my song, * and in the night I commune with mine own heart, and search out my spirit.
- 7 Will the Lord absent himself for ever? * and will he be no more intreated?
- 8 Is his mercy clean gone for ever? * and is his promise come utterly to an end for evermore?
- 9 Hath God forgotten to be gracious? * and will he shut up his loving-kindness in displeasure?
- 10 And I said, It is mine own infirmity; * but I will remember the years of the right hand of the Most Highest.

11 I will remember the works of the Lord, * and call to mind thy wonders of old time.

12 I will think also of all thy works, * and my talking shall be

of thy doings.

- 13 Thy way, O God, is holy: * who is so great a God as our God?
- 14 Thou art the God that doest wonders, * and hast declared thy power among the peoples.

15 Thou hast mightily delivered thy people, * even the sons of

Jacob and Joseph.

- 16 The waters saw thee, O God, the waters saw thee, and were afraid; * the depths also were troubled.
- 17 The clouds poured out water, the air thundered, * and thine arrows went abroad.
- 18 The voice of thy thunder was heard round about: * the lightnings shone upon the ground; the earth was moved, and shook withal.
- 19 Thy way is in the sea, and thy paths in the great waters, * and thy footsteps are not known.
- 20 Thou leddest thy people like sheep, * by the hand of Moses and Aaron.

Fifteenth Day: Evening Prayer

Part I Attendite, popule

HEAR my law, O my people; * incline your ears unto the words of my mouth.

2 I will open my mouth in a parable; * I will declare hard

sentences of old;

3 Which we have heard and known, * and such as our fathers have told us;

4 That we should not hide them from the children of the generations to come; * but to show the honor of the Lord, his mighty and wonderful works that he hath done.

5 He made a covenant with Jacob, and gave Israel a law, * which he commanded our forefathers to teach their children:

6 That their posterity might know it, * and the children which were yet unborn;

7 To the intent that when they came up, * they might show their children the same;

8 That they might put their trust in God; * and not to forget the works of God, but to keep his commandments;

9 And not to be as their forefathers, a faithless and stubborn generation; * a generation that set not their heart aright, and whose spirit clave not steadfastly unto God;

10 Like as the children of Ephraim; * who being harnessed, and carrying bows, turned themselves back in the day of battle.

- 11 They kept not the covenant of God, * and would not walk in his law;
- 12 But forgat what he had done, * and the wonderful works that he had showed for them.
- 13 Marvellous things did he in the sight of our forefathers, in the land of Egypt, * even in the field of Zoan.
- 14 He divided the sea, and let them go through; * he made the waters to stand on an heap.
- 15 In the day-time also he led them with a cloud, * and all the night through with a light of fire.
- 16 He clave the hard rocks in the wilderness, * and gave them drink thereof, as it had been out of the great depth.
- 17 He brought waters out of the stony rock, * so that it gushed out like the rivers.
- 18 Yet for all this they sinned more against him, * and provoked the Most Highest in the wilderness.

- 19 They tempted God in their hearts, * and required meat for their lust.
- 20 They spake against God also, saying, * Shall God prepare a table in the wilderness?
- 21 He smote the stony rock indeed, that the water gushed out, and the streams flowed withal; * but can he give bread also, or provide flesh for his people?
- 22 When the Lord heard this, he was wroth; * so the fire was kindled in Jacob, and there came up heavy displeasure against Israel;
- 23 Because they believed not in God, * and put not their trust in his help.
- 24 So he commanded the clouds above, * and opened the doors of heaven.
- 25 He rained down manna also upon them for to eat, * and gave them food from heaven.
- 26 So man did eat angels' food; * for he sent them meat enough.
- 27 He caused the east-wind to blow under heaven; * and through his power he brought in the southwest-wind.
- 28 He rained flesh upon them as thick as dust, * and feathered fowls like as the sand of the sea.
- 29 He let it fall among their tents, * even round about their habitation.
- 30 So they did eat, and were well filled; for he gave them their own desire: * they were not disappointed of their lust.
- 31 But while the meat was yet in their mouths, the heavy wrath of God came upon them, and slew the wealthiest of them; * yea, and smote down the chosen men that were in Israel.
- 32 But for all this they sinned yet more, * and believed not his wondrous works.
- 33 Therefore their days did he consume in vanity, * and their years in trouble.

34 When he slew them, they sought him, * and turned them early, and inquired after God.

35 And they remembered that God was their strength, * and

that the High God was their redeemer.

36 Nevertheless, they did but flatter him with their mouth, * and dissembled with him in their tongue.

37 For their heart was not whole with him, * neither continued they steadfast in his covenant.

38 But he was so merciful, that he forgave their misdeeds, * and destroyed them not.

39 Yea, many a time turned he his wrath away, * and would not suffer his whole displeasure to arise.

40 For he considered that they were but flesh, * and that they were even a wind that passeth away, and cometh not again.

Part II Ouoties exacerbaverunt

- 41 Many a time did they provoke him in the wilderness, * and grieved him in the desert.
- 42 They turned back, and tempted God, * and provoked the Holy One in Israel.
- 43 They thought not of his hand, * and of the day when he delivered them from the hand of the enemy;
- 44 How he had wrought his miracles in Egypt, * and his wonders in the field of Zoan.
- 45 He turned their waters into blood, * so that they might not drink of the rivers
- 46 He sent flies among them, and devoured them up; * and frogs to destroy them.
- 47 He gave their fruit unto the caterpillar, * and their labor unto the grasshopper.
- 48 He destroyed their vines with hailstones, * and their mulberry-trees with the frost.

- 49 He smote their cattle also with hailstones, * and their flocks with hot thunderbolts.
- 50 He cast upon them the furiousness of his wrath, anger, displeasure, and trouble; * and sent evil angels among them.
- 51 He made a way to his indignation, and spared not their soul from death; * but gave their life over to the pestilence:
- 52 And smote all the firstborn in Egypt, * the most principal and mightiest in the dwellings of Ham.
- 53 But as for his own people, he led them forth like sheep, * and carried them in the wilderness like a flock.
- 54 He brought them out safely, that they should not fear, * and overwhelmed their enemies with the sea.
- 55 And brought them within the borders of his sanctuary, * even to this mountain, which he purchased with his right hand.
- 56 He cast out the heathen also before them, * caused their land to be divided among them for an heritage, and made the tribes of Israel to dwell in their tents.
- 57 Yet they tempted and displeased the Most High God, * and kept not his testimonies.
- 58 They turned their backs, and fell away like their forefathers; * starting aside like a broken bow.
- 59 For they grieved him with their hill-altars, * and provoked him to displeasure with their images.
- 60 When God heard this, he was wroth, * and took sore displeasure at Israel;
- 61 So that he forsook the tabernacle in Shiloh, * even the tent that he had pitched among men.
- 62 He delivered their power into captivity, * and their beauty into the enemy's hand.
- 63 He gave his people over also unto the sword, * and was wroth with his inheritance.
- 64 The fire consumed their young men, * and their maidens were not given in marriage.

- 65 Their priests were slain with the sword, * and there were no widows to make lamentation.
- 66 So the Lord awaked as one out of sleep, * and like a giant refreshed with wine.
- 67 He drave his enemies backward, * and put them to a perpetual shame.
- 68 He refused the tabernacle of Joseph, * and chose not the tribe of Ephraim;
- 69 But chose the tribe of Judah, * even the hill of Zion which he loved.
- 70 And there he built his temple on high, * and laid the foundation of it like the ground which he hath made continually.
- 71 He chose David also his servant, * and took him away from the sheep-folds:
- 72 As he was following the ewes with their young he took him, * that he might feed Jacob his people, and Israel his inheritance.
- 73 So he fed them with a faithful and true heart, * and ruled them prudently with all his power.

Sixteenth Day: Morning Prayer

79 Deus, venerunt

- OGOD, the heathen are come into thine inheritance; * thy holy temple have they defiled, and made Jerusalem an heap of stones.
- 2 The dead bodies of thy servants have they given to be meat unto the fowls of the air, * and the flesh of thy saints unto the beasts of the land.
- 3 Their blood have they shed like water on every side of Jerusalem, * and there was no man to bury them.
- 4 We are become an open shame to our enemies, * a very scorn and derision unto them that are round about us.

- 5 Lord, how long wilt thou be angry? * shall thy jealousy burn like fire for ever?
- 6 Pour out thine indignation upon the heathen that have not known thee; * and upon the kingdoms that have not called upon thy Name.
- 7 For they have devoured Jacob, * and laid waste his dwelling-place.
- 8 O remember not our old sins, but have mercy upon us, and that soon; * for we are come to great misery.

- 13 And for the blasphemy wherewith our neighbors have blasphemed thee, * reward thou them, O Lord, sevenfold into their bosom.
- 14 So we, that are thy people, and sheep of thy pasture, shall give thee thanks for ever, * and will alway be showing forth thy praise from generation to generation.

- 2 Before Ephraim, Benjamin, and Manasseh, * stir up thy strength, and come and help us.

- 4 O Lord God of hosts, * how long wilt thou be angry with thy people that prayeth?

5 Thou feedest them with the bread of tears, * and givest them

plenteousness of tears to drink.

