NOTE, That the different sections of the Missal are denoted by a letter (thus: A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, S), followed by the page number of the section. (See Table of Contents below.) These numbers agree with the Altar Edition except for Holy Week (pages A 142 ff) and the B section, where omitted musical notation and certain other changes have necessitated a different pagination.

Since the Eternal Sacrifice was offered on earth through Christ's oblation on Maundy Thursday, his death on Good Friday, and his triumph on Easter, the Order for offering the daily Sacrifice (i.e., The Ordinary and Canon of the Mass given in the B section) is inserted between Holy Week and Easter (i.e., after the A section and before the C section).

To follow the service, mark beforehand the Mass for the day, which will be either from The Proper of the Season (A or C section), or from The Proper of the Saints if it be a Holy Day not of the Season (E or D section, or S section for "supplementary" Feasts), or from Votive Masses (G), or from Masses for the Dead (H).

Begin your worship by turning to The Ordinary of the Mass (page B 26) and continue to follow the offering of the daily Sacrifice from section B, only turning therefrom, as directed, to the Mass for the day when the Propers thereof are to be used.

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INTRODUCTION

LOYALTY TO THE PRAYER BOOK has become a battle-cry. As such it is used to confront one's enemies, and hence does not always become a principle of personal practice or obedient action on the part of those who proclaim it.

Loyalty to the Prayer-Book implies knowledge and sympathetic understanding of our liturgy. For the Prayer-Book is the result of a long evolution in worship, and that evolution still continues. When liturgy ceases to develop, as with any other living thing, it is dying or dead. "Stick to the Prayer-Book" may be good advice. But those who give it are often those who do not realize that Prayer-Book Offices cannot — simply cannot — be celebrated if one sticks to the Prayer-Book in the sense of doing no more than what is therein ordered.

Are there to be vestments? Not even the surplice and stole is ordered. Cross and candles? There is no Prayer-Book authority for them. Of ceremonial customs there is little. Vested Choirs, processions, processional Crosses, flags and banners, and many other things dear to the heart of the "Prayer-Book Churchmen," are unmentioned. Music is ordered, but none is provided. Hymns are permitted but only one Hymn, the *Veni Creator*, is given. And so it goes. The use of most of these things is the result of following, not Prayer-Book directions, but the living Catholic tradition of the Church.

In other words, the Prayer-Book Rite must be treated as an apocopated liturgy, for that is precisely what it is. That is to say, our liturgy cannot be celebrated without the addition of material or knowledge which the Prayer-Book fails to supply. And when such supplementary material and the Prayer-Book Eucharistic formularies are published together as one book, the result is called a "Missal." Now it is impossible to publish such a book and please everybody. One person wishes little in the way of such additions. Another wishes much. To be of wide service, such a book should be inclusive rather than exclusive, and those who

believe in the guidance by the Holy Spirit of the Church will not doubt that the evolutionary process, which is so characteristic of the Western Liturgy, will surely, if slowly, eliminate that which is unworthy.

Six things have been found necessary, or at least convenient, almost everywhere, and amongst all kinds of Churchmen, as supplements to the Prayer-Book, namely:

1. Some ceremonial directions. (For it is impossible to celebrate the Eucharist if nothing more is done than what the Prayer-Book orders. What is the Celebrant to wear? What is he to do with his hands and feet? Dozens of questions arise which must be answered by obedience to the living Catholic tradition out of which our liturgy grew, or else the answers will be made up out of personal notions or taken from non-Catholic traditions which have grown up amongst us by mischance. But the ceremonial of the authentic tradition, if followed intelligently, provides order, deftness, the minimizing of personal idiosyncrasies, all of which makes for reverence.)
2. Musical notations, special punctuations, diacritical marks, and other helps toward good singing or reading.
3. Forms for certain popular liturgical dramas. (These are of the nature of mystery plays, such as the ceremonies for Candlemas, Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, and Holy Week.)
4. Prayers and Scriptural lections for many occasions which demand special observance but for which the Prayer-Book makes no provision.
5. Hymns. (These in the Missal take the traditional form of sacred anthems from

the Holy Scriptures instead of the present popular rhymed secular compositions which are all too often selected at random from the Hymnal. NOTE, That the latter is the most widely accepted supplement to the Prayer-Book, although time was when a hymnal was considered a dangerous and disloyal book.)

6. The personal prayers of the Celebrant. (For always and everywhere devout Priests have privately added their own personal prayers, as lay-folk do. And the Prayer-Book in some places, e.g., where it tells the Priest to offer and place on the Altar the Bread and Wine, seems to assume that the Priest will pray privately in connection with his liturgical acts. NOTE, That in the centuries just preceding the Reformation a complete set of these personal prayers of the Celebrant came into use, but except for the Collect for Purity, originally a sacristy prayer but now placed at the beginning of our eucharistic rite, they were all omitted when our liturgy was put into English from its Latin original. Perhaps the omission was due to the fact that the clergy knew them by heart and said them privately from memory, and hence they were "private" rather than "common" prayer. But doubtless the clergy continued to say them from memory as the custom is today amongst many of our clergy.)

A Missal is a book which supplies these six much needed supplements from the original sources of our liturgy and conveniently places them in the Prayer-Book Eucharistic formularies at the very points where they are likely to be used.

This Edition of the PEOPLE'S ANGLICAN MISSAL is a republication in a smaller size of the American Altar edition, and agrees therewith except as follows:

1. The introduction to the Altar edition has been omitted in favour of the INTRODUCTION which you are now reading.
2. The musical notations have been omitted, and consequently some slight re-arrangements of the Rubrics and liturgical text for Holy Week have been necessary.
3. The Ordinary and Canon of the Altar edition, which is necessarily rubricated for the Celebrant's ceremonial, is of little value to layfolk, and consequently is superseded by the version herein given, consisting of the Prayers as in the Altar edition with general directions and devotional notes which may be of assistance to the public worship of the lay people.
4. The section called THE SEASONAL PRAYERS has been much abbreviated, and placed at the end of the A section.
5. After this Introduction is given a form of Preparation before and Thanksgiving after Holy Communion which in the interests of space-saving was not inserted in the Altar edition.

The diacritical marks in prayers and lections of this Missal were devised to assist the Celebrant and Ministers at Sung Mass, and as they concern the clergy only, it is unnecessary to explain them here, although they are of necessity included in this People's edition because most of it has been produced by a photographic process from the Altar edition.

The two-column KALENDAR of this Missal has in its first column the most inclusive and most widely-used Kalendar in the world. In this has been inserted in brackets a few Feasts which are of general interest to Anglicans. Feasts which were considered of less interest are printed in Italics and their Propers are given, not in THE PROPER OF THE SAINTS, but in THE SUPPLEMENT. Thus the former, which consists only of those Feasts which the Editors felt they could recommend for wide-spread usage, furnishes a conservative but devout Kalendar observance, and the latter can be used where, and when, and to the extent that, it is found useful or necessary. For that matter, in very few localities is the so-called Universal Kalendar followed exactly. Rather it is used as the basis of local

Kalendars, Feasts being transferred or even suppressed, according to prescribed rules, in order to provide for local liturgical needs. In other words, the Universal Kalendar is used as a norm on which to base local Kalendars.

Inclusion or exclusion from THE PROPER OF THE SAINTS of this Missal was with the idea that it should represent every age of the Church, and as far as possible every section of the Church, but in doing so, should give only those Feasts which make the widest application of Catholic principles or the most general appeal to true devotion. Certain recent Feasts which might seem to fall within these terms were put in THE SUPPLEMENT because they have not yet

stood the test of time. Since all these Feasts are thus made available for those who wish to use them, nothing is lost by this conservatism.

In the second column of THE KALENDAR mention is made of all the Feasts to be found in Anglican Prayer-Books in the English language. Except when these days are to be found in THE PROPER, provision is made in THE SUPPLEMENT for keeping them also. Likewise in THE SUPPLEMENT are included certain Feasts which have some observance but for which, so far as the Editors could discover, there is no general devotion. Thus is exemplified the principle that local Feasts may be observed but should be kept local.

ACKNOWLEDGMENT

This American Edition of the ANGLICAN MISSAL has been made possible by an arrangement between the Frank Gavin Liturgical Foundation and the Society of SS. Peter and Paul whereby the editorial staff of the former is permitted to use the liturgical materials which have been prepared by the editorial staff of the latter, with discretion to introduce such changes and additions as seem necessary for the purpose in

view, namely, to conform the ANGLICAN MISSAL to the usages and customs of those places where the American Book of Common Prayer is the prescribed liturgy. Although there has been on the part of the American editorial staff no conscious departure from the ideals or purposes of the English staff, it is only fair to note that for any deviation from the English Edition to be found in the American, the American Editors

alone are responsible, and that any expression of an editorial judgement or opinion which is to be found only in the American Edition is to be understood as emanating from the American editorial staff, and therefore not necessarily representing the English Editors.

All the prayers appended to the Office of Preparation and to the Office of Thanksgiving are to be found in their original and complete English translation in *THE PRIESTS' SANCTUARY BOOK OF COMMON PRAYERS*. Since it seems desirable to adhere to the norm established by the English Editors and already widely used throughout the Anglican Communion, the Amer-

ican Editors are regretful that they found it necessary to make certain emendations in these prayers in order to serve the purpose of a Missal for American lay folk, and therefore the *Anima Christi* and the *Suscipe* are given in the form already commonly used in the United States. Some prayers were too long for general usage, and as our Titles to them make clear, are given only in part. The well-known Prayer of St. Bonaventure has been paraphrased so that its wealth of mystical meaning may be better understood. Besides these changes, only a few, and for the most part, unimportant emendations were considered necessary.

PREPARATION FOR MASS

To be said according to the opportunity of the Priest. [In some religious communities, by local custom, the following Preparation and Thanksgiving are said in Choir, certain parts thereof being recited only on those days indicated in brackets, Psalm 84 being used, however, whenever the Sunday or festival Psalms are said at Prime.]

ADDITIONAL PRAYERS OF PREPARATION

THE PRAYER OF ST. AMBROSE THE BISHOP

[NOTE, That the portion assigned below to Friday is especially appropriate in preparation for Masses for the Dead.]

Sunday

OLORD Jesu Christ, who art the true High Priest and Bishop of our souls : who didst upon the Altar of the Cross offer thyself to God the Father to be a pure and undefiled sacrifice for us miserable sinners ; who hast likewise given us thy Flesh to eat and thy Blood to drink : and hast established this Mystery in the power of the Holy Ghost, saying, Do this in remembrance of me : I beseech thee by the same thy precious Blood, the ransom of our salvation. I beseech thee by that wondrous and ineffable love wherewith thou dost vouchsafe to love us (miserable and unworthy sinners) washing us clean from all our sins in thine own Blood. Teach me, thy unworthy servant, whom among thy manifold mercies thou hast vouchsafed to share in the benefits of thy

Priesthood. (And this through no merits of my own, but only of thine abundant mercy!) Teach me, I pray thee, by thy Holy Spirit to draw near to so great a Mystery, as is meet and right, with reverence and honour, and in all godliness and holy fear. Make me by thy grace always so to believe and understand, to feel and firmly to hold, to speak, and to think, concerning this holy Mystery as shall be well-pleasing to thee and profitable to my soul.

LET thy good Spirit enter into my heart, that with voiceless utterance and without sound of words he may speak there, all thy truth ; which same, hidden under the veil of holiness, passeth man's understanding. Of thy great mercy vouchsafe to me to take part in this holy Mystery with purity of heart and integrity of mind. Deliver me with the gracious and unfailing guard of thy blessed Angels, that by their mighty protection the enemies of good may be banished thence. By the power of this great Mystery and by the hand of that holy

Angel whom thou dost send me, drive far from me and from all thy servants the spirit of hardness of heart ; the spirit of pride and vainglory, the spirit of envy and blasphemy ; the spirit of fornication and uncleanness, the spirit of doubt and unfaithfulness. Confound them that persecute us, destroy them that make haste to destroy us.

Monday

O KING of virgins, Lover of chastity and purity ; pour on me the heavenly dew of thy blessing, to quench in my flesh any smouldering embers of lustful desires ; that I may abide in continual chastity both of body and soul. Mortify in my members all incentives of the flesh, all inordinate affections, all motions of concupiscence. And give unto me true and abiding chastity, and all other gifts which be pleasing to thee. Grant me thus to offer unto thee this Sacrifice of Praise and Thanksgiving in purity of body and cleanness of heart. For who can understand what a sorrow of heart and what a fountain of tears is needful? What reverence and fear, what chastity of body and purity of heart is required? And yet only thus should one draw near to assist at that divine and heavenly Sacrifice. For herein thy Flesh is eaten indeed and thy Blood is drunk indeed. For herein things beneath and things above, things earthly and things heavenly, are made one. For herein are thy holy Angels ever present. For herein in a wonderful and ineffable order thou hast constituted thyself to be both Sacrifice and Priest.

Tuesday

WHO can be worthy to offer this Sacrifice unless thou, Almighty God, dost make him worthily so to do? I know, O Lord, and know of a surety, and to thy goodness do I confess the same ; that I am not worthy to draw near to so great a Mystery, because of my grievous sins and my manifold negligences. But I know, and truly believe with all my heart, and confess with my mouth, that thou canst make me worthily so to do, who alone canst justify and sanctify sinners. O my God, I pray thee, by this thy almighty power, that thou wouldest vouchsafe to me a sinner worthily to take my part in this Sacrifice. And thereto endue me with fear and trembling, with purity of heart and a fountain of tears, with spiritual gladness and heavenly rejoicing. Grant that my soul may feel the sweetness of thy blessed Presence, and the guard of thy holy Angels round about me.

Wednesday

FOR I, O Lord, having in devout remembrance thy holy passion, draw near unto thy Altar. Although a sinner, I draw near thereto to take part in the Sacrifice which thou didst institute ; and which thou hast commanded us to offer unto thee in thy memory and for our salvation. I beseech thee, Almighty God, that thou wouldest receive the same for the benefit of thy holy Church, and the people which thou hast purchased with thine own Blood. And forasmuch as thou dost vouchsafe to place thy

Priesthood upon sinful men ; and to give each Priest as a mediator between thee and the same thy people : I pray thee that wherever thou findest not the testimony of good works in them ; yet thou wouldest not make void the office and ministry which thou hast committed unto their charge : that the Price of their Redemption, for whom thou hast vouchsafed to offer thyself to be a perfect Oblation and Satisfaction, be not lost through any of our unworthinesses. And moreover, O Lord, I lift up before thee (if thou wilt vouchsafe to look favourably thereon) : the tribulations of all peoples and the perils of all nations ; the sighing of all prisoners and the sorrows of the fatherless ; the necessities of them that travel, the wants of the sick, the depression of the weary ; the failing powers of all the aged, the aspirations of all young men, the resolutions of all maidens, and the lamentations of all widows.

Thursday

FOR thou, O Lord, hast mercy upon all men and hatest nothing that thou hast made. Remember how frail is our nature, for thou art our Father, for thou art our God. Be not angry with us as we have deserved, and withdraw not thou thy mercy from us. For we do not present our supplications before thee because we are righteous, but rather because thou art compassionate. Take away from us our iniquities, and in thy mercy kindle in us the fire of thy Holy Spirit. Take away the stony heart from us, and give us an heart of flesh ; that we

may love thee, cherish thee, delight in thee, follow thee, and enjoy thee. We beseech thee, O Lord, of thy mercy, to shew the light of thy countenance upon thy family performing this sacred office, to the honour of thy Name. And to the intent that their supplications be not in vain, nor their petitions of none effect, do thou put into our minds such prayers as it shall be well-pleasing unto thee to hear and to fulfil.

Friday

WE pray thee also, O Lord, holy Father, for the souls of the faithful departed : that this most comfortable Sacrament may be to them salvation, health, rejoicing, and refreshment. O Lord my God, grant unto them this day to feast abundantly on thee, the Living Bread ; who didst come down from heaven, and givest life unto the world. Grant them to eat thy Flesh, holy and blessed, who art the immaculate Lamb that takest away the sins of the world ; even the Flesh which thou didst take of the womb, holy and glorious, of the blessed Virgin Mary, by the operation of the Holy Ghost. Grant them to drink of that fountain of love which flowed from thy sacred side, pierced by the soldier's spear ; that being thereby refreshed and satisfied, restored and comforted, they may rejoice in giving praise and glory unto thee. I pray thee, O Lord, of thy mercy, that thou wouldest send upon the bread now to be offered unto thee, the fulness of thy blessing and the sanctifying powers of thy Godhead. Send down also, O Lord, the unseen and incomprehensible

majesty of thy Holy Spirit, as once thou didst send the same upon the sacrifice of the fathers : that he may make our oblations to be indeed thy Body and Blood. And because I am so unworthy, teach me to approach this holy Mystery with purity of heart and with a devout sorrow for my sins, in reverence and in awe. So shalt thou lovingly and graciously accept this Sacrifice at my hands for the salvation of all men, both living and departed.

Saturday

I BESEECH thee also, O Lord, by this same sacred Mystery of thy Body and Blood ; whereby, in thy holy Church, we are daily given to eat and drink ; are washed and sanctified, and made partakers in thy one Almighty Godhead ; grant to me thy holy virtues, that being filled therewith, I may draw near unto thine Altar with a good conscience ; that so this heavenly Sacrament may be unto me life and salvation. For thou, who art ever holy and blessed, hast said : The Bread which I will give is my Flesh for the life of the world : I am the living Bread which came down from heaven : If any man eat of this Bread, he shall live for ever. **C** Bread of Sweetness, give healing to my taste, that I may perceive the delights of thy love. Deliver me from mine earthiness that I may find no sweetness in anything apart from thee. **O** Bread of purest whiteness, that containest all delights, and all pleasant savours! **O**

thou who dost ever refresh us, and never failest! Grant that my heart may feed on thee, and that my inmost soul may be filled with the sweetness of thy savour. The Angels do feed upon thee with full mouth. Grant that I, a pilgrim and a sojourner, may feed on thee in such measure as I may. And thereby grant that I fail not in my journey, with such provision to stay me.

O BREAD, holy, pure, and living, who didst come down from heaven and givest life unto the world! Come into my heart, and cleanse me from all defilement both of flesh and of spirit. Enter into my person, and heal and cleanse me both inwardly and outwardly. Be the protection and abiding health of my body as well as of my soul. Drive far from me all the enemies that lie in wait for me. Grant that they may fly far off from the presence of thy power. Grant that being in all things defended by thee, I may walk in a straight way into thy Kingdom. For there we shall no more behold thee in a mystery as in this present time. But rather we shall see thee face to face, when thou shalt deliver up the kingdom to God the Father, and God shall be all in all. For on that day shalt thou satisfy me with a wondrous fulness, so that I shall no more hunger or thirst for ever, O Jesu. Who with the same God the Father and the Holy Spirit livest and reignest, world without end. Amen.

ST. AMBROSE

My heart and body are defiled by many sins ; my mind and tongue have not been guarded from evil. Therefore, O God of love, awful in thy majesty, in the straits of my misery I fly unto thee, the fountain of all mercy : I hasten unto thee for healing, I flee to thy protection : and since I dare not stand before thy judgement, I yearn to have thee for my Saviour. In thy sight, O Lord, I lay bare my bruises and uncover my shame. I know my sins to be many and grievous, and therefore I am afraid : I put my trust in thy mercies, for the sum of them cannot be numbered.

[Tuesday]

LOOK upon me, therefore, O Lord Jesu Christ, King eternal, God and Man, crucified for man, with the eyes of thy mercy. Hearken unto me, for I put my trust in thee : have

mercy upon me, who am full of misery and sin, O thou unfailing fountain of mercy. Hail, saving Victim, offered for me and all mankind upon the shameful Cross. Hail, O noble and precious Blood, flowing from the wounds of Jesus Christ (my Lord who was crucified for me) to wash away the sins of the whole world. Remember, O Lord, thy creature, whom thou hast redeemed with thy Blood. I repent me of my sins, I desire to amend what I have done amiss. I beseech thee, therefore, most merciful Father, take away from me all my sins and iniquities ; that being purified both in body and soul, I may worthily receive these most holy Mysteries : and grant that as now in my unworthiness I purpose to be a partaker of thy Body and Blood, so I may thereby obtain remission of my sins, and full delivery from my guilt : that all evil thoughts may be banished from me, and all good affections be born again within me : that all such works as are pleasing to thee may effectually be accomplished in me : to my protection both in body and soul against all the assaults of my enemies. AQUINAS

ALmighty and everlasting God, behold I draw near to the Sacrament of thy only-begotten Son, Jesus

Christ our Lord. I draw near, sick to the Physician of life, foul to the fountain of mercy, blind to the light of eternal glory, poor and needy to the Lord of heaven and earth. SMITE me, Lord Jesu, with that sword which thou camest to send upon earth ; wherewith thou dost strike deep into the conscience of man, even into the very centre of our passions and desires. Wound me thus with the sword of thy grace, not to my hurt but to my healing and sweet comfort, O thou who art the Desire of all nations ; that all sinful passions may die in me, and that all things belonging to the Spirit may live and grow in me ; to the end that I may delight in thee, O Lord, and will what thou wilt and desire what thou desirest. Be thou each day what my heart doth hunger for, that on thee it may always feed ; and that mine inmost soul may be filled with the savour of thy sweetness. O grant that my soul may thirst after thee, who art the Well of life and the Font of wisdom and knowledge. Be thou to me each day the Spring of everlasting light, the River of pleasures, the Plenteousness of the house of God.

[Thursday]

THOU who art the Desire of all nations, make me to delight in thee, O Lord, that thou mayest become my heart's desire. And to this

end, give me grace ever to pay my vows unto thee, to seek for thee and find thee, to strive for thee and come to thee. May I in all things labour for the honour and glory of thy Name ; with humility and discretion, with love and delight, with readiness and devotion, with endurance unto the end. EXCERPTS FROM THE PRAYERS OF ST. ALPHONSUS THE BISHOP

Sunday

MOST loving Jesu, my Redeemer and my God : I adore thee, who art present within me under the veils of bread and wine, wherein thou art made the meat and drink of my soul. O my God, I pray that thy coming to my soul may be ever blessed. And for this great benefit I give thee thanks from my inmost heart. And I lament that I cannot worthily give thanks unto thee. For how could a steward of low degree give worthy thanks, if his king should visit his hut ; save by casting himself down at his feet in silence to praise and honour such great condescension? Therefore, O heavenly King, Jesu beloved, I cast myself at thy feet and adore thee in my utter unworthiness. I unite my adoration to the adoration offered unto thee by the blessed Virgin Mary, when she received thee into her sacred womb. And with such love as she loved thee would I also honour thee.

My God and my all! Thou alone from henceforth shalt be my best good and my chief love. Grant that I may say unto thee, with thy blessed Saint Paulinus : Let the rich man keep his riches, and the king his crown ; my glory and my kingdom is Christ. Let the kings and the rich men of the

earth enjoy their kingdoms and their riches : thou, O good Jesu, shalt alone be evermore my riches and my kingdom. O everlasting Father, by the love of this thy Son, whom I have this day offered unto thee, and received into my heart ; grant me, I pray thee, holy perseverance in thy grace, and the gift of thy holy love.

Monday

O INFINITE goodness and infinite love of God, that art given wholly unto me, and art become wholly mine! O my soul, gather together all thy affections, and in thy inmost self unite thyself to thy Lord! For he of his set purpose hath come unto thee, that he may be united unto thee, and be loved as he hath loved thee.

O loving Redeemer, I embrace thee who art my love and my life : I unite myself unto thee : despise not thou me. Though I have sinned against thee, thou dost command me to love thee, saying : Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart. My Lord, who am I that thou shouldst desire to be loved by me? Behold, thou hast vouchsafed to undergo death for my sake, and hast given me thy Flesh to eat. Whom have I in heaven but thee? And there is none upon earth that I desire in comparison of thee. God is the strength of my heart, and my portion for ever. In truth, O God, neither in heaven nor in earth can I find a greater good than thou,

nor one who hath loved me more than thee. Thy kingdom come, O good Jesu. Take, I pray thee, this day the dominion of my whole heart, for I give it wholly unto thee. Do thou occupy it at all times and in all things, and drive far from it all affections which are not directed unto thee.

Tuesday

O LORD, how could I offend thee so often, knowing all the while how greatly I displease thee by my sins? I implore thee, by the merits of thy passion, pardon me, and bind me to thee by the bonds of thy love. Let not the foulness of my offences separate me from thee. Make me ever to know more and more thy goodness, and the love which I owe to thee, and the charity wherewith thou hast loved me.

O everlasting Father, I trust in the promises of thy Son who hath said : Verily, verily, I say unto you : Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in my Name, he will give it you. Therefore I ask of thee, in the Name of Jesus Christ, holy perseverance, and grace to love thee with all my heart, in evermore doing perfectly thy will. O Jesu, thou hast been made a victim for my sake, that I might give myself unto thee, and sacrifice all my will to thee ; for thou sayest, My son, give me thine heart. Accept, O Lord, my heart and my soul, which I desire to bestow upon thee, and devote wholly unto thee. But thou, O Lord, knowest my weakness. Succour me, and suffer me never to turn away my will from thee to sin against thee. Like as thy Son, dying upon the Cross, was

able to say, It is finished : so in the hour of my death may I be able to say from this day forth, I kept thy commandments.

Wednesday

O LORD Jesu, I see what great things thou hast wrought and suffered, that thou mightest constrain me to love thee ; and yet so often do I shew myself ungrateful to thee! How often do I barter thy grace for the sake of worthless delights and evil desires, and thereby lose thee, O God of my soul! To thy creatures how often have I given honour and gratitude for the benefits they have done to me. But to thee how often have I shewed myself all ungrateful. Pardon me, O my God! I bewail such sins of ingratitude, I repent thereof with all my heart, and I hope for thy pardon, for thou art infinite goodness. If thou wert not infinite goodness, I must needs despair, nor might I dare henceforth to implore thy mercy.

I know not how much of life remaineth to me ; but the residue of my life, whether it be short or long, I consecrate entirely unto thee. To this end hast thou waited for me unto this day. I desire indeed to please thee. I desire, O most loving Lord, ever to love thee. Thou hast said : I love them that love me. Behold, I love thee as much as I am now able to do. O be not angry with my boldness : do thou also love me, and suffer me to do nothing that may hinder thee from loving me. Grant that I may ever love thee, that thou mayest ever be able to love me. And so shall love continue ever more between us,

nor ever henceforth be broken. Grant this, O Everlasting Father, by the love of Jesus Christ. Grant this, O dearest Jesu, by thy merits, whereby I hope evermore to be enabled to love thee, and to be loved of thee.

Thursday

O GOD of infinite majesty, behold at thy feet the traitor who hath sinned so grievously against thee. Many times hast thou had mercy on my sins. Nonetheless, spurning the benefits and the succour which thou hast granted me, I have wronged thee yet again. Others have sinned in darkness, but I in the light. But do thou hearken to the voice of this thy Son, whom but now I have offered unto thee, and who now is in my heart. Let him implore for me thy mercy and thy pardon. Spare me, O infinite goodness, for the love of Jesus Christ ; for I repent me with my whole heart that I have offended thee. I know that thou, for the love of Jesus Christ, art willing to have mercy upon sinners, for it is written : It pleased the Father by him to reconcile all things unto himself. By the love of Jesus Christ I pray thee therefore to have compassion also upon me. Cast me not away from thy presence, although this is what I deserve. Spare me and change my heart. Make me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me.

Take back, O my God, to the love of thee, a sinner who heretofore hath sinned grievously against thee, but now desireth to love thee and to be thine. O eternal God, I hope to love thee to all eternity. And therefore in this

life do I desire to love thee much, that I may attain to love thee much to all eternity. And because I love thee, I desire thee to be known and loved by all men ; and therefore, O Lord, grant that I may labour for thee and strive for the salvation of souls.

Friday

INTO thy hands, O Lord, I commend my spirit ; for thou hast redeemed us, O Lord, thou God of truth. O divine Shepherd, thou didst come down from heaven to find me, a sheep that was lost. And for my sake thou hast laid down thy life for my salvation. Leave me not, for into thy hands I commend my soul. Receive it of thy mercy, and suffer me never to be separated from thee. For my sake thou hast shed all thy precious Blood. We therefore pray thee help thy servants whom thou hast redeemed with thy precious Blood. Lord, as yet art thou my Advocate, not my Judge. Win for me pardon before thy Father's throne. Obtain for me light and strength to love thee with all my soul. Grant me so to pass the residue of my life that, when I look upon thee as my Judge, I may find thee gracious towards me.

I pray thee, let thy love reign in my heart ; make me to be wholly thine. And therefore, O loving Saviour, make me ever mindful of the love wherewith thou hast loved me. Make me mindful of all that thou hast done and suffered that thou mightest love me and be loved by me. Make me lowly and patient in the toils of this life ; cheerful in humiliations, careless of earthly delights, and more detached

from all love of creaturely things. Grant that I may cast out from my heart all affections that are not directed towards thee. All this I implore of thee, and hope by the merits of thy passion to receive the same. O Jesu most sweet, O Jesu beloved, O good Jesu, hear me.

Saturday

THOU, O Jesu, hast given thyself wholly unto me. Thou hast given thy Blood, thy life, thy agony and sweat, and all thy merits. I give myself wholly unto thee. I give all my joys, all the pleasures of this life, my body, my soul, and my will. I have no more to give thee. If I had more, I would give thee more. O sweetest Jesu, thou art sufficient for me. Yet grant, O Lord, that I may be faithful unto thee. Suffer me not to change

my will and to abandon thee. I trust, O my Saviour, that by the merits of thy passion this may never befall me. Thou hast said : Who did ever put his trust in the Lord, and was ashamed? Therefore I too can say with all confidence : In thee, O Lord, have I trusted, let me never be confounded. O God of my soul, I trust, and desire always to trust, that I may never suffer the confusion of beholding myself separated from thee.

O my God, since thou art Almighty make me holy. Make me to love thee much. Make me to leave nothing undone that may abound to thy glory. Make me to conquer all things that I may please thee. Happy were I, could I love all things in such wise that I might find thee alone and thy love. To this end hast thou given me life. Grant that I may devote it wholly to the works of thy glory.

FIRST SUNDAY IN ADVENT

Sunday of I Class, Semidouble

Station at St. Mary Major. Collect 1549. Gospel Sarum.

INTROIT. *Ad te levavi. Ps. 25.*

UNTO thee, O Lord, will I lift up my soul : my God, I have put my trust in thee, O let me not be confounded : neither let mine enemies triumph over me : for all they that hope in thee shall not be ashamed. *Ps. ibid.* Shew me thy ways, O Lord : and teach me thy paths.

¶ Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Which ended, Unto thee, O Lord, will I lift up is repeated as far as the Psalm. And this manner of repeating the Introit is to be observed through the year.

§ Gloria in excelsis is not said in Masses of the Season from this Sunday up to the Vigil of the Nativity of the Lord, inclusive.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY God, give us grace that we may cast away the works of darkness, and put upon us the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which thy Son, Jesus Christ, came to visit us in grêat humility : that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge

both the quick and the dëad ; we may rise to the life immortal.

[*Prayer Book Ending:* Through him who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, now and ever. R̄. Amen.]

Long Ending: Through the same Jesus Christ thy Son, our Lôrd. Who liveth and reigneth with thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost, ever ône God, world without end. R̄. Amen.

¶ *This Collect is to be repeated every day after the other Collects in Advent, until Christmas Day. [For an exposition of this Rubric, see the Liturgical Note in Seasonal Prayers, page A 200.]*

COLLECT 2. *Of St. Mary.*

OGOD, who didst vouchsafe that thy Word should be made flesh in the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary at the message ôf an Angel : grant to us thy humble servânts ; that we, believing her to be indeed the Mother of God, may by her intercession find favour in thy sight. *If it be said in the last place, it is ended as follows:* Through the same Jesus Christ thy Son, our Lôrd. Who liveth and reigneth with thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost, ever ône God, world without end. R̄. Amen.

COLLECT 3. *For the Church.*

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to hear the prayers of thy people : that being delivered from all adversities and all false doctrines, thy Church may serve thee in freedom and quietness. *If it be said in the last place, it is ended:* Through the same Jesus Christ thy Son, our Lôrd. Who liveth and reigneth with thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost, ever ône God, world without end. R̄. Amen.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Romans.
Rom. 13. 8.

BRETHREN : Owe no man any thing, but to love one another : for he that loveth another hath fulfilled the Law. For this : Thou shalt not commit adultery, Thou shalt not kill, Thou shalt not steal, Thou shalt not bear false witness, Thou shalt not covet : and if there be any other commandment, it is briefly comprehended in this saying, namely : Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. Love worketh no ill to his neighbour : therefore love is the fulfilling of the Law. And that, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep : for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand : let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light. Let us walk honestly, as in the day ; not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying. But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfil the lusts thereof.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 25.* For all they that look for thee shall not be ashamed, O Lord. V̄. Make known to me thy ways, O Lord : and teach me thy paths.

On Ferias in Advent when during the week the Sunday Mass is resumed, Alleluia and its following verse is not said, but only the Gradual.

Alleluia, alleluia. V̄. *Ps. 85.* Shew us thy mercy, O Lord : and grant us thy salvation. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 21. 1.

AT that time : When they drew nigh unto Jerusalem, and were come to Bethphage, unto the mount of Olives : then sent Jesus two disciples, saying unto them : Go into the village over against you, and straightway ye shall find an ass tied, and a colt with her : loose them, and bring thê m unto me. And if any man say ought unto you, ye shall say : The Lord hath need of them ; and straightway hê will send them. All this was done, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the Prophet, saying : Tell ye the daughter of Sion : Behold, thy King cometh unto thee, meek, and sitting upon an ass, and a colt the fôal of an ass. And the disciples went, and did as Jesus commanded them, and brought the ass, and the colt, and put on them their clothes, and they sê t him thereon. And a very great multitude spread their garmênts in the way ; others cut down branches from the trees, and strawed thê m in the way. And the multitudes that went before, and that followed, cried, saying : Hosanna to the Sôn of David ; Blessed is he that cometh

in the Nâme of the Lord ; Hosanna in the highest. And when he was come into Jerusalem, all the city was moved, saying : † Whô is this? And the multitude said: This is Jesus the Prophet of Nazareth of Galilee. And Jesus went into the temple of God, and cast out all them that sold and bought in the temple, and overthrew the tables of the money-changers, and the seats of them that sold doves, and said unto them : It is written : My house shall be called the house of prayer ; but ye have made it a den of thieves.

The Creed is said on all Sundays through the year, whether occurring or anticipated, and also when its Office is postponed to the first unhindered day. But it is not said on Ferias when the Mass of the preceding Sunday is merely resumed.

OFFERTORY. Ps. 25. Unto thee, O Lord, will I lift up my soul : my God, I have put my trust in thee, O let me not be confounded : neither let mine enemies triumph over me : for all they that hope in thee shall not be ashamed.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord, that the effectual power of these thy holy mysteries may in such wise cleanse us from all our iniquities that we may in all purity attain unto him who is the author of the same, even Jesus Christ, thy Son, our Lord. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

SECRET 2. *Of St. Mary.*

WE beseech thee, O Lord, stablish in our hearts the mysteries of thy true religion : that, as we do believe thy Son, conceived of a Virgin, to be

very God and very man, so by the power of his resurrection we may be found worthy to attain to everlasting felicity. (Through the same.)

SECRET 3. *For the Church.*

DEFEND, O Lord, we pray thee, us thy servants : that we cleaving fast to things heavenly, may faithfully serve thee both in body and soul. Through.

The Preface of the Most Holy Trinity is said in this Mass. Likewise it is said in Sunday Masses through the year, even when the Mass is anticipated on Saturday, provided there be no proper Preface ordered by the Rubrics; but it is not said on Ferias, nor when the Sunday Mass is resumed on a week day, for then is said the common Preface unless some Commemoration be made which requires a proper Preface. But note that the Preface of the B.V.M. is never said in Masses of the Season during Advent.

COMMUNION. Ps. 86. The Lord shall shew loving-kindness : and our land shall give her increase.

POSTCOMMUNION.

§ *From the I Sunday in Advent to December 23 inclusive, when the Collects assigned for the different seasons (to wit, those given above for the B.V.M., etc.) are ordered to be said, the second Collect will be of the B.V.M., and the third that for the Church, as given above, if the Latin Rubrics be followed. But if the Prayer-Book Rubrics be followed, after the first week in Advent, the second Collect will be of the I Sunday in Advent, and the third Collect that of the B.V.M. However, in Masses of the B.V.M. or in those in which she is commemorated, and likewise in a Votive Mass of All Saints, in place of the Collect of the B.V.M. is said the Collect of the Holy Spirit, as given in the Votive Masses of the B.V.M.*

§ *In Advent, in Lent (from Ash Wednesday up to Saturday after Passion Sunday*

inclusive), on Ember Days, on Vigils, and on the days of the greater and the lesser Litanies, when Mass is said of any Festival, or when a Votive Mass is said, a Commemoration of the Feria is always made unless it be a Conventual or a sung Mass in a place where there is also another Conventual or sung Mass of the Feria: otherwise the Feria must be commemorated even in a Conventual or a sung Mass. The same rule is observed on all Vigils, excepting when on a common Vigil, a Double of the I Class is kept, or when a Votive Mass is celebrated for an important matter of public intention, in which case there is no Commemoration of the said Vigil.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Thessalonians. 2 *Thess.* 2. 1.

BRETHREN : We beseech you, by the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, and by our gathering together unto him : that ye be not soon shaken in mind, or be troubled, neither by spirit, nor by word, nor by letter as from us, as that the day of Christ is at hand. Let no man deceive you by any means : for that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition ; who opposeth and exalteth himself above all that is called God, or that is worshipped ; so that he as God sitteth in the temple of God, shewing himself that he is God. Remember ye not, that, when I was yet with you, † I told you these things? And now ye know what withholdeth that he might be revealed in his time. For the mystery of iniquity doth already work : only he who now letteth will let, until he be taken out of the way. And then shall that Wicked be revealed, whom the Lord shall consume with the spirit of his mouth, and shall destroy with the brightness of his coming.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 19. He rejoiceth as a giant to run his course : he goeth forth from the uttermost part of the heaven, and runneth about unto the end of it again.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord our God : that these holy mysteries which thou hast given unto us for the assurance of our salvation, may both in this life and in that which is to come be profitable unto us for the healing of our souls. Through.

He said : I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness : Make straight the way of the Lord, as said the Prophêt Esaias. And they which were sent were of thê Pharisees. And they asked him, and said unto him : Why baptizest thou then, if thou be not that Christ, nor Elias, † neither thât Prophet? John answered them, saying : I baptize with water : but there standeth one among you, whôm ye know not. He it is, who coming after me is preferred before me, whose shoe's latchet I am not worthy to unloose. These things were done in Bethabara beyond Jordan, where Jôhn was baptizing. *The Creed is said.*

INTROIT. *Hodie scietis. Exod. 16.*

TODAY shall ye know that the Lord will come and deliver you : and in the morning ye shall see the glory of the Lord. *Ps. 23.* The earth is the Lord's and all that therein is : the compass of the world and they that dwell therein. ✠. Glory be.

COLLECT.

OGOD, who makest us glad with the yearly Expectation of the birth of thine only Son Jesus Christ : grant that as we joyfully receive him for our Redeemêr, so we may with sure confidence behold him when he shall come to be our Judge. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

And the Seasonal Prayers shall not be said, but if the Vigil fall on a Sunday, the Sunday is commemorated.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Romans.

Rom. I. I.

PAUL, a servant of Jesus Christ, called to be an Apostle, separated unto the Gospel of God, which he had promised afore by his prophets in the holy Scriptures, concerning his Son Jesus Christ our Lord, which was made of the seed of David according to the flesh ; and declared to be the Son of God with power, according to the Spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead : by whom we have received grace and apostleship, for obedience to the faith among all nations, for his Name : among whom are ye also the called of Jesus Christ our Lord.

GRADUAL. *Exod. 16.* To-day shall ye know that the Lord will come and save you : and in the morning ye shall see the glory of the Lord. *V. Ps. 80.* Hear, O thou Shepherd of Israel : thou that leadest Joseph like a sheep. Shew thyself, thou that sittest upon the Cherubims, before Ephraim, Benjamin, and Manasses.

The following Alleluia with its verse shall not be said, except the Vigil fall on a Sunday.

St. Matt. I. 18.

WHEN as Mary the mother of Jesus was espoused to Joseph, before they came together she was found with child of the Holy Ghost. Then Joseph

her husband, being a just man, and not willing to make her a publick example, was minded to put her away privily. But while he thought on these things, behold, the Angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a dream, saying : Joseph thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife : for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost. And she shall bring forth a Son : and thou shalt call his Name JESUS : for he shall save his people from their sins. *If it be a Sunday, the Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 24.* Lift up your heads, O ye gates, and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors : and the King of glory shall come in.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that like as we do now prevent the glorious Nativity of thy Son, so we may obtain with gladness his reward of everlasting life. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

The common Preface shall be said, except the Vigil fall on a Sunday, when the Preface of the Most Holy Trinity shall be said.

COMMUNION. *Is. 40.* The glory of the Lord shall be revealed : and all flesh shall see the salvation of our God.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OLORD, we beseech thee : that like as thy only-begotten Son hath in this heavenly mystery given himself to be our meat and drink ; so as at this time we may be inwardly renewed by the remembrance of his birth. Through the same.

December 25th.

THE NATIVITY OF OUR LORD

Commonly Called Christmas Day

Double of I Class with privileged Octave 3

§ *The Priest, when on the Nativity of our Lord he celebrates three Masses, shall not take the Ablutions at the first and second Mass, but at the third only: and at the first and second he shall wash his fingers in some clean vessel, as explained in the Rubric for All Souls' Day, given at the beginning of MASSES FOR THE DEAD, page H 1.*

AT THE FIRST MASS: OF MIDNIGHT

Station at St. Mary Major at the Crib.

INTROIT. *Dominus dixit. Ps. 2.*

THE Lord said unto me : Thou art my Son, this day have I begotten thee. *Ps. ibid.* Why do the heathen so furiously rage together : and why do the people imagine a vain thing ? *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

¶ *If in any Church the Holy Communion be twice celebrated on Christmas Day, the following Collect, Epistle and Gospel may be used at the first Communion. [But note the alternate Collect below.]*

O GOD, who makest us glad with the yearly remembrance of the Birth of thine only Son Jesus Christ : grant that as we joyfully receive him for our Redeemêr, so we may with sure con-

fidence behold him when he shall come to be our Judge. Who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, ône God, world without end.

[Anciently the Collect of the Vigil, given in the Prayer-Book as above, was not used, but rather the following:

COLLECT.

O GOD, who hast enlightened this most holy night with the beams ôf thy one true light : grant, we beseech thêe ; that we, who have known the mystery of his light on earth, may also attain to the fruition of his joys in heaven. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.]

St. Luke 2. 1.

AND it came to pass in those days ; That there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus that all the world shõuld be taxèd. And this taxing was first made when Cyrenius was governour of Syria : and all went to be taxed, every one into his own city. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, out of the city of Nazareth into Judæa, unto the city of David, which is called Bethlehem : because he was of the house and lineage of David : to be taxed with Mary his espoused wife, being great with child. And so it was, that, while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be dèliverèd. And she brought forth her firstborn Son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger : because there was no room for thèem in the inn. And

there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over thèir flock by night. And, lo, the Angel of the Lord came upon them : and the glory of the Lord shone round about them : and they wère sore afraid. And the Angel said unto them : Fear not : for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be tõ all people ; for unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you : Ye shall find the Babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the Angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying : Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, gõod will toward men. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 96. Let the heavens rejoice and let the earth be glad before the Lord : for he is come.

SECRET.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that the offerings, which on this day's festival we present unto thee, may be acceptable in thy sight : that by thy bounteous goodness vouchsafed unto us in this holy Communion, we may be found in the likeness of him in whom our substance is united unto thee : And who liveth and reigneth with thee.

PREFACE and CANON OF CHRISTMAS. *And this Preface shall be said daily until the Epiphany ; except upon the Octave day of Saint John the Evangelist, and unless in some other instance the Rubrics order otherwise.*

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 110. With an holy worship : the dew of thy Birth is of the womb of the morning.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord our God, that we who in a mystery have drawn near with gladness unto the Birth of Jêsus Christ our Lord : may so walk in godliness of life, that we may be found worthy to attain unto his fellowship in heaven. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

§ *Before the three Christmas Masses is said Psalm 43 with its Antiphon, the Confession, etc., and at the end of each the Blessing is given, and the Last Gospel is read from St. John In the beginning, except at the Third Mass when is read the Epiphany Gospel, When Jesus was born.*

§ *From today until the Vigil of Epiphany, if there be said a Solemn Votive of our Lord for which there is no proper Mass, or if a Solemn Votive be said of the Nativity, it shall be the Mass Puer Natus as given for Dec. 30th.*

LIGHT shall shine to-day upon us : for unto us the Lord is born : and his Name shall be called Wonderful, Mighty God, the Prince of peace, Father of the world to come : of whose kingdom there shall be no end. *Ps.* 93. The Lord is King and hath put on glorious apparel : the Lord hath put on his apparel and girded himself with strength. *∇.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that, as thou hast poured forth upon us the new light of thine incarnate Wôrd ; so he, who doth illuminate our hearts by faith, may likewise in all our works shew forth his brightness. Through the same.

[It is traditional that St. Anastasia (who was burnt alive on this day during the Diocletian persecution) be commemorated (privately, when Mass is sung) in this Station Mass of her Basilica.]

Of St. Anastasia. COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we, who now devoutly keep the feast of the blessed Martyr Saint Anastasia, may by her effectual intercession find favour in thy sight. Through.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to Titus.

Titus 3. 4.

DEARLY beloved : The kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man hath appeared : not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost, which he shed on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Saviour : that being justified by his grace, we should be made heirs according to the hope of eternal life : in Christ Jesus our Lord.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 118. Blessed is he that cometh in the Name of the Lord : God is the Lord, who hath

shewed us light. *℣.* This is the Lord's doing : and it is marvellous in our eyes.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣. Ps. 93.* The Lord is King, and hath put on glorious apparel : the Lord hath put on his apparel, and girded himself with strength. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accōrding to Luke.

St. Luke 2. 15.

AT that time : The shepherds said one to another : Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made knōwn unto us. And they came with haste : and found Mary and Joseph, and the Babe lying in a manger. And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concēning this Child. And all they that heard it wondered at those things which were told them bȳ the shepherds. But Mary kept all these things, and pondered thēm in her heart. And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things that they had heard and seen, as it was told unto them. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 93.* God hath made the round world so sure, that it cannot be moved : ever since the world began hath thy seat, O God, been prepared : thou art from everlasting.

SECRET.

WE pray thee, O Lord, that these our oblations may be worthy of the mysteries which we celebrate on the Birth of thy Son, and may ever-

more shed forth thy peace within our hearts : that, even as he who was born in the substance of our manhood did shew forth therein the glory of the Godhead, so we, in these thy earthly creatures, may be made partakers of that which is heavenly. Through the same.

Of St. Anastasia. SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, graciously to accept our oblations : that by the merits and intercession of thy blessed Martyr, Saint Anastasia, they may be profitable to the advancement of our salvation. Through.

PREFACE and CANON as in the former Mass.

COMMUNION. *Zech. 9.* Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Sion, shout, O daughter of Jerusalem : behold, thy King cometh unto thee, he is just, and having salvation.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OR, who by thy wondrous Birth hast put off from us the old nature of our manhood : grant, we beseech thēe ; that by this new Sacrament of thy Nativity we may ever be inwardly renewed in our souls. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

Of St. Anastasia. POSTCOMMUNION.

OR, who hast vouchsafed to feed us thy household with thy heavenly gifts : mercifully grant ; that we, who celebrate the feast of thy blessed Martyr Anastasia, may at all times be comforted by her intercession. Through.

Station at St. Mary Major. Collect 1549.

INTROIT. *Puer natus est. Is. 9.*

UNTO us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given : and the government shall be upon his shoulder : and his Name shall be called, Angel of mighty counsel. *Ps. 98.* O sing unto the Lord a new song : for he hath done marvellous things. *℣.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY God, who hast given us thy only-begotten Son to take our nature upon him, and as at this time to be born ôf a pure Virgin : grant that we, being regenerate, and made thy children by adoption and grâce, may daily be renewed by thy Holy Spirit. Through the same our Lord, Jesus Chrîst. Who liveth and reigneth with thee and the same Spirit ever, ône God, world without end.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Hebrews. *Heb. 1. 1.*

GOD, who at sundry times and in divers manners spake in time past unto the fathers by the Prophets : hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son, whom he hath appointed heir of all things, by whom also he made the worlds : who being the brightness of his glory, and the express image of his person, and upholding all things by the word of his power, when he had by himself purged our sins, sat down on the right hand of the majesty on high ; being made so

much better than the Angels, as he hath by inheritance obtained a more excellent name than they. For unto which of the Angels said he at any time : Thou art my Son, † this day have I begotten thee? And again : I will be to him a Father, † and he shall be to m^e a Son? And again, when he bringeth in the first-begotten into the world, he saith : And let all the Angels of God worship him. And of the Angels he saith : Who maketh his Angels spirits, and his ministers a flame of fire. But unto the Son he saith : Thy throne, O God, is for ever and ever ; a sceptre of righteousness is the sceptre of thy kingdom : thou hast loved righteousness, and hated iniquity : therefore God, even thy God, hath anointed thee with the oil of gladness above thy fellows. And : Thou, Lord, in the beginning hast laid the foundation of the earth ; and the heavens are the works of thine hands : they shall perish, but thou remainest : and they all shall wax old as doth a garment : and as a vesture shalt thou fold them up, and they shall be changed ; but thou art the same, and thy years shall not fail.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 98.* All the ends of the world have seen the salvation of our God : O be joyful in God, all ye lands. *℣.* The Lord hath declared his salvation : in the sight of the heathen his righteousness hath he openly shewed.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣.* A hallowed day hath dawned upon us : come, all ye nations, and worship the Lord : for on this day a great light hath descended upon the earth. Alleluia.

✠ The Beginning of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John. *St. John* I. I.

IN the beginning was the Word; and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing mâde that was made. In him was life, and the life was the light of men. And the light shineth in darkness, and the darkness comprehended it not. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. The same came for a witness, to bear witness of the light, that all men through him might believe. He was not that light, but was sent to bear witness of that light. That was the true light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world. He was in the world, and the world was made by him, and the world knew him not. He came unto his own, and his own received him not. But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his Name: which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Hebrews. *Heb. 5. 1.*

BRETHREN : Every high priest taken from among men is ordained for men in things pertaining to God, that he may offer both gifts and sacrifices

for sins : who can have compassion on the ignorant, and on them that are out of the way ; for that he himself also is compassed with infirmity. But he that is an hireling, and not the shepherd, whose own the sheep are not, seeth the wolf coming, and leaveth the shêep, and fleeth ; and the wolf catcheth them, and scattêreth the sheep. The hireling fleeth, because he is an hireling, and

And when they had opened their treasures, they presented unto him gifts, gold, and frankincense, and myrrh. And being warned of God in a dream that they should not return to Herod : they departed into their own country another way. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 72.* The kings of Tharsis and of the isles shall give presents : the kings of Arabia and Saba shall bring gifts : all kings shall fall down before him, all nations shall do him service.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to look upon the oblations of thy Church : wherein no longer offering gold and frankincense and myrrh, we sacrifice and receive him who by those gifts was mystically signified, even Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

§ *Gloria in excelsis shall not be said from this day forth until Easter except on Maundy Thursday and Holy Saturday, and on days when the Mass of a Feast is appointed to be said.*

O LORD, we beseech thee favourably to hear the prayers ôf thy people : that we, who are justly punished for our offencês, may be mercifully delivered by thy goodness, for the glory of thy Name. Through Jesus Christ our Saviôur. Who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost ever, ône God, world without end.

§ *From Feb. 3rd unto the day before Ash Wednesday inclusive the Seasonal Prayers shall be said (unless a Double occur) as below, but if Septuagesima fall on or before the Feast of the Purification, they shall be said as on Dec. 30th.*

COLLECT 2. *Of the Saints.*

DEFEND us, O Lord, we beseech thee, from all dangers both of body and soul : and at the intercession of the blessed and glorious ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of God, of blessed Joseph, of thy holy Apostles Peter and Paul, of blessed N., and of all thy Saints, grant us thy saving health and peâce ; that being defended from all adversities and all false doctrines, thy Church may serve thee in freedom and quietness. (Through.)

COLLECT 3. *Ad Libitum.*

The LESSON from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians. *I Cor. 9. 24.*

BRETHREN : Know ye not that they which run in a race run all, † but one receivêth the prize? So run, that ye may obtain. And every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible crown ; but we an incorruptible. I therefore so run, not as uncertainly ; so fight I, not as one that beateth the air : but I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection : lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 9.* The Lord will be a refuge in the time of trouble : and they that know thy Name will

put their trust in thee : for thou, Lord, hast never failed them that seek thee. *℣.* For the poor shall not always be forgotten : the patient abiding of the meek shall not perish for ever : up, Lord, and let not man have the upper hand.

TRACT. *Ps.* 130. St. Matt. 20. 1.

AT that time ; Jesus spake this parable unto his disciples : The kingdom of heaven is like unto a man that is an householder, which went out early in the morning to hire labourers intô his vineyard. And when he had agreed with the labourers for a penny a day, he sent them intô his vineyard. And he went out about the third hour, and saw others standing idle in the marketplace, and said unto them : Go ye also into the vineyard, and whatsoever is right I will give you. And thêy went their way. Again he went out about the sixth and ninth hour, and did likewise. And about the eleventh hour he went out, and found others standing idle, and saith unto them : † Why stand ye here all the dây idle? They say unto him : Because no man hâth hirèd us. He

saith unto them : Go ye also into the vineyard ; and whatsoever is right, that shall ye receive. So when even was come, the lord of the vineyard saith unto his steward : Call the labourers, and give them their hire, beginning from the last ûnto the first. And when they came that were hired about the eleventh hour, they received every mân a penny. But when the first came, they supposed that they should have received more ; and they likewise received every mân a penny. And when they had received it, they murmured against the goodman of the house, saying : These last have wrought but one hour, and thou hast made them equal unto us, which have borne the burden and hêat of the day. But he answered one of them, and said : Friend, I do thee no wrong : † didst not thou agree with me for â penny? BRETHREN : Ye suffer fools gladly : seeing ye yourselves are wise. For ye suffer, if a man bring you into bondage, if a man devour you, if a man take of you, if a man exalt himself, if a man smite you on the face. I speak as concerning reproach, as though we had been weak. Howbeit whereinsoever any is bold (I speak foolishly), I am bold also. † Are they Hebrews? so am I. † Are they Israhelites? so am I. † Are they the seed of Abraham? so am I. † Are they

ministêrs of Christ? (I speak as a fool) I am more ; in labours more abundant, in stripes above measure, in prisons more frequent, in deaths oft. Of the Jews five times received I forty stripes save one. Thrice was I beaten with rods, once was I stoned, thrice I suffered shipwreck, a night and a day I have been in the deep ; in journeyings often ; in perils of waters ; in perils of robbers ; in perils by mine own countrymen ; in perils by the heathen ; in perils in the city ; in perils in the wilderness ; in perils in the sea ; in perils among false brethren ; in weariness and painfulness ; in watchings often ; in hunger and thirst ; in fastings often ; in cold and nakedness. Beside those things that are without, that which cometh upon me daily, the care of all the churches. Who is weak, † and I am not weak? who is offended, † and I burn not? If I must needs glory, I will glory of the things which concern mine infirmities. The God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, which is blessed for evermore, knoweth that I lie not.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 83. Let the heathen know that thou, whose Name is Jehovah : art only the Most Highest over all the earth. *V.* O my God, make them like unto a wheel : and as the stubble before the wind.

But that on the good ground

are they, which in an honest and good heart, having heard the word, keep it, and bring forth fruit with patience. *The Creed is said.*

I Cor. 13. 1.

BRETHREN . Though I speak with the tongues of men and of Angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal. And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries, and all knowledge : and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am nothing. And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing. Charity suffereth long, and is kind : charity envieth not, charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, doth not

But when that which is perfect is come, then that which is in part shall be done away. When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child : but when I became a man, I put away childish things. For now we see through a glass, darkly : but then face to face. Now I know in part ; but then shall I know even as also I am known. And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three ; but the greatest of these is charity.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 77. Thou art the God, that doeth wonders : and hast declared thy power among the people. *V.* Thou hast mightily delivered thy people : even the sons of Jacob and Joseph.

THE FIRST DAY OF LENT

Commonly Called Ash Wednesday

Privileged Feria of I Class

Before Mass shall be blessed ashes made of branches of olive or other trees blessed in the year foregoing; and the blessing shall be done in this manner:

§ *The Office being said, the Priest, wearing a violet Cope, or without a Chasuble (the Ministers being vested in like manner), shall go to bless the ashes, which shall be set in a vessel on the Altar. And first the Choir shall sing the Antiphon following.*

Ps. 69

HEAR me, O Lord, for thy loving-kindness is comfortable : turn thee unto me according to the multitude of thy mercies.

Ps. ibid. Save me, O God, for the waters are come in even unto my soul.

℣. Glory be.

Then shall be repeated the Antiphon
Hear me.

Then the Priest, standing at the Epistle corner without turning to the People, and with hands joined (which shall be observed in like manner in the prayers appointed for all blessings) shall say:

℣. The Lord be with you.

℟. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

PRAYER.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, we beseech thee to spare them that are penitent, and to be favourable to them that call upon thee. Vouchsafe, we pray thee, to send thy holy Angel from heaven to bless and sanctify these ashes, that they may be a wholesome medicine to all them that humbly call upon thy holy Name, who in their consciences by sin are accused, who in the sight of thy heavenly mercy bewail their sins, and earnestly and meekly implore thy gracious loving-kindness. And we beseech thee to

grant to all them that call upon thy holy Name, that being sprinkled with these ashes for the remission of their sins, they may be preserved evermore both in body and soul. Through Christ our Lord. R̄. Amen.

Let us pray.

O GOD, who wouldest not the death of a sinner, but rather that he should turn from his wickedness and live : we beseech thee to have compassion on the frailty of our mortal nature, and of thy goodness to bless these ashes now to be set upon our heads for a token of humility and for the remission of our sins : that we, acknowledging ourselves to be but dust and ashes, and that by reason of our vileness we must return unto the same, may of thy mercy be found worthy to obtain the pardon of our offences and the reward that thou dost promise to them that are penitent. Through Christ our Lord. R̄. Amen.

Let us pray.

O GOD, who turnest unto them that abase themselves and art favourable unto them that offer atonement : incline thy merciful ear unto our prayers ; and of thy pity pour forth upon the heads of thy servants now sprinkled with these ashes the grace of thy heavenly benediction : that they being filled with the spirit of true repentance may effectually obtain those things that they have asked according to thy will. And we beseech thee to ordain that we, being established in these thy blessings, may cleave unto the same to life everlasting. Through Christ our Lord. R̄. Amen.

Let us pray.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who upon the people of Nineveh, repenting in dust and ashes, didst bestow the healing of thy loving-kindness : mercifully grant, that we, who now do imitate them in outward fashion, may be made like unto them in the obtaining of thy pardon. Through.

§ *Then shall the Priest, setting incense in the censer, sprinkle the ashes thrice with holy water, saying the Antiphon Thou shalt purge, without singing and not saying the Psalm; and he shall cense them thrice.*

Thereafter the first of the Priests that are present shall draw near to the Altar and set ashes on the head of the Celebrant, who shall not genuflect. But if none be present, the Celebrant himself, kneeling afore the Altar, shall set ashes on his own head, saying nothing. And forthwith the Choir shall sing the Antiphon.

Joel 2. Let us change our raiment for sackcloth and ashes : let us fast and mourn before the Lord : for our God is merciful to forgive us our sins.

Another Antiphon. Ibid. Let the priests, the ministers of the Lord, weep between the porch and the altar, and let them say : Spare, O Lord, spare thy people, and shut not up, O Lord, the mouths of them that praise thee.

Then shall follow this Respond.

Esther 13. Joel 2. Let us amend the sins that in our ignorance we have committed : lest the day of death come upon us suddenly, and we find no place for repentance though we seek it. * Hear, Lord, and have mercy, for we have sinned against thee.

℣. *Ps.* 79. Help us, O God of our salvation : for the glory of thy Name deliver us, O Lord. Hear, Lord.

℣. Glory be. Hear, Lord.

§ *And the Priest, while the Antiphon and Respond are in singing, with his head uncovered, shall first set ashes on the head of the first of the Priests from whom he received them, and then upon the Ministers being vested and kneeling afore the Altar. And he shall say:*

Genesis 3. Remember, O man, that dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return.

§ *Then shall the rest draw near, first the Bishops, Priests and Deacons, according to their order, and after that the People; and all, meekly kneeling before the Altar, shall receive the ashes from the Priest after the manner appointed for the Ministers. And when all the ashes have been delivered, the Priest shall say:*

℣. The Lord be with you.

℞. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord, that we, who now with prayer and fasting do put upon us the armour of our Christian warfare, being defended by the power of abstinence, may fight manfully against all spiritual wickedness. Through Christ our Lord. ℞. Amen.

AT THE MASS

Station at St. Sabina. Collect 1549.

INTROIT. *Misereris omnium. Wisdom* 11.

THOU hast mercy upon all, O Lord, and abhorrest nothing which thou hast made, and winkest at the sins of men, because they should amend, and

sparest them : for thou art the Lord our God. *Ps.* 57. Be merciful unto me, O God, be merciful unto me : for my soul trusteth in thee. ℣. Glory be.

[*The Prayers in Lent are sung to the feria' tone except on Sundays, etc.*]

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who hatest nothing that thou hast made, and dost forgive the sins of all those whô are penitent : create and make in us new and contrite hêarts, that we worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of thee, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

§ *This Collect is to be said every day in Lent, after the Collect appointed for the day, until Palm Sunday.*

§ *On this day these two Prayers that follow are read after the Collect of the Day, but thereafter until Passion Sunday in Masses of the Season, when the above Collect is read after the one appointed for the day, then only the first one of these Prayers shall be said, and from Passion Sunday until Palm Sunday, only the Ash Wednesday Collect shall be said after the Collect for the day in Masses of the Season.*

COLLECT 2. *Of the Saints.*

DEFEND us, O Lord, we beseech thee, from all dangers both of body and soul : and at the intercession of the blessed and glorious ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of God, of blessed Joseph, of thy holy Apostles Peter and Paul, of blessed N., and of all thy

Saints, grant us thy saving health and p ace ; that being defended from all adversities and all false doctrines, thy Church may serve thee in freedom and quietness. (Through the same.)

COLLECT 3. *For the quick and dead.*

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who hast dominion both of the quick and of the dead, who likewise hast mercy upon all men, whom by reason of their faith and works thou hast foreknown : we commend unto thee all those for whom we now do offer our prayers, whether in this world they still be held in the bonds of the flesh, or being delivered therefrom have passed into that which is to come ; beseeching thee that at the intercession of all thy Saints they may of thy bountiful goodness obtain the remission of all their sins. Through.

The LESSON from Joel the Prophet.

Joel 2. 12.

TURN ye even unto me, saith the Lord, with all your heart, and with fasting, and with weeping, and with mourning. And rend your heart, and not your garments, and turn unto the Lord your God : for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and of great kindness, and repenteth him of the evil. Who knoweth if he will return, and repent, and leave a blessing behind him, ‡ even a meat-offering and a drink-offering unto the L ord your God? Blow the trumpet in Sion, sanctify a fast, call a solemn assembly, gather the people, sanctify the congregation, assemble the elders, gather the children, and those that suck the breast : let the bridegroom go forth of

his chamber, and the bride out of her closet. Let the priests, the ministers of the Lord, weep between the porch and the altar, and let them say : Spare thy people, O Lord, and give not thine heritage to reproach, that the heathen should rule over them. Wherefore should they say among the people : Where is their God?

GRADUAL. *Ps. 57.* Be merciful unto me, O God, be merciful unto me : for my soul trusteth in thee. V. He shall send from heaven, and save me from the reproof of him that would eat me up.

§ *And this Tract is said on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, from today on until Monday in Holy Week, unless a proper Tract be appointed.*

TRACT. *Ps. 103.* O Lord, deal not with us after our sins : nor reward us according to our wickednesses. V. *Ps. 79.* Lord, remember not our old sins, but have mercy upon us, and that soon : for we are come to great misery. V. (*Here genuflect.*) Help us, O God of our salvation, for the glory of thy Name, O Lord : O deliver us and be merciful unto our sins, for thy Name's sake.

† The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 6. 16.

AT that time ; Jesus said unto his disciples : When ye fast, be not as the hypocrites, of a sad countenance : for they disfigure their faces, that they may appear unto men to fast. Verily I say unto you, they have their reward. But thou, when thou fastest, anoint thine head, and wash

thy face, that thou appear not unto men to fast, but unto thy Father, which seêth in secret ; and thy Father, which seeth in secret, shall reward thêe openly. OD, to whom alone is known the number of thine elect, whom thou hast chosen to set in eternal felicity : grant, we beseech thee, that

at the intercession of all thy Saints the names of all them that are commended to our prayers and of all thy faithful people may be found written in the book of them that are ordained to everlasting blessedness. Through.

PREFACE OF LENT, *which is said daily until Passion Sunday even upon Feasts, unless a proper Preface be appointed for them.*

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord, that the gifts now offered by us in these holy mysteries may evermore cleanse and defend us : that at the intercession of the blessed Virgin Mary Mother of God, of blessed Joseph, of thy holy Apostles Peter and Paul, of blessed N., and of all thy Sâints, we may be absolved from all our offences and defended against all adversities. (Through the same.)

POSTCOMMUNION 3. *For the Quick and Dead.*

Seasonal Prayers as on Ash Wednesday.

The LESSON from Isaiah the Prophet.

Isaiah 38. 1.

IN those days : Hezekiah was sick unto death. And Isaiah the Prophet the son of Amoz came unto him, and said unto him : Thus saith the Lord : Set thine house in order : for thou shalt die, and not live. Then Hezekiah turned his face toward the wall, and prayed unto the Lord, and said : Remember now, O Lord, I beseech thee, how I have walked before thee in truth and with a perfect heart, and have done that which is good in thy sight. And Hezekiah wept sore. Then came the word of the Lord to Isaiah, saying : Go, and say to Hezekiah : Thus saith the Lord, the God of David thy father : I have heard thy prayer, I have seen thy tears : behold, I will add unto thy days fifteen years. And I will deliver thee and this city out of the hand of the king of Assyria : and I will defend this city, saith the Lord Almighty.

AT that time : When Jesus was entered into Capernaum, there came unto him a centurion, beseeching him, and saying : Lord, my servant lieth at home sick of the palsy, grievously tormented. The centurion answered and said : Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof : but speak the word only, and my servant shall be healed. For I am a man under authority, having soldiers under me ; and I say to this man : Go, and he goeth ; and to another : Come, and he cometh ; and to my servant : Do this, and he doeth it. When Jesus heard it, he marvelled, and said to them that followed : Verily I say unto you, I have not found so great faith, no, not in Israël. And I say unto you : That many shall come from the east and west, and shall sit down with Abraham, and Isaac, and Jacob, in the kingdom of heaven. But the children of the kingdom shall be cast out into outer darkness ; there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth. And Jesus said unto the centurion : Go thy way ; and as thou hast believed, so be it done unto thee. And his servant was healed in the selfsame hour.

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 25.* Unto thee, O Lord, will I lift up my soul : my God,

I have put my trust in thee, O let me not be confounded : neither let mine enemies triumph over me : for all they that hope in thee shall not be ashamed.

Behold, ye fast for strife and debate, and to smite with the fist of wickedness : ye shall not fast as ye do this day, to make your voice to be heard on high. † Is it such a fast that I have chosen? † a day for a man to afflict his soul? is it to bow down his head as a bulrush, † and to spread sackcloth and ashes under him? wilt thou call this a fast, † and an acceptable day to the Lord? † Is not this the fast that I have chosen? to loose the bands of

wickedness, to undo the heavy burdens, and to let the oppressed go free, † and that ye break every yoke? Is it not to deal thy bread to the hungry, † and that thou bring the poor that are cast out to thy house? when thou seest the naked, † that thou cover him ; † and that thou hide not thyself from thine own flesh? Then shall thy light break forth as the morning, and thine health shall spring forth speedily : and thy righteousness shall go before thee ; the glory of the Lord shall be thy rearward. Then shalt thou call, and the Lord shall answer ; thou shalt cry, and he shall say : Here I am. For I, the Lord thy God, am merciful.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 27.* One thing have I desired of the Lord, which I will require, even that I may dwell in the house of the Lord. *℣.* To behold the fair beauty of the Lord, and to visit his temple.

TRACT. *Ps. 103.* O Lord, deal not as on *Ash Wednesday.*

St. Matt. 5. 43.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : Ye have heard that it hath been said : Thou shalt love thy neighbour, and hate thine enemy. But I say unto you : Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you ; that ye may be the children of your Father which is in heaven ; for he maketh his sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sendeth rain on the just and on the unjust. For if ye love them which love you, † what

rewârd have ye? † do not even the publicâns the same? And if ye salute your brethren only, † what do ye more thàn others? † do not even the publicans so? Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heavên is perfect. * Take heed that ye do not your alms before men, to be seen of them : otherwise ye have no reward of your Father which is in heaven. Therefore when thou doest thine alms, do not sound a trumpet before thee, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may have glôry of men. Verily I say unto you, they hâve their reward. But when thou doest alms, let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth : that thine alms may bê in secret : and thy Father which seeth in secret himself shall rewârd thee openly.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 119. Quicken me, O Lord, according to thy word : that I may know thy testimonies.

The LESSON from Isaiah the Prophet.
Isaiah 58. 9.