- 12 Why hast thou then broken down her hedge, * that all they that go by pluck off her grapes?
- 13 The wild boar out of the wood doth root it up, * and the wild beasts of the field devour it.
- 14 Turn thee again, thou God of hosts, look down from heaven, * behold, and visit this vine;
- 15 And the place of the vineyard that thy right hand hath planted, * and the branch that thou madest so strong for thyself.
- 16 It is burnt with fire, and cut down; * and they shall perish at the rebuke of thy countenance.
- 17 Let thy hand be upon the man of thy right hand, * and upon the son of man, whom thou madest so strong for thine own self.
- 18 And so will not we go back from thee: * O let us live, and we shall call upon thy Name.
- 19 Turn us again, O Lord God of hosts; * show the light of thy countenance, and we shall be whole.

81 Fxultate Deo

C ING we merrily unto God our strength; * make a cheerful noise unto the God of Jacob.

- 2 Take the psalm, bring hither the tabret, * the merry harp with the lute.
- 3 Blow up the trumpet in the new moon, * even in the time appointed, and upon our solemn feast-day.
- 4 For this was made a statute for Israel, * and a law of the God of Jacob.
- 5 This he ordained in Joseph for a testimony, * when he came out of the land of Egypt, and had heard a strange language.
- 6 I eased his shoulder from the burden, * and his hands were delivered from making the pots.
- 7 Thou calledst upon me in troubles, and I delivered thee; * and heard thee what time as the storm fell upon thee.
- 8 I proved thee also * at the waters of strife.

- 10 There shall no strange god be in thee, * neither shalt thou worship any other god.
- 11 I am the Lord thy God, who brought thee out of the land of Egypt: * open thy mouth wide, and I shall fill it.

- 13 So I gave them up unto their own hearts' lusts, * and let them follow their own imaginations.
- 14 O that my people would have hearkened unto me! * for if Israel had walked in my ways,

- 17 I would have fed them also with the finest wheat-flour; * and with honey out of the stony rock would I have satisfied thee.

- 13 O my God, make them like unto the whirling dust, * and as the stubble before the wind;
- 14 Like as the fire that burneth up the forest, * and as the flame that consumeth the mountains;
- 15 Pursue them even so with thy tempest, * and make them afraid with thy storm.
- 16 Make their faces ashamed, O Lord, * that they may seek thy Name.
- 17 Let them be confounded and vexed ever more and more; * let them be put to shame, and perish.
- 18 And they shall know that thou, whose Name is Jehovah, * art only the Most Highest over all the earth.

- 11 But who regardeth the power of thy wrath? * or feareth aright thy indignation?
- 12 So teach us to number our days, * that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom.
- 13 Turn thee again, O Lord, at the last, * and be gracious unto thy servants.
- 14 O satisfy us with thy mercy, and that soon: * so shall we rejoice and be glad all the days of our life.
- 15 Comfort us again now after the time that thou hast plagued us; * and for the years wherein we have suffered adversity.
- 16 Show thy servants thy work, * and their children thy glory.
- 17 And the glorious majesty of the Lord our God be upon us: * prosper thou the work of our hands upon us; O prosper thou our handy-work.

- 2 I will say unto the Lord, Thou art my hope, and my stronghold; * my God, in him will I trust.

- 12 They shall bear thee in their hands, * that thou hurt not thy foot against a stone.
- 13 Thou shalt go upon the lion and adder: * the young lion and the dragon shalt thou tread under thy feet.
- 14 Because he hath set his love upon me, therefore will I deliver him; * I will set him up, because he hath known my Name.
- 15 He shall call upon me, and I will hear him; * yea, I am with him in trouble; I will deliver him, and bring him to honor.
- 16 With long life will I satisfy him, * and show him my salvation.

IT is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord, * and to sing praises unto thy Name, O Most Highest.

2 To tell of thy loving-kindness early in the morning, * and of

4 How long shall all wicked doers speak so disdainfully, * and make such proud boasting?

5 They smite down thy people, O Lord, * and trouble thine heritage.

- 6 They murder the widow and the stranger, * and put the fatherless to death.
- 7 And yet they say, Tush, the Lord shall not see, * neither shall the God of Jacob regard it.

- 9 When your fathers tempted me, * proved me, and saw my works.
- 10 Forty years long was I grieved with this generation, and said, * It is a people that do err in their hearts, for they have not known my ways:
- 11 Unto whom I sware in my wrath, * that they should not enter into my rest.

96 Cantate Domino

O SING unto the Lord a new song; * sing unto the Lord, all the whole earth.

- 2 Sing unto the Lord, and praise his Name; * be telling of his salvation from day to day.
- 3 Declare his honor unto the heathen, * and his wonders unto all peoples.
- 4 For the Lord is great, and cannot worthily be praised; * he is more to be feared than all gods.
- 5 As for all the gods of the heathen, they are but idols; * but it is the Lord that made the heavens.
- 6 Glory and worship are before him; * power and honor are in his sanctuary.

7 Ascribe unto the Lord, O ye kindreds of the peoples, * ascribe unto the Lord worship and power.

8 Ascribe unto the Lord the honor due unto his Name; * bring

presents, and come into his courts.

9 O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness; * let the whole earth stand in awe of him.

10 Tell it out among the heathen, that the Lord is King, and that it is he who hath made the round world so fast that it cannot be moved; * and how that he shall judge the peoples righteously.

11 Let the heavens rejoice, and let the earth be glad; * let the

sea make a noise, and all that therein is.

- 12 Let the field be joyful, and all that is in it; * then shall all the trees of the wood rejoice before the Lord.
- 13 For he cometh, for he cometh to judge the earth; * and with righteousness to judge the world, and the peoples with his truth.

97 Dominus regnavit

THE Lord is King, the earth may be glad thereof; * yea, the multitude of the isles may be glad thereof.

2 Clouds and darkness are round about him: * righteousness and judgment are the habitation of his seat.

3 There shall go a fire before him, * and burn up his enemies on every side.

4 His lightnings gave shine unto the world: * the earth saw it, and was afraid.

5 The hills melted like wax at the presence of the Lord; * at the presence of the Lord of the whole earth.

6 The heavens have declared his righteousness, * and all the

peoples have seen his glory.

7 Confounded be all they that worship carved images, and that delight in vain gods: * worship him, all ye gods.

8 Zion heard of it, and rejoiced; and the daughters of Judah were glad, * because of thy judgments, O Lord.

9 For thou, Lord, art higher than all that are in the earth: *

thou art exalted far above all gods.

10 O ye that love the Lord, see that ye hate the thing which is evil: * the Lord preserveth the souls of his saints; he shall deliver them from the hand of the ungodly.

11 There is sprung up a light for the righteous, * and joyful

gladness for such as are true-hearted.

12 Rejoice in the Lord, ye righteous; * and give thanks for a remembrance of his holiness.

7 With trumpets also and shawms, * O show yourselves joyful

8 Let the sea make a noise, and all that therein is; * the round world, and they that dwell therein.

- 9 Let the floods clap their hands, and let the hills be joyful together before the Lord; * for he is come to judge the earth.
- 10 With righteousness shall he judge the world, * and the peoples with equity.

- THE Lord is King, be the people never so impatient; * he sitteth between the Cherubim, be the earth never so unquiet.
- 2 The Lord is great in Zion, * and high above all people.
- 3 They shall give thanks unto thy Name, * which is great, wonderful, and holy.
- 4 The King's power loveth judgment; thou hast prepared equity, * thou hast executed judgment and righteousness in Jacob.
- 5 O magnify the Lord our God, and fall down before his footstool; * for he is holy.
- 6 Moses and Aaron among his priests, and Samuel among such as call upon his Name; * these called upon the Lord, and he heard them.
- 7 He spake unto them out of the cloudy pillar; * for they kept his testimonies, and the law that he gave them.
- 8 Thou heardest them, O Lord our God; * thou forgavest them, O God, though thou didst punish their wicked doings.
- 9 O magnify the Lord our God, and worship him upon his holy hill; * for the Lord our God is holy.

100 Jubilate Deo

OBE joyful in the Lord, all ye lands: * serve the Lord with gladness, and come before his presence with a song.

2 Be ye sure that the Lord he is God; it is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves; * we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.

3 O go your way into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise; * be thankful unto him, and speak good

of his Name.

4 For the Lord is gracious, his mercy is everlasting; * and his truth endureth from generation to generation.

MY song shall be of mercy and judgment; * unto thee, O Lord, will I sing.

2 O let me have understanding * in the way of godliness!

9 Whoso leadeth a godly life, * he shall be my servant.

10 There shall no deceitful person dwell in my house; * he that telleth lies shall not tarry in my sight.

11 I shall soon destroy all the ungodly that are in the land; * that I may root out all wicked doers from the city of the Lord.

HEAR my prayer, O Lord, * and let my crying come unto thee.

- 2 Hide not thy face from me in the time of my trouble; * incline thine ear unto me when I call; O hear me, and that right soon.
- 3 For my days are consumed away like smoke, * and my bones are burnt up as it were a firebrand.
- 4 My heart is smitten down, and withered like grass; * so that I forget to eat my bread.
- 5 For the voice of my groaning, * my bones will scarce cleave to my flesh.
- 6 I am become like a pelican in the wilderness, * and like an owl that is in the desert.
- 7 I have watched, and am even as it were a sparrow, * that sitteth alone upon the housetop.
- 8 Mine enemies revile me all the day long; * and they that are mad upon me are sworn together against me.
- 9 For I have eaten ashes as it were bread, * and mingled my drink with weeping;
- 10 And that, because of thine indignation and wrath; * for thou hast taken me up, and cast me down.
- 11 My days are gone like a shadow, * and I am withered like grass.
- 12 But thou, O Lord, shalt endure for ever, * and thy remembrance throughout all generations.
- 13 Thou shalt arise, and have mercy upon Zion; * for it is time that thou have mercy upon her, yea, the time is come.
- 14 And why? thy servants think upon her stones, * and it pitieth them to see her in the dust.
- 15 The nations shall fear thy Name, O Lord; * and all the kings of the earth thy majesty;

16 When the Lord shall build up Zion, * and when his glory shall appear;

17 When he turneth him unto the prayer of the poor destitute, * and despiseth not their desire.

18 This shall be written for those that come after, * and the people which shall be born shall praise the Lord.

19 For he hath looked down from his sanctuary; * out of the heaven did the Lord behold the earth;

20 That he might hear the mournings of such as are in

- captivity, * and deliver them that are appointed unto death;
- 21 That they may declare the Name of the Lord in Zion, * and his worship at Jerusalem;
- 22 When the peoples are gathered together, * and the kingdoms also, to serve the Lord.
- 23 He brought down my strength in my journey, * and shortened my days.
- 24 But I said, O my God, take me not away in the midst of mine age; * as for thy years, they endure throughout all generations.
- 25 Thou, Lord, in the beginning hast laid the foundation of the earth, * and the heavens are the work of thy hands.
- 26 They shall perish, but thou shalt endure: * they all shall wax old as doth a garment;
- 27 And as a vesture shalt thou change them, and they shall be changed; * but thou art the same, and thy years shall not fail.
- 28 The children of thy servants shall continue, * and their seed shall stand fast in thy sight.

103 Benedic, anima mea

PRAISE the Lord, O my soul; * and all that is within me, praise his holy Name.

- 2 Praise the Lord, O my soul, * and forget not all his benefits:
- 3 Who forgiveth all thy sin, * and healeth all thine infirmities;
- 4 Who saveth thy life from destruction, * and crowneth thee with mercy and loving-kindness;
- 5 Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things, * making thee young and lusty as an eagle.
- 6 The Lord executeth righteousness and judgment * for all them that are oppressed with wrong.
- 7 He showed his ways unto Moses, * his works unto the children of Israel.
- 8 The Lord is full of compassion and mercy, * long-suffering, and of great goodness.
- 9 He will not alway be chiding; * neither keepeth he his anger for ever.
- 10 He hath not dealt with us after our sins; * nor rewarded us according to our wickednesses.
- 11 For look how high the heaven is in comparison of the earth; * so great is his mercy also toward them that fear him.
- 12 Look how wide also the east is from the west; * so far hath he set our sins from us.
- 13 Yea, like as a father pitieth his own children; * even so is the Lord merciful unto them that fear him.
- 14 For he knoweth whereof we are made; * he remembereth that we are but dust.
- 15 The days of man are but as grass; * for he flourisheth as a flower of the field.
- 16 For as soon as the wind goeth over it, it is gone; * and the place thereof shall know it no more.
- 17 But the merciful goodness of the Lord endureth for ever and ever upon them that fear him; * and his righteousness upon children's children;
- 18 Even upon such as keep his covenant, * and think upon his commandments to do them.

19 The Lord hath prepared his seat in heaven, * and his

kingdom ruleth over all.

20 O praise the Lord, ye angels of his, ye that excel in strength: * ye that fulfill his commandment, and hearken to the voice of his word.

21 O praise the Lord, all ye his hosts; * ye servants of his that

do his pleasure.

22 O speak good of the Lord, all ye works of his, in all places of his dominion: * praise thou the Lord, O my soul.

P RAISE the Lord, O my soul: * O Lord my God, thou art become exceeding glorious; thou art clothed with majesty and honor.

2 Thou deckest thyself with light as it were with a garment, *

and spreadest out the heavens like a curtain.

- 3 Who layeth the beams of his chambers in the waters. * and maketh the clouds his chariot, and walketh upon the wings of the wind.
- 4 He maketh his angels winds, * and his ministers a flaming fire.
- 5 He laid the foundations of the earth, * that it never should move at any time.
- 6 Thou coveredst it with the deep like as with a garment; * the waters stand above the hills.
- 7 At thy rebuke they flee; * at the voice of thy thunder they haste away.
- 8 They go up as high as the hills, and down to the valleys beneath; * even unto the place which thou hast appointed for them.
- 9 Thou hast set them their bounds, which they shall not pass, * neither turn again to cover the earth.

- 10 He sendeth the springs into the rivers, * which run among the hills.
- 11 All beasts of the field drink thereof, * and the wild asses quench their thirst.
- 12 Beside them shall the fowls of the air have their habitation, * and sing among the branches.
- 13 He watereth the hills from above; * the earth is filled with the fruit of thy works.
- 14 He bringeth forth grass for the cattle, * and green herb for the service of men;
- 15 That he may bring food out of the earth, and wine that maketh glad the heart of man; * and oil to make him a cheerful countenance, and bread to strengthen man's heart.
- 16 The trees of the Lord also are full of sap; * even the cedars of Lebanon which he hath planted;
- 17 Wherein the birds make their nests; * and the fir-trees are a dwelling for the stork.
- 18 The high hills are a refuge for the wild goats; * and so are the stony rocks for the conies.
- 19 He appointed the moon for certain seasons, * and the sun knoweth his going down.
- 20 Thou makest darkness that it may be night; * wherein all the beasts of the forest do move.
- 21 The lions, roaring after their prey, * do seek their meat from God.
- 22 The sun ariseth, and they get them away together, * and lay them down in their dens.
- 23 Man goeth forth to his work, and to his labor, * until the evening.
- 24 O Lord, how manifold are thy works! * in wisdom hast thou made them all; the earth is full of thy riches.
- 25 So is the great and wide sea also; * wherein are things creeping innumerable, both small and great beasts.

26 There go the ships, and there is that leviathan, * whom thou hast made to take his pastime therein.

27 These wait all upon thee, * that thou mayest give them meat

in due season.

28 When thou givest it them, they gather it; * and when thou openest thy hand, they are filled with good.

- 29 When thou hidest thy face, they are troubled: * when thou takest away their breath, they die, and are turned again to their dust.
- 30 When thou lettest thy breath go forth, they shall be made; * and thou shalt renew the face of the earth.
- 31 The glorious majesty of the Lord shall endure for ever; * the Lord shall rejoice in his works.
- 32 The earth shall tremble at the look of him; * if he do but touch the hills, they shall smoke.
- 33 I will sing unto the Lord as long as I live; * I will praise my God while I have my being.
- 34 And so shall my words please him: * my joy shall be in the Lord.
- 35 As for sinners, they shall be consumed out of the earth, * and the ungodly shall come to an end.

36 Praise thou the Lord, O my soul. * Praise the Lord.

OGIVE thanks unto the Lord, and call upon his Name; * tell the people what things he hath done.

2 O let your songs be of him, and praise him; * and let your talking be of all his wondrous works.

- 4 Seek the Lord and his strength; * seek his face evermore.
- 5 Remember the marvelous works that he hath done; * his wonders, and the judgments of his mouth:
- 6 O ye seed of Abraham his servant, * ye children of Jacob his chosen.
- 7 He is the Lord our God; * his judgments are in all the world.
- 8 He hath been alway mindful of his covenant and promise, * that he made to a thousand generations:
- 9 Even the covenant that he made with Abraham: * and the oath that he sware unto Isaac:
- 10 And appointed the same unto Jacob for a law, * and to Israel for an everlasting testament;
- Saying, Unto thee will I give the land of Canaan, * the lot of your inheritance:
- 12 When there were yet but a few of them, * and they strangers in the land;
- 13 What time as they went from one nation to another, * from one kingdom to another people;
- 14 He suffered no man to do them wrong, * but reproved even kings for their sakes:
- 15 Touch not mine anointed, * and do my prophets no harm.
- 16 Moreover, he called for a dearth upon the land, * and destroyed all the provision of bread.
- 17 But he had sent a man before them, * even Joseph, who was sold to be a bond-servant:
- 18 Whose feet they hurt in the stocks; * the iron entered into his soul:
- 19 Until the time came that his cause was known: * the word of the Lord tried him.
- 20 The king sent, and delivered him; * the prince of the people let him go free.

- 21 He made him lord also of his house, * and ruler of all his substance;
- 22 That he might inform his princes after his will, * and teach his senators wisdom.

Part II Et intravit Israel

- 23 Israel also came into Egypt, * and Jacob was a stranger in the land of Ham.
- 24 And he increased his people exceedingly, * and made them stronger than their enemies;
- 25 Whose heart turned so, that they hated his people, * and dealt untruly with his servants.
- 26 Then sent he Moses his servant, * and Aaron whom he had chosen.
- 27 And these showed his tokens among them, * and wonders in the land of Ham.
- 28 He sent darkness, and it was dark; * and they were not obedient unto his word.
- 29 He turned their waters into blood, * and slew their fish.
- 30 Their land brought forth frogs; * yea, even in their kings' chambers.
- 31 He spake the word, and there came all manner of flies, * and lice in all their quarters.
- 32 He gave them hailstones for rain; * and flames of fire in their land.
- 33 He smote their vines also and fig-trees; * and destroyed the trees that were in their coasts.
- 34 He spake the word, and the grasshoppers came, and caterpillars innumerable, * and did eat up all the grass in their land, and devoured the fruit of their ground.
- 35 He smote all the firstborn in their land; * even the chief of all their strength.