THUS saith the Lord God : If thou take away from the midst of thee the yoke, the putting forth of the finger, and speaking vanity ; and if thou draw out thy soul to the hungry, and satisfy the afflicted soul ; then

shall thy light rise in obscurity, and thy darkness be as the noon day : and the Lord shall guide thee continually, and satisfy thy soul in drought, and make fat thy bones : and thou shalt be like a watered garden, and like a spring of water, whose waters fail not. And they that shall be of thee shall build the old waste places : thou shalt raise up the foundations of many generations ; and thou shalt be called, the repairer of the breach, the restorer of paths to dwell in. If thou turn away thy foot from the sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day ; and call the sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honourable ; and shalt honour him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words : then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord ; and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father : for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it.

pàssèd by them. But when they saw him walking upon the sea, they supposed it had been a spirit, and cried out : for they all saw him, and were troubled. And immediately he talked with them, and saith unto them : Be of good chœur : it is I ; bē not afraid. And he went up unto them into the ship ; and the wind ceased : and they were sore amazed in themselves beyond measure, and wonderèd. And when they were come out of the ship, straightway they knew him, and ran through that whole region round about, and began to carry about in beds those that were sick, where thēy heard he was. And whithersoever he entered, into villages, or cities, or country, they laid the sick in the streets, and besought him that they might touch if it were but the border ôf his garment : and as many as tōuched him were made whole.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 119. Quicken me, O Lord, according to thy word : that I may know thy testimonies.

SECRET.

O LORD, who of thy goodness hast vouchsafed to ordain this sacrifice for the propitiation of our sins : we beseech thee that thou wouldest graciously receive the same ; that the thoughts of our hearts, being cleansed by its operation, may be made an oblation acceptable in thy sight. Through.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians.

2 Cor. 6. 1.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 4. 1.

AT that time : Then was Jesus led up of the spirit into the wilderness, to be tempted of the devil. And when he had fasted forty days and forty

nights, he was afterward an-hungred. And when the tempter came to him, he said : If thou be the Son of God, command that these stônes be made bread. But he answered and said : It is written : Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of thê mouth of God. Then the devil taketh him up into the holy city, and setteth him on a pinnacle of the temple, and saith unto him : If thou be the Son of God, câst thyself down ; for it is written : He shall give his Angels charge concerning thee, and in their hands they shall bear thee up, lest at any time thou dash thy foot âgainst a stone. Jesus said unto him : It is written again : Thou shalt not tempt thê Lord thy God. Again, the devil taketh him up into an exceeding high mountain, and sheweth him all the kingdoms of the world, and the glory of them ; and saith unto him : All these things will I give thee, if thou wilt fall down and worship me. Then the devil leaveth him, and behold, Angels came and ministered unto him. *The Creed is said.*

Ezek. 34. 11.

THUS saith the Lord God : Behold, I, even I, will both search my sheep, and seek them out. As a shepherd seeketh out his flock in the day that he is among his sheep that are scattered ; so will I seek out my sheep, and will deliver them out of all places where they have been scattered in the cloudy and dark day. And I will bring them out from the people, and gather them from the countries, and will bring them to their own land : and feed them upon the mountains of Israel by the rivers, and in all the inhabited places of the country. I will feed them in a good pasture, and upon the high mountains of Israel shall their fold be : there shall they lie in a good fold, and in a fat pasture shall they feed upon the mountains of Israel. TRACT. *Ps.* 103. O Lord, deal not, as on Ash Wednesday.

St. Matt. 25. 31.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : When the Son of Man shall come in his glory, and all the

holy Angels with him, then shall he sit upon the throne of his glory : and before him shall be gathered all nations, and he shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats : and he shall set the sheep on his right hand, but the goats on the left. Then shall the King say unto them on his right hand : Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was an hungred, and ye gave me meat ; I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink ; I was a stranger, and ye took me in ; naked, and ye clothed me ; I was sick, and ye visited me ; I was in prison, and ye came unto me. Then shall the righteous answer him, saying : Lord, when saw we thee an hungred, and fed thee? or thirsty, and gave thee drink? When saw we thee a stranger, and took thee in? or naked, and clothed thee? Or when saw we thee sick, or in prison, and came unto thee? And the King shall answer and say unto them : Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me. Then shall he say also unto them on the left hand : Depart from me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was an hungred, and ye gave me no meat ; I was thirsty, and ye gave me no drink ; I was a stranger, and ye took me not in ; naked, and ye clothed me not ; sick, and in prison, and ye visited me not. Then shall they also answer him, saying : Lord, when saw we thee an hungred, or athirst, or a stranger, or naked, or sick, or in

prison, and did not minister unto thee? Then shall he answer them, saying : Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did it not to me. And these shall go away into everlasting punishment : but the righteous into life eternal.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 119. I will lift up mine eyes, O Lord, that I may see the wondrous things of thy law, that I may learn thy judgements : O give me understanding that I may learn thy commandments.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that thou wouldest vouchsafe to sanctify these our oblations : and to cleanse us from the defilement of all our iniquities. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. Matt.* 25. Verily I say unto you : Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me : come ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the beginning of the world.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OR Lord, who hast vouchsafed to bestow upon us the healing gifts of thy bounty : grant, we beseech thee ; that, like as we do rejoice in the partaking of the same, so they may be inwardly profitable to the renewing of our souls. Through.

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, absolve thy people from their offences : and of thy great mercy turn aside from us the punishment, which for the same we have most righteously deserved. Through.

Station at St. Anastasia.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, graciously to behold this thy family : that, whereas we now do chasten our bodies by the mortifying of the flesh, our souls may shine in thy sight with longing after thee. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on Ash Wednesday.

The LESSON from Isaiah the Prophet.
Isaiah 55. 6.

IN those days : Isaiah the Prophet spake, saying : Seek ye the Lord while he may be found, call ye upon him while he is near : let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts : and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him ; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon. For my thoughts are not your thoughts,

neither are your ways my ways, saith the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts. And he looked, and, behold, there was a cake baken on the coals, and a cruse of water at his head. And he did eat and drink, and laid him down again. The men of Nineveh shall rise in judgement with this generation, and shall condemn it : because they repented at the preaching of Jonas ; and, behold, a greater than Jônas is here. Then goeth he, and taketh with himself seven other spirits more wicked than himself, and they enter in and dwell there ; and the last state of that man is wôrse than the first. Even so shall it be also unto this wicked gênera-tion. While he yet talked to the people, behold, his mother and his brethren stood without, desiring tô speak with him. Then one said unto him : Behold, thy mother and thy brethren stand without, desiring tô speak with thee. But he answered and said unto him that told him : † Who is mÿ mother? † and who are mÿ brethren? And he stretched forth his hand towards his disciples, and said :

Behold my mother ând my brethren! For whosoever shall do the will of my Father which is in heaven, the same is my brother, and sîster, and mother.

But if the wicked will turn from all his sins that he hath committed, and keep all my statutes, and do that which is lawful and right, he shall surely live, he shall not die. All his transgressions that he hath committed, they shall not be mentioned unto him : in his righteousness that he hath done he shall live. † Have I any pleasure at all that the wicked should die? saith the Lord God : †

and not that he should return from his wâys, and live? But when the righteous turneth away from his righteousness, and committeth iniquity, and doeth according to all the abominations that the wicked man doeth, † shall he live? All his righteousness that he hath done shall not be mentioned : in his trespass that he hath trespassed, and in his sin that he hath sinned, in them shall he die. Yet ye say : The way of the Lord is not equal. Hear now, O house of Israel ; † Is not my wây equal? † are not your ways ûnequal? When a righteous man turneth away from his righteousness, and committeth iniquity and dieth in them ; for his iniquity that he hath done shall he die. Again, when the wicked man turneth away from his wickedness that he hath committed, and doeth that which is lawful and right, he shall save his soul alive. Because he considereth, and turneth away from all his transgressions that he hath committed, he shall surely live, he shall not die, saith the Lord Almighty.

GRADUAL. Ps. 86. My God, save thy servant that putteth his trust in thee. V. Give ear, Lord, unto my prayer.

TRACT. Ps. 103. O Lord, deal not, as on Ash Wednesday.

St. John 5. 1.

AT that time : There was a feast of the Jews ; and Jesus went up to Jêrusalem. Now there is at Jerusalem by the sheep market a pool, which is

called in the Hebrew tongue Bethesda, having five porches. In these lay a great multitude of impotent folk, of blind, halt, withered, waiting for the moving ôf the water. For an Angel went down at a certain season into the pool, and troublêd the water ; who-soever then first after the troubling of the water stepped in was made whole of whatsoever disease he had. And a certain man was there, which had an infirmity thirtÿ and eight years. When Jesus saw him lie, and knew that he had been now a long time in that case, he saith unto him : † Wilt thou bê made whole? The impotent man answered him : Sir, I have no man, when the water is troubled, to put me into the pool ; but while I am coming, another steppeth dôwn before me. Jesus saith unto him : Rise, take up thÿ bed, and walk. And immediately the man was made whole, and took up his bêd, and walkêd ; and on the same day wâs the sabbath. The Jews therefore said unto him that was cured : It is thê sabbath day ; it is not lawful for thee to cârry thy bed. He answered them : He that made me whole, the same said unto me : Take up thÿ bed, and walk. Then asked they him : What man is that which said unto thee : † Take up thy bêd, and walk? And he that was healed wist not who it was : for Jesus had conveyed himself away, a multitude being in that place. Afterward Jesus findeth him in the temple, and said unto him : Behold, thôu art made whole ; sin no more, lest a worse thing côme unto thee. The man departed, and told the Jews that it was Jesus, which had mâde him whole.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 103. Praise the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits : who satisfieth thy mouth with good things : making thee young and lusty as an eagle.

SECRET.

ACCEPT, O Lord, we pray thee, these oblations of our bounden service : and like as thou hast thyself bestowed these gifts upon us, so do thou of thy mercy sanctify the same. Through.

Dan. 9. 15.

IN those days : Daniel prayed unto the Lord, saying : O Lord our God, that hast brought thy people forth out of the land of Egypt with a mighty hand, and hast gotten thee renown, as at this day ; we have sinned, we have done wickedly. O Lord, according to all thy righteousness, I beseech thee, let thine anger and thy fury be turned away from thy city Jerusalem, thy holy mountain : because for our sins, and for the iniquities of our fathers, Jerusalem and thy people are become a reproach to all that are about us. AT that time ; Jesus said unto the multitude of the Jews : I go my way, and ye shall seek me, and shall die in your sins ; whither I go, yê cannot come. Then said the Jews : ‡ Will he kill himself? because he saith : Whither I go, yê cannot come. And he said unto them : Ye are from beneath ; I am from above ; ye are of this world ; I am nôt of this world. I said therefore unto you, that ye shall die in your sins : for if ye believe not that I am he, ye shall die in your sins. Then said they unto him : ‡ Whô art thou? And Jesus saith unto them : Even the same that I said unto you from thê beginning. I have many things to say and to judge of you : but he that sênt me is true ; and I speak to the world those things which I hâve heard of him. They understood not that he spake to them ôf the Father. Then said Jesus unto them : When ye have lifted up the Son of Man, then shall ye know that I am he, and that I do nothing of myself ; but as my Father hath taught me, I speak these things. And he that sent me is with me : the Father hath not lêft me alone ; for I do always thôse things that please him.

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 16.* I will thank the Lord for giving me warning : I have set God always before me : for he is on my right hand, therefore I shall not fall.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord, that this our sacrifice of atonement and thanksgiving may render us

I Kings 17. 8.

IN those days : The word of the Lord came unto Elijah the Tishbite, saying : Arise ; get thee to Zarephath, which belongeth to Zidon, and dwell there : behold I have commanded a widow woman there to sustain thee. So he arose and went to Zarephath. And when he came to the gate of the city, behold, the widow woman was there gathering of sticks : and he called to her, and said : Fetch me, I pray thee, a little water in a vessel, that I may drink. And as she was going to fetch it, he called to her, and said : Bring me, I pray thee, a morsel of bread in thine hand. And she said : As the Lord thy God liveth, I have not a cake, but an handful of meal in a barrel, and a little oil in a cruse : and, behold, I am gathering two sticks, that I may go in and dress it for me and my son, that we may eat it, and die. And Elijah said unto her : Fear not ; go and do as thou hast said : but make me thereof a little cake first, and bring it unto me, and after make for thee and for thy son. For thus saith the Lord God of Israel : The barrel of meal shall not waste, neither shall the cruse of oil fail, until the day that the Lord sendeth rain upon the earth. And she went and did according to the saying of Elijah : and she, and he, and her house, did eat many days. And the barrel of meal wasted not, neither did the cruse of oil fail, according to the word of the Lord, which he spake by Elijah.

GRADUAL. Ps. 55. O cast thy burden upon the Lord : and he shall

nourish thee. V̄. When I cried unto the Lord he heard my voice, from the battle that was against me.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 23. 1.

AT that time : Jesus spake unto the multitudes and to his disciples, saying : The scribes and Pharisees sit in Moses' seat. All therefore whatsoever they bid you observe, that observe and do ; but do not ye after their works : for they sâ, and do not. For they bind heavy burdens and grievous to be borne and lay them on men's shoulders : but they themselves will not move them with one ôf their fingers. But all their works they do for to bê seen of men ; they make broad their phylacteries, and enlarge the borders of their garments, and love the uppermost rooms at feasts, and the chief seats in the synagogues, and greetings in the markets, and to be called of men, Râbbi, Rabbi. But be not ye called Rabbi : for one is your master, even Christ : and all yê are brethren. And call no man your father upon the earth : for one is your Father, which is in heaven. Neither be ye called masters : for one is your mastêr, even Christ. But he that is greatest among you shall bê your servant. And who-soever shall exalt himself shall bê abasèd ; and he that shall humble himself shall be exalted.

OFFERTORY. Ps. 51. Have mercy upon me, O God, after thy great goodness : O Lord, do away mine offences.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that by these holy mysteries thou wouldest be pleased to accomplish in us thy work of sanctification : that we, being cleansed from all earthly and carnal vices, may attain thy gift of everlasting life. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 9. I will speak of all thy marvellous works : I will be glad and rejoice in thee : yea, my songs will I make of thy Name, O thou Most Highest.

The LESSON from the Book of Esther.
Esther 13. 8.

IN those days : Mardocheus thought upon all the works of the Lord, and made his prayer unto him, saying : O Lord, Lord, the King Almighty : for the whole world is in thy power, and if thou hast appointed to save Israel, there is no man that can gainsay thee : for thou hast made heaven and earth, and all the wondrous things under the heaven. Thou art Lord of all things, and there is no man that can resist thee, which art the Lord. And now, O Lord God and King, spare thy people : for their eyes are upon us to bring us to nought : yea, they desire to destroy the inheritance, that hath been thine from the beginning. Despise not the portion, which thou hast delivered out of Egypt for thine own self. Hear my prayer, and be merciful unto thine inheritance : turn our sorrow into joy, that we may live, O Lord, and praise thy Name : and destroy not the mouths of them that praise thee, O Lord.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 28. O Lord, save thy people, and give thy blessing unto thine inheritance. *℣.* Unto thee will

I cry, O Lord my strength : think no scorn of me, lest I become like unto them that go down into the pit.

TRACT. *Ps.* 103. O Lord, deal not, as on *Ash Wednesday*.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 20. 17.

AT that time : Jesus going up to Jerusalem took the twelve disciples apart in the way, and said unto them : Behold, we go up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man shall be betrayed unto the chief priests, and unto the scribes ; and they shall condemn him to death ; and shall deliver him to the Gentiles to mock, and to scourge and to crucify him ; and the third day he shall rise again. Then came to him the mother of Zebedee's children with her sons, worshipping him, and desiring a certain thing of him. And he said unto her : ‡ Whât wilt thou? She saith unto him : Grant that these my two sons may sit, the one on thy right hand, and the other on the left, in thy kingdom. But Jesus answered and said : Ye know nôt what ye ask. Are ye able to drink of the cup that I shall drink of, ‡ and to be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with? They say unto him : Wê are able. And he saith unto them : Ye shall drink indeed of my cup, and be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with ; but to sit on my right hand, and on my left, is nôt mine to give ; but it shall be given to them for whom it is prepared ôf my Father. And when the ten heard it, they were moved with indignation against thê two

brethren. But Jesus called them unto him, and said : Ye know that the princes of the Gentiles exercise dominion over them, and they that are great exercise authority upon them. But it shall not be sô among you ; but whosoever will be great among you, let him be yôur minister ; and whosoever will be chief among you, let him bê your servant ; even as the Son of Man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a rãnsora for many.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 25. Unto thee, O Lord, will I lift up my soul : my God, I have put my trust in thee, O let me not be confounded : neither let mine enemies triumph over me : for all they that hope in thee shall not be ashamed.

SECRET.

WE pray thee, O Lord, look down in mercy on the sacrifice, which we here present unto thee : that we, drawing near unto thee in these holy mysteries, may by the same be delivered from the chains of the sins which we have committed. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 11. The righteous Lord loveth righteousness : his countenance will behold the thing that is just.

HASTE thee, O God, to deliver me : make haste to help me, O Lord : let them be ashamed and confounded that seek after my soul. *Ps. ibid.* Let them be turned backward and put to confusion : that wish me evil. *℣.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

GRANT to us, Lord, we beseech thee, the help of thy grace : that we, being devoutly given to abstinence and prayer, may be preserved both in body and soul from all the assaults of our enemies. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on Ash Wednesday.

The LESSON from Jeremiah the Prophet. *Jer. 17. 5.*

THUS saith the Lord God : Cursed be the man that trusteth in man, and maketh flesh his arm, and whose heart departeth from the Lord. For he shall be like the heath in the desert, and shall not see when good cometh ; but shall inhabit the parched places in the wilderness, in a salt land and not inhabited. Blessed is the man that trusteth in the Lord, and whose hope

the Lord is. For he shall be as a tree planted by the waters, and that spreadeth out her roots by the river, and shall not see when heat cometh, but her leaf shall be green ; and shall not be careful in the year of drought, neither shall cease from yielding fruit. The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked : † who can know it? I the Lord search the heart : I try the reins, even to give every man according to his ways, and according to the fruit of his doings, saith the Lord Almighty.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 79.* Be merciful unto our sins, O Lord ; wherefore do the heathen say : Where is now their God? *℣.* Help us, O God of our salvation : for the glory of thy Name deliver us, O Lord.

† The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Luke.

St. Luke 16. 19.

AT that time : Jesus said unto the Pharisees : There was a certain rich man, which was clothed in purple and fine linen, and fared sumptuously every day. And there was a certain beggar named Lazarus, which was laid at his gate full of sores, and desiring to be fed with the crumbs which fell from the rich man's table ; moreover the dogs came and licked his sores. And it came to pass, that the beggar died, and was carried by the Angels into Abraham's bosom. The rich man also died, and was buried : and in hell he lift up his eyes, being in torments, and seeth Abraham afar off, and Lazarus in his bosom. And he cried and said : Father Abraham, have mercy on

me, and send Lazarus, that he may dip the tip of his finger in water, and cool my tongue ; for I am tormentèd in this flame. But Abraham said : Son, remember that thou in thy lifetime receivedst thy good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things ; but now he is comforted, and thou art tormented. And besides all this, between us and you there is a great gulf fixed : so that they who would pass from hence to you cannot ; neither can they pass to us, that would come from thence. Then he said : I pray thee therefore, father, that thou wouldest send him to my father's house : for I have five brethren : that he may testify unto them, lest they also come into this place of torment. Abraham saith unto him : They have Moses and the Prophets ; let them hear them. And he said : Nay, father Abraham ; but if one went unto them from the dead, they will repent. And he said unto him : If they hear not Moses and the Prophets, neither will they be persuaded, though one rise from the dead.

OFFERTORY. *Exod. 32.* Moses besought the Lord his God, and said : Why, O Lord, doth thy wrath wax hot against thy people? Turn from thy fierce wrath ; remember Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, to whom thou swarest to give a land flowing with milk and honey ; and the Lord repented of the evil which he thought to do unto his people.

SECRET.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that the fast, which we have dedicated to the honour of thy Name, may by

our present sacrifice be sanctified in thy sight : that this profession of our outward observance may inwardly work in us to good effect. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. John 6.* He that eateth my Flesh and drinketh my Blood, dwelleth in me, and I in him, saith the Lord.

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that we thy servants, never failing of the succour of thy grace, may in all things be devoutly given to thy holy service and stablished by thy continual help. Through.

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

ASSIST, O Lord, we pray thee, us thy servants, who call on the perpetual bounty of thy loving-kindness : and, forasmuch as we do glory in thee alone, our author and our governour, vouchsafe that we may be in all things united and restored by thee, and evermore preserved in that state, whereunto thou dost restore us. Through.

FRIDAY

Station at St. Vitalis.

INTROIT. *Ego autem. Ps. 17.*

As for me, I will behold thy presence in righteousness : and when I awake up after thy likeness I shall be satisfied with it. *Ps. ibid.* Hear the right, O Lord : consider my complaint. *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY God, we humbly beseech thee, that we may in such wise be cleansed by this holy time of fasting, that we may keep the coming feast in all sincerity. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on Ash Wednesday.

The LESSON from the Book of Genesis.
Gen. 37. 6.

IN those days : Joseph said unto his brethren : Hear, I pray you, this dream which I have dreamed : For, behold, we were binding sheaves in the field, and lo, my sheaf arose, and also stood upright ; and, behold, your sheaves stood round about, and made obeisance to my sheaf. And his brethren said to him : † Shalt thou indeed reign ôver us? † or shalt thou indeed have dominion ôver us? And they hated him yet the more for his dreams, and for his words. And he dreamed yet another dream, and told it his brethren, and said : Behold, I have dreamed a dream more ; and, behold, the sun and the moon and the eleven stars made obeisance to me. And he told it to his father, and to his brethren : and his father rebuked him, and said unto him : † What is this dream that thou hast dreamed? † Shall I and thy mother and thy brethren indeed come to bow down ourselves to thee tô the earth? And his brethren envied him : but his father observed the saying. And his brethren went to feed their father's flock in Shechem. And Israel said unto Joseph : † Do not thy brethren feed the flock in Shechem? come, and I will send thee unto them.

And he said to him : Here am I. And he said to him : Go, I pray thee, see whether it be well with thy brethren, and well with the flocks : and bring me word again. So he sent him out of the vale of Hebron, and he came to Shechem. And a certain man found him, and, behold, he was wandering in the field : and the man asked him, saying : † What sêkest thou? And he said : I seek my brethren : tell me, I pray thee, where they feed their flocks. And the man said : They are departed hence : for I heard them say : Let us go to Dothan. And Joseph went after his brethren, and found them in Dothan. And when they saw him afar off, even before he came near unto them, they conspired against him to slay him. And they said one to another : behold, this dreamer cometh. Come now therefore, and let us slay him, and cast him in some pit, and we will say : Some evil beast hath devoured him : and we will see what will become of his dreams. And Reuben heard it, and he delivered him out of their hands : and said : Let us not kill him. And Reuben said : Shed no blood, but cast him into this pit that is in the wilderness, and lay no hand upon him : that he might rid him out of their hands, to deliver him to his father again.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 120.* When I was in trouble, I called upon the Lord, and he heard me. *V.* Deliver my soul, O Lord, from lying lips, and from a deceitful tongue.

TRACT. *Ps. 103.* O Lord, deal not, *as on Ash Wednesday.*

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 21. 33.

AT that time : Jesus spake this parable unto the multitudes of the Jews and the chief priests : There was a certain householder, which planted a vineyard, and hedged it round about, and digged a winepress in it, and built a tower, and let it out to husbandmen, and went into a far country ; and when the time of the fruit drew near, he sent his servants to the husbandmen, that they might receive the fruits of it. And the husbandmen took his servants, and beat one, and killed another, and stoned another. Again, he sent other servants more than the first : and they did unto them likewise. But last of all he sent unto them his son, saying : They will reverence my son. But when the husbandmen saw the son, they said among themselves : This is the heir ; come, let us kill him, and let us seize on his inheritance. And they caught him, and cast him out of the vineyard, and slew him. When the lord therefore of the vineyard cometh, ‡ what will he do unto those husbandmen? They say unto him : He will miserably destroy those wicked men, and will let out his vineyard unto other husbandmen, which shall render him the fruits in their seasons. * Jesus saith unto them : Did ye never read in the Scriptures : The stone which the builders rejected, the same is become the head of the corner : this is the Lord's doing, ‡ and it is marvellous in our eyes? Therefore I say unto you : The kingdom of God shall be taken from you and given to a

nation bringing forth the fruits thereof. And whosoever shall fall on this stone shall be broken : but on whomsoever it shall fall, it shall grind him to powder. And when the chief priests and Pharisees had heard his parables, they perceived that he spake of them. But when they sought to lay hands on him, they feared the multitude, because they took him for a Prophet.

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 40.* Make haste, O Lord, to help me : let them be ashamed and confounded together, that seek after my soul to destroy it : make haste, O Lord, to help me.

SECRET.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that this holy sacrifice may continually work in us to good effect, and be strengthened in the power of its operation. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps. 12.* Thou shalt keep us, O Lord : thou shalt preserve us from this generation for ever.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O LORD, who hast bestowed on us these pledges of our salvation : grant us, we pray thee, that we may so walk worthily of the same that we may attain unto their fulfilment in everlasting life. Through.

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

KEEP, we beseech thee, O Lord, thy faithful people both outwardly in their bodies and inwardly in their souls : that they, cleaving stedfastly to all good works, may ever be defended by thy mighty power. Through.

*Station at SS. Marcellinus and Peter.*INTROIT. *Lex Domini. Ps. 19.*

The LESSON from the Book of Genesis. *Gen. 27. 6.*

IN those days : [Rebekah spake unto Jacob her son, saying : Behold, I heard thy father speak unto Esau thy brother, saying : Bring me venison, and make me savoury meat, that I may eat, and bless thee before the Lord before my death. Now, therefore, my son, obey my voice according to that which I command thee. Go now to the flock, and fetch me from thence two good kids of the goats ; and I will make them savoury meat for thy father, such as he loveth : and thou shalt bring it to thy father, that he may eat, and that he may bless thee before his death. And Jacob said

to Rebekah, his mother : Behold, Esau my brother is a hairy man, and I am a smooth man : my father peradventure will feel me, and I shall seem to him as a deceiver : and I shall bring a curse upon me, and not a blessing. And his mother said unto him : Upon me be thy curse, my son : only obey my voice, and go fetch me them. And he went, and fetched, and brought them to his mother : and his mother made savoury meat, such as his father loved. And Rebekah took goodly raiment of her eldest son Esau, which were with her in the house, and put them upon Jacob her younger son : and she put the skins of the kids of the goats upon his hands, and upon the smooth of his neck : and she gave the savoury meat and the bread, which she had prepared, into the hand of her son Jacob. And he came unto his father, and said : My father : and he said : Here am I ; † who art thou, my son? And Jacob said unto his father : I am Esau thy firstborn ; I have done according as thou badest me : arise, I pray thee, sit and eat of my venison, that thy soul may bless me. And Isaac said unto his son : † How is it that thou hast found it so quicklÿ, my son? And he said : Because the Lord thy God brought it to me. And] Isaac said unto Jacob : Come near, I pray thee, that I may feel thee, my son, whether thou be my very son Esau or not. And Jacob went near unto Isaac his father ; and he felt him, and said : The voice is Jacob's voice, but the hands are the hands of Esau. And he discerned him not, because his hands were hairy, as his brother Esau's hands : so he blessed him. And he

said : † Art thou my very sôn Esau? And he said : I am. And he said : Bring it near to me, and I will eat of my son's venison, that my soul may bless thee. And he brought it near to him, and he did eat : and he brought him wine, and he drank. And his father Isaac said unto him : Come near now, and kiss me, my son. And he came near, and kissed him : and he smelled the smell of his raiment, and blessed him, and said : See, the smell of my son is as the smell of a field which the Lord hath blessed : therefore God give thee of the dew of heaven, and the fatness of the earth, and plenty of corn and wine : let people serve thee, and nations bow down to thee : be lord over thy brethren, and let thy mother's sons bow down to thee : cursed be every one that curseth thee, and blessed be he that blesseth thee. And it came to pass, as soon as Isaac had made an end of blessing Jacob, and Jacob was yet scarce gone out from the presence of Isaac his father, that Esau his brother came in from his hunting. And he also had made savoury meat, and brought it unto his father, and said unto his father : Let my father arise, and eat of his son's venison, that thy soul may bless me. And Isaac his father said unto him : † Whô art thou? And he said : I am thy son, thy firstborn Esau. And Isaac trembled very exceedingly, and said : † Who? where is he that hath taken venison, and brought it me, and I have eaten of all before thou camest, † and have blêssed him? yea, and he shall be blessed. And when Esau heard the words of his father, he cried with a great and exceeding bitter

cry, and said unto his father : Bless me, even me also, O my father. And he said : Thy brother came with subtilty, and hath taken away thy blessing. And he said : † Is not he rightly namêd Jacob? for he hath supplanted me these two times : he took away my birthright ; and, behold, now he hath taken away my blessing. And he said : † Hast thou not reserved a blessing for me? And Isaac answered and said unto Esau : Behold, I have made him thy lord, and all his brethren have I given to him for servants : and with corn and wine have I sustained him : † and what shall I do now unto thêe, my son? And Esau said unto his father : † Hast thou but one blessing for me, mÿ father? bless me, even me also, O my father. And Esau lifted up his voice and wept. And Isaac his father answered and said unto him : Behold, thy dwelling shall be the fatness of the earth, and of the dew of heaven above.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 92. It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord : and to sing praises unto thy Name, O Most Highest. *V.* To tell of thy loving-kindness early in the morning, and of thy truth in the night-season.

AT that time Jesus spake this parable unto the scribes and Pharisees : A certain man had two sons, and the younger of them said to his father : Father, give me the portion of goods that fâlleth to me. And he divided unto thêem his living. And not many days after the younger son gathered

all together, and took his journey into a far country, and there wasted his substance with riotous living. And when he had spent all, there arose a mighty famine in that land : and he began to be in want. And he went and joined himself to a citizen of that country ; and he sent him into his fields to feed swine. And he would fain have filled his belly with the husks that the swine did eat : and no man gave unto him. And when he came to himself, he said : How many hired servants of my father's have bread enough and to spare, and I perish with hunger! I will arise and go to my father, and will say unto him : Father, I have sinned against heaven, and before thee, and am no more worthy to be called thy son ; make me as one of thy hired servants. And he arose, and came to his father. But when he was yet a great way off, his father saw him, and had compassion, and ran, and fell on his neck, and kissed him. And the son said unto him : Father, I have sinned against heaven, and in thy sight, and am no more worthy to be called thy son. But the father said to his servants : Bring forth the best robe, and put it on him : and put a ring on his hand, and shoes on his feet ; and bring hither the fatted calf and kill it ; and let us eat, and be merry : for this my son was dead, and is alive again ; he was lost, and is found. And they began to be merry. Now his elder son was in the field : and as he came and drew nigh to the house, he heard musick and dancing. And he called one of the servants, and asked what these things meant. And he said unto him : Thy brother is

come : and thy father hath killed the fatted calf, because he hath received him safe and sound. And he was angry, and would not go in ; therefore came his father out, and entreated him. And he answering said to his father : Lo, these many years do I serve thee, neither transgressed I at any time thy commandment : and yet thou never gavest me at any time a kid, that I might make merry with my friends : but as soon as this thy son was come, which hath devoured thy living with harlots, thou hast killed for him the fatted calf. And he said unto him : Son, thou art ever with me, and all that I have is thine. It was meet that we should make merry, and be glad : for thy brother was dead, and is alive again ; and was lost, and is found.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 13. Lighten mine eyes that I sleep not in death : lest mine enemy say : I have prevailed against him.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to look upon these our oblations : and grant that like as we do pray to be delivered from the sins which we have committed, so we may be preserved from all the devices of our enemies. Through.

WE beseech thee, Almighty God, look upon the hearty desires of thy humble servants : and stretch forth the right hand of thy majesty, to be our defence against all our enemies. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. [Who.]

Seasonal Prayers as on Ash Wednesday.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Ephesians.
Eph. 5. 1.

BRETHREN : Be ye therefore followers of God, as dear children ; and walk in love, as Christ also hath loved us, and hath given himself for us, an offering and a sacrifice to God for a sweet-smelling savour. But fornication, and all uncleanness, or covetousness, let it not be once named amongst you, as becometh saints ; neither filthiness, nor foolish talking, nor jesting, which are not convenient ; but rather giving of thanks ; for this ye know, that no whoremonger, nor unclean person, nor covetous man, who is an idolater, hath any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ, and of God. Let no man deceive you with vain words : for because of these things cometh the wrath of God upon the children of disobedience. Be not ye therefore partakers with them : for ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord : walk as children of light ; (for the fruit of the Spirit is in all goodness, and righteousness, and truth ;) proving what is acceptable unto the Lord. And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them : for it is a shame even to speak of those things which are done of them in secret. But all things that are re-proved are made manifest by the light : for whatsoever doth make manifest is light. Wherefore he saith : Awake, thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 9.* Up, Lord, and let not man have the upper hand : let the heathen be judged in thy sight. *V.* While mine enemies are driven back, they shall fall and perish at thy presence.

TRACT. *Ps.* 123. Unto thee lift I up mine eyes, O thou that dwellest in the heavens. *℣.* Behold, even as the eyes of servants look unto the hand of their masters. *℣.* And as the eyes of a maiden unto the hand of her mistress : even so our eyes wait upon the Lord our God, until he have mercy upon us. *℣.* Have mercy upon us, O Lord, have mercy upon us.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 11. 14.

AT that time : Jesus was casting out a devil, and it was dumb. And it came to pass, when the devil was gone out, the dumb spake ; and the peoplê wonderèd. But some of them said : He casteth out devils through Beelzebub, the chief ôf the devils. And others, tempting him, sought of him a sîgn from heaven. But he, knowing their thoughts, said unto them : Every kingdom divided against itself is brought to desolation ; and a house divided against â house falleth. If Satan also be divided against himself, ‡ how shall his kingdom stand? because ye say, that I cast out devils through Bêelzebub. And if I by Beelzebub cast out devils, ‡ by whom do your sons câst them out? therefore shall they bê your judges. But if I with the finger of God, cast out devils, no doubt the kingdom of God is côme upon you. When a strong man armed, keepeth his palace, his gôods are in peace ; but when a stronger than he shall come upon him, and overcome him, he taketh from him all his armour wherein he trusted, and divideth his spoils. He

that is not with me is against me ; and he that gathereth not with mê scattereth. When the unclean spirit is gone out of a man, he walketh through dry placês, seeking rest ; and finding none, he saith : I will return unto my house whênce I came out. And when he cometh, he findeth it swept and garnishèd. Then goeth he and taketh to him seven other spirits more wicked than himself, and they enter in, and dwell there ; and the last state of that man is wôrse than the first. And it came to pass, as he spake these things, a certain woman of the company lifted up her voice, and said unto him : Blessed is the womb that bare thee, and the paps which thôu hast suckèd. But he said : Yea rather, blessed are they that hear the word of Gôd, and keep it. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 19. The statutes of the Lord are right, and rejoice the heart, sweeter also than honey and the honeycomb : moreover thy servant keepeth them.

SECRET.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that this oblation may in such wise cleanse us from all our sins : that we thy servants, being sanctified both in body and soul, may worthily offer unto thee this our sacrifice. Through.

The LESSON from the Book of the Kings.
2 Kings 5. 1.

IN those days : Naaman, captain of the host of the king of Syria, was a great man with his master, and honourable, because by him the Lord had given deliverance unto Syria : he was also a mighty man in valour, but he was a leper. And the Syrians had gone out by companies, and had brought away captive out of the land of Israel

a little maid : and she waited on Naaman's wife. And she said unto her mistress : Would God, my Lord, were with the Prophet that is in Samaria! for he would recover him of his leprosy. And one went in, and told his lord, saying : Thus and thus said the maid that is of the land of Israel. And the king of Syria said : Go to, go, and I will send a letter unto the king of Israel. And he departed, and took with him ten talents of silver, and six thousand pieces of gold, and ten changes of raiment. And he brought the letter to the king of Israel, saying : Now when this letter is come unto thee, behold, I have therewith sent Naaman my servant to thee, that thou mayest recover him of his leprosy. And it came to pass, when the king of Israel had read the letter, that he rent his clothes, and said : Am I God, to kill and to make alive, † that this man doth send unto me to recover a man of his lêprosy? wherefore consider, I pray you, and see how he seeketh a quarrel against me. And it was so, when Elisha the man of God had heard that the king of Israel had rent his clothes, that he sent to the king, saying : † Wherefore hast thou rent thy clothes? let him come now to me, and he shall know that there is a Prophet in Israel. So Naaman came with his horses and with his chariot, and stood at the door of the house of Elisha. And Elisha sent a messenger unto him, saying : Go and wash in Jordan seven times, and thy flesh shall come again to thee, and thou shalt be clean. But Naaman was wroth, and went away, and said : Behold, I thought, he will surely come out to me, and stand, and

call on the Name of the Lord his God, and strike his hand over the place, and recover the leper. Are not Abana and Pharpar, rivers of Damascus, † better than all the waters of Îsraël? † may I not wash in them, and be clean? So he turned and went away in a rage. And his servants came near, and spake unto him, and said : My father, if the Prophet had bid thee do some great thing, † wouldest thou not have done it? how much rather then, when he saith to thee : † Wash, and be clean? Then went he down, and dipped himself seven times in Jordan, according to the saying of the man of God : and his flesh came again like unto the flesh of a little child, and he was clean. And he returned to the man of God, he and all his company, and came and stood before him : and he said : Behold, now I know that there is no God in all the earth, but in Israel.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 56. Thou, O God, tellest my flittings : put my tears into thy bottle. *V.* Be merciful unto me, O God, for man goeth about to devour me : he is daily fighting, and troubling me.

TRACT. *Ps.* 103. O Lord, deal not, as on Ash Wednesday.

† The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Luke.

St. Luke 4. 23.

AT that time : Jesus said unto the Pharisees : Ye will surely say unto me this proverb : Physician, heal thyself ; whatsoever we have heard done in Capernaum, do also here in thy country. And he said : Verily I say unto you, No prophet is accepted in

his own country. But I tell you of a truth, many widows were in Israel in the days of Elias, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, when great famine was throughout all the land ; but unto none of them was Elias sent, save unto Sarepta, a city of Sidon, unto a woman that was a widow. And many lepers were in Israel in the time of Eliseus the Prophet ; and none of them was cleansed, saving Naaman the Syrian. And all they in the synagogue, when they heard these things, were filled with wrath, and rose up, and thrust him out of the city, and led him unto the brow of the hill whereon their city was built, that they might cast him down headlong. But he passing through the midst of them went his way.

The LESSON from the Book of the Kings. *2 Kings 4. 1.*

IN those days : A certain woman cried unto Elisha the Prophet, saying : Thy servant, my husband, is dead : and thou knowest that thy servant did fear the Lord : and the creditor is come to take unto him my two sons to be bondmen. And Elisha said unto

her : † What shall I do for thee? tell me, † what hast thou in the house? And she said : Thine handmaid hath not anything in the house, save a pot of oil. Then he said : Go, borrow thee vessels abroad of all thy neighbours, even empty vessels ; borrow not a few. And when thou art come in, thou shalt shut the door upon thee and upon thy sons, and shalt pour out into all those vessels, and thou shalt set aside that which is full. So she went from him, and shut the door upon her and upon her sons, who brought the vessels to her ; and she poured out. And it came to pass, when the vessels were full, that she said unto her son : Bring me yet a vessel. And he said unto her : There is not a vessel more. And the oil stayed. Then she came and told the man of God. And he said : Go, sell the oil, and pay thy debt : and live thou and thy children of the rest.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 19.* Who can tell how oft he offendeth : O cleanse thou me from my secret faults. *℣.* Keep thy servant also from presumptuous sins, lest they get the dominion over me : so shall I be undefiled, and innocent from the great offence.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 18. 15.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : If thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone ; if he shall hear thee, thou hast gainèd thy brother. But if he will not hear thee, then take with thee one or two more, that in the mouth of two or

three witnesses every word may be established. And if he shall neglect to hear them, tell it unto the Church ; but if he neglect to hear the Church, let him be unto thee as a heathen man and a publican. Verily I say unto you, Whatsoever ye shall bind on earth shall be bound in heaven : and whatsoever ye shall loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. Again I say unto you, That if two of you shall agree on earth as touching any thing that they shall ask it shall be done for them of my Father which is in heaven. For where two or three are gathered together in my Name, there am I in the midst of them. Then came Peter to him, and said : Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, † and I forgive him? † till seven times? Jesus saith unto him : I say not unto thee, Until seven times : but, Until seventy times seven.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 15. Lord, who shall dwell in thy tabernacle? or who shall rest upon thy holy hill? Even he that leadeth an uncorrupt life, and doeth the thing that is right.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OR, who hast vouchsafed to purge us by these holy mysteries : grant, we beseech thee, that we may obtain of thy mercy pardon and grace. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on Ash Wednesday.

The LESSON from the Book of Exodus. *Exod.* 20. 21.

THUS saith the Lord God : Honour thy father and thy mother : that thy days may be long upon the land

which the Lord thy God giveth thee. Thou shalt not kill. Thou shalt not commit adultery. Thou shalt not steal. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's house, thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's wife, nor his manservant, nor his maidservant, nor his ox, nor his ass, nor anything that is thy neighbour's. And all the people saw the thunderings, and the lightnings, and the noise of the trumpet, and the mountain smoking : and when the people saw it, they removed, and stood afar off. And they said unto Moses : Speak thou with us, and we will hear : but let not God speak with us, lest we die. And Moses said unto the people : Fear not, for God is come to prove you, and that his fear may be before your faces, that ye sin not. And the people stood afar off, and Moses drew near unto the thick darkness where God was. ✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 15. 1.

AT that time : There came unto Jesus scribes and Pharisees, which were of Jerusalem, saying : † Why do thy disciples transgress the Tradition of the Elders? For they eat bread with unwashen hands. But he answered and said unto them : † Why do ye also transgress the commandment of God by your Tradition? For God commanded, saying : Honour thy father and mother. And : He that curseth father or mother, let him die the death. But ye say : Whosoever shall say to his father or his mother : It is a gift, by whatsoever thou mightest be profited by me : and honour not his father or his mother, he shall be free. Thus have ye made the commandment of God of none effect by your Tradition. Ye hypocrites, well did Esaias prophesy of you, saying : This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoureth me with their lips ; but their heart is far from me. But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men. And he called the multitude, and said unto them : Hear, and understand ; not that which goeth into the mouth defileth a man ; but that which cometh out of the mouth, this defileth a man. Then came his disciples, and said unto him : Knowest thou that the Pharisees were offended, † after they heard this saying? But he answered and said : Every plant, which my heavenly Father hath not planted, shall be rooted up. Let them alone ; they be blind leaders of the blind. And if the blind

lead the blind, both shall fall into the ditch. Then answered Peter and said unto him : Declare unto us this parable. And Jesus said : † Are ye also yet without understanding? Do not ye yet understand, that whatsoever entereth in at the mouth goeth into the belly, † and is cast out into the draught? But those things which proceed out of the mouth come forth from the heart ; and they defile the man. For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies ; these are the things which defile a man ; but to eat with unwashed hands defileth not a man.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 109. But deal thou with me, O Lord God, according unto thy Name : for sweet is thy mercy.

SECRET.

The LESSON from the Book of Numbers. *Num. 20. 1.*

IN those days : The children of Israel gathered themselves together against Moses and against Aaron, and chode with Moses, and spake, saying : Give us water to drink. And Moses and Aaron went from the presence of the assembly unto the door of the tabernacle of the congregation, and they fell upon their faces : and the glory of the Lord appeared unto them. And

the Lord spake unto Moses, saying : Take the rod, and gather thou the assembly together, thou, and Aaron thy brother, and speak ye unto the rock before their eyes ; and it shall give forth his water, and thou shalt bring forth to them water out of the rock : so thou shalt give the congregation and their beasts drink. And Moses took the rod from before the Lord, as he commanded him. And Moses and Aaron gathered the congregation together before the rock, and he said unto them : Hear now, ye rebels ; † must we fetch you water out of this rock? And Moses lifted up his hand, and with his rod he smote the rock twice : and the water came out abundantly, and the congregation drank, and their beasts also. And the Lord spake unto Moses and Aaron : Because ye believed me not, to sanctify me in the eyes of the children of Israel, therefore ye shall not bring this congregation into the land which I have given them. This is the water of Meribah ; because the children of Israel strove with the Lord, and he was sanctified in them.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 28.* My heart hath trusted in God, and I am helped : therefore my heart danceth for joy : and in my song will I praise him. *℣.* Unto thee will I cry, O Lord my strength : think no scorn of me : my God, go not far from me.

AT that time : Jesus cometh to a city of Samaria, which is called Sychar : near to the parcel of ground that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Now Jacôb's well was there. Jesus therefore, being wearied with his journey, sat thûs on the well. And it was about the sixth hour. There cometh a woman of Samaria tô draw water ; Jesus saith unto her : Give me to drink. [(For his disciples were gone away unto the city to buy meat.) Then saith the woman of Samaria unto him : How is it that thou, being a Jew, askest drink of me, ‡ which am a woman of Samâria? for the Jews have no dealings with the Sâmaritans. Jesus answered and said unto her : If thou knewest the gift of God, and who it is that saith to thee, Give me to drink ; thou wouldest have asked of him, and he would have given thee living water. The woman saith unto him : Sir, thou hast nothing to draw with, and the well is deep : ‡ from whence then hast thou that living water? Art thou greater than our father Jacob, which gave us the well, ‡ and drank thereof himself, and his children, and his cattle? Jesus answered and said unto her : Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again : but whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst ; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into evêrlasting life. The woman saith unto him : Sir, give me this water, that I thirst not, neither come hither to draw. Jesus saith unto

her : Go, call thy husband, and come hither. The woman answered and said : I hâve no husband. Jesus said unto her : Thou hast well said, I have no husband : for thou hast hâd five husbands ; and he whom thou now hast is nôt thy husband ; in that saidst thou truly. The woman saith unto him : Sir, I perceive that thou art a Prophet. Our fathers worshipped in this mountain ; and ye say, that in Jerusalem is the place where men ought to worship. Jesus saith unto her : Woman, believe me, the hour cometh, when ye shall neither in this mountain, nor yet at Jerusalem, worship the Father. Ye worship yê know not what ; we know what we worship : for salvation is of the Jews. But the hour cometh, and now is when the true worshippers shall worship him in spirit and in truth. The woman saith unto him : I know that Messias cometh, which is callèd Christ ; when he is come, he will têtll us all things. Jesus saith unto her : I that speak untô thee am he.] And upon this came his disciples, and marvelled that he talked with the woman : yet no man said : ‡ What sêekest thou? or, ‡ Why talkest thôu with her? The woman then left her water-pot, and went her way into the city, and saith to the men : Come, see ■ man, which told me all things that êver I did ; ‡ is not this the Christ? Then they went out of the city, and câme unto him. In the mean while his disciples prayed him, saying : Master, eat. But he said unto them : I have meat to eat that yê know not of. Therefore said the disciples one to another : ‡ Hath any man brought him ôught to eat? Jesus

saith unto them : My meat is to do the will of him that sent me, and to finish his work. Say not ye, There are yet four months, † and then comêth harvest? behold, I say unto you : Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields ; for they are white already to harvest. And he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal : that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejôice together. And herein is that saying true : One soweth, and anôther reapeth. I sent you to reap that whereon ye bestowêd no labour ; other men laboured, and ye are entered intô their labours. And many of the Samaritans of that city believed on him for the saying of the woman, which testified : He told me all that êver I did. So when the Samaritans were come unto him, they besought him that he would tarry with them : and he abôde there two days. And many more believed because of his own word, and said unto the woman : Now we believe, not because ôf thy saying ; for we have heard him ourselves, and know that this is indeed the Christ, the Saviour of the world.

The LESSON from the Story of Susanna.
The Story of Susanna.

IN those days : [There dwelt a man in Babylon, called Joacim : and he took a wife, whose name was Susanna, the daughter of Chelcias, a very fair woman, and one that feared the Lord. Her parents also were righteous, and taught their daughter according to the Law of Moses. Now Joacim was a great rich man, and had a fair garden joining unto his house : and to him resorted the Jews ; because he was more honourable than all others. The same year were appointed two of the ancients of the people to be judges, such as the Lord spake of, that wickedness came from Babylon from ancient judges, who seemed to govern the people. These kept much at Joacim's house : and all that had any suits in law came unto them. Now when the people departed away at noon, Susanna went into her husband's garden to walk. And the two elders saw her going in every day, and walking ; so that their lust was inflamed toward her. And they perverted their own mind, and turned away their eyes, that they might not look unto heaven, nor remember just judgements. And albeit they both were wounded with her love, yet durst not one shew another his grief. For they were ashamed to declare their lust, that they desired to have to do with her. Yet they watched diligently from day to day to see her. And the one said to the other : Let us now go home : for it is dinner time. So when they were gone out, they parted the one from the other, and turning back again they came to the

same place ; and after that they had asked one another the cause, they acknowledged their lust : then appointed they a time both together, when they might find her alone. And it fell out, as they watched a fit time, she went in as before with two maids only, and she was desirous to wash herself in the garden : for it was hot. And there was no body there save the two elders, that had hid themselves, and watched her. Then she said to her maids : Bring me oil and washing balls, and shut the garden doors, that I may wash me. And they did as she bade them, and shut the garden doors, and went out themselves at privy doors to fetch the things that she had commanded them : but they saw not the elders, because they were hid. Now when the maids were gone forth, the two elders rose up, and ran unto her, saying : Behold, the garden doors are shut, that no man can see us, and we are in love with thee ; therefore consent unto us, and lie with us. If thou wilt not, we will bear witness against thee, that a young man was with thee : and therefore thou didst send away thy maids from thee. Then Susanna sighed, and said : I am straitened on every side : for if I do this thing, it is death unto me : and if I do it not, I cannot escape your hands. It is better for me to fall into your hands, and not do it, than to sin in the sight of the Lord. With that Susanna cried with a loud voice : and the two elders cried out against her. Then ran the one, and opened the garden door. So when the servants of the house heard the cry in the garden, they rushed in at a privy door, to see what was done

unto her. But when the elders had declared their matter, the servants were greatly ashamed : for there was never such a report made of Susanna. And it came to pass the next day, when the people were assembled to her husband Joacim, the two elders came also full of mischievous imagination against Susanna to put her to death ; and said before the people : Send for Susanna, the daughter of Chelcias, Joacim's wife. And so they sent. So she came with her father and mother, her children, and all her kindred. Now Susanna was a very delicate woman, and beauteous to behold. And these wicked men commanded to uncover her face (for she was covered) that they might be filled with her beauty. Therefore her friends and all that saw her wept. Then the two elders stood up in the midst of the people, and laid their hands upon her head. And she weeping looked up toward heaven : for her heart trusted in the Lord. And the elders said : As we walked in the garden alone, this woman came in with two maids, and shut the garden doors, and sent the maids away. Then a young man, who there was hid, came unto her, and lay with her. Then we that stood in a corner of the garden, seeing his wickedness, ran unto them. And when we saw them together, the man we could not hold : for he was stronger than we, and opened the door, and leaped out. But having taken this woman, we asked who the young man was, but she would not tell us : these things do we testify. Then the assembly believed them, as those that were the elders and judges of the people : so they condemned her to

death. Then] Susanna cried out with a loud voice, and said : O everlasting God, that knowest the secrets, and knowest all things before they be : thou knowest that they have borne false witness against me, and, behold, I must die ; whereas I never did such things as these men have maliciously invented against me. And the Lord heard her voice. Therefore when she was led to be put to death, the Lord raised up the holy spirit of a young youth, whose name was Daniel : who cried with a loud voice : I am clear from the blood of this woman. Then all the people turned them toward him, and said : † What mean these words that thou hast spoken? So he standing in the midst of them said : Are ye such fools, ye sons of Israel, † that without examination or knowledge of the truth ye have condemned a daughter of Îsraël? Return again to the place of judgement : for they have borne false witness against her. Wherefore all the people turned again in haste, and the elders said unto him : Come, sit down among us, and shew it us, seeing God hath given thee the honour of an elder. Then said Daniel unto them : Put these two aside one far from another, and I will examine them. So when they were put asunder one from another, he called one of them, and said unto them : O thou that art waxen old in wickedness, now thy sins which thou hast committed aforetime are come to light : for thou hast pronounced false judgement, and hast condemned the innocent, and hast let the guilty go free ; albeit the Lord saith : The innocent and righteous shalt thou not slay. Now then, if thou

hast seen her, tell me : † Under what tree sawest thou them companying together? Who answered : Under a mastick tree. And Daniel said : Very well ; thou hast lied against thine own head ; for even now the Angel of God hath received the sentence of God to cut thee in two. So he put him aside, and commanded to bring the other, and said unto him : O thou seed of Chanaan, and not of Juda, beauty hath deceived thee, and lust hath perverted thine heart. Thus have ye dealt with the daughters of Israel, and they for fear companied with you : but the daughter of Juda would not abide your wickedness. Now therefore tell me : † Under what tree didst thou take them companying together? Who answered : Under an holm tree. Then said Daniel unto him : Well ; thou hast also lied against thine own head : for the Angel of God waiteth with the sword to cut thee in two, that he may destroy you. With that all the assembly cried out with a loud voice, and praised God, who saveth them that trust in him. And they arose against the two elders, for Daniel had convicted them of false witness by their own mouth : and according to the Law of Moses they did unto them in such sort as they maliciously intended to do to their neighbour : and they put them to death. Thus the innocent blood was saved the same day.

AT that time : Jesus went unto the mōunt of Olives. And early in the morning he came again into the temple, and all the people cāme unto him ; and he sat dōwn, and taught them. And the scribes and Pharisees brought unto him a woman taken in adultery ; and when they had set her in the midst, they say unto him : Master, this woman was taken in adultery, in thê very act. Now Moses in the Law commanded us, that such should be stoned : † but what sâyest thou? This they said, tempting him, that they might have tō accuse him. But Jesus stooped down, and with his finger wrote on the ground, as though hê heard them not. So when they continued asking him, he lifted up himself, and said unto them : He that is without sin among you, let him first cast â stone at her. And again he stooped down, and wrôte on the ground. And they which heard it, being convicted by their own conscience, went out one by one, beginning at the eldest, even ûnto the last ; and Jesus was left alone, and the woman standing in the midst. When Jesus had lifted up himself, and saw none but the woman, he said unto her : Woman, † where are those thine âccusers? † hath no man condêmnèd thee? She sâid : No man, Lord. And Jesus said unto her : Neither do I condemn thee : gö and sin no more.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 119. Order my steps in thy word : and so shall no wickedness have dominion over me, O Lord.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that this oblation of our sacrifice may in all things purify the frailty of our mortal nature from all evil, and be our defence against all temptations. Through.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Galatians.

Gal. 4. 21.

BRETHREN : Tell me, ye that desire to be under the Law, † do ye not hear the Law? For it is written : that Abraham had two sons, the one by a bondmaid, the other by a free-woman. But he who was of the bondwoman was born after the flesh ; but he of the freewoman was by promise. Which things are an allegory : for these are the two covenants ; the one from the mount Sinai, which gendereth to bondage : which is Agar. For this Agar is mount Sinai in Arabia, and answereth to Jerusalem which now is, and is in bondage with her children. But Jerusalem which is above is free, which is the mother of us all. For it is written : Rejoice, thou barren that barest not ; break forth and cry, thou that travailest not : for the desolate hath many more children than she which hath an husband. Now we, brethren, as Isaac was, are the children of promise. But as then he that was born after the flesh persecuted him that was born after the spirit : even so it is

now. ‡ Nevertheless what saith thê Scripture? Cast out the bondwoman and her son : for the son of the bondwoman shall not be heir with the son of the freewoman. So then, brethren, we are not children of the bondwoman, but of the free : [by the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free.]

GRADUAL. *Ps. 122.* I was glad when they said unto me : We will go into the house of the Lord. *V.* Peace be within thy walls, and plenteousness within thy palaces.

TRACT. *Ps. 125.* They that put their trust in the Lord shall be even as the mount Sion : which may not be removed but standeth fast for ever. *V.* The hills stand about Jerusalem : even so standeth the Lord round about his people, from this time forth for evermore.

† The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 6. 1.

AT that time : Jesus went over the sea of Galilee, which is the sea of Tiberias. And a great multitude followed him, because they saw his miracles which he did on them that wêre diseasèd. And Jesus went up into a mountain, and there he sat with his disciples. And the Passover, a feast of thê Jews, was nigh. When Jesus then lifted up his eyes, and saw a great company come unto him, he saith unto Philip : Whence shall we buy bread, ‡ that thêse may eat? And this he said to prove him : for he himself knew whât he would do. Philip answered him : Two hundred pennyworth of bread is not sufficient for

them, that every one of them may tâke a little. One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, saith unto him : There is a lad here, which hath five barley loaves, and two small fishes : ‡ but what are they among sô many? And Jesus said : Make thê men sit down. Now there was much grâss in the place. So the men sat down, in number abôut five thousand. And Jesus took the loaves ; and when he had given thanks, he distributed to the disciples, and the disciples to them thât were set down ; and likewise of the fishes as mûch as they would. When they were filled, he said unto his disciples : Gather up the fragments that remain, that nôthing be lost. Therefore they gathered them together, and filled twelve baskets with the fragments of the five barley loaves, which remained over and above unto them thât had eaten. Then those men, when they had seen the miracle that Jesus did, said : This is of a truth that prophet that should cômè into the world. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 135.* O praise the Lord, for the Lord is gracious : O sing praises unto his Name, for it is lovely : whatsoever the Lord pleased, that did he in heaven and in earth.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to have respect unto these our oblations : that the same may be profitable unto us for our increase in all godliness, and for the attainment of everlasting salvation. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps. 122.* Jerusalem is built as a city that is at unity with

itself : for thither the tribes go up, even the tribes of the Lord, to give thanks unto the Name of the Lord.

IN those days : There came two women, that were harlots, unto king Solomon, and stood before him. And the one woman said : O my lord, I and this woman dwell in one house ; and I was delivered of a child with her in the house. And it came to pass the third day after that I was deliv-

ered, that this woman was delivered also : and we were together ; there was no stranger with us in the house, save we two in the house. And this woman's child died in the night ; because she overlaid it. And she arose at midnight, and took my son from beside me, while thine handmaid slept, and laid it in her bosom, and laid her dead child in my bosom. And when I rose in the morning to give my child suck, behold, it was dead : but when I had considered it in the morning, behold, it was not my son, which I did bear. And the other woman said : Nay ; but the living is my son, and the dead is thy son. And this said : No ; but the dead is thy son, and the living is my son. Thus they spake before the king. Then said the king : The one saith : This is my son that liveth, and thy son is the dead : and the other saith : Nay ; but thy son is the dead, and my son is the living. And the king said : Bring me a sword. And they brought a sword before the king. And the king said : Divide the living child in two, and give half to the one, and half to the other. Then spake the woman whose the living child was unto the king, for her bowels yearned upon her son, and she said : O my lord, give her the living child, and in no wise slay it. But the other said : Let it be neither mine nor thine, but divide it. Then the king answered and said : Give her the living child, and in no wise slay it : she is the mother thereof. And all Israel heard of the judgement which the king had judged ; and they feared the king : for they saw that the wisdom of God was in him, to do judgement.

St. John 2. 13.

AT that time : the Jews' Passover was at hand, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and found in the temple those that sold oxen and sheep and doves, and the changers of mōney sitting ; and when he had made a scourge of small cords, he drove them all out of the temple, and the sheep, and the oxen ; and poured out the changers' money, and overthrew the tables ; and said unto them that sold doves : Take these things hence ; make not my Father's house an house ôf merchandise. And his disciples remembered that it was written : The zeal of thine house hath eaten me up. Then answered the Jews and said unto him : What sign shewest thou unto us, † seeing that thou doest these things? Jesus answered and said unto them : Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up. Then said the Jews : Forty and six years was this temple in building, † and wilt thou rear it up in three days? But he spake of the temple ôf his body. When therefore he was risen from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this unto them ; and they believed the Scripture, and the word which Jêsus

had said. Now when he was in Jerusalem at the Passover, in the feast day, many believed in his Name, when they saw the miraclês which he did. But Jesus did not commit himself unto them, because he knew all men, and needed not that any should testify of man : for he knêw what was in man.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 100. O be joyful in the Lord, all ye lands, serve the Lord with gladness : and come before his presence with a song : be ye sure that the Lord he is God.

The LESSON from the Book of Exodus. *Exod. 32. 7.*

IN those days : The Lord spake unto Moses, saying : Go, get thee down from the mount ; for thy people, which thou broughtest out of the land of Egypt, have corrupted themselves : they have turned aside quickly out of the way which I commanded them : they have made them a molten calf, and have worshipped it, and have sacrificed thereunto, and said : These be thy gods, O Israel, which have brought thee up out of the land of Egypt. And the Lord said unto Moses : I have seen this people, and, behold, it is a stiff-necked people : now therefore let me alone, that my wrath may wax hot against them, and that I may consume them : and I will make of thee a great nation. And Moses besought

the Lord his God, and said : Lord, why doth thy wrath wax hot against thy people, which thou hast brought forth out of the land of Egypt with great power, † and with a mighty hand? Wherefore should the Egyptians speak, and say : For mischief did he bring them out, to slay them in the mountains, † and to consume them from the face of the earth? Turn from thy fierce wrath, and repent of this evil against thy people. Remember Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, thy servants, to whom thou swarest by thine own self, and saidst unto them : I will multiply your seed as the stars of heaven, and all this land that I have spoken of will I give unto your seed, and they shall inherit it for ever. And the Lord repented of the evil which he thought to do unto his people.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 44.* Arise, O Lord, and help us : and deliver us for thy mercy's sake. *℣.* We have heard with our ears, O God, our fathers have told us : what thou hast done in their time of old.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 7. 14.

AT that time : About the midst of the feast Jesus went up into the tēple, and taught. And the Jews marvelled, saying : How knoweth this man letters, † having nevēr learned? Jesus answered them, and said : My doctrine is not mine, but his that sent me. If any man will do his will, he shall know of the doctrine, whether it be of God, or whether I spēak of myself. He that speaketh of himself

seeketh his own glory ; but he that seeketh his glory that sent him, the same is true, and no unrighteousness is in him. Did not Moses give you the Law, † and yet none of you keepeth the Law? † Why go ye about to kill me? The people answered and said : Thou hast a devil : † who goeth about to kill thee? Jesus answered and said unto them : I have done one work, and ye all marvel. Moses therefore gave unto you circumcision ; (not because it is of Moses, but of the fathers) and ye on the sabbath day circumsise a man. If a man on the sabbath day receive circumcision, that the Law of Moses should not be broken ; are ye angry at me, † because I have made a man every whit whole on the sabbath day? Judge not according to the appearance, but judge righteous judgement. Then said some of them of Jerusalem : Is not this he, † whom they seek to kill? But, lo, he speaketh boldly, and they say nothing unto him. † Do the rulers know indeed that this is the very Christ? Howbeit we know this man whence he is ; but when Christ cometh, no man knoweth whence he is. Then cried Jesus in the temple as he taught, saying : Ye both know me, and ye know whence I am ; and I am not come of myself, but he that sent me is true, whom ye know not. But I know him : for I am from him, and he hath sent me. Then they sought to take him : but no man laid hands on him, because his hour was not yet come. And many of the people believed on him.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 40. I waited patiently for the Lord, and he inclined

unto me : he heard my calling, and he hath put a new song in my mouth, even ■ thanksgiving unto our God.

SECRET.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that this oblation may in such wise cleanse us from all our sins : that we thy servants, being sanctified both in body and soul, may worthily offer unto thee this our sacrifice. Through.

St. John 9. 1.

AT that time : As Jesus passed by, he saw a man which was blind from his birth. And his disciples asked him, saying : Master, who did sin, this man, or his parents, † that he wás born blind? Jesus answered : Neither hath this man sinned, nôr his parents ; but that the works of God should be made manifest in him. I must work the works of him that sent me, while it is day ; the night cometh, when nô man can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world. When he had thus spoken, he spat on the ground, and made clay of the spittle and he anointed the eyes of the blind man with the clay, and said unto him : Go, wash in the pool of Siloam (which is by interprétation, Sent). He went his way therefore, and washed, and came seeing. [The neighbours therefore, and they which before had seen him that he was blind, said : † Is not this he that sat and begged? Some said : This is he ;

others said : Hê is like him ; but he said : I am he. Therefore said they unto him : † How were thine eyes openèd? He answered and said : A man that is called Jesus made clay, and anointed mine eyes, and said unto me : Go to the pool of Silôam, and wash ; and I went and washed, and I rêcêivèd sight. Then said they unto him : † Whêre is he? He said : I know not. They brought to the Pharisees him that afôretime was blind. And it was the sabbath day when Jesus made the clay, and openèd his eyes. Then again the Pharisees also asked him how he had recêivèd his sight. He said unto them : He put clay upon mine eyes, and I washêd, and do see. Therefore said some of the Pharisees : This man is not of God, because he keepeth not thê sabbath day. Others said : † How can a man that is a sinner do such mîracles? And there was a division among them. They say unto the blind man again : What sayest thou of him, † that he hath openèd thine eyes? He said : Hê is a Prophet. But the Jews did not believe concerning him that he had been blind, and received his sight, until they called the parents of him that had recêivèd his sight. And they asked them, saying : Is this your son, † who ye say wás born blind? † how then doth hê now see? His parents answered them and said : We know that this is our son, and that hê was born blind ; but by what means he now seêth, we know not ; or who hath opened his êyes, we know not ; he is of age : ask him: he shall spêak for himself. These words spake his parents, because they fêarèd the Jews ; for the Jews had agreed

already, that if any man did confess that he was Christ, he should be put out of the thê synagogue. Therefore said his parents : He is ôf age ; ask him. Then again called they the man that was blind, and said unto him : Give God the praise ; we know that this man is a sinner. He answered and said : Whether he be a sinner or nô, I know not ; one thing I know, that, whereas I was blind, now I see. Then said they to him again : † What did hê to thee? † how opened hê thine eyes? He answered them : I have told you already, and ye did not hear : † wherefore would ye hear it again? † will ye also be his dîsciples? Then they reviled him, and said : Thou art his disciple ; but we are Mosês' disciples. We know that God spake ûnto Moses ; as for this fellow, we know not frôm whence he is. The man answered and said unto them : Why herein is a marvellous thing, that ye know not from whence he is, and yet he hath opênèd mine eyes. Now we know that God heareth not sinners : but if any man be a worshipper of God, and doeth his will, him he heareth. Since the world began was it not heard that any man opened the eyes of one thât was born blind. If this man were not of God, hê could do nothing. They answered and said unto him : Thou wast altogether born in sins, † and dost thôu teach us? And thêy cast him out. Jesus heard that they hâd cast him out ; and when he had found him, he said unto him : † Dost thou believe on the Sôn of God? He answered and said : Who is he, Lord, † that I might believe on him? And Jesus said unto him : Thou hast both

seen him, and it is he that tâlketh with thee. And he said : Lôrd, I believe. (*Here genuflect.*) And he worshippèd him.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 66. O praise our God, ye people, and make the voice of his praise to be heard : who holdeth our soul in life, and suffereth not our feet to slip : praised be God, who hath not cast out my prayer, nor turned his mercy from me.

IN those days : The Shunammite woman came unto Elisha to mount Carmel. And it came to pass, when the man of God saw her afar off, that he said to Gehazi his servant : Behold, yonder is that Shunammite : Run now, I pray thee, to meet her, and say unto her : † Is it well with thee? † is it well with thy husband? † is it well with the child? And she answered : It is well. And when she came to the man of God to the hill, she caught him by the feet : but Gehazi came near to thrust her away. And the man of God said : Let her alone ; for her soul is vexed within her : and the Lord hath hid it from me, and hath not told me. Then she said : † Did

I desire a son of my lord? did I not say : † Do not deceive me? Then he said to Gehazi : Gird up thy loins, and take my staff in thine hand, and go thy way : if thou meet any man, salute him not ; and if any salute thee, answer him not again : and lay my staff upon the face of the child. And the mother of the child said : As the Lord liveth, and as thy soul liveth, I will not leave thee. And he arose, and followed her. And Gehazi passed on before them, and laid the staff upon the face of the child ; but there was neither voice, nor hearing. Wherefore he went again to meet him, and told him, saying : The child is not awaked. And when Elisha was come into the house, behold, the child was dead, and laid upon his bed. He went in therefore, and shut the door upon them twain, and prayed unto the Lord. And he went up, and lay upon the child, and put his mouth upon his mouth, and his eyes upon his eyes, and his hands upon his hands : and he stretched himself upon the child ; and the flesh of the child waxed warm. Then he returned, and walked in the house to and fro ; and went up, and stretched himself upon him : and the child sneezed seven times, and the child opened his eyes. And he called Gehazi, and said : Call this Shunammite. So he called her. And when she was come in unto him, he said : Take up thy son. Then she went in, and fell at his feet, and bowed herself to the ground, and took up her son, and went out. And Elisha came again to Gilgal.

And he took him out of her bosom, and carried him up into a loft, where he abode, and laid him upon his own bed. And he cried unto the Lord, and said : O Lord my God, hast thou also brought evil upon the widow with whom I sojourn, † by slaying her son? St. John II. I.