- 36 He brought them forth also with silver and gold; * there was not one feeble person among their tribes.
- 37 Egypt was glad at their departing; * for they were afraid of them.
- 38 He spread out a cloud to be a covering, * and fire to give light in the night season.
- 39 At their desire he brought quails; * and he filled them with the bread of heaven.
- 40 He opened the rock of stone, and the waters flowed out, * so that rivers ran in the dry places.
- 41 For why? he remembered his holy promise; * and Abraham his servant.
- 42 And he brought forth his people with joy, * and his chosen with gladness;
- 43 And gave them the lands of the heathen; * and they took the labors of the people in possession;
- 44 That they might keep his statutes, * and observe his laws.

O GIVE thanks unto the Lord; for he is gracious, * and his mercy endureth for ever.

- 2 Who can express the noble acts of the Lord, * or show forth all his praise?
- 3 Blessed are they that alway keep judgment, * and do righteousness.
- 4 Remember me, O Lord, according to the favor that thou bearest unto thy people; * O visit me with thy salvation;

- 5 That I may see the felicity of thy chosen, * and rejoice in the gladness of thy people, and give thanks with thine inheritance.
- 6 We have sinned with our fathers; * we have done amiss, and dealt wickedly.
- 7 Our fathers regarded not thy wonders in Egypt, neither kept they thy great goodness in remembrance; * but were disobedient at the sea, even at the Red Sea.
- 8 Nevertheless, he helped them for his Name's sake, * that he might make his power to be known.
- 9 He rebuked the Red Sea also, and it was dried up; * so he led them through the deep, as through a wilderness.
- 10 And he saved them from the adversary's hand, * and delivered them from the hand of the enemy.
- 11 As for those that troubled them, the waters overwhelmed them; * there was not one of them left.
- 12 Then believed they his words, * and sang praise unto him.
- 13 But within a while they forgat his works, * and would not abide his counsel.
- 14 But lust came upon them in the wilderness, * and they tempted God in the desert.
- 15 And he gave them their desire, * and sent leanness withal into their soul.
- 16 They angered Moses also in the tents, * and Aaron the saint of the Lord.
- 17 So the earth opened, and swallowed up Dathan, * and covered the congregation of Abiram.
- 18 And the fire was kindled in their company; * the flame burnt up the ungodly.

Part II Et fecerunt vitulum

19 They made a calf in Horeb * and worshiped the molten image.

20 Thus they turned their glory * into the similitude of a calf that eateth hav.

21 And they forgat God their Savior, * who had done so great

things in Egypt:

22 Wondrous works in the land of Ham; * and fearful things by the Red Sea.

23 So he said he would have destroyed them, had not Moses his chosen stood before him in the gap, * to turn away his wrathful indignation, lest he should destroy them.

24 Yea, they thought scorn of that pleasant land, * and gave no

credence unto his word:

25 But murmured in their tents, * and hearkened not unto the voice of the Lord

- 26 Then lift he up his hand against them, * to overthrow them in the wilderness:
- 27 To cast out their seed among the nations, * and to scatter them in the lands.
- 28 They joined themselves unto Baal-peor, * and ate the offerings of the dead.
- 29 Thus they provoked him to anger with their own inventions; * and the plague was great among them.
- 30 Then stood up Phinehas, and interposed; * and so the plague ceased.
- 31 And that was counted unto him for righteousness, * among all posterities for evermore.
- 32 They angered him also at the waters of strife, * so that he punished Moses for their sakes;
- 33 Because they provoked his spirit, * so that he spake unadvisedly with his lips.
- 34 Neither destroyed they the heathen, * as the Lord commanded them:
- 35 But were mingled among the heathen, * and learned their works.

- 36 Insomuch that they worshiped their idols, which became a snare unto them; * yea, they offered their sons and their daughters unto devils;
- 37 And shed innocent blood, even the blood of their sons and of their daughters, * whom they offered unto the idols of Canaan; and the land was defiled with blood.
- 38 Thus were they stained with their own works, * and went a whoring with their own inventions.
- 39 Therefore was the wrath of the Lord kindled against his people, * insomuch that he abhorred his own inheritance.
- 40 And he gave them over into the hand of the heathen; * and they that hated them were lords over them.
- 41 Their enemies oppressed them, * and had them in subjection.
- 42 Many a time did he deliver them; * but they rebelled against him with their own inventions, and were brought down in their wickedness.
- 43 Nevertheless, when he saw their adversity, * he heard their complaint.
- 44 He thought upon his covenant, and pitied them, according unto the multitude of his mercies; * yea, he made all those that led them away captive to pity them.
- 45 Deliver us, O Lord our God, and gather us from among the heathen; * that we may give thanks unto thy holy Name, and make our boast of thy praise.
- 46 Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, from everlasting, and world without end; * And let all the people say, Amen.

107

Part I Confitemini Domino

OGIVE thanks unto the Lord, for he is gracious, * and his mercy endureth for ever.

- 2 Let them give thanks whom the Lord hath redeemed, * and delivered from the hand of the enemy;
- 3 And gathered them out of the lands, from the east, and from the west; * from the north, and from the south.
- 4 They went astray in the wilderness out of the way, * and found no city to dwell in.
- 5 Hungry and thirsty, * their soul fainted in them.
- 6 So they cried unto the Lord in their trouble, * and he delivered them from their distress.
- 7 He led them forth by the right way, * that they might go to the city where they dwelt.
- 8 O that men would therefore praise the Lord for his goodness; * and declare the wonders that he doeth for the children of men!
- 9 For he satisfieth the empty soul, * and filleth the hungry soul with goodness.
- 10 Such as sit in darkness, and in the shadow of death, * being fast bound in misery and iron;
- 11 Because they rebelled against the words of the Lord, * and lightly regarded the counsel of the Most Highest;
- 12 He also brought down their heart through heaviness: * they fell down, and there was none to help them.
- 13 So when they cried unto the Lord in their trouble, * he delivered them out of their distress.

- 14 For he brought them out of darkness, and out of the shadow of death, * and brake their bonds in sunder.
- 15 O that men would therefore praise the Lord for his goodness; * and declare the wonders that he doeth for the children of men!
- 16 For he hath broken the gates of brass, * and smitten the bars of iron in sunder.
- 17 Foolish men are plagued for their offense, * and because of their wickedness.
- 18 Their soul abhorred all manner of meat, * and they were even hard at death's door.
- 19 So when they cried unto the Lord in their trouble, * he delivered them out of their distress.
- 20 He sent his word, and healed them; * and they were saved from their destruction.
- 21 O that men would therefore praise the Lord for his goodness; * and declare the wonders that he doeth for the children of men!
- 22 That they would offer unto him the sacrifice of thanksgiving, * and tell out his works with gladness!
- 23 They that go down to the sea in ships, * and occupy their business in great waters;
- 24 These men see the works of the Lord, * and his wonders in the deep.
- 25 For at his word the stormy wind ariseth, *which lifteth up the waves thereof.
- 26 They are carried up to the heaven, and down again to the deep; * their soul melteth away because of the trouble.
- 27 They reel to and fro, and stagger like a drunken man, * and are at their wit's end.
- 28 So when they cry unto the Lord in their trouble, * he delivereth them out of their distress.
- 29 For he maketh the storm to cease, * so that the waves thereof are still.
- 30 Then are they glad, because they are at rest; * and so he bringeth them unto the haven where they would be.

- 31 O that men would therefore praise the Lord for his goodness; * and declare the wonders that he doeth for the children of men!
- 32 That they would exalt him also in the congregation of the people, * and praise him in the seat of the elders!

Part II Posuit flumina

- 33 He turneth the floods into a wilderness, * and drieth up the water-springs.
- 34 A fruitful land maketh he barren, * for the wickedness of them that dwell therein.
- 35 Again, he maketh the wilderness a standing water, * and water-springs of a dry ground.
- 36 And there he setteth the hungry, * that they may build them a city to dwell in;
- 37 That they may sow their land, and plant vineyards, * to yield them fruits of increase.
- 38 He blesseth them, so that they multiply exceedingly; * and suffereth not their cattle to decrease.
- 39 And again, when they are minished and brought low * through oppression, through any plague or trouble;
- 40 Though he suffer them to be evil entreated through tyrants, * and let them wander out of the way in the wilderness;
- 41 Yet helpeth he the poor out of misery, * and maketh him households like a flock of sheep.
- 42 The righteous will consider this, and rejoice; * and the mouth of all wickedness shall be stopped.
- 43 Whoso is wise, will ponder these things; * and they shall understand the loving-kindness of the Lord.

10 Who will lead me into the strong city? * and who will bring me into Edom?

11 Hast not thou forsaken us, O God? * and wilt not thou, O God, go forth with our hosts?

12 O help us against the enemy: * for vain is the help of man.

13 Through God we shall do great acts; * and it is he that shall tread down our enemies.

109 Deus, laudem

TOLD not thy tongue, O God of my praise; * for the mouth of the ungodly, yea, the mouth of the deceitful is opened upon me.

2 And they have spoken against me with false tongues; * they compassed me about also with words of hatred, and fought

against me without a cause.

3 For the love that I had unto them, lo, they take now my contrary part; * but I give myself unto prayer.

4 Thus have they rewarded me evil for good, * and hatred for my good will.

5 Set thou an ungodly man to be ruler over him, * and let an adversary stand at his right hand.

6 When sentence is given upon him, let him be condemned: * and let his prayer be turned into sin.

7 Let his days be few; * and let another take his office.

8 Let his children be fatherless, * and his wife a widow.

9 Let his children be vagabonds, and beg their bread; * let them seek it also out of desolate places.

10 Let the extortioner consume all that he hath: * and let the stranger spoil his labor.

11 Let there be no man to pity him, * nor to have compassion upon his fatherless children.

12 Let his posterity be destroyed; * and in the next generation

let his name be clean put out.