AT that time : [A certain man was sick, named Lazarus, of Bethany, the town of Mary and her sîster Martha. (It was that Mary which anointed the Lord with ointment, and wiped his feet with her hair, whose brother Lazârus was sick.) Therefore his sisters sent unto him, saying : Lord, behold, he whom thou lôvest is sick. When Jesus heard that, he said : This sickness is not unto death, but for the glory of God, that the Son of God might be glorifièd thereby. Now Jesus loved Martha, and her sister, and Lazarus. When he had heard therefore that he was sick, he abode two days still in the same plâce where he was. Then after that saith he to his disciples : Let us go into Judæa again. His disciples say unto him : Master, the Jews of late sought to stone thee ; † and goest thou thithêr again? Jesus answered : † Are there not twelve hours in the day? If any man walk in the day, he stumbleth not, because he seeth the lîght of this world. But if a man walk in the night, he stumbleth, because there is nô light in him. These things said he : and after that he saith unto them : Our friend Lazârus sleepeth ; but I go, that I may

awake him out of sleep. Then said his disciples : Lord, if he sleep, hê shall do well. Howbeit Jesus spake of his death : but they thought that he had spoken of taking ôf rest in sleep. Then said Jesus unto them plainly : Lazârus is dead. And I am glad for your sakes that I was not there, to the intent yê may believe ; nevertheless let us gô unto him. Then said Thomas, which is called Didymus, unto his fellow-disciples : Let us also go, that we mây die with him. Then when Jesus came, he found that he had lain in the grave four dâys already. Now Bethany was nigh unto Jerusalem, about fifteen furlongs off : and many of the Jews came to Martha and Mary, to comfort them concernîng their brother. Then Martha, as soon as she heard that Jesus was coming, went and met him : but Mary sat still in the house. Then] said Martha unto Jesus : Lord, if thou hadst been here, my brother hâd not dièd. But I know, that even now, whatsoever thou wilt ask of God, God will give it thee. Jesus saith unto her : Thy brother shâll rise again. Martha saith unto him : I know that he shall rise again in the resurrection ât the last day. Jesus said unto her : I am the resurrection, and the life : he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yêt shall he live ; and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shâll never die. † Believêst thou this? She saith unto him : Yea, Lord : I believe that thou art the Christ, the Son of God, which should come înto the world. [And when she had so said, she went her way, and called Mary her sister secretly, saying : The Master is come, and câlleth for thee. As soon as she

heard that, she arose quickly, and câme unto him. Now Jesus was not yet come into the town, but was in that place where Mârtha met him. The Jews then which were with her in the house, and comforted her, when they saw Mary, that she rose up hastily and went out, followed her, saying : She goeth unto the grâve to weep there.] Then when Mary was come where Jesus was, and saw him, she fell down at his feet, saying unto him : Lord, if thou hadst been here, my brother hâd not dièd. When Jesus therefore saw her weeping, and the Jews also weeping which came with her, he groaned in the spirit, and was troubled, and said : † Where have yê laid him? They said unto him : Lôrd, come and see. Jêsus wept. Then said the Jews : Behold how hê lovèd him! And some `of them said : Could not this man, which opened the eyes of the blind, † have caused that even this man should not hâve dièd? Jesus therefore again groaning in himself comêth to the grave. It was a cave, and a stone lây upon it. Jesus said : Take ye âway the stone. Martha, the sister of him that was dead, saith unto him : Lord, by this time he stinketh : for he hath bêen dead four days. Jesus saith unto her : Said I not unto thee, that, if thou wouldest believe, † thou shouldest see the glorÿ of God? Then they took away the stone from the place where thê dead was laid. And Jesus lifted up his eyes, and said : Father, I thank thee that thôu hast heard me. And I knew that thou hearest me always : but because of the people which stand by I said it, that they may believe that thôu hast sent

me. And when he thus had spoken, he cried with a loud voice : Lazârus, come forth. And he that was dead came forth, bound hand and foot with grave-clothes : and his face was bound about with a napkin. Jesus saith unto them : Loose him, and let him go. Then many of the Jews which came to Mary, and had seen the things which Jesus did, believèd on him.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 18. Thou shalt save the people that are in adversity, O Lord, and shalt bring down the high looks of the proud : for who is God, but the Lord?

SECRET.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that these our oblations may in such wise purify us from all our iniquities, that we may ever be found an acceptable people in thy sight. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. John* 11. The Lord, seeing the sisters of Lazarus weeping at the tomb, wept before the Jews, and cried : Lazarus, come forth : and he that had been dead four days came forth, bound hand and foot.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, that we which have here received this holy Sacrament, may thereby be delivered evermore from the bonds of our sins, and defended against all adversities. Through.

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY God, who seest that we, knowing ourselves to be compassed about by many and great in-

firmities, do put our whole trust and confidence in thy mighty power, may evermore rejoice in the abundance of thy loving-kindness. Through.

SATURDAY

Station at St. Nicholas at the Prison.

INTROIT. *Sitientes. Is.* 55.

HO, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, saith the Lord : and ye that have no money, come and drink with gladness. *Ps.* 78. Hear my law, O my people : incline your ears unto the words of my mouth. *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

OD, forasmuch as our fast is unprofitable unto us, unless it be acceptable unto thy loving-kindness : grant, we beseech thee, that the devout affection of our hearts may by thy grace be rendered abundant in the fruit of all good works. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on Ash Wednesday.

The LESSON from Isaiah the Prophet.
Is. 49. 8.

THUS saith the Lord : In an acceptable time have I heard thee, and in a day of salvation have I helped thee : and I will preserve thee, and give thee for a covenant of the people, to establish the earth, to cause to inherit the desolate heritages ; that thou mayest say to the prisoners : Go forth ; to them that are in darkness : Shew yourselves. They shall feed in the ways, and their pastures shall be in all high places. They shall not hunger nor thirst ; neither shall the heat nor sun smite them : for he that hath

mercy on them shall lead them, even by the springs of water shall he guide them. And I will make all my mountains a way, and my highways shall be exalted. Behold, these shall come from far : and, lo, these from the north and from the west ; and these from the land of Sinim. Sing, O heavens ; and be joyful, O earth ; and break forth into singing, O mountains : for the Lord hath comforted his people, and will have mercy upon his afflicted. But Zion said : The Lord hath forsaken me, and my Lord hath forgotten me. Can a woman forget her sucking child, ‡ that she should not have compassion on the son ôf her womb? yea, they may forget, yet will I not forget thee, saith the Lord Almighty.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 10. The poor committeth himself unto thee, O Lord : for thou art the helper of the friendless. *V.* Why standest thou so far off, O Lord, and hidest thy face in the needful time of trouble : the ungodly for his own lust doth persecute the poor.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 8. 12.

AT that time : Jesus spake unto the multitudes of the Jews, saying : I am the light of the world ; he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have thê light of life. The Pharisees therefore said unto him : Thou bearest recôrd of thyself ; thy recôrd is not true. Jesus answered and said unto them : Though I bear record of myself, yet my record is true : for I know whence I came,

and whither I go ; but ye cannot tell whence I come, and whither I go. Ye judge âfter the flesh ; I judge no man. And yet if I judge, my judgement is true : for I am not alone, but I and the Fathêr that sent me. It is also written in your law, that the testimony of twô men is true. I am one that bear witness of myself, and the Father that sent me beareth witness of me. Then said they unto him : ‡ Where is thÿ Father? Jesus answered : Ye neither know me, nôr my Father ; if ye had known me, ye should have known my Fâther also. These words spake Jesus in the treasury, as he taught in the temple : and no man laid hands on him, for his hõur was not yet come.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 18. The Lord is my stony rock, and my defence : my Saviour in whom I will trust.

SECRET.

MOST merciful Lord, we beseech thee, to have respect unto these our oblations : that whereas we have rebelled and done evil against thee, we may by thy grace be conformed unto thy will. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 23. The Lord is my shepherd, therefore can I lack nothing : he shall feed me in a green pasture : and lead me forth beside the waters of comfort.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee ; that these holy mysteries may by their operation cleanse us from all our sins, and render us an acceptable people in thy sight. Through.

SATURDAY AFTER FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT A 127

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who wouldest not be wroth with them that put their trust in thee, but rather shewest mercy unto them : grant unto us, we pray thee, so rightly to bewail the sins, which we have committed, that we may be found worthy to obtain the comfort of thy grace. Through.

§ *Before Evensong, Crosses and any other sacred images are covered; and the Crosses remain covered until after the Veneration of the Cross by the Celebrant on Good Friday; but the other sacred images remain covered until the intonation of the Angelic Hymn on Holy Saturday.*

§ *From this day until after Good Friday the Psalm, Give sentence with me, is not said before the Confiteor: nor yet Glory be to the Father at the Psalm I will wash my hands.*

THE FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

Commonly Called Passion Sunday

Sunday of I Class, Semidouble.

Station at St. Peter's.

INTROIT. *Judica me. Ps. 43.*

GIVE sentence with me, O God, and defend my cause against the ungodly people : O deliver my soul from the deceitful and wicked man : for thou art the God of my strength. *Ps. ibid.* O send out thy light and thy truth, that they may lead me : and bring me unto thy holy hill, and to thy dwelling. Give sentence with me.

§ Glory be to the Father *is not said at the Introit from henceforth until Easter, except upon a feast day, if any shall occur; but the Psalm being ended, the Introit is repeated straightway, up to the beginning of the Psalm.*

COLLECT.

WE beseech thee, Almighty God, mercifully to look upon thy people : that by thy great goodness they may be governed and preserved evermore, both in body and soul. Through Jesus Christ our Lōrd. [Who.]

Only one Seasonal Prayer is said from this day forth in Masses of the Season; according to the Latin Rite this 2nd Collect is for the Church (as on Dec. 30th), until Maundy Thursday; but according to the Prayer-Book, as follows until Holy Week:

COLLECT 2. *Of Ash Wednesday.*

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who hatest nothing that thou hast made, and dost forgive the sins of all those whō are penitent : create and make in us new and contrite hēarts, that we worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of thee, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness. Through Jesus Christ our Lōrd. [Who.]

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Hebrews.
Heb. 9. 11.

BRETHREN : Christ being come an high priest of good things to come, by a greater and more perfect tabernacle, not made with hands, that is to say, not of this building ; neither by the blood of goats and calves, but by his own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us. For if the blood of bulls and of goats, and the ashes of an heifer sprinkling the unclean, sanctifieth to the purifying of the flesh ; how much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God, † purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God? And for this cause he is the mediator of the new testament, that by means of death, for the redemption of the transgressions

that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance, [in Christ Jesus our Lord.]

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 143. Deliver me, O Lord, from mine enemies : teach me to do the thing that pleaseth thee. *V.* *Ps.* 18. It is the Lord that delivereth me from my cruel enemies, and setteth me up above mine adversaries : thou shalt rid me from the wicked man.

TRACT. *Ps.* 129. Many a time have they fought against me from my youth up. *V.* May Israel now say : yea many a time have they vexed me from my youth up. *V.* But they have not prevailed against me : the plowers plowed upon my back. *V.* And made long furrows : but the righteous Lord hath hewn the snares of the ungodly in pieces.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to John.

St. John 8. 46.

AT that time : Jesus said; † Which of you convinceth mē of sin? And if I say the truth, † why do ye not believe me? He that is of God hēareth God's words ; ye therefore hear them not, because ye âre not of God. Then answered the Jews, and said unto him : Say we not well that thou art a Samaritan, † and hast â devil? Jesus answered : I have nôt a devil ; but I honour my Father, and ye do dishonour me. And I seek not mine own glory ; there is one that seekêth and judgeth. Verily, verily, I say unto you, If a man keep my saying, he shall nôver see death. Then said the Jews unto him : Now we know that thou

hâst a devil. Abraham is dead, and the Prophets : and thou sayest : If a man keep my saying, he shall nôver taste of death. † Art thou greater than our father Abraham, which is dead? and the Prophets are dead : † whom makest thôu thyself? Jesus answered : If I honour myself, my honôur is nothing ; it is my Father that hōnoureth me ; of whom ye say, that he is your God : yet ye hâve not known him ; but I know him : and if I should say, I know him not, I shall be a liar like unto you ; but I know him, and kēep his saying. Your father Abraham rejoiced to see my day : and he saw it, and was glad. Then said the Jews unto him : Thou art not yet fifty years old, † and hast thou seen Âbraham? Jesus said unto them : Verily, verily, I say unto you : Before Abrahâm was, I am. Then took they up stones to cast at him : but Jesus hid himself, and went ôut of the temple. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 119. I will give thanks unto the Lord with my whole heart : O do well unto thy servant, that I may live, and keep thy word : quicken thou me, according to thy word, O Lord.

SECRET.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that these our oblations may deliver us from every bond of iniquity, and obtain for us the bounteous gifts of thy mercy. Through.

SECRET 2. *Of Ash Wednesday.*

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord, that like as we do by these our oblations bring to remembrance the institution of this holy Sacrament, so

we may by thee be enabled to offer the same according to thy will. Through.

PREFACE of the Cross: which is said daily until Maundy Thursday inclusive.

COMMUNION. I Cor. II. This is my Body, which is given for you : this cup is the new testament in my Blood, saith the Lord : this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me.

POSTCOMMUNION.

ASSIST us mercifully, O Lôrd our God : that we whom thou hast here refreshed with thy holy mysteriês, may be defended by thy perpetual succour. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION 2. *Of Ash Wednesday.*

WE beseech thee, Lord, mercifully to protect us who have now received this hôly Sacrament : that this our fast may be acceptable in thy sight, and profitable unto us for the healing of our souls. Through.

MONDAY

Station at St. Chrysogonus.

INTROIT. *Miserere mei. Ps. 56.*

BE merciful unto me, O God, for man goeth about to devour me : he is daily fighting and troubling me. *Ps. ibid.* Mine enemies are daily in hand to swallow me up : for they be many that fight against me. Be merciful.

COLLECT.

LET thy bountiful goodness, O Lord, we beseech thee, sanctify this our fasting : and effectually bestow upon us the remission of all our sins. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on the preceding Sunday.

The **LESSON** from Jonah the Prophet.
Jonah 3. 1.

IN those days : The word of the Lord came unto Jonah the second time, saying : Arise, go unto Nineveh, that great city, and preach unto it the preaching that I bid thee. So Jonah arose, and went unto Nineveh, according to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was an exceeding great city of three days' journey. And Jonah began to enter into the city a day's journey, and he cried, and said : Yet forty days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown. So the people of Nineveh believed God, and proclaimed a fast, and put on sackcloth, from the greatest of them even to the least of them. For word came unto the king of Nineveh, and he arose from his throne, and he laid his robe from him, and covered him with sackcloth, and sat in ashes. And he caused it to be proclaimed and published through Nineveh by the decree of the king and his nobles, saying : Let neither man nor beast, herd nor flock, taste any thing : let them not feed, nor drink water : but let man and beast be covered with sackcloth, and cry mightily unto God : yea, let them turn every one from his evil way, and from the violence that is in their hands. Who can tell if God will turn and repent, and turn away from his fierce anger, † that we p̄rish not? And God saw their works, that they turned from their evil way ; and God repented of the evil, that he had said that he would do unto them ; and he did it not.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 54. Hear my prayer, O God : and hearken unto the words of my mouth. *V.* Save me, O God, for thy Name's sake : and avenge me in thy strength.

TRACT. *Ps.* 103. O Lord, deal not, as on *Ash Wednesday*.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accord'ing to John.

St. John 7. 32.

AT that time : The Pharisees and the chief priests sent officers tō take Jesus. Then said Jesus unto them : Yet a little while am I with you, and then I go unto him that sent me. Ye shall seek me, and shall not find me : and where I am, thither yē cannot come. Then said the Jews among themselves : Whither will he go, † that we shall nōt find him? will he go unto the dispersed among the Gentiles, † and teach thē Gentiles? What manner of saying is this that he said : Ye shall seek me, and shall not find me : and where I am, † thither ye cānot come? In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried, saying : If any man thirst, let him come untō me, and drink. He that believeth on me, as the Scripture hath said, out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water. But this spake he of the Spirit, which they that believe on him shōuld receive.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 6. Turn thee, O Lord, and deliver my soul : O save me for thy mercy's sake.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord our God : that this saving victim may effectually avail, both for the cleansing

of our souls from all their sins, and for the obtaining of the favour of thy heavenly Majesty. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 24. The Lord of hosts, he is the King of glory.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OR Lord, who hast made us partakers in this Sacrament of our salvation : grant, we beseech thee, that the same may be profitable unto us both for the cleansing and the healing of our souls. Through.

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

KEEP, we beseech thee, O Lord, thy faithful people, both outwardly in their bodies and inwardly in their souls : that they, cleaving stedfastly to all good works, may ever be defended by thy mighty power. Through.

TUESDAY

Station at St. Cyriacus.

INTROIT. *Exspecta.* *Ps.* 27.

OTARRY thou the Lord's leisure : be strong, and he shall comfort thy heart, and put thou thy trust in the Lord. *Ps. ibid.* The Lord is my light and my salvation : whom then shall I fear? O tarry thou.

COLLECT.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that this our fasting may be acceptable in thy sight : that we beir, cleansed from our sins, and made worthy of thy grace, may be made whole unto everlasting life. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on Passion Sunday.

The LESSON from the Story of Bel and the Dragon.

Bel and the Dragon, 29.

IN those days : They of Babylon came to the king, and said : Deliver us Daniel, or else we will destroy thee and thine house. Now when the king saw that they pressed him sore, being constrained, he delivered Daniel unto them : who cast him into the lions' den : where he was six days. And in the den there were seven lions, and they had given them every day two carcases, and two sheep : which then were not given to them, to the intent they might devour Daniel. Now there was in Jewry a Prophet, called Habbacuc, who had made pottage, and had broken bread in a bowl, and was going into the field, for to bring it to the reapers. But the Angel of the Lord said unto Habbacuc : Go, carry the dinner that thou hast into Babylon unto Daniel, who is in the lions' den. And Habbacuc said : Lord, I never saw Babylon ; neither do I know where the den is. Then the Angel of the Lord took him by the crown, and bare him by the hair of his head, and through the vehemency of his spirit set him in Babylon over the den. And Habbacuc cried, saying : O Daniel, Daniel, take the dinner which God hath sent thee. And Daniel said : Thou hast remembered me, O God : neither hast thou forsaken them that seek thee and love thee. So Daniel arose, and did eat : and the Angel of the Lord set Habbacuc in his own place again immediately. Upon the seventh day the king went to bewail

Daniel : and when he came to the den, he looked in, and, behold, Daniel was sitting. Then cried the king with a loud voice, saying : Great art thou, O Lord God of Daniel, and there is none other beside thee. And he drew him out, and cast those that were the cause of his destruction into the den : and they were devoured in a moment before his face. Then said the King : Let all men that dwell in all the earth tremble and fear before the God of Daniel : for it is he that rescueth and worketh signs in the earth, who hath delivered Daniel from the power of the lions.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 43.* Defend my cause, O Lord : deliver me from the deceitful and wicked man. *V.* O send out thy light and thy truth, that they may lead me : and bring me unto thy holy hill.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to John.

St. John 7. 1.

AT that time : Jesus walked in Galilee : for he would not walk in Jewry, because the Jews sough't to kill him. Now the Jews' feast of Tabernacles was at hand. His brethren therefore said unto him : Depart hence, and go into Judaea, that thy disciples also may see the works that thou doest. For there is no man that doeth any thing in secret, and he himself seeketh to be known openly. If thou do these things, shew thyself to the world. For neither did his brethren believe in him. Then Jesus said unto them : My time is not yet come : but your time is alway ready. The world cannot hate you ; but me it hateth, because I testify of it, that the works thereof are

evil. Go ye up unto this feast ; I go not up yet unto this feast : for my time is not yet full come. When he had said these words unto them, he abode still in Galilee. But when his brethren were gone up, then went he also up unto the feast, not openly, but as it were in secret. Then the Jews sought him at the feast, and said : † Where is he? And there was much murmuring among the people concerning him : for some said : He is a good man ; others said : Nay ; but he deceiveth the people. Howbeit no man spake openly of him for fear of the Jews.

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 9.* They that know thy Name shall put their trust in thee : for thou, Lord, hast never failed them that seek thee : O praise the Lord which dwelleth in Sion : for he forgetteth not the complaint of the poor.

SECRET.

ACCEPT, O Lord, we pray thee, the sacrifice, which we here do offer and present unto thee : humbly beseeching thee, that it may in such wise be profitable unto us for our comfort in this present life, that we may ever hold fast the promises which thou hast given us of life eternal. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps. 25.* Deliver me, O God of Israel, out of all my troubles.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we, ever following diligently after things eternal, may be found worthy to attain unto the gifts of thy heavenly bounty. Through.

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

GRANT to us, Lord, we beseech thee, grace so to continue stedfastly in obedience to thy will : that in our time the number of the faithful people may be multiplied and the worthiness of their service increased. Through.

WEDNESDAY

Station at St. Marcellus.

INTROIT. *Liberator. Ps. 18.*

IT is he that delivereth me from my cruel enemies : and setteth me up above mine adversaries : thou shalt rid me from the wicked man, O Lord. *Ps. ibid.* I will love thee, O Lord, my strength : the Lord is my stony rock, and my defence, and my Saviour. It is he.

COLLECT.

MERCIFUL God, we beseech thee to sanctify this our fasting to the enlightenment of the hearts of thy faithful people : that we, to whom thou hast given an hearty desire to pray, may obtain of thy loving-kindness the fulfilment of all our petitions. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on Passion Sunday.

The LESSON from the Book of Leviticus. *Lev. 19. 10.*

IN those days : the Lord spake unto Moses, saying : Speak unto all the congregation of the children of Israel, saying : I am the Lord your God. Ye shall not steal, neither deal falsely, neither lie one to another. And ye shall not swear by my name falsely, neither shalt thou profane the name of thy God : I am the Lord. Thou shalt

not defraud thy neighbour, neither rob him : the wages of him that is hired shall not abide with thee all night until the morning. Thou shalt not curse the deaf, nor put a stumblingblock before the blind, but shalt fear thy God : I am the Lord. Ye shall do no unrighteousness in judgement : thou shalt not respect the person of the poor, nor honour the person of the mighty : but in righteousness shalt thou judge thy neighbour. Thou shalt not go up and down as a talebearer among thy people : neither shalt thou stand against the blood of thy neighbour : I am the Lord. Thou shalt hate not thy brother in thine heart : thou shalt in any wise rebuke thy neighbour, and not suffer sin upon him. Thou shalt not avenge, nor bear any grudge against the children of thy people, but thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself : I am the Lord. Ye shall keep my statutes. For I am the Lord your God.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 30. I will magnify thee, O Lord, for thou hast set me up : and hast not made my foes to triumph over me. *V.* O Lord my God, I cried unto thee : and thou hast healed me : thou, Lord, hast brought my soul out of hell, thou hast kept my life from them that go down to the pit.

TRACT. *Ps.* 103. O Lord, deal not, as on *Ash Wednesday*.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 10. 22.

AT that time : It was at Jerusalem the feast of the Dedication, and it was winter. And Jesus walked in the temple in Sôlomon's porch. Then

came the Jews round about him, and said unto him : † How long dost thou make us to doubt? If thou be the Christ, tell us plainly. Jesus answered them : I told you, and ye believed not ; the works that I do in my Father's name, they bear witness of me. But ye believe not, because ye are not of my sheep, as I said unto you. My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me : and I give unto them eternal life ; and they shall never perish, neither shall any man pluck them out of my hand. My Father, which gave them me, is greater than all : and no man is able to pluck them out of my Father's hand. I and my Father are one. Then the Jews took up stones again to stone him. Jesus answered them : Many good works have I shewed you from my Father ; † for which of those works do ye stone me? The Jews answered him, saying : For a good work we stone thee not : but for blasphemy ; and because that thou, being a man, makest thyself God. Jesus answered them : Is it not written in your law, I said : † Ye are gods? If he called them gods, unto whom the word of God came, and the Scripture cannot be broken : say ye of him, whom the Father hath sanctified, and sent into the world : Thou blasphemest ; because I said : † I am the Sôn of God? If I do not the works of my Father, believe me not. But if I do, though ye believe not me, believe the works : that ye may know, and believe, that the Father is in me, and I in him.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 59. Deliver me from mine enemies, O God : defend me, O

Lord, from them that rise up against me.

SECRET.

GRANT, O most merciful God : that we, which here bring unto thee this sacrifice of propitiation and thanksgiving, may offer the same in all singleness and lowliness of heart. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 26. I will wash my hands in innocency, O Lord, and so will I go to thine altar : that I may shew the voice of thanksgiving, and tell of all thy wondrous works.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O LORD, who hast vouchsafed to make us partakers of thy heavenly benediction : grant, we pray thee, that the pledge, which thou hast given us in this holy Sacrament, may be fulfilled in us unto everlasting salvation. Through.

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

ASSIST us mercifully, O Lord, in these our supplications : that we, whom thou dost suffer to put our trust and confidence in thy mercy, may of thy goodness obtain the wonted effects of thy compassion. Through.

THURSDAY

Station at St. Apollinaris.

INTROIT. *Omnia quae fecisti.*
Song of the Three Children, v. 8.

EVERYTHING that thou hast done to us, O Lord, thou hast done in true judgement, for we have trespassed, and not obeyed thy commandments :

but give glory to thy Name, and deal with us after thy loving-kindness. *Ps.* 119. Blessed are those that are undefiled in the way : and walk in the law of the Lord. Everything that thou.

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we, which by our incontinence have corrupted the worthiness of man's condition, may by devout abstinence heal and restore the same. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on Passion Sunday.

The LESSON from the Song of the Three Children.

Song of the Three Children, II.

IN those days : Azarias prayed unto the Lord, saying : O Lord our God, deliver us not up wholly, for thy Name's sake, neither disannul thou thy covenant : and cause not thy mercy to depart from us, for thy beloved Abraham's sake, for thy servant Isaac's sake, and for thy holy Israel's sake ; to whom thou hast spoken and promised, that thou wouldest multiply their seed as the stars of heaven, and as the sand that lieth upon the seashore. For we, O Lord, are become less than any nation, and be kept under this day in all the world because of our sins. Neither is there at this time prince, or prophet, or leader, or burnt offering, or sacrifice, or oblation, or incense, or place to sacrifice before thee, and to find mercy. Nevertheless in a contrite heart and an humble spirit let us be accepted. Like as in the burnt offerings of rams and bullocks, and like as in ten thousands of

fat lambs : so let our sacrifice be in thy sight this day, and grant that we may wholly go after thee : for they shall not be confounded that put their trust in thee. And now we follow thee with all our heart, we fear thee, and seek thy face. Put us not to shame : but deal with us after thy loving-kindness, and according to the multitude of thy mercies. Deliver us also according to thy marvellous works, and give glory to thy Name, O Lord : and let all them that do thy servants hurt be ashamed ; and let them be confounded in all their power and might, and let their strength be broken ; and let them know that thou art Lord, the only God, and glorious over the whole world, O Lord our God.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 96. Bring presents, and come into his courts : O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness. *V.* *Ps.* 29. The voice of the Lord discovereth the thick bushes : in his temple doth every man speak of his honour.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Luke.

St. Luke 7. 36.

AT that time : One of the Pharisees desired Jesus, that he would eat with him. And he went into the Pharisee's house, and sat down to meat. And, behold, a woman in the city, which was a sinner, when she knew that Jesus sat at meat in the Pharisee's house, brought an alabaster box of ointment, and stood at his feet behind him weeping, and began to wash his feet with tears, and did wipe them

with the hairs of her head, and kissed his feet, and anointed them with the ointment. Now when the Pharisee which had bidden him saw it, he spake within himself, saying : This man, if he were a Prophet, would have known who and what manner of woman this is that toucheth him : for she is a sinner. And Jesus answering said unto him : Simon, I have somewhat to say unto thee. And he saith : Master, say on. There was a certain creditor which had two debtors : the one owed five hundred pence, and the other fifty. And when they had nothing to pay, he frankly forgave them both. Tell me therefore, † which of them will love him most? Simon answered and said : I suppose that he, to whom he forgave most. And he said unto him : Thou hast rightly judged. And he turned to the woman, and said unto Simon : † Seest thou this woman? I entered into thine house, thou gavest me no water for my feet : but she hath washed my feet with tears, and wiped them with the hairs of her head. Thou gavest me no kiss : but this woman since the time I came in hath not ceased to kiss my feet. My head with oil thou didst not anoint : but this woman hath anointed my feet with ointment. Wherefore I say unto thee : Her sins, which are many, are forgiven : for she loved much ; but to whom little is forgiven, the same loveth little. And he said unto her : Thy sins are forgiven. And they that sat at meat with him began to say within themselves : † Who is this that forgiveth sins also? And he said to the woman : Thy faith hath saved thee ; go in peace.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 137. By the waters of Babylon we sat down and wept : when we remembered thee, O Sion.

SECRET.

O LORD God Almighty, who of the creatures, which thou hast ordained for the succour of man's frailty, hast commanded that an oblation should be offered to the honour of thy Name : grant, we beseech thee, that the same may be a sacrifice acceptable unto thee for our succour in this present life, and a Sacrament profitable unto us for the obtaining of life everlasting. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 119. O think upon thy servant, as concerning thy word, O Lord, wherein thou hast caused me to put my trust : the same is my comfort in my trouble.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, that those things, which we have taken with our outward lips, we may inwardly receive in purity of heart : that being in this life partakers of these thy gifts, we may by the same be healed unto life everlasting. Through.

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to have compassion on thy people : that we, eschewing those things that are contrary to thy good pleasure, may be fulfilled with gladness by the walking after thy commandments. Through.

FRIDAY

[*On this day is kept the Feast of the Compassion of our Lady in honour of her share in the Passion, for which see Propers for Certain Moveable Holy Days.*]

Station at St. Stephen's on the Coelian Hill.

INTROIT. *Miserere mihi. Ps.* 31.

HAVE mercy upon me, O Lord, for I am in trouble : deliver me from the hand of mine enemies, and from them that persecute me : let me not be confounded, O Lord, for I have called upon thee. *Ps. ibid.* In thee, O Lord, have I put my trust, let me never be put to confusion : deliver me in thy righteousness. Have mercy upon me, O Lord.

COLLECT.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to pour thy grace into our hearts : that we, who willingly by the chastisement of the flesh do refrain from sin, may in such wise mortify ourselves in this life, that we may be delivered in the end from everlasting damnation. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on Passion Sunday.

The LESSON from Jeremiah the Prophet. *Jer.* 17. 13.

IN those days : Jeremiah said : O Lord, all that forsake thee shall be ashamed, and they that depart from me shall be written in the earth, because they have forsaken the Lord, the fountain of living waters. Heal me, O Lord, and I shall be healed ; save me, and I shall be saved : for thou art my praise. Behold, they say unto me : † Where is the word of the Lord? let it

come now. As for me, I have not hastened from being a pastor to follow thee : neither have I desired the woe-ful day ; thou knowest : that which came out of my lips was right before thee. Be not a terror unto me : thou art my hope in the day of evil. Let them be confounded that persecute me, but let not me be confounded : let them be dismayed, but let not me be dismayed : bring upon them the day of evil, and destroy them with double destruction, O Lord our God.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 35.* Their communing is not for peace : but they imagine deceitful words against them that are quiet in the land. *V.* This hast thou seen, O Lord, hold not thy tongue : go not far from me, O Lord.

TRACT. *Ps. 103.* O Lord, deal not, as on *Ash Wednesday*.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to John.

St. John II. 47.

AT that time : The chief priests and the Pharisees gathered a council against Jesus, and said : † Whât do we? for this man doeth maný miracles. If we let him thus alone, all men will believe on him : and the Romans shall come and take away both our plâce and nation. And one of them, named Caiaphas, being the high priest that same year, said unto them : Ye know nothing at all, nor consider that it is expedient for us, that one man should die for the people, and that the whole nation perish not. And this spake he nô of himself ; but being high priest that year, he prophesied that Jesus

should die for that nation ; and not for that nation only, but that also he should gather together in one the children of God that were scattèrèd abroad. Then from that day forth they took counsel together for to put him to death. Jesus therefore walked no more openly among the Jews ; but went thence unto a country near to the wilderness, into a city called Ephraim, and there continued with his disciples.

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 119.* Blessed art thou, O Lord, O teach me thy statutes : O give me not over unto the proud, that are mine oppressors : so shall I make answer unto my blasphemers.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, merciful God : that we being ever found meet to do thee worthy service at thine holy altar, may continually be made partakers of the same to our salvation. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps. 27.* Deliver me not over into the will of mine adversaries, O Lord : for there are false witnesses risen up against me, and such as speak wrong.

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE pray thee, O Lord, that this holy sacrifice whereof we have been made partakers, may never fail to succour and defend us, and evermore to drive far from us all things that may hurt us. Through.

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we, who seek the grace of thy protection, may ever be delivered from all evils and faithfully serve thee with a quiet mind. Through.

SATURDAY

*Station at St. John before the Latin Gate.*INTROIT. *Miserere mihi. Ps. 31.*

HAVE mercy upon me, O Lord, for I am in trouble : deliver me from the hand of mine enemies and from them that persecute me : let me not be confounded, O Lord, for I have called upon thee. *Ps. ibid.* In thee, O Lord, have I put my trust, let me never be put to confusion : deliver me in thy righteousness. Have mercy.

COLLECT.

GRANT, O Lord, that thy people, which are consecrated to thy service may continually increase in all godly affections : that they being duly instructed in all holy learning, may both be made the more acceptable unto thy divine majesty, and prospered more abundantly in the gifts of thy bounty. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as on Passion Sunday.

The LESSON from Jeremiah the Prophet. *Jer. 18. 18.*

IN those days : The ungodly Jews said one to another : Come let us devise devices against the righteous : for the law shall not perish from the priest, nor counsel from the wise, nor the word from the prophet. Come, and let us smite him with the tongue,

and let us not give heed to any of his words. Give heed to me, O Lord, and hearken to the voice of them that contend with me. † Shall evil be recompensèd for good? for they have digged a pit for my soul. Remember that I stood before thee to speak good for them, and to turn away thy wrath from them. Therefore deliver up their children to the famine, and pour out their blood by the force of the sword ; and let their wives be bereaved of their children, and be widows ; and let their men be put to death ; let their young men be slain by the sword in battle. Let a cry be heard from their houses, when thou shalt bring a troop suddenly upon them : for they have digged a pit to take me, and hid snares for my feet. Yet, Lord, thou knowest all their counsel against me to slay me : forgive not their iniquity, neither blot out their sin from thy sight, but let them be overthrown before thee ; deal thus with them in the time of thine anger, O Lord our God.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 35.* Their communing is not for peace : but they imagine deceitful words against them that are quiet in the land. √. This hast thou seen, O Lord, hold not thy tongue ; go not far from me, O Lord.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accòrding to John.

St. John 12. 10.

AT that time : The chief priests consulted together that they might put Lazarus also to death ; because that by reason of him many of the

Jews went away, and believêd on Jesus. On the next day much people that were come to the feast, when they heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, took branches of palm trees, and went forth to meet him, and cried : Hosanna : Blessed is the King of Israel that cometh in the Nâme of the Lord. And Jesus, when he had found a young âss, sat thereon ; as it is written : Fear not, daughter of Sion : behold, thy King cometh, sitting on an ass's colt. These things understood not his disciples at the first : but when Jesus was glorified, then remembered they that these things were written of him, and that they had done these things unto him. The people therefore that was with him when he called Lazarus out of his grave, and raised him from the dêad, bare record. For this cause the people also met him, for that they heard that he had done this miracle. The Pharisees therefore said among themselves : † Perceive ye how ye prevâil nothing? behold, the world is gône after him. And there were certain Greeks among them that came up to worship at the feast ; The same came therefore to Philip, which was of Bethsaida of Galilee, and desired him, saying : Sir, we wôuld see Jesus. Philip cometh and telleth Andrew : and again Andrew and Philip tell Jesus. And Jesus answered them, saying : The hour is come, that the Son of Man should be glôrified. Verily, verily, I say unto you, Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone : but if it die, it bringêth forth much fruit. He that loveth his life shall lose it ; and he that hateth his life in this world shall keep

it unto life eternal. If any man serve me, let him follow me ; and where I am, there shall also my servant be ; if any man serve me, him will my Fâther honour. Now is my soul troubled ; † and what shall I say? Father save me from this hour : but for this cause came I ûnto this hour. Father, glorify thy name. Then came there a voice from heaven, saying : I have both glorified it, and will glorifÿ it again. The people therefore, that stood by, and heard it, said that it thunderèd ; others said : An Angêl spake to him. Jesus answered and said : This voice came not because of me, bût for your sakes. Now is the judgemênt of this world ; now shall the prince of this wôrld be cast out. And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all mên unto me. This he said, signifying what dêath he should die. The people answered him : We have heard out of the law that Christ abideth for ever : and how sayest thou : † The Son of Man must be lifted up? † who is this Sôn of Man? Then Jesus said unto them : Yet a little while is thê light with you. Walk while ye have the light, lest darkness come upon you : for he that walketh in darkness knoweth not whithêr he goeth. While ye have light, believe in the light, that ye may be the children of light. These things spake Jesus, and departed, and did hide himself from them.

OFFERTORY. Ps. 119. Blessed art thou, O Lord, O teach me thy statutes : O give me not over unto the proud that are mine oppressors : so shall I make answer unto my blasphemers.

SECRET.

O LORD, who sufferest us to be partakers of thy wondrous mysteries : grant, we beseech thee, that by thy mercy we may be absolved from all our iniquities, and defended against all adversities. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps. 27.* Deliver me not over into the will of mine adversaries, O Lord : for there are false witnesses risen up against me, and such as speak wrong.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O LORD our God, who hast fulfilled us with the bounty of thy heavenly gifts : grant, we beseech thee,

that we may ever live by the partaking of the same. Through.

Over the people. Let us pray. Bow down before the Lord.

COLLECT.

STRETCH forth, O Lord, we pray thee, thy right hand to be the defence of thy people that calleth upon thee : that they, being cleansed from all their sins and taught in thy holy will, may in such wise obtain thy comfort in this present life, that they may grow in grace to the attainment of everlasting felicity. Through.

THE SUNDAY NEXT BEFORE EASTER

Commonly Called Palm Sunday

Sunday of I Class, Semidouble

THE LITURGY OF THE PALMS

I. THE SCRIPTURAL LECTIIONS.

§ *The Priest proceeds to bless the branches of palm and olive or other trees; such branches being laid before the middle of the Altar or at the Epistle corner, and first the Choir shall sing the Antiphon:*

St. Matt. 21.

HOSANNA to the Son of David : blessed is he that cometh in the Name of the Lord. O King of Israel : Hosanna in the highest.

℣. The Lord be with you.

℟. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O GOD, whose love and service is our righteousness, increase, we pray thee, and multiply upon us the gifts of thy unspeakable grace : that like as by the death of thy Son thou hast given unto us the hope of our faith ; so by his resurrection we may be brought unto the country which we seek. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

The LESSON from the Book of Exodus.

Exod. 15. 27.

IN those days : The children of Israel came to Elim, where were twelve wells of water, and threescore and ten palm trees : and they encamped there by the waters. And they took their

journey from Elim, and all the congregation of the children of Israel came unto the wilderness of Sin, which is between Elim and Sinai : on the fifteenth day of the second month after their departing out of the land of Egypt. And the whole congregation of the children of Israel murmured against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. And the children of Israel said unto them : Would to God we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the flesh-pots, and when we did eat bread to the full : for ye have brought us forth into this wilderness, to kill this whole assembly with hunger. Then said the Lord unto Moses : Behold, I will rain bread from heaven for you : and the people shall go out and gather a certain rate every day : that I may prove them, whether they will walk in my law or no. And it shall come to pass, that on the sixth day they shall prepare that which they bring in : and it shall be twice as much as they gather daily. And Moses and Aaron said unto all the children of Israel : At even, then ye shall know that the Lord hath brought you out from the land of Egypt : and in the morning, then ye shall see the glory of the Lord.

§ *Then shall be sung for the Gradual:*

℟. *St. John 11.* Then gathered the chief priests and the Pharisees a coun-

cil, and said : What do we, for this man doeth many miracles? If we let him thus alone, all men will believe on him : * And the Romans shall come, and take away both our place and nation. V̄. And one of them, named Caiaphas, being the high priest that same year, said unto them : It is expedient for us, that one man should die for the people, and that the whole nation perish not. From that day forth they took counsel together for to put him to death, saying : And the Romans shall come.

Or this R̄. *St. Matt. 26.* On the Mount of Olives he prayed to his Father : O my Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me. * The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak : nevertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt. V̄. Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation. The spirit indeed.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 21. 1.

AT that time : When they drew nigh unto Jerusalem and were come to Bethphage unto the Mount of Olives : then sent Jesus two disciples, saying unto them : Go into the village over against you, and straightway ye shall find an ass tied, and a colt with her : loose them and bring them unto me ; and if any man say ought unto you, ye shall say : The Lord hath need of them, and straightway he will send them. All this was done, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophet, saying : Tell ye the daughter of Sion : Behold thy King cometh

unto thee, meek and sitting upon an ass, and a colt the fôal of an ass. And the disciples went, and did as Jesus commanded them : and brought the ass, and the colt : and put on them their clothes, and they set him thereon. And a very great multitude spread their garments in the way ; others cut down branches from the trees, and strowed them in the way ; and the multitudes that went before and that followed, cried, saying : Hosanna to the Son of David : blessed is he that cometh in the Name of the Lord.

II. THE BLESSING OF THE PALMS.

§ *Then shall the branches be blessed. And the Priest standing at the Epistle corner shall say in the ferial tone of the Collect:*

V̄. The Lord be with you. R̄. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

INCREASE, O Lord, we pray thee, the faith of them that put their trust in thee, and graciously hear the prayers of thy humble servants : send down upon us the manifold gifts of thy mercy and vouchsafe to bless these branches of palm or olive ; that like as in a figure of thy Church thou didst bless Noah going forth from the ark, and Moses going forth out of Egypt with the children of Israel, so we bearing palms and olive-branches may go forth with all good works to meet Christ, our Saviour, and through him enter into everlasting gladness. Who liveth and reigneth with thee, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, ever one God :

WORLD without end. *R.* Amen.
V. The Lord be with you. *R.*
 And with thy spirit. *V.* Lift up your
 hearts. *R.* We lift them up unto the
 Lord. *V.* Let us give thanks unto
 our Lord God. *R.* It is meet and
 right so to do.

IT is very meet, right, and our boun-
 den duty, that we should at all
 times, and in all places give thanks
 unto thee, O Lord, Holy, Father Al-
 mighty, Everlasting God. Who art
 glorified in the council of thy Saints,
 being acknowledged by all thy crea-
 tures, their only Maker and their God :
 all thy works do praise thee and thy
 Saints give thanks unto thee : con-
 fessing without fear before the kings
 and rulers of this world the great
 Name of thy only begotten Son.

THEREFORE with Angels and Arch-
 angels, and with all the company
 of heaven, we laud and magnify thy
 glorious Name ; evermore praising thee,
 and saying.

And the Sanctus is sung by the Choir.

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord God of
 Hosts. Heaven and earth are full of
 thy glory. Glory be to thee, O Lord
 Most High. Blessed is he that cometh
 in the Name of the Lord. Hosanna
 in the highest.

Then shall he say:

V. The Lord be with you.

R. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

WE beseech thee, O Lord holy, Fa-
 ther almighty, everlasting God :
 that thou wouldest vouchsafe to bl⁺ess
 and sanct⁺ify these thy creatures,

which thou hast bidden to spring from
 the wood of the olive tree : which
 likewise the dove, returning to the ark,
 did bear in her mouth : granting unto
 all them that shall receive the same
 that they may obtain thereby protec-
 tion both in body and soul : and that,
 by thy grace which in a figure is
 shewn forth herein, we may effectually
 be healed unto everlasting salvation.
 Through.

Let us pray.

O GOD, who gatherest together the
 outcasts, and preservest them
 whom thou hast gathered : who didst
 bless the people when they went forth
 bearing branches to meet Jesus : vouch-
 safe likewise to bl⁺ess these branches
 of palm and olive which thy faithful
 servants shall here receive in honour
 of thy Name ; granting that into what-
 soever place they shall bear the same,
 the dwellers therein may obtain thy
 blessing : that being delivered from all
 adversity, they may ever be defended
 by thy mighty power, who are re-
 deemed by Jesus Christ thy Son our
 Lord. Who liveth and reigneth with
 thee.

Let us pray.

O GOD whose wonderful providence
 hath ordained even lifeless things
 to shew forth the dispensation of our
 redemption : grant, we beseech thee ;
 that the devout hearts of thy faithful
 people may understand aright the mys-
 tery which is this day shewn forth.
 For, as at this time, the multitude by
 the inspiration of thy heavenly light
 went forth to meet their Redeemer,
 and strawed branches of palm and olive

in his way, thereby in the branches of palm foreshadowing his triumph over the prince of death and by the boughs of olive proclaiming that the anointing of the Spirit was come. For the multitude rejoiced to know that even then was it prefigured : that our Redeemer, having compassion on the misery of mankind, was making ready to fight against the prince of death for the life of the whole world and by his death to conquer. And therefore obediently they laid before him offerings to signify both the triumph of his victory and the abundance of his mercy. Wherefore we likewise, with sure faith having in memory their deeds and the signification of the same, humbly beseech thee, O Lord holy, Father almighty, everlasting God, that like as thou hast vouchsafed to make us members of the same Jesus Christ our Lord : so in him and through him, we may win the victory over the powers of death, and be made partakers of his glorious resurrection. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

Let us pray.

O GOD, who by an olive-branch didst command the dove to proclaim peace on earth : vouchsafe, we beseech thee ; to sanctify with thy heavenly blessing these branches of olive and other trees : that for all thy people they may be profitable unto the attainment of everlasting salvation. Through Christ our Lord. R̄. Amen.

Let us pray.

BLESS, O Lord, we pray thee, these branches of palm and olive : and grant ; that as thy people outwardly

with their bodies do worship thee, so inwardly in their souls they may serve thee with pure devotion, that they may be victorious over the assaults of the enemy and cleave stedfastly unto all good works. Through.

§ *Then shall the Priest set incense in the censer, and sprinkle the branches three times with holy water, saying without note and without the Psalm the Antiphon Thou shalt purge me ; then shall he cense them three times and afterwards he shall say:*

℣. The Lord be with you. ℞. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

O GOD, who didst send forth thy Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, into the world for our salvation, that he might humble himself to be made like unto us and call us back unto thee : before whom, at his coming to Jerusalem for the fulfilling of the Scriptures, the multitude of them that believed with fruitful devotion strawed their raiment and palm branches in the way : grant, we beseech thee ; that we may so prepare for him the way of faith, that, every stone of stumbling and rock of offence being done away, our works may blossom before thee with branches of righteousness : and that we may be found worthy to follow in his footsteps. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

III. THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE PALMS.

§ *The blessing being thus ended, the first of the Clergy that are present shall approach the Altar and give one of the*

branches that have been blessed to the Priest. And thereafter, the Priest standing before the Altar shall turn himself to the People and distribute the branches, first to the Clergy singly, according to their order, and lastly, to the People. And as he be-ginneth to make distribution, the Choir shall sing the Antiphons here set forth:

The children of the Hebrews, bearing branches of olive, went out to meet the Lord, crying out and saying : Hosanna in the highest.

And this Antiphon. The children of the Hebrews strawed their raiment in the way and cried out saying : Hosanna to the Son of David : blessed is he that cometh in the Name of the Lord.

§ *And if these be not sufficient, they shall be repeated until all the branches have been distributed.*

Then shall the Priest say:

℣. The Lord be with you.

℟. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who didst ordain that Jesus Christ our Lord should ride upon a colt, the foal of an ass, and didst teach the multitudes to straw in his way their raiment and branches of trees, and likewise to sing Hosanna in his praise : grant, we beseech thee ; that we may by thee be enabled to follow them in all innocency of life, and be made like unto them in rendering unto thee our true and worthy service. Through the same Christ our Lord. ℟. Amen.

IV. THE PROCESSION OF THE PALMS.

§ *Then shall they make the PROCESSION. And first the Priest shall set incense in*

the censer, and the Deacon turning himself about to the people, shall say: Let us go forth in peace. And the clerks shall answer: In the Name of Christ. Amen.

And the Antiphons here following shall be sung, so many as shall suffice for the time of the Procession.

Antiphon. St. Matt. 21. When the Lord drew nigh unto Jerusalem he sent two of his disciples, saying unto them : Go into the village over against you : and straightway ye shall find an ass's colt tied, whereon never man sat : loose him and bring him unto me. If any man say aught unto you, ye shall say : The Lord hath need of him. They loose him and bring him to Jesus and put on him their clothes, and set him thereon : and some spread their garments in the way, others strawed branches from the trees : and they that followed cried : Hosanna : blessed is he that cometh in the Name of the Lord : blessed is the kingdom of our father David : Hosanna in the highest : Thou Son of David, have mercy upon us.

Another Antiphon. St. John 12. When the people heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, they took branches of palm trees : and went forth to meet him, and the children cried, saying : This is he that should come for the salvation of the people. This is our salvation and the redemption of Israel. How mighty is he whom Thrones and Dominations go forth to meet. Fear not, daughter of Sion : behold thy King cometh, sitting on an ass's colt, as it is written. Hail, King, creator of the world, who hast come to redeem us.

Another Antiphon. Six days before the feast of the Passover, when the Lord came to the city of Jerusalem, the children went forth to meet him : and in their hands they took branches of palm-trees and cried with a loud voice, saying : Hosanna in the highest : blessed art thou who hast come in the multitude of thy mercies : Hosanna in the highest.

Another Antiphon. The multitudes with flowers and branches go forth to meet their Redeemer : and render worthy homage to the triumphant conqueror : the Gentiles with their lips proclaim the Son of God : and in the praise of Christ their voices thunder through the sky : Hosanna in the highest.

Another Antiphon. With the Angels and the children may we be found faithful, crying unto the vanquisher of death : Hosanna in the highest.

Another Antiphon. Much people that were come to the feast cried unto the Lord : Blessed is he that cometh in the Name of the Lord : Hosanna in the highest.

§ *As the Procession turneth back, two or four Cantors shall enter into the Church, and shutting the door, shall stand with their faces towards the Procession and begin the hymn Gloria, laus, et honor. So shall they sing the first verse and the Priest with the others shall repeat the same, standing without the Church.*

Thereafter they that are within shall sing the other verses that follow: either all or as many as seemeth good: and after every verse, they that are without shall sing in answer the first verse.

HYMN. *Gloria, laus, et honor.*

ALL glory, laud, and honour to thee, Redeemer, King : to whom the lips of children made sweet Hosannas ring. *R.* All glory.
 Thou art the King of Israel, thou David's royal Son : who in the Lord's Name comest, the King and Blessed One. *R.* All glory.
 The company of Angels are praising thee on high, and mortal men and all things created make reply. *R.* All glory.
 The people of the Hebrews with palms before thee went : our praise and prayer and anthems before thee we present. *R.* All glory.
 To thee before thy passion they sang their hymns of praise : to thee now high exalted our melody we raise. *R.* All glory.
 Thou didst accept their praises, accept the prayers we bring : who in all good delightest, thou good and gracious King. *R.* All glory.

This ended, the Subdeacon with the shaft of the Cross shall strike the door: which being forthwith opened, the Procession shall enter the Church, singing:

R. When the Lord entered the holy city, the children of the Hebrews foretold the Resurrection of Life. * And bearing branches of palms, cried out : Hosanna in the highest.

V. When the people heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, they went forth to meet him. And bearing branches. *And Glory be to the Father shall not be said.*

Then shall the MASS be said; and all shall hold the branches in their hands while the Passion and Gospel are sung, but not at any other time.

AT THE MASS

Station at St. John Lateran. Passion shortened 1662.

INTROIT. *Domine, ne longe.* Ps. 22.

BE not thou far from me, O Lord, thou art my succour, haste thee to help me : save me from the lion's mouth, thou hast heard me also from among the horns of the unicorns. *Ps.*

ibid. My God, my God, look upon me : why hast thou forsaken me : and art so far from my health, and from the words of my complaint? Be not thou.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who, of thy tender love towards mankind, hast sent thy Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, to take upon him our flesh, and to suffer death upon the Cross, that all mankind should follow the example of his grêat humility : mercifully grant that we may both follow the example of his patiênce, and also be made partakers of his resurrection. Through the same Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Philippians. *Phil. 2. 5.*

BRETHREN : Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus : who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God : but made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men. And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the Cross. Wherefore God also hath highly exalted him : and given him a Name which is above every name : (*Here genuflect*) that at the Name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth : and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 73.* Thou hast holden me by my right hand : thou shalt guide me with thy counsel : and after that receive me with glory. *V.* Truly God is loving unto Israel, even unto such as are of a clean heart : nevertheless, my feet were almost gone : my treadings had well-nigh slipt : and why? I was grieved at the wicked, I do also see the ungodly in such prosperity.

TRACT. *Ps. 22.* My God, my God, look upon me : why hast thou forsaken me? *V.* And art so far from my health ; and from the words of my complaint? *V.* O my God, I cry in the daytime, but thou hearest not : and in the night season also I take no rest. *V.* But thou continuest holy, O thou Worship of Israel. *V.* Our fathers hoped in thee : they trusted in thee, and thou didst deliver them. *V.* They called upon thee, and were holpen : they put their trust in thee, and were not confounded. *V.* But as for me, I am a worm, and no man : a very scorn of men, and the outcast of the people. *V.* All they that see me laugh me to scorn : they shoot out their lips, and shake their heads, saying : *V.* He trusted in God, that he would deliiver him : let him deliver him, if he will have him. *V.* They stand staring and looking upon me : they part my garments among them, and cast lots upon my vesture. *V.* Save me from the lion's mouth : thou hast heard me also from among the horns of the unicorns. *V.* O praise the Lord, ye that fear him : magnify him, all ye seed of Jacob. *V.* They shall be counted unto the Lord for a generation : they shall come, and the heavens shall declare

his righteousness. *℣.* Unto a people that shall be born, whom the Lord hath made.

§ The Passion shall be begun immediately: Cleanse my heart is not said, nor is a blessing asked, nor are lights carried, nor incense: The Lord be with you is not said, nor Glory be to thee, O Lord, and the Celebrant, or Deacon, when he announces The Passion of our Lord, does not sign the book, nor himself. And this is to be observed on the other days also, when the Passion is read.

The PASSION of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 27. 1.

WHEN the morning was come : All the chief priests and elders of the people took counsel against Jesus, to put him to death. And when they had bound him, they led him away, and delivered him to Pontius Pilate the governour. Then Judas which had betrayed him, when he saw that he was condemned, repented himself, and brought again the thirty pieces of silver to the chief priests and elders, saying : *℟.* I have sinned, in that I have betrayed the innocent blood. *℣.* And they said : *℟.* What is that to us? see thou to that. *℣.* And he cast down the pieces of silver in the temple, and departed : and went and hanged himself. And the chief priests took the silver pieces, and said : *℟.* It is not lawful for to put them into the treasury : because it is the price of blood. *℣.* And they took counsel, and bought with them the potter's field, to bury strangers in. Wherefore that field was called, The field of blood, unto this

day. Then was fulfilled that which was spoken by Jeremy the Prophet, saying : And they took the thirty pieces of silver, the price of him that was valued, whom they of the children of Israel did value : and gave them for the potter's field, as the Lord appointed me. And Jesus stood before the governour : and the governour asked him, saying : *℟.* Art thou the King of the Jews? *℣.* And Jesus said unto him : *✠* Thou sayest. *℣.* And when he was accused of the chief priests and elders : he answered nothing. Then said Pilate unto him : *℟.* Hearest thou not how many things they witness against thee? *℣.* And he answered him to never a word, insomuch that the governour marvelled greatly. Now at that feast the governour was wont to release unto the people a prisoner, whom they would. And they had then a notable prisoner, called Barabbas. Therefore when they were gathered together, Pilate said unto them : *℟.* Whom will ye that I release unto you : Barabbas, or Jesus which is called Christ? *℣.* For he knew that for envy they had delivered him. When he was set down on the judgement-seat, his wife sent unto him, saying : *℟.* Have thou nothing to do with that just man : for I have suffered many things this day in a dream because of him. *℣.* But the chief priests and elders persuaded the multitude that they should ask Barabbas, and destroy Jesus. The governour answered and said unto them : *℟.* Whether of the twain will ye that I release unto you? *℣.* They said : *℟.* Barabbas. *℣.* Pilate saith unto them : *℟.* What shall I do then with Jesus, which is called Christ? *℣.* They

all say unto him : **℟.** Let him be crucified. **℣.** And the governour said : **℟.** Why, what evil hath he done? **℣.** But they cried out the more, saying : **℟.** Let him be crucified. **℣.** When Pilate saw that he could prevail nothing, but that rather a tumult was made : he took water, and washed his hands before the multitude, saying : **℟.** I am innocent of the blood of this just person : see ye to it. **℣.** Then answered all the people, and said : **℟.** His blood be on us, and on our children. **℣.** Then released he Barabas unto them : and when he had scourged Jesus he delivered him to be crucified. Then the soldiers of the governour took Jesus into the common hall, and gathered unto him the whole band of soldiers : and they stripped him, and put on him a scarlet robe : and when they had platted a crown of thorns they put it upon his head, and a reed in his right hand. And they bowed the knee before him, and mocked him, saying : **℟.** Hail, King of the Jews. **℣.** And they spit upon him, and took the reed, and smote him on the head. And after that they had mocked him they took the robe off from him, and put his own raiment on him, and led him away to crucify him. And as they came out they found a man of Cyrene, Simon by name : him they compelled to bear his cross. And when they were come unto a place called Golgotha, that is to say, a place of a skull : they gave him vinegar to drink mingled with gall. And when he had tasted thereof, he would not drink. And they crucified him, and parted his garments, casting lots : that it might be fulfilled, which was spoken

by the Prophet : They parted my garments among them, and upon my vesture did they cast lots. And sitting down they watched him there. And set up over his head his accusation written : THIS IS JESUS THE KING OF THE JEWS. Then were there two thieves crucified with him : one on the right hand, and another on the left. And they that passed by reviled him : wagging their heads, and saying : **℟.** Thou that destroyest the temple, and buildest it in three days : save thyself. If thou be the Son of God, come down from the cross. **℣.** Likewise also the chief priests mocking him, with the scribes and elders, said : **℟.** He saved others, himself he cannot save : if he be the King of Israel, let him now come down from the cross, and we will believe him : he trusted in God : let him deliver him now, if he will have him ; for he said : I am the Son of God. **℣.** The thieves also, which were crucified with him, cast the same in his teeth. Now from the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land unto the ninth hour. And about the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying : **✠** Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani? **℣.** That is to say : **✠** My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me? **℣.** Some of them that stood there, when they heard that, said : **℟.** This man calleth for Elias. **℣.** And straightway one of them ran, and took a sponge, and filled it with vinegar, and put it on a reed, and gave him to drink. The rest said : **℟.** Let be, let us see whether Elias will come to save him. **℣.** Jesus, when he had cried again with a loud voice : yielded up the ghost.

Here shall he genuflect and pause for a space. That which follows is sung in the tone of the Gospel:

AND behold, the veil of the temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom : and the earth did quake, and the rocks rent, and the graves were opened : and many bodies of saints which slept arose, and came out of the graves after his resurrection, and went into the holy city, and appeared unto many. Now when the centurion, and they that were with him, watching Jesus, saw the earthquake, and those things that were done, they feared greatly, saying : Truly this was the Son of God. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 69. Thy rebuke hath broken my heart, I am full of heaviness : I looked for some to have pity on me, but there was no man : neither found I any to comfort me : they gave me gall to eat, and when I was thirsty they gave me vinegar to drink.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that these gifts which we offer in the sight of thy divine majesty, may obtain for us grace to serve thee in this life with all godliness, and bring us in the end to everlasting felicity. Through.

PREFACE of the Cross.

COMMUNION. *St. Matt.* 26. O my Father, if this cup may not pass away from me, except I drink it : thy will be done.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, that by the operation of these thy mysteries, we may be cleansed from all our sins : and obtain that which we have asked according to thy will. Through.

§ *At Low Masses the Last Gospel is* When they drew nigh unto Jerusalem, *St. Matt.* 21, as above in the blessing of Palms.

Privileged Greater Feria.

*Station at St. Praxedes. Collect 1929.
Lesson & Passion 1549.*

INTROIT. *Judica Domine. Ps.* 35.

PLEAD thou my cause, O Lord, with them that strive with me ; and fight thou against them that fight against me : lay hand upon the shield and buckler, and stand up to help me, O Lord, the strength of my salvation. *Ps. ibid.* Bring forth the spear, and stop the way against them that persecute me : say unto my soul : I am thy Salvation. Plead thou.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified : mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the Cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace. Through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. [Who.]

COLLECT 2. *Of Palm Sunday.*

The LESSON from Isaiah the Prophet.

Is. 63. 1.

IN those days ; Said Isaiah : Who is this that cometh from Edom, † with dyed garments frôm Bozrah? This that is glorious in his apparel, † travelling in the greatness ôf his strength? I that speak in righteousness, mighty to save. † Wherefore art thou red in thine âpparel? † And thy garments like him that treadeth in thê winefat? I have trodden the wine-press alone, and of the people there was none with me : for I will tread them in mine anger, and trample them in my fury : and their blood shall be sprinkled upon my garments, and I will stain all my raiment. For the day of vengeance is in mine heart, and the year of my redeemed is come. And I looked, and there was none to help : and I wondered that there was none to uphold : therefore mine own arm brought salvation unto me, and my fury it upheld me. And I will tread down the people in mine anger, and make them drunk in my fury, and I will bring down their strength to the earth. I will mention the lovingkindnesses of the Lord, and the praises of the Lord, according to all that the Lord hath bestowed on us, and the great goodness toward the house of Israel. Which he hath bestowed on them, according to his mercies : and according to the multitude of his lovingkindnesses. For he said : Surely they are my people, children that will not lie : so he was their Saviour. In all their affliction he was afflicted : and the angel of his presence saved them. In his love, and in his pity, he redeemed them : and he bare them, and carried them all the days

of old. But they rebelled, and vexed his Holy Spirit : therefore he was turned to be their enemy, and he fought against them. Then he remembered the days of old : Moses and his people, saying : † Where is he that brought them up out of the sea with the shepherd ôf his flock? † Where is he that put his Holy Spirit within him? That led them by the right hand of Moses, † with his glorious arm? Dividing the water before them, † to make himself an everlâsting Name? That led them through the deep as an horse in the wilderness, † that they should nôt stumble? As a beast goeth down into the valley, the Spirit of the Lord caused him to rest : so didst thou lead thy people, to make thyself a glorious Name. Look down from heaven, and behold : from the habitation of thy holiness, and of thy glory. Where is thy zeal, and thy strength, the sounding of thy bowels, † and of thy merciês toward me? † Are they rêstrained? Doubtless thou art our Father. Though Abraham be ignorant of us, and Israel acknowledge us not : thou, O Lord, art our Father, our Redeemer, thy Name is from everlasting. O Lord, why hast thou made us to err from thy ways, † and hardened our heart frôm thy fear? Return for thy servants' sake, the tribes of thine inheritance. The people of thy holiness have possessed it but a little while : our adversaries have trodden down thy sanctuary. We are thine, thou never barest rule over them ; they were not called by thy Name.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 35.* Awake, O Lord, and stand up to judge my quarrel,

avenge thou my cause, my God, and my Lord. *℣*. Bring forth the spear, and stop the way against them that persecute me.

TRACT. *Ps.* 103. O Lord, deal not with us after our sins : nor reward us according to our wickednesses. *℣*. *Ps.* 79. Lord, remember not our old sins, but have mercy upon us, and that soon : for we are come to great misery. (*Here genuflect.*) *℣*. Help us, O God of our salvation, for the glory of thy Name, O Lord : O deliver us, and be merciful unto our sins, for thy Name's sake.

The PASSION of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Mark.

St. Mark 14. 1.

AFTER two days ; Was the feast of the Passover, and of unleavened bread, and the chief priests and the scribes sought how they might take Jesus by craft, and put him to death. But they said : *℟*. Not on the feast-day, lest there be an uproar of the people. *℟*. And being in Bethany, in the house of Simon the leper, as he sat at meat : there came a woman having an alabaster box of ointment of spikenard, very precious, and she brake the box, and poured it on his head. And there were some that had indignation within themselves, and said : *℟*. Why was this waste of the ointment made? For it might have been sold for more than three hundred pence, and have been given to the poor. *℟*. And they murmured against her. And Jesus said : *℣*. Let her alone : why trouble ye her? She hath wrought a good work on me. For ye have the

poor with you always : and whensoever ye will ye may do them good : but me ye have not always. She hath done what she could : she is come aforehand to anoint my body to the burying. Verily I say unto you : Wheresoever this Gospel shall be preached throughout the whole world, this also that she hath done shall be spoken of for a memorial of her. *℟*. And Judas Iscariot, one of the twelve, went unto the chief priests to betray him unto them. And when they heard it they were glad, and promised to give him money. And he sought how he might conveniently betray him. And the first day of unleavened bread, when they killed the Passover, his disciples said unto him : *℟*. Where wilt thou that we go and prepare, that thou mayest eat the Passover? *℟*. And he sendeth forth two of his disciples, and saith unto them : *℣*. Go ye into the city : and there shall meet you a man bearing a pitcher of water, follow him : and wheresoever he shall go in, say ye to the good-man of the house : The Master saith : Where is the guest-chamber, where I shall eat the Passover with my disciples? And he will shew you a large upper-room furnished, and prepared : there make ready for us. *℟*. And his disciples went forth, and came into the city : and found as he had said unto them, and they made ready the Passover. And in the evening he cometh with the twelve. And as they sat, and did eat, Jesus said : *℣*. Verily I say unto you, One of you which eateth with me shall betray me, *℟*. And they began to be sorrowful, and to say unto him one by one : *℟*. Is it I? *℟*. And another said :

℟. Is it I? ℥. And he answered and said unto them : ✠ It is one of the twelve that dippeth with me in the dish. The Son of Man indeed goeth, as it is written of him : but woe to that man by whom the Son of Man is betrayed. Good were it for that man if he had never been born. ℥. And as they did eat, Jesus took bread : and blessed, and brake it, and gave to them, and said : ✠ Take, eat, this is my body. ℥. And he took the cup, and when he had given thanks he gave it to them : and they all drank of it. And he said unto them : ✠ This is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many. Verily I say unto you, I will drink no more of the fruit of the vine, until that day that I drink it new in the Kingdom of God. ℥. And when they had sung an hymn, they went out into the mount of Olives. And Jesus saith unto them : ✠ All ye shall be offended because of me this night : for it is written : I will smite the shepherd, and the sheep shall be scattered. But, after that I am risen : I will go before you into Galilee. ℥. But Peter said unto him : ℟. Although all shall be offended, yet will not I. ℥. And Jesus saith unto him : ✠ Verily I say unto thee, That this day, even in this night, before the cock crow twice, thou shalt deny me thrice. ℥. But he spake the more vehemently : ℟. If I should die with thee, I will not deny thee in any wise. ℥. Likewise also said they all. And they came to a place which was named Gethsemane. And he saith to his disciples : ✠ Sit ye here, while I shall pray. ℥. And he taketh with him Peter, and James, and John : and be-

gan to be sore amazed, and to be very heavy. And saith unto them : ✠ My soul is exceeding sorrowful unto death : tarry ye here, and watch. ℥. And he went forward a little, and fell on the ground : and prayed, that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from him : and he said : ✠ Abba, Father, all things are possible unto thee, take away this cup from me : nevertheless, not what I will, but what thou wilt. ℥. And he cometh and findeth them sleeping, and saith unto Peter : ✠ Simon, sleepest thou? Coudest not thou watch one hour? Watch ye and pray, lest ye enter into temptation. The spirit truly is ready, but the flesh is weak. ℥. And again he went away, and prayed, and spake the same words. And when he returned he found them asleep again, (for their eyes were heavy,) neither wist they what to answer him. And he cometh the third time, and saith unto them : ✠ Sleep on now, and take your rest. It is enough : the hour is come : behold, the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Rise up, let us go : lo, he that betrayeth me is at hand. ℥. And immediately, while he yet spake, cometh Judas, one of the twelve, and with him a great multitude with swords and staves, from the chief priests, and the scribes, and the elders. And he that betrayed him had given them a token, saying : ℟. Whomsoever I shall kiss, that same is he, take him, and lead him away safely. ℥. And as soon as he was come he goeth straightway to him, and saith : ℟. Master, master. ℥. And kissed him. And they laid their hands on him, and took him. And one of them that stood by drew a sword, and smote

a servant of the high priest : and cut off his ear. And Jesus answered, and said unto them : ✠ Are ye come out as against a thief, with swords and with staves, to take me? I was daily with you in the temple teaching, and ye took me not. But the Scriptures must be fulfilled. ℄. And they all forsook him, and fled. And there followed him a certain young man, having a linen cloth cast about his naked body : and the young men laid hold on him. And he left the linen cloth, and fled from them naked. And they led Jesus away to the high priest : and with him were assembled all the chief priests, and the elders, and the scribes. And Peter followed him afar off, even into the palace of the high priest : and he sat with the servants, and warmed himself at the fire. And the chief priests and all the council sought for witness against Jesus to put him to death, and found none. For many bare false witness against him : but their witness agreed not together. And there arose certain, and bare false witness against him, saying : §. We heard him say : I will destroy this temple that is made with hands, and within three days I will build another made without hands. ℄. But neither so did their witness agree together. And the high priest stood up in the midst, and asked Jesus, saying : §. Answerest thou nothing? What is it which these witness against thee? ℄. But he held his peace, and answered nothing. Again the high priest asked him, and said unto him : §. Art thou the Christ, the Son of the Blessed? ℄. And Jesus said : ✠ I am : and ye shall see the Son of Man sitting on the

right hand of power, and coming in the clouds of heaven. ℄. Then the high priest rent his clothes, and saith : §. What need we any further witnesses? Ye have heard the blasphemy : what think ye? ℄. And they all condemned him to be guilty of death. And some began to spit on him, and to cover his face, and to buffet him, and to say unto him : §. Prophesy. ℄. And the servants did strike him with the palms of their hands.

That which follows is sung in the tone of the Gospel:

AND as Peter was beneath in the palace, there cometh one of the maids of the high priest : and when she saw Peter warming himself she looked upon him, and said : And thou also wast with Jesus of Nazareth. But he denied, saying : I know not, neither understand I what thou sayest. And he went out into the porch, and the cock crew. And a maid saw him again, and began to say to them that stood by : This is one of them. And he denied it again. And a little after, they that stood by said again to Peter : Surely thou art one of them : for thou art a Galilaean : and thy speech agreeth thereto. But he began to curse and to swear, saying : I know not this man of whom ye speak. And the second time the cock crew. And Peter called to mind the word that Jesus said unto him : Before the cock crew twice, thou shalt deny me thrice. And when he thought thereon, he wept.