13 Let the wickedness of his fathers be had in remembrance in the sight of the Lord; * and let not the sin of his mother be done away.

14 Let them alway be before the Lord, * that he may root out

the memorial of them from off the earth:

- 15 And that, because his mind was not to do good; * but persecuted the poor helpless man, that he might slay him that was vexed at the heart.
- 16 His delight was in cursing, and it shall happen unto him; * he loved not blessing, therefore shall it be far from him.
- 17 He clothed himself with cursing like as with a raiment, * and it shall come into his bowels like water, and like oil into his bones.
- 18 Let it be unto him as the cloak that he hath upon him, * and as the girdle that he is alway girded withal.
- 19 Let it thus happen from the Lord unto mine enemies, * and to those that speak evil against my soul.

- 24 I am become also a reproach unto them: * they that look upon me shake their heads.
- 25 Help me, O Lord my God; * O save me according to thy mercy;
- 26 And they shall know how that this is thy hand, * and that thou, Lord, hast done it.
- 27 Though they curse, yet bless thou; * and let them be confounded that rise up against me; but let thy servant rejoice.
- 28 Let mine adversaries be clothed with shame; * and let them cover themselves with their own confusion, as with a cloak.
- 29 As for me, I will give great thanks unto the Lord with my mouth, * and praise him among the multitude;
- 30 For he shall stand at the right hand of the poor, * to save his soul from unrighteous judges.

And ye shall pray for a due supply of persons fitted to serve God in the Ministry and in the State; and to that end, as well as for the good education of all the youth of this land, ye shall pray for all schools, colleges, and seminaries of sound and godly learning, and for all whose hands are open for their

maintenance; that whatsoever tends to the advancement of true religion and useful learning may for ever flourish and abound.
Ye shall pray for those who celebrate the anniversary of their birth [especially], and for those who celebrate the anniversary of their marriage [especially], that they may continue to grow in grace all the days of their lives.
Ye shall pray for those who are ill [especially], that God be pleased to grant them release from suffering and restoration to health according to his will.
Ye shall pray also for any who are troubled in mind, in spirit or in the circumstances of their lives [especially], that they be granted a happy issue out of all their afflictions.
Ye shall pray for all women who are in expectation of childbirth [especially], that the Lord grant them a safe delivery.
Ye shall pray also for those who have departed this life [especially], that they may go from strength to strength in the life of perfect service in God's heavenly Kingdom.
Ye shall pray also for all who travel by land, sea, or air; for all

Ye shall pray also for all who travel by land, sea, or air; for all prisoners and captives; for all who have fallen into grievous sin; for all who, through temptation, ignorance, helplessness, grief, trouble, dread, or the near approach of death, especially need our prayers.

Ye shall also praise God for rain and sunshine; for the fruits of the earth; for the products of all honest industry; and for all his good gifts, temporal and spiritual, to us and to all men. Finally, ye shall yield unto God most high praise and hearty thanks for the wonderful grace and virtue declared in all his saints [especially the Blessed Virgin Mary, and Saint

], who have been the choice vessels of His grace and the lights of the world in their several generations; and pray unto God, that we may have grace to direct our lives after their good examples; that, this life ended, we may be made partakers with them of the glorious resurrection and the life everlasting.

And now, brethren, summing up all our petitions and all our thanksgivings, in the words which Christ hath taught us, we make bold to say: Our Father...

Common of Martyrs

Whosoever will come after me, * let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me.

In communion with and in honor of this most holy day [night] whereon Jesus Christ our Lord did rise again in his own flesh: and in worshipful remembrance of the glorious and Ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of the Same our God and Lord Jesus Christ: and also of thy blessed Apostles...

On the Day of the Ascension and through the whole Octave:

In communion with and in honor of this most holy day whereon our Lord thy only-begotten Son, set on high at the right hand of thy glory our frail human nature in union with himself: and in worshipful remembrance of the glorious and Ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of the same our God and Lord

Jesus Christ: and also of thy blessed Apostles...

On the Vigil of Pentecost to the following Saturday inclusive:

In communion with and in honor of this most holy day of Pentecost whereon the Holy Ghost appeared to the Apostles in countless tongues of fire: and in worshipful remembrance of the glorious and Ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of our God and Lord Jesus Christ: and also of thy blessed Apostles...

Through the rest of the year

and also of thy blessed Apostles and Martyrs, Peter, Paul, Andrew, James, John, Thomas, James, Philip, Bartholomew, Matthew, Simon and Thaddeus: Linus, Cletus, Clement, Xystus, Cornelius, Cyprian, Lawrence, Chrysogonus, John and Paul, Cosmas and Damian: and of all thy Saints; by whose merits and prayers grant thou that in all things we may be defended with the help of thy protection. Therefore, Lord, we beseech thee, that thou wilt graciously receive this oblation of our bounden service, and of all thy household:

On the Vigil of Easter and of Pentecost, and thereafter through the following Saturday inclusive, here is inserted:

and we offer it to thee on behalf also of those whom thou hast been pleased to regenerate by water and the Holy Ghost, granting unto them remission of all their sins:

And do thou order our days in thy peace, and command us to be delivered from eternal damnation, and to be numbered in the flock of thine elect. Through Christ our Lord. Amen. Which oblation, we beseech thee, O Almighty God, in all things to make blessed, appointed, ratified, reasonable and acceptable, that unto us it may be the Body and Blood of thy most dearly beloved Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Who the next day afore he suffered, took bread into his holy and reverent hands, and his eyes being lifted into heaven unto thee, God almighty his Father, rendering thanks unto thee, he blessed, he brake, and gave unto his disciples, saying: Take and eat this, ye all. For this is my body.

Likewise after they had supped, he taking this excellent Cup into his holy and reverent hands, rendering thanks also unto thee, blessed, and gave unto his disciples, saying, Take and drink of this, ye all.

For this is the cup of my blood of the new and everlasting testament: the mystery of faith: which for you and for many shall be shed to the remission of sins. As oft as ye do these things, ye shall do them in remembrance of me.

Wherefore, O Lord, we also, thy servants, and thy holy people, being mindful as well of the blessed passion and resurrection, as of the glorious ascension of the same Christ thy Son, our Lord God, do offer unto thy excellent Majesty of thy own rewards and gifts, a pure host, a holy host, an undefiled host, the holy bread of eternal life, and the cup of eternal salvation.

Vouchsafe thou also, with a merciful and pleasant countenance, to have respect hereunto: and to accept the same, as thou didst vouchsafe to accept the gifts of thy righteous servant Abel, and the sacrifice of our Patriarch Abraham, and the holy sacrifice, the undefiled host, that the high priest Melchisedek did offer unto thee.

We humbly beseech thee, O Almighty God, command thou these to be brought by the hand of thy holy Angel unto thy high Altar in the presence of thy Divine Majesty, that as many of us as of this partaking of the Altar shall receive thy Son's holy Body and Blood may be replenished with all heavenly & benediction and grace. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

Remember, Lord, also the souls of thy servants and hand-maidens, N. and N. which are gone before us with the mark of faith, and rest in the sleep of peace. The following is an adaptation of the Eucharistic prayer of the First English Book of Common Prayer of Edward VI, compiled by Thomas Cranmer.

If this prayer is used, the Prayer for the Whole State of Christ's Church is omitted earlier.

The Celebrant, whether bishop or priest, faces them and sings or says

The Lord be with you.

People And with thy spirit.
Celebrant Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them up unto the Lord.

Celebrant Let us give thanks unto our Lord God.

People It is meet and right so to do.

Then, facing the Altar, the Celebrant proceeds

It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, O Lord, holy Father, almighty, everlasting God.

Here a Proper Preface is sung or said on all Sundays, and on other occasions as appointed.

Therefore with Angels and Archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we laud and magnify thy glorious Name, evermore praising thee, and saying,

Celebrant and People

Holy, holy, Lord God of Hosts: Heaven and earth are full of thy glory. Glory be to thee, O Lord Most High.

And to all thy people give thy heavenly grace, that with meek heart and due reverence they may hear and receive thy holy Word, truly serving thee in holiness and righteousness all the days of their life. And we most humbly beseech thee of thy goodness, O Lord, to comfort and succor all them who in this transitory life are in trouble, sorrow, need, sickness, or any other adversity. And especially we commend unto thy merciful goodness [N., and N., and] this congregation which is here assembled in thy Name, to celebrate the Commemoration of the most glorious death of thy Son.

And here we do give unto thee most high praise and hearty thanks for the wonderful grace and virtue declared in all thy Saints, from the beginning of the world: And chiefly in the glorious and most blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord and God, and in the holy Patriarchs, Prophets, Apostles and Martyrs whose examples, O Lord, and steadfastness in thy faith, and keeping thy holy commandments, grant us to follow.

We commend unto thy mercy, O Lord, all other thy servants, which are departed hence from us, with the sign of faith, and now do rest in the sleep of peace.

Grant unto them, we beseech thee, thy mercy, and everlasting peace, and that, at the day of the general resurrection, we and all thy servants which be of the mystical body of thy Son, may altogether be set on his right hand, and hear that his most joyful voice: Come unto me, O ye that be blessed of my Father, and possess the kingdom, which is prepared for you from the beginning of the world.

Grant this, O Father, for Jesus Christ's sake, our only Mediator and Advocate. Amen.