OFFERTORY. Ps. 143. Deliver me, O Lord, from mine enemies : for I flee unto thee to hide me. Teach me to

do the thing that pleaseth thee : for thou art my God.

For the Lord God will help me, therefore shall I not be confounded : therefore have I set my face like a flint, and I know that I shall not be ashamed. AT that time : And straightway in the morning, the chief priests held a consultation with the elders, and scribes, and the whole council, and bound Jesus, and carried him away, and delivered him to Pilate. And Pilate asked him : *℟.* Art thou the King of the Jews? *℣.* And he answering said unto him : † Thou sayest it. *℣.* And the chief priests accused him of many things : but he answered nothing. And Pilate asked him again, saying : *℟.* Answerest thou nothing?

behold how many things they witness against thee. *℣.* But Jesus yet answered nothing, so that Pilate marvelled. Now at that feast he released unto them one prisoner whomsoever they desired. And there was one named Barabbas, which lay bound with them that had made insurrection with him, who had committed murder in the insurrection. And the multitude, crying aloud, began to desire him to do as he had ever done unto them. But Pilate answered them, saying : *℟.* Will ye that I release unto you the King of the Jews? *℣.* For he knew that the chief priests had delivered him for envy. But the chief priests moved the people, that he should rather release Barabbas unto them. And Pilate answered, and said again unto them : *℟.* What will ye then that I shall do unto him whom ye call the King of the Jews? *℣.* And they cried out again : *℟.* Crucify him. *℣.* Then Pilate said unto them : *℟.* Why, what evil hath he done? *℣.* And they cried out the more exceedingly : *℟.* Crucify him. *℣.* And so Pilate, willing to content the people, released Barabbas unto them, and delivered Jesus, when he had scourged him, to be crucified. And the soldiers led him away into the hall, called Praetorium, and they call together the whole band, and they clothed him with purple, and platted a crown of thorns, and put it about his head. And began to salute him : Hail, King of the Jews. And they smote him on the head with a reed : and did spit upon him, and bowing their knees worshipped him. And when they had mocked him, they took off the purple from him, and put

his own clothes on him : and led him out to crucify him. And they compel one Simon a Cyrenian, who passed by, coming out of the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to bear his cross. And they bring him unto the place Golgotha, which is, being interpreted, The place of a skull. And they gave him to drink wine mingled with myrrh : but he received it not. And when they had crucified him they parted his garments, casting lots upon them, what every man should take. And it was the third hour : and they crucified him. And the superscription of his accusation was written over : THE KING OF THE JEWS. And with him they crucify two thieves : the one on his right hand, and the other on his left. And the Scripture was fulfilled, which saith : And he was numbered with the transgressors. And they that passed by railed on him, wagging their heads, and saying : *℟.* Ah, thou that destroyest the temple, and buildest it in three days : save thyself, and come down from the cross. *℣.* Likewise also the chief priests mocking said among themselves, with the scribes : *℟.* He saved others, himself he cannot save. Let Christ the King of Israel descend now from the cross, that we may see and believe. *℣.* And they that were crucified with him, reviled him. And when the sixth hour was come, there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying : *✠* Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani? *℣.* Which is, being interpreted : *✠* My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me? *℣.* And some of them that stood by, when they heard

it, said : *℟.* Behold, he calleth Elias. *℣.* And one ran and filled a sponge full of vinegar, and put it on a reed, and gave him to drink, saying : *℟.* Let alone, let us see whether Elias will come to take him down. *℣.* And Jesus cried with a loud voice, and gave up the ghost.

(Here genuflect and pause awhile.)

That which follows is sung in the tone of the Gospel:

AND the veil of the temple was rent in twain, from the top to the bottom. And when the centurion, which stood over against him, saw that he so cried out, and gave up the ghost, he said : Truly this man was the Son of God.

At the Name.

After the Kyrie, forthwith the Priest shall say : Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. R. Arise.

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we, who are continually afflicted by reason of our trans-

gressions, may be delivered by the passion of thine only-begotten Son : Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

The LESSON from Isaiah the Prophet.
Is. 53. 1.

IN those days : Said Isaiah : Lord, † who hath believed our report? † and to whom is the arm of the Lord revealed? For he shall grow up before him as a tender plant, and as a root out of a dry ground ; he hath no form nor comeliness : and when we shall see him, there is no beauty that we should desire him : he is despised and rejected of men, a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief : and we hid as it were our faces from him, he was despised, and we esteemed him not. Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows : yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities ; the chastisement of our peace was upon him, and with his stripes we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray, we have turned every one to his own way : and the Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth ; he is brought as a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before her shearers is dumb, so he openeth not his mouth. He was taken from prison and from judgement : † and who shall declare his generation? for he was cut off out of the land of the living : for the transgression of my people was he stricken. And he made his grave with the wicked : because he had done no violence, neither was any deceit in his

mouth. Yet it pleased the Lord to bruise him, he hath put him to grief : when thou shalt make his soul an offering for sin, he shall prolong his days, and the pleasure of the Lord shall prosper in his hand. He shall see of the travail of his soul, and shall be satisfied : by his knowledge shall my righteous servant justify many, for he shall bear their iniquities. Therefore will I divide him a portion with the great : and he shall divide the spoil with the strong, because he hath poured out his soul unto death, and he was numbered with the transgressors ; and he bare the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 69. Hide not thy face from thy servant, for I am in trouble : O haste thee, and hear me. *V.* Save me, O God, for the waters are come in, even unto my soul : I stick fast in the deep mire, where no ground is.

Here he shall not say Let us bow the knee, *but* *V.* The Lord be with you. Let us pray.

COLLECT.

ASSIST us mercifully with thy help, O Lord God of our salvation : that we may enter with joy upon the meditation of those mighty acts, whereby thou hast given unto us life and immortality. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. [Who.]

COLLECT 2. *Of Palm Sunday.*

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Hebrews. *Heb.* 9. 16.

BRETHREN : Where a testament is, there must also of necessity be the death of the testator : for a testament is of force after men are dead, otherwise it is of no strength at all whilst the testator liveth. Whereupon, neither the first testament was dedicated without blood. For when Moses had spoken every precept to all the people, according to the Law, he took the blood of calves and of goats, with water, and scarlet wool, and hyssop, and sprinkled both the book, and all the people, saying : This is the blood of the testament, which God hath enjoined unto you. Moreover, he sprinkled with blood both the tabernacle, and all the vessels of the ministry. And almost all things are by the Law purged with blood : and without shedding of blood is no remission. It was therefore necessary that the patterns of things in the heavens should be purified with these : but the heavenly things themselves with better sacrifices than these. For Christ is not entered into the holy places made with hands, which are the figures of the true : but into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God for us. Nor yet that he should offer himself often, as the high priest entereth into the holy place every year with blood of others : for then must he often have suffered since the foundation of the world. But now once in the end of the world hath he appeared, to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself. And as it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgement : so Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many. And unto them that look for him shall he appear the second time without sin unto salvation.

TRACT. *Ps.* 102. Hear my prayer, O Lord, and let my crying come unto thee. *℣.* Hide not thy face from me : in the time of my trouble incline thine ear unto me. *℣.* When I call ; O hear me, and that right soon. *℣.* For my days are consumed away like smoke : and my bones are burnt up as it were a fire-brand. *℣.* My heart is smitten down, and withered like grass : so that I forget to eat my bread. *℣.* Thou shalt arise and have mercy upon Sion : for it is time that thou have mercy upon her, yea, the time is come.

The PASSION of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Luke.

St. Luke 2. 1.

AT that time : [Now] The feast of unleavened bread drew nigh, which is called the Passover : and the chief priests and scribes sought how they might kill him : for they feared the people. Then entered Satan into Judas surnamed Iscariot, being of the number of the twelve. And he went his way, and communed with the chief priests and captains, how he might betray him unto them. And they were glad, and covenanted to give him money. And he promised. And sought opportunity to betray him unto them in the absence of the multitude. Then came the day of unleavened bread, when the Passover must be killed. And he sent Peter and John, saying : *✠* Go and prepare us the Passover, that we may eat. *℥.* And they said unto him : *℥.* Where wilt thou that we prepare? *℥.* And he said unto them : *✠* Behold, when ye are entered into the city, there shall a man meet you, bearing a pitcher of water :

follow him into the house where he entereth in, and ye shall say unto the good-man of the house : The Master saith unto thee : Where is the guest-chamber, where I shall eat the Passover with my disciples? And he shall shew you a large upper-room furnished, there make ready. *℥.* And they went, and found as he had said unto them, and they made ready the Passover. And when the hour was come he sat down, and the twelve Apostles with him. And he said unto them : *✠* With desire I have desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. For I say unto you : I will not any more eat thereof, until it be fulfilled in the Kingdom of God. *℥.* And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and said : *✠* Take this, and divide it among yourselves. For I say unto you, I will not drink of the fruit of the vine, until the Kingdom of God shall come. *℥.* And he took bread, and gave thanks, and brake it, and gave unto them, saying : *✠* This is my Body, which is given for you : this do in remembrance of me. *℥.* Likewise also the cup after supper, saying : *✠* This cup is the new testament in my Blood, which is shed for you. But behold, the hand of him that betrayeth me is with me on the table. And truly the Son of Man goeth as it was determined : but woe unto that man by whom he is betrayed. *℥.* And they began to inquire among themselves, which of them it was that should do this thing. And there was also a strife among them, which of them should be accounted the greatest. And he said unto them : *✠* The kings of the Gentiles exercise lordship over them : and

they that exercise authority upon them are called benefactors. But ye shall not be so : but he that is greatest among you, let him be as the younger : and he that is chief, as he that doth serve. For whether is greater, he that sitteth at meat, or he that serveth? Is not he that sitteth at meat? But I am among you as he that serveth : ye are they which have continued with me in my temptations. And I appoint unto you a kingdom, as my Father hath appointed unto me, that ye may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom : and sit on thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. **C.** And the Lord said : **✠** Simon, Simon, behold, Satan hath desired to have you, that he may sift you as wheat : but I have prayed for thee, that thy faith fail not : and when thou art converted, strengthen thy brethren. **C.** And he said unto him : **℟.** Lord, I am ready to go with thee both into prison and to death. **C.** And he said : **✠** I tell thee, Peter : The cock shall not crow this day before that thou shalt thrice deny that thou knowest me. **C.** And he said unto them : **✠** When I sent you without purse, and scrip, and shoes, lacked ye any thing? **C.** And they said : **℟.** Nothing. **C.** Then said he unto them : **✠** But now, he that hath a purse, let him take it, and likewise his scrip : and he that hath no sword, let him sell his garment, and buy one. For I say unto you, that this that is written must yet be accomplished in me : And he was reckoned among the transgressors. For the things concerning me have an end. **C.** And they said : **℟.** Lord, behold, here are two swords. **C.** And he said unto them :

✠ It is enough. **C.** And he came out, and went, as he was wont, to the mount of Olives. And his disciples also followed him. And when he was at the place, he said unto them : **✠** Pray, that ye enter not into temptation. **C.** And he was withdrawn from them about a stone's cast, and kneeled down and prayed, saying : **✠** Father, if thou be willing, remove this cup from me : nevertheless, not my will, but thine be done. **C.** And there appeared an Angel unto him from heaven, strengthening him. And being in an agony, he prayed more earnestly. And his sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground. And when he rose up from prayer, and was come to his disciples, he found them sleeping for sorrow ; and said unto them : **✠** Why sleep ye? Rise and pray, lest ye enter into temptation. **C.** And while he yet spake, behold, a multitude : and he that was called Judas, one of the twelve, went before them : and drew near unto Jesus to kiss him. But Jesus said unto him : **✠** Judas, betrayest thou the Son of Man with a kiss? **C.** When they which were about him saw what would follow, they said unto him : **℟.** Lord, shall we smite with the sword? **C.** And one of them smote the servant of the high priest, and cut off his right ear. And Jesus answered and said : **✠** Suffer ye thus far. **C.** And he touched his ear, and healed him. Then Jesus said unto the chief priests, and captains of the temple, and the elders which were come to him : **✠** Be ye come out as against a thief, with swords and staves? When I was daily with you in the temple, ye stretched forth

no hands against me : but this is your hour, and the power of darkness. **C.** Then took they him, and led him, and brought him into the high priest's house : and Peter followed afar off. And when they had kindled a fire in the midst of the hall, and were set down together, Peter sat down among them. But a certain maid beheld him, as he sat by the fire, and earnestly looked upon him, and said : **S.** This man was also with him. **C.** And he denied him, saying : **S.** Woman, I know him not. **C.** And after a little while another saw him, and said : **S.** Thou art also of them. **C.** And Peter said : **S.** Man, I am not. **C.** And about the space of one hour after, another confidently affirmed, saying : **S.** Of a truth this fellow also was with him : for he is a Galilaean. **C.** And Peter said : **S.** Man, I know not what thou sayest. **C.** And immediately, while he yet spake, the cock crew. And the Lord turned, and looked upon Peter. And Peter remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said unto him : Before the cock crow, thou shalt deny me thrice. And Peter went out, and wept bitterly.

That which follows is sung in the tone of the Gospel:

AND the men that held Jesus mocked him, and smote him. And when they had blindfolded him, they struck him on the face : and asked him, saying : Prophecy, who is it that smote thee? And many other things blasphemously spake they against him. And as soon as it was day, the elders of the people, and the chief priests, and the scribes, came together, and led him into their council, saying : Art thou

the Christ? Tell us. And he said unto them : If I tell you, ye will not believe : and if I also ask you, ye will not answer me, nor let me go. Hereafter shall the Son of Man sit on the right hand of the power of God. Then said they all : Art thou then the Son of God? And he said unto them : Ye say that I am. And they said : What need we any further witness? For we ourselves have heard of his own mouth.

And on this day shall be said, Gloria in excelsis, and on this being intoned the bells shall be rung: and the Hymn being ended the bells shall be silent until Holy Saturday, as is noted in the Mass for that day.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, did institute the Sacrament of his Body and Blood : mercifully grant that we may thankfully receive the same in remembrance of him, who in these holy mysteries giveth us a pledge of life eternal ; the same thy Son Jesus Christ

And they began to accuse him, saying : *℟.* We found this fellow perverting the nation, and forbidding to give tribute to Caesar, saying, that he himself is Christ a King. *℣.* And Pilate asked him, saying : *℟.* Art thou the King of the Jews? *℣.* And he answered him, and said : *✠* Thou sayest it. *℣.* Then said Pilate to the chief priests, and to the people : *℟.* I find no fault in this man. *℣.* And they were the more fierce, saying : *℟.* He stirreth up the people, teaching throughout all Jewry, beginning from Galilee to this place. *℣.* When Pilate heard of Galilee, he asked whether the man were a Galilaean. And as soon as he knew that he belonged unto Herod's jurisdiction, he sent him to Herod, who himself was also at Jerusalem at that time. And when Herod saw Jesus he was exceeding glad. For he was desirous to see him of a long season, because he had heard many things of him, and he hoped to have seen some miracle done by him. Then he questioned with him in many words. But he answered him nothing. And the chief priests and scribes stood and vehemently accused him. And Herod with his men of war set him at nought : and mocked him, and arrayed him in

a gorgeous robe, and sent him again to Pilate. And the same day Pilate and Herod were made friends together : for before they were at enmity between themselves. And Pilate, when he had called together the chief priests, and the rulers, and the people, said unto them : *℟.* Ye have brought this man unto me, as one that perverteth the people, and behold, I, having examined him before you, have found no fault in this man touching those things whereof ye accuse him. No, nor yet Herod : for I sent you to him, and lo, nothing worthy of death is done unto him. I will therefore chastise him, and release him. *℣.* For of necessity he must release one unto them at the feast. And they cried out all at once, saying : *℟.* Away with this man, and release unto us Barabbas. *℣.* Who for a certain sedition made in the city, and for murder, was cast into prison. Pilate therefore, willing to release Jesus, spake again to them. But they cried, saying : *℟.* Crucify him, crucify him. *℣.* And he said unto them the third time : *℟.* Why, what evil hath he done? I have found no cause of death in him : I will therefore chastise him, and let him go. *℣.* And they were instant with loud voices, requiring that he might be crucified. And the voices of them and of the chief priests prevailed. And Pilate gave sentence that it should be as they required. And he released unto them him that for sedition and murder was cast into prison, whom they had desired : but he delivered Jesus to their will. And as they led him away, they laid hold upon one Simon a Cyrenian, coming out of the country : and on him they laid the

Cross, that he might bear it after Jesus. And there followed him a great company of people, and of women, which also bewailed and lamented him. But Jesus, turning unto them, said : † Daughters of Jerusalem, weep not for me, but weep for yourselves, and for your children. For behold, the days are coming, in the which they shall say : Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bare, and the paps which never gave suck. Then shall they begin to say to the mountains : Fall on us ; and to the hills : Cover us. For if they do these things in a green tree, what shall be done in the dry? ℄. And there were also two other, malefactors, led with him to be put to death. And when they were come to the place which is called Calvary, there they crucified him : and the malefactors, one on the right hand, and the other on the left. Then said Jesus : † Father, forgive them : for they know not what they do. ℄. And they parted his raiment, and cast lots. And the people stood beholding, and the rulers also with them derided him, saying : §. He saved others : let him save himself, if he be Christ, the chosen of God. ℄. And the soldiers also mocked him, coming to him, and offering him vinegar, and saying : §. If thou be the King of the Jews, save thyself. ℄. And a superscription also was written over him in letters of Greek, and Latin, and Hebrew : THIS IS THE KING OF THE JEWS. And one of the malefactors, which were hanged, railed on him, saying : §. If thou be Christ, save thyself, and us. ℄. But the other answering rebuked him, saying : §. Dost not thou fear God?

Seeing thou art in the same condemnation. And we indeed justly, for we receive the due reward of our deeds : but this man hath done nothing amiss. ℄. And he said unto Jesus : §. Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom. ℄. And Jesus said unto him : † Verily I say unto thee : To-day shalt thou be with me in paradise. ℄. And it was about the sixth hour, and there was a darkness over all the earth until the ninth hour. And the sun was darkened : and the veil of the temple was rent in the midst. And when Jesus had cried with a loud voice, he said : † Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit. ℄. And having said thus, he gave up the ghost.

(Here genuflect and pause awhile.)

That which follows is sung in the tone of the Gospel:

NOW when the centurion saw what was done, he glorified God, saying : Certainly this was a righteous man. And all the people that came together to that sight, beholding the things that were done, smote their breasts, and returned. And all his acquaintance, and the women that followed him from Galilee, stood afar off, beholding these things.

¶ *Or else this that followeth. [To wit, the Gospel given below, which same is the ancient Gospel for this Mass, for the Passion was not read on this day.]*

† The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accõrding to John. *St. John* 13. 1.

NOW before the feast of the Passover, when Jesus knew that his hour was come that he should depart

out of this world unto the Father, having loved his own which were in the world, he loved them unto the end. And supper being ended, the devil having now put into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him ; Jesus knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he was come from God, and went to God : he riseth from supper, and laid aside his garments ; and took a towel, and girded himself. After that he poureth water into a bason, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel wherewith he was girded. Then cometh he to Simon Peter. And Peter saith unto him : Lord, † dost thou wash my feet? Jesus answered and said unto him : What I do thou knowest not now ; but thou shalt know hereafter. Peter saith unto him : Thou shalt never wash my feet. Jesus answered him : If I wash thee not, thou hast no part with me. Simon Peter saith unto him : Lord, not my feet only, but also my hands and my head. Jesus saith to him : He that is washed needeth not save to wash his feet, but is clean every whit. And ye are clean, but not all. For he knew who should betray him ; therefore said he : Ye are not all clean. So after he had washed their feet, and had taken his garments, and was set down again, he said unto them : † Know ye what I have done to you? Ye call me Master and Lord : and ye say well ; for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet ; ye also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you. *And the Creed shall be said.*

OFFERTORY. Ps. 118. The right hand of the Lord hath the pre-eminence, the right hand of the Lord bringeth mighty things to pass : I shall not die but live, and declare the works of the Lord.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord holy, Father almighty, everlasting God : that he may render our sacrifice acceptable in thy sight, who as on this day commanded his disciples, saying : Do this in remembrance of me, even Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord : Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

PREFACE of the Cross.

Anciently the Anaphora was slightly varied on this day (to celebrate therein the Institution of the Eucharist) by the insertion of the bracketed words given in the Gregorian Canon as follows:

Communicantes.

In communion with and in honour of this most holy day [*whereon our Lord Jesus Christ was betrayed for us*] : and in worshipful remembrance of the glorious and Ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of the same our God and Lord Jesus Christ, etc.

Hanc igitur.

Therefore, Lord, we beseech thee, that thou wilt graciously receive this oblation of our bounden service, and of all thy household : [*which we offer unto thee as on this day whereon our Lord Jesus Christ did institute and hand down to his disciples the mysteries of his Body and Blood :*] and do thou order, etc.

Qui pridie.

Who the next day afore he suffered [*for us men and for our salvation, that*

is, *even today,*] took Bread into his holy and reverent hands, *etc.*

After this fashion, the American Canon would read as follows:

ALL glory be to thee, Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for that thou, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption ; who made there (by his one oblation of himself once offered), a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world ; and [*as on this day*] did institute [*and hand down to his disciples the mysteries of his Body and Blood,*] and in his holy Gospel [*did*] command us to continue a Perpetual Memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again :

FOR in the [*same*] night, in which [*for us men and for our salvation*] he was betrayed, [*even today,*] he took Bread, and when he had blessed and given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying : Take, eat :

This is my Body which is given for you.

And the rest, as in the Canon.

O Lamb of God is said after the customary manner, but the Kiss of Peace shall not be given. But the three accustomed Prayers before the Communion shall be said.

§ *On this day the Priest shall consecrate two Hosts, whereof he shall consume the one; but the other he shall reserve for the day following whereon the Sacrament is not consecrated.*

COMMUNION. *St. John 13.* The Lord Jesus, after he had supped with his

disciples, and had washed their feet, said unto them : Know ye what I your Lord and Master have done to you? I have given you an example that ye should do as I have done to you.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OUR Lord our God, who hast refreshed us with this life-giving sustenance, wê beseech thee : that we, who observe this institution in the time of our mortal life, may obtain the benefit thereof in thy gift of immortality. Through.

Then shall he say Depart in peace and give the Blessing; and the Gospel of St. John shall be read: at the beginning whereof the Priest shall not sign the Altar, but himself alone.

THE PROCESSION

§ *On this day a fit place shall be made ready in some Chapel within the Church or on an Altar, where the Chalice with the Host reserved therein shall be set. And when Mass is finished, torches being lighted, a PROCESSION shall be formed after the customary fashion, and the Most Holy carried with honour to the place made ready; and during the Procession shall be sung:*

HYMN. *Pange, lingua, gloriosi.*

OF the glorious Body telling, O my tongue, its mysteries sing,
And the Blood, all price excelling, which the world's eternal King,
In a noble womb once dwelling, shed for this world's ransoming.

Given for us, for us descending, of a Virgin to proceed,
Man with man in converse blending, scattered he the Gospel seed,
Till his sojourn drew to ending, which he closed in wondrous deed.

At the last great Supper lying, circled by his brethren's band,
Meekly with the law complying, first he finished its command,
Then, immortal Food supplying, gave himself with his own hand.

Word made Flesh, by word he maketh, very bread his Flesh to be :
Man in wine Christ's Blood partaketh, and if senses fail to see,
Faith alone the true heart waketh, to behold the mystery.

Therefore we before him bending, this great Sacrament revere :
Types and shadows have their ending, for the newer Rite is here :
Faith, our outward sense befriending, makes the inward vision clear.

Glory, let us give, and blessing, to the Father and the Son ;
Honour, might, and praise addressing, while eternal ages run :
Ever too his love confessing, who from both, with both, is one. Amen.

And when he shall be come to the place prepared, the Sacrament shall be set therein reverently. And thereafter shall EVENSUNG be said in the Quire without singing.

And Evensong being ended, the Priest, vested in an Alb, with violet Stole, with the Ministers, shall LAY BARE THE ALTARS, reading the Antiphon: Ps. 22. They parted my garments among them : and cast lots upon my vesture, and the whole of the Psalm My God, my God, look upon me, as at Matins for Good Friday (sung as "Tenebrae" this evening).

THE MAUNDY

§ *The Altars being laid bare, at a convenient time the signal is given with a wooden instrument, and the Clergy shall come together to perform the MAUNDY. First shall be sung in the customary manner the Gospel Now before the feast of the Passover, as in the Mass above. And they that are to be washed shall be set in order, and the Superior shall wash*

their feet and wipe and kiss them. And at the same time shall be sung these sentences of Scripture that follow.

Antiphon. St. John 13. A new commandment give I unto you : that ye love one another as I have loved you, saith the Lord.

Ps. 119. Blessed are those that are undefiled in the way : and walk in the law of the Lord.

Then forthwith shall the Antiphon A new commandment be repeated. And in like manner shall each Antiphon be repeated after its Psalm or verse. And of each Psalm the first verse only shall be said.

Antiphon. St. John 13. After the Lord had risen from supper he put water in a bason and began to wash his disciples' feet : this example left he unto them. Ps. 48. Great is the Lord, and highly to be praised : in the city of our God, even upon his holy hill. After the Lord.

Antiphon. St. John 13. The Lord Jesus after he had supped with his disciples washed their feet, and said unto them : Know ye what I your Lord and Master have done unto you? I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you. Ps. 85. Lord, thou art become gracious unto thy land : thou hast turned away the captivity of Jacob.

The Lord Jesus.

Antiphon. St. John 13. Lord, dost thou wash my feet? Jesus answered and said unto him : If I wash not thy feet, thou hast no part in me. V. He came therefore unto Simon Peter, and Peter said unto him.

Then shall be repeated the Antiphon Lord, dost thou wash my feet? Jesus

answered and said unto him : If I wash not thy feet, thou hast no part in me.

℣. What I do, thou knowest not now : but thou shalt know hereafter.

And the Antiphon is repeated a third time. Lord, dost thou wash my feet? Jesus answered and said unto him : If I wash not thy feet, thou hast no part in me.

Antiphon. If I, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet : how much more ought ye to wash one another's feet? *Ps.* 49. O hear ye this, all ye people : ponder it with your ears, all ye that dwell in the world.

If I, your Lord.

Antiphon. *St. John* 13. By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another. *℣.* Jesus said unto his disciples. By this shall all men know.

Antiphon. *I Cor.* 13. Let these three abide in you, faith, hope, and charity : but the greatest of these is charity.

℣. Now abideth faith, hope, and charity, these three : but the greatest of these is charity.

Let these three.

Antiphon. Blessed be the holy Trinity and the undivided Unity : we will confess him, because he hath shewed his mercy upon us. *℣.* Let us bless the Father and the Son with the Holy Ghost. *Ps.* 84. O how amiable are thy dwellings, thou Lord of Hosts! My soul hath a desire and longing to enter into the courts of the Lord. Blessed be.

Antiphon. *I St. John* 2, 3, 4. Where charity and love are, there is God. *℣.* The love of Christ joined us in one. *℣.* Let us rejoice and be glad

in him. *℣.* Let us fear and love the living God. *℣.* And love one another in sincerity of heart.

Then is repeated the Antiphon Where charity and love are, there is God. *℣.* When, therefore, we are joined together. *℣.* Let us see that we be not divided in spirit. *℣.* Let all malicious wranglings and contentions cease. *℣.* And let Christ our God be in the midst of us.

Then is repeated the Antiphon Where charity and love are, there is God. *℣.* So may we with the blessed see. *℣.* In glory thy countenance, Christ our God. *℣.* Joy that is infinite and undefiled. *℣.* For ever and for evermore. Amen.

After the washing, the Superior shall say, standing with head uncovered:

Our Father, *secretly.*

℣. And lead us not into temptation.

℞. But deliver us from evil.

℣. Thou hast charged, O Lord.

℞. That we should diligently keep thy commandments.

℣. Thou didst wash the feet of thy disciples.

℞. Despise not thou the works of thine own hands.

℣. Lord, hear my prayer.

℞. And let my cry come unto thee.

℣. The Lord be with you.

℞. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to assist this our bounden duty and service : and forasmuch as thou didst vouchsafe to wash the feet of thy disciples, despise not thou the

works of thine own hands, which thou hast bidden us to follow : and mercifully grant that as we have this day washed away our outward defilements,

so by thee we may inwardly be cleansed from all our offences. Who livest and reignest God : world without end. R̄. Amen.

GOOD FRIDAY

Double of I Class

Station at St. Cross in Jerusalem. Proanaphora 1549 and successive revisions.

I. THE MASS OF THE CATECHUMENS.

[*The Prayer-Book Proanaphora begins at the heavy line below.*]

§ *In Quire, the Office being ended, the Priest and Ministers in black vestments, and without candles and incense, shall go unto the Altar; and prostrating themselves before it, shall pray for a while. And meanwhile the Acolytes shall spread one cloth and no more upon the Altar. His prayer being finished, the Priest, with the Ministers, shall go up to the Altar, and kiss it in the midst: and thereafter the Reader, going to the place where the Epistle is read, shall read the Prophecy, beginning it without any announcement:*

Hosea 6.

THUS saith the Lord : In their affliction they will seek me early : Come, and let us return unto the Lord : for he hath torn, and he will heal us : he hath smitten, and he will bind us up. After two days will he revive us : in the third day he will raise us up, and we shall live in his sight. Then shall we know, if we follow on to know the Lord : his going forth is prepared as the morning, and he shall come unto us as the rain, as the latter and former rain unto the earth. O Ephraim, ‡

what shall I do unto thee? O Judah, ‡ what shall I do unto thee? For your goodness is as a morning cloud : and as the early dew it goeth away. Therefore I have hewed them by the Prophets, I have slain them by the words of my mouth : and thy judgements are as the light that goeth forth. For I desired mercy, and not sacrifice, and the knowledge of God more than burnt offerings.

Thanks be to God *shall not be said here, nor after the Epistle following.*

TRACT. *Hab. 3.* O Lord, I have heard thy speech, and was afraid : O Lord, revive thy work in the midst of the years. V̄. In the midst of the two beasts, be thou acknowledged : in the midst of the years, make thyself known. V̄. In the time to come, be thou manifest : in the time of the confusion of my soul in wrath, remember mercy. V̄. God came from Libanus : and the Holy One from the thick darkness of the wooded mountain. V̄. His glory covered the heavens : and the earth was full of his praise.

§ *The Tract being ended, the Priest at the Epistle horn shall say: Let us pray. Then shall the Deacon say: Let us bow the knee. And the Subdeacon: Arise.*

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY God, we beseech thee graciously to behold this thy family, for which our Lord Jesus Christ was contented to be betrayed, and given up into the hands of wicked men, and to suffer death upon the Cross. Who now liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost ever, one God, world without end. *R.* Amen.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee.
R. Arise.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, by whose Spirit the whole body of the Church is governed and sanctified : receive our supplications and prayers, which we offer before thee for all estates of men in thy holy Church ; that every member of the same, in his vocation and ministry, may truly and godly serve thee. Through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. [*Who.*] *R.* Amen.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee.
R. Arise.

COLLECT.

OMERCIFUL God, who hast made all men, and hatest nothing that thou hast made, nor desireth the death of a sinner, but rather that he should be converted and live : have mercy upon all who know thee not as thou art revealed in the Gospel of thy Son. Take from them all ignorance, hardness of heart, and contempt of thy Word ; and so fetch them home, blessed Lord, to thy fold, that they may be made one flock under one shepherd, Jesus Christ our Lord. Who liveth

and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end. *R.* Amen.

Then shall the Subdeacon, without any announcement, sing the EPISTLE following.

Heb. 10. 1.

BRETHREN : The Law having a shadow of good things to come, and not the very image of the things, can never with those sacrifices, which they offered year by year continually, make the comers thereunto perfect : † for then would they not have ceased to be offered? because that the worshippers once purged should have had no more conscience of sins. But in those sacrifices there is a remembrance again made of sins every year. For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and of goats should take away sins. Wherefore, when he cometh into the world, he saith : Sacrifice and offering thou wouldest not, but a body hast thou prepared me : in burnt-offerings and sacrifices for sin thou hast had no pleasure. Then said I : Lo, I come (in the volume of the book it is written of me) to do thy will, O God. Above, when he said : Sacrifice and offering, and burnt-offerings, and offering for sin thou wouldest not, neither hadst pleasure therein, which are offered by the Law : then said he : Lo, I come to do thy will, O God. He taketh away the first, that he may establish the second. By the which will we are sanctified, through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all. And every priest standeth daily ministering, and offering oftentimes the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins. But this man, after he had offered one

sacrifice for sins for ever, sat down on the right hand of God ; from henceforth expecting till his enemies be made his foot-stool. For by one offering he hath perfected for ever them that are sanctified. Whereof the Holy Ghost also is a witness to us : for after that he had said before : This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days, saith the Lord : I will put my laws into their hearts, and in their minds will I write them ; then saith he : And their sins and iniquities will I remember no more. Now where remission of these is, there is no more offering for sin. Having therefore, brethren, boldness to enter into the holiest by the Blood of Jesus, by a new and living way, which he hath consecrated for us, through the veil, that is to say, his flesh : and having an High Priest over the house of God ; let us draw near with a true heart, in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience, and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast the profession of our faith without wavering : (for he is faithful that promised ;) and let us consider one another to provoke unto love, and to good works : not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is : but exhorting one another : and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching.

TRACT. Ps. 140. Deliver me, O Lord, from the evil man : and preserve me from the wicked man. *V.* Who imagine mischief in their hearts : and stir up strife all the day long. *V.* They have sharpened their tongues like a serpent : adder's poison is under their

lips. *V.* Keep me, O Lord, from the hands of the ungodly : and preserve me from the wicked men. *V.* Who are purposed to overthrow my goings : the proud have laid a snare for me. *V.* And spread a net abroad with cords : yea, and set traps in my way. *V.* I said unto the Lord : Thou art my God : hear the voice of my prayers, O Lord. *V.* O Lord God, thou strength of my health : thou hast covered my head in the day of battle. *V.* Let not the ungodly have his desire, O Lord : let not his mischievous imagination prosper : lest they be too proud. *V.* Let the mischief of their own lips fall upon the head of them : that compass me about. *V.* The righteous also shall give thanks unto thy Name : and the just shall continue in thy sight.

§ *The Tract ended, the Passion is sung from a bare desk: and the Celebrant shall read it also at the Epistle horn of the Altar with the subdued voice.*

The PASSION of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to John. *St. John* 19. 1.

AT that time : Pilate therefore took Jesus, and scourged him. And the soldiers platted a crown of thorns, and put it on his head : and they put on him a purple robe, and said : *S.* Hail, King of the Jews. *C.* And they smote him with their hands. Pilate therefore went forth again, and saith unto them : *S.* Behold, I bring him forth to you, that ye may know that I find no fault in him. *C.* Then came Jesus forth, wearing the crown of thorns, and the purple robe. And Pilate saith unto them : *S.* Behold the man. *C.* When the chief priests there-

fore and officers saw him, they cried out, saying : **℟.** Crucify him, crucify him. **℣.** Pilate saith unto them : **℟.** Take ye him, and crucify him : for I find no fault in him. **℣.** The Jews answered him : **℟.** We have a law, and by our law he ought to die, because he made himself the Son of God. **℣.** When Pilate therefore heard that saying, he was the more afraid. And went again into the judgement-hall : and saith unto Jesus : **℟.** Whence art thou? **℣.** But Jesus gave him no answer. Then saith Pilate unto him : **℟.** Speakest thou not unto me? Knowest thou not that I have power to crucify thee, and have power to release thee? **℣.** Jesus answered : **✠** Thou couldest have no power at all against me, except it were given thee from above. Therefore he that delivered me unto thee hath the greater sin. **℣.** And from thenceforth Pilate sought to release him. But the Jews cried out, saying : **℟.** If thou let this man go, thou art not Caesar's friend. Whosoever maketh himself a king speaketh against Caesar. **℣.** When Pilate therefore heard that saying, he brought Jesus forth, and sat down in the judgement seat, in a place that is called the Pavement, but in the Hebrew, Gabbatha. And it was the Preparation of the Passover, and about the sixth hour, and he saith unto the Jews : **℟.** Behold your King. **℣.** But they cried out : **℟.** Away with him, away with him, crucify him. **℣.** Pilate saith unto them : **℟.** Shall I crucify your King? **℣.** The chief priests answered : **℟.** We have no king but Caesar. **℣.** Then delivered he him therefore unto them to be crucified. And they took Jesus,

and led him away. And he, bearing his cross, went forth into a place called the place of a skull, which is called in the Hebrew, Golgotha : where they crucified him, and two other with him, on either side one, and Jesus in the midst. And Pilate wrote a title : and put it on the cross. And the writing was : JESUS OF NAZARETH THE KING OF THE JEWS. This title then read many of the Jews, for the place where Jesus was crucified was nigh to the city. And it was written in Hebrew, and Greek, and Latin. Then said the chief priests of the Jews to Pilate : **℟.** Write not, The King of the Jews : but that he said : I am the King of the Jews. **℣.** Pilate answered : **℟.** What I have written, I have written. **℣.** Then the soldiers, when they had crucified Jesus, took his garments, and made four parts : to every soldier a part, and also his coat. Now the coat was without seam, woven from the top throughout. They said therefore among themselves : **℟.** Let us not rend it, but cast lots for it, whose it shall be. **℣.** That the Scripture might be fulfilled, which saith : They parted my raiment among them : and for my vesture they did cast lots. These things therefore the soldiers did. Now there stood by the cross of Jesus, his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Cleophas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus therefore saw his mother, and the disciple standing by, whom he loved, he saith unto his mother : **✠** Woman, behold thy son. **℣.** Then saith he to the disciple : **✠** Behold thy mother. **℣.** And from that hour that disciple took her unto his own home. After this, Jesus, knowing that all things were

now accomplished, that the Scripture might be fulfilled, saith : ✠ I thirst. ℄. Now there was set a vessel full of vinegar. And they filled a sponge with vinegar, and put it upon hyssop, and put it to his mouth. When Jesus therefore had received the vinegar, he said : ✠ It is finished. ℄. And he bowed his head, and gave up the ghost.

(Here genuflect and pause awhile.)

The rest is sung in the tone of the Gospel: Cleanse my heart is said, but the blessing is not asked, nor are lights carried nor incense, and at the end the Celebrant does not kiss the book.

THE Jews therefore, because it was the Preparation, that the bodies should not remain upon the cross on the sabbath day, (for that sabbath day was an high day,) besought Pilate that their legs might be broken, and that they might be taken away. Then came the soldiers : and brake the legs of the first, and of the other which was crucified with him. But when they came to Jesus, and saw that he was dead already, they brake not his legs : but one of the soldiers with a spear pierced his side, and forthwith came there out blood and water. And he that saw it bare record : and his record is true. And he knoweth that he saith true : that ye might believe. For these things were done, that the Scripture should be fulfilled : A bone of him shall not be broken. And again another Scripture saith : They shall look on him whom they pierced.

II. THE SOLEMN COLLECTS.

Then the Priest, standing at the Epistle horn of the Altar, shall begin immediately with joined hands:

DEARLY beloved brethren, let us pray for the holy Church of God : that the Lord our God may vouchsafe to preserve it throughout all the world in unity, peace, and safety : making subject unto it all Principalities and Powers : and that he may grant unto us to dwell in such quiet and tranquillity that we may duly shew forth the glory of God the Father Almighty.

LET us pray. *(Deacon:)* Let us bow the knee. *(Sub-deacon:)* Arise.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who hast in Christ made manifest thy glory unto all mankind : we beseech thee that thou wouldest preserve those things which of thy mercy thou hast created ; that thy Church being spread abroad through all the world may stedfastly abide in the confession of thy holy Name. Through the same. ℞. Amen.

LET us pray likewise for *N.* the Chief Bishop : that like as the Lord our God hath appointed him to the office of a bishoprick, so he may preserve him in all peace and safety for the governance of God's holy People.

LET us pray. *(Deacon:)* Let us bow the knee. *(Sub-deacon:)* Arise.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, whose judgement upholdeth all things both in heaven and earth : we beseech thee mercifully to have respect unto our prayers, that like as thou hast appointed this thy servant to be our Bishop so thou

wouldest of thy mercy defend him against all adversities ; and that all Christian peoples, acknowledging thee alone to be their author and governour, may so prosper by his care that they may duly increase in bringing forth the fruits of their profession. Through. R̄. Amen.

LET us pray likewise for all Bishops, Priests, and Deacons ; for all Sub-deacons, Acolytes, Exorcists, Readers, Doorkeepers, Confessors, Virgins, and Widows : and for all God's holy People.

LET us pray. (*Deacon:*) Let us bow the knee. (*Sub-deacon:*) Arise.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, by whose Spirit the whole body of the Church is governed and sanctified : receive our supplications and prayers which we offer before thee for all estates of men in thy holy Church ; that every member of the same in his vocation and ministry may truly and godly serve thee. Through.

LET us pray likewise for *N.* the President of the United States, and all in Civil Authority ; that they, knowing whose ministers they are, may above all things seek thy honour and glory : and that we and all the People, duly considering whose authority they bear, may faithfully and obediently honour them.

LET us pray. (*Deacon:*) Let us bow the knee. (*Sub-deacon:*) Arise.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, our Governour, whose glory is in all the world : we commend this nation to thy merciful care, that being guided by thy Providence, we may dwell secure in thy peace. Grant to THE PRESIDENT

OF THE UNITED STATES, and to all in authority, wisdom and strength to know and to do thy will. Fill them with the love of truth and righteousness ; and make them ever mindful of their calling to serve this people in thy fear. Through. R̄. Amen.

LET us pray likewise for all them that are catechumens : that the Lord our God may open the ears of their hearts that they may enter in at the gate of his mercy ; that by the washing of regeneration they may obtain the remission of all their sins, and be found faithful servants of our Lord, Christ Jesus.

LET us pray. (*Deacon:*) Let us bow the knee. (*Sub-deacon:*) Arise.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who dost ever increase thy Church with the abundance of a new generation : we beseech thee that thou wouldest multiply in faith and understanding them that are being taught in thy holy word ; that being renewed in the water of Baptism they may be numbered among the sons of thine adoption. Through. R̄. Amen.

DEARLY beloved brethren, let us pray likewise to God the Father Almighty, that he would vouchsafe to cleanse the world from all false doctrine : to deliver it from pestilence and famine : to open all prisons : and to set free them that are in captivity : granting unto pilgrims a safe return : to the sick healing : and to them that travel by sea to attain unto the haven that they desire.

LET us pray. (*Deacon:*) Let us bow the knee. (*Sub-deacon:*) Arise.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, the comforter of them that mourn, the strength of them that travail : we beseech thee to hear the prayers of them that in any necessity make their supplications unto thee ; that in all their troubles and adversities they may rejoice in the present succour of thy loving-kindness. Through. *R.* Amen.

LET us pray likewise for all them that are in heresy and schism : that the Lord our God may deliver them from all false doctrines, and vouchsafe to restore them to their holy Mother the Catholic and Apostolic Church.

LET us pray. (*Deacon:*) Let us bow the knee. (*Sub-deacon:*) Arise.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who wouldest not that any should perish, but rather that they should be saved : we beseech thee mercifully to look upon them that are deceived by the crafts of the devil ; that the hearts of them which have gone astray may be delivered from their perversities and restored to the way of truth and to the unity of thy holy Church. Through. *R.* Amen.

LET us pray likewise for the Jews : that the Lord our God may remove from their hearts the veil of unbelief ; and that they may come to the knowledge of Jesus Christ our Lord.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who extendest to the unbelieving of the Jews the abundance of thy mercy : graciously hear our prayers for this people whose hearts are blinded ; that they may come to know Christ Jesus to be the Light of thy truth, and in him find the

way out of the darkness of their misunderstandings. Through the same. *R.* Amen.

LET us pray likewise for the heathen : that God Almighty may take away the iniquity of their hearts ; that they may turn away from their idols to the true and living God, and to his only begotten Son Jesus Christ our Lord and God.

LET us pray. (*Deacon:*) Let us bow the knee. (*Sub-deacon:*) Arise.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who desirest not the death of a sinner but rather that he should turn from his wickedness and live : mercifully accept our prayers ; that all who know thee not as thou art revealed in the Gospel of thy Son may be delivered from the worship of their idols, and by confession of the true faith be united to thy holy Church to the honour and glory of thy Name. Through the same. *R.* Amen.

III. THE VENERATION OF THE CROSS.

Having finished the Prayers, the Priest lays aside his Chasuble and goes to the Epistle horn of the Altar, where, standing at the back corner, he takes from the Deacon a CROSS which has been previously made ready on the Altar. [Or, if he celebrate without Deacon or Subdeacon, the Priest himself removes the Cross from the Altar, genuflecting before ascending the steps.] Turning towards the People, he partly UNCOVERS it from the top, and begins alone the Antiphon Behold the wood of the Cross, after which the Ministers join in singing the rest as far as O come, let us worship. And when the Choir sings O come, let

us worship, *all kneel except the Celebrant. And all this is done twice again, except that the third time the Cross is uncovered entirely.*

BEHOLD the Wood of the Cross, whereon was hung the world's Salvation. (*Choir:*) O come, let us worship.

And afterward THE CROSS IS CARRIED by the Priest alone to the place made ready for it before the Holy Table, and, kneeling there, he sets it in place: next he lays aside his shoes, and approaches to venerate the Cross, thrice making a double genuflection before he kisses it. Which done, he returns and takes again his shoes and the Chasuble. Afterward the Ministers at the Altar and then in order the rest of the Clerics and Laics, two by two proceed to VENERATE THE CROSS, making double genuflections thrice, as is noted above. Meanwhile, the REPROACHES are sung, and the rest that follows, either all or in part, according to the many or few that come to venerate the Cross.

Celebrant: V. O my people, what have I done unto thee, or wherein have I wearied thee? Testify against me.

V. Because I brought thee forth from the land of Egypt : thou hast prepared a Cross for thy Saviour.

Deacon: R. Agios o Theós.

Subdeacon: R. Holy God.

Deacon: R. Agios ischyros.

Subdeacon: R. Holy mighty.

Deacon: R. Agios athánatos, eléison imas.

Subdeacon: R. Holy and immortal, have mercy upon us.

Celebrant: V. Because I led thee through the desert forty years, and fed thee with manna, and brought thee into a land exceeding good : thou hast prepared a Cross for thy Saviour.

Deacon: R. Agios o Theós.

Subdeacon: R. Holy God.

Deacon: R. Agios ischyros.

Subdeacon: R. Holy mighty.

Deacon: R. Agios athánatos, eléison imas.

Subdeacon: R. Holy and immortal, have mercy upon us.

Celebrant: V. What more could I have done unto thee that I have not done? I indeed did plant thee, O my vineyard, with exceeding fair fruit : and thou art become very bitter unto me : for vinegar, mingled with gall, thou gavest me when thirsty : and hast pierced with a spear the side of thy Saviour.

Deacon: R. Agios o Theós.

Subdeacon: R. Holy God.

Deacon: R. Agios ischyros.

Subdeacon: R. Holy mighty.

Deacon: R. Agios athánatos, eléison imas.

Subdeacon: R. Holy and immortal, have mercy upon us.

Celebrant: V. I did scourge Egypt with her first-born for thy sake : and thou hast scourged me and delivered me up.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. O my people, what have I done unto thee, or wherein have I wearied thee? Testify against me.

Celebrant: V. I led thee forth out of Egypt, drowning Pharaoh in the Red Sea : and thou hast delivered me up unto the chief priests.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. O my people, what have I done unto thee,

or wherein have I wearied thee? Testify against me.

Celebrant: V. I did open the sea before thee : and thou hast opened my side with a spear.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. O my people, what have I done unto thee, or wherein have I wearied thee? Testify against me.

Celebrant: V. I did go before thee in the pillar of cloud : and thou hast led me unto the judgement-hall of Pilate.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. O my people, what have I done unto thee, or wherein have I wearied thee? Testify against me.

Celebrant: V. I did feed thee with manna in the desert : and thou hast stricken me with blows and scourges.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. O my people, what have I done unto thee, or wherein have I wearied thee? Testify against me.

Celebrant: V. I did give thee to drink the water of life from the rock : and thou hast given me to drink but gall and vinegar.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. O my people, what have I done unto thee, or wherein have I wearied thee? Testify against me.

Celebrant: V. I did smite the kings of the Canaanites for thy sake : and thou hast smitten my head with a reed.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. O my people, what have I done unto thee, or wherein have I wearied thee? Testify against me.

Celebrant: V. I did give thee a royal sceptre : and thou hast given unto my head a crown of thorns.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. O my people, what have I done unto thee, or

wherein have I wearied thee? Testify against me.

Celebrant: V. I did raise thee on high with great power : and thou hast hanged me upon the gibbet of the Cross.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. O my people, what have I done unto thee, or wherein have I wearied thee? Testify against me.

Celebrant: V. We venerate thy Cross, O Lord : and praise and glorify thy holy Resurrection : for by virtue of the Cross joy hath come to the whole world.

Ps. 67. God be merciful unto us and bless us :

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. And shew us the light of his countenance, and be merciful unto us.

Celebrant: V. We venerate thy Cross, O Lord : and praise and glorify thy holy Resurrection : for by virtue of the Cross joy hath come to the whole world.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. Faithful Cross, above all other, one and only noble Tree : none in foliage, none in blossom, none in fruit thy peer may be.

Sweetest wood, and sweetest iron, sweetest weight is hung on thee.

Celebrant: HYMN. V. Sing, my tongue, the glorious battle, sing the ending of the fray ; now above the Cross, the trophy, sound the loud triumphant lay : tell how Christ, the world's Redeemer, as a Victim won the day.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R. Faithful Cross, above all other, one and only noble Tree : none in foliage, none in blossom, none in fruit thy peer may be.

Celebrant: V. God in pity saw man fallen, shamed and sunk in misery,

when he fell on death by tasting fruit of the forbidden tree : then another Tree was chosen which the world from death should free.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R̄. Sweetest wood, and sweetest iron, sweetest weight is hung on thee.

Celebrant: V̄. Thus the scheme of our salvation was of old in order laid : that the manifold deceiver's art by art might be outweighed : and the lure the foe put forward into means of healing made.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R̄. Faithful Cross.

Celebrant: V̄. Therefore when the appointed fullness of the holy time was come, he was sent, who maketh all things, forth from God's eternal home : thus he came to earth, incarnate, offspring of a maiden's womb.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R̄. Sweetest wood.

Celebrant: V̄. Lo! he lies an infant weeping, where the narrow manger stands : while the Mother-maid his members wraps in mean and lowly bands : and the swaddling clothes is winding round his helpless feet and hands.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R̄. Faithful Cross.

Celebrant: V̄. Thirty years among us dwelling, his appointed time fulfilled, born for this, he meets his passion, for that this he freely willed ; on the Cross the Lamb is lifted where his life-Blood shall be spilled.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R̄. Sweetest wood.

Celebrant: V̄. He endured the nails, the spitting, vinegar, and spear, and reed ; from that holy Body broken

Blood and Water forth proceed : earth, and stars, and sky, and ocean by that flood from stain are freed.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R̄. Faithful Cross.

Celebrant: V̄. Bend thy boughs, O Tree of glory ; thy relaxing sinews bend ; for a while the ancient rigour that thy birth bestowed, suspend : and the King of heavenly beauty on thy bosom gently tend.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R̄. Sweetest wood.

Celebrant: V̄. Thou alone wast counted worthy this world's ransom to uphold : for a shipwrecked race pre-paring harbour, like the Ark of old : with the sacred Blood anointed from the smitten Lamb that rolled.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R̄. Faithful Cross.

Celebrant: V̄. To the Trinity be glory everlasting, as is meet : equal to the Father, equal to the Son, and Paraclete : Trinal Unity, whose praises all created things repeat. Amen.

Deacon & Subdeacon: R̄. Sweetest wood.

IV. THE MASS OF THE PRESANCTIFIED.

§ *Toward the end of the Worship of the Cross the Altar is made ready, and a PROCESSION is made to the place where the Sacrament was laid yesterday, and honour is paid to the Most Holy, with incense and lights, wherewith the Procession returns, whilst there is sung :*

HYMN. *Vexilla Regis prodeunt.*

THE royal banners forward go :
The Cross shines forth in mystic glow,
Where he in flesh, our flesh who made,
Our sentence bore, our ransom paid.

Where deep for us the spear was dyed,
Life's torrent rushing from his side,
To wash us in that precious flood,
Where mingled Water flowed and Blood.

Fulfilled is all that David told,
In true prophetic song of old :
Amidst the nations, God, saith he,
Hath reigned and triumphed from the Tree.

O Tree of beauty, Tree of light,
O Tree with royal purple dight,
Erect on whose triumphal breast
Those holy limbs should find their rest.

On whose dear arms so widely flung
The weight of this world's ransom hung,
The price of humankind to pay,
And spoil the spoiler of his prey.

§ *The following verse is sung kneeling.*

O Cross, our one reliance hail,
So may thy power with us avail
To give new virtue to the saint
And pardon to the penitent.

To thee, eternal Three in One,
Let homage meet by all be done,
Whom by the Cross thou dost restore
Preserve and govern evermore. Amen.

§ *When the Priest has come to the Altar, he places the Chalice upon it, and kneeling again censes the Sacrament: then going up to the Altar he places the Host from the Chalice on the Paten and then makes the Offertory as prescribed for Good Friday.*

Then turning towards the People, on the Gospel side, he says in the customary way:

BRETHREN, pray: that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the Father Almighty.

Omitting all else, he immediately sings:

Let us pray

AND now, as our Saviour Christ hath taught us, we are bold to say :
Our Father, who art in heaven : Hal-
lowed be thy Name : Thy kingdom
come : Thy will be done, On earth as
it is in heaven. Give us this day our

daily bread : And forgive us our
trespasses, As we forgive those who
trespass against us. And lead us not
into temptation. R̄. But deliver us
from evil.

Then the Priest shall say with the low voice Amen, and afterward, like as he said Our Father, immediately and without Let us pray, he shall begin this prayer following :

DELIVER us, we beseech thee, O Lord, from all evils, past, present, and to come etc.

§ *Then the Priest genuflects, slides the Paten beneath the Sacrament, and taking the Host in his right hand, lifts it up so that it may be seen by the People: and immediately dividing it into three parts over the Chalice, he shall place the last part into the Chalice in the usual way, but saying nothing. The Peace of the Lord is not said, nor O Lamb of God, nor is the Kiss of Peace given. And afterward, having omitted the first two Prayers, he shall say this one only:*

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, I, thine unworthy servant, do presume to take thy Body etc.

Then shall he genuflect, and take the Paten with Christ's Body: and with great reverence and humility say:

I will receive the bread of heaven,
and call upon the Name of the Lord.

Then he smites his breast as he thrice says:

Lord, I am not worthy that thou
shouldest come under my roof ; but
speak the word only and my soul shall
be healed.

And he reverently receives the Body.

Then omitting all else which is wont to be said before taking the Sacrament of the precious Blood, he forthwith consumes with reverence the Particle of the Host with the wine. Then he washes his fingers in the accustomed manner; and takes the purification. Afterward, bow-

ing down in the midst of the Altar, he says with hands joined:

GRANT that what we have received with the mouth, O Lord, we may keep with a pure heart, *etc.*

And nothing further is said: and EVENSONG is said without chant: and the Altar is laid bare.

THE HOLY SABBATH OF HOLY WEEK

Commonly Called Holy Saturday or Easter Even

Double of I Class

[If the Collect, Epistle, and Gospel from the Book of Common Prayer be used after the Litany in the Mass according to the ancient order, all that here follows is to be omitted as far as The Liturgy for Holy Saturday: but if the same be used without the Anaphora, they should be said according to the order which immediately follows.]

INTROIT. *Repleta est. Ps. 88.*

MY soul is full of trouble: and my life draweth nigh unto hell. *Ps. ibid.* O Lord God of my salvation, I have cried day and night before thee. *Then at once is repeated* My soul.

Then shall the Priest say, his hands being joined: Let us pray. The Deacon shall say: Let us bow the knee. R/. Arise.

COLLECT.

GRANT, O Lord, that as we are baptized into the death of thy blessed Son our Saviour Jesus Christ: so by

continual mortifying our corrupt affections we may be buried with him; and that through the grave, and gate of death, we may pass to our joyful resurrection. For his merits, who died, and was buried, and rose again for us, the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. [Who.]

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Peter the Apostle.

I Peter 3. 17.

DEARLY beloved: It is better, if the will of God be so: that ye suffer for well-doing, than for evil-doing. For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to God: being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the Spirit. By which also he went and preached unto the spirits in prison, which sometime were disobedient, when once the long-suffering of God waited in the days of Noah, while the ark was a preparing: wherein few, that is, eight souls, were saved by water. The

like figure whereunto, even baptism, doth also now save us, (not the putting away the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience towards God,) by the resurrection of Jesus Christ : who is gone into heaven, and is on the right hand of God, Angels and authorities and powers being made subject unto him.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 18.* The sorrows of death compassed me : and the snares of death overtook me. *V. Ps. 4.* I will lay me down in peace, and take my rest.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 27. 57.

AT that time : When the Even was come, there came a rich man of Arimathaea, named Joseph : who also himself was Jesûs' disciple. He went to Pilate, and begged the body of Jesus : then Pilate commanded the body to be dêliverèd. And when Joseph had taken the body, he wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn ôut in the rock ; and he rolled a great stone to the door of the sepulchre, and departed. * And there was Mary Magdalene, and the other Mary, sitting over against thê sepulchre. Now the next day that followed the Day of the Preparation, the chief priests and Pharisees came together unto Pilate, saying : Sir, we remember that that deceiver said, while he was yet alive : After three days I will rise again. Command therefore that the sepulchre be made sure until the third day : lest his disciples come by night and steal him away, and say unto the people :

He is risèn from the dead. So the last error shall be wôrse than the first. Pilate said unto them : Ye have a watch, go your way : make it as sûre as ye can. So they went and made the sepulchre sure : sealing the stône, and setting a watch.

After which the Priest shall proceed to bless the New Fire and do that which follows.

THE LITURGY FOR HOLY SATURDAY

Station at St. John Lateran

I. THE BLESSING OF THE NEW FIRE AND THE PASCHAL CANDLE.

At a suitable hour the Altars are covered with cloths, and the Offices said, but the candles on the Altar are not lighted until the beginning of Mass. In the meantime fire is struck from a flint without the Church, and coals are kindled from the fire.

The Office being finished in Quire, the Priest, vested in Amice, Alb, Girdle, Stole, and violet Cope, or without the Chasuble, accompanied by the Ministers with Cross, holy water, and incense, proceeds to the porch of the Church, if it may conveniently be done, or into the entrance of the Church itself, and BLESSES THE NEW FIRE, saying:

V. The Lord be with you.

R. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O GOD, who through thy Son, who is the true corner-stone, hast bestowed upon thy faithful people the fire of thy brightness : we beseech thee

that thou wouldest sanctify this new fire, now struck by us from the flint-stone, to be profitable to our service : and grant unto us that by this paschal feast we may be so inflamed with heavenly desires ; that we may with pure hearts and minds attain unto the feast of thy eternal brightness. Through the same Christ our Lord. *R.* Amen.

Let us pray.

O LORD GOD, Father Almighty, who art light unfailing and the father of all lights : we beseech thee so to bless this light which hath here been sanctified and blessed in thy Name, who hast enlightened the whole world : that we may be enkindled by thy light and enlightened with the fire of thy brightness : and like as thou didst enlighten Moses going forth from the land of Egypt, so do thou at this time enlighten our hearts and understandings, that we may be found worthy to attain unto the light of everlasting life. Through Christ our Lord. *R.* Amen.

Let us pray.

O LORD holy, Father Almighty, everlasting God : we pray thee that thou wouldest vouchsafe to assist us who here do bless this fire in thy Name, and in the Name of thy only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord and our God, and of the Holy Ghost ; and we beseech thee likewise to assist us against all the fiery darts of the enemy, and to enlighten us with thy heavenly grace. Who livest and reignest with the same thy only-begotten Son and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. *R.* Amen.

Then shall he BLESS the five GRAINS OF INCENSE that shall be put in the candle, saying, without any preface, this prayer following.

WE beseech thee, Almighty God, to pour down on this incense the abundance of thy blessing : and as thou, thyself unseen, art the regenerator of all mankind, so now we pray thee kindle a light to lighten our darkness ; that both our sacrifice to be offered on this night may be made bright by the inward presence of thy holy light, and that all places where-soever light shall be brought from this mystery here sanctified by us, may by the same be relieved from the crafts and assaults of the devil, and filled with the mighty power of thy heavenly majesty. Through Christ our Lord. *R.* Amen.

§ And while he is blessing the grains of incense, an Acolyte takes some of the blessed coals and places them in the censer: and the above Prayer ended, the Priest sets incense in the censer from the boat, and blesses it in the customary manner. Then he thrice sprinkles with holy water the aforementioned grains of incense and the fire, saying: Thou shalt purge me with hyssop, without intoning it, nor adding the Psalm, and he censes them thrice.

Meanwhile all the lights in the Church are extinguished, so that they may be presently lighted afresh from the New Fire. Then the Deacon, vesting himself in a white Dalmatic, takes the reed upon the top of which are set three candles in the shape of a triangle. And the Thurifer goes first with an Acolyte, bearing in a basin the five grains of incense: the

Subdeacon follows with the Cross, afterward the Clergy in due order: next the Deacon with the reed, and after him the Celebrant. When the Deacon has come into the Church, he lowers the reed, and an Acolyte bringing a taper lighted from the New Fire lights one of the three candles on the reed: and the DEACON lifting up the reed, genuflects (all likewise genuflecting with him, save the SUB-DEACON who bears the Cross) and SINGS ALONE :

THE Light of Christ. R̄. Thanks be to God.

And going on to the middle of the Church, there another candle is lighted: and again genuflecting as before, he sings at a higher pitch:

The Light of Christ. R̄. Thanks be to God.

The third time he goes up before the Altar, where the third candle is lighted: and genuflecting again as before, he sings at a pitch still higher:

The Light of Christ. R̄. Thanks be to God.

Then the Celebrant goes up to the Lord's Table, at the Epistle horn: and the Deacon gives the reed to one of the Acolytes: and taking the book, asks a blessing from the Celebrant, as at the Gospel, the Priest saying:

The Lord be in thy heart and on thy lips, that worthily and rightly thou mayest proclaim his paschal praise : In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, ✠ and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Then all rising and standing, as if for the Gospel, the Deacon sings:

REJOICE now, all ye heavenly legions of Angels : and celebrate the divine mysteries with exultation : and for the King that cometh with victory, let the trumpet proclaim salvation. Sing with joy, O earth, illumined with this celestial radiancy : and enlightened by the King eternal, thy Glory, believe and know that thou hast put away the darkness of all mankind. So likewise let his holy Church, our Mother, welcome the bright beams of light shed upon her : and let his holy courts be filled with the praises of his people. I pray and beseech you, therefore, dearly beloved, that all ye, who here are present seeking this heavenly brightness, make your supplication with me to God the Almighty, that he would shew forth his mercy toward me. That he who in my unworthiness numbered me among his Ministers and called me to do him service : so also may vouchsafe to lighten my darkness, making me meet to praise this gift of light with thankfulness. Through his son, Jesus Christ our Lord and Redeemer : who liveth and reigneth with him in the unity of the Holy Ghost.

WORLD without end. R̄. Amen. V̄. The Lord be with you. R̄. And with thy spirit. V̄. Lift up your hearts. R̄. We lift them up unto the Lord. V̄. Let us give thanks unto our Lord God. R̄. It is meet and right so to do.

IT is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks unto thee, O Lord, Holy, Father Almighty, Everlasting God. And that

with the service of our lips we should glorify thee, and with heart and soul should praise thee, O God the Invisible and Almighty, and likewise thy only begotten Son, Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour. Who paid for us to thee, O Eternal Father, the debt of Adam's transgression : and with his dear Blood wiped away the reproach of our former offences. Now therefore we sacrifice our Passover, wherein for us the very Lamb of God is slain, by whose Blood even the doors of his faithful people are made holy. Now is come the night, wherein, when our fathers the children of Israel were led forth out of Egypt, thou dividedst the sea and madest them to go on dry land in the midst of the waters. Yea, now is come the night, that with the fiery pillar hath taken away the darkness of our condemnation. Now is come the night, whereby all that believe in Christ upon the face of the earth, delivered from this naughty world, and out of the shadow of death, are unto grace renewed, and made partakers of eternal life. Now is come the night, wherein the bonds of death were loosed, and Christ harrowing hell rose again in triumph. For wherefore should man be born into this world, save that being born he might be redeemed? O how wonderful is thy loving kindness unto us thy children! O how unspeakable is the love that thou hast bestowed on us : who to redeem a servant, delivered up thine only Son! O how great is thy providence in man's necessity, to make by the Blood of Christ from Adam's sin our salvation! O blessed iniquity, for whose redemption such a price was

paid by such a Saviour! O night verily blessed, to thee alone that time and that hour were made manifest, when our Saviour Christ rose again from death unto life! Now is come the night whereof David said : Behold, the night is as clear as the day : then shall my night be turned into day. The holy mystery therefore of this night putteth to flight the deeds of darkness, purgeth away sin, restoreth innocence to the fallen, and gladness to them that mourn : casteth out hatred, bringeth peace to all mankind, and boweth down mighty princes.

Here the Deacon fixes the five grains of blessed incense into the Candle in the form of a Cross, on this wise:

THEREFORE, in this night of grace, accept, O holy Father, this our evening sacrifice of incense : which thy holy Church by the hands of thy servants doth offer thee, wherein this Candle of wax which thy creatures the bees did gather, is made a solemn oblation. Ye hear, brethren, the meaning of this pillar we have set up, which in God's honour the bright flame of fire doth set alight.

Here the Deacon lights the Candle from one of the three tapers on the reed.

WHICH though it be never so much divided, yet knoweth not variability, nor loseth ought of its splendour. For wax that melteth doth but feed the flame, for thereunto have God's creatures the bees brought it forth, that it should give light in darkness.

Here the lamps are lighted.

O NIGHT verily blessed, which did spoil the people of Egypt and enrich the Hebrews! O night, wherein heaven and earth are joined, and man is brought close to God. We pray thee, therefore, O Lord most merciful : that this Candle, which we have lighted and consecrated before thee in thine own Name, may continue to shine forth without ceasing, and may vanquish all the shades of darkness. That being accepted before thee as a sweet savour, it may be numbered with the lights that thou hast kindled. May the Day Star find it burning when he dawneth into day : the Day Star that riseth and knoweth not his going down : but coming forth from the places of darkness gladly giveth forth light unto all creation. We beseech thee, therefore, O Lord most merciful : that thou wouldst direct and guide us thy servants, and the hearts of all thy faithful family : and all those also that minister in thy service : especially *N.* our Chief Bishop, and thy servant *N.* our own Bishop, so helping us with continual grace, that we may pass our time in rest and quietness, in the glad solemnity of our Redemption. Through the same thy Son, Jesus Christ our Lord and Redeemer : who liveth and reigneth with thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost ever one God, world without end. *R.* Amen.

II. THE PROPHECIES.

[In the Sarum Use was said only the 1st, 4th, 8th, and 11th Prophecies, each with a Tract (except the 1st) and a

Collect; after which was said the Tract with which the blessing of the Font begins.]

§ *The blessing of the Candle ended, the PROPHECIES, without any announcement are read, and at the end is not said, Thanks be to God. At the end of each Prophecy is said the Prayer that follows.*

§ PROPHECY THE FIRST.

Gen. 1. 1-31 and 2. 1-2.

Thereafter, the Priest says: Let us pray. Deacon: Let us bow the knee, and Subdeacon: Arise.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who in a wondrous manner didst create the race of man, and still more wondrously hast redeemed the same : grant us, we beseech thee ; so stedfastly to withstand all the crafts and devices of sin ; that we may be found worthy to attain everlasting felicity. Through.

PROPHECY THE SECOND.

Gen. 5, 6, 7 and 8.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. *R.* Arise.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who art strength unchanging and eternal light : look down, we pray thee, in mercy on thy holy Church, which thou hast so marvellously ordained, that by the effectual operation of thy continual providence, the work of man's salvation may be accomplished in all tranquillity ; and that, all mankind seeing the restoration of such things as are cast down, and the re-

newal of such things as are grown old, may understand aright, that like as through thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord all things were created, so through him they do now return to their perfection. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

PROPHECY THE THIRD.

Gen. 22. 1-19.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee.
℞. Arise.

COLLECT.

O GOD, Almighty Father of them that put their trust in thee, who hast spread abroad throughout all the world the grace of adoption to the increasing of thy children of promise : who dost likewise, through this Paschal Sacrament, fulfil the oath which thou didst swear unto Abraham thy servant, to make him the father of all nations ; grant, we pray thee, unto all thy peoples that they may rightly and worthily enter upon the grace of thy calling. Through.

§ PROPHECY THE FOURTH.

Exod. 14. 24-31 and 15. 1.

TRACT. *Exod. 15.* We will sing unto the Lord : for he hath triumphed gloriously : the horse and his rider hath he thrown into the sea : the Lord is my strength and song, and he is become my salvation. ℣. He is my God, and I will prepare him an habitation : my father's God, and I will exalt him. ℣. The Lord is a man of war : the Lord is his name.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee.
℞. Arise.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who hast ordained that thy mighty works of old should enlighten even this our present generation : who didst by the mighty defence of thy right hand deliver one people from persecution in the land of Egypt to be a figure of the salvation of all nations by the washing of regeneration : grant, we pray thee ; that the fullness of all mankind, being delivered from its present bondage, may be made sons of Abraham and worthy members of thy true Israel. Through.

PROPHECY THE FIFTH.

Is. 54. 17 and 55. 1-11.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee.
℞. Arise.

COLLECT.

ALmighty and everlasting God, who didst swear unto the faith of our forefathers that they should by thy holy adoption be made the fathers of many : increase and multiply, we pray thee, to the honour of thy Name, the sons of promise ; that, like as they of old doubted not thine oath, so thy Church in our time may see in due measure the fulfilment of the same. Through.

PROPHECY THE SIXTH.

Baruch 3. 9-38.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee.
℞. Arise.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who by the calling of the nations dost ever multiply thy holy Church : mercifully grant ; that

they whom thou dost cleanse by the waters of baptism may be defended by thy perpetual and ready help. Through.

PROPHECY THE SEVENTH.

Ezek. 37. 1-14.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee.
℞. Arise.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who both in thy former and in thy latter Covenant hast taught us to observe the Sacrament of thy passover : grant unto us, so to understand aright the designs of thy mercy ; that we receiving these thy present gifts may be stablished in the stedfast expectation of those that are to come. Through.

§ PROPHECY THE EIGHTH.

Is. 4. 1-6.

TRACT. *Is. 5.* My well-beloved hath a vineyard in a very fruitful hill : ℣. And he fenced it and gathered out the stones thereof : and planted it with the choicest vine, and built a tower in the midst of it. ℣. And also made a winepress therein : for the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the house of Israel.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee.
℞. Arise.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who by the mouth of thy holy Prophets hast manifested thyself before all the children of the Church, to be in all places of thy dominion, to be the sower of good seed and the husbandman of thine

elect branches : grant unto thy peoples, that, the vineyard of thy planting and the harvest of thy sowing being purged of all thorns and briars, they may be made to bring forth worthy fruit in abundance. Through.

PROPHECY THE NINTH.

Exod. 12. 1-11.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee.
℞. Arise.

COLLECT.

ALmighty and everlasting God, who art wondrous in the governance of all thy works : grant unto thy people a right understanding ; that like as in the beginning thou didst of thy excellent wisdom create the world, so thou didst in the end yet more wondrously redeem the same by suffering Christ our Passover to be sacrificed for us. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

PROPHECY THE TENTH.

Jonah 3. 1-10.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee.
℞. Arise.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who hast united the diversity of nations in the confession of thy Name : grant unto us that we may both desire the things that thou commandest, and by thy merciful guidance perform the same ; that all thy people whom thou hast called to everlasting life may agree in unity of faith and in righteousness of conversation. Through.

§ PROPHECY THE ELEVENTH.

Deut. 31. 22-30.

TRACT. *Deut.* 32. Give ear, O ye heavens, and I will speak : and hear, O earth, the words of my mouth. V̄. My doctrine shall drop as the rain : my speech shall distil as the dew. V̄. As the small rain upon the tender herb, and as the showers upon the grass : because I will publish the Name of the Lord : V̄. Ascribe ye greatness unto our God : he is the rock, his work is perfect, for all his ways are judgement : V̄. A God of truth and without iniquity : just and right is he.

Let us pray. Let us bow the knee. R̄. Arise.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who dost exalt them that are of low estate, and dost stablish them that stand upright : who didst likewise by thy holy servant Moses so vouchsafe to teach thy people to sing praises to thy honour, that thy law by them repeated might be profitable for our guidance : raise up, we pray thee, thy power among the fullness of the nations whom thou hast justified ; that they, being delivered from the fear of thy wrath, may rejoice in the plenteous remission of all their sins, and being warned to flee from the judgement of thy vengeance may be delivered from the same unto everlasting salvation. Through.

PROPHECY THE TWELFTH.

Dan. 3. 1-24

Let us bow the knee *is not said here, but only:*

Let us pray. COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, the only hope of all mankind, who by the preaching of thy holy Prophets hast prefigured the mysteries of these our generations : mercifully grant ; that, forasmuch as without thy inspiration thy faithful people cannot increase in godliness, they may obtain of thee the abundant fulfilment of all their desires. Through.

II. THE BLESSING OF THE FONT.

And these ended, if there be a Font for Baptism in the Church, the Priest comes to the Font with the Clergy and the Ministers, ready vested: meanwhile is sung the following:

TRACT. *Ps.* 42. Like as the hart desireth the water-brooks : so longeth my soul after thee, O God. V̄. My soul is athirst for God, yea, even for the living God : when shall I come to appear before the presence of God? V̄. My tears have been my meat day and night, while they daily say unto me : Where is now thy God?

Then the Priest, before he goes in to bless the Font, sings this Prayer near by:

V̄. The Lord be with you. R̄. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, mercifully look upon the devout prayers of thy servants now seeking regeneration and desiring the fountain of thy waters, even as the hart desireth the water-brooks : and of thy goodness grant that they who thirst after thy

faith may in this mystery of thy holy Baptism obtain sanctification both of body and soul. Through. R̄. Amen.

Which done, he goes to the Font.

[If Baptism be administered, The Ministration of Holy Baptism as set forth in the Book of Common Prayer is used in its entirety in place of everything which here follows as far as the Litany, except that the form for hallowing the Font is sung as noted below.]

Afterwards he proceeds to bless the Font, singing:

Ÿ. The Lord be with you. R̄. And with thy spirit. Let us pray.

¶ *Then shall the Minister say:*

O MERCIFUL God, grant that like as Christ died and rose again, so *all that are baptized (or this Child or this thy Servant)* may die to sin and rise to newness of life. R̄. Amen.

Grant that all sinful affections may die in *him*, and that all things belonging to the Spirit may live and grow in *him*. R̄. Amen.

Grant that *he* may have power and strength to have victory, and to triumph, against the devil, the world, and the flesh. R̄. Amen.

Grant that whosoever is here dedicated to thee by our office and ministry, may also be endued with heavenly virtues, and everlastingly rewarded, through thy mercy, O blessed Lord God, who dost live, and govern all things :

Raising his voice to the tone of the Preface, he continues, with hands joined:

WORLD without end. R̄. Amen.
Ÿ. The Lord be with you. R̄. And with thy spirit. Ÿ. Lift up your

hearts. R̄. We lift them up unto the Lord. Ÿ. Let us give thanks unto our Lord God. R̄. It is meet and right so to do.

IT is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should give thanks unto thee, O Lord, Holy, Father Almighty, Everlasting God. For that thy dearly beloved Son Jesus Christ, for the forgiveness of our sins, did shed out of his most precious side both water and blood ; and gave commandment to his disciples, that they should go teach all nations, and baptize them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

If Prayer-Book forms only be used, all that follows is omitted as far as Regard, we beseech thee.

O GOD, whose Spirit moved over the face of the waters, when the earth was without form and void at its creation : that even then the nature of water might conceive the virtue of purging all defilement :

O GOD, who didst cover the earth with water, and wash away its wickedness, and didst shew forth in the saving of eight souls by the same water, a figure of our regeneration : that by the mystery of this one element of water thou mightest make an end of sin, and give birth unto righteousness :

BEHOLD with thy good pleasure the family of thy Church, and make the grace of thy regeneration to abound therein, for thou dost with the rivers of thy plenteous mercy make glad the city of thy redeemed : and openest unto us fountains of Baptism through the whole world for the healing of

nations : that, at the word of thy majesty, the same may receive the grace of thine only Son, through the Holy Ghost.

Here the Priest divides with his open hand the water in the form of a Cross, and forthwith wiping his hand with a napkin, says:

MAY he by the secret operation of his power make this water fruitful unto the regeneration of man : that having received sanctification, and being born again without spot of defilement, the same may be found a new creature, that springeth from this womb of living water : that young and old, both men and women, who henceforth shall be baptized herein, may all become the children of grace and heirs of thy heavenly promises.

SPEAK the word, O Lord, and drive away speedily unclean spirits and all things that may hurt us : banish from us by thy Name all the snares and assaults of the devil. And may our ghostly enemy have no power at all to encompass us : to deceive our hearts by his subtilty : to waylay us in secret, and spread abroad the leaven of malice.

He touches the water with his hand.

BE this an holy and undefiled creation, and such that the son of wickedness may not approach it, nor the stain of iniquity come near to defile it. Be it a fountain that doth regenerate, a stream that doth purify : may all they that by this means shall be dedicated before thee by the operation of the Holy Ghost, receive the grace of redemption and remission of their offences.

He makes three Crosses over the Font, saying:

WHEREFORE I do hallow thee, O creature of water, by God ✠ that liveth, by God ✠ the faithful, by God, ✠ the Holy : by God, who in the beginning by his Word divided the land from thee : and whose Spirit moved upon thy face.

Here he divides the water with his hand, and scatters it towards the four corners of the earth, saying:

WHO did ordain that thou shouldst issue out of Eden, and be parted from thence into four heads, flowing therefrom into all the earth. Likewise in the desert of Marah he did turn thy bitterness into sweetness, and made thee to come forth out of the rock for his people.

IN the Name of his only Son our Saviour Jesus Christ do I hallow thee, O creature of water : for he did change thee into wine as a wondrous sign of his Omnipotence, when he was bidden to the wedding at Cana.

WHO walked upon thee with his feet to come to his disciples : and was baptized in thee in Jordan by John his minister.

WHO moreover did mingle thee with Blood from his side at his Passion : and commanded his disciples that such as believed should be in thee baptized.

Changing his voice, he continues in the tone of the Lesson (that is, on one note).

ALMIGHTY GOD, mercifully assist our prayers, who here observe what thou hast commanded : and of thy great goodness breathe thy Breath upon us.

He breathes thrice on to the water in the form of a Cross, saying (in the tone of the Lesson):

Hallow by the Word of thy mouth and of thy power the weakness of this water : that like as by nature it doeth service unto the purifying of the body, so by thy grace it may effectually cleanse our souls.

Here the Priest lowers the Candle into the water a little way : and going back to the tone of the Preface, says:

MAY the power of the Holy Ghost be poured out on this Font which we have filled.

Then taking the Candle out of the water, he dips it again more deeply, repeating at a somewhat higher pitch: May the power. Afterward the Candle is again taken out of the water and the third time is dipped to the bottom of the Font, the Priest repeating at a still higher pitch: May the power, as above. And then breathing thrice on the water in this form ♀, he proceeds:

AND make the whole substance of this water effectual unto the washing of regeneration.

The Candle is taken out of the water, and he continues:

MAY every stain of our iniquity here be cleansed : may our nature be restored to its perfect fashioning, and be conformed again to thine own image of righteousness ; may it be redeemed from the old sins of its conversation : that every person, being born again by the Sacrament he hath here received, may be restored verily unto the innocence of thy children.

And the following he reads, or else sings as below:

THROUGH Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord. Who shall come to judge the quick and the dead, and the world by fire. *R̄. Amen.*

Then some of the blessed water is sprinkled over the People by the assisting Priests, and meanwhile other thereof is put in a receptacle to be used later to sprinkle homes and other places; and then the Celebrant pours the Oil of the Catechumens into the Font in the form of a Cross, saying distinctly:

May this Oil of salvation make this Font holy and fruitful, in such wise that those who find herein their new birth may come to life everlasting. *R̄. Amen.*

In the form of a Cross, he pours in the Chrism, saying:

May this mingling of the Chrism of Jesus Christ our Lord, and of the Holy Ghost the Paraclete, be wrought in the Name of the Most Holy Trinity. *R̄. Amen.*

In the form of a Cross, he pours in both together, saying:

May this commingling of the Chrism of salvation and of the Oil of unction and of the Water of Baptism likewise be wrought in the Name of the Fa-**T**her, and of the S**O**on, and of the Holy **T** Ghost. *R̄. Amen.*

Then he mingles the Oil and water, and scatters it over the Font with his hand, which done, he continues as follows:

REGARD, we beseech thee, the supplications of thy congregation : sanctify this Water to the mystical

washing away of sin ; and grant that *this Child (this thy Servant)*, now to be baptized therein, may receive the fulness of thy grace, and ever remain in the number of thy faithful children : through the same Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with thee, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, be all honour and glory, now and evermore. R̄. Amen.

III. THE ADMINISTRATION OF BAPTISM.

If Baptism is to be administered, it is done after the usual manner, from the form for the Ministration of Holy Baptism.

Then the Priest and the Ministers return to the Altar and the Litany is sung by two Cantors, and the Choir repeat it also together, as is directed below.

IV. THE LITANY AND THE MASS.

§ *But where there is no baptismal Font, when the last Prophecy and Collect is ended the Celebrant lays aside his Chasuble, and with the Ministers lies prostrate before the Altar: and all kneeling, the LITANY IS CHANTED by two Cantors in the midst of the Choir, and both sides of the Choir make the responses together. But when has been said the final repetition of R̄. Good Lord, deliver us, the Priest and Ministers arise, and go to the Sacristy to array themselves in white vestments for the Solemn Mass: and meanwhile the Altar candles are lighted. At the end of the Litany Kyrie eleison is solemnly intoned, and repeated as in the Mass on ordinary days. And the Litany is said [as given in the Prayer-Book, or else] in the following form:*

KYRIE eleison. Christe eleison. Kyrie eleison.

Or:

LORD, have mercy upon us. Christ, have mercy upon us. Lord, have mercy upon us.

O CHRIST, hear us. O Christ, graciously hear us.

O GOD the Father of heaven : Have mercy upon us.

O God the Son, Redeemer of the world : Have mercy upon us.

O God the Holy Ghost : Have mercy upon us.

O Holy Trinity, one God : Have mercy upon us.

HOLY Mary : Pray for us.

Holy Mother of God : Pray

Holy Virgin of virgins : Pray.

SAINT Michael : Pray for us.

Saint Gabriel : Pray.

Saint Raphael : Pray.

All ye holy Angels and Archangels : Pray.

All ye holy orders of blessed Spirits : Pray.

Saint John Baptist : Pray.

Saint Joseph : Pray.

All ye holy Patriarchs and Prophets : Pray.

Saint Peter : Pray.

Saint Paul : Pray.

Saint Andrew : Pray.

Saint John : Pray.

O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world : Graciously hear us, good Lord.

O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world : have mercy upon us.

O CHRIST, hear us. O Christ, graciously hear us.

And here the Cantors solemnly intone Kyrie eleison, Christe eleison, Kyrie eleison, and repeat each invocation thrice. Meanwhile the Priest with his Ministers all in white vestments approach the Altar: and having said the Psalm Give sentence, with Glory be, he makes the Confession, as he is accustomed, in the appointed place: then going up, he kisses the Altar, censes it in the usual manner, and as soon as the Choir shall have finished the Kyrie eleison, he begins with solemnity Gloria in excelsis, and the bells are set ringing.

Afterward the Priest says:

℣. The Lord be with you.

℞. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

COLLECT. *From the Prayer-Book.*

GRANT, O Lord, that as we are baptized into the death of thy blessed Son our Saviour Jesus Christ : so by continual mortifying our corrupt affections we may be buried with him ; and that through the grave, and gate of death, we may pass to our joyful resurrection. For his merits, who died, and was buried, and rose again for us, the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

And one Collect only is said.

COLLECT. *From the Latin Rite.*

O GOD, who as on this most holy night hast sent forth the glorious light of the Resurrection of thy Son, Jêsus Christ our Lord : preserve, we pray thee, in these persons, now made incorporate in thy family, the spirit of adoption which thou hast given them ; that they being regenerate both in body and soul may in all sincerity obey thy holy will. Through the same.

EPISTLE. *From the Prayer-Book.*

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Peter the Apostle.

1 Peter 3. 17.

DEARLY beloved : It is better, if the will of God be so : that ye suffer for well-doing, than for evil-doing. For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the Spirit : by which also he went and preached unto the spirits in prison : which sometime were disobedient, when once the long-suffering of God waited in the days of Noah, while the ark was a preparing, wherein few, that is, eight souls were saved by water. The like figure whereunto even baptism, doth also now save us (not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God,) by the Resurrection of Jesus Christ : who is gone into heaven, and is on the right hand of God : Angels and authorities and powers being made subject unto him.

EPISTLE. *From the Latin Rite.*

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Colossians. *Col. 3. 1.*

BRETHREN : If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God : set your affections on things above, not on things on the earth. For ye are dead, and your life is hid with Christ in God. When Christ, who is our life, shall appear : then shall ye also appear with him in glory.

The Epistle ended, the Celebrant begins:

ALLELUIA. *And he sings the chant through thrice, in a pitch a little higher each time: and the Choir after each time repeats it in the same manner. Afterward the Choir proceeds:*

℣. Ps. 118. O give thanks unto the Lord, for he is gracious : for his mercy endureth for ever.

Then is said the TRACT. Ps. 117. O praise the Lord, all ye heathen : praise him, all ye nations. ℣. For his merciful kindness is ever more and more towards us : and the truth of the Lord endureth for ever.

At the Gospel, lights are not carried, but incense only: a blessing is asked, and the rest is done as usual.

GOSPEL. *From the Prayer-Book.*

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 27. 57.

AT that time : When the Even was come, there came a rich man of Arimathæa, named Joseph : who also

himself was Jesús' disciple. He went to Pilate, and begged the body of Jesus : then Pilate commanded the body to be dêliverèd. And when Joseph had taken the body, he wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn ôut in the rock ; and he rolled a great stone to the door of the sepulchre, ând departed. And there was Mary Magdalene, and the other Mary, sitting over against thê sepulchre. Now the next day that followed the Day of the Preparation, the chief priests and Pharisees came together unto Pilate, saying : Sir, we remember that that deceiver said, while he was yet alive : After three days I will rise again. Command therefore that the sepulchre be made sure until the third day : lest his disciples come by night and steal him away, and say unto the people : He is risên from the dead. So the last error shall be wôrse than the first. Pilate said unto them : Ye have a watch, go your way : make it as sûre as ye can. So they went and made the sepulchre sure : sealing the stone, and sêting a watch. [*And to commemorate the Resurrection, as well as the Burial of our Lord, the Gospel below should be added to the foregoing, but without any Announcement.*]

GOSPEL. *From the Latin Rite.*

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 28. 1.

IN the end of the sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mary Magdalene, and the other Mary to see thê sepulchre. And

behold there was a great earthquake. For the Angel of the Lord descended from heaven : and came and rolled back the stone from the door, and sât upon it ; his countenance was like lightning : and his raiment white as snow. And for fear of him the keepers did shake, and becâme as dead men. And the Angel answered and said unto the women : Fear not ye : for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified ; he is not here : for he is risen, as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay. And go quickly, and tell his disciples that he is risen from the dead : and behold he goeth before you into Galilee ; there shall ye see him. Lö, I have told you.

The Creed is not said, but the Gospel finished, the Priest says: The Lord be with you, and afterwards: Let us pray. The Offertory is not said, and at the end of the Psalm, at the Lavabo, is said Glory be.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to accept the prayers and oblations of thy people : that this beginning of thy Paschal Mysteries may by the operation of thy grace be unto us a wholesome medicine unto everlasting life. Through.

PREFACE and CANON of Easter.

Anciently the Anaphora was slightly varied on this day (to celebrate therein the greatness of the gift of Baptism) by the insertion of the bracketed words given below.

ALL glory be to thee, Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for that thou of thy tender mercy didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death

upon the Cross for our redemption : who made there by his one oblation, of himself once offered, [*on behalf also of those whom thou hast been pleased to regenerate by water and the Holy Ghost, granting unto them remission of all their sins,*] a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, etc. *And the rest as in the Canon.*

The Peace of the Lord be always with you *is said, but the Kiss of Peace is not given. O Lamb of God is not said, nor the Postcommunion: but the customary Prayers before Communion are said.*

After the reception of the Sacrament, in place of Evensong in Quire is chanted this Psalm and this Antiphon:

Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia, and Ps. 117.

O PRAISE the Lord, all ye heathen : * praise him, all ye nations.

For his merciful kindness is ever more and more towards us : * and the truth of the Lord endureth for ever. Praise the Lord.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, * and to the Holy Ghost.

As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be : * world without end. Amen.

Antiphon: Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia.

The Lesson, Hymn and Versicle are not said, but at once the Celebrant starts to intone the Antiphon to the Magnificat:

I N the end of the Sabbath. *And the Choir continues:* As it began to dawn toward the first day of the week : came Mary Magdalene, and the other Mary, to see the sepulchre, alleluia.

Then is sung the Magnificat with Glory be at the end, and the censuring is done as at other times at Evensong.

Afterward the Antiphon is repeated, [the Lesson and Nunc Dimittis read,] and at the end the Celebrant says:

℣. The Lord be with you. ℞. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, pour into our hearts the love of thy Hôly Spirit : that as thou hast now

fulfilled us with this Paschal Sacramênt, so thou wouldest make us to continue in all godly concord. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

Then he says: The Lord be with you.

And the Deacon turning himself to the People, sings:

Depart in peace, alleluia, alleluia.

℞. Thanks be to God, alleluia, alleluia.

And the Priest, having said Let this my bounden duty and service, gives the Blessing in the accustomed manner.

THE SEASONAL PRAYERS

LITURGICAL NOTE CONCERNING PRAYER-BOOK SEASONAL COLLECTS

The English Uses of the Western Liturgy, which were the source of the Prayer-Book, all provided for "Seasonal Prayers," and the Prayer-Book took this usage over in a somewhat inconsistent form by prescribing that the Advent Sunday and Ash Wednesday Collects are to be said at each Mass after the Collect for the Day. The latest American revision now prescribes the Palm Sunday Collect from Palm Sunday onwards. It is impossible to reconcile a completely literal interpretation of the Prayer-Book Rubrics on this subject with traditional liturgical uses, but it is doubtful whether the Rubrics of the 1549 Prayer-Book, which are the source of all the later Rubrics in this connection, were ever meant to be observed without reference to the liturgical knowledge and customs with which the clergy were at that time familiar. The classic example of this is the Proper Preface for Trinity which in the form given in 1549 could not have been added to the first strophe of the Preface as there given without some change in the wording, although no such change was indicated in the Rubric.

It is probable that the Ash Wednesday Collect was meant to do double service, (a) to take the place of the Sarum Lenten Seasonal Prayer for

Penitents, and (b) to provide on Feasts a commemoration of the Lenten Feria (since the Prayer-Book failed to provide a Mass for every day in Lent), and that the Advent Collect was prescribed as a parallel usage to that of Lent.

Those who wish to follow a completely literal interpretation of the Prayer-Book Rubrics should repeat the Advent Collect after the Collect of the Day from the 2nd Sunday after Advent to Christmas Day, whether it be an ordinary Feria, or a Festival such as that of St. Thomas the Apostle; and likewise during Lent and Passiontide, should repeat the prescribed Collect, no matter what Rubrics in this Missal order otherwise.

Those who wish to follow a usage consistent with ordinary liturgical rules should treat the prescribed Prayer-Book Collect (i.e., the Collect for Advent Sunday, Ash Wednesday, and Palm Sunday) as completely equivalent to the 2nd Seasonal Prayer, which means that it would be omitted on Doubles, when the rule is that no Seasonal Prayers be said, but only a Commemoration of the Feria, which in Advent is made by the use of the Collect of the preceding Sunday, but in Lent and Passiontide by the use of the Collect of the daily Feria.

LITURGICAL NOTE CONCERNING THE LONG ENDINGS
OF THE PRAYERS

Traditional Ending of Prayers addressed to God the Father is as follows:

Through [*the same*] Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord. Who liveth and reigneth with thee, in the unity of the [*same*] Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end.

Traditional Ending of Prayers addressed to God the Son is as follows:

Who livest and reignest with the Father, in the unity of the [*same*] Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end.

THE ORDER OF BLESSING WATER

On a Sunday, the salt and the water to be blessed being made ready in the Sacristy, the Priest who is about to celebrate the Mass, or another deputed for the purpose, being vested in an Alb or Surplice, with a Stole about his neck, first says:

℣. Our help is in the Name of the Lord.

℟. Who hath made heaven and earth.

Then straightway he beginneth the exorcism of the salt:

I ADJURE thee, O creature of salt, by the living ✠ God, by the true ✠ God, by the holy ✠ God : by God, who through Elisha the Prophet did command that thou shouldest be cast into the water to the healing of its barrenness : that thou be exorcized for the salvation of all them that believe : be thou made profitable for all them that receive thee, to their healing both in body and soul : let all places wherein thou shalt be sprinkled be delivered from all evil imaginations and wickedness, and the crafts and subtleties of the devil, and let all unclean spirits be exorcized thence, by him who shall come to judge the quick and the dead, and the world by fire. ℟. Amen.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, we humbly beseech thy infinite goodness, that thou wouldest vouchsafe of thy mercy to bless and sanctify this thy creature of salt, which thou hast bestowed for the necessities of mankind : let it be profitable for all them that receive it for their healing both in body and soul : and grant that

all such things as are touched or sprinkled with the same may be delivered from all uncleanness, and defended against the assaults of all spiritual wickedness. Through.

He straightway continueth with the exorcism of the water:

I ADJURE thee, O creature of water, in the Name of God ✠ the Father Almighty, and in the Name of Jesus ✠ Christ his Son our Lord, and by the power of the Holy ✠ Ghost : that thou be exorcized to the casting forth of all the power of the enemy, and that thou be enabled to root out and expel the enemy himself and his apostate angels, through the power of the same Jesus Christ our Lord : who shall come to judge the quick and the dead, and the world by fire. ℟. Amen.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O GOD, who in the chiefest of thy sacraments appointed for the salvation of mankind, hast ordained the use of the substance of water : mercifully assist us who call upon thee ; pour forth upon this creature, cleansed and made ready for thy service, the abundance of thy benediction : that in the service of thy mysteries the same may effectually receive the power of thy heavenly grace for the casting forth of devils, and the healing of diseases : grant that all such things as in the dwellings or possessions of thy faithful people are sprinkled with this water may be cleansed from all uncleanness, and delivered from all evil :

suffer not the spirit of pestilence to dwell therein, nor the breath of corruption : cause to depart from thence all the snares of the unseen enemy : and cast forth by the sprinkling of this water all such things as are contrary to the health and peace of them that dwell therein ; that like as we do call upon thy holy Name for their salvation, so the same may be effectually preserved against all the assaults of adversity. Through.

Here he thrice putteth salt into the water in the form of a cross, saying once:

LET this mingling of salt and water be wrought in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. *R.* Amen.

V. The Lord be with you.

R. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O GOD, who art the author of strength invincible, the King of the empire that none may overcome, who art ever wondrous in thy triumphs : who quellest the might of the dominion that is against thee : who dost conquer the fierceness of the roaring enemy : and overthrow by thy might the wickedness of the adversary : we beseech thee, O Lord, in fear and in lowliness : that thou wouldest regard with mercy this creature of salt and water, that thou wouldest enlighten the same with thy mercy and sanctify it with the dew of thy loving-kindness ; that wheresoever the same shall be sprinkled with the invocation of thy holy Name, the assaults of the unclean spirit may be driven forth from thence, and the

dread of the poisonous serpent be cast forth : and grant that in all such places the presence of thy Holy Spirit may be vouchsafed to us that call upon thy mercy. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

THE ASPERGES

§ The following order for the aspersion of holy water is to be observed on all Sundays before the principal Mass, even though it be not sung.

Having blessed the water, the Priest who is going to celebrate, vested in a Cope of the colour of the Office, proceeds to the Altar. And there, kneeling with the Ministers at the steps, even in Eastertide, he receives the aspersory from the Deacon, and first asperses the Altar thrice, then himself, and, standing up, the Ministers, beginning the Antiphon Thou shalt purge me. And the Choir continues: O Lord, with hyssop, etc., as below. Meanwhile the Celebrant asperses the Clergy, and then the People, saying with a low voice with the Ministers the Psalm Have mercy upon me, O God.

Asperges me.

Antiphon. Thou shalt purge me, *
O Lord, with hyssop, and I shall be clean : thou shalt wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.

Ps. 51. Have mercy upon me, O God, after thy great goodness.
V. Glory be to the Father. *And the Antiphon is repeated:* Thou shalt purge me.

This Antiphon is said after the manner prescribed in the aspersion of holy water on Sundays throughout the year: except upon Passion Sunday and upon Palm Sunday, when Glory be to the Father is not said, but after the Psalm Have mercy, the Antiphon Thou shalt purge me, is immediately repeated.

In Eastertide also, that is, from Easter Sunday until Pentecost inclusively, is sung this Anthem:

Vidi aquam.

Antiphon: I beheld water * proceeding out of the temple, from the right side thereof, alleluia : and everything, whithersoever the waters of life shall come, shall be healed, and they all shall say, alleluia, alleluia.

Ps. 118. O give thanks unto the Lord, for he is gracious : because his mercy endureth for ever.

℣. Glory be to the Father.

Antiphon is repeated. I beheld water.

On Trinity Sunday is resumed: Thou shalt purge me, O Lord.

On the feast days of Easter and Pentecost, in places where there is a Baptismal Font, the aspersion is made with the water blessed the previous day in the Font for Baptism, and taken from it before the infusion of the Oil and Chrism.

§ *Having finished the Antiphon after the manner prescribed above, the Priest who has sprinkled the water, returning to the Altar, with joined hands, says:*

℣. O Lord, shew thy mercy upon us. (Alleluia.)

℞. And grant us thy salvation. (Alleluia.)

℣. Lord, hear my prayer.

℞. And let my cry come unto thee.

℣. The Lord be with you.

℞. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O LORD holy, Father almighty, everlasting God, we beseech thee to hear us : and vouchsafe to send thy holy Angel from heaven, to guard and cherish, protect and visit, and evermore defend all that dwell in this dwelling-place. Through Christ our Lord. ℞. Amen.

THE ORDINARY AND CANON OF THE MASS

Being the Prayer-Book Order for the Eucharist along with traditional devotions and some notes to assist layfolk in their worship

How to Worship at the Eucharist

THE Eucharist is celebrated in obedience to the divine command, Do this in remembrance of me. Hence it is an action carried out in imitation of what our Lord did and said. One of the ancient names for the essential part of the Eucharist is The Action. Liturgical prayer combines action, or ceremonial, with words, and even with silence, all of which makes one complete act of prayer.

The Action, which is also called the Anaphora (that is, the Offering), has from earliest times been preceded by a preparatory service known as the Proanaphora, or in the Anglican colloquial phrase, the "Ante-Communion Service." The Proanaphora seems to have originated as follows. In the first days of the Church, when paganism prevented any proper observance of the Lord's Day, most Christians could find no opportunity in daytime for corporate

worship, and hence it was customary for them to assemble for corporate worship at night when other folk were asleep.

Necessity may have dictated the hours at which the early Christians worshipped, but if so, they made a virtue of that necessity by the explanation which they gave to it. The fact that in the midst of the night our Lord was born into the world, and rose again from the dead, and was, as he had said, to come again in judgement, seemed to the first Christians to make these hours of darkness a time of special grace. They therefore explained that they proposed to be in the midst of his worship if he came in judgement in their time, as he had foretold, like a thief in the night.

Hence, as early at night as possible on the last day of the week, they congregated for a vigil of prayer which issued in the cele-

bration of The Action in the early morning hours of the morrow. From this vigil service, which was based upon the Jewish Synagogue service of prayer, Psalms, Scripture-reading and instruction, there developed the Proanaphora, which was designed to be a service of instruction for those who were looking forward to Baptism (that is, for the Catechumens), and as a means of preparation for the Faithful who alone were permitted to be present at the Anaphora to receive the Holy Communion.

Hence the Proanaphora came to be known as the Mass of the Catechumens and the Anaphora as the Mass of the Faithful, and the Catechumens were always dismissed, along with any of the baptized who were under discipline for sin, just before the Mass of the Faithful was begun.

These two divisions are obvious in our Prayer-Book rite. Our form of the Mass up to the Offertory consists of prayers of preparation, the reading of Scripture, and a Sermon or instruction, all which is the normal content of the Mass of the Catechumens in every part

of the Church Catholic. Unfortunately, the Prayer-Book does not require the use of Psalms in the Eucharist, but in permitting the use of "hymns" it permits the use of Psalms which are the Church's first and greatest hymns.

Just as the Consecration provides the climax in the Mass of the Faithful, at which time our Lord is recognized as present with us sacramentally, to be the Object of our adoration and the Food of our souls, so the Gospel, as the ceremonial of Solemn Mass so well exemplifies, is the climax of the Mass of the Catechumens, since therein our Lord in his actions and teaching is exhibited for our instruction and imitation. Hence at the Gospel all stand, to shew their readiness to follow him, and there is always a Gospel procession, done with special solemnity at High Mass. Even at Low Mass the book is carried from the Epistle side to the north side.

Strictly speaking, the Creed, which was introduced into the Western Liturgy after the Catechumens ceased to be of importance, belongs to the Mass of

the Faithful. Hence, if the ancient customs of the Catechuminate were to be followed, the positions of the Creed and Sermon would need to be reversed, so that the Catechumens, and any of the baptized under discipline, could be dismissed before the Faithful made their profession of belief, in which the Catechumens were not permitted to join since they had not yet made their initial profession of it in Baptism. Perhaps our indiscriminate use of the Creed, which invites unbelievers and the poorly instructed to make a glorious act of faith which they are incapable of making, is a casting of pearls before swine. It may account for the popular contempt for the Creed.

The Mass of the Faithful consists of The Action, which is an imitation of what our Lord did and said in obedience to his divine command, Do this in remembrance of me. We read that he did four things, namely, took Bread, gave thanks, brake it, and gave it to them. During The Action the Church also does these four things.

First, he "took" the Bread and Wine which were to be used for the Offering. This is technically known as the Oblation and is accomplished at the Offertory. And it should be noted that the taking of a collection is not the real Offertory, but merely the People's share in it, whereby they provide the means of buying the Bread and Wine and of supporting the Church and the poor. In the earliest times the Bread and Wine were collected at this point, and what was not needed for the Mass was used for the relief of the poor and for the physical sustenance of those who served at the Altar.

Secondly, our Lord "gave thanks." The Prayer-Book, following the Gregorian Canon, speaks of "this our Sacrifice of Praise and Thanksgiving." According to Jewish ideas, blessing or consecration was accomplished by a form of thanksgiving (that is, eucharist) wherein the worshipper identified himself with the One worshipped by praising and thanking the Lord and by eating what had through sacrifice become

in a peculiar sense the Lord's possession. For this reason the Consecration Prayer is eucharistic in tone. It begins with the Preface (*Let us give thanks unto our Lord God*) and continues in the form of thanksgiving. Identity with the One worshipped is asserted both in speech and action in the Words of Institution, wherein the Celebrant speaks in the Person of Christ (*This is my body* and *This is my blood*), and even imitates the divine actions. Hence it is not strange that at this first point of conscious identification with our Lord in speech and action, and in praise and thanksgiving, we should think of the Consecration as being consummated. It is to be recognized that even though the essential thing about the Eucharist is obedience to our Lord in performing his Action, the use of the Words of Institution do constitute a conscious act of identity with him as almost nothing else does.

At any rate, the Jewish idea of identification is worth remembering as a key for the interpretation of much that is significant

in the Eucharist. Of course, it can never mean that the worshipper is so identified with the Object of his worship that he himself is absorbed into the Object of his worship, and ceases to exist as an individual. But "Communion" means close union, which we are wont to describe as identification, and this process of identification might be said to consist of four stages, thus: the initial step of offering (described above as Oblation), which is a prelude to the second step of acceptance for immolation (described above as Consecration). But Consecration gives over the victim to the use of the One worshipped, and is itself a prelude to union with the Object of worship. These two latter steps are described below as Utilization (signified by the Fracture) and Unification (accomplished in the act of Communion).

Thus, thirdly, after our Lord had effected the Consecration by the successive acts of taking the bread and wine and blessing it in the form of thanksgiving, he "brake" the Bread. This action, known as the Fracture, came to

be dramatized as a visible sign of the great sacrifice wherein he was broken on the Cross for us, and with which we must identify ourselves if that sacrifice is to be effective in our own souls. That is, sacrifice is a process whereby God makes use of us, for which reason this step in the Mass may well be named Utilization. Hence at this point we do well to think of the heartbreaks of suffering humanity and of our Lord's oneness with the sorrows of mankind, and of his being broken for us on the Cross, even as we must make of our own heart-breaks a loving union with his sacrifice. Only by such devotion can the agony of mankind become a part of Christ's agony, and be utilized in the process of divine redemption instead of being lost in ignorance of his love and rebellion against his compassion.

Fourthly, our Lord "gave" to his disciples this heavenly Food to be the food of their souls, and to consummate their union with him, and this Unification is, of course, the climax of the Mass of the Faithful, the act of Com-

munion. Anything after this great act except the briefest of thanksgivings would seem to be an anticlimax.

The Offertory, the Consecration, the Fracture, and the Communion are the chief acts of The Action, and the Church joyfully emphasizes these by her ceremonial dramatization of them, in reverent obedience to the command, DO THIS. Anything less than a very careful carrying out of these acts is but a meagre obedience to the expressed wish of our great High Priest. Because the Prayer-Book does not make as much of the Fracture as of the other acts, many Priests re-inforce the present Prayer-Book usage by the addition of the ancient ceremonies thereof, as given in this Missal.

The Eucharist is sometimes defined as the making-present on the Altar of the eternal sacrifice offered once for all on Calvary, so that it becomes available to us as the means whereby we can, through our Communion, be identified with him in his sacrificial consecration to God. Liturgical prayer is thus different from

other kinds of prayer. It is THE WORSHIP WHICH CHRIST OFFERED ON CALVARY made present on the Altar as the worship of the Church on earth, and through the union which each worshipper has with Christ, the individual is thus enabled to offer Christ's own perfect act of Worship. Hence the Mass can never be an act of private devotion. It is always the act of the whole Church, the mystical Body of Christ, which exists only in and through Christ, and which alone possesses Christ since Christ—its head and life—is also in possession of the Church, and of every soul therein which surrenders to him. He ordained the Eucharist as the means whereby we put ourselves into his possession and, in return, enter into possession of him. It is the Holy Communion of his broken Body and poured-out Blood. These words describe Christ as offered or sacrificed for us. That is, Holy Communion can only be a Communion because it is first of all a Sacrifice.

Hence the individual benefits thereby because he loses himself

in that which Christ has ordained to be the corporate worship of all. Eucharistic worship is not a matter of personal edification but of self-forgetfulness. You go to Mass not to get but to give, for you can in this instance GET only by giving. "The price of love is thyself," says St. Augustine.

The individual ought therefore to exercise himself in certain acts during The Action. Four acts are indicated, as said above, conveniently known as OBLATION, CONSECRATION, UTILIZATION, and UNIFICATION, corresponding to the four acts of The Action.

First, consider Oblation. At the Offertory, when the Priest obeys the Prayer-Book Rubric, to "offer and place" upon the Holy Table, the Bread and the Wine, the worshipper may well remind himself that a gift should bring the giver with it—that just as his monetary offering, the fruit of his own labour, has helped provide this physical sustenance which is now offered and placed on the Altar, ready for consecration, so he should now complete the Offering, and give that which his Lord

most desires. That is, at the Offertory he should offer and place himself in spirit upon the Altar, and thus make an oblation of himself at the time when the Priest offers thereon the physical sustenance of human life in the form of the Bread and Wine.

Secondly, there is Consecration. When, at the Preface, the Priest begins the Consecration, the individual should realize that he too is being consecrated to God along with his offering of himself and of this physical sustenance for human life. And when mere physical sustenance has become the Bread of Heaven, that is, when Christ has become sacramentally present, he should regard himself as a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice, which has now become consecrated to God in union with Christ's sacrifice of himself. For in each Mass not only is the Bread and Wine consecrated but also each true worshipper.

Thirdly, there is Utilization. At the Fracture, when the Host is broken and the Particle is placed in the Chalice, the worshipper should, as it were, place his own

sorrows, temptations, and aspirations in the Chalice, along with those of all of broken humanity, that the same may be lifted up to God in praise and thanksgiving. The language of love is pain. It was so for Christ. It must be so for us because we are sinners needing redemption through this great sacrifice. Thus through the Sacrifice of Praise and Thanksgiving is life sweetened and strengthened because it is surrendered to him in its joy and in its anguish to be used for his holy and happy purposes. And even if the Priest does not himself make the greater Fracture, but contents himself with the little Fracture which the Prayer-Book orders during the Words of Institution, at any rate the worshipper need not abstain from making the devotions appropriate to the Fracture at this point.

Our religion is a religion of redemption. Every soul, no matter how marred by evil, can be redeemed, that is, purified, utilized, and restored by the grace of the atoning sacrifice. All pain, sorrow, frustration, disease, death, can

be mere wastage, or it can be utilized by God and made into something fine for all eternity. We who are to be co-redeemers with Christ must lift up broken humanity into union with the lifting up of the broken Christ upon the Cross, and we may do this at least in intention at the Fracture, as a prelude to the reception of the Blessed Sacrament which is the means of our intermingling of ourselves with Christ in his redemption of the world.

This idea needs emphasis. Consider it a moment. The English version of the Apostles Creed calls the Church *the Communion of the Saints*. But to go back to the original Greek and Latin forms of this Creed, in accordance with the Anglican principle of always going back to the sources in order to establish the proper interpretation, we find its literal meaning to be "the Communion of the Holy." This phrase must indicate at least all these things: (a) The Church is the fellowship of those who are in communion with, and who are therefore partakers of, the holiness of God; (b) all in the

Church are therefore in communion with the Saints, i.e., those who are filled with God's holiness; but (c) holiness of dedication, according to the Jewish Scriptures, consists in being given over in sacrifice to God. This latter idea is the Jewish conception of holiness which our Lord accepted and taught. According to the Scriptures, holiness consists in being offered to God so as to be made by him fit and acceptable for his purposes. Christians are those who have accepted the Atonement (at-one-ment) made by Christ, which they can do only by entering into it and becoming part of it.

Thus the Holy Catholic Church is the Communion of the Holy (or, as we say, the Communion of the Saints) because it consists of all those souls, living and dead, who have been offered to God through the sacrifice of Christ. You are a Christian only because you are a part of the redemptive process which Christ made possible by his sacrifice of himself. The Eucharist is Communion (that is, close union) with Christ our

Sacrifice. There could be no Communion in the Christian sense of the word if this service of worship were not first of all the making present and available for us of the eternal sacrifice of Calvary.

Thus fourthly, there is Unification. That is, the reception of our Lord in the act of Holy Communion, as said above, is an intermingling of ourselves with him, in such wise that we can achieve identity of purpose with him in his thoughts, desires, strength, and living. The reception of Holy Communion is the expression of all that is holy in our religion, and when the worshipper knows himself to be unfit or unprepared, he should content himself with an act of Spiritual Communion lest he "eat and drink condemnation to himself."

The method of assisting at Mass outlined above consists in making oneself a part of The Action at each step. Surely this is the best method of "following the service." Thereby each worshipper is able to experience the true inner meaning of the Eucharist. For therein we and ours, with praise and

thanksgiving are offered to God through the eternal sacrifice on Calvary, which same is made present and available to us every time Mass is celebrated, and is the divinely ordained means of the renewal and of the maintenance of our union with Christ who is our Saviour because he is our Sacrifice.

To summarize:

1. OBLATION. At the Offertory offer yourself along with the People's gifts on the Altar.

2. CONSECRATION. From the Preface onwards suffer yourself, with praise and thanksgiving, to be consecrated to God's service.

3. UTILIZATION. At the Fraction will yourself to be a sacrifice in union with Christ's broken Body and poured-out Blood, to be used as he wills.

4. UNIFICATION. At the Communion give yourself to Christ, even as he gives himself to you, so that you may then go forth in union with him.

The phrase *Real Presence* does not mean that there can be an unreal presence. Rather, the words *Real Presence* reject the contrary

idea of the real absence of Christ in favour of what every devout Communicant knows from experience, namely, that in this Sacrament Christ makes himself available to us in his humanity (which is the fundamental meaning of the phrase *Body* and *Blood* as well as in his divinity. The real and whole Christ is here, after a fashion which enables us to receive him. He is present every-

where as God, but not in such a way as to enable us to receive him as our spiritual Food. In his humanity he is present only (a) in heaven where he continually makes intercession for us in the presentation of his eternal sacrifice; and (b) in the Sacrament which he has ordained to be the means whereby his heavenly presence and sacrifice is made available for us on earth.

The Most Widely Used Liturgy of All Christendom

AT first there was no written Christian liturgy. The Church did what our Lord had told her to do as well as she knew how. That is, each Celebrant performed the four acts of the Action, using such words and actions as seemed fitting in an attempt to render generous obedience to our Lord's command, DO THIS. In time patterns of such words and ceremonial grew up, and these were the first Christian liturgies. In the world today there are, for all practical purposes, only two liturgies, which may be called respectively, The Eastern Liturgy

and The Western Liturgy, because the former represents the general usage of the Eastern Orthodox Communion and the latter the general usage of Western Catholics. Here and there in Christendom some survivals of other liturgies are still to be found. But for the most part only these two great liturgies are in use amongst Catholic Christians. And if to us "Catholic" implies universality, the wide-spread adoption of the usages of these two liturgies cannot but be impressive. Of the two, the Western Liturgy is by far the wider used.

In a word, all Catholic liturgies of the past and present agree in essentials, although in the course of the centuries different liturgies have developed differing methods of performing The Action; but the most widely used liturgy in the world today is the Western Rite. And our Prayer-Book form of the liturgy belongs to this, the largest family of liturgies.

The Western Liturgy is supposed to have originated in the City of Rome when Christianity was there introduced into Europe through the preaching of the blessed Apostles Peter and Paul. It was at first celebrated in Greek. Later it was translated into Latin (except for a few phrases which have always been used in the Greek, such as *Kyrie Eleison*). Some time in its development, perhaps at the time of this translation from Greek into Latin, it was greatly shortened. Ever since then it has undergone a process of amplification, and each liturgical centre which accepted it, proceeded to develop certain variations in it. The Sarum Use, which is largely the foundation of our

Prayer-Book rite, was only one of the many local variations of the great Western Rite. Our Prayer-Book liturgy has probably suffered no greater change from its original Latin form than has the present Roman Use from its original Greek form. Development in the preservation of continuity is the distinguishing mark of the Western Liturgy, and our use of the ancient ceremonial and vestments is an assertion of the continuity and identity of our Prayer-Book rite back to the Upper Room and the institution of the Eucharist by our Lord Jesus Christ.

In the early days, before liturgy had attained a written form, the Christians used the Jewish Scriptures for lessons and hymns. They used Christian writings too. When the Church finally established the Old and New Testaments as her Bible, the Church seldom used anything in liturgy but the Holy Scriptures with the exception of the prayers, and even these were largely in Scriptural phraseology.

The Anglican Communion decided at the Reformation to make much of this primitive principle.

But due to unfortunate changes made in 1551, the Eucharist is now usually celebrated amongst us with almost no use of Scripture in it except the "Epistle" and Gospel. In the name of our principles, we need to restore the Scriptural anthems which are so large a part of a "Missal."

In the early Church, to give the lay folk a part in the liturgical use of the Scriptures, the Congregation broke in on the chanting of the singers with refrains of the Psalms which they heard chanted. These acclamations of the laity developed into the versicles and responses which are such a familiar part of liturgy today. But another strange miscarriage of principles of the Anglican Reformation is that most of them have disappeared from the Eucharist. Time was when the Priest never began a new step in the Liturgy without giving the People his blessing in expectation of theirs in return. Thus the Salutation (*V. The Lord be with you. R. And with thy spirit.*) was said in some form or other nine times, as it is given in this Mis-

sal. And the Bidding Prayer (*Let us pray.*) was repeated by the Celebrant on many occasions to stir the People up to greater devotion.

One interesting feature of western liturgies is the Collect, a short prayer so carefully constructed that it has been called the sonnet of devotion. The eastern liturgies on the contrary are featured by Litanies, not by Collects. In the Western Liturgy the Mass for each Feast and Feria had a set of three Collects, called respectively in this Missal, the Collect, the Secret, and the Postcommunion. The Secrets were said as prayers over the Oblations at the time of the Offertory, and for them our Prayer-Book substitutes the PRAYER FOR THE WHOLE STATE OF CHRIST'S CHURCH. As for the Postcommunion, in 1549 in the first Prayer-Book, a thanksgiving was inserted to be used always as the Postcommunion Collect, and this prayer has survived to the present day, although in a different position, for it is now in the position of a post-ablution prayer, namely, The Thanksgiving. But the

American Prayer-Book authorizes, and sometimes requires, a "Prayer before the Blessing" which is the position for the Postcommunion, and is ample justification for a return to the use of the ancient Postcommunions.

The necessity of making the service brief for the benefit of working folk has led to the use of a shortened Eucharist based upon the Prayer-Book permission granted for the one necessity which the Rubrics recognize, namely, sickness. When on the analogy of this permission the Prayer for the Church is omitted, the least that can be done is to say the Secrets in its place, so as to provide proper prayers over the oblations.

Another matter is worth attention, and that is the fact that every Catholic liturgy except the Anglican makes mention in its prayers not only of the needs of the living and dead, but also of the Saints in glory. The Eucharist is Holy Communion, that is, close union, union between God

and man, heaven and earth, and the Communion of the Saints should therefore find expression in the prayers of the service and Sacrament which provides this close union.

Some Priests insert before the American Consecration Prayer a commemoration of the Saints, either in the form of the lost section of our 1549 Canon or the appropriate section of our original Gregorian Canon, in order to restore to our liturgy a witness to the commerce-in-Christ between the living and dead which the Eucharist makes for us. Our 1549 Canon began with the Prayer for the whole State of Christ's Church. (That is, this prayer was not then said, as now, at the Offertory but was placed after the *Sanctus*.) If you will read this prayer, substituting for its final paragraph the *lost fragment* given in the Canon of this Missal, and then read our present Consecration Prayer, you will be able to appreciate the glory of the Anglican Canon of the Mass in our original Prayer-Book of 1549.

The Meaning of Some Liturgical Terms and Usages

IN the Latin original of our liturgy, *Missa* is the word used which we now translate *Mass*. This word is thought to have been derived from the word *Missa* in the Dismissal, *Ite, missa est*. The latter phrase is a bit of obscure Latin, but on almost any interpretation the meaning implied is, Go, what you have offered has been presented to God. The word *Mass* may therefore be interpreted to mean an offering to God the Father made through Christ's offering of himself.

The Latin Missal recognizes two chief forms of Mass. First of all, Conventual Mass, which does not mean a Mass in a Convent but a Mass for a group who are under obligation to offer it, such as the Chapter of a Cathedral, the Choir of a Monastery, or the students of a Seminary Chapel. The nearest thing which corresponds to this in parish usage is the Mass in a parish Church to which the parishioners owe a definite obligation of attendance. Certain privileges and responsibilities in

regard to a Conventual Mass are constantly referred to in the Missal.

The Second form of Mass chiefly referred to in the Missal is one that is offered out of devotion and not primarily to satisfy the obligation of some group of worshippers. Such a Mass is called in Latin a *Missa privata*, but for two reasons this phrase is usually translated *Low Mass*; first, because such a Mass is usually a Low Mass, and second, because the literal translation, *private Mass*, implies a solitary Mass, or at least a Mass which is said with no concern for anyone except the Priest, and neither of these ideas is present in the Latin term. Because these are Masses of devotion rather than of obligation, the rules as to what is to be said and done permit a wider latitude than those for a Conventual Mass.

The distinction between these two kinds of Mass can be kept clear if it is understood that the Conventual is one of obligation upon some group of worshippers and ought always to be the best

the Church can offer, i.e., a Solemn Mass, whereas the non-Conventual Mass is usually a Low Mass because it is said out of devotion at times or places where a Conventual Mass in its normal musical form is neither required nor possible.

Masses are either for the living or for the dead. The latter are more penitential in character than the former since they are concerned with release from the effects of sin and growth in the freedom and peace which is the result of complete purgation from evil. Because they are Masses for the Dead, ceremonial is omitted which pertains to the living, such as the censuring of the Altar in the preparation of the People for the Mass of the Catechumens, and the censuring of living persons at the Offertory, and the blessing of the People at the end of Mass.

A Mass which does not agree with the Kalendar is a Votive Mass. Except on All Soul's Day, all Requiem Masses are Votives.

However, no discussion of the word *Mass* would be adequate without the reminder that the

noblest title for our Lord's Own Service is *The Eucharist*, that is THE THANKSGIVING. This is the title preferred by all theologians of today.

By the time of the Reformation it had become customary for Priests to use certain personal and private prayers of devotion when they were carrying out their ministry, and these are known as the *personal prayers of the Celebrant*, as has been explained in the INTRODUCTION to this Missal. When our liturgy was put into English in 1549, all such personal prayers of the Celebrant were omitted except the *Collect for Purity*, which seems to have been said privately by the Priest while the Choir was singing the Introit.

In the Prayer-Book of 1552, all of the Scriptural anthems were omitted, as is said above, and in place of these, we have become accustomed to the use of rhymed secular compositions (that is, so-called *hymns*). In this Missal the traditional forms of the Scriptural anthems and of the personal prayers of the Celebrant are provided for our present-day usage,

and it is recommended that each worshipper join in all of them silently whenever he assists at Mass. The worshipper may profitably recite these devotions, even if the Celebrant omits them. And it should be remembered that no Rubric requires their use, but Congregations which have been accustomed to them will testify to their great devotional value.

Originally there were several readings from the Scriptures at Mass, normally three, one from the Gospels, one from some other New Testament book, and one from the Old Testament. When it became normal to use only two

lections, the Gospel was retained and one of the first two lections omitted. Hence the Prayer-Book often has for its "Epistle" an Old Testament lesson.

The Masses which are noted as Station Days (See *the Proper of the Season*) are very ancient, and were compiled for a particular Church and occasion, which dictated to some extent the choice of the Propers. A good example of this is the ancient Ordination Masses for the Ember Days. After each one of the seven lections on Ember Saturday one of the minor or major Orders was conferred.

The Reason for Ceremonial

NON-CATHOLIC Christians have usually been suspicious of ceremonial because they are afraid that external formalities may become a substitute for worship in spirit and in truth. Sometimes it has been held that a lack of external expression produces an inward spirit of worship. The Society of Friends, commonly called Quakers, makes true worship to

consist of devotion in silence, with only occasional expression in words. However, any use of words is an externality. And Protestants tend to make much of the use of words in worship with a denial of any other form of expression, and they are usually particularly vehement in their objection to the use of silence in Catholic worship. Perhaps American insensitiveness

to noise has produced insensitivity to the devotional values of silence intermingled with worship.

Catholic worship has always been concerned to bring the whole man, in the use of his body and all its powers and faculties, as well as in the use of his spirit, to expression in worship. Hence not only are the faculties of hearing and speech used in worship, but also the faculties of sight, smell, tasting, and touch, and at times the hushing of these five faculties in mystical silence.

When our Lord instituted the Eucharist as an Action, he said DO THIS. It is impossible to obey our Lord without expressing our obedience in externalities. In the process of time this expression of the spirit through all the faculties of the body has assumed certain patterns which we call Catholic ceremonial. Hence there are vestments, the use of incense, and music, etc., so that all the mind and body can be used and consecrated to God in the Eucharist. Furthermore, as has been said, Catholic usage has not even neglected silence as a means of wor-

ship, although non-Catholics, except those of the Society of the Friends, do usually object violently to the use of mystical silence in public worship.

As a matter of fact, it is impossible to carry on any public service without the use of ceremonial. Something must be done with the body in moments of worship, and wherever any pre-arranged order is followed, the result is a system of ceremonial. Even for the Friends' Meeting there are customs of sitting, standing, speaking, and refraining from speech, and these customs are just as much a matter of ceremonial as those found in a Catholic Missal.

The question is therefore not whether we will have ceremonial or do without it, but what kind of ceremonial we shall use. The ceremonial of Catholic worship is the result of centuries of experience in finding out how the human being most naturally expresses himself when he worships God in spirit and in truth.

As a result of ignorance and prejudice, and of the propaganda

which prejudice carries on, certain customs of course may come to seem strange or unnatural. A good example of this is the use of the kiss. In modern times kissing is more often than not associated with sensuous ideas. In the ages of faith, when everyone shewed his reverence in worship by kissing those articles which were closely associated with worship, such as the Cross on the Stole, or the cruets which contained the wine and water to be used at the Eucharist, or the Bishop's ring, etc., the kiss became an expression of reverence, and therefore in the relationship between the sexes it was likely to be an expression of reverence for the human body. In the New Testament the Kiss of Peace is mentioned as a Christian ceremony. The question before Catholics is whether we are to surrender to the constant secularization of manners and thought, or whether we are to use Catholic ceremonial as a means of bringing sanctification into the emotional and sensory experience of human beings.

Every ceremonial act which is indicated in the Missal is the heritage of Western Christendom in the worship of God, and therefore deserves respectful consideration, even though we ourselves are unable to see its justification. Surely we all realize that the individual is less likely to know better than the whole community of God with its many centuries of worship and of dealing with human problems.

The American Episcopal Church ordains deaf mutes who are incapable of the use of ordinary human speech. This means that the American Episcopal Church believes that the sign manual is just as adequate an expression of the spirit as the use of words. Catholic ceremonial is a sign manual of the Catholic religion much more widespread than the sign manual used by deaf mutes to express English speech. Anyone present at a service for deaf mutes conducted in the sign manual might find it very strange and amusing if he were ignorant of this method of speech, but such a reaction would be a token of

his lack of understanding. Just so a person who is ignorant of the language of Catholic ceremonial, or unsympathetic with its method of expressing the most sublime ideas of the human soul, is sometimes moved to irreverent laughter when for the first time he sees Catholic ceremonial. But such a reaction shews his own lack of human sympathy and perception. He might rather learn to use this Catholic or universal language, and express his devotion through it, so as to be one with all the past ages of the great Church of God.

Anti-Catholic propaganda against ceremonial asserts as its basis the alleged simplicity of our Lord and of all that he did and taught. Now *simplicity* is a word which indicates a great and noble characteristic, but unfortunately most people do not know whereof they speak when they talk of the simplicity of Jesus. The simple truths of Christianity are profound, and when subjected to intellectual analysis are discovered to be very complex. Surely the first and foremost truth of Christ's

teaching is that of God. Analyze this teaching, as you would pick apart a simple flower of the field, and you will see that its surface appearance of simplicity, like that of the flower, is a matter of perfect unity of complexities.

A "simple" dinner party is not an excuse for carelessness, shoddiness, or bad manners. Reverence is taking pains to give God the best that human beings can offer, and simplicity is not the same thing as slipshod methods of worship. The ancients knew that they owed it to the dignity of man as well as to the dignity of God not to approach him except with dignity. This method of approach was very different from that of modern "simple services" which are likely to be a sentimental hodge-podge, hastily put together, and because of the lack of effort, described as "simple."

The idea that a very "simple" and plain celebration of the Eucharist (e.g., Low Mass) approximates the Last Supper and the early Christian Eucharist is quite mistaken. Whether the Eucharist grew out of the Jewish Passover

liturgy, or out of the Jewish Fellowship Meal called the Kiddush, it was, by modern non-Catholic standards, a dignified, formal celebration which avoided that familiarity with holy things which so easily breeds contempt. And the early Christians from the start celebrated it in the form of what we now call the Solemn Pontifical Mass. That is, the Bishop as the father and head of the family took the place of Christ, and surrounded by his Priests and other assistants at the Holy Table celebrated the Eucharist in the most solemn and dignified fashion. In those days people had grand manners, and would have considered themselves irreverent and ill-bred if they failed at worship to take time and effort to express their reverence thus. Low Mass or the "simple" Celebration of the Eucharist developed in an age when men were so immersed in and wearied by the affairs of the world that they had little interest, time, or energy to spend in the worship of God.

The Prayer-Book Rubrics are for the most part relics of the

Latin High Mass, and in this the Prayer-Book is like the Latin Missals. At least in theory High Mass is still our norm, and Low Mass is a tolerated mediaeval abnormality. The Holy Eastern Orthodox Church knows almost nothing of such practices. But the Anglican Communion has become so enamoured of them that we have even lost all idea of the ancient congregational ceremonial for Mass. To sit for instruction, stand for praise, and kneel for prayer has become a rule of the thumb. But the Eucharist is thanksgiving or praise. Even by this popular rule ought we not then normally to stand during the Prayers of the Eucharist as the Prayer-Book so often and so plainly orders us to do at Baptism, Confirmation, etc.? It is easier to kneel throughout than to stand, and Low Mass calls for kneeling. And kneeling has come to be a mark of Episcopalians. Most non-Catholic Christians as well as all Catholics of East and West except Anglicans consider standing to be the appropriate posture of prayer except in moments of spe-

cial reverence or during times of public humiliation, such as fast days.

Hence those who have been brought up in the narrower Anglican tradition of constant kneeling for prayer, and of genuflecting only toward the Altar when the Most Holy Sacrament is present there, must not think it wrong or strange if in some of our churches they find the Congregation standing for most of the Prayers at

High Mass or genuflecting other than to the Blessed Sacrament. As Anglicanism becomes less provincial and more ecumenical in its customs, we shall doubtless learn more and more to follow the authentic and wide-spread Christian tradition in these matters rather than customs that are considered "simple" because they require a minimum of effort and interest. Reverence is taking pains.

How the Kalendar Teaches the Faith

THE Church follows two calendars simultaneously. First, she developed her liturgical year, as registered in the Proper of the Season. When dating by the calendar months became customary, she also developed her system of immoveable Feasts in honour of the Saints. And we refer to this combination of moveable and immoveable Feasts, this union of the Church's Year and the civil calendar, as the *Church Kalendar*. However, the Kalendar as printed in this Missal refers largely to the calendar months. Each Church-

man is expected to know the Church Year, just as he knows the chief anniversary dates of his own family, without having them in a printed form.

After the death and resurrection of our Lord, the event which every Christian wished to celebrate was Christ's Easter victory over pain, death, and sin. "This is the day which the Lord hath made" was the passage from the Psalms which seemed to describe Easter Day. Straightway they called the first day of the week "The Lord's Day," and celebrated

it as the weekly Feast of our Lord's resurrection. The yearly anniversary of Easter they kept for fifty days, ending with the Feast of Pentecost (or Whitsunday) in honour of the Holy Ghost. For Easter came at the time of the Jewish Feast of the Passover which after fifty days was followed by the Jewish Pentecost. In preparation for Easter, they kept a solemn commemoration of the Passion, which finally grew into Lent and Passiontide. Eventually they instituted a commemoration of the coming of Christ, first in the form of the Feast of Epiphany, later still as the Feast of his Nativity, on December 25th, just nine months after March 25th, the Feast of the Annunciation (which traditionally is also the calendar month date of the Crucifixion). By the time the immoveable Feast of Christmas had been accepted, the Church found herself committed to the calendar month system in addition to her calendar of moveable Feasts.

Thus the liturgical year developed into three main cycles, in honour of the three central mys-

teries of the Catholic religion. A moment's thought makes clear that all Catholic doctrine is focussed in three concentric mysteries, (a) the mystery of God (namely, the doctrine of the Holy Trinity), (b) the mystery of the Incarnation (which is the manifestation of God to us), and (c) the mystery of the Church or of Sanctification (which reveals to us how we are to attain God and his holiness).

Of course, these ideas overlap and are constantly repeated in the Church Year. Even in Passiontide the Church does not use a chronological method. Rather, she takes a theme and illustrates it from many different angles, shewing thereby the inter-relationship and unity of the Faith. The Church Year is like a great musical composition, its main theme being thanksgiving (or Eucharist) for God's goodness, with the minor themes of the three mysteries being developed in and through each other.

The Church begins with the manifestation of God to the world in the Person of Christ. First

comes Advent, with its setting forth of the three themes of preparation, (a) the preparation of humanity for Christ's first advent to the world, (b) the preparation of the Church for his second advent by a consideration of the four last things (death, judgement, heaven, and hell), and (c) the preparation of the individual soul for the coming of Christ in the Christmas Communion. As a season of penitence the Advent colour is violet.

Then comes the white of Christmas with its midnight, dawn, and midday Masses, so tender and human in their appeal, followed by three Feasts which remind one of the passion which Christians must share, (a) the Martyr (exemplified in St. Stephen) who suffers unto death, (b) the stalwart servant (exemplified in the Beloved Disciple) who testifies throughout a long life of service, and (c) the many (exemplified in the Holy Innocents) who suffer unknowingly and without choice but who nevertheless are part of Christ's glorious heritage of weakness made into eternal triumph. The Octave

Day shews us the divine Babe shedding his first blood (the Circumcision). On January 6th under the title of the Epiphany we celebrate the manifestation of Christ's divinity made to humanity in the coming of the Magi, in his Baptism, and in his first miracle. The Christmas season does not really end until the Purification (Feb. 2nd), theoretically forty days after the Nativity, and constituting the first course of forty days in the Church Year. But after the Epiphany Octave begins the ferial season known as Epiphanytide, which uses green as does Trinitytide, and does not end until Septuagesima comes with its violet of penitence.

Thus is the cycle of the Incarnation ended, and a new cycle begun, the cycle of redemption which manifests the mystery of sanctification, or as it is better called, the mystery of the Church. This cycle is the most interesting and varied of the three, with its tracing out of the suffering and victory of Christ, the coming of the Holy Spirit, and the founding of the Church whereby is re-

vealed to us the mystery of God and of his blessed will.

First there is an introduction, so that we may not leave the joys of Christmas too suddenly for the penance of Lent. This is the pre-Lenten (or *Gesima*) season of Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima, approximately seventy, sixty, and fifty days before Easter. Then Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, and extends for another period of forty days (i.e., not counting the Sundays which are never fast days) through Passiontide and Holy Week, and issues in the Queen of Feasts, the yearly anniversary of Christ's Resurrection. Then comes the Great Forty Days (when Christ again walked the earth), ending in the Ascension of Christ. But Eastertide itself does not end until Pentecost (fifty days) is finished with its Octave Day of Trinity Sunday whereon we worship God in his final revelation of himself.

The foregoing cycle has been violet with penitence (from Septuagesima till Easter, except for the black of Good Friday) and

white in honour of Christ the Immaculate, except for the red which is used for the fire of the Holy Spirit during Whitsuntide. Trinity Sunday is also white, as is the Feast on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday, Corpus Christi, the day whereon the revelation of the mystery of God is seen to be completed and fulfilled in the Blessed Sacrament of the Altar.

Trinitytide is the third cycle, and deals with the mystery of God and his blessed will in our lives. It uses green on Ferias, as did Epiphanytide, and ends with the Sunday next before Advent, when the glorious worship of the Church in the three cycles of the mysteries of our Faith is begun again.

But all through these three cycles come the immoveable Feasts with their presentation of heroic servants of Christ (the Apostles and Evangelists, the Martyrs, the Confessors, the Virgins, the Holy Women) and many commemorations of mysteries or of titles of our Lord and our Lady, such as the Precious Blood or the Seven

Sorrows. For all Feasts in honour of martyrdom the Church uses red. For other Feasts white.

The moveable Feasts, which so often occur throughout the year, may seem to interrupt this gradual unfolding of the three-fold mystery of our Faith (i.e., the doctrine of God, the Incarnation, and the Church). But if we see the moveable Feasts against the

background of the Season, and thus think of them as evidences of the Faith expressed in human life and action, they serve to illustrate and illuminate this three-fold mystery. And let it not be forgotten that we, as Catholic Christians, are an integral part of this mystery, for St. Paul says that the Church is "the fellowship of the mystery."

THE ORDINARY OF THE MASS

NOTE, That to use the following Ordinary and Canon profitably, the worshipper should be thoroughly familiar with the ideas and terms in HOW TO WORSHIP AT THE EUCHARIST, in the foregoing section.

Part I. The Mass of the Catechumens

During which the worshipper should prepare for The Action (i.e., the Mass of the Faithful) by praying all the devotions with the Celebrant, and by reflecting on the Scriptures which are read as part of the liturgy of the day.

Preparatory Prayers of the Celebrant

(Which the worshipper ought also to pray)

The Priest, when he has made ready, approaches the Holy Table of the Altar, and makes the accustomed reverence, and then proceeds to say the following preparatory prayers, which same are said by the Priest standing on the floor in front of the Altar steps. Nothing is said at the Altar or on the steps thereof until the Mass itself is actually begun.

THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

First the Priest makes the Sign of the Cross, saying: In the Name of the Father, ✠ and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. *R.* Amen.

§ In Masses for the Dead and of the Season of Passiontide the following Psalm is omitted, in which case the Antiphon only is said.

OPENING PSALM: CONCERNING THE ALTAR AS THE MERCY SEAT OF GOD.

Next the Priest begins the Antiphon: I will go unto the altar of God, and the Ministers answer: Even unto the God of my joy and gladness. And then he continues alternately with the Ministers:

PSALM 43. *Judica me, Deus.*

(The Priest's pleading of the Cause of God's People)

GIVE sentence with me, O God, and defend my cause against

the ungodly people : O deliver me from the deceitful and wicked man.

M. For thou art the God of my strength, why hast thou put me from thee : and why go I so heavily, while the enemy oppresseth me?

(Petition to approach God's Altar devoutly)

P. O send out thy light and thy truth, that they may lead me : and bring me unto thy holy hill, and to thy dwelling.

M. And that I may go unto the altar of God, even unto the God of my joy and gladness : and upon the harp will I give thanks unto thee, O God, my God.

(Act of Confidence in God)

P. Why art thou so heavy, O my soul : and why art thou so disquieted within me?

M. O put thy trust in God : for I will yet give him thanks, which is the help of my countenance, and my God.

(Act of adoration of the Triune God)

P. Glory be to the Father, and to the Son : and to the Holy Ghost.

M. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be : world without end. Amen.

The Priest then repeats the *Antiphon*: I will go unto the altar of God. **R̄.** Even unto the God of my joy and gladness.

(Acknowledgment of our unworthiness)

V̄ Our help **†** is in the Name of the Lord.

R̄. Who hath made heaven and earth.

The Priest then says the General Confession (i.e., the *Confiteor*) as below, except that he changes the words *thee, father* to *you, brethren*, whereupon the Ministers ask God to accept his Confession, as follows:

Misereatur.

ALMIGHTY God have mercy upon thee, forgive thee thy sins, and bring thee to everlasting life.

R̄. Amen.