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of thy tender mercy didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the

cross for our redemption, who made there, by his one oblation of himself, once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world, and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to celebrate a Perpetual Memory of that his precious death, until his coming again:

Hear us, O merciful Father, we beseech thee: and with thy Holy Spirit and Word vouchsafe, to bless and sanctify these thy gifts, and creatures of Bread and Wine, that they may be unto us the Body and Blood of thy most dearly beloved Son Jesus Christ:

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

Who in the same night that he was betrayed, took Bread, and when he had blessed and given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat, this is my Body which is given for you, do this in remembrance of me.

Likewise after supper, he took the Cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying: Drink ye all of this, for this is my Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you and for many, for the remission of sins; do this as oft as you shall drink it, in remembrance of me.

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the Institution of thy dearly beloved Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, we thy humble servants do celebrate and make here before thy divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, the Memorial which thy Son hath willed us to make, having in remembrance his blessed Passion, mighty Resurrection and glorious Ascension,

rendering unto thee most hearty thanks, for the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same:

Entirely desiring thy fatherly goodness, mercifully to accept this our Sacrifice of Praise and Thanksgiving: most humbly beseeching thee to grant, that by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his Blood, we and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his Passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, ourselves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee: humbly beseeching thee, that whosoever shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, and be 4 filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with thy Son Jesus Christ, that he may dwell in them, and they in him.

And although we be unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice: Yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, and command these our prayers and supplications, by the ministry of thy holy Angels, to be brought up into thy holy Tabernacle before the sight of thy divine Majesty; not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses. Through Christ our Lord.

By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost: all honor and glory, be unto thee, O Father almighty, world without end. Amen.

The Creed of Saint Athanasius

The following creed, which is thought to have been written by the disciples of Saint Athanasius of Alexandria, is a response to the Fourth Century heresy of Arianism (the denial of the full divinity of Jesus). It seeks to give a fuller expression of the relation among the three Persons of the Blessed Trinity; its use, therefore, is especially appropriate on Trinity Sunday.

Whosoever will be saved, before all things it is necessary that he hold the Catholic Faith.

Which Faith except everyone do keep whole and undefiled, without doubt he shall perish everlastingly.

And the Catholic Faith is this: That we worship one God in Trinity, and Trinity in Unity, neither confounding the Persons, nor dividing the Substance.

For there is one Person of the Father, another of the Son, and another of the Holy Ghost. But the Godhead of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, is all one, the Glory equal, the Majesty co-eternal.

Such as the Father is, such is the Son, and such is the Holy Ghost.

The Father uncreate, the Son uncreate, and the Holy Ghost uncreate.

The Father incomprehensible, the Son incomprehensible, and the Holy Ghost incomprehensible.

The Father eternal, the Son eternal, and the Holy Ghost eternal. And yet they are not three eternals, but one eternal.

As also there are not three incomprehensibles, nor three uncreated, but one uncreated, and one incomprehensible.

So likewise the Father is Almighty, the Son Almighty, and the Holy Ghost Almighty.

And yet they are not three Almighties, but one Almighty. So the Father is God, the Son is God, and the Holy Ghost

is God.

And yet they are not three Gods, but one God.

So likewise the Father is Lord, the Son Lord, and the Holy Ghost Lord.

And yet not three Lords, but one Lord.

For like as we are compelled by the Christian verity to acknowledge every Person by himself to be both God and Lord,

So are we forbidden by the Catholic Religion, to say, There be three Gods, or three Lords.

The Father is made of none, neither created, nor begotten.

The Son is of the Father alone, not made, nor created, but begotten.

The Holy Ghost is of the Father and of the Son, neither made, nor created, nor begotten, but proceeding.

So there is one Father, not three Fathers; one Son, not three Sons; one Holy Ghost, not three Holy Ghosts.

And in this Trinity none is afore, or after other; none is greater, or less than another;

But the whole three Persons are co-eternal together and co-equal.

So that in all things, as is aforesaid, the Unity in Trinity and the Trinity in Unity is to be worshiped.

He therefore that will be saved must thus think of the Trinity.

Furthermore, it is necessary to everlasting salvation that he also believe rightly the Incarnation of our Lord Jesus Christ.

- For the right Faith is, that we believe and confess, that our Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is God and Man;
- God, of the Substance of the Father, begotten before the worlds; and Man, of the Substance of his Mother, born in the world;
- Perfect God and perfect Man, of a reasonable soul and human flesh subsisting;
- Equal to the Father, as touching his Godhead; and inferior to the Father, as touching his Manhood.
- Who although he be God and Man, yet he is not two, but one Christ;
- One, not by conversion of the Godhead into flesh, but by taking of the manhood into God;
- One altogether; not by confusion of Substance, but by unity of Person.
- For as the reasonable soul and flesh is one man, so God and Man is one Christ;
- Who suffered for our salvation, descended into hell, rose again the third day from the dead.
- He ascended into heaven, he sitteth on the right hand of the Father, God Almighty, from whence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead.
- At whose coming all men shall rise again with their bodies and shall give account for their own works.
- And they that have done good shall go into life everlasting; and they that have done evil into everlasting fire.
- This is the Catholic Faith, which except a man believe faithfully, he cannot be saved.

If desired, the Gloria Patri may be said here.

The Solemn Reception of a Bishop

This rite emphasizes the role of the Bishop as a chief Pastor of the Church. He leads the people in humble reverence before the Crucified Savior (the kissing of the crucifix); he reminds them of their baptism (the aspersion with blessed water); and he holds befor them our common vocation to holiness (the blessing of incense and of the people). The emphasis in this rite is on the Bishop as a good shepherd in the following of the Good Shepherd, who leads his flock to the place where they should go.

The Bishop may be met at the entrance to the Church where he kneels down to pray. He may be presented with a crucifix, holy water, and incense in the customary manner. A procession is then made toward the altar. The choir sings the canticle, Benedictus Dominus Deus, page 46, with the following antiphon.

O priest and bishop, thou worker of all virtues, good shepherd of thy people, pray for us unto the Lord. (Alleluia.)

The following may also be sung, if desired.

Responsory Ecce Sacerdos magnus

Stations of the Cross

The practice of pilgrims to the Holy Land following the Way of Sorrows from the house of Pilate to the Holy Sepulchre was the origin of this devotion, which became widespread in the later Middle Ages, although it was not completely formalized until the eighteenth century. This is a popular and appropriate devotion during Lent and Holy Week. Eight of the stations are based directly upon events recorded in the Gospels. The remaining six (stations III, IV, VI, VII, IX, and XIII) are based upon inferences from the Gospels or upon pious legend, and may be omitted if desired.

Preparation

In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Lord, have mercy upon us.

Christ, have mercy upon us. Lord, have mercy upon us.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

- V. God forbid that I should glory:
- R. Save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Let us pray.

Almighty God, we beseech thee graciously to behold this thy family, for which our Lord Jesus Christ was contented to be betrayed, and given up into the hands of wicked men, and to suffer death upon the cross; who now liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost ever, one God, world without end. Amen.

Stanzas of the hymn, Stabat Mater, may be sung before each station.

At the Cross her station keeping Stood the mournful mother weeping, Where he hung, the dying Lord.

For her soul of joy bereaved, Bowed with anguish, deeply grieved, Felt the sharp and piercing sword.

I. Jesus is Condemned to Death

- V. We adore thee, O Christ, and we bless thee,

And straightaway in the morning the chief priests held a consultation with the elders and scribes and the whole council, and bound Jesus, and carried him away, and delivered him to Pilate. Amen.

True repentance, Jesus, win me: Savior print thy wounds within me. Brand them on my stubborn heart.

As thou bought'st, through tribulation, In thy passion, my salvation, Let me bear therein my part.

VIII. Jesus Meets the Women of Jerusalem

O Lord God, whose blessed Son, our Savior, gave his back to the smiters and hid not his face from shame: Grant us grace to take joyfully the sufferings of the present time, in full assurance of the glory that shall be revealed; through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

> Jesus, great beyond all other, Turn not from me, heav'nly brother, Let me too bewail thy pain.

XI. Jesus is Nailed to the Cross

- V. We adore thee, O Christ, and we bless thee,
- R. Because by thy holy Cross thou hast redeemed the world.

And when they were come to the place which is called Calvary, there they crucified him. And with him they crucified two thieves; the one on his right hand, and the other on his left. And the scripture was fulfilled, which saith, "And he was numbered with the transgressors." O my people, what have I done unto thee? I did raise thee on high with great power: and thou hast hanged me upon the gibbet of the Cross.

V. I, if I be lifted up:

R. Will draw all men unto me.

Let us pray.

O God, who by the passion of thy blessed Son hast made the instrument of shameful death to be unto us the means of life and peace: Grant us so to glory in the Cross of Christ, that we

may gladly suffer shame and loss; for the sake of the same thy Son our Lord. Amen.

Let my soul, thy death declaring, Thy unsparing passion sharing, Count thy bruises one by one.

All kneel. Then may be said the Our Father and the Hail Mary silently, after which all rise.

Let us pray.

O God, who for our redemption didst give thine only-begotten Son to the death of the Cross, and by his glorious resurrection hast delivered us from the power of our enemy; Grant us so to die daily from sin, that we may evermore live with him in the joy of his resurrection; through the same thy Son Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let thy stripes and scourging smite me; At thy holy Cross requite me, Let thy blood refresh me there.

XIII. The Body of Jesus is Placed in the Arms of His Mother

- V. We adore thee, O Christ, and we bless thee,
- R. Because by thy holy Cross thou hast redeemed the world.