Then the Ministers repeat the General Confession (and since sin is an offence not only against God, but against the Mystical Body of Christ as well, confession is made to representatives thereof as well as to God) as follows:

Confiteor.

I CONFESS to Almighty God, to Blessed Mary Ever-Virgin, to blessed Michael the Archangel, to blessed John Baptist, to the holy Apostles Peter and Paul, to all the Saints, and to thee, Father, that I have sinned exceedingly in thought, word, and deed, (*Here thrice strike the breast*) through

my fault, through my own fault, through my own most grievous fault. Therefore I beg Blessed Mary Ever-Virgin, blessed Michael the Archangel, blessed John Baptist, the holy Apostles Peter and Paul, all the Saints, and thee Father, to pray to the Lord our God for me.

(The Priest asks God to accept our Confession)

Misereatur.

ALmighty God have mercy upon you, forgive you your sins, and bring you to everlasting life.
R. Amen.

(He prays for full absolution)

Indulgentiam.

THE Almighty and merciful Lord grant us pardon, † absolution, and remission of our sins. *R.* Amen.

(He asks for spiritual renewal)

V. Wilt thou not turn again and quicken us, O God?

R. That thy people may rejoice in thee.

V. Shew us thy mercy, O Lord.

R. And grant us thy salvation.

V. Lord, hear my prayer.

R. And let my cry come unto thee.

IMMEDIATE PREPARATION FOR WORSHIP

Originally the Mass began with a Litany (Kyrie); when the Christians acquired church-buildings, a processional Psalm (Introit) became necessary; and then arose the custom of the clergy making devotions of preparation (such as those immediately foregoing and those immediately following) whilst the Introit was in singing.

FIRST SALUTATION

(Which marks the beginning of the Mass of the Catechumens, or the preparation for the Sacrifice)

V. The Lord be with you.

R. And with thy spirit.

¶ And the Priest, standing reverently before the Holy Table, shall say the Lord's Prayer and the Collect following, the People kneeling; but the Lord's Prayer may be omitted at the discretion of the Priest. [These devotions are sometimes said privately by the Priest as the Introit is sung, or even after the Introit, at the Altar on the Missal side, although the foregoing Rubric seems to indicate that they are to be said at the foot of the Altar.]

Collect for Purity

ALMIGHTY GOD, unto whom all hearts are open, all desires known and from whom no secrets are hid : cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of thy Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love thee, and worthily magnify thy holy Name. Through Christ our Lord. *R.* Amen.

Summary of the Law

HEAR what our Lord Jesus Christ saith : Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it : Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets.

In place of the Summary of the Law, the Decalogue may be said, the People responding after each of the Commandments except the last: Lord, have mercy upon us, and incline our hearts to keep this law. But after the tenth Commandment the People respond: Lord, have mercy upon us, and write all these thy laws in our hearts, we beseech thee.

[If there be said the Prayer next following (which is in substance the same as the fore-

going Collect for Purity), it is said privately by the Priest, as he ascends to the Altar.

Aufer a nobis.

PUT away our iniquities far from us, O Lord, we beseech thee, that with pure minds we may be worthy to enter into the Holy of holies. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.]

(Since the tombs of the Martyrs in the Catacombs were the first immoveable Altars, the Church soon began to express her veneration of their tortured bodies, which had been sacrificed for Christ, in prayers such as the following. Later this veneration was extended to the body of any person who had heroically served Christ and thus was recognized as a Saint, for the Church has always considered the human body a holy thing.)

Oramus, te.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, by the merits [of thy Saints whose relicks are here, and] of all thy Saints, that it may please thee to forgive me all my sins. Amen.

(At Solemn Mass, before the Priest reads the Introit, he blesses the incense, saying: Be thou blessed by him in whose honour thou shalt be burnt. Amen. And then he censures the Altar, after which he is censured by the Deacon. This is done as an act of honour to the Altar and its Priest, in preparation for the sacrifice, and teaches us that the grace of Jesus Christ must cleanse and sweeten our lives and our worship if our sacrifice is to be acceptable to God. See NOTE, page B 38.)

Introit or Opening Anthem

The Priest now goes to the Epistle corner of the Altar and reads the Introit (which at Sung Mass is usually chanted during the foregoing devotions). This opening anthem furnishes the keynote (see proper Mass for the day), and the worshipper should reflect thereon, so as to enter into the Church's mind in her use thereof.

¶ Here, if the Decalogue hath been omitted, shall be said:

Opening Litany or General Supplication

In order that this great cry for God's blessing may be said as one united prayer in the same tongue throughout Christendom, it is often recited, as both the Latin and Greek Catholics still do, in the New Testament language:

Kyrie in English

LORD, have mercy upon us.
 Lord, have mercy upon us.

Doxology to the Litany

The Prayer-Book prints the Gloria in excelsis as a Communion anthem toward the end of the Mass, but permits its omission at that place, for which reason it is often, according to the original custom, added to the Kyrie in Masses of Feasts. For the reason that it is a paraphrase of the Kyrie combined with a paraphrase of the Song

of the Angels which announced the Incarnation, the original custom is highly appropriate.

Gloria in excelsis.

Standing in the middle of the Altar, the Celebrant bows his head and says (if it is to be said) Glory be to God on high, and the People continue with him:

(Praise to the Father for the gift of his Son)

AND on earth peace, good will towards men. We praise thee, we bless thee, (Here bow the head) we worship thee, we glorify thee, (Here bow the head) we give thanks to thee for thy great glory, O Lord God, heavenly King, God the Father Almighty.

(Supplication to the Son our Sacrifice)

O Lord, the only-begotten Son, (Here bow the head) Jesus

Christ ; O Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us. Thou that takest away the sins of the world, (Here bow the head) receive our prayer. Thou that sittest at the right hand of God the Father, have mercy upon us.

(Act of faith in the oneness of the Son and the Spirit with the Father)

For thou only art holy ; thou only art the Lord ; thou only, (Here bow the head) O [Jesu] Christ, with the Holy Ghost, art most high in the glory ✠ of God the Father. Amen.

Collect or Collects of the Day

Anciently each Mass had three special Prayers, the Collect, the Secret, and the Postcommunion, as given in this Missal. These are the principal variable Prayers of the Mass, and usually deserve special devotional consideration. See proper Mass for the day.

SECOND SALUTATION

(Which introduces the Collect for the Day or the principal variable prayer of the Mass)

∇. The Lord be with you.

℞. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

Then is said the Collect for the Day and any other Prayers, if the Rubrics so require. These other Collects are either (a) the Commemoration of a Feast; or (b) the Seasonal Prayers (usually in honour of our Lady, since every day is a commemoration of the Incarnation; or in honour of all Saints, since every day has been sanctified by the death of some Saint); and (c) sometimes one or more variable prayers of devotion such as are to be found in Various Prayers, Page G if.

Lesson or Epistle

Originally there was in addition to the Gospel, more than one Lesson, usually two, the first from the Old Testament, the second from the New. When Mass was shortened by the omission of Lessons, sometimes it was the New Testament Lesson which was omitted, which is why the Prayer-Book gives us "Epistles" from the Old Testament. During the Lesson the worshipper should reverently reflect on the Scripture which the Church has chosen for the occasion. After the Lesson the People respond: Thanks be to God.

Gradual or Anthem After the Lesson

The worshipper should privately read and reflect on these devout aspirations which the Church anciently appointed to be used after the Lesson or Epistle, and all Old Testament references to the Old Testament Church (i.e., Jerusalem, Sion, etc.) and its ordinances and experiences must be understood as applying to the Catholic Church and illustrating its practices and history. (See NOTE, page B 38.)

Personal Prayers of the Celebrant Before the Gospel

(Which the worshipper ought also to pray)

Catholic ceremonial ordains that the Gospel-book be honoured by being censed (since it is full of the sweetness of our Lord) and reverently kissed by the Celebrant, and thus teaches with what reverence the worshipper should listen to its holy words.

Munda cor meum.

CLEANSE my heart and my lips,
O thou Almighty God, who
didst purge the lips of Isaiah
the Prophet with a live coal :

and of thy sweet mercy vouch-
safe so to purify me, that I
may worthily proclaim thy holy
Gospel. Through Christ our Lord.
Amen.

At Solemn Mass the Deacon now asks for the Celebrant's blessing, but at Low Mass the Celebrant himself asks God for a blessing; and this the worshipper ought also to do, in the following prayer which asks that he may be a good missionary for Christ.

Jube, Domine. Dominus sit.

PRAY, Lord, give me thy blessing. The Lord be in my heart and on my lips, that worthily and rightly I may proclaim his Gospel. Amen.

READING OF THE GOSPEL

In the early days the preceding devotions were said at the "south" or Epistle side of the church-building, perhaps because they were meaningless to anyone who had not accepted the Gospel, as the south part of Europe had already done. But the North was as yet in pagan darkness, and perhaps that is why the Gospel was carried to the "north" side of the church-building to be read or sung, for the Christians desired to carry the Gospel to the North and around the whole world. Even at Low Mass the Missal is carried from the

"south" side of the Altar to the "north" side, while at Solemn Mass the Gospel procession is done with special solemnity, after the ancient manner: and the book is censed (the incense having been previously blessed, as at the Introit), and afterwards the Priest, to do honour to both of them, and to teach us that the Gospel is the sweet savour of Christ whose grace alone can make his Gospel effective. Everyone stands in profession of a willingness to follow the Gospel and to signify our purpose that the Gospel be carried to all lands.

THIRD SALUTATION

(Which introduces the proclamation of the Good News about Jesus Christ, being the climax of the Mass of the Catechumens)

℣. The Lord be with you.

℟. And with thy Spirit.

When the Holy Gospel is announced, the People make the holy Sign on their forehead, lips, and breast (thus dedicating their hearing, speech, and heart to the teaching of Christ) and say: Glory be to thee, O Lord. After the Gospel is said: Praise be to thee, O Christ.

The Pledge of Faithfulness from the Faithful

The Creed was inserted in the Western Liturgy after the Catechumenate (i.e., converts from paganism under instruction for Baptism) had ceased to be a normal thing in Church discipline. In the early days the unbaptized converts, and all the baptized who had proved unfaithful and were under discipline, were made to depart at the end of the Mass of the Catechumens, after the Sermon. If the Creed had been used at Mass in the days of the Catechumenate, it would have been recited after the Catechumens were dismissed. Hence the Sermon would have been preached before the Faithful made their Profession of Faith. The Prayer-Book places the Sermon

after the **Creed**, but also orders it preached elsewhere on certain occasions. In practice it is used at any appropriate point in the service which suits the convenience of the occasion, e.g., before Mass, before the **Creed**, after the **Creed**, at the end of Mass, etc.

The **Creed** was considered to be a festival hymn, unsuited to Masses for the Dead and non-festival Masses, and was permitted to be used only in such Masses as were in honour of mysteries mentioned therein, such as: Masses of Sunday (which honour the resurrection of our Lord); Masses of Feasts of our Lord; Masses of our Lady, and other Saints closely connected with the Incarnation, and of the Doctors who defended the Faith; and Masses of the Church (such as the Patronal Feast, Ordinations, etc.).

The Nicene Creed

In the midst of the Altar, the Priest says (if it is to be said) **I believe in one God** and the Choir or People continue with him in the profession of the Faith:

(God the Father and Creation)

THE Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, And of all things visible and invisible :

(God the Son and Redemption)

And in one Lord (Here bow the head) Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God ; Begotten of his Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, Very God of very God ; Begotten, not made ; Being of one substance with the Father ; By whom all things were made : Who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven, (Here genu-

flect) And was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary, And was made man : (Here rise) And was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate ; He suffered and was buried : And the third day he rose again according to the Scriptures : And ascended into heaven, And sitteth on the right hand of the Father : And he shall come again, with glory, to judge both the quick and the dead ; Whose kingdom shall have no end.

(God the Spirit and Sanctification)

And I believe in the Holy Ghost, The Lord, and Giver of Life, Who proceedeth from the Father and the Son ; Who with the Father and the Son (Here bow the head) together is wor-

shipped and glorified ; Who spake by the Prophets :

(The Catholic Church and its work in souls)

And I believe one [Holy] Catholic and Apostolic Church : I ac-

knowledge one Baptism for the remission of sins : And I look for the Resurrection of the dead : And the Life † of the world to come. Amen.

The Notices and Sermon or Other Instruction

¶ Then shall be declared unto the People what Holy Days, or Fasting Days, are in the week following to be observed; and (if occasion be) shall Notice be given of the Communion, and of the Banss of Matrimony, and of other matters to be published. [Here also some Priests announce the intention of the Mass, and ask for prayers for any other intentions, so as not to interrupt the action of the Offertory with such details. In some places it is also found convenient to have an instruction or the Sermon at this point rather than earlier in the service.]

Part II. The Mass of the Faithful or the Action

The Mass is an act of obedience to our Lord who said: DO THIS IN REMEMBRANCE OF ME. The Action is that part of the Mass in which we DO what he DID. We read that he did four things. 1. He took Bread and Wine. 2. He gave thanks. 3. He brake the Bread. 4. He gave it to them. Bear in mind these four acts of The Action.

During The Action the worshipper should obey our Lord by making each one of these acts his own act, as explained in the foregoing section, HOW TO WORSHIP AT THE EUCHARIST, thus: (1. Oblation) When the Priest takes Bread and Wine and (as the Prayer-Book commands) "offers and places" the same on the Altar, the worshipper should in spirit offer and place himself on the Altar, as an oblation to God, along with that which is there being offered in his name and for his sake; (2. Consecration) When the Eucharistic Consecration is said, he should suffer himself to be consecrated in thanksgiving to God along with the oblations;

(3. Utilization) *When the Fracture is made, he should give himself and his will to be broken in sacrifice as God wills; and (4. Unification) When the Body of his Lord is given in the Administration of Holy Communion, he should give himself to Christ who thereby gives himself to the worshipper.*

I. OBLATION OR THE OFFERTORY

This is the first act of The Action. The Priest now offers and places on the Altar the Bread and Wine which the worshippers have provided by their offering, wherein and whereby each worshipper offers himself to God.

FOURTH SALUTATION

(Which marks the beginning of The Action)

∇. The Lord be with you.

℞. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

Then is said the Offertory, which this Missal provides in the Proper of each Mass (and which the worshipper should say privately as the watchword of his self-oblation on this day), and for which the Prayer-Book gives fifteen Sentences of Scripture, of which the following is often used:

THINE, O LORD, is the greatness, and the power, and the glory, and the victory, and the

majesty ; for all that is in the heaven and in the earth is thine ; thine is the kingdom, O LORD, and thou art exalted as head above all. I Chron. 29. 11.

¶ And the Priest shall then offer, and shall place upon the Holy Table, the Bread and Wine.

And the worshipper should now make his offering of himself and of all that he has to God, in token whereof he makes, when he can, his offering of money for the support of his Altar and its sacrifice and Priest. If the worshipper will say the following devotions as the Priest makes each act of the Offertory, he will be offering himself in spirit and will as a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice.

The Personal Prayers of the Celebrant at the Offertory

(Which the worshipper ought also to pray as his act of self-oblation)

AT THE OFFERING OF THE HOST

The Priest lifts up the Host on the Paten, and then makes therewith over the Corporal the Sign of the Cross, saying meanwhile:

Suscipe, sancte Pater.

RECEIVE, O Holy Father, Almighty and Everlasting God, this spotless Host, which I thine

unworthy servant now offer unto thee, my God, the living and the true, for all my countless sins, wickedness, and neglect ; and for all those here present ; as also for all the faithful in Christ, both quick and dead ; that it may set forward their salvation and mine, unto life everlasting. Amen.

AT THE BLESSING OF THE WATER

The Priest at the Epistle side of the Altar pours Wine into the Chalice, then prays that as the Water is to be united with the Wine, so our weak human nature may be united to the divine nature of Christ.

Deus, qui humanae substantiae.

O GOD, who didst lay the foundation of man's being in wonder and honour, and in greater wonder and honour didst renew the same : grant by the mystery of this water and wine, that he who was partaker of our humanity may make us joint-heirs of his very Godhead, even Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord. Who liveth and reigneth with thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

AT THE OFFERING OF THE CHALICE

The Priest returns to the centre, lifts up

the Chalice and then makes therewith the Sign of the Cross, saying meanwhile:

Offerimus tibi.

WE offer unto thee, O Lord, the Cup of Salvation ; beseeching thy mercy that it may ascend in the sight of thy Divine Majesty as a sweet-smelling savour for our salvation, and that of the whole world. Amen.

AT THE OFFERING OF OURSELVES

The Priest bows and says:

In spiritu humilitatis.

IN a contrite heart and an humble spirit let us be accepted of thee, O Lord, and so let our sacrifice be in thy sight this day that it may be well pleasing unto thee, O Lord our God.

AT THE INVOCATION OF HIM WHO IS THE FONT OF HOLINESS

The Priest raises himself and makes the Sign of the Cross over the oblations, saying:

Veni, sanctificator.

COME, O thou Sanctifier, Almighty and Everlasting God, and bless this sacrifice made ready for thy Holy Name.

THE LITTLE LITURGY OF THE INCENSE

At the Censing of the Oblations and Worshippers

(Whereby both are honoured as one sacrifice)

NOTE, That in Masses for the Living, incense is used in the Mass of the Catechumens (i) at the very beginning, when the Altar and the Priest are thus honoured, and again (ii) at the climax of the Mass of the Catechumens when the Gospel and also the Priest are censed. Likewise at the beginning of the Mass of the Faithful (iii) the Oblations are censed and then the Altar, the Priest and the People, and again (iv) at the climax of the Mass of the Faithful, when the Consecration is effected, the Blessed Sacrament is censed. But in Masses for the Dead incense is used only at the Offertory (the censing of the People of course being omitted, since it is not a Mass for the living worshippers) and at the Consecration. However, if the Solemn Dismissal (the so-called Absolution) of the Body be given, incense is used in honour of the dead body, for Holy Scripture says that the Christian's body is the temple of the Holy Ghost.

The devotions used by the Priest and his Ministers in the "liturgy of the incense" at the Offertory may well be said also by the worshipper as follows:

AT THE BLESSING OF THE INCENSE

Per intercessionem.

By the intercession of blessed Michael the Archangel, who standeth at the right hand of the Altar of incense, and of all the Elect, may the Lord vouchsafe to bless this incense, and accept it as a sweet-smelling savour. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

AT THE CENSING OF THE OBLATIONS

Incensum istud.

LET this incense, blest by thee, O Lord, come up before thee, and let thy mercy come down upon us.

AT THE CENSING OF THE CROSS AND ALTAR

Dirigatur, Domine.

LET my prayer, O Lord, be set forth in thy sight as the incense : and let the lifting up of my hands be an evening sacrifice. Set a watch, O Lord, before my mouth : and keep the door of my lips. O let not mine heart be inclined to any evil thing : let me not be occupied in ungodly works with the men that work wickedness.

BEFORE THE CENSING OF PRIEST AND PEOPLE

Accendat in nobis.

MAY the Lord kindle in us the fire of his love, and the flame of his everlasting charity. Amen.

AT THE WASHING OF THE PRIEST'S HANDS

If Alms are to be presented, they are presented at the Altar at this time.

Next, the Priest goes to the Epistle side to wash his hands, lest any crumbs of the wafers, or drops of wine, or dust from handling the censur or the Alms basin, adhere to his fingers, so that they can be fresh and clean for handling the Blessed Sacrament. Meanwhile he prays for spiritual cleansing.

(Concerning what God requires of those who would offer sacrifice)

PSALM 26. 6. *Lavabo.*

(Resolution to be always prepared to approach the Altar)

I WILL wash my hands in innocency, O Lord : and so will I go to thine altar.

That I may shew the voice of thanksgiving : and tell of all thy wondrous works.

(Protestation of love for God's house and People)

Lord, I have loved the habitation of thy house : and the place where thine honour dwelleth.

O shut not up my soul with the sinners : nor my life with the bloodthirsty ;

In whose hands is wickedness : and their right hand is full of gifts.

(Aspiration for perseverance)

But as for me, I will walk innocently : O deliver me, and be merciful unto me.

My foot standeth right : I will praise the Lord in the congregations.

(Act of adoration of the Triune God)

In Masses for the Dead and of the Season of Passiontide, the following is omitted.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son : and to the Holy Ghost.

As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be : world without end. Amen.

FOR THE ACCEPTANCE OF OURSELVES AND OUR GIFTS

The Priest then returns to the centre, and bowing over, says:

Suscipe, sancta Trinitas.

RECEIVE O Holy Trinity, this oblation which we offer unto thee, in memory of the passion, resurrection, and ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ ; and in honour of blessed Mary Ever-Virgin, of blessed John Baptist, of the holy Apostles Peter and Paul ; of these and all the Saints ; that it may be to their honour and our salvation : and that like as we remember them on earth, so in heaven they may plead for us. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

THE PRIEST AND PEOPLE PRAY FOR EACH OTHER

The Priest says in the subdued voice:

Orate, fratres.

BRETHREN, pray : and then adds privately: that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the Father Almighty.

Meanwhile the bystanders respond:

Suscipiat Dominus.

THE Lord receive this sacrifice at thy hands, to the praise and glory of his Name ; both to our benefit and that of all his holy Church. And then the Priest, with the subdued voice, says: Amen.

PRAYER OVER THE OBLATIONS

The Secrets or the Prayer for the Church

Then the Priest, without saying Let us pray, immediately adds the Secrets, or (for the Secrets) the following Prayer for the Church, before which he says: Let us pray for the whole state of Christ's Church.

(This Prayer was originally the introductory prayer to our Prayer-Book Canon, and if its "lost fragment" be restored to it, it will be seen to be a paraphrase somewhat re-arranged as to order, of its original, the first of introductory parts of the Gregorian Canon, as given in the Note on the Canon of the Mass after the Preface, page B48 ff.)

ALmighty and everliving God, who by thy holy Apostle hast taught us to make prayers, and supplications, and to give thanks for all men : We humbly beseech thee most mercifully to accept our [alms and] oblations, and to receive these our prayers, which we offer unto thy Divine Majesty ; beseeching thee to inspire continually the Universal

Church with the spirit of truth, unity, and concord : And grant that all those who do confess thy holy Name may agree in the truth of thy holy Word, and live in unity and godly love.

We beseech thee also, so to direct and dispose the hearts of all Christian Rulers, that they may truly and impartially administer justice, to the punishment of wickedness and vice, and to the maintenance of thy true religion, and virtue.

Give grace, O heavenly Father, to all Bishops and other Ministers, that they may, both by their

life and doctrine, set forth thy true and lively Word, and rightly and duly administer thy holy Sacraments.

And to all thy People give thy heavenly grace ; and especially to this congregation here present ; that, with meek heart and due reverence, they may hear, and receive thy holy Word ; truly serving thee in holiness and righteousness all the days of their life.

And we most humbly beseech thee, of thy goodness, O Lord, to comfort and succour all those

who, in this transitory life, are in trouble, sorrow, need, sickness, or any other adversity.

And we also bless thy holy Name for all thy servants departed this life in thy faith and fear ; beseeching thee to grant them continual growth in thy love and service, and to give us grace so to follow their good examples, that with them we may be partakers of thy heavenly kingdom. Grant this, O Father, for Jesus Christ's sake. Our only Mediator and Advocate. *R.* Amen.

The Order of Ministering the Holy Communion to the People

Commonly called Communion Devotions

In the Latin Mass used in England at the time of the Reformation, there was no form for ministering the Holy Communion to the People (just as in the Roman Missal of today there is no such form), for which reason a vernacular form was devised, and used in the Latin Mass immediately before the Communion of the People. Then, in the first Prayer-Book (1549) this vernacular "Order" was inserted immediately before the Celebrant's own Communion. In the second Prayer-Book (1552) this Order was interpolated here in its present awkward place, where it unfortunately interrupts the Action. One element of this form, however, the Prayer of Humble Access, was removed at the last American revision to its present place before the Act of Communion, which is historically and liturgically the proper position for the whole of this Order.

¶ Then shall the Priest say to those who come to receive the Holy Communion.

YE who do truly and earnestly repent you of your sins, and are in love and charity with your neighbours, and intend to lead a new life, following the commandments of God, and walking from henceforth in his holy ways ; Draw near with faith, and take this holy Sacrament to your comfort ; and make your humble confession to Almighty God, devoutly kneeling.

General Confession

ALMIGHTY God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Maker of all things, Judge of all men ; We acknowledge and bewail our manifold sins and wickedness, Which we, from time to time, most grievously have committed, By thought, word, and deed, Against thy Divine Majesty, Provoking most justly thy wrath and indignation against us. We do earnestly repent, And are heartily sorry for these our misdoings ; The remembrance of them is grievous unto us ; The burden of them is intolerable. Have mercy upon us, Have mercy upon us,

most merciful Father ; For thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, Forgive us all that is past ; And grant that we may ever hereafter Serve and please thee In newness of life, To the honour and glory of thy Name ; Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

¶ Then shall the Priest (the Bishop if he be present) stand up, and turning to the People, say:

Absolution

ALMIGHTY God, our heavenly Father, who of his great mercy hath promised forgiveness of sins to all those who with hearty repentance and true faith turn unto him ; Have mercy upon you ; pardon ✠ and deliver you from all your sins ; confirm and strengthen you in all goodness ; and bring you to everlasting life ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. R. Amen.

¶ Then shall the Priest say:

HEAR what comfortable words our Saviour Christ saith unto all who truly turn to him. Come unto me, all ye that travail and are heavy laden, and I will refresh you. *Matt. II. 28.* So God loved the world, that he

gave his only-begotten Son, to the end that all that believe in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. *John 3. 16.*

HEAR also what Saint Paul saith. This is a true saying, and worthy of all men to be received, That Christ Jesus came

into the world to save sinners. *I Tim. 1. 15.*

HEAR also what Saint John saith. If any man sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous ; and he is the Propitiation for our sins. *I John 2. 1, 2.*

THE PREFACE TO THE CANON OF THE MASS

According to the general tradition of the West (obscured by the interpolation as above of the Communion Devotions), the Preface follows immediately upon the Offertory, and the music for the Ending of the final prayer thereof is the beginning of the melody of the opening Versicles of the Preface.

2. CONSECRATION OR THE EUCHARISTIC BLESSING

This is the second act of The Action. Our Lord gave thanks, which means that he blessed the Bread and Wine by means of a form of thanksgiving, for which reason the chief name of the Mass is the Eucharist. The great Thanksgiving of Consecration is therefore begun solemnly with the reverential chant of the Preface, and the worshipper should join in the Preface privately with a heart full of thankfulness, and thus give himself to be consecrated to God along with his offerings, according to the Covenant which God made with his people, saying: To make thee high above all nations which God hath made, in praise, and in name, and in honour : and that thou mayest be an holy people unto the Lord thy God. *Deut. 26. 19.*

In most liturgies the Canon or prayer of consecration has certain

variable elements to adapt it to the Seasons of the Church Year. The Prayer-Book continues this usage by giving us Proper Prefaces, as noted below, but the rest of the Prayer-Book Canon is the same on Fast, Feria, or Feast throughout the year, unlike its Latin original, the Gregorian Canon, which see in Note on the Canon of the Mass, below.

FIFTH SALUTATION

(Which begins the Eucharistic Consecration)

℣. The Lord be with you.

℟. And with thy spirit.

Sursum corda.

℣. Lift up your hearts.

℟. We lift them up unto the Lord.

℣. Let us give thanks unto our Lord God.

℟. It is meet and right so to do.

IT is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, O Lord, Holy, Father Almighty, Everlasting God.

Here shall follow the Proper Preface according to the time, if there be any specially appointed; or else immediately shall be said or sung by the Priest:

THEFORE with Angels and Archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we laud and magnify thy glorious Name; evermore praising thee, and saying:

(Here it is customary to ring the bell thrice.)

Sanctus, sanctus, sanctus.

HOLY, Holy, Holy, Lord God of hosts, Heaven and earth are full of thy glory: Glory be to thee, O Lord Most High. (Amen). [After which it is customary to add:

Benedictus, qui venit.

BLESSED is he that cometh in the Name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.]

Proper Prefaces from the Book of Common Prayer

For the Nativity of Our Lord.

BECAUSE thou didst give Jesus Christ, thine only Son, to be born as at this time for us; who by the operation of the Holy

Ghost, was made very man, of the substance of the Virgin Mary, his Mother; and that without spot of sin, to make us clean from all sin. Therefore, etc.

For the Epiphany of our Lord.

THROUGH Jesus Christ our Lord ; who, in substance of our mortal flesh, manifested forth his glory ; that he might bring us out of darkness into his own glorious light. Therefore, *etc.*

For certain Feasts of our Lord and our Lady.

BECAUSE in the Mystery of the Word made flesh, thou hast caused a new light to shine in our hearts, to give the knowledge of thy glory in the face of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Therefore, *etc.*

For Easter.

BUT chiefly are we bound to praise thee for the glorious Resurrection of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord : for he is the very Paschal Lamb, which was offered for us, and hath taken away the sin of the world ; who by his death hath destroyed death, and by his rising to life again hath restored to us everlasting life. Therefore, *etc.*

For the Ascension of our Lord.

THROUGH thy most dearly beloved Son Jesus Christ our Lord ; who, after his most glori-

ous Resurrection, manifestly appeared to all his Apostles, and in their sight ascended up into heaven, to prepare a place for us ; that where he is, thither we might also ascend, and reign with him in glory. Therefore, *etc.*

For Whitsuntide.

THROUGH Jesus Christ our Lord ; according to whose most true promise, the Holy Ghost came down (as at this time) from heaven, lighting upon the disciples, to teach them, and to lead them into all truth ; giving them boldness with fervent zeal constantly to preach the Gospel unto all nations ; whereby we have been brought out of darkness and error into the clear light and true knowledge of thee, and of thy Son Jesus Christ. Therefore, *etc.*

For the Feast of the Most Holy Trinity and on Sundays.

WHO, with thine only-begotten Son, and the Holy Ghost, art one God, one Lord, in Trinity of Persons and in Unity of Substance. For that which we believe of thy glory, O Father, the same we believe of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, with-

out any difference of inequality. Therefore, *etc.*

¶ Or this.

FOR the precious death and merits of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord, and for the sending to us of the Holy Ghost, the Comforter ; who are one with thee in thy Eternal Godhead. Therefore, *etc.*

For All Saints.

WHO, in the multitude of thy Saints, hast compassed us about with so great a cloud of witnesses that we, rejoicing in their fellowship, may run with patience the race that is set before us, and, together with them, may receive the crown of glory that fadeth not away. Therefore, *etc.*

Other Proper Prefaces

In Lent.

BECAUSE that by our bodily fasting thou dost curb our sinfulness, dost raise our minds from things of earth, dost renew our strength and reward us with manifold blessings ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Therefore, *etc.*

In Masses of the Passion and of the Holy Cross.

BECAUSE by the Tree of the Cross thou hast wrought the salvation of the race of man ; that whence death arose, thence also Life might rise again ; and that he who by a tree was once the vanquisher, might also by a Tree be vanquished ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Therefore, *etc.*

In Masses of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

WHO didst will that a soldier's spear should pierce thine only-begotten Son as he hung upon the Cross, that his Heart which containeth all the riches of the divine goodness might be opened to pour forth on us showers of mercy and of grace ; and that as his Heart once pierced doth ever burn with love towards us, so it should remain a haven of rest for the godly, and for the penitent an open refuge of salvation. Therefore, *etc.*

In Masses of Christ the King.

BECAUSE thou hast anointed thine only-begotten Son Jesus Christ our Lord with the oil of

gladness, to be a Priest for ever, and to be King over all mankind ; that when he had rendered himself a spotless sacrifice of peace upon the Altar of the Cross, he might fulfil the mystery of our redemption ; and having brought all creatures under his governance, might present unto thine infinite Majesty, a kingdom universal and everlasting ; a kingdom of truth and life ; a kingdom of sanctity and grace ; a kingdom of justice, love, and peace. Therefore, *etc.*

In Masses of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

AND that on the . . . of Blessed Mary Ever-Virgin, we should praise, bless, and tell forth thy wonders ; in that by the overshadowing of the Holy Ghost, she conceived thy only-begotten Son, and without let to the glory of her abiding maidenhood, brought forth for man the light eternal, even Jesus Christ our Lord. Therefore, *etc.*

In Masses of St. Joseph, Spouse of the B.V.M.

AND that (on the Festival) of Joseph the blessed, we should praise, bless, and tell forth thy

wonders ; who being a righteous man was espoused to the Virgin Mother of God by thine appointment ; a faithful and wise servant, made ruler of thy household ; that in the office of a father he should guard thy only-begotten Son, conceived by the overshadowing of the Holy Ghost, even Jesus Christ our Lord. Therefore, *etc.*

In Masses of the Apostles and Evangelists.

AND also that we should humbly entreat thee, O Lord, the everlasting Shepherd, not to leave thy flock untended, but by thy blessed Apostles to keep it in thy continual protection ; that it may be governed by those same rulers, whom in thy stead, thou hast given for thy work, as shepherds of thy People. Therefore, *etc.*

In Masses for the Dead.

THROUGH Jesus Christ our Lord ; in whom hath been manifested forth unto us the hope of a glorious resurrection ; giving unto them that bewail the certain condition of their mortality the comfort of thy promise of immortality to come : for thou, O Lord, takest not away but chang-

est the life of thy faithful People, granting unto them at the dissolution of the tabernacle of their earthly pilgrimage a dwelling-place everlasting in the heavens. Therefore, *etc.*

In Masses of St. Francis, to be used by Franciscans only.

WHO by thy most high goodness and mercy hast exalted unto the merits and virtues of

the Saints, thy blessed servant, the praiseworthy Confessor Francis ; whose soul inwardly by the operation of the Holy Spirit hath of Seraphic love been most fervently kindled ; and whose body outwardly hath of the same been marked with the sacred Stigmata, the sign of the Crucified, Jesus Christ our Lord. Therefore, *etc.*

(For the American Consecration Prayer, turn to page B53.)

NOTE ON THE CANON OF THE MASS

After the foregoing Preface to the Consecration there was at one time a prayer known as the Post-Sanctus, which prayed that because God is holy and Christ is blessed, we may be his holy people, blessed by the Blessed One. At High Mass, after the worshipper has privately said the Sanctus, he may wish to say, whilst the Choir is singing, one of the following prayers as a kind of Post-Sanctus. If this be done, a restoration will be made of something which has been lost from our liturgy, for every Catholic liturgy in the whole world, with the exception of our own, expresses and emphasizes the idea that the Eucharist is not only the union of Christ with the Church Militant but also with the Church Expectant and Triumphant, for the Church is the Mystical Body of Christ composed of all the Faithful, living and dead, and the Mass is a holy commerce between them all in Christ.

NOTE, That canon means a standard or strict rule, and the Canon of the Mass is that part of the Eucharist in which strict obedience must be given to the Lord's Command, DO THIS IN REMEMBRANCE OF ME.

EXCERPTS FROM OUR ORIGINAL FORMS OF LITURGY

*Used in Some Places as*Personal Prayers of the Celebrant before the
Eucharistic Consecration

(Either one of the two following devotions may be said:)

(i) The Commemoration of the Living, the Departed,
and the Saints in Heaven*which in 1552 was lost from the Anglican Canon*

The following Prayer was originally the conclusion to the Prayer for the Church when in the First Prayer-Book the Prayer for the Church was said, not as now at the Offertory but after the Sanctus, as the opening section of the Consecration Prayer. In some places in the Anglican Communion (e.g., in the Dioceses of Zanzibar, Nassau, etc.) it is still said thus in its original Anglican form. A comparison with the opening Prayers of the Gregorian Canon of this restored form of the Prayer for the Church will shew that it is a translation in paraphrase of this ancient western liturgical formula.

If this Prayer following be said as a Post-Sanctus, the Commemoration of the Departed and of the Saints, interpolated into the Prayer-Book Canon, should be omitted, because in the rite of 1549 the Commemoration of the Departed was removed from the place it had occupied at the end of the Gregorian Canon and put in this place along with the Commemoration of the Living.

The Commemoration of the Living

AND especially, O Lord, we commend unto thy merciful goodness N. and N., and this congregation which is here assembled in thy name, to cele-

brate the commemoration of the most glorious death of thy Son.

The Commemoration of the Saints

AND here we do give unto thee most high praise and hearty thanks [Here is sometimes made mention of the day itself, as indicated below.]

On the NATIVITY of the Lord, and thereafter to the Octave Day inclusive:

On the day of the EPIPHANY, and through the whole Octave:

On this most holy day whereon thy only-begotten Son, co-eternal with thee in thy glory, manifestly appeared in the true substance of our flesh : For the wonderful grace and virtue declared in all thy Saints, from the beginning of the world : And chiefly in the glorious and most blessed Virgin Mary, Mother

of the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord and God.

On MAUNDY THURSDAY:

On this most holy day whereon Jesus Christ our Lord was betrayed for us : For the wonderful grace and virtue declared in all thy Saints, from the beginning of the world : And chiefly in the glorious and most blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord and God.

From the VIGIL OF EASTER to Saturday before Low Sunday inclusive:

On this most holy day, whereon Jesus Christ our Lord did rise again in his own flesh : For the wonderful grace and virtue declared in all thy Saints, from the beginning of the world : And chiefly in the glorious and most blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord and God.

On the day of the ASCENSION, and through the whole Octave:

On this most holy day whereon our Lord, thy only-begotten Son, set on high at the right hand of thy glory our frail human nature in union with himself : For the wonderful grace and virtue declared in all thy Saints, from the beginning of the world : And chiefly in the glorious and most blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord and God.

On the VIGIL OF PENTECOST to the following Saturday inclusive:

On this most holy day of Pentecost, whereon the Holy Ghost appeared to the Apostles in countless tongues of fire : For the wonderful grace and virtue declared in all thy Saints, from the beginning of the world : And chiefly in the glorious and most blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord and God.

Through the rest of the year:

For the wonderful grace and virtue declared in all thy Saints, from the beginning of the world : And chiefly in the glorious and most blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord and God.

And then the same is ended as follows:

And in thy holy Patriarchs, Prophets, Apostles, and Martyrs, whose examples, O Lord, and steadfastness in thy faith, and keeping thy holy commandments, grant us to follow.

*The Commemoration of the
Departed*

WE commend unto thy mercy, O Lord, all other thy servants N. and N., which are departed hence from us, with the sign of faith, and now do rest in the sleep of peace.

*The Commemoration of the Con-
summation of Christ's Kingdom*

GRANT unto them, we beseech thee, thy mercy, and everlasting peace, and that, at the day of the general resurrection, we and all thy servants which be of the mystical body of thy Son, may altogether be set on his right hand, and hear that his most joyful voice : Come unto me, O ye that be blessed of my Father, and possess the kingdom, which is prepared for you from the beginning of the world.

(Or this:)

(ii) The Introductory Prayer of the Gregorian Canon

The most widely used consecration prayer of Christendom is the Gregorian Canon (so called because it is supposed to have been arranged on the basis of earlier forms by St. Gregory the Great), of which our own Prayer for the Church and Consecration Prayer are a paraphrase, slightly rearranged. As explained above, the foregoing Prayer for the Whole State of Christ's Church is an amplification of the following introductory prayers of the Gregorian Canon. They are given here in the translation (slightly modernized) made by Miles Coverdale, the Father of the English Bible, and probably used at our Altars in England just prior to the publication of the first Prayer-Book. The addition of the above "lost fragment" of 1549 to the Prayer for the Church will make plain that our Prayer for the Church is but a paraphrase of the following:

Te igitur.

THEREFORE, most gracious Father, through Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord, we humbly beseech thee, and we desire, that thou accept, and bless, these gifts, these presents, these holy and unspotted sacrifices, which, first of all, we offer unto thee for thy holy Catholic Church : that thou vouchsafe to pacify, keep, unite and govern it throughout the whole world : with thy servant N., our chief Bishop, and N., our own Bishop, and all true believers, and such as have the Catholic and Apostolic faith in due estimation.

Memento, Domine.

REMEMBER, Lord, thy servants and handmaids, N. and N., and all who stand here round about, whose faith and devotion unto thee is known and manifest : for whom we offer unto thee, or who themselves do offer unto thee, this sacrifice of praise (for them and theirs, for the redemption of their souls, for the hope of their salvation and health) and render their vows unto thee, the eternal living, and true God :

Communicantes.

In communion with [Here is sometimes made mention of the day itself, as indicated below:] and in worshipful remembrance of the glorious and Ever-Virgin Mary, the Mother of our God and Lord Jesus Christ :

On the NATIVITY of the Lord, and thereafter to the Octave Day inclusive:

On the Day of the ASCENSION and through the whole Octave:

In communion with and in honour of this most holy day whereon our Lord, thy only-begotten Son, set on high at the right hand of thy glory our frail human nature in union with himself : and in worshipful remembrance of the glorious and Ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of the same our God and Lord Jesus Christ : and also of thy blessed Apostles, etc.

On the VIGIL OF PENTECOST to the following Saturday inclusive:

In communion with and in honour of this most holy day of Pentecost whereon the Holy Ghost appeared to the Apostles in countless tongues of fire : and in worshipful remembrance of the glorious and Ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of our God and Lord Jesus Christ : and also of thy blessed Apostles, etc.

Through the rest of the year:

AND also of thy blessed Apostles and Martyrs, Peter, Paul, Andrew, James, John, Thomas,

James, Philip, Bartholomew, Matthew, Simon and Thaddeus : Linus, Cletus, Clement, Xystus, Cornelius, Cyprian, Lawrence, Chrysgonus, John and Paul, Cosmas and Damian : and of all thy Saints ; by whose merits and prayers grant thou that in all things we may be defended with the help of thy protection. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

Hanc igitur.

THEREFORE, Lord, we beseech thee, that thou wilt graciously receive this oblation of our bounden service, and of all thy household : [On the Vigil of Easter and Pentecost, and thereafter through the following Saturday inclusive, here is inserted: *and we offer it to thee on behalf also of those whom thou hast been pleased to regenerate by water and the Holy Ghost, granting unto them remission of all their sins :*] and do thou order our days in thy peace, and command us to be delivered from eternal damnation, and to be numbered in the flock of thine elect. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

THE AMERICAN CANON



The ringing of bells has always been associated with the worship of the one, living, and true God, and it is customary to have their glad voices ring out the news that Christ still comes to his People during the consecration of the Eucharist. They may be rung, as said above, at the Sanctus, and also (i) just before the Words of Institution, as a warning that the worshipper must be especially reverent, (ii) after each recitation of the Words, as the Priest makes his adoration, and (iii) just before he receives the Holy Communion, which is the final act of The Action commanded by our Lord. The worshipper should be mindful of the fact that he, along with the whole Church is being offered and consecrated to God at this time, and therefore should recite the Consecration Prayer with the Priest, or follow the more ancient custom of practicing mystical silence, as the Scripture says: BE STILL, and KNOW that I am God.

PRAYER OF CONSECRATION

(Hanc igitur)

ALL glory be to thee, Almighty God our heavenly Father, for that thou, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption ; who made there (by his one oblation of himself once offered) a full,

perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world ; And did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue a Perpetual Memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

Here the worshipper bows his head, and remains bowed until the elevation.

(Qui pridie)

FOR in the night in which he was betrayed, he took Bread ; and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, Take, eat,

THIS IS MY BODY, WHICH IS
GIVEN FOR YOU;

Do this in remembrance of me.

When the Priest elevates the Host above his head to shew it to the People, the worshipper should lift up his head and raise his eyes thereto. With St. Thomas the Apostle, he may well express love and devotion, saying: My Lord and my God. Afterward, he should bow again.

(Simili modo)

LIKEWISE, after supper, he took the Cup ; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of this ; for

THIS IS MY BLOOD
OF THE NEW TESTAMENT, WHICH
IS SHED FOR YOU, AND FOR MANY,
FOR THE REMISSION OF SINS;

Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in
remembrance of me.

When the Priest elevates the Chalice above his head to shew it to the People, the worshipper should lift up his head and raise his eyes thereto. With St. Thomas the Apostle he may well express his faith and devotion, saying: My Lord and my God. Afterward he should bow his head momentarily.

The Oblation (Unde et memores)

WHEREFORE, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of thy dearly beloved Son our Saviour Jesus

Christ, we, thy humble servants, do celebrate and make here before thy Divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, which we now offer unto thee, the Memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make ; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension ; rendering unto thee most hearty thanks for

the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same.

The Invocation (Quam oblationem)

AND we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us : and, of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine ; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

(Supra quae propitio)

AND we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness, mercifully to accept this our Sacrifice of Praise and Thanksgiving ; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

(Supplices te rogamus)

AND here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, ourselves, our souls and bodies, to be a

reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee ; humbly beseeching thee, that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

[Commemoratio pro Defunctis]

The names of the faithful departed are in some places remembered before God here in the Canon, along with those triumphant in heaven. To this end, the ancient prayers are here given:

REMEMBER, Lord, also the souls of thy servants and handmaidens, which are gone before us with the mark of faith, and rest in the sleep of peace, N. and N. We beseech thee, O Lord, that unto them, and unto all such as rest in Christ, thou wilt grant a place of refreshing, of light, and of peace. And vouchsafe to give unto us some portion and fellowship with thy holy Apostles and Martyrs ; with John, Stephen, Matthias, Barnabas, Ignatius, Alexander, Marcellinus, Peter, Felici-

tas, Perpetua, Agatha, Lucia, Agnes, Cecilia, Anastasia, and with all thy Saints ; within whose fellowship we beseech thee to admit us ;]

(Nobis quoque peccatoribus)

And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice ; yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service ; not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offences. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honour and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty. World without end. *R.* Amen.

Pater noster.

Anciently the Priest, as the representative of Christ, said the perfect Prayer of our Lord alone, to emphasize its extreme sacredness as a part of the foregoing priestly Consecration Prayer.

LET us pray : And now, as our Saviour Christ hath taught us, we are bold to say :

OUR Father, who art in heaven, Hallowed be thy Name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, On earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, As we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation. *R.* But deliver us from evil. [For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. *R.* Amen.]

Personal Prayer of the Celebrant Before the Fracture

(Which the worshipper ought also to pray)

Libera nos.

DELIVER us, we beseech thee, O Lord, from all evils, past, present, and to come : and at the intercession of the blessed and glorious Ever-Virgin Mary,

Mother of God, with thy blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and with Andrew, and with all Saints, give peace graciously in our days, that we, being holpen by the succour of thy mercy, may both always be free from sin and safe from all

disquietude. Through the same Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, ever one God. World without end. *R.* Amen.

3. UTILIZATION OF THE SACRIFICE PRESENTED OR THE FRACTURE

This is the third act of The Action, imitating our Lord's act in breaking the Bread. Offer your will to be broken by Christ to his use.

SIXTH SALUTATION

(Which introduces the proclamation of the Lamb of God as our Sacrifice.)

In some Churches the worshippers here make the Sign of the Cross on their forehead, lips, and breast, as at the Gospel. The wor-

shipper should now offer his will and all his desires to God in union with the Sacrifice which was for him lifted up on the Cross.

V. The peace of the Lord be always with you.

R. And with thy spirit.

After which is said privately:

Personal Prayer of the Celebrant After the Fracture

(Which the worshipper ought also to pray)

Haec commixtio.

MAY this mingling and consecration of the Body and

Blood of Jesus Christ our Lord be unto us who receive it an approach to everlasting life. Amen.

The Anthem of Sacrifice

The Forerunner of the Saviour, St. John Baptist, once proclaimed our Lord as the Lamb of Sacrifice for the sins of the world, and the Priest, if he follows Catholic custom, now thrice repeats the Baptist's words that he may fix our devotion on him who is present on the Altar as the propitiation for our sins and the peace and rest for our souls.

Agnus Dei. In Masses for the Living.

O LAMB of God, that takest away the sins of the world : have mercy upon us. O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world : have mercy upon us. O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world : grant us thy peace.

Agnus Dei. In Masses for the Dead.

O LAMB of God, that takest away the sins of the world : grant them rest. O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world : grant them rest. O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world : grant them rest eternal.

Personal Prayers of the Celebrant at the Communion

(Which the worshipper ought also to pray)

FOR THE PEACE OF THE CHURCH

(Said only in Masses for the Living)

Domine Jesu Christe.

O LORD Jesus Christ, who saidst to thine Apostles, Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you : regard not my sins, but the faith of thy Church ; and grant to it that peace and unity which is according to thy will. Who livest and reignest God, world without end. Amen.

PRAYERS TO RECEIVE CHRIST WORTHILY

Prayer of Humble Access

WE do not presume to come to this thy Table, O Merciful Lord, trusting in our own

righteousness, but in thy manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under thy Table. But thou art the same Lord, whose property is always to have mercy :

Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the Flesh of thy dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink his blood, that our sinful bodies may be made clean by his Body, and our souls washed through his most precious Blood, and that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. R. Amen.

¶ Here may be sung a Hymn.

The foregoing Prayer is often substituted for the following two Prayers:

Domine Jesu Christe, Fili Dei vivi.

OLORD Jesus Christ, son of the living God, whom the Father with the Holy Ghost hath willed by death to make the world to live : by this most holy Body and Blood of thine, set me free from all my sins, and from all evil things : and make me in such wise ever to abide in thy commands that I may never be separated from thee. Who with the same God the Father and the Holy Ghost, livest and reignest one God for ever and ever. Amen.

Perceptio Corporis tui.

OLORD Jesus Christ, I, thine unworthy servant, do presume to take thy Body : but let not this act be to my judgement and condemnation : rather, of thy mercy let it ward me in body and soul, and shew thy healing forth in me. Who livest and reignest with God the Father, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

Panem caelestem.

I WILL receive the bread of heaven and call upon the Name of the Lord.

The Priest now thrice strikes his breast (at which time in some places the bell is rung thrice, as a sign that the Sacrifice is about to be consummated by the Priest's reception of the Blessed Sacrament, and also to notify the People to come forward to receive the Holy Communion), as he thrice repeats the words of the holy Centurion whose humility and faith won the healing of his servant from our Lord. The Priest prays audibly only the first five words; the rest he says privately, thus:

Domine, non sum dignus.

LORD, I am not worthy : that thou shouldest come under my roof, but speak the word only and my soul shall be healed.

¶ Then shall the Priest first receive the Holy Communion in both kinds himself and proceed to deliver the same to the Bishops, Priests, and Deacons, in like manner (if any be present,) and, after that, to the People also in order.

After the Celebrant has received the Body of our Lord, he makes a devout resolution, which the worshipper should make with him, namely:

Quid retribuam.

WHAT reward shall I give unto the Lord for all the benefits that he hath done unto me? I will receive the cup of salvation and call upon the Name of the Lord. I will call upon the Lord, which is worthy to be praised, so shall I be safe from mine enemies.

4. UNIFICATION WITH OUR LORD, OR ADMINISTRATION OF HOLY COMMUNION

This is the fourth and final act of The Action, wherein our Lord gives himself to us in return for our gift of ourselves to him. And if the worshipper is not fasting, or is otherwise unprepared to receive the Holy Communion, he ought nevertheless to make an Act of Spiritual Communion, such as the following:

Anima Christi.

SOUL of Christ, sanctify me.

BODY of Christ, save me.

Blood of Christ, inebriate me.

Water from the side of Christ,
wash me.

Passion of Christ, strengthen me.

O good Jesu, hear me.

Within thy wounds hide me.

Suffer me not to be separated
from thee.

From the malicious enemy defend
me.

In the hour of my death call
me,

And bid me come to thee,

That with thy Saints I may praise
thee

For ever and ever. Amen.

Thus may the worshipper go forth in union with Christ and take heed to what God said to holy Gideon: Go forth in this thy might, O mighty man of valour. Have I not sent thee?

The Communion Devotions

Here appropriately the Order of Ministering Holy Communion to the People was originally said in its entirety, as is still done in some places. And then is repeated the cry of St. John Baptist, thus:

Ecce, Agnus Dei.

BEHOLD the Lamb of God, behold him that taketh away the sins of the world.

The following words of the Centurion are appropriately said by the Priest and People together, thrice:

Domine, non sum dignus.

LORD, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof : but speak the word only and my soul shall be healed.

¶ And when he delivereth the Bread, he says:

Corpus Domini.

THE Body of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was given for thee, preserve thy body and soul unto everlasting life. Take and eat this in remembrance that Christ died for thee, and feed on him in thy heart by faith, with thanksgiving.

¶ And the Minister who delivereth the Cup shall say:

Sanguis Domini.

THE Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was shed for thee, preserve thy body and soul unto everlasting life. Drink this in remembrance that Christ's Blood was shed for thee, and be thankful.

¶ When all have communicated the Priest shall return to the Holy Table, and reverently place upon it what remaineth of the consecrated Elements, covering the same with a fair linen cloth. [NOTE, That this fair linen cloth is now commonly understood to be the Pall. The Priest, if he follows the general tradition of the Western Liturgy, now makes the Ablutions, saying meanwhile:]

Personal Prayers of the Celebrant After Reception

(Which the worshipper ought also to pray)

Quod ore sumpsimus.

GRANT that what we have received with the mouth, O Lord, we may keep with a pure heart ; and that from this temporal gift may come unto us life everlasting.

Corpus tuum, Domine.

MAY thy Flesh which I have taken and thy Blood which I have drunk, O Lord, cleave unto mine inmost soul ; and grant that no spot of sin may abide in me, whose meat hath been thine

incorrupt and holy sacraments. Who livest and reignest for ever and ever. Amen.

¶ Then shall the Priest say:

Let us pray.

But the following prayer is often omitted when no one has received Holy Communion except the Celebrant, since it is meant to be said on behalf of those who have received.

The Thanksgiving

ALmighty and everlasting God, we most heartily thank thee for that thou dost vouchsafe to feed us who have duly received

these holy Mysteries, with the spiritual food of the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ ; and dost assure us thereby of thy favour and goodness towards us ; and that we are very members incorporate in the mystical body of thy Son, which is the blessed company of all faithful people ; and are also heirs through hope of thy everlasting kingdom, by

the merits of his most precious death and passion. And we humbly beseech thee, O heavenly Father, so to assist us with thy grace, that we may continue in that holy fellowship, and do all such good works as thou hast prepared for us to walk in ; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with thee and the Holy Ghost, be all honour and glory, world without end. *R.* Amen.

The Communion Anthem

The worshipper ought to think on its words and retain them in his heart all day long as his watchword of thankfulness for all God's benefits.

¶ Then shall be said the *Gloria in excelsis* all standing, or some proper Hymn. [But NOTE, that the proper Hymn appointed in this Missal is the Communion anthem, which same is said at the Epistle corner, whereto the Missal is carried, and the Priest goes to read the same, which done, with hands joined as before, he returns to the midst. Otherwise, remaining in the midst, he says according to the directions given after the Kyrie, as follows:]

Gloria in excelsis.

GLORY be to God on high, and on earth peace, good will towards men. We praise thee, we bless thee, we worship thee, we glorify thee, we give thanks to thee for thy great glory, O Lord

God, heavenly King, God the Father Almighty.

O Lord, the only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ ; O Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us. Thou that takest away the sins of the world, receive our prayer. Thou that sittest at the right hand of God the Father, have mercy upon us.

For thou only art holy ; thou only art the Lord ; thou only, O [Jesu] Christ, with the Holy Ghost, art most high in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The Final Thanksgiving

The Missal indicates a special thanksgiving prayer for each proper Mass, corresponding to the Collect for the Day and the Secret, and in Lenten weekday Masses a Collect Over the People as the concluding devotion before The Dismissal. (See proper Mass for the day.)

SEVENTH SALUTATION

(Which introduces the Postcommunion or final thanksgiving)

∇. The Lord be with you.

R̄. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

After which he says the Postcommunions, in the same number and order, as the Collects at the beginning of the Mass.

The Dismissal

Every historic liturgy except the Nestorian and the Anglican has a Dismissal said or sung by the Deacon, such as follows:

EIGHTH SALUTATION

(Which introduces the Dismissal)

∇. The Lord be with you.

R̄. And with thy Spirit.

In Masses for the Living:

∇. Depart in peace. Or: Let us bless the Lord.

R̄. Thanks be to God.

In Masses for the Dead:

∇. May they rest in peace.

R̄. Amen.

Final Personal Prayer of the Celebrant

(Which the worshipper ought also to pray)

Placeat tibi.

unto thee ; and be for me and all them for whom I have offered it, a propitiation of thy loving-kindness. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Blessing of the People by the Celebrant

(Which is not said in Mass for the Dead, and which is given with special solemnity only by the Bishop as chief Pastor)

THE Peace of God, which passeth all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of his Son Jesus Christ our Lord. And the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, ✠ and the Holy Ghost be amongst you and remain with you always. *R.* Amen.

The Last Gospel or Final Proclamation of the Good News Concerning Jesus Christ

Here is read the following Gospel, namely the Apostle St. John's great proclamation concerning God who became Man and dwelt among us, or some other Gospel when the Rubrics of the Missal provide one, as for example when there is a Commemoration on the same day with a Gospel which sets forth the special observance of the day. And the Sign of the Cross is made by the worshipper as the Priest signs himself.

R. Glory be to thee, O Lord.

In principio.

John 1.

IN the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The

same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by him : and without him was not any thing made that was made : in him was life, and the life was the light of men : and the light shineth in darkness, and the darkness comprehended it not. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. The same came for a witness, to bear witness of the light, that all men through him might believe. He was not

that light, but was sent to bear witness of that light. That was the true light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world. He was in the world, and the world was made by him, and the world knew him not. He came unto his own, and his own received him not. But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe

on his Name : which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. **Here genuflect.** And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, **Here rise** (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the Only-begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth.

R. Thanks be to God.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Colossians. *Col. 3. 1.*

BRETHREN : If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God : set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth. For ye are dead, and your life

is hid with Christ in God. When Christ, who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with him in glory.

AT that time : On the first day of the week cometh Mary Magdalene early, when it was yet dark, unto the sepulchre, and seeth the stone taken away from thê sepulchre. Then she runneth and cometh to Simon Peter, and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and saith unto them : They have taken away the Lord out of the sepulchre, and we know not where thêy have laid him. Peter therefore went forth, and that other disciple, and came to thê sepulchre. So they ran bôth together ; and the other disciple did outrun Peter, and came first to thê sepulchre. And he, stooping down and looking in, saw the linen clothes lying : yet wênt he not in. Then cometh Simon Peter following him, and went into the sepulchre, and seeth the linen clothes lie ; and the napkin that was about his head, not lying with the linen clothes, but wrapped together in a plâce by itself. Then went in also that other disciple which came first to the sepulchre : and he saw, ând believèd. For as yet they knew not the Scripture, that he must rise agâin from the dead. Then the disciples went away agâin unto their own home. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 76.* The earth trembled and was still, when God arose to judgement, alleluia.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians.
I Cor. 5. 6.

BRETHREN : ‡ Know ye not that a little leaven leaveneth thê whole lump? Purge out therefore the old leaven, that ye may be a new lump, as ye are unleavened. For even Christ our Pass-over is sacrificed for us : therefore let us keep the feast, not with old leaven, neither with the leaven of malice and wickedness ; but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accordîng to Mark.

St. Mark 16. 1.

AT that time : When the sabbath was past, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome, had bought sweet spices, that they might come ând anoint him. And very early in the morning the First Day of the week, they came unto the sepulchre at the rising of the sun. And they said among themselves, ‡ Who shall roll us away the stone from the door of the sêpulchre? And when they looked, they saw that the stone was rolled away : for it wâs very great. And entering into the sepulchre, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, clothed in a long white garment ; and they wêre affrighted. And he saith unto them : Be nôt affrighted : Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which was crucified : he is risen ; hê is not here ; be-

hold the place whêre they laid him. But go your way, tell his disciples and Peter that he goeth before you intô Galilee ; there shall ye see him, as he sâid unto you. And they went out quickly, and fled from thê sepulchre ; for they trembled and were amazed : neither said they any thing to any man ; for thêy were afraid.

§ *Within the Octave of Easter, Mass is not said of any double or semidouble Feast, but Doubles which can be transferred are celebrated after the Octave. But of Doubles which cannot be transferred, or Semidoubles and Simples occurring after this triduum, a Commemoration only is made.*

MONDAY IN EASTER WEEK

Station at St. Peter's. Collect 1929.

INTROIT. *Introduxit vos. Exod. 13.*

THE Lord hath brought you into a land flowing with milk and honey, alleluia : that the law of the Lord may alway be in your heart, alleluia, alleluia. Ps. 105. O give thanks unto the Lord, and call upon his Name : tell the people what things he hath done. V. Glory be.

COLLECT.

O GOD, whose blessed Son did manifest himself to his disciples in the breaking of bread : open, we pray thee, the eyes of our fâith, that we may behold thee in all thy works. Through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles.
Acts 10. 34.

IN those days : Peter opened his mouth, and said : Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons : but in every nation he that feareth him, and worketh righteousness, is accepted with him. The word which God sent unto the children of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ : (he is Lord of all ;) that word (I say) ye know, which was published throughout all Judaea : and began from Galilee, after the baptism which John preached : how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost, and with power, who went about doing good, and healing all that were oppressed of the devil, for God was with him. And we are witnesses of all things which he did, both in the land of the Jews, and in Jerusalem ; whom they slew, and hanged on a tree. Him God raised up the third day, and shewed him openly ; not to all the people, but unto witnesses chosen before of God, even to us, who did eat and drink with him after he rose from the dead. And he commanded us to preach unto the people, and to testify that it is he which was ordained of God to be the Judge of quick and dead. To him give all the Prophets witness, that through his Name whosoever believeth in him shall receive remission of sins.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 118.* This is the day which the Lord hath made : we will rejoice and be glad in it. *V.* Let Israel now confess that he is gracious : and that his mercy endureth for ever.

Alleluia, alleluia. V. St. Matt. 28. The Angel of the Lord descended from heaven : and came and rolled back the stone from the door, and sat upon it.

SEQUENCE. *Victimæ Paschali, as on Easter Day.*

✠ The Continuation of the **HOLY GOSPEL** accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 24. 13.

AT that time : Behold, two of his disciples went that same day to a village called Emmaus, which was from Jerusalem about thrêscore furlongs. And they talked together of all these things which hâd happenèd. And it came to pass, that while they communed together, and reasoned, Jesus himself drew near, and went with them : but their eyes were holden, that they shôuld not know him. And he said unto them : What manner of communications are these that ye have one to another, ‡ as ye walk, and are sad? And the one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answering, said unto him : Art thou only a stranger in Jerusalem, ‡ and hast not known the things which are come to pass there in these days? And he said unto them : ‡ What things? And they said unto him : Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, which was a Prophet mighty in deed and word ; before God and all the people ; and how the chief priests and our rulers delivered him to be condemned to death, and have crucifièd him. But we trusted that it had been he which should have redeemèd Israël ; and besides all this, to-day is the third day since thêse things were done. Yea, and certain women also of our company made us astonished, which were early at thê sepulchre ; and when they found not his body, they came, saying, that they had also seen a vision of Angels, which said that hê was alive.

And certain of them which were with us went to the sepulchre and found it even so as the women had said, but him they saw not. Then he said unto them : O fools, and slow of heart to believe all that the Prophêts have spoken. Ought not Christ to have suffered these things, † and to enter into his glory? And beginning at Moses, and all the prophets, he expounded unto them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself. And they drew nigh unto the village whither they went ; and he made as though he would have gone further. But they constrained him, saying : Abide with us, for it is toward evening, and the day is far spent. And he went in to tarry with them. And it came to pass, as he sat at meat with them, he took bread, and blessed it, and brake, and gave to them. And their eyes were opened, and they knew him, and he vanished out of their sight. And they said one to another : Did not our heart burn within us, while he talked with us by the way, † and while he opened to us the Scriptures? And they rose up the same hour, and returned to Jerusalem, and found the eleven gathered together, and them that were with them, saying : The Lord is risen indeed, and hath appeared to Simon. And they told what things were done in the way, and how he was known of them in breaking of bread. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *St. Matt. 28.* The Angel of the Lord descended from heaven and said unto the women : He whom ye seek is risen, as he said, alleluia.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to accept the prayers and oblations of thy people : that this beginning of thy Paschal Mysteries may by the operation of thy grace be unto us a wholesome medicine unto everlasting life. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. Luke 24.* The Lord is risen, and hath appeared unto Peter, alleluia.

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we who celebrate with reverence the Paschal Feast, may be found worthy to attain to everlast-

ing joys. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts 13. 26.*

IN those days ; Paul stood up, and beckoning with his hand, said : Men and brethren, children of the stock of Abraham, and whosoever among you feareth God, to you is the word of this salvation sent. For they that dwell at Jerusalem, and their rulers, because they knew him not, nor yet the voices of the Prophets which are read every sabbath-day, they have fulfilled them in condemning him : and though they found no cause of death in him, yet desired they Pilate that he should be slain. And when they had fulfilled all that was written of him, they took him down from the tree, and laid him in a sepulchre. But God raised him from the dead : and he was seen many days of them which came up with him from Galilee to Jerusalem : who are his witnesses unto the people. * And we declare unto you glad tidings, how that the promise which was made unto the fathers : God hath fulfilled the same unto us their children, in that he hath raised up Jesus again : as it is also written in the second Psalm : Thou art my Son, this day have I begotten thee. And as concerning that he raised him up from the dead, now no more to return to corruption, he said on this wise : I will give you the sure mercies of David. Wherefore he saith also in another Psalm : Thou shalt not suffer thine Holy One to see corruption. For David, after he had served his own generation by the will of God,

fell on sleep, and was laid unto his fathers, and saw corruption : but he whom God raised again saw no corruption. Be it known unto you therefore, men and brethren, that through this man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins : and by him all that believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be justified by the Law of Moses. Beware therefore, lest that come upon you which is spoken of in the Prophets : Behold, ye despisers, and wonder, and perish : for I work a work in your days, a work which ye shall in no wise believe, though a man declare it unto you.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 118.* This is the day which the Lord hath made : we will rejoice and be glad in it. *Ps. 107.* Let them give thanks whom the Lord hath redeemed : and delivered from the hand of the enemy, and gathered them out of the lands.

Alleluia, alleluia. *Ps. 118.* The Lord hath risen from the tomb, who hung for us upon the Tree.

SEQUENCE. *Victimæ Paschali, as on Easter Day.*

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 24. 36.

AT that time : Jesus himself stood in the midst of them, and saith unto them : Peace bê unto you. But they were terrified and affrighted, and supposed that they had sêen a spirit. And he said unto them : Why are ye troubled, ‡ and why do thoughts arise in your hearts? Behold my hands and my feet, that it is I myself ; handle me, and see : for a spirit hath not

flesh and bones, as yê see me have. And when he had thus spoken, he shewed them his hânds and his feet. And while they yet believed not for joy, and wondered, he said unto them : † Have ye here âny meat? And they gave him a piece of a broiled fish, and of ân honey-comb. And he took it, and did êat before them. And he said unto them : These are the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled which were written in the Law of Moses, and in the Prophets, and in the Psalms cōncerning me. Then opened he their understanding, that they might understand the Scriptures, and said unto them : Thus it is written, and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dëad the third day ; and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his Name among all nations, beginning at Jérusalem. And ye are witnesses of these things. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 18. 13. The Lord also thundered out of heaven, and the Highest gave his thunder : and springs of water were seen, alleluia.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, to accept the prayers and oblations of thy faithful people : that through this observance of our bounden devotion, we may attain to the glory of thy heavenly kingdom. Through.

COMMUNION. *Col.* 3. If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God, alleluia : set your affection on things above, alleluia.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God, that this Paschal Sacrament, which we have receivêd, may evermore continue to bring forth fruit within our souls. Through.

GOD, who gladdenest us with the yearly Festival of the Resurrection of thy Son Jêsus Christ our Lord : mercifully grant that we may so observe this temporal fêast, that we may be found worthy to attain to everlasting felicity. Through the same.

§ *From today until the Saturday before Low Sunday inclusive, after the Collect of the day, is said only the Collect for the Church (as in Seasonal Prayers, given at the end of the following Low Sunday Mass), unless there is to be made a Commemoration of some Feast.*

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Act.* 3. 12.

IN those days : Peter opened his mouth and said : Ye men of Israel, † why marvel yê at this? or why look ye so earnestly on us, † as though by our own power or holiness we had

made this mân to walk? The God of Abraham, and of Isaac, and of Jacob, the God of our fathers, hath glorified his Son Jesus, whom ye delivered up, and denied him in the presence of Pilate, when he was determined to let him go. But ye denied the Holy One and the Just, and desired a murderer to be granted unto you : and killed the Prince of life, whom God hath raised from the dead, whereof we are witnesses. And now, brethren, I wot that through ignorance ye did it, as did also your rulers. But those things, which God before had shewed by the mouth of all his Prophets, that Christ should suffer, he hath so fulfilled. Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 118.* This is the day which the Lord hath made : we will rejoice and be glad in it. *V.* The right hand of the Lord hath the pre-eminence, the right hand of the Lord bringeth mighty things to pass.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V. St. Luke 24.* The Lord is risen indeed, and hath appeared unto Peter.

SEQUENCE. *Victimæ Paschali, as on Easter Day.*

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accord'ing to John.

St. John 21. 1.

AT that time : Jesus shewed himself again to the disciples at the sea of Tiberias. And on this wise shewêd he himself. There were together Simon Peter, and Thomas called Didymus, and Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, and the sons of Zebedee, and two other of his disciples. Simon Peter saith unto

them : I gô a fishing. They say unto him : We alsô go with thee. They went forth, and entered into a ship immediately : and that night thêy caught nothing. But when the morning was now come, Jesus stood on the shore : but the disciples knew not that it was Jesus. Then Jesus saith unto them : Children, † have ye âny meat? They answered him : No. And he said unto them : Cast the net on the right side of the ship, ând ye shall find. They cast therefore : and now they were not able to draw it for the multitûde of fishes. Therefore that disciple whom Jesus loved saith unto Peter : It is the Lord. Now when Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he girt his fisher's coat unto him (for he was naked,) and did cast himself into the sea. And the other disciples came in a little ship ; (for they were not far from land, but as it were two hundred cubits,) dragging the nêt with fishes. As soon then as they were come to land, they saw a fire of coals there, and fish laid thêreon, and bread. Jesus saith unto them : Bring of the fish which yê have now caught. Simon Peter went up, and drew the net to land full of great fishes, an hundred and fifty and three. And for all there were so many, yet was not thê net broken. Jesus said unto thêm : Come and dine. And none of the disciples durst ask him : † Whô art thou? knowing that it was the Lord. Jesus then cometh, and taketh bread, and giveth them, ând fish likewise. This is now the third time that Jesus shewed himself to his disciples after that he was risen frôm the dead. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 78. The Lord opened the doors of heaven : and rained down manna also upon them for to eat : he gave them bread from heaven : so man did eat Angels' food, alleluia.

SECRET.

WE offer unto thee, O Lord, the sacrifice of our Paschal gladness : whereby thou dost wondrously bestow upon thy Church her food and sustenance. Through.

COMMUNION. *Rom.* 6. Christ being raised from the dead, dieth no more, alleluia : death hath no more dominion over him, alleluia, alleluia.

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE beseech thee, O Lord : that we, being cleansed from the corruption of our former nature, may by the devout receiving of this holy Sacrament be transformed into a new creature. Who livest and reignest with the Father.

THURSDAY IN EASTER WEEK

Station at the Church of the Holy Apostles.

INTROIT. *Victricem manum. Wisdom*

COLLECT.

The 2nd Prayer, for the Church, as in Seasonal Prayers, after Low Sunday.

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts.* 8. 26.

IN those days : The Angel of the Lord spake unto Philip, saying : Arise, and go toward the south, unto the way that goeth down from Jerusalem unto Gaza : which is desert. And he arose and went. And, behold, a man of Ethiopia, an eunuch of great authority under Candace queen of the Ethiopians, who had the charge of all her treasure, and had come to Jerusalem for to worship : was returning, and sitting in his chariot read Esaias the Prophet. Then the Spirit said unto Philip : Go near, and join thyself to this chariot. And Philip ran thither to him, and heard him read the Prophet Esaias, and said : † Understandest thou what thou readest? And he said : How can I, † except some man should guide me? And he desired Philip that he would come up and sit with him. The place of the Scripture which he read was this : He was led as a sheep to the slaughter : and like a lamb dumb before his shearer, so opened he not his mouth. In his humiliation his judgement was taken away. † And who shall declare his generation? for his

life is taken from the earth. And the eunuch answered Philip, and said : I pray thee, † of whom speaketh the Prôphet this? of himself, † or of some ôther man? Then Philip opened his mouth, and began at the same Scripture, and preached unto him Jesus. And as they went on their way, they came unto ■ certain water : and the eunuch said : See, here is water : † what doth hinder me to be bâptizèd? And Philip said : If thou believest with all thine heart, thou mayest. And he answered and said : I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. And he commanded the chariot to stand still : and they went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch, and he baptized him. And when they were come up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord caught away Philip, that the eunuch saw him no more. And he went on his way rejoicing. But Philip was found at Azotus : and passing through he preached in all the cities, till he came to Caesarea, the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 118. This is the day which the Lord hath made : we will rejoice and be glad in it. V. The same stone which the builders refused, is become the head-stone in the corner : this is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes.

Alleluia, alleluia. V. Christ is risen, who created all things : and hath had compassion on the human race.

St. John 20. 11.

AT that time : Mary stood without at the sepulchre weeping. And as she wept, she stooped down, and looked into the sepulchre : and seeth two Angels in white sitting, the one at the head, and the other at the feet, where the body of Jêsus had lain. And they say unto her : Woman, † why wêepest thou? She saith unto them : Because they have taken away my Lord : and I know not where thêy have laid him. And when she had thus said, she turned herself back, and saw Jesus standing : and knew not that it was Jesus. Jesus saith unto her : Woman, † why wêepest thou? † whom sêekest thou? She, supposing him to be the gardener, saith unto him : Sir, if thou have borne him hence, tell me where thou hast laid him : and I will tâke him away. Jesus saith untô her : Mary. She turned herself, and saith unto him : Rabboni (which is tô say, Master). Jesus saith unto her : Touch me not, for I am not yet ascended to my Father ; but go to my brethren, and say unto them : I ascend unto my Father, and your Father : and to my Gôd, and your God. Mary Magdalene came and told the disciples : that she had seen the Lord, and that he had spoken thêse things unto her. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Exod.* 13. In the day of your festivity, saith the Lord, I will bring you into a land flowing with milk and honey, alleluia.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to accept the oblations of thy people : that being made regenerate, by baptism and the confession of thy Name, they may attain to everlasting felicity. Through.

COMMUNION. I *St. Peter* 2. 9. Ye are a peculiar people, that ye should shew forth his praises, alleluia : who hath called you out of darkness into his marvellous light, alleluia.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OR Lord, we pray thee, mercifully to hear our prayers : that this holy Sacrament of our redemption may obtain for us thy succour in this present life, and bring us to the gladness of life everlasting. Through.

FRIDAY IN EASTER WEEK

*Station at St. Mary of the Martyrs (in the Pantheon).*INTROIT. *Eduxit eos. Ps. 78.*

THE Lord hath brought them out safely, alleluia : and overwhelmed their enemies with the sea, alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. *Ps. ibid.* Hear my law, O my people : incline your ears unto the words of my mouth. *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who hast bestowed on us this Paschal Sacrament, for a pledge of our redemption : grant, we beseech thee ; that those things which we observe in our outward profession we may effectually imitate within our souls. Through.

The 2nd Prayer, for the Church, as in Seasonal Prayers, after Low Sunday.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Peter the Apostle.

I *Peter* 3. 18.

DEARLY beloved : Christ hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the Spirit. By which also he went and preached unto the spirits in prison : which sometime were disobedient, when once the long-suffering of God waited in the days of Noah, while the ark was a preparing, wherein few, that is, eight souls were saved by water. The like figure whereunto even baptism doth also now save us : not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God by the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, who is gone into heaven, and is on the right hand of God.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OR, we pray thee, mercifully to have respect untô thy people : and as thou hast vouchsafed to renew them with thine everlasting mysteriês ; so of thy goodness deliver them from guilt in all things temporal. Through.

Station at St. John Lateran.

THE Lord hath brought forth his people with joy, alleluia : and his chosen with gladness, alleluia, alleluia. *Ps. ibid.* O give thanks unto the Lord, and call upon his Name : tell the people what things he hath done. *℟.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we who have devoutly kept this Paschal Festivâl, may thereby be found worthy to attain to everlasting felicity. Through.

The 2nd Prayer, for the Church, as in Seasonal Prayers, after Low Sunday.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Peter the Apostle.

I St. Peter 2. 1.

DEARLY beloved : Wherefore, laying aside all malice, and all guile, and hypocrisies, and envies, and all evil speakings, as new-born babes, desire the sincere milk of the word, that ye may grow thereby : if so be ye have tasted that the Lord is gracious. To whom coming, as unto a living stone, disallowed indeed of men, but chosen of God, and precious : ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ. Wherefore also it is contained in the Scripture : Behold, I lay in Sion a chief corner stone, elect, precious : and he that believeth on him shall not be confounded. Unto

you therefore which believe he is precious : but unto them which be disobedient, the stone which the builders disallowed, the same is made the head of the corner, and a stone of stumbling, and a rock of offence, even to them which stumble at the word, being disobedient ; whereunto also they were appointed. But ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people : that ye should shew forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvellous light. Which in time past were not a people, but are now the people of God : which had not obtained mercy, but now have obtained mercy.

§ *From to-day until the Octave of Pentecost, both in the Office of the Season and in that of the Saints, the Gradual is not said : but in its place are said two versicles with four Alleluias, in the order below : except in Masses of the Rogation Days, and of the Vigil of Pentecost, in which is said one Alleluia, with one versicle: similarly also after any Lesson on Ember Saturday after Pentecost. At other times up to Septuagesima, when the Gradual is said, three Alleluias are said after the Gradual, two before the V. and one after the V.: but when the Sequence is said, the Alleluia which should be said after the V. is said after the Sequence.*

Alleluia, alleluia. V. Ps. 118. This is the day which the Lord hath made : we will rejoice and be glad in it. Alleluia. V. Ps. 113. Praise the Lord, ye servants, O praise the Name of the Lord.

St. John 20. 1.

AT that time : On the first day of the week, cometh Mary Magdalene early, when it was yet dark, unto the sepulchre : and seeth the stone taken away from the sepulchre. Then she runneth, and cometh to Simon Peter, and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and saith unto them : They have taken away the Lord out of the sepulchre, and we know not where they have laid him. Peter therefore went forth, and that other disciple, and came to the sepulchre. So they ran both together ; and the other disciple did outrun Peter, and came first to the sepulchre. And he stooping down, and looking in, saw the linen clothes lying ; yet went he not in. Then cometh Simon Peter following him, and went into the sepulchre, and seeth the linen clothes lie ; and the napkin, that was about his head, not lying with the linen clothes, but wrapped together in a place by itself. Then went in also that other disciple which came first to the sepulchre ; and he saw, and believed : for as yet they knew not the Scripture, that he must rise again from the dead. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. Ps. 118. Blessed is he that cometh in the Name of the Lord : we have wished you good luck, ye that are of the house of the Lord : God is the Lord, who hath shewed us light, alleluia, alleluia.

SECRET.

GRANT, we pray thee, O Lord, that we may ever so rejoice in these thy Paschal Mysteries : that the continual operation of the work of our redemption, may effectually bring us unto gladness everlasting. Through.

COMMUNION. *Gal. 3.* As many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ, alleluia.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OLORD, who hast quickened us with the gift of our redemption : we beseech thee that this means of everlasting salvation may avail for our advancement in true faith in thee. Through.

Station at St. Pancras. Collect 1549.

INTROIT. *Quasi modo.* 1 *St. Peter 2.*

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed John the Apostle.

1 *St. John 5. 4.*

DEARLY beloved : Whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world : and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith. Who is he that overcometh the world, † but he that believeth that Jesus is the Son of God? This is he that came by water and blood, even Jesus Christ : not by water only, but by water and blood. And it is the Spirit that beareth witness, because the Spirit is truth. For there are three that bear witness, the Spirit, and the water, and the blood : and these three agree in one. If we receive the witness of men, the witness of God is greater : for this is the witness of God, which he hath testified of his Son. He that believeth on the Son of God hath the witness in himself : he that believeth not God hath made him a liar, because he believeth not the record that God gave of his Son. And this is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life ; and this life is in his Son. He that hath the Son hath life ; and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣. St. Matt. 28.* In the day of my Resurrection, saith the Lord, I will go before you into Galilee. Alleluia. *℣. St. John 20.* After eight days, the doors being shut,

Jesus stood in the midst of his disciples, and said : Peace be unto you. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 20. 19.

THE same day at evening, being the first day of the week ; When the doors were shut, where the disciples were assembled for fear of the Jews : Came Jesus and stood in the midst, and saith unto them : Peace bê unto you. And when he had so said, he shewed unto them his hânds and his side. Then were the disciples glad when thêy saw the Lord. Then said Jesus to them again : Peace bê unto you. As my Father hath sent me, even sô send I you. And when he had said this, he breathed on them, and saith unto them : Receive ye thê Holy Ghost. Whosoever sins ye remit, they are remittêd unto them ; and whosoever sins ye retain, thêy are retainêd. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *St. Matt. 28.* The Angel of the Lord descended from heaven, and said unto the women : He whom ye seek is risen, as he said, alleluia.

SECRET.

ACCEPT, O Lord, we pray thee, the gifts which in her gladness the Church doth offer unto thee : that they on whom thou hast bestowed the cause of so great a gladness may thereby be profited unto everlasting felicity. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. John 20.* Reach hither thy hand, and behold the print of the nails, alleluia : and be not faithless but believing, alleluia, alleluia.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, we beseech thêe, O Lord our God : that these holy mysteries which thou hast given unto us for the assurance of our salvation, may both in this life and that which is to come be profitable unto us for the healing of our souls. Through.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that by the bountiful goodness of thy mercy, and by the intercession of blessed Mary Ever-Virgin, these our

oblations may be acceptable in thy sight : that we being delivered in this present life from all adversities may obtain in that which is to come peace everlasting. Through.

DEFEND, O Lord, we pray thee, us thy servants : that we, cleaving fast to things heavenly, may faithfully serve thee both in body and soul. Through.

ALMIGHTY GOD, who hast given thine only Son to be unto us both a sacrifice for sin, and also an ensample of godly life : give us grace that we may always most thankfully receive that his inestimable benefit, and also daily endeavour ourselves to follow the blessed steps of his most holy life. Through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. [Who.]

Seasonal Prayers as given after Low Sunday.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Peter the Apostle. *1 St. Peter 2. 19.*

DEARLY beloved : This is thankworthy, if a man for conscience toward God endure grief, suffering wrongfully. For what glory is it, if when ye be buffeted for your faults, ye shall take it patiently? but if when ye do well and suffer for it ye take it patiently, this is acceptable with God. For even hereunto were ye called : because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow his steps. Who did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth : who when he was reviled, reviled not again : when he suffered, he threatened not ; but committed himself to him that judgeth righteously : who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree : that we being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness : by whose stripes ye were healed. For ye were as sheep going astray, but are now returned unto the Shepherd, and Bishop of your souls.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V. St. Luke 24.* The disciples knew the Lord Jesus in

the breaking of bread. Alleluia. *V. St. John* 10. I am the Good Shepherd : and know my sheep, and am known of mine. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 10. 11.

AT that time : Jesus said : I am the Good Shepherd. The Good Shepherd giveth his life for the sheep. But he that is an hireling, and not the shepherd, whose own the sheep are not, seeth the wolf coming, and leaveth the shêep, and fleeth ; and the wolf catcheth them, and scattêreth the sheep ; the hireling fleeth, because he is an hireling, and careth nôt for the sheep. I am the Good Shepherd ; and know my sheep, and am known of mine, even as the Father knoweth me, and I knôw the Father ; and I lay down my life for the sheep. And other sheep I have, which are nôt of this fold ; them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice ; and there shall be one flock, and one Shepherd. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 63. O God, thou art my God, early will I seek thee : and I will lift up my hands in thy Name, alleluia.

SECRET.

WE pray thee, O Lord, that this holy oblation may ever obtain for us thy heavenly blessing : that those things which we shew forth in an outward mystery may effectually be accomplished in our inward souls. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. John* 10. I am the Good Shepherd, alleluia : and know my

sheep, and am known of mine, alleluia, alleluia.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we receiving the quickening of thy grâce, may ever glory in the gift which thou bestowest. Through.

THIRD SUNDAY AFTER EASTER

INTROIT. *Jubilate Deo. Ps.* 66.

BE joyful in God, all ye lands, alleluia : sing praises unto the honour of his Name, alleluia : make his praise to be glorious, alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. *Ps. ibid.* Say unto God, O how wonderful art thou in thy works, O Lord : through the greatness of thy power shall thine enemies be found liars unto thee. *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY GOD, who shewest to them that are in error the light of thy truth, to the intent that they may return into the way of righteousness : grant unto all those who are admitted into the fellowship of Christ's Religion that they may avoid those things that are contrary to their profession, and follow all such things as are agreeable to the same. Through our Lord Jesus Christ. [Thy Sôn. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.]

Seasonal Prayers as given after Low Sunday.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Peter the Apostle.

1 *St. Peter* 2. 11.

DEARLY beloved ; I beseech you as strangers and pilgrims abstain from fleshly lusts, which war against the soul, having your conversation honest among the Gentiles : that, whereas they speak against you as evildoers, they may, by your good works which they shall behold, glorify God in the day of visitation. Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake : whether it be to the king, as supreme, or unto governours, as unto them that are sent by him for the punishment of evildoers, and for the praise of them that do well : for so is the will of God, that with well-doing ye may put to silence the ignorance of foolish men : as free, and not using your liberty for a cloke of maliciousness, but as the servants of God. Honour all men : love the brotherhood : fear God : honour the king.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣. Ps. III.* The Lord hath sent redemption unto his people. Alleluia. *℣. St. Luke 24.* Ought not Christ to have suffered these things : and to enter into his glory? Alleluia.

AT that time : Jesus said to his disciples : A little while and ye shall not see me ; and again a little while, and ye shall see me : because I go tô the Father. Then said some of his disciples among themselves : What is this, that he saith unto us : A little while, and ye shall not see me : and again, a little while, and ye shall see

me, and, ‡ because I go to the Father? They said therefore : What is this, that he saith : ‡ A little while? we cannot tell, what he saith. Now Jesus knew, that they were desirous to ask him and said unto them : Do ye inquire among yourselves of that I said : A little while, and ye shall not see me : and again a little while, ‡ and ye shall see me? Verily, verily I say unto you : that ye shall weep, and lament, but the world shall rejoice ; and ye shall be sorrowful, but your sorrow shall be turned into joy. A woman, when she is in travail, hath sorrow, because her hour is come ; but as soon as she is delivered of the child, she remembereth no more the anguish, for joy that a man is born into the world. And ye now therefore have sorrow, but I will see you again, and your heart shall rejoice : and your joy no man taketh from you. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 146.* Praise the Lord, O my soul : while I live will I praise the Lord : yea, as long as I have any being, I will sing praises unto my God, alleluia.

SECRET.

OLORD, we pray thee, that from these mysteries we may obtain such succour of thy grace, that refraining ourselves from the desire of all things earthly, we may learn to love all such things as are heavenly. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. John 16.* A little while, and ye shall not see me, alleluia : and again a little while, and ye shall see me, because I go to the Father, alleluia, alleluia.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O LORD our God, who hast made us partakers of this hōly Sacrament : grant, we beseech .hêe ; that we may be thereby inwardly satisfied with heavenly food, and outwardly defended against all adversities. Through.

Through Jesus Christ our Lōrd. [Who.]

Seasonal Prayers as given after Low Sunday.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed James the Apostle.

St. James. 1. 17.

DEARLY beloved : Every good gift, and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the

Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning. Of his own will begat he us with the word of truth, that we should be a kind of first-fruits of his creatures. Wherefore, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath. For the wrath of man worketh not the righteousness of God. Wherefore lay apart all filthiness, and superfluity of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save your souls.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V. Ps. 118.* The right hand of the Lord hath the pre-eminence : the right hand of the Lord bringeth mighty things to pass. Alleluia. *V. Rom. 6, 9.* Christ being raised from the dead dieth no more : death hath no more dominion over him. Alleluia.

St. John 16. 5.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : Now I go my way to him that sent me : and none of you asketh me : ‡ Whither gōest thou? But because I have said these things unto you, sorrow hath fillèd your heart. Nevertheless, I tēll you the truth ; it is expedient for you that I go away ; for if I go not away, the Comforter will not come unto you : but if I depart, I will send him unto you. And when he is come, he will reprove the world of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgement. Of sin, because they believe not on me ; of righteousness, because I go to my Father, and ye sêe me no more ; of

judgement, because the prince of this world is judged. I have yet many things to say unto you, but ye cannot bear them now. Howbeit, when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth. For he shall not speak of himself : but whatsoever he shall hear, that shall he speak, and he will shew you things to come. He shall glorify me : for he shall receive of mine, and shall shew it unto you. All things that the Father hath, are mine. Therefore said I : that he shall take of mine, and shall shew it unto you. *The Creed is said.*

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed James the Apostle.

St. James. I. 22.

DEARLY beloved : Be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves. For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer : he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass : for he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth, what man-

ner of man he was. But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work : this man shall be blessed in his deed. If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain. THE GREATER AND LESSER LITANIES

On St. Mark the Evangelist's Day, or on Easter Tuesday when St. Mark's Day occurs on Easter Day, the Station was at St. Peter's and on the Lesser Litanies before Ascension Day, the Stations were: on Rogation Monday at St. Mary Major's; on Tuesday at St. John Lateran's; on Wednesday at St. Peter's.

[The observance of the Rogation or Greater and Lesser Litany Days (i.e., April 25th or St. Mark's Day and the other three Rogation Days) was of prime importance to the Church when all understood, as few do today, that human sustenance must be wrung from the earth itself by the labour of man, and that it is accomplished only by God's blessing on man's labours (which are thus recognized as ordained by God to be carried on according to his law of justice). The Latin Rubrics reflect this concern that the "Rogation liturgy" (which is an entity in itself, consisting of a processional Litany, with blessings of the fields, followed by the penitential Mass of the Rogations, and of necessity celebrated in addition to the Office and Mass of the day) should be maintained in its fullness or, if this be impossible, should be carried out as far as may be.]

The following Mass is intended to be sung on the Greater and Lesser Rogation Days in connection with the Procession, without Commem. of an Occurrence and without the Creed, even on a Sunday, with this exception: such a Commem. is

not to be omitted if a Conventual Mass be said in Choir of a I or II Class Double or of the Easter Octave occurring on that day.

But if only one Mass be celebrated, and that Mass be of the Procession, it should be of the Rogation with a Commem. of the Occurrence, when there is one, unless the Commem. be of a I Class Double [or of a Prayer-Book Feast of Observance], in which case only a Commem. is made of the Rogations.

On the other hand, the Rogations are commemorated in all private Masses, except Requiems, and even in all sung Masses unless a sung or Conventual Mass of the Rogations be also celebrated.

The foregoing directions explain the general rules. Where the liturgy can be maintained in its fullness, it is arranged as follows:

On Rogation Monday, if it be a Feria or a Day within a common Octave, even if there be no Procession, the Conventual Mass is of the Rogations; if it be a Double or Semidouble, two Conventual Masses are said; but private Masses may be said either of the Feast or Feria.

On Rogation Tuesday, if it be a Feria, the Mass of the Rogations is said (without the Gloria in excelsis even though the Te Deum have been said at Matins); if it be a Feast, even a Simple, Mass is of the Feast with a Commem. of the Rogations, unless there be a Procession, in which case the general directions above are to be followed.

On Rogation Wednesday, Mass is of the Vigil with a Commem. of the Rogations, unless there be a Procession, in which case the general directions above are to be followed.

INTROIT. *Exaudivit. Ps. 18.*

HE hath heard my voice out of his holy temple, alleluia : and my complaint hath come before him, it hath entered even into his ears, alleluia, alleluia. *Ps. ibid.* I will love thee, O Lord, my strength : the Lord is my stony rock, and my defence, and my Saviour. *℟.* Glory be.

At this Mass Gloria in excelsis and the Creed are not said.

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we who in all our troubles and adversities do put our trust and confidence in thy mercy, may ever be defended by thy mighty power. Through.

Seasonal Prayers as given after Low Sunday. [But Note the Proper Prayers (Number 26) in Various Prayers provided by the Prayer-Book for Rogationtide.]

DEARLY beloved : Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed : the effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much. Luke 24. 49.

AT that time : Jesus said : Behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you : but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem, until ye be endued with powêr from on high. And he led them out as far as to Bethany, and he lifted up his hands, and blessed them. And it came to pass, while he blessed them, he was parted from them, and carried up into heaven. And they worshipped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy : and were continually in the temple, praising and blessing God.

On the Octave Day of the Ascension Mass is said as on the day, with one Collect only, unless a simple Feast occur, or one treated as such.

Station at St. John Lateran.

FOR THE BLESSING OF THE FONT

The Office having been said, the Priest and ministers, vested in violet, go up to the Altar, and after the reverence, the Priest kisses it in the centre. Then are read the Prophecies without title, the candles of the Altar being unlighted up to the beginning of the Mass, as on Holy Saturday. The Priest reads them with the subdued voice at the Epistle horn of the Altar. At the end of the Prophecies are said the Collects without. Let us bow the knee.

[*In the Sarum Use was said only the 1st, 3rd, 4th, and 5th Prophecies indicated below.*]

§ PROPHECY THE FIRST. *Gen. 22. 1-19.* In those days : God did tempt Abraham. *As on Holy Saturday, Prophecy 3.*

Which ended, the Priest says:

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O GOD, who in the works of Abraham thy servant hast sanctified a pattern of obedience to all mankind : grant us so to conquer the perversity of our desires, that we may in all things fulfil the righteousness of thy commandments. Through.

PROPHECY THE SECOND. *Exod. 14. 24 to 15. 1.* In those days : It came to pass that in the morning watch. *As on Holy Saturday, Prophecy 4, with the Tract, We will sing unto the Lord.*

Let us pray. COLLECT.

§ PROPHECY THE THIRD. *Deut. 31. 22-30.* In those days : Moses therefore wrote this song. *As on Holy Saturday, Prophecy 11, with the Tract, Give ear, O ye heavens.*

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O GOD, who art the glory of the faithful and the life of the righteous ; who likewise by Moses thy servant hast taught us to sing songs of praise unto thee : accomplish in all nations the work of thy mercy, granting them felicity, and delivering them from all terror : that those things which were uttered for a warning of thy vengeance may be made profitable for our healing unto life everlasting. Through.

§ PROPHECY THE FOURTH. *Isaiah 4. 1-6.* And in that day seven women shall take hold of one man. *As on Holy Saturday, Prophecy 8, with the Tract, My well-beloved hath a vineyard.*

Let us pray. COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who in thine only-begotten Son hast revealed thyself to be the husbandman of thy Church, who dost mercifully purge every branch that bringeth forth fruit in the true vine, even the same Christ thy Son, to the intent that it may bring forth more fruit : we pray thee that the thorns and briars of sin may not prevail against thy faithful people, whom by the waters of baptism thou hast brought like a vine out of Egypt; that being confirmed by the sanctifying power of thy Holy Spirit, they may evermore bring forth fruit in abundance. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

§ PROPHECY THE FIFTH. *Baruch 3. 9-37.* Hear, Israel, the commandments of life. *As on Holy Saturday, Prophecy 6.*

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O GOD, who by the mouths of thy prophets hast commanded us to leave behind us all things temporal, and to strive earnestly after things eternal : grant that we thy servants, knowing those things thou commandest, by thy heavenly inspiration may be enabled to perform the same. Through.

PROPHECY THE SIXTH. *Ezech. 37. 1-14.* In those days : The hand of the Lord was upon me. *As on Holy Saturday, Prophecy 7.*

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O LORD GOD OF HOSTS, who restorest those things that are broken down, and preservest those things that thou restorest : increase, we pray thee, the peoples that shall be regenerated in the sanctification of thy Name ; that they that are washed in the waters of baptism may in all things be guided by thy inspiration. Through.

§ *These ended, the Celebrant puts on a violet Cope, and, while he descends to the font, the following is sung :*

TRACT. *Ps. 42.* Like as the hart desireth the water-brooks : so longeth my soul after thee, O God. V. My soul is athirst for the living God : when shall I come to appear before the presence of God? V. My tears have been my meat day and night, while they daily say unto me : Where is now thy God?

Then the Priest, before he enters the Baptistry to bless the font, says :

V. The Lord be with you. R. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we which here observe the day whereon thou didst send forth thy Holy Spirit, may in such wise be influenced with heavenly desires that we may ever thirst for the waters of life. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

Then he proceeds to bless the font, as on Holy Saturday.

§ *But where there is no baptismal Font, when the last Prophecy and Collect is ended the Celebrant lays aside his chasuble, and with the Ministers lies prostrate before the Altar: and all kneeling, the LITANY IS CHANTED by two Cantors in the midst of the Choir, and both sides of the Choir make the responses together. But when has been said the final repetition of R. Good Lord, deliver us, the Priest and Ministers arise, and go to the Sacristy to array themselves in red vestments for the Solemn Mass; and meanwhile the Altar candles are lighted. At the end of the Litany Kyrie eleison is solemnly intoned, and repeated as usual. And this having been begun, the Priest with the Ministers proceeds to the Altar, and makes the Confession: then, going up, he kisses the Altar, and incenses it in the accustomed way. The Kyrie eleison being finished, Gloria in excelsis is solemnly begun, and the bells are rung.*

AT THE MASS

§ *In private Masses of this Vigil, the Prophecies, Collects, and Litany are omitted, and the Mass begins at once with the following Introit :*

INTROIT. *Cum sanctificatus. Ezech. 36.*

WHEN I shall be sanctified in you before their eyes, I will gather you out of all countries : then will I sprinkle clean water upon you, and ye shall be clean from all your filthiness, and a new spirit will I put within you, alleluia, alleluia. *Ps. 34.* I will alway give thanks unto the Lord : his praise shall ever be in my mouth. *℣.* Glory be.

Then is said the Kyrie eleison, and Gloria in excelsis.

℣. The Lord be with you. *℟.* And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God, that the splendour of thy glory may in such wise shine fôrth upon us : that the brightness of thy light may by the illumination of thy Holy Spirit, strengthen the hearts of them which through thy grace are born again. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

This Collect only is said, even though a Commem. were made in the Office.

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts. 19. 1.*

IN those days : It came to pass that while Apollos was at Corinth, Paul having passed through the upper coasts came to Ephesus : and finding certain disciples, he said unto them : † Have ye received the Holy Ghost since ye bélievèd? And they said unto him : We have not so much as heard whether there be any Holy Ghost. And he said unto them : † Unto what

then were ye bâptizèd? And they said : Unto John's baptism. Then said Paul : John verily baptized with the baptism of repentance, saying unto the people : That they should believe on him which should come after him, that is, on Christ Jesus. When they heard this, they were baptized in the Name of the Lord Jesus. And when Paul had laid his hands upon them, the Holy Ghost came on them ; and they spake with tongues, and prophesied. And all the men were about twelve. And he went into the synagogue, and spake boldly for the space of three months, disputing and persuading the things concerning the kingdom of God.

Alleluia. *℣.* *Ps. 107.* O give thanks unto the Lord, for he is gracious : and his mercy endureth for ever.

Alleluia is not repeated, but there immediately follows:

TRACT. *Ps. 117.* O praise the Lord, all ye heathen : praise him all ye nations. *℣.* For his merciful kindness is ever more and more towards us : and the truth of the Lord endureth for ever.

At the Gospel, lights are not carried, but incense only.

WE humbly beseech thee, O Lord, that thou wouldest send down upon our hearts the healthful Spirit of thy grace: and, that we may bring forth fruit unto thee, pour upon us the inward dew of his blessing. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

Double of I Class with Privileged Octave I.

Station at St. Peter's. Gospel lengthened 1549.

INTROIT. *Spiritus Domini. Wisdom* 1.

THE Spirit of the Lord hath filled the whole world, alleluia: and that which containeth all things hath knowledge of the voice, alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. *Ps.* 68. Let God arise, and let his enemies be scattered: let them also that hate him flee before him. *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who as at this time didst teach the hearts of thy faithful people, by sending to them the light of thy Holy Spirit: grant us by the same Spirit to have a right judgement in all things, and evermore to rejoice in his holy comfort. Through the merits of Christ Jesus our Saviour.

Who liveth and reigneth with thee, in the unity of the same Spirit, ône God, world without end.

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts. 2. 1.*

WHEN the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place : and suddenly there came a sound from heaven, as of a rushing mighty wind : and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues, like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them : and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. And there were dwelling at Jerusalem Jews, devout men, out of every nation under heaven. Now when this was noised abroad, the multitude came together, and were confounded, because that every man heard them speak in his own language. And they were all amazed, and marvelled, saying one to another : Behold, † are not all these which speak Galileans? ‡ And how hear we every man in our own tongue wherein wê were born? The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians. I Cor. 12. 4.

BRETHREN : Now there are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit. And there are differences of administrations, but the same Lord. And there are diversities of operations, but it is the same God which worketh all in all. But the manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man to profit withal. For to one is given by the Spirit the word of wisdom; to another the word of knowledge by the same Spirit ; to another faith by the same Spirit ; to another the gifts of healing by the same Spirit ; to another the working of miracles ; to another prophecy; to another discerning of spirits; to another divers kinds of tongues ; to another

the interpretation of tongues : but all these worketh that one and the self-same Spirit, dividing to every man severally as he will. For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body : so also is Christ. For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free ; and have been all made to drink into one Spirit. For the body is not one member, but many.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 11. 9.

AT that time : Jesus said to his disciples : Ask, and it shall bê given you ; seek, and ye shall find ; knock, and it shall be openèd unto you. For every one that askêth receiveth ; and he that sêeketh findeth ; and to him that knocketh it shall bê openèd. If a son shall ask bread of any of you that is a father, † will he give him a stone? or if he ask a fish, † will he for a fish give him â serpent? or if he shall ask an egg, † will he offer him a scôrpiôn? If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children : how much more shall your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to thêem that ask him?

§ *Within the Octave of Pentecost no Office of any double or semidouble Feast is said, but double Feasts which can be transferred are celebrated after the Octave. Of double Feasts which cannot be transferred, Semidoubles, and Simples, after the first three days a Commemoration only is made.*

Through Jesus Christ our Lōrd. Who with thee and the same Holy Spirit liveth and reigneth, ône God, world without end.

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts 10. 34.*

IN those days : Then Peter opened his mouth, and said . Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons ; but in every nation he that feareth him, and worketh righteousness, is accepted with him. The word which God sent unto the children of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ ; (he is Lord of all ;) that word, I say, ye know, which was published throughout all Judaea, and began from Galilee, after the baptism which John preached : how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost, and

with power : who went about doing good, and healing all that were oppressed with the devil ; for God was with him. And we are witnesses of all things which he did both in the land of the Jews, and in Jerusalem ; whom they slew and hanged on a tree : him God raised up the third day, and shewed him openly ; not to all the people ; but unto witnesses chosen before of God ; even to us who did eat and drink with him after he rose from the dead. And he commanded us to preach unto the people : and to testify that it is he which was ordained of God to be the Judge of quick and dead. To him give all the Prophets witness, that through his Name whosoever believeth in him shall receive remission of sins. While Peter yet spake these words, the Holy Ghost fell on all them which heard the word. And they of the circumcision, which believed, were astonished, as many as came with Peter : because that on the Gentiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Ghost. For they heard them speak with tongues, and magnify God. Then answered Peter : Can any man forbid water, that these should not be baptized, † which have received the Holy Ghost as well as we? And he commanded them to be baptized in the Name of the Lord. Then prayed they him to tarry certain days.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣.* *Acts 2.* The Apostles spake with divers tongues the wonderful works of God, alleluia. (*Here genuflect.*) *℣.* Come, Holy Ghost, and fill the hearts of thy faithful people : and kindle in them the fire of thy love.

St. John 3. 16.

AT that time ; Jesus said unto Nicodemus : God so loved the world, that he gave his only-begotten Son : that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have evêrlasting life. For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through him might be savèd. He that believeth on him is nôt condemnèd : but he that believeth not is condemned already : because he hath not believed in the Name of the only-begottên Son of God. And this is the condemnation : that light is come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light : because their dêeds were evil. For every one that doeth evil hateth the light, neither cometh to the light, lest his deeds should bê reprovèd ; but he that doeth truth cometh to the light, that his deeds may be made manifest, that they are wrôught in God. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 18.* The Lord thundered out of heaven, and the Highest gave his thunder : and the springs of water were seen, alleluia.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, graciously to sanctify these our gifts : that, by the acceptable offering of our spiritual sacrifice, we may ourselves be rendered an everlasting oblation unto thee. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. John 14.* The Holy Ghost shall teach you, alleluia : whatsoever I have said unto you, alleluia, alleluia.

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to assist thy people : that they, on whom thou hast bestowed thy heavenly mysteriês, may by thee be defended from all the assaults of their enemies. Through.

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts 8. 14.*

IN those days : When the Apostles, which were at Jerusalem, heard that Samaria had received the word of God,

they sent unto them Peter and John. Who, when they were come down, prayed for them, that they might receive the Holy Ghost : for as yet he was fallen upon none of them, only they were baptized in the Name of the Lord Jesus. Then laid they their hands on them, and they received the Holy Ghost.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V. St. John 15.* The Holy Ghost shall teach you, whatsoever I have said unto you. Alleluia. (*Here genuflect.*) *V.* Come, Holy Ghost, and fill the hearts of thy faithful people : and kindle in them the fire of thy love.

But he that entereth in by the door is the shephêrd of the sheep. To him the porter openeth, and the shêep hear his voice ; and he calleth his own sheep by name, and lêadeth them out. And, when he putteth forth his own sheep, he goeth before them : and the sheep follow him, for thêy know his voice. And a stranger will they not follow, but will flee from him : for they know not the vôiçe of strangers. This parable spake Jesûs unto them. For these are not drunken, as ye suppose, seeing it is but the third hour of the day : but this is that which was spoken by the prophet Joel : And it shall come to pass in the last days, (saith God,) I will pour out of my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. And on my servants and on my handmaidens I will pour out in those days of my Spirit, and they shall prophesy :

and I will shew wonders in heaven above, and signs in the earth beneath ; blood, and fire, and vapour of smoke. The sun shall be turned into darkness, and the moon into blood, before that great and notable day of the Lord come. And it shall come to pass : that whosoever shall call on the Name of the Lord shall be saved.

Alleluia. *℣.* *Ps. 33.* By the word of the Lord were the heavens made, and all the hosts of them by the Breath of his mouth.

Here is said Gloria in excelsis, and then ℣. The Lord be with you. Let us pray.

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, almighty and merciful God : that the Holy Ghost descending on us may by his gracious indwelling render us a temple of his glory. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

§ *From today until Saturday inclusive, is said only one Seasonal Prayer after the Prayer of the day, to wit, the Prayer for the Church, as given after Low Sunday. [Or on the Ember Days may be said Collect 15, from Various Prayers.]*

If a simple Feast occur, or a Feast reduced to the form of a Simple, the Collect for the Church is omitted.

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts 5. 12.*

IN those days : By the hands of the Apostles were many signs and wonders wrought among the people. And they were all with one accord in Solomon's porch. And of the rest durst

no man join himself to them : but the people magnified them. And believers were the more added to the Lord, multitudes both of men and women, insomuch that they brought forth the sick into the streets, and laid them on beds and couches, that at the least the shadow of Peter passing by might overshadow some of them. There came also a multitude out of the cities round about unto Jerusalem, bringing sick folks, and them which were vexed with unclean spirits : and they were healed every one.

And the people with one accord gave heed unto those things which Philip spake, hearing and seeing the miracles which he did. For unclean spirits, crying with loud voice, came out of many that were possessed with them. And many taken with palsies, and that were lame, were healed. And there was great joy in that city.

And the floors shall be full of wheat, and the fats shall overflow with wine and oil. And immediately he rose up before them, and took up that whereon he lay : and departed to his own house, glorifying God. And they were all amazed, and they glorified God, and were filled with fear, saying : We have seen strange things to-day. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 146. Praise the Lord, O my soul : while I live will I praise the Lord : yea, as long as I have any being, I will sing praises unto my God, alleluia.

SECRET.

O LORD, who by thy Holy Spirit didst kindle the hearts of the disciples of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord : grant, we pray thee, that the same heavenly fire may consume the sacrifice which we offer in thy sight. Through the same . . . in the unity of the same.

And also upon the servants and upon the handmaids in those days will I pour out my Spirit. And I will shew wonders in the heavens and in the earth, blood, and fire, and pillars of smoke. The sun shall be turned into darkness, and the moon into blood : before the great and the terrible day of the Lord come. And it shall come to pass : that whosoever shall call on the Name of the Lord shall be delivered.

The LESSON from the Book of Leviticus.

Lev. 23. 10.

IN those days : The Lord spake unto Moses, saying : Speak unto the children of Israel, and say unto them : When ye be come into the land which I give unto you, and shall reap the harvest thereof, then ye shall bring a sheaf of the first-fruits of your harvest unto the priest : and he shall wave the sheaf before the Lord, to be accepted for you ; on the morrow after the sabbath the priest shall wave it. And ye shall count unto you from the morrow after the sabbath, from the day that ye brought the sheaf of the wave offering ; seven sabbaths shall be complete, even unto the morrow after the seventh sabbath shall ye number fifty days ; and ye shall offer a new meat offering unto the Lord. Ye shall bring out of your habitations two wave loaves of two tenth deals : they shall be of fine flour ; they shall be baked with leaven ; they are the first-fruits unto the Lord. And ye shall proclaim on the selfsame day, that it may be an holy convocation unto you : ye shall do no servile work therein. It shall be a statute for ever in all your dwellings throughout your generations : saith the Lord Almighty.

Alleluia. *V. Job 26.* By his Spirit he hath garnished the heavens.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O GOD, who for the healing of our souls hast commanded us to chasten our bodies with gôdly fasting : mercifully grant that we may both in

body and soul be evermore devoutly given to thy service. Through.

The LESSON from the Book of Deuteronomy. *Deut. 26. 1.*

IN those days : Moses spake unto the children of Israel : Hear, O Israel, what I command thee this day. When thou art come in unto the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee for an inheritance, and possessest it, and dwellest therein : that thou shalt take of the first of all the fruit of the earth, which thou shalt bring of thy land that the Lord thy God giveth thee, and shalt put it in a basket, and shalt go unto the place which the Lord thy God shall choose to place his Name there : and thou shalt go unto the priest that shall be in those days, and say unto him : I profess this day unto the Lord thy God, the Lord heard our voice, and looked on our affliction, and our labour, and our oppression : and the Lord brought us forth out of Egypt with a mighty hand, and with an outstretched arm, and with great terribleness, and with signs, and with wonders : and he hath brought us into this place, and hath given us this land, even a land that floweth with milk and honey. And now, behold, I have brought the first-fruits of the land which thou, O Lord, hast given me. And thou shalt set it before the Lord thy God : and worship before the Lord thy God : and thou shalt rejoice in every good thing which the Lord thy God hath given unto thee.

Alleluia. *℣. Acts 2.* When the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we, being taught by abstinence in the way of salvation, may in such wise learn to refrain ourselves from all vices, that we may readily obtain the pardon of thy loving kindness. Through.

The LESSON from the Book of Leviticus. *Lev. 26. 3.*

IN those days : The Lord said unto Moses : Speak unto the children of Israel, and say unto them : If ye walk in my statutes, and keep my commandments, and do them, then I will give you rain in due season, and the land shall yield her increase, and the trees of the field shall yield their fruit. And your threshing shall reach unto the vintage, and the vintage shall reach unto the sowing time ; and ye shall eat your bread to the full, and dwell in your land safely. And I will give peace in the land : and ye shall lie down, and none shall make you afraid. And I will rid evil beasts out of the land, neither shall the sword go through your land. And ye shall chase your enemies, and they shall fall before you by the sword. And five of you shall chase an hundred, and an hundred of you shall put ten thousand to flight : and your enemies shall fall before you by the sword. For I will have respect unto you : and make you fruitful : and multiply you, and establish my covenant with you. And ye shall eat old store, and bring forth the old because of the new. And I will set my tabernacle among you, and my soul shall not abhor you. And I

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we may in such wise refrain ourselves from carnal feastings, that we may likewise abstain from all sins that beset us. Through.

The LESSON from the Song of the Three Children.

Song of the Three Children, v. 26.

IN those days : The Angel of the Lord came down into the oven together with Azarias and his fellows : and smote the flame of the fire out of the oven, and made the midst of the furnace as it had been a moist whistling wind. And the flame streamed forth above the furnace forty and nine cubits : and it passed through, and burned those Chaldeans it found about the furnace. And the fire touched the three not at all ; neither hurt nor troubled them. Then they, as out of one mouth, praised, glorified, and blessed God in the furnace, saying :

Here Thanks be to God is not said.

Alleluia. *℣. ibid.* Blessed art thou, O Lord God of our Fathers, and to be praised and exalted above all for ever.

The Verse ended Gloria in excelsis is said, and then ℣. The Lord be with you. Let us pray.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who for the deliverance of the three children didst assuage the flames of fire : mercifully grant that the fiery assaults of temptation may have no power upon us thy servants. Through.

COLLECT 2, for Church, as given after Low Sunday. [*Or Collect 15 from Various Prayers.*]

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Romans.
Rom. 5. 1.

BRETHREN : Being therefore justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ : by whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand, and rejoice in hope of the glory of God. And not only so, but we glory in tribulations also : knowing that tribulation worketh patience, and patience, experience, and experience, hope, and hope maketh not ashamed : because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost, which is given unto us.

TRACT. *Ps. 117.* O praise the Lord, all ye heathen : praise him all ye nations. *℣.* For his merciful kindness is ever more and more towards us : and the truth of the Lord endureth for ever.

St. Luke 4. 38.

AT that time : Jesus arose out of the synagogue, and entered into Simon's house. And Simon's wife's

mother was taken with â great fever ; and they besought him for her. And he stood over her, and rebuked the fever : ând it left her. And immediately she arose and ministered unto them. Now when the sun was setting, all they that had any sick with divers diseases brought them unto him. And he laid his hands on every one of them, ând healèd them. And devils also came out of many, crying out, and saying : Thou art Christ, thê Son of God. And he, rebuking them, suffered them not to speak, for they knew thât he was Christ. And when it was day, he departed and went into â desert place ; and the people sought him, and came unto him : and stayed him, that he should not départ from them. And he said unto them : I must preach the kingdom of God to other cities also : for therefore am I sent. And he preached in the synagögues of Galilee. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 88. O Lord God of my salvation, I have cried day and night before thee : O Lord, let my prayer enter into thy presence, alleluia.

SECRET.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee : that to the rendering of our abstinence acceptable in thy sight, we may, by the power of this holy Sacrament, be enabled to present our hearts unto thee in perfect purity. Through.

SECRET 2 *for Church, as given after Low Sunday.* [Or Secret 15 from Various Prayers.]

COMMUNION. *St. John* 3. The Spirit breatheth where he listeth : and thou hearest his voice, alleluia, alleluia : but knowest not whence he cometh, and whither he goeth, alleluia, alleluia, alleluia.

THE FEAST OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

Commonly Called Trinity Sunday

Double of I Class

INTROIT. *Benedicta sit. Tob. 12.*

BLESSED be the holy Trinity, and the undivided Unity : we will confess him, because he hath shewed his mercy upon us. *Ps. 8.* O Lord our Governour : how excellent is thy Name in all the world. *℣.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who hast given unto us thy servants grace, by the confession of a true faith, to acknowledge the glory of the eternal Trinity, and in the power of the Divine Majesty to worship the Unity : we beseech thee ; that, thou wouldest keep us stedfast in this faith, and evermore defend us from all adversities.

Prayer-Book Ending: Who livest and reignest, ône God, world without end.

Long Ending: Through Jesus Christ thy Son our Lôrd. Who liveth, etc.

The LESSON from the book of the Revelation of blessed John the Apostle.

Rev. 4. 1.

AFTER this I looked, and behold, a door was opened in heaven : and the first voice which I heard was as it were of a trumpet talking with me ; which said : Come up hither, and I will shew thee things which must be hereafter. And immediately I was in the spirit ; and behold, a throne was

set in heaven, and one sat on the throne : and he that sat was to look upon like a jasper and a sardine stone : and there was a rainbow round about the throne, in sight like unto an emerald. And round about the throne were four and twenty seats ; and upon the seats I saw four and twenty elders sitting, clothed in white raiment ; and they had on their heads crowns of gold : and out of the throne proceeded lightnings and thunderings and voices. And there were seven lamps of fire burning before the throne, which are the seven Spirits of God. And before the throne there was a sea of glass like unto crystal ; and in the midst of the throne, and round about the throne, were four living creatures full of eyes before and behind. And the first was like a lion, and the second like a calf, and the third had a face as a man, and the fourth was like a flying eagle. And the four living creatures had each of them six wings about him ; and they were full of eyes within : and they rest not day and night, saying : Holy, holy, holy, Lord God Almighty, which was, and is, and is to come. And when those living creatures give glory and honour and thanks to him that sat on the throne, who liveth for ever and ever, the four and twenty elders fall down before him that sat on the throne, and worship him that liveth

for ever and ever, and cast their crowns before the throne, saying : Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and honour and power ; for thou hast created all things, and for thy pleasure they are, and were created.

GRADUAL. *Dan.* 3. Blessed art thou, that beholdest the depths, and sittest upon the Cherubim. *Ps.* Blessed art thou, O Lord, in the firmament of heaven : and above all to be praised and glorified for ever.

Alleluia, alleluia. *Ps.* Blessed art thou, O Lord God of our fathers : and to be praised and exalted above all for ever. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to John.

St. John 3. 1.

AT that time : There was a man of the Pharisees, named Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews : the same came to Jesus by night, and said unto him : Rabbi, we know that thou art a teacher come from God : for no man can do these miracles that thou doest, except God be with him. Jesus answered and said unto him : Verily, verily I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God. Nicodemus saith unto him : † How can a man be born when he is old? † can he enter the second time into his mother's womb, and be born? Jesus answered : Verily, verily I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God. That which is born of the flesh is flesh ; and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit. Marvel not that I said unto thee, Ye must be born again. The

wind bloweth where it listeth, and thou hearest the sound thereof, but canst not tell whence it cometh, and whither it goeth ; so is every one that is born of the Spirit. Nicodemus answered and said unto him : † How can these things be? Jesus answered and said unto him : Art thou a master of Israel, † and knowest not these things? Verily, verily I say unto thee, We speak that we do know, and testify that we have seen, and ye receive not our witness. If I have told you earthly things, and ye believe not : how shall ye believe, † if I tell you of heavenly things? And no man hath ascended up to heaven, but he that came down from heaven, even the Son of Man, which is in heaven. And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up ; that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have eternal life. *The Creed is said.*

Doom of life or death awarded, as their days shall be recorded which from one beginning ran.

In this was manifested the love of God toward us, because that God sent his only-begotten Son into the world, that we might live through him. Herein is love : not that we loved God, but that he loved us, and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us : we ought also to love one another. There is no fear in love : but perfect love casteth out fear, because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made perfect in love. We love him, because he first loved us. If a man say, I love God, and hateth his brother, he is a liar. For he that loveth not his brother whom he hath seen, † how can he love God whom he hath not seen? And this commandment have we from him : that he who loveth God love his brother also.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 41. I said : Lord, be merciful unto me : heal my soul, for I have sinned against thee. †. Blessed is he that considereth the poor and needy : the Lord shall deliver him in the time of trouble.

Then he said : I pray thee therefore, father, that thou wouldest send him to my father's house : for I have five brethren ; that he may testify unto them, lest they also come into this place of torment. Abraham saith unto him : They have Moses and the Prophets ; let them hear them. And he said : Nay, father Abraham, but if one went unto them from the dead, they will repent. And he said unto him : If they hear not Moses and the Prophets, neither will they be persuaded, though one rose from the dead.

Hereby perceive we the love of God, because he laid down his life for us : and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren. But whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother

BRETHREN ; I would not that ye should be ignorant, how that all our fathers were under the cloud, and all passed through the sea : and were all baptized unto Moses in the cloud, and in the sea : and did all eat the same spiritual meat, and did all drink the same spiritual drink : for they drank of that spiritual rock that followed them : and that rock was Christ. But with many of them God was not well pleased : for they were over-

thrown in the wilderness. Now these things were our examples, to the intent we should not lust after evil things, as they also lusted. Neither be ye idolaters, as were some of them : as it is written : The people sat down to eat and drink, and rose up to play. Neither let us commit fornication, as some of them committed, and fell in one day three and twenty thousand. Neither let us tempt Christ, as some of them also tempted, and were destroyed of serpents. Neither murmur ye, as some of them also murmured, and were destroyed of the destroyer. Now all these things happened unto them for ensamples : and they are written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the world are come. Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth, take heed lest he fall. There hath no temptation taken you, but such as is common to man : but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able, but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 9.* O Lord our Governour, how excellent is thy Name in all the world. *V.* Thou that hast set thy glory above the heavens.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps. 59.* Deliver me from mine enemies, O God : defend me from them that rise up against me. Alleluia.

St. Luke 15. 11.

AT that time ; Jesus said : A certain man had two sons and the younger of them said to his father : Father give me the portion of goods that fall-

eth to me. And he divided unto thém his living. And not many days after the younger son gathered all together, and took his journey into a far country, and there wasted his substance with rîotous living. And when he had spent all, there arose a mighty famine in that land : and he began tô be in want. And he went and joined himself to a citizen ôf that country ; and he sent him into his fiêlds to feed swine. And he would fain have filled his belly with the husks that the swîne did eat ; and no man gâve unto him. And when he came to himself, he said : How many hired servants of my father's have bread enough and to spare, and I perish with hunger! I will arise and go to my father, and will say unto him : Father, I have sinned against heaven, and before thee, and am no more worthy to be cállèd thy son ; make me as one of thy hîrèd servants. And he arose, and came tô his father. But when he was yet a great way off, his father saw him, and had compassion, and ran, and fell on his neck, and kissèd him. And the son said unto him : Father, I have sinned against heaven, and in thy sight, and am no more worthy to be cállèd thy son. But the father said to his servants : Bring forth the best robe, and put it on him : and put a ring on his hand, and shôes on his feet ; and bring hither the fatted cãlf, and kill it ; and let us eat, and be merry : for this my son was dead, and is âlive again ; he was lôst, and is found. And they began tô be merry. Now his elder son was in the field : and as he came and drew nigh to the house, he heard musick and dancing. And he called

one of the servants, and asked whât these things meant. And he said unto him : Thy brother is come : and thy father hath killed the fatted calf, because he hath received hîm safe and sound. And he was angry, and wôuld not go in ; therefore came his father out, and întreated him. And he answering said to his father : Lo, these many years do I serve thee, neither transgressed I at any time thÿ commandment ; and yet thou never gavest me a kid, that I might make merrÿ with my friends ; but as soon as this thy son was come, which hath devoured thy living with harlots, thou hast killed for him thê fatted calf. And he said unto him : Son, thou art ever with me, and all that I have is thine. It was meet that we should make merrÿ, and be glad : for this thy brother was dead, and is âlive again ; and was lôst, and is found.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 19. The statutes of the Lord are right, and rejoice the heart, sweeter also than honey, and the honeycomb : and moreover thy servant keepeth them.

I Cor. 12. 1.

BRETHREN : Concerning spiritual gifts. I would not have you ignorant, Ye know that ye were Gentiles, carried away unto these dumb idols, even as

ye were led. Wherefore I give you to understand, that no man speaking by the Spirit of God calleth Jesus accursed. And that no man can say that Jesus is the Lord, but by the Holy Ghost. Now there are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit. And there are differences of administrations, but the same Lord. And there are diversities of operations, but it is the same God, which worketh all in all. But the manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man to profit withal. For to one is given by the Spirit the word of wisdom : to another the word of knowledge by the same Spirit : to another faith by the same Spirit : to another the gifts of healing by the same Spirit : to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another discerning of spirits, to another divers kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. But all these worketh that one and the self-same Spirit, dividing to every man severally as he will.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 17.* Keep me, O Lord, as the apple of an eye : hide me under the shadow of thy wings. *℣.* Let my sentence come forth from thy presence : and let thine eyes look upon the thing that is equal.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians.
1 Cor. 15. 1.

BRETHREN ; I declare unto you the Gospel which I preached unto you, which also ye have received, and

wherein ye stand, by which also ye are saved : if ye keep in memory what I preached unto you, unless ye have believed in vain. For I delivered unto you first of all, that which I also received, how that Christ died for our sins, according to the Scriptures : and that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the Scriptures : and that he was seen of Cephas, then of the twelve. After that, he was seen of above five hundred brethren at once : of whom the greater part remain unto this present, but some are fallen asleep. After that, he was seen of James, then of all the Apostles : and last of all, he was seen of me also, as of one born out of due time. For I am the least of the Apostles, that am not meet to be called an Apostle, because I persecuted the Church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace which was bestowed upon me was not in vain. But I laboured more abundantly than they all, yet not I, but the grace of God which was with me. Therefore whether it were I or they, so we preach, and so ye believed.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 28.* My heart hath trusted in God and I am helped : therefore my heart danceth for joy : and in my song will I praise him. *V.* Unto thee will I cry, O Lord my strength : think no scorn of me : my God, go not far from me.

Alleluia, alleluia. *Ps. 81.* Sing we merrily unto God our strength, make a cheerful noise unto the God of Jacob : take the psalm, bring hither the tabret. Alleluia.

St. Luke 18. 9.

AT that time : Jesus spake this parable unto certain which trusted in themselves that they were righteous, and despised others : Two men went up into the temple to pray : the one a Pharisee, and the other a Publican. The Pharisee stood and prayed thus with himself : God, I thank thee that I am not as other men are : extortioners, unjust, adulterers : or even as this Publican. I fast twice in the week ; I give tithes of all that I possess. And the Publican, standing afar off, would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven : but smote upon his breast, saying : God be merciful to me a sinner. I tell you : This man went down to his house justified rather than the other : for every one that exalteth himself shall be abased ; and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 30.* I will magnify thee, O Lord, for thou hast set me up, and not made my foes to triumph over me : O Lord, my God, I cried unto thee, and thou hast healed me.

SECRET.

O GOD, who hast ordained a sacrifice, that we, offering the same to thy honour and glory, might receive thereby the healing of all our infirmities : mercifully grant that this our present offering may be made acceptable in thy sight. Through.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who art always more ready to hear than we to pray, and art wont to give more than either we desire ôr deserve : pour down upon us the abundance of thy mercÿ ; forgiving us those things whereof our conscience is afraid, and giving us those good things which we are not worthy to ask, but through the merits and mediation of Jesus Christ, thy Son, our Lord. [Who.]

COLLECT 2 of the Saints; 3 ad lib.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians. *2 Cor.* 3. 4.

BRETHREN : Such trust have we through Christ to Godward : not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think any thing as of ourselves ; but our sufficiency is of God : who also hath made us able ministers of the new testament ; not of the letter, but of the spirit : for the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life. But if the ministration of death written and engraven in stones was glorious ; so that the children of Israel could not stedfastly behold the face of Moses for the glory of his countenance, which glory was to be done away : † how shall not the ministration of the spirit be rather glôrious? For if the ministration of condemnation be glory : much more doth the ministration of righteousness exceed in glory.

St. Mark 7. 31.

AT that time : Jesus, departing from the coasts of Tyre and Sidon, came unto the sea of Galilee, through the midst of the coasts of Dêcapolis. And they bring unto him one that was deaf, and had an impediment in his

speech, and they beseech him to put his hând upon him. And he took him aside from the multitude, and put his fingers into his ears ; and he spit, and touchèd his tongue ; and looking up to heaven, he sighed, and saith unto him : Ephphatha, that is, Bê openèd. And straightway his ears were opened, and the string of his tongue was loosed, and he spake plain. And he charged them that they should tell no man. But the more he charged them, so much the more a great deal they published it : and were beyond measure astonished, saying : He hath done all things well : he maketh both the deaf to hear, and the dumb to speak. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ex.* 32. Moses besought the Lord his God, and said : Lord, why doth thy wrath wax hot against thy people? Turn from thy fierce wrath : remember Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, thy servants, to whom thou swarest to give a land flowing with milk and honey. And the Lord repented of the evil which he thought to do unto his people.

SECRET.

REGARD, O Lord, we pray thee, this our bounden duty and service : that this sacrifice may be an oblation acceptable unto thee, and effectually avail for the succour of our frailty. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 104. The earth, O Lord, is filled with the fruit of thy works : that thou mayest bring food out of the earth, and wine that maketh

glad the heart of man : and oil to make him a cheerful countenance, and bread to strengthen man's heart.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that we which have received this hōly sacrament : may in such wise feel the effectual succour of the sâme ; that we being preserved both in body and soul may glory in the fulness of thy heavenly healing. Through.

INTROIT. *Respite, Domine. Ps.* 74.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Galatians.
Gal. 3. 16.

St. Luke 10. 23.

BRETHREN : To Abraham and his seed were the promises made. He saith not : And to seeds, as of many ; but as of one : And to thy seed, which is Christ. And this I say : that the covenant that was confirmed before of God in Christ, the Law, which was four hundred and thirty years after, cannot disannul, that it should make the promise of none effect. For if the inheritance be of the Law, it is no more of promise. But God gave it to Abraham by promise. ‡ Wherefore then servêth the Law? It was added because of transgressions, till the seed should come, to whom the promise was made, and it was ordained by Angels in the hand of a mediator. Now a mediator is not a mediator of one : but God is one. ‡ Is the Law then against the promisês of God? God forbid. For if there had been a law given, which could have given life, verily righteousness should have been by the Law. But the Scripture hath concluded all under sin, that the promise by faith of Jesus Christ might be given to them that believe.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 74.* Look upon the covenant, O Lord, and forget not the congregation of the poor for ever. *V.* Arise, O God, maintain thine own cause : remember how the foolish man blasphemeth thee daily.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps. 90.* Lord, thou hast been our refuge : from one generation to another. Alleluia.

AT that time ; Jesus said to his disciples : Blessed are the eyes which see the things that ye see. For I tell you, that many Prophets and kings have desired to see those things which ye see, and have not seen them : and to hear those things which ye hear, and hâve not heard them. And behold, a certain lawyer stood up and tempted him, saying : Master, ‡ what shall I do to inherit etêrnal life? He said unto him : ‡ What is written in the Law? ‡ how rêadest thou? And he answering said : Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind ; and thy neighbôur as thyself. And he said unto him : Thou hast ânswerèd right ; this do, ând thou shalt live. But he, willing to justify himself, said unto Jesus : ‡ And who is my neighbôur? And Jesus answering said : A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, which stripped him of his raiment : and wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead. And by chance, there came down a certâin Priest that way ; and, when he saw him, he passed by on thê other side. And likewise a Levite, when he was at the place, came and looked on him, and passed by on thê other side. But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, câme where he was ; and, when he saw him, he had compassion on him, and went to him, and bound up his wounds, pouring in oil and wine ; and set him on

his own beast, and brought him to an inn, and took care of him. And on the morrow, when he departed, he took out two pence, and gave them to the host, and said unto him : Take care of him : and whatsoever thou spendest more, when I come again, I will repay thee. Which now of these three, thinkest thou, † was neighbour unto him that fell among the thieves? And he said : He that shewed mercy on him. Then said Jesus unto him : Go, and do thou likewise. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 31. My hope hath been in thee, O Lord ; I have said : Thou art my God, my time is in thy hand.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to look upon the oblation, which on thine holy altar we do present unto thee : that the same may be profitable unto us for the obtaining of thy pardon, and effectually avail for the increasing of the glory of thy Name. Through.

SECRET 2 of the Saints; 3 ad lib.

COMMUNION. *Wis.* 16. 20. Thou didst send them bread from heaven, O Lord : able to content every man's delight, and agreeing to every taste.

POSTCOMMUNION.

QUICKEN us, O Lord, we pray thee, who have duly received these holy mysteries : that we may be cleansed from all our sins, and defended against all temptations. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION 2 of the Saints; 3 ad lib.

FOURTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

INTROIT. *Protector noster. Ps.* 84.

BEHOLD, O God, our defender, and look upon the face of thine Anointed : for one day in thy courts is better than a thousand. *Ps. ibid.* O how amiable are thy dwellings, thou Lord of hosts ; my soul hath a desire, and longing to enter into the courts of the Lord. *℣.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, give unto us the increase of faith, hope, and charity : and, that we may obtain that which thou dost promise, make us to love that which thou dost command. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [*Who.*]

COLLECT 2 of the Saints; 3 ad lib.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Galatians. *Gal.* 5. 16.

BRETHREN : I say then, walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh. For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit : and the Spirit against the flesh : and these are contrary the one to the other, so that ye cannot do the things that ye would. But if ye be led by the Spirit, ye are not under the Law. Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these : adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings, and such like ; of the which I tell you before, as I have also told you in time past : that they who do

such things, shall not inherit the kingdom of God. But the fruit of the Spirit is : love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance. Against such there is no law. And they that are Christ's, have crucified the flesh, with the affections and lusts.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 118. It is better to trust in the Lord, than to put any confidence in man. *V.* It is better to trust in the Lord, than to put any confidence in princes.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps.* 95. O come, let us sing unto the Lord : let us heartily rejoice in the strength of our salvation. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Luke.

St. Luke 17. 11.

AT that time : And it came to pass, as Jesus went to Jerusalem, that he passed through the midst of Samaria and Galilee. And as he entered into a certain village, there met him ten men that were lepers, which stood afar off ; and they lifted up their voices, and said : Jesus, Master, have mercy on us. And when he saw them, he said unto them : Go, shew yourselves unto the priests. And it came to pass that, as they went, they were cleansed. And one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, and with a loud voice glorified God, and fell down on his face at his feet, giving him thanks ; and he was a Samaritan. And Jesus answering said : † Were there not ten cleansed? † but where are the nine? There are not found that returned to give glory to God,

save this stranger. And he said unto him : Arise, go thy way, thy faith hath made thee whole. *The Creed is said.*

COLLECT 2 of the *Saints*; 3 *ad lib.*

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Galatians. *Gal.* 6. 11.

BRETHREN : Ye see how large a letter I have written unto you with mine own hand. As many as desire to make a fair shew in the flesh, they constrain you to be circumcised, only lest they should suffer persecution for the Cross of Christ. For neither they themselves who are circumcised keep the Law : but desire to have you circumcised, that they may glory in your flesh. But God forbid that I should glory, save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ : by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world. For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision availeth any thing, nor uncircumcision, but a new creature. And as many as walk according to this rule, peace be on them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God. From henceforth let no man trouble me : for I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus. Brethren : the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 92. It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord : and to sing praises unto thy Name, O Most Highest. *℟*. To tell of thy loving-kindness early in the morning, and of thy truth in the night-season.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℟*. *Ps.* 95. For the Lord is a great God, and a great King above all gods. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 6. 24.

AT that time ; Jesus said to his disciples : No man can sêrve two masters : for either he will hate the one, and love the other ; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve Gôd, and Mammon. Therefore I say unto you, Be not anxious for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink, nor yet for your body, what yê shall put on. Is not the life more than the food : † and the body than thê raiment? Behold the birds of the heaven, that they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns ; and your heavenly Fathêr feedeth them. † Are not ye of much more valûe than they? † And which of you by being anxious can add one cubit unto the measure ôf his life? † And why are ye anxious concernîng raiment? Consider the lilies of the field how they grow ; they toil not, neithêr do they spin. Yet I say unto you, that even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. But if God doth so clothe the grass of the field which to-day is, and to-morrow is cast into the oven : shall he not much more clothe you, † O ye of little faith? Be not therefore anxious,

saying : † What shall we eat? or, † What shall we drink? or, † Where-withal shall we be clothed? for after all these things do the Gentiles seek. For your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things. But seek ye first his kingdom, and his righteousness : and all these things shall be added unto you. Be not therefore anxious for the morrow. For the morrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 40. I waited patiently for the Lord, and he inclined unto me : he heard my calling, and he hath put a new song in my mouth, even a thanksgiving unto our God.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord our God : that this saving Victim may effectually avail, both for the cleansing of our souls from all their sins, and for the obtaining of the favour of thine almighty power. Through.

SECRET 2 of the Saints; 3 ad lib.

COMMUNION. *St. John* 6. The bread that I will give is my Flesh, which I will give for the life of the world.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Ephesians. *Eph.* 3. 13.

BRETHREN : I desire that ye faint not at my tribulations for you : which is your glory. For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, of whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named, that he would grant you, according to the riches of his glory, to be strengthened with might by his Spirit in the inner man, that Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith : that ye, being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all saints, what is the breadth, and length, and depth, and height : and to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye might be filled with all

the fulness of God. Now unto him, that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask, or think, according to the power, that worketh in us, unto him be glory in the Church by Christ Jesus, throughout all ages, world without end. Amen.

AND it came to pass the day after; That Jesus went into a city, called Nain : and many of his disciples went with him, and much people. Now when he came nigh to the gate of the city, behold, there was a dead man carried out, the only son of his mother : and she was a widow ; and much people of the city was with her. And when the Lord saw her, he had compassion on her, and said untô her : Weep not. And he came and touchèd the bier. (And they, that bare him, stood still.) And he said : Young man, I say untô thee, Arise. And he that was dead sat up, and bégan to speak. And he delivered him tô his mother. And there came a fear on all : and they glorified God, saying : that a great Prophet is risen up among us ; and that God hath visitèd his people. And this rumour of him went forth throughout all Judaea, and

throughout all the region rôund about. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 40. Make haste, O Lord, to help me : let them be ashamed and confounded together, that seek after my soul, to destroy it : make haste, O Lord, to help me.

SECRET.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that by the protection of thy holy sacraments, we may ever be defended against all the assaults of the devil. Through.

SECRET 2 of the Saints; 3 ad lib.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 71. O Lord, I will make mention of thy righteousness only : thou, O God, hast taught me from my youth up until now : forsake me not, O God, in mine old age, when I am grey-headed.

POSTCOMMUNION.

THUS saith the Lord God : Behold, the days come : that the plowman shall overtake the reaper, and the treader of grapes him that soweth seed : and the mountains shall drop sweet wine, and all the hills shall melt. And I will bring again the captivity of my people of Israel : and they shall build the waste cities, and inhabit them : and they shall plant vineyards, and drink the wine thereof : they shall also make gardens, and eat the fruit of them. The LESSON from the Book of Nehemiah. *Neh. 8. 1.*

IN those days : All the people gathered themselves together as one man into the street that was before the water gate : and they spake unto Ezra the scribe to bring the Book of the Law of Moses, which the Lord had commanded to Israel. And Ezra the priest brought the Law before the congregation both of men and women, and all that could hear with understanding, upon the first day of the seventh month. And he read therein before the street that was before the water gate from the morning until midday, before the men and the women, and those that could understand : and the ears of all the people were attentive unto the Book of the Law. And Ezra the scribe stood upon a pulpit of wood, which they had made for the purpose. And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people : for he was above all the people : and when he opened it, all the people stood up. And Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God : and all the people answered : Amen, Amen, with lifting up their hands : and they bowed their heads, and worshipped the Lord with their faces to the ground.

And the Levites caused the people to understand the Law : and the people stood in their place. So they read in the book in the Law of God distinctly, and gave the sense : and caused them to understand the reading. And Nehemiah, which is the Tirshatha, and Ezra the priest the scribe, and the Levites that taught the people, said unto all the people : This day is holy unto the Lord your God, mourn not, nor weep. For all the people wept, when they heard the words of the Law. Then he said unto them : Go your way, eat the fat, and drink the sweet, and send portions unto them for whom nothing is prepared : for this day is holy unto our Lord ; neither be ye sorry : for the joy of the Lord is your strength.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 33.* Blessed are the people, whose God is the Lord Jehovah : and blessed are the folk, that he hath chosen to him to be his inheritance. *V.* By the word of the Lord were the heavens made : and all the hosts of them by the breath of his mouth.