All ye that pass by, behold, and see if there be any sorrow like unto my sorrow. Mine eyes do fail with tears, my soul is troubled; my heart is poured out in grief because of the downfall of my people. Call me not Naomi (which is Pleasant), call me Mara (which is Bitter); for the Almighty hath dealt very bitterly with me.

Grant, we beseech thee, merciful Lord, to thy faithful people pardon and peace, that they may be cleansed from all their sins, and serve thee with a quiet mind; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

O how sad and sore distressed Now was she, that mother blessed Of the sole-begotten One.

XIV. Jesus is Laid in the Tomb

- V. We adore thee, O Christ, and we bless thee,
- R. Because by thy holy Cross thou hast redeemed the world.

When the even was come, there came a rich man of Arimathaea, named Joseph, who also himself was Jesus' disciple; he went to Pilate, and begged the body of Jesus. Then Pilate commanded the body to be delivered. And when Joseph had taken the body, he wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn out in the rock: and he rolled a great stone to the door of the sepulchre, and departed.

- V. Thou shalt not leave my soul in hell:
- R. Neither shalt thou suffer thy Holy One to see corruption.

Let us pray.

Grant, O Lord, that as we are baptized into the death of thy blessed Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, so by continual mortifying our corrupt affection we may be buried with him; and that through the grave, and gate of death, we may pass to our joyful resurrection; for his merits, who died, and was buried, and rose again for us, the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Deep the woe of her affliction, When she saw the crucifixion Of her everglorious Son.

Amen.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Ghost be with us all evermore. Amen.

Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament

This brief service of adoration of our Lord's presence in the Blessed Sacrament provides the faithful with an opportunity to worship Him as He extends His risen and glorified life in heaven to be present sacramentally with His people on earth. It had its origin in the heightened devotion of the faithful to the Presence of Christ in the Eucharistic Gifts and in the practice of concluding extraliturgical devotions by blessing the faithful with some sacred object connected with the devotion, such as a crucifix, a relic of a saint, or the Consecrated Bread of the Eucharist. Benediction may be given using a monstrance or a ciborium. Because the only divinely-ordained purpose of the Sacraments is "that we should duly use them." Benediction cannot under any circumstances be considered a substitute for attendance at the Eucharist and the reception of Holy Communion; it is, rather, a supplemental aid in our devotion to Jesus.

All kneeling, the blessed Sacrament in the Monstrance is exposed; then the following hymn is sung.

Blessed, praised and adored be Jesus in the most Holy Sacrament.

The Monstrance is placed on the Altar and the Divine Praises are said by the Priest, the people repeating them after him, all kneeling. At the Celebrant's discretion, additional Praises may be added.

Blessed be God.

Blessed be His Holy Name.

Blessed be Jesus Christ, true God and true Man.

Blessed be the Name of Jesus.

Blessed be His Most Sacred Heart.

Blessed be Jesus in the Most Holy Sacrament of the Altar.

Blessed be God the Holy Ghost, the Comforter.

Blessed be the Great Mother of God, Mary most Holy.

Blessed be the name of Mary, Virgin and Mother.

Blessed be Saint Joseph, her most chaste spouse.

Blessed be God in His Angels and in His Saints.

The Blessed Sacrament is replaced in the Tabernacle, the People stand, and Psalm 117, with this antiphon, is sung or said.

Antiphon: Let us forever adore the Most Holy Sacrament. (Alleluia.)

O praise the Lord, all ye nations; * praise him, all ye peoples. For His merciful kindness is ever more and more toward us; * and the truth of the Lord endureth for ever.

Praise the Lord.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, * and to the Holy Ghost:

As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, * world without end. Amen. (Repeat Antiphon).

Tenebrae

The Evening Service for Wednesday of Holy Week

Tenebrae is a Latin word meaning "darkness," and is the popular name for the special forms of the offices of Mattins and Lauds appointed for the last three days in Holy Week. Because it is now a nearly universal practice to hold the liturgies for Maundy Thursday and Good Friday in the evening, it has become customary, in some places, to offer Tenebrae in the evening on Holy Wednesday, at times drawing elements from Tenebrae of Good Friday and Holy Saturday. Perhaps the most striking feature of the service is the gradual extinguishing of the candles until only one is left, which is then concealed for a time until a loud noise is made (signifying the earthquake at the time of the Resurrection), whereupon the hidden candle is restored to its place in anticipation of the Resurrection. The congregation then departs in silence.

After the procession to the choir, all kneel and pray silently. Then all stand and say in silence Our Father, Hail Mary, and the Apostles' Creed. The Cantor then intones the first antiphon, which is continued by the Choir. All sit when the Cantor begins intoning the first Psalm.

Nocturn I

Antiphon: (Zelus domus) The zeal of thine house hath even eaten me: and the rebukes of them that rebuked thee are fallen upon me.

Psalm 69 (Salvum me fac, page 522) The Antiphon is repeated.

Antiphon: (Deus meus) Deliver me, O my God, out of the hand of the ungodly.

Psalm 71 (In te, Domine, speravi, page 525) Repeat Antiphon.

Then all stand and say Our Father silently. All sit when the Reader goes to the lectern and says

Here beginneth the Lamentation of Jeremiah the Prophet.

From the Treatise of Saint Augustine the Bishop, on the Psalms

Lesson IV. On Psalm 55:1

Lest that by saying, the world, ye should think perhaps he says: Of the darkness of this world. He says, of the world, that is, the lovers of the world: Of the world, that is, the impious and wicked: Of the world, that is, of which the Gospel saith: And the world knew him not.

Respond: Judas, that most wicked traitor, betrayed the Lord with a kiss: he, like an innocent lamb, refused not the kiss of Judas: * For a few pence he hath delivered Christ to the Jews.

V. It had been better for that man if he had not been born. For a few pence he hath delivered Christ to the Jews.

Lesson VI.

For I have spied unrighteousness and strife in the city. See the glory of the Cross itself. Now on the brow of kings is placed that Cross, which enemies did deride. Effect hath proved strength: he hath subdued the world, not with steel, but with wood. The wood of the Cross seemed a worthy object of scorn to his enemies; and standing before that wood they wagged their heads, saying: If thou be the Son of God, come down from the Cross. He stretched forth his hands to an unbelieving and gainsaying people. If he is just who lives by faith he is unrighteous who has not faith. Therefore when he saith unrighteousness, understand that it is unbelief. The Lord then saw unrighteousness and strife in the city, and stretched out his hand to an unbelieving and gainsaying people; and yet, waiting for them, he saith; Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do.

Respond: One of my disciples shall this day betray me: Woe unto that man by whom I shall be betrayed: * It had been better for that man if he had not been born.

V. He that dippeth his hand with me in the dish, the same is he that shall betray me into the hands of sinners. It had been better for that man if he had not been born.

Respond: One of my disciples...

Antiphon: Mayest thou be justified in thy saying, and clear when thou art judged.

Psalm 51 (Miserere mei, Deus, page 503) Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon: He was led as a sheep to the slaughter, and he opened not his mouth.

Psalm 90 (Domine, refugium, page 554) Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon: My heart within me is broken: all my bones shake.

Psalm 36 (Dixit injustus, page 484) Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon: Thou hast encouraged us in thy power, O Lord, and in thy holy refection.

Canticle: Cantemus Domino (page 57) Repeat Antiphon.

Antiphon: He was made an offering because he himself desired it: and himself bare our sins.

Psalm 147 (Laudate Dominum, page 624) Repeat Antiphon.

V. Mine own familiar friend whom I trusted.

R. Who did also eat of my bread, hath laid great wait for me.

All stand. During the singing of the following Canticle, all the candles upon the triangular stand having been put out (except the one placed at the top), the six candles upon the Altar are likewise extinguished one by one, so that at the last verse the last candle is put out. The lamps and other lights throughout the church, except those which burn before the Blessed Sacrament, are extinguished.

Antiphon: Now he that betrayed him gave them a sign, saying: Whomsoever I shall kiss, that same is he; hold him fast.

Canticle: Benedictus Dominus Deus (page 46) Repeat Antiphon.

During the repetition of the Antiphon, the topmost candle is taken from the candelabrum and hidden from sight under the Epistle corner of the Altar or other place as prepared.

Then all kneel and the following is sung

Christ became obedient for us unto death [even the death of the cross. Wherefore God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a name which is above every name].

Our Father is then said in silence.

Then Psalm 51, Misere mei, Deus, (page 503) may be said in a humble voice.

Then the officiant, still kneeling, says the Collect in a humble voice, without The Lord be with you or Let us pray.

Almighty God, we beseech thee graciously to behold this thy family, for which our Lord Jesus Christ was contented to be betrayed, and given up into the hands of wicked men, and to suffer death upon the cross. *He adds silently:* Who now liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

A noise is then made; the lighted candle is at once brought forth from the place where it was concealed; and all rise and depart in silence.

If a shorter form of the service is desired, Nocturns II and III may be omitted.

Blessing of the Font

This traditional Blessing of the Font is appropriate for use at the Easter Vigil. Through the use of rich symbolism, it calls to mind the mighty saving acts which God accomplishes through the waters of Baptism, calling us to die with Christ and to be raised to new life in him.

An appropriate psalm or anthem may be sung as the ministers process to the font.

Celebrant People The Lord be with you. And with thy spirit.

Celebrant

Let us pray.

Almighty and everlasting God, mercifully look upon the devout prayers of thy servants now seeking regeneration and desiring the fountain of thy water-brooks: and of thy goodness grant that they who thirst after thy faith may in this mystery of thy Holy Baptism obtain sanctification both of body and soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Lord be with you.

People Celebrant And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

O merciful God, grant that like as Christ died and rose again, so all that are baptized may die to sin and rise to newness of life. Amen.

Grant that all sinful affections may die in *them*, and that all things belonging to the Spirit may live and grow in *them*.

Amen.

Grant that *they* may have power and strength to have victory, and to triumph against the devil, the world, and the flesh.

Amen.

Grant that whosoever is here dedicated to thee by our office and ministry, may also be endued with heavenly virtues, and everlastingly rewarded, through thy mercy, O blessed Lord God, who dost live, and govern all things: world without end. Amen.

The Lord be with you.

And with thy spirit.

Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them up unto the Lord.

Celebrant Let us give thanks unto our Lord God.

People It is meet and right so to do.

The Celebrant continues

People

Celebrant

It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should give thanks unto thee, O Lord, Holy, Father Almighty, Everlasting God. For that thy dearly beloved Son Jesus Christ, for the forgiveness of our sins, did shed out of his most precious side both water and blood; and gave commandment to his disciples, that they should go teach all nations, and baptize them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

O God, whose Spirit moved over the face of the waters, when the earth was without form and void at its creation: that even then the nature of water might conceive the virtue of purging all defilement:

O God, who didst cover the earth with water, and wash away its wickedness, and didst show forth in the saving of eight souls

by the same water, a figure of our regeneration: that by the mystery of this one element of water thou mightest make an end of sin, and give birth unto righteousness:

Behold with thy good pleasure the family of thy Church, and make the grace of thy regeneration to abound therein, for thou dost with the rivers of thy plenteous mercy make glad the city of thy redeemed: and openest unto us fountains of Baptism through the whole world for the healing of nations; that, at the word of thy majesty, the same may receive the grace of thine only Son, through the Holy Ghost.

Here the priest makes the sign of the cross, dividing the water.

May he by the secret operation of his power make this water fruitful unto the regeneration of man: that having received sanctification, and being born again without spot of defilement, the same may be found a new creature, that springeth from this womb of living water: that young and old, both men and women, who henceforth shall be baptized herein, may all become the children of grace and heirs of thy heavenly promises.

Speak the word, O Lord, and drive away speedily unclean spirits and all things that may hurt us: banish from us by thy Name all the snares and assaults of the devil. And may our ghostly enemy have no power at all to encompass us: to deceive our hearts by his subtility: to waylay us in secret, and spread abroad the leaven of malice.

Be this an holy and undefiled creation, and such that the son of wickedness may not approach it, nor the stain of iniquity come near to defile it. Be it a fountain that doth regenerate, a stream that doth purify: may all they that by this means shall be dedicated before thee by the operation of the Holy Ghost,

receive the grace of redemption and remission of their offenses. Wherefore I do hallow thee, O creature of water, by God that liveth, by God the faithful, by God, the Holy: by God, who in the beginning by his Word divided the land from thee: and whose Spirit moved upon thy face.

Here the priest divides the water with his hand and scatters it towards the four corners of the earth.

Who did ordain that thou shouldst issue out of Eden, and be parted from thence into four heads, flowing therefrom into all the earth. Likewise in the desert of Marah he did turn thy bitterness into sweetness, and made thee to come forth out of the rock for his people.

In the Name of his only Son our Savior Jesus Christ do I hallow thee, O creature water: for he did change thee into wine as a wondrous sign of his Omnipotence, when he was bidden to the wedding at Cana.

Who walked upon thee with his feet to come to his disciples: and was baptized in thee in Jordan by John his minister.

Who moreover did mingle thee with Blood from his side at his Passion: and commanded his disciples that such as believed should be in thee baptized.

Almighty God, mercifully assist our prayers, who here observe what thou hast commanded: and of thy great goodness breathe thy Breath upon us.

Here the priest breaths on the water three times in the form of a cross.

Hallow by the Word of thy mouth and of thy power the weakness of this water: that like as by nature it doeth service unto the purifying of the body, so by thy grace it may effectually cleanse our souls.

Here the priest lowers the Paschal Candle into the water three times while singing the following. Then, breathing on the water, he proceeds.

May the power of the Holy Ghost be poured out on this Font which we have filled.

And make the whole substance of this water effectual unto the washing of regeneration.

The candle is taken out of the water.

May every stain of our iniquity here be cleansed: may our nature be restored to its perfect fashioning, and be conformed again to thine own image of righteousness; may it be redeemed from the old sins of its conversation: that every person, being born again by the Sacrament he hath here received, may be restored verily unto the innocence of thy children.

Through Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord. Who shall come to judge the quick and the dead, and the world by fire. Amen.

The priest then pours the Oil of Catechumens into the Font in the form of a cross.

May this Oil of salvation make this Font holy and fruitful, in such wise that those who find herein their new birth may come to life everlasting. Amen.

In the form of a cross, he pours in the Chrism.

May this mingling of the Chrism of Jesus Christ our Lord, and of the Holy Ghost the Paraclete, be wrought in the Name of the Most Holy Trinity. Amen.

In the form of a cross, he pours in both together, saying

May this commingling of the Chrism of salvation and of the Oil of unction and of the Water of Baptism likewise be wrought in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Then he mingles the Oil and Water, and scatters it over the Font with his hand.

Regard, we beseech thee, the supplications of thy congregation: sanctify this Water to the mystical washing away of sin; [and grant that these thy Servants, now to be baptized therein, may receive the fullness of thy grace, and ever remain in the number of thy faithful children:] through the same Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with thee, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and evermore. Amen.

The service then continues with Baptism or the Renewal of Baptismal vows, on page 208.

Concerning Marian Devotion

Popular devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary is an affirmation of the inseparable union between our Lord's true humanity and his full divinity. The Church teaches that he who was incarnate of the Holy Ghost and the Virgin Mary is a union of divine and human natures in one divine Person. That being the case, it is appropriate to call His Mother *Theotokos* (accurately rendered as "Birth-giver of God," but more usually translated as "Mother of God"). Indeed, the Nestorian controversy during the fifth century was ignited by the condemnation by the heretical Bishop of Constantinople of the use of the term Theotokos. Every orthodox doctrine about Mary is Christological, continuing the pattern of the Wedding Feast at Cana, where she says to the servants, "Whatsoever he saith unto you, do it." Because of her faith in the works of God, all generations have indeed "called her Blessed." Mary is the model of humanity redeemed by Christ, and the principal type of the Church.

The councils of the undivided Church encourage the faithful to venerate and emulate the saints of the Christian family, and this is supremely true of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Adoration, however, is due only to the Holy Trinity and devotion to the saints is supplementary to the worship of the one, true, living God. It is an expression of the unity of the whole family of God in Heaven and on earth. At the heart of all Marian devotion is the simple request for the prayers of our Mother in Christ - one who is held by the common tradition of the Church to be "higher than the Cherubim, more glorious than the Seraphim," yet still a creature, and subordinate to God the creator.

The Angelus

In many churches the bell is rung morning, noon, and evening in memory of the Incarnation of God, and the faithful say the following prayers, except during Eastertide, when the Regina coeli is said.

- R. And she conceived by the Holy Ghost.
- V. Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee, Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus.
- R. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.
- V. Behold the handmaid of the Lord;
- R. Be it unto me according to thy word.

Hail, Mary...

- V. And the Word was made flesh,
- R. And dwelt among us.

Hail Mary...

- V. Pray for us, O holy Mother of God.
- R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Let us pray: We beseech thee, O Lord, pour thy grace into our hearts; that as we have known the incarnation of thy Son Jesus Christ (announced) by the message of an angel (to the Virgin Mary), so by his # cross and passion we may be brought unto the glory of his resurrection. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

Regina coeli During Eastertide, until First Vespers of Trinity Sunday

O Queen of heaven, be joyful, alleluia; Because he whom so meetly thou barest, alleluia, Hath arisen, as he promised, alleluia: Pray for us to the Father, alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia. R. For the Lord is risen indeed, alleluia.

Let us pray: O God, who, by the resurrection of thy Son Jesus Christ didst vouchsafe to give gladness unto the world: Grant, we beseech thee, that we, being holpen by the Virgin Mary, his Mother, may attain unto the joys of everlasting life. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

An alternative version of the "Hail Mary" is as follows

- V. Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee, Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus.
- R. Son of Mary, son of the Living God, have mercy upon us, now, and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Queen of the heavens, we hail thee, Hail thee, Lady of all the Angels; Thou the dawn, the door of morning Whence the world's true Light is risen: Joy to thee, O Virgin glorious, Beautiful beyond all other; Hail and farewell, O most gracious, Intercede for us alway to Jesus.

V. Vouchsafe that I may praise thee, O holy Virgin. R. Give me strength against thine enemies.

Let us pray: Grant us, O merciful God, protection in our weakness: that we who celebrate the memory of the holy Mother of God may, through the aid of her intercession, rise again from our sins. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

Almighty God, who didst send thy holy Angel unto the pool of Bethesda, that at the moving of the waters he who stepped in was healed of whatever infirmities afflicted him, hear our prayers and the prayers of our blessed Lady, and be pleased to stretch out thy hand, and according to thy holy will grant restoration of health and the fulfillment of the good desires of all those who are about to be blessed with this water. Amen.

As each person is blessed, the Priest says

May it please Almighty God of his great goodness, and at the intercession of our blessed Lady, to grant thee health and peace, according to his holy will, and fulfill all thy good desires for his honor and glory. The blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, be upon thee now and always. Amen.

After all have been blessed, the following is said

- V. Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus.
- R. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.