St. Mark 9. 17.

AT that time : One of the multitude answered and said : Master, I have brought unto thee my son, which hath a dumb spirit ; and wheresoever he taketh him, he teareth him ; and he foameth, and gnasheth with his teeth, and pineth away ; and I spake to thy disciples that they should cast him out, and they could not. He answereth him, and saith : O faithless generation, how long shall I be with you? how long shall I suffer you?

Bring him unto me. And they brought him unto him. And when he saw him, straightway the spirit tare him ; and he fell on the ground, and wallowed foaming. And he asked his father : † How long is it ago since this came unto him? And he said : Of a child ; and oftentimes it hath cast him into the fire, and into the waters, to destroy him. But if thou canst do any thing, have compassion on us, and help us. Jesus said unto him : If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth. And straightway the father of the child cried out, and said with tears : Lord, I believe : help thou mine unbelief. When Jesus saw that the people came running together, he rebuked the foul spirit, saying unto him : Thou dumb and deaf spirit, I charge thee, come out of him : and enter no more into him. And the spirit cried, and rent him sore, and came out of him ; and he was as one dead, inasmuch that many said : He is dead. But Jesus took him by the hand, and lifted him up, and he arose. And when he was come into the house, his disciples asked him privately : † Why could not we cast him out? And he said unto them : This kind can come forth by nothing, but by prayer and fasting.

Asshur shall not save us ; we will not ride upon horses ; neither will we say any more to the work of our hands : Ye are our gods : for in thee the fatherless findeth mercy. I will heal their backsliding, I will love them freely : for mine anger is turned away from him. I will be as the dew unto Israel ; he shall grow as the lily, and cast forth his roots as Lebanon. And, behold, a woman in the city, which was a sinner, when she knew that Jesus sat at meat in the Pharisee's house, brought an alabaster bôx of ointment ; and stood at his feet behind him weeping, and began to wash his feet with tears ; and did wipe them with the hairs of her head, and kissed his feet, and anointed them with the ointment. Now when the Pharisee which had bidden him saw it, he spake within himself, saying : This man, if he were a prophet, would have known who and what manner of woman this is thât toucheth him ; for she is a sinner. And Jesus answering said unto him : Simon, I have somewhat to sây unto thee. And he saith : Mâster, say on. There was a certain creditor which hâd two debtors : the one owed five hundred pence, and the ôther fifty. And when they had nothing to pay, he frankly fôrgave them both. Tell me therefore, † which of them will lôve him most? Simon answered and said : I suppose that he, to whom hê forgave most. And he said unto him : Thou hast rightly judgèd. And he turned to the woman, and said unto Simon : † Seest thou this woman? I entered into thine house, thou gavest me no watêr for my feet ; but she hath washed my feet with tears, and wiped them

with the hairs of her head. Thou gavêst me no kiss ; but this woman since the time I came in hath not ceased tô kiss my feet. My head with oil thou didst not anoint ; but this woman hath anointed my fêet with ointment. Wherefore I say unto thee : Her sins, which are many, are forgiven, for shê lovèd much. But to whom little is forgiven, the same lôveth little. And he said unto her : Thy sins âre forgiven. And they that sat at meat with him began to say within themselves : † Who is this that forgiveth sîns also? And he said to the woman : Thy faith hath saved thee : gô in peace.

OFERTORY. *Ps.* 103. Praise the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits : who satisfieth thy mouth with good things : making thee young and lusty as an eagle.

And ye shall do no work in that same day : for it is a day of atonement, to make an atonement for you before the Lord

your God. The LESSON from Micah the Prophet.
Mic. 7. 14.

OUR Lord our God, feed thy people with thy rod, the flock of thine heritage, which dwell solitarily in the wood, as in the days of old. The nations shall see and be confounded at all their might. Who is a God like unto thee, that pardoneth iniquity, † and passeth by the transgression of the remnant of his heritage? He retaineth not his anger for ever, because he delighteth in mercy. He will turn

again, he will have compassion on us : he will subdue our iniquities ; and thou wilt cast all their sins into the depths of the sea. Thou wilt perform the truth to Jacob, and the mercy to Abraham : which thou hast sworn unto our fathers from the days of old : O Lord our God.

IN those days : The word of the Lord came unto me saying : Thus saith the Lord of hosts : As I thought to punish you, when your fathers provoked me to wrath, saith the Lord of hosts, and I repented not : so again have I thought in these days to do well unto Jerusalem and to the house of Judah : fear ye not. These are the things that ye shall do : Speak ye every man the truth to his neighbour : execute the judgement of truth and peace in your gates. And let none of you imagine evil in your hearts against his neighbour : and love no false oath : for all these are things that I hate, saith the Lord. And the word of the Lord of hosts came unto me, saying :

Thus saith the Lord of hosts : The fast of the fourth month, and the fast of the fifth, and the Fast of the Seventh, and the fast of the tenth, shall be to the house of Judah joy and gladness, and cheerful feasts ; therefore love the truth and peace : thus saith the Lord of hosts.

IN those days : The Angel of the Lord came down into the oven together with Azarias and his fellows : and smote the flame of the fire out of the oven, and made the midst of the furnace as it had been a moist whistling wind. And the flame streamed forth above the furnace forty and nine cubits : and it passed through, and burned those Chaldeans it found about the furnace. And the fire touched the three not at all ; neither hurt nor troubled them. Then they, as out of one mouth, praised, glorified, and blessed God in the furnace, saying :

Here Thanks be to God is not said.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Hebrews.

Heb. 9. 2.

BRETHREN : There was a tabernacle made, the first, wherein was the candlestick, and the table, and the shewbread, which is called the sanctuary. And after the second veil, the tabernacle which is called the Holiest of all : which had the golden censer, and the ark of the covenant overlaid round about with gold, wherein was the golden pot that had manna, and Aaron's rod that budded, and the tables of the covenant ; and over it the cherubims of glory shadowing the mercyseat : of which we cannot now speak particularly. Now when these things were thus ordained, the priests went always into the first tabernacle, accomplishing the service of God ; but into the second went the high priest alone once every year, not without blood, which he offered for himself, and for the errors of the people : the Holy Ghost this signifying, that the way into the holiest of all was not yet made manifest, while as the first tab-

ernacle was yet standing. Which was a figure for the time then present : in which were offered both gifts and sacrifices, that could not make him that did the service perfect, as pertaining to the conscience ; which stood only in meats and drinks, and divers washings, and carnal ordinances, imposed on them until the time of reformation. But Christ being come an high priest of good things to come, by a greater and more perfect tabernacle, not made with hands, that is to say, not of this building ; neither by the blood of goats and calves, but by his own Blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us.

TRACT. *Ps.* 117. O praise the Lord, all ye heathen : praise him, all ye nations. *V.* For his merciful kindness is ever more and more towards us : and the truth of the Lord endureth for ever.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 13. 6.

AT that time : Jesus spake also this parable unto the multitudes : A certain man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard, and he came and sought fruit thereôn, and found none. Then said he unto the dresser of his vineyard : Behold, these three years I come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and find nône : cut it down ; † why cumbereth it the ground? And he answering said unto him : Lord, let it alone this year also, till I shall dig about it, and dung it ; and if it bear fruit, well : and if not, then after that thou shalt cut it

down. And he was teaching in one of the synagogues ôn the sabbath. And, behold, there was a woman which had a spirit of infirmity eighteen years : and was bowed together, and could in no wise lift up herself. And when Jesus saw her, he called her to him, and said unto her : Woman, thou art loosed from thine infirmity. And he laid his hands on her : and immediately she was made straight, and glorified God. And the ruler of the synagogue answered with indignation, because that Jesus had healed on the sabbath-day, and said unto the people : There are six days in which mên ought to work ; in them therefore come and be healed, and not on thê sabbath-day. The Lord then answered him, and said : Thou hypocrite, doth not each one of you on the sabbath loose his ox or his ass from the stall, † and lead him away to wâtering? And when he had said these things, all his adversaries wêre ashamed : and all the people rejoiced for all the glorious things that were dône by him.

BRETHREN : This I say therefore, and testify in the Lord, that ye henceforth walk not as other Gentiles walk in the vanity of their mind, having the understanding darkened, being alienated from the life of God through the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart, who, being past feeling, have given themselves over unto lasciviousness, to work all uncleanness with greediness. But ye have not so learned Christ, if so be that ye have heard him, and have been taught by him, as the truth is in Jesus : that ye put off, concerning the former conversation, the old man,

Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth : but that which is good to the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers. And grieve not the Holy Spirit of God : whereby ye are sealed unto the day of redemption. Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil-speaking, be put away from you, with all malice. And be ye kind one to another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 141. Let my prayer be set forth in thy sight, as the incense, O Lord. *V.* And let the lifting up of my hands be an evening sacrifice.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps.* 105. O give thanks unto the Lord, and call upon his Name : tell the people what things he hath done. Alleluia.

And behold, certain of the scribes said within themselves : This man blasphemeth. And Jesus, knowing their thoughts, said : † Wherefore think ye evil in your hearts? For whether is easier, to say : † Thy sins be forgiven thee? or to say : † Arise, and walk? But that ye may know that the Son of Man hath power on earth to forgive sins, then saith he to the sick of the palsy : Arise, take up thy bed, and go into thine house. Again, he sent forth other servants, saying : Tell them which are bidden : Behold, I have preparêd my dinner ; my oxen and my fatlings are killed, and all things are ready ; come untô the marriage. But they made light of it, and went their ways, one to his farm, an-

And he was speechless. Then said the king to the servants : Bind him hand and foot, and take him away, and cast him into outer darkness ; there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth. For many are called, but few are chosen. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 137. By the waters of Babylon we sat down, and wept : when we remembered thee, O Sion.

For we wrestle not against flesh and blood : but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places. Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand. Then said Jesus unto him : Except ye see signs and wonders, ye will not believe. The nobleman saith unto him : Sir, come down ere my child die. Jesus saith unto him : Go thy way, thy son liveth. And the man believed the word that Jesus had spoken unto him, and he went his way. And as he was now going down, his servants met him, and told him, saying : Thy son liveth. Then inquired he of them the hour when he began to amend. And they said unto him : Yesterday at the seventh hour the fever left him. So the father knew that it was at the same hour, in the which Jesus said unto him : Thy son liveth ; and himself believed, and his whole house. * This is again the second miracle that Jesus did, when he was come out of Jud ea into Galilee. *The Creed is said.*

There was a man in the land of Uz whose name was Job : and that man was perfect and upright, and one that feared God : and Satan sought to tempt him : and power was given him by the Lord over his possessions, and over his flesh : and he destroyed all his substance, and his sons : and he smote his flesh with sore boils.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that these holy mysteries may in such wise bestow upon us thy heavenly healing, that our hearts may thereby be freed from all their iniquities. Through.

BRETHREN : I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making request with joy, for your fellowship in the Gospel from the first day until now : being confident of this very thing, that he who hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ. Even as it is meet for me to think this of you all : because I have you in my heart, inasmuch as both in my bonds, and in the defence and confirmation of the Gospel, ye all are partakers of my grace. AT that time : Peter said unto Jesus : Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, ‡ and I fôrgive him? ‡ till sêven times? Jesus saith unto him : I say not unto thee, until seven times : but until seventy times seven. Therefore is the kingdom of heaven likened unto a certain king, which would take account ôf his servants. And when he had begun to reckon, one was brought unto him, which owed him ten thôusand talents. But forasmuch as he had not to pay, his lord commanded him to be sold, and his wife and children, and all that he had, and paymênt to be made. The servant therefore fell down and worshipped him, saying : Lord, have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. Then the lord of that servant was moved with compassion, and loosed him, and forgâve him the debt. But the same servant went out, and found one of his fellow-servants, which owed him ân hundred pence ; and he laid hands on him, and took him by the throat, saying : Pay me thât thou owest. And his fellow-servant fell down at his feet, and besought him, saying : Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. And he would not : but went and cast him into prison, till he shôuld pay the debt. So when his fellow-servants saw what was done, they were very sorry : and came and told unto

their lord âll that was done. Then his lord, after that he had called him, said unto him : O thou wicked servant, I forgave thee all that debt, because thou dêsirêdst me ; shouldest not thou also have had compassion on thy fellow-servant, ‡ even as I had pitÿ on thee? And his lord was wroth, and delivered him to the tormentors, till he should pay all that was dûe unto him. So likewise shall my heavenly Father do also unto you, if ye from your hearts forgive not every one his brôther their trespasses. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Esth. 14.* Remember me, O Lord, King of all power : and give me eloquent speech in my mouth, that my words may be pleasing in thy sight.

SECRET.

For many walk, of whom I have told you often (and now tell you even weeping) that they are the enemies of the Cross of Christ : whose end is destruction : whose god is their belly : and whose glory is in their shame, who mind earthly things. When it be not the last Sunday after Trinity; for if it be the last Sunday then the Mass of the twenty-fifth Sunday shall be said, and the Mass of the twenty-fourth Sunday shall be said on the previous Saturday, if it be not hindered by a double or semidouble Feast (as was aforesaid on the Octave of the Epiphany).

But if it be so hindered then this Mass shall be said on some other previous Feria, not likewise hindered.

THE PATRONAGE OF ST. JOSEPH.

Double of I Class with common Octave

INTROIT. *Adjutor et protector. Ps. 33.*

THE Lord is our help and our shield : Our heart shall rejoice in him, because we have hoped in his Name (alleluia, alleluia). *Ps. 80.* Hear, O thou Shepherd of Israel : thou that leadest Joseph like a sheep. *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who in thy wondrous providence didst vouchsafe to appoint blessed Joseph to be the spouse of thy most hôly Mother : grant that we who reverence him as our patron

on êarth, may be worthy of his intercession in heaven, where thou livest and reignest, with the Father, in the unity.

The LESSON from the Book of Genesis. *Gen. 49. 22.*

JOSEPH is a fruitful bough, even a fruitful bough by a well : whose branches run over the wall. The archers have sorely grieved him, and shot at him, and hated him. But his bow abode in strength, and the arms of his hands were made strong by the hands of the mighty God of Jacob :

from thence is the Shepherd, the stone of Israel. Even by the God of thy father, who shall help thee, and by the Almighty, who shall bless thee with blessings of heaven above, blessings of the deep that lieth under, blessings of the breasts and of the womb. The blessings of thy father have prevailed above the blessings of my progenitors unto the utmost bound of the everlasting hills : they shall be on the head of Joseph, and on the crown of the head of him that was separate from his brethren.

Except in Masses out of Eastertide (for which see below) here is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. V. From whatsoever tribulation they shall call upon me, I will hear them, and I will be their defender for ever. Alleluia. V. Obtain for us, O Joseph, to walk in innocency : and ever to be safe under thy protection. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 3. 21. P

AT that time : When all the people were baptized, it came to pass, that Jesus also being baptized, and praying, the heaven wâs openèd ; and the Holy Ghost descended in ■ bodily shape like a dôve upon him ; and a voice came from heaven, which said : Thou art my beloved Son ; in thee I am well pleasèd. And Jesus himself began to be about thirty years of age, being, as was supposed, the sôn of Joseph. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 147.* Praise the Lord, O Jerusalem : for he hath made

fast the bars of thy gates, and hath blessed thy children within thee (alleluia, alleluia).

SECRET.

O LORD, who seest that we do put our trust in the patronage of the Spouse of thy most holy Mother : we pray thee, that thou wouldest so train our hearts to despise all things earthly, that we may in perfect charity cleave unto thee, the only true God. Who livest and reignest with the Father.

PREFACE of St. Joseph.

COMMUNION. *St. Matt. 1.* And Jacob begat Joseph the husband of Mary, of whom was born Jesus, who is called Christ (alleluia, alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE beseech thêe, O Lord our God : that we whom thou hast refreshed with the river of thy heavenly bounty ; may by thee be enabled so to rejoice in the protection of thy blessed Saint Joseph that, by his merits and intercession, we may be made partakers of thy heavenly glory. Through.

§ *Within the Octave Mass is said as on the Feast, with 2nd Collect of St. Mary, the 3rd for the Church, as given after Low Sunday; but on the Octave Day, Mass as on the Feast.*

§ *If this Feast be transferred after Pentecost, Mass is said as above, except that the Alleluias are omitted from Introit, Offertory, and Communion, and the Gradual as below is substituted.*

Votive Masses of St. Joseph

Mass is said as above, but the Alleluias are omitted from Introit, Offertory, and Communion.

Out of Eastertide, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 21. Lord, thou hast prevented him with the blessings of goodness : thou hast set a crown of pure gold upon his head. *℣.* He asked life of thee, and thou gavest him a long life, even for ever and ever.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣.* Obtain for us, O Joseph, to walk in innocency : and ever to be safe under thy protection. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps.* 112. Blessed is the man that feareth the Lord : he hath great delight in his commandments. *℣.* His seed shall be mighty upon earth : the generation of the faithful shall be blessed. *℣.* Riches and plenteousness shall be in his house : and his righteousness endureth for ever.

Friday after Oct. of Corpus Christi.

THE FEAST OF THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS.

Double of I Class with privileged Oct. 3.

Within the Octave Mass is said as on the Feast, with 2nd Collect of St. Mary, 3rd for the Church; on the Octave Day Mass as on the Feast.

INTROIT. *Cogitationes. Ps.* 33.

THE thoughts of his Heart are from generation to generation : to deliver their soul from death, and to feed them in the time of dearth. *Ps. ibid.* Rejoice in the Lord, O ye righteous : for it becometh well the just to be thankful. *℣.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who hast suffered the Heart of thy Son to be wounded by our sins, and in that very Heart hast bestowed on us the abundant riches of thy love : grant that the devout homage

of our hearts which we render unto him may of thy mercÿ ; be deemed a recompence, acceptable in thy sight. Through the same.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Ephesians. *Ephes.* 3. 8.

BRETHREN : Unto me who am less than the least of all saints is this grace given, that I should preach among the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ, and to make all men see what is the fellowship of the mystery, which from the beginning of the world hath been hid in God, who created all things by Jesus Christ : to the intent that now unto the principalities and powers in heavenly places might be known by the Church the

manifold wisdom of God, according to the eternal purpose which he purposed in Christ Jesus our Lord, in whom we have boldness and access with confidence by the faith of him. For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, of whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named, that he would grant you according to the riches of his glory, to be strengthened with might by his Spirit in the inner man, that Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith : that ye, being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all saints what is the breadth and length and depth and height : and to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye might be filled with all the fulness of God.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 25. Gracious and righteous is the Lord : therefore will he teach sinners in the way. *℣.* Them that are meek shall he guide in judgment, and such as are gentle them shall he learn his way.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣. Matt.* 11. Take my yoke upon you and learn of me, for I am meek and lowly in Heart, and ye shall find rest unto your souls. Alleluia.

In Votive Masses, after Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps.* 103. The Lord is full of compassion and mercy, longsuffering and of great goodness. *℣.* He will not always be chiding, neither keepeth he his anger for ever. *℣.* He hath not dealt with us after our sins, nor rewarded us according to our wickednesses.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣. Matt.* 11. Take my yoke upon you and learn of me, for I am meek and lowly in Heart : and ye shall find rest unto your souls. Alleluia. *℣.* Come unto me all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will refresh you. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to John.

St. John 19. 31. P

AT that time : The Jews, because it was the Preparation, that the bodies should not remain upon the cross on the Sabbath day (for that Sabbath day was an high day), besought Pilate that their legs might be broken, and that they might be taken away. Then came the soldiers and brake the legs of the first, and of the other which was crucified with him. But when they came to Jesus, and saw that he was dead already, they brake not his legs ; but one of the soldiers with a spear pierced his side, and forthwith came there out blood and water. And he that saw it bare record, and his record is true ; and he knoweth that he saith true, that ye might believe. For these things were done, that the Scripture should be fulfilled : A bone of him shall not be broken. And again another Scripture saith : They shall look on him whom they pierced. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 69. Thy rebuke hath broken my heart, I am full of heaviness : I looked for some to have pity upon me, but there was no man : neither found I any to comfort me.

In Votive Masses, in Eastertide, the following is said:

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 40. Burnt offerings and sacrifice for sin hast thou not required : then said I, Lo, I come ; in the volume of the book it is written of me that I should fulfil thy will ; O my God, I am content to do it, yea, thy law is within my Heart, alleluia.

SECRET.

REGARD, we beseech thee, O Lord, the unspeakable love of the Heart of thy beloved Son : that the gifts which we offer may find favour in thy sight ; and be acceptable unto thee as a satisfaction for our misdeeds. Through the same.

PREFACE of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

COMMUNION. *John* 19. One of the soldiers with a spear pierced his side, and forthwith came there out blood and water.

In Votive Masses, in Eastertide, the following is said:

COMMUNION. *John* 7. If any man thirst, let him come unto me and drink, alleluia, alleluia.

POSTCOMMUNION.

LORD JESUS CHRIST, who hast given unto us to taste of the sweetness of thy gracious Heart : kindle in us by these holy mysteries the fire of thy divine charity ; that we may learn to despise the joys of earth and to set our affections on things above. Who livest and reignest with the Father.

SUNDAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE

All as in the Proper for the II Sunday after Trinity, with a Commem. and the Preface of the Sacred Heart; but if the Commem. of the Oct. be omitted, the Preface of the Most Holy Trinity is said according to the Rubrics.

The last Sunday in October.

THE FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING.

Double of I Class

INTROIT. *Dignus est. Rev.* 5 & 6.

COLLECT.

WORTHY is the Lamb that was slain to receive power and riches and wisdom and strength and honour. To him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. *Ps.* 72. Give the King thy judgements, O God ; and thy righteousness unto the King's son. Glory be.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who hast exalted thy beloved Son to be King over all worlds, and hast willed in him to make all things new : mercifully grant that the kindreds of the earth which are wounded and dispersed by sin : may speedily be knit together under his gracious sov-

reignty. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

Commemoration is made of the Sunday occurring.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of Blessed Paul the Apostle to the Colossians. *Col. 1. 12.*

BRETHREN : We give thanks unto the Father, which hath made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the Saints in light : who hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear Son : in whom we have redemption through his blood, even the forgiveness of sins : who is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of every creature. For by him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible, whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers : all things were created by him and for him : and he is before all things, and by him all things consist. And he is the head of the body, the Church : who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead ; that in all things he might have the pre-eminence. For it pleased the Father that in him should all fulness dwell : and, having made peace through the blood of his Cross, by him to reconcile all things unto himself ; by him, I say, whether they be things in earth, or things in heaven.

GRADUAL. *Psalm 72.* His dominion shall be from the one sea to the other : and from the flood unto the world's end. *V.* All kings shall fall down before him : All nations shall do him service.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Dan. 7.* His dominion is an everlasting dominion, which shall not pass away : and his kingdom that which shall not be destroyed. Alleluia.

In Votive Masses, after Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps. 89.* He shall call me : Thou art my Father, my God, and my strong salvation. *V.* And I will make him my firstborn : higher than the kings of the earth. *V.* His seed also will I make to endure for ever : and his throne as the days of heaven.

In Eastertide, in place of the Gradual is said Alleluia, and verse following as above, to which is added:

V. *Rev. 19.* He hath on his vesture and on his thigh a name written: KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 18. 33. P

AT that time : Pilate said unto Jesus : *‡* Art thou the King ôf the Jews? Jesus answered him : Sayest thou this thing of thyself, *‡* or did others tell it thee of me? Pilate answered : *‡* Am I a Jew? Thine own nation and the chief priests have delivered thee unto me : *‡* what hâst thou done? Jesus answered : My kingdom is nôt of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, then would my servants fight, that I should not be deliverêd to the Jews ; but now is my kingdôm not from hence. Pilate therefore said unto him : *‡* Art thou â King then? Jesus answered : Thou sayest that I am a

King. To this end was I born, and for this cause came I into the world, that I should bear witness unto the truth ; everyone that is of the truth heareth my voice. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Psalm 2.* Desire of me, and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance : and the utmost parts of the earth for thy possession.

SECRET.

WE present unto thee, O Lord, this sacrifice of our reconciliation, humbly beseeching that he whom at this time we offer unto thee, may himself bestow on all mankind the gifts of unity and peace, even Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

Commemoration is made of the Sunday occurring.

PROPER PREFACE.

COMMUNION. *Ps. 29.* The Lord remaineth a King for ever : the Lord shall give his people the blessing of peace.

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE beseech thêe, O Lord : that we, who have here received the food of everlasting life, may so glory to fight under the banner of Christ our King ; that we may be made worthy to reign with him for ever on his throne in heaven. Where he liveth and reigneth with thee, in the unity.

Commemoration is made of the Sunday occurring, the Gospel of which is read at the end.

July 4th.

COMMEMORATION OF AMERICAN INDEPENDENCE

On July 4th, is said the Mass WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF SS. PETER AND PAUL, unless some other Feast occur, except in the United States where by Ecclesiastical Authority is ordered the Votive Mass given below, which is suitable also for other patriotic observances. On July 4th it is a privileged Votive, and where obligation of Choir exists two Masses are said, one of the Feast without Commem. of the Votive, the other of the Votive without Commem. of the Feast or other Occurrence unless it be of a Sunday, of a privileged Octave, or of a II Class Double. But where both Masses are not said, the Votive alone is said, without any Commem. unless it be of one of the aforesaid Occurrences. All is said as in the Votive Mass IN ANY NECESSITY, Salus populi, with the Gloria in excelsis and the Creed, except:

COLLECT.

ETERNAL God, through whose mighty power our fathers won their libertiês of old : grant, we beseech thêe ; that we and all the people of this land may have grace to maintain these liberties in righteousness and peace. Through Jesus Christ our Lôr. [Who.]

The LESSON from the Book of Deuteronomy.
Deut. 10. 17.

IN those days ; Moses spake unto Israel, saying : The LORD your God is God of gods, and Lord of lords, a great God, a mighty, and a terrible, which regardeth not persons, nor taketh reward : he doth execute the judge-

ment of the fatherless and widow, and loveth the stranger, in giving him food and raiment. Love ye therefore the stranger : for ye were strangers in the land of Egypt. Thou shalt fear the LORD thy God ; him shalt thou serve, and to him shalt thou cleave, and swear by his name. He is thy praise, and he is thy God, that hath done for thee these great and terrible things, which thine eyes have seen.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 5. 43.

AT that time : Jesus said ; Ye have heard that it hath been said, Thou shalt love thy neighbour, and hate thine enemy. But I say unto you, Love your enemies : bless them that curse you : do good to them that hate you : and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you : that ye may be the children of your Father which is in heaven. For he maketh his sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sendeth rain on the just and on the unjust. For if ye love them which love you, † what reward have ye? † do not even the publicans the same? And if ye salute your brethren only, † what do ye more than others? † do not even the publicans so? Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect.

VOTIVE MASS OF THANKSGIVING DAY

On any day appointed by Civil Authority as Thanksgiving Day, is said in the United States the privileged Votive Mass ordered by Ecclesiastical Authority.

And if on Thanksgiving Day a Holy Day occur, where obligation of Choir exists two Masses are said, one of the Feast without Commem. of the Votive, the other of the Votive without Commem. of the Feast or other Occurrence unless it be of a greater Feria, of a privileged Octave, of a Sunday, or of a II Class Double. But when both Masses are not said, the Votive alone is said, without any Commem. unless it be of one of the aforesaid Occurrences. The non-Prayer-Book Propers given below are those authorized in the Missionary District of the Philippine Islands.

INTROIT. *Citavit eos. Ps. 81.*

HE fed them also with the finest wheat flour : and with honey from the rock hath he satisfied them. *Ps. ibid.* Sing we merrily unto God our strength : make a cheerful noise unto the God of Jacob. *℣.* Glory be.

Gloria in excelsis is said.

COLLECT.

MOST merciful Father, who hast blessed the labours of the husbandmen in the returns of the fruits of the earth : we give thee humble and hearty thanks for this thy bounty ; beseeching thee to continue thy loving-kindness to us, that our land may still yield her increase, to thy glory and our comfort. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. [Who.]

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed James the Apostle.

St. James 1. 16.

DO not err, my beloved brethren. Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down

from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning. Of his own will begot he us with the word of truth, that we should be a kind of firstfruits of his creatures. Wherefore, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath : for the wrath of man worketh not the righteousness of God. Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save your souls. But be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves. For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass : for he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was. But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed. If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain. Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 145. The eyes of all wait upon thee, O Lord : and thou givest them their meat in due season. *V.* Thou openest thine hand : and fillest all things living with plenteousness.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps.* 147. O praise the Lord, for it is a good thing to sing praises unto our God ; yea, a

joyful and pleasant thing it is to be thankful, alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 6. 25.

AT that time : Jesus said ; Be not anxious for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink ; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than food, † and the body than raiment? Behold the fowls of the air : for they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns ; yet your heavenly Father feedeth them. † Are ye not much better than they? † Which of you by being anxious can add one cubit unto the measure of his life? † And why are ye anxious for raiment? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow ; they toil not, neither do they spin ; and yet I say unto you, That even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. Wherefore, if God so clothe the grass of the field, which to-day is, and to-morrow is cast into the oven, shall he not much more clothe you, † O ye of little faith? Therefore be not anxious, saying, † What shall we eat? or, † What shall we drink? or, † Wherewithal shall we be clothed? (For after all these things do the Gentiles seek ;) for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things. But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness : and all these things shall be added unto you. Be not therefore anxious for the morrow : for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 147.* O sing unto the Lord with thanksgiving : sing praises upon the harp unto our God.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, give us a just sense of these and all thy great mercies : such as may appear in our lives by an humble, holy, and obedient walking before thee all our days. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps. 147.* Praise the Lord, O Jerusalem : praise thy God, O Sion. For he hath made fast the bars of thy gates : and hath blessed thy children within thee. He maketh peace in thy borders : and filleth thee with the flour of wheat.

POSTCOMMUNION.

MOST gracious God, by whose knowledge the depths are broken up and the clouds drop dōwn the dew : we yield thee unfeigned thanks and praise for the return of seed-time and harvest, for the increase of the ground and the gathering in of the fruits thereof ; and for all the other blessings of thy merciful providence bestowed upon this nation and people. Through.

PRAYER-BOOK PROPERS FOR ROGATION DAYS

The Mass Exaudivit, following the Mass for the 5th Sunday after Easter in the Proper of the Season, is used as directed by the Rubrics, except for the Collect, Epistle, and Gospel here given from the American Prayer-Book.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY GOD, Lord of heavèn and earth : we beseech thee to pour forth thy blessing upon this land, and to give us a fruitful season ; that we, constantly receiving thy bounty, may evermore give thanks unto thee in thy holy Church. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

The LESSON from Ezekiel the Prophet.
Ezek. 34. 25.

I^N those days the word of the Lord came unto Ezekiel, saying : I will make with them a covenant of peace, and will cause the evil beasts to cease out of the land : and they shall dwell safely in the wilderness, and sleep in the woods. And I will make them and the places round about my hill a blessing ; and I will cause the shower to come down in his season ; there shall be showers of blessing. And the tree of the field shall yield her fruit, and the earth shall yield her increase, and they shall be safe in their land, and shall know that I am the LORD, when I have broken the bands of their yoke, and delivered them out of the hand of those that served themselves of them. And they shall no more be a prey to the heathen, neither shall the beast of the land devour them ; but they shall dwell safely, and none shall make them afraid. And I will raise up for them a plant of renown, and they shall be no more consumed with hunger in the land, neither bear the shame of the heathen any more. Thus shall they know that I the LORD their God am with them, and that they, even the house of Israel, are my people, saith the Lord GOD. And ye my flock, the

flock of my pasture, are men, and I am your God, saith the Lord GOD.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke II. 5.

AT that time : Jesus said unto them, Which of you shall have a friend, and shall go unto him at midnight, and say unto him, Friend, lend me three loaves ; for a friend of mine in his journey is come to me, † and I have nothing to set bêfore him? and he from within shall answer and say, Trôuble me not ; the door is now shut, and my children are with me in bed ; I cannot rise and give thee. I say unto you, Though he will not rise and give him, because he is his friend, yet because of his importunity he will rise and give him as many âs he needeth. And I say unto you, Ask, and it shall bê given you ; seek, and ye shall find ; knock, and it shall be openêd unto you. For every one that askêth receiveth ; and he that sêeketh findeth ; and to him that knocketh it shall bê openêd. If a son shall ask bread of any of you that is a father, † will he give him a stone? or if he ask a fish, † will he for a fish give him â serpent? or if he shall ask an egg, † will he offer him a scôrption? If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children : how much more shall your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to thëm that ask him?

PRAYER-BOOK PROPERS FOR
EMBER DAYS

The appropriate Mass from the Masses of the Season is used except for the

Collect, Epistle, and Gospel here given from the American Prayer-Book.

COLLECT.

O ALMIGHTY God, who hast committed to the hands of men the ministry of reconciliation : we humbly beseech thee, by the inspiration of thy Holy Spirit, to put it into the hearts of many to offer themselves for this ministry ; that thereby mankind may be drawn to thy blessed kingdom. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts 13. 44.*

THE next sabbath day came almost the whole city together to hear the word of God. But when the Jews saw the multitudes, they were filled with envy, and spake against those things which were spoken by Paul, contradicting and blaspheming. Then Paul and Barnabas waxed bold, and said, It was necessary that the word of God should first have been spoken to you : but seeing ye put it from you, and judge yourselves unworthy of everlasting life, lo, we turn to the Gentiles. For so hath the Lord commanded us, saying, I have set thee to be a light of the Gentiles, that thou shouldest be for salvation unto the ends of the earth. THE PROPER OF SAINTS

NOTE, That if the bracketed Feasts in this Proper are to be observed, reference must be made to the Supplement.

The Masses contained in this Proper, with the exceptions of those of peculiar Mysteries of our Lord, or of Feasts of our Lady (unless otherwise noted), or those of St. Joseph on March 19th and of SS. Peter and Paul, are also said as Votives. But when they are so used, unless it be otherwise noted, after the Epistle, the Gradual with the verse following or Tract, or, in Eastertide, the Alleluia, with its verse, when they are not contained in the Mass, are supplied from the appropriate Common. But for Martyrs, in Eastertide, Mass 9, Protexisti, or Mass 10, Sancti tui, as the case may be, is said, with the Prayers, Lesson, and Gospel, from the Proper of the Saint. However, in every Prayer the words on this day, yearly, etc., should be omitted wherever they occur, and the expressions birthday, festivity, changed to commemoration, memory. Also, in place of the Introit Gaudeamus is said the Introit from the appropriate Common. And the Alleluias are omitted out of Eastertide, when they have been added to the Introit, Offertory, and Communion on account of the Paschal Season.

When he prepared the heavens, I was there : when he set a compass upon the face of the depth : when he established the clouds above, when he strengthened the fountains of the deep : when he gave to the sea his decree, that the waters should not pass his commandment : when he appointed the foundations of the earth. Then I was by him, as one brought up with him : and I was daily his delight, rejoicing always before him : rejoicing in the habitable part of his earth ; and my delights were with the sons of men. Now therefore hearken unto me, O ye children : for blessed are they that keep my ways. Hear instruction, and be wise, and refuse it not. Blessed

is the man that heareth me, watching daily at my gates, waiting at the posts of my doors. For whoso findeth me findeth life, and shall obtain favour of the Lord.

GRADUAL. *Judith* 13. 18. Blessed art thou, O Virgin Mary, of the most high God, above all the women upon the earth. *Ps. Ibid.* 15. 9. Thou art the exaltation of Jerusalem, thou art the great glory of Israel : thou art the great rejoicing of our nation.

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts* 9. 1.

IN those days : [And] Saul, yet breathing out threatenings and slaughter against the disciples of the Lord, went unto the high priest, and desired of him letters to Damascus to the synagogues : that, if he found any of this way, whether they were men or women, he might bring them bound unto Jerusalem. And, as he journeyed, he came near Damascus : and suddenly there shined round about him a light from heaven. And he fell to the earth, and heard a voice saying unto him : Saul, Saul, † why persecutêst thou me? And he said : † Who art thou, Lord? And the Lord said : I am Jesus whom thou persecutest : it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks. And he, trembling and astonished, said : Lord, † what wilt thou have mê to do? And the Lord said unto him : Arise, and go into the

city, and it shall be told thee what thou must do. And the men which journeyed with him stood speechless, hearing a voice, but seeing no man. And Saul arose from the earth, and when his eyes were opened he saw no man. But they led him by the hand, and brought him into Damascus. And he was three days without sight, and neither did eat nor drink. And there was a certain disciple at Damascus, named Ananias : and to him said the Lord in a vision : Ananias. And he said : Behold, I am here, Lord. And the Lord said unto him : Arise, and go into the street which is called Straight : and enquire in the house of Judas for one called Saul, of Tarsus : for behold, he prayeth, and hath seen in a vision a man named Ananias, coming in, and putting his hand on him, that he might receive his sight. Then Ananias answered : Lord, I have heard by many of this man, how much evil he hath done to thy saints at Jerusalem : and here he hath authority from the chief priests to bind all that call on thy Name. But the Lord said unto him : Go thy way ; for he is a chosen vessel unto me, to bear my Name before the Gentiles, and kings, and the children of Israel. For I will shew him how great things he must suffer for my Name's sake. And Ananias went his way, and entered into the house ; and, putting his hands on him, said : Brother Saul, the Lord, (even Jesus that appeared unto thee in the way as thou camest,) hath sent me, that thou mightest receive thy sight, and be filled with the Holy Ghost. And immediately there fell from his eyes as it had been

scales : and he received sight forthwith : and arose, and was baptized. And when he had received meat, he was strengthened. Then was Saul certain days with the disciples which were at Damascus. And straightway he preached Christ in the synagogues, that he is the Son of God. But all that heard him were amazed, and said : Is not this he that destroyed them which called on this Name in Jerusalem : and came hither for that intent, † that he might bring them bound unto thê chief priests? But Saul increased the more in strength, and confounded the Jews which dwelt at Damascus, proving that this is very Christ.

GRADUAL. *Gal. 2.* He that wrought effectually in Peter to the apostleship of the Circumcision, the same was also mighty in me toward the Gentiles : and they perceived the grace that was given unto me. *℣. 1 Cor. 15.* The grace of God which was bestowed upon me was not in vain : but his grace ever abideth in me.

be set in the middle before the Altar, or at the Epistle corner, and, his hands being joined, shall say in the ferial tone:

V. The Lord be with you. *R.* And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

OLORD holy, Father almighty, everlasting God, who hast made all things out of nothing, and hast appointed that the labours of bees should be formed into wax by thine ordinance : who didst likewise as on this day fulfil the prayers of thy righteous

servant Simeon : we humbly beseech thee ; that thou wouldest vouchsafe, by the power of thy holy Name, and at the intercession of blessed Mary Ever-Virgin, whose festival we this day devoutly celebrate, and of all thy Saints, to bless and sanctify these candles for the use of men, and for their protection both in body and soul in all perils of land or sea : hear, O Lord, we humbly pray thee, from thy holy heaven and from the throne of thy glory the voice of this thy people, that seeketh to bear them forth to thy glory and to sing thy praises : and we humbly beseech thee that thou wouldest have mercy on all them that call upon thee, whom thou hast redeemed with the precious Blood of thy dear Son. by thy parents in the temple : whom Simeon in his old age, being enlightened by the light of thy Spirit, knew and blessed, taking thee in his arms : mercifully grant ; that we, being enlightened and instructed by the grace of the same Spirit, may know thee truly in our minds and love thee faithfully with all our hearts. Who livest and reignest with the Father in the unity of the same.

§ *The prayers being ended, the Celebrant shall set incense in the censer; then shall he sprinkle the candles thrice with holy water, saying the Antiphon Thou shalt purge me, but without singing and not saying the Psalm: and he shall cense them thrice. Then shall the first of the Priests that are present approach the Altar, and from him shall the Celebrant take his candle, neither genuflecting nor kissing his hand. And afterwards the Celebrant standing in the midst afore the Altar, turning to the People, delivers the candles first to the first of the Priests from whom he received the candle himself, and then to the Deacon and Subdeacon in their vestments; and thereafter to the Priests and Deacons, if any be present, according to their order; and finally to the People; all genuflecting and kissing the candle and the hand of the Celebrant, excepting the Bishops if any be present. And when he beginneth to deliver the candles, the Choir shall sing:*

Antiphon. St. Luke 2. To be a light to lighten the Gentiles : and to be the glory of thy people Israel.

Cant. ibid. Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word.

Then shall be repeated the whole Antiphon: To be a light, which shall

be repeated in like manner after each verse.

For mine eyes have seen thy salvation. *Ant. To be a light.*

Which thou hast prepared before the face of all people. *Ant. To be a light.*

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost. *Ant. To be a light.*

As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen. *Ant. To be a light.*

This being done shall be sung this Antiphon: Ps. 44. O Lord, arise, help us : and deliver us for thy Name's sake.

Ps. ibid. O God, we have heard with our ears : our fathers have declared unto us. V. Glory be.

Then shall be repeated the Antiphon O Lord, arise.

Then shall the Priest say: Let us pray.

§ *And if it be on any day after Septuagesima, not being a Sunday, the Deacon shall say:*

And the Thurifer shall go first with smoking censer: and after him the Subdeacon vested and bearing the Cross in the midst between two Acolytes with lighted torches: then shall follow the Clergy after their order; and last the Celebrant with the Deacon on his left, all bearing lighted candles in their hands: and the Antiphons following shall be sung.

O Sion, adorn thy bride-chamber, and receive Christ thy King: greet Mary who is the gate of heaven: for she beareth the King of the glory of the new light: she remaineth a Virgin, yet beareth in her arms a Son begotten before the morning star: whom Simeon took in his arms declaring to all nations that he is Lord of life and death, and Saviour of the world.

Another Ant. St. Luke 2. It was revealed unto Simeon by the Holy Ghost, that he should not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ: and when they brought the child into the temple, then took he him up in his arms and blessed God and said: Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace.

¶. When his parents brought in the Child Jesus to do for him according to the custom of the law, then took he him up in his arms.

And as they enter the Church shall be sung:

¶. They offered for him unto the Lord a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons: * As it is written in the law of the Lord.

AT that time : [And] When the days of Mary's purification, according to the Law of Moses, were accomplished, they brought Jesus to Jerusalem, to present him to the Lord, as it is written in the law of the Lord : Every male that openeth the womb shall be called holy to the Lord ; and to offer a sacrifice according to that which is said in the law of the Lord, a pair of turtledoves, or twô young pigeons. And, behold, there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name wâs Simeon ; and the same man was just and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Ghost wâs upon him. And Simeon blessed them, and said unto Mary his mother : Behold, this Child is set for the fall and rising again of many in Israël ; and for a sign which shall be spoken against, yea, a sword shall pierce through thine own soul also, that the thoughts of many hearts may bê revealed. And there was one Anna a prophetess, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Aser ; she was of a great age, and had lived with an husband seven years from her vîrginity. And she was a widow of about fourscore and four years, which departed not from the temple, but served God with fastings and prayers night and day. And she coming in that instant gave thanks likewise unto the Lord, and spake of him to all them that looked for redemption in Jérusalem. And when they had performed all things according to the law of the Lord, they returned into Galilee to their own city Nazareth. And the Child grew, and waxed strong in spirit, fillêd with wisdom ; and the grace of Gôd was upon him. *The Creed is said.*

of the Feria is said in Choir, without Commem. of the Feast. Private Masses may be said, either of the Feast with Commem. and Last Gospel of the Feria, or of the Feria with Commem. of the Feast, in accordance with the Rubrics. On Doubles of I or II Class, a Conventual Mass of the Feast is said in Choir, and a Mass of the Feria out of Choir, in which case private Masses of the Feria are forbidden.

§ Likewise throughout Lent, from Ash Wednesday until the Saturday before Passion Sunday inclusive, in all Masses of semidouble Feasts, and in Votive Masses which are not for an important matter of public intention, after the Commem. of the Feria, is said the Collect assigned for the various Seasons, as on Ash Wednesday. In Conventual or sung Masses, if the Feria be not commemorated, Collect 2 is Defend us, 3 for the Quick and Dead, Almighty, as on Ash Wednesday.

Wherefore they are no more twain, but one flesh. What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder. They say unto him : Why did Moses then command to give a writing of divorcement, † and to put her away? He saith unto them : Moses because of the hardness of your hearts suffered you to put away your wives : but from the beginning it was not so. If the Procession be omitted, on Monday after None is said the Mass of the Rogations out of Choir, and on Wednesday after Sext is always said the Mass of the Vigil. Private Masses of the Feria and of the Vigil are forbidden.

The words that I speak unto you I speak nôt of myself. But the Father, that dwelleth in me, he dôeth the works. Believe me that I am in the Father, and the Fâther in me. Or else believe me for the vêry works' sake. Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also, and greater works than these shall he do : because I go untô my Father. And whatsoever ye shall ask in my Name, that will I do, that the Father may be glorifiêd in the Son. If ye shall ask any thing in mÿ Name, I will do it. *The Creed is said.*

And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the Cross. Wherefore God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a Name which is above every name : (*here genuflect*) that at the Name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth : and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Jesus answered and said unto him : Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kîngdom of God. Jesus answered : Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kîngdom of God. That which is born of thê flesh is flesh ; and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit. Marvel not that I said unto thee : Ye must bê born again. The wind bloweth where it listeth, and thou hearest the sound thereof, but canst not tell whence it cometh, and whithêr it goeth ; so is every one that is born of the Spirit. Nicodemus answered and said unto him : ‡ How can thêse things be? Jesus answered and said unto him : Art thou a master of Israel, ‡ and knowest nôt these things? Verily, verily, I say unto thee, We speak that we do know, and testify that we have seen, and ye believe nôt our witness. If I have told you earthly things, and ye believe not : how shall ye be-

lieve, ‡ if I tell you of heavênly things? And no man hath ascended up to heaven, but he that came down from heaven, even the Son of Man, which is in heaven. And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have etêrnal life. *The Creed is said.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 118.* The right hand of the Lord hath thê pre-eminence, the right hand of the Lord bringeth mighty things to pass : I shall not die but live, and declare the works of the Lord, alleluia.

The LESSON from *Jeremiah* the Prophet. *Jer.* 1. 4.

and hast made him to have dominion of the works of thy hands, O Lord.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that thou wouldest vouchsafe to sanctify these our oblations : and, at the intercession of blessed John the Baptist, to cleanse us from the defilement of all our iniquities. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 21. His honour is great in thy salvation : glory and great

worship shalt thou lay upon him, O Lord.

POSTCOMMUNION.

DEARLY beloved : Continue thou in the things which thou hast learned and hast been assured of : knowing of whom thou hast learned them, and

that from a child thou hast known the holy Scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus. All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness : that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works. I charge thee therefore before God, and the Lord Jesus Christ, who shall judge the quick and the dead at his appearing and his kingdom : preach the word, be instant in season, out of season : reprove, rebuke, exhort with all long-suffering and doctrine. O GOD, who art the author of peace and lover of concord, in knowledge of whom standeth our eternal life, whose service is perfect freedom : defend us, thy humble servants, in all assaults of our enemies ; that, at the intercession of blessed Irenaeus thy Martyr and Bishop, we, surely trusting in thy defence, may not fear the power of any adversaries. The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts 3. 1.*

IN those days : Peter and John went up together into the temple at the hour of prayer, being the ninth hour. And a certain man lame from his mother's womb was carried : whom they laid daily at the gate of the temple which is called Beautiful, to ask alms of them that entered into the temple. Who seeing Peter and John about to go into the temple asked an alms. And Peter, fastening his eyes upon him with John, said : Look on us. And he gave heed unto them, expecting to receive something of them. Then

Peter said : Silver and gold have I none ; but such as I have give I thee : In the Name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk. And he took him by the right hand, and lifted him up, and immediately his feet and ankle bones received strength. And he leaping up stood, and walked : and entered with them into the temple, walking, and leaping, and praising God. And all the people saw him walking and praising God. NOW I know of a surety that the Lord hath sent his Angel : and hath delivered me from the hand of Herod, and from all the expectation of the people of the Jews. *Ps. 139.* O Lord, thou hast searched me out and known me : thou knowest my downsitteing and mine uprising. *V. Glory be.*

[NOTE, That the bracketed words in the following Collect were proposed by Bishop Cosin in order to bring the Prayer-Book Proper into accordance with the tradition that this Feast is to be kept in honour of both the holy Apostles Peter and Paul, and must be omitted where this Feast is kept in honour of Saint Peter alone.]

COLLECT.

O ALMIGHTY GOD, who by thy Son Jesus Christ didst give to thy Apostle Saint Peter many excellent gifts, and commandedst him earnestly to feed thy flock ; [and madest thy Apostle Saint Paul a chosen vessel to bear thy name amôngst the Gentiles:] make, we beseech thee, all Bishops and Pastors diligently to preach thy holy Wôrd ; and the people obediently to follow the same, that they may receive the crown of everlasting glory. Through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts 12. 1.*

ABOUT that time ; Herod the king stretched forth his hands to vex certain of the Church. And he killed James the brother of John with the sword. And, because he saw it pleased the Jews, he proceeded further to take Peter also. Then were the days of unleavened bread. And when he had apprehended him, he put him in prison, and delivered him to four quaternions of soldiers to keep him : intending after Easter to bring him forth to the people. Peter therefore was kept in prison. But prayer was made without ceasing of the Church unto God for him. And when Herod would have brought him forth, the same night Peter was sleeping between two soldiers, bound with two chains : and the keepers before the door kept the prison. And behold, the Angel of the Lord came upon him : and a light shined in the prison : and he smote Peter on the side, and raised him up, saying : Arise up quickly. And his chains fell off from his hands. And the Angel said unto him : Gird thyself, and bind on thy sandals. And so he did. And he saith unto him : Cast thy garment about thee, and follow me. And he went out and followed him, and wist not that it was true

which was done by the Angel : but thought he saw a vision. When they were past the first and second ward, they came unto the iron gate that leadeth unto the city : which opened to them of his own accord. And they went out, and passed on through one street : and forthwith the Angel departed from him. And when Peter was come to himself, he said : Now I know of a surety, that the Lord hath sent his Angel, and hath delivered me out of the hand of Herod, and from all the expectation of the people of the Jews.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 45. Thou shalt make them princes in all lands : they shall remember thy Name, O Lord. *V.* Instead of thy fathers thou shalt have children : therefore shall the people give thanks unto thee.

GRADUAL. *Gal. 2.* He that wrought effectually in Peter to the apostleship of the Circumcision, the same was also mighty in me toward the Gentiles : and they perceived the grace that was given unto me. *Ÿ. 1 Cor. 15.* The grace of God which was bestowed upon me was not in vain : but his grace ever abideth in me.

Alleluia, alleluia. *Ÿ.* Holy Paul the Apostle, preacher of truth and teacher of the Gentiles, pray for us. Alleluia.

is to say, not of this building : neither by the blood of goats and calves, but by his own Blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us. For if the blood of bulls and of goats, and the ashes of an heifer sprinkling the unclean, sanctifieth to the purifying of the flesh : how much more shall the Blood of Christ, who, through the eternal Spirit, offered himself without spot to God, ‡ purge your consciences from dead works to serve the living God? And for this cause he is the Mediator of the new testament : that by means of death, for the redemption of the transgressions that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance : in Christ Jesus our Lord.

There are three that bare record in heaven : the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost : and these three are one. And there are three that bare witness in earth : the Spirit, and the Water, and the Blood : and these three agree in one.

Alleluia, alleluia. V. If we receive the witness of men, the witness of God is greater. Alleluia.

And all the Angels stood round about the throne, and about the elders and the four living creatures, and fell before the throne on their faces, and worshipped God, saying, Amen : Blessing, and glory, and wisdom, and thanksgiving, and honour, and power, and might, be unto our God for ever and ever. Amen.

And one of the elders answered, saying unto me : † What are these which are arrayed in white robes? ‡ and whence came they? And I said unto him : Sir, thou knowest. And he said to me : These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. Therefore are they before the throne of God, and serve him day and night in his temple : and he that sitteth on the throne shall dwell among them. They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more ; neither shall the sun light on them, nor any heat. For the Lamb which is in the midst of the throne shall feed them, and shall lead them unto living fountains of waters : and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes.

Therefore I endure all things for the elect's sakes, that they may also obtain the salvation which is in Christ Jesus with eternal glory. But thou hast fully known my doctrine, manner of life, purpose, faith, longsuffering, charity, patience, persecutions, afflictions : which came unto me at Antioch, at Iconium, at Lystra ; what persecutions I endured : but out of them all the Lord delivered me. DEARLY beloved : Count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations ; knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience. But let patience have her perfect work : that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing. If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not ; and it shall be given him. But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering. For he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea driven with the wind and tossed. For let not that man think that he shall receive anything of the Lord. A double-minded man is unstable in all his ways. Let the brother of low degree rejoice in that he is exalted : but the rich in that he is made low : because as the flower of the grass he shall pass away. For the sun is no sooner risen with a burning heat, but it withereth the grass, and the flower thereof falleth, and the grace of the fashion of it perisheth : so also shall the rich man fade away in his ways. Blessed is the man that endureth temptation : for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him.

[2] The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Peter the Apostle.

1 *St. Peter* 4. 13.

DEARLY beloved : Rejoice inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings : that, when his glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy. If ye be reproached for the name of Christ happy are ye ; for the spirit of glory and of God resteth upon you : on their part he is evil spoken of, but on your part he is

glorified. But let none of you suffer as a murderer, or as a thief, or as an evildoer, or as a busybody in other men's matters. Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed : but let him glorify God on this behalf. For the time is come that judgement must begin at the house of God : and if it first begin at us, † what shall the end be of them that obey not the Gospêl of God? And if the righteous scarcely be saved, ‡ where shall the ungodly and the sinnêr appear? Wherefore let them that suffer according to the will of God commit the keeping of their souls to him in well doing, as unto a faithful Creator.

[3] † The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 12. 24.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : Verily, verily I say unto you, except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone ; but if it die, it bringêth forth much fruit. He that loveth his life shall lose it ; and he that hateth his life in this world shall keep it unto life eternal. If any man serve me, let him follow me ; and where I am, there shall also my servant be. If any man serve me him will my Fâther honour.

Wisd. 3. 1.

THE souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and there shall no torment touch them. In the sight of the unwise they seemed to die : and their departure is taken for misery : and their going from us to be utter destruction : but they are in peace. For though they be punished in the sight of men, yet is their hope full of immortality. And having been a little chastised, they shall be greatly rewarded : for God proved them, and

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 21. 9.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : When ye shall hear of wars and commotions, be not têtterrifièd : for these things must first come to pass : but the end is nôt by and by. Then said he unto them : Nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom âgainst kingdom ; and great earthquakes shall be in divers places, and famines and pêttilences ; and fearful sights and great signs shall there bê from heaven.

But before all these, they shall lay their hands on you, and persecute you, delivering you up to the synagogues, and into prisons, being brought before kings and rulers fôr my Name's sake. And it shall turn to you for a têtstimony. Settle it therefore in your hearts, not to meditate before what yê shall answer ; for I will give you a mouth and wisdom, which all your adversaries shall not be able to gainsây nor resist. And ye shall be betrayed both by parents, and brethren, and kinsfolks, and friends ; and some of you shall they cause to bê put to death. And ye shall be hated of all men fôr my Name's sake. But there shall not an hair of yôur head perish. In your patience possèss ye your souls.

After Septuagesima Alleluia at the end of the following Offertory is omitted, but otherwise it is said through the year.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 68. O God, wonderful art thou in thy Saints : even the God of Israel, he will give strength and power unto his people, blessed be God, (alleluia).

SECRET.

ASSIST us mercifully, O Lord, in these our supplications which we make before thee in remembrance of thy Saints : that we who trust not in our own righteousness may be succoured by the merits of them that have found favour in thy sight. Through.

COMMUNION. *Wisd.* 3. For though they be punished in the sight of men, yet hath God proved them : as gold in the furnace hath he tried them, and received them as a burnt offering.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 6. 17.

AT that time : Jesus came down from the mountain and stood in the plain, and the company of his disciples, and a great multitude of people out of all Judæa and Jerusalem and from the sea coast of Tyre and Sidon, which came to hear him, and to be healed of thêir diseases ; and they that were vexed with ûnclean spirits ; and thêy were healèd. GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that at the intercession of thy holy Martyrs *N.* and *N.*, we, who with our outward lips have partaken of this holy Sacramënt, may inwardly receive the same in purity of heart. Through.

Heb. 10. 32.

BRETHREN : Call to remembrance the former days, in which, after ye were illuminated, ye endured a great fight of afflictions ; partly, whilst ye were made a gazingstock both by reproaches and afflictions ; and partly, whilst ye became companions of them that were so used. For ye had compassion of me in my bonds, and took joyfully the spoiling of your goods, knowing in yourselves that ye have in heaven a better and an enduring substance. Cast not away therefore your confidence, which hath great recompence of reward. For ye have need of patience, that, after ye have done the will of God, ye might receive the

promise. For yet a little while, and he that shall come will come, and will not tarry. Now the just shall live by faith.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 24. 3.

AT that time : As Jesus sat upon the Mount of Olives, the disciples came unto him privately, saying : Tell us, † when shall these things be? and what shall be the sign of thy coming, † and of the end of the world? And Jesus answered and said unto them : Take heed that no man deceive you. For many shall come in my Name, saying : I am Christ ; and shall deceive many. And ye shall hear of wars and rumours of wars ; see that ye be not troubled : for all these things must come to pass, but the end is not yet. For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom ; and there shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes, in divers places. All these are the beginning of

After Septuagesima Alleluia at the end of the following Offertory is omitted, but otherwise it is said through the year.

OFFERTORY. *Wisd.* 3. The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and there shall no torment touch them : in the sight of the unwise they seemed to die : but they are in peace, (alleluia.)

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to accept these our oblations : that at the intercession of thy holy Martyrs *N.* and *N.* we may by thee be defended against all adversities. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. Matt. 10.* What I tell you in darkness, that speak ye in light, saith the Lord : and what ye hear in the ear that preach ye upon the housetops.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, that this holy Communion may cleanse us from every guilty stain : and at the intercession of blessed *N.* and *N.* thy holy Martyrs, may be our healing unto life eternal. Through.

Other Lessons and Gospels for the Common of several Martyrs.

[1] The LESSON from the Book of Wisdom. *Wisd. 10. 17.*

GOD rendered to the righteous a reward of their labours, guided them in a marvellous way, and was unto them for a cover by day, and a light of stars in the night-season ; brought them through the Red sea, and led them through much water : but he drowned their enemies, and cast them up out of the bottom of the deep. Therefore the righteous spoiled the ungodly, and praised thy holy Name, O Lord, and magnified with one accord thine hand, that fought for them, O Lord our God.

[2] The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Romans. *Romans 5. 1.*

BRETHREN : Being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ : by whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand, and rejoice in hope of the glory of God. And not only so, but we glory in tribulations also : knowing that tribulation worketh patience ; and patience experience ; and experience hope : and hope maketh not ashamed ; because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us.

[3] The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Romans. *Romans 8. 18.*

BRETHREN : I reckon that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory

which shall be revealed in us. For the earnest expectation of the creature waiteth for the manifestation of the sons of God. For the creature was made subject to vanity, not willingly, but by reason of him who hath subjected the same in hope : because the creature itself also shall be delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God. For we know that the whole creation groaneth and travaileth in pain together until now. And not only they, but ourselves also, which have the first-fruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting for the adoption, to wit, the redemption of our body.

[4] The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians. *2 Cor. 6. 4.*

BRETHREN : Let us in all things approve ourselves as the ministers of God in much patience, in afflictions, in necessities, in distresses, in stripes, in imprisonments, in tumults, in labours, in watchings, in fastings ; by pureness, by knowledge, by longsuffering, by kindness, by the Holy Ghost, by love unfeigned, by the word of truth, by the power of God, by the armour of righteousness on the right hand and on the left, by honour and dishonour, by evil report and good report : as deceivers and yet true : as unknown and yet well known : as dying, and, behold, we live : as chastened and not killed : as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing : as poor, yet making many rich : as having nothing, and yet possessing all things.

[5] The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Hebrews.

Heb. II. 33.

BRETHREN : Through faith the Saints subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, waxed valiant in fight, turned to flight the armies of the aliens. Women received their dead raised to life again : and others were tortured, not accepting deliverance ; that they might obtain a better resurrection : and others had trial of cruel mockings and scourgings, yea, moreover of bonds and imprisonment : they were stoned, they were sawn asunder, were tempted, were slain with the sword : they wandered about in sheepskins and goatskins ; being destitute, afflicted, tormented ; (of whom the world was not worthy :) they wandered in deserts, and in mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth. And these all obtained a good report through faith in Jesus Christ our Lord.

[6] The LESSON from the Book of the Revelation of blessed John the Apostle.

Rev. 7. 13.

IN those days : One of the elders answered and said unto me : † What are these which are arrayed in white robes? † and whence came they? And I said unto him : Sir, thou knowest. And he said to me : These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

Therefore are they before the throne of God, and serve him day and night in his temple : and he that sitteth on the throne shall dwell among them. They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more ; neither shall the sun light on them, nor any heat. For the Lamb which is in the midst of the throne shall feed them, and shall lead them unto living fountains of waters : and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes.

[7] † The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 5. 1.

AT that time : Jesus, seeing the multitudes, went up into a mountain ; and when he was set, his disciples came unto him, and he opened his mouth, and taught them, saying : Blessed are the poor in spirit : for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are they that mourn : for they shall be comforted. Blessed are the meek : for they shall inherit the earth. Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness : for they shall be filled. Blessed are the merciful : for they shall obtain mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart : for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers : for they shall be called the children of God. Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake : for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for my sake. Rejoice, and be exceeding glad : for great is your reward in heaven.

[8] ✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 11. 25.

AT that time : Jesus answered and said : I thank thee, O Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and hast revealed thê m unto babes. Even so, Father : for so it seemed gôod in thy sight. All things are delivered unto me ôf my Father ; and no man knoweth the Son bût the Father ; neither knoweth any man the Father, save the Son, and he to whomsoever the Son will reveal him. Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me : for I am meek and lôwly in heart : and ye shall find rest ûnto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my bürden is light.

[9] ✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 11. 47.

AT that time : Jesus said unto the scribes and Pharisees : Wôe unto you! For ye build the sepulchres of the Prophets, and your fathêrs killed them. Truly ye bear witness that ye allow the deeds ôf your fathers ; for they indeed killed them, and ye build thêir sepulchres. Therefore also said the wisdom of God : I will send them Prophets and Apostles, and some of them they shall slay and persecute : that the blood of all the Prophets, which was shed from the foundation of the world, may be required of this gêneratiôn ; from the blood of Abel unto the blood of Zacharias, which perished between the altar ând the

temple ; verily I say unto you : It shall be required of this generation.

[10] ✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 10. 16.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : He that heareth yôu heareth me ; and he that despiseth you dêspiseth me ; and he that despiseth me, despiseth hîm that sent me. And the seventy returned again with joy, saying : Lord, even the devils are subject unto ûs through thy Name. And he said unto them : I beheld Satan as lightning fâll from heaven. Behold, I give unto you power to tread on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of thê enemy ; and nothing shall by anÿ means hurt you. Notwithstanding in this rejoice not, that the spirits are subjêct unto you ; but rather rejoice, because your names are wriâten in heaven.

St. Luke 12. 1.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : Beware ye of the leaven of the Pharisees, which is hÿpocrisy. For there is nothing covered that shall not be revealed ; neither hid that shall not be known. Therefore whatsoever ye have spoken in darkness shall be heard in the light : and that which ye have spoken in the ear in closets shall be proclaimed upôn the house-tops. And I say unto you my friends : Be not afraid of them that kill the body, and after that have no more thât they can do. But I will forewarn you whom ye shall fear : Fear him,

which after he hath killed hath power to câst into hell ; yea, I say untô you : Fear him. Are not five sparrows sold for two farthings, † and not one of them is forgotten bêfore God? But even the very hairs of your head are

âll numberèd. Fear not therefore : ye are of more value than mâny sparrows. Also I say unto you : Whosoever shall confess me before men, him shall the Son of Man also confess before the Angels of God.

IN those days : After these things I, John, heard a great voice of much people in heaven, saying : Alleluia : Salvation and glory, and honour, and power, unto the Lord our God : for true and righteous are his judgements : for he hath judged the great whore, which did corrupt the earth with her fornication, and hath avenged the blood of his servants at her hand. And again they said : Alleluia ; and her smoke rose up for ever and ever. And the four-and-twenty elders and the four living creatures fell down and worshipped God that sat on the throne, saying : Amen ; Alleluia. And a voice came out of the throne, saying : Praise our God, all ye his servants, and ye that fear him, both small and great. And I heard as it were the voice of a great multitude, and as the voice of many waters, and as the voice of mighty thunderings, saying : Alleluia : for the Lord God omnipotent reigneth. Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honour to him : for the marriage of the Lamb is come, and his wife hath made herself ready. And to her was granted

that she should be arrayed in fine linen, clean and white : for the fine linen is the righteousness of Saints. And he saith unto me : Write : Blessed are they which are called unto the marriage supper of the Lamb.

[2] † The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 16. 20.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : Verily, verily I say unto you : that ye shall weep and

lament, but the wôrld shall rejoice ; and ye shall be sorrowful, but your sorrow shall be turnêd into joy. A woman when she is in travail hath sorrow, because hêr hour is come ; but as soon as she is delivered of the child, she remembereth no more the anguish, for joy that a man is born into the world. And ye now therefôre have sorrow ; but I will see you again, and your heart shall rejoice, and your joy no man taketh from you.

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that the devout observance of this festival of blessed N., thy Con-

fessor and Bishôp, may be profitable unto us for our advancement in all godliness, and for the attainment of everlasting salvation. Through.

The LESSON from the Book of Ecclesiasticus. *Eccus.* 44. 16.

BEHOLD a great priest who in his days pleased the Lord and was found righteous : and in the time of wrath he was taken in exchange for the world. There was none like unto him to keep the law of the Most High. Therefore by an oath the Lord assured him that he would increase him among his people. He established with him the blessing of all men and the covenant, and made it rest upon his head. He acknowledged him in his blessing : and preserved for him his mercy : so that he found favour in the sight of the Lord. He magnified him in the sight of kings : and gave unto him a crown of glory. An everlasting covenant he made with him and gave him a great priesthood and blessed him with glory, that he should

execute the office of the priesthood and have honour in his name and offer unto him incense and a sweet savour.

GRADUAL. *Ecclus. 44.* Behold a great priest who in his days pleased the Lord. *V.* There was none like unto him to keep the law of the Most High.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V. Ps. 110.* Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchisedech. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps. 112.* Blessed is the man that feareth the Lord : he hath great delight in his commandments. *V.* His seed shall be mighty upon earth : the generation of the faithful shall be blessed. *V.* Riches and plentifulness shall be in his house : and his righteousness endureth for ever.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *V. Ps. 110.* Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchisedech. Alleluia. *V.* This is a priest whom the Lord hath crowned. Alleluia.

AT that time : Jesus spake this parable unto his disciples : A certain man travelling into a far country called his own servants, and delivered unto them his goods. And unto one he gave five talents, to another two, and to another one ; to every man according to his several ability ; and straightway took his journey. Then he that had received the five talents went and traded with the same, and made them

other five talents. And likewise he that had received two, he also gained other two. But he that had received one went and digged in the earth and hid his lord's money. After a long time the lord of those servants cometh, and reckoneth with them. And so he that had received five talents came and brought other five talents, saying : Lord, thou deliveredst unto me five talents ; behold, I have gained beside them five talents more. His lord said unto him : Well done, thou good and faithful servant ; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things ; enter thou into the joy of thy lord. He also that had received two talents came and said : Lord, thou deliveredst unto me two talents ; behold, I have gained two other talents beside them. His lord said unto him : Well done, good and faithful servant ; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things ; enter thou into the joy of thy lord.

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 89.* I have found David my servant : with my holy oil have I anointed him : my hand shall hold him fast, and my arm shall strengthen him (alleluia).

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord, that we remembering with gladness the righteousness of thy Saints, may at all times and in all places feel the effectual succour of their intercession. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. Luke 12.* A faithful and wise steward, whom his Lord hath made ruler over his household :

For I say unto you : That unto every one that hath shall be given ; and from him that hath not, even that he hath shall be taken away from him.

And Zacchaeus stood, and said unto the Lord : Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor ; and if I have taken any thing from any man by false accusation, I restore him fourfold. If the Mass of St. Mary on Saturday is to be said within simple Octaves of the same Blessed Virgin Mary, it is said as on the respective Feast, but with Collects 2 and 3 as above, for the various Seasons, and without the Creed, in accordance with the Rubrics.

THE VOTIVE MASSES

I

Votive Masses which may be said in Choir in place of the Conventual Mass

[*Since the Divine Office and the Mass together constitute the liturgy for the day, and so are interdependent, the Mass should as far as possible agree with the Kalendar either of the Celebrant's own Office (whether this be the daily Prayer-Book Office or the Breviary) or of the place where the Mass is said. (Thus, except in Mass specially arranged for the Celebrant's own devotion, the Chaplain of a Convent follows the Kalendar of the Sisters for whom he is saying Mass; or a Priest celebrating in a Church other than his own, the Kalendar of the place.) In general, therefore, the Mass should follow the Kalendar of the place, and Commemorations should be made of each and every Occurrence celebrated in the Office of the day.*

But certain exceptions to the foregoing are obvious, such as those stated in the Rubrics concerning Seasonal Prayers and the following directions concerning Votive Masses (i.e., Masses not in agreement with the Kalendar). However, even in the case of Votives, due regard must be paid to the liturgy of the day. The Kalendar does not always permit them, and when it does, unless the Votive be privileged, the 2nd Prayer is the principal Prayer of the Mass of the day; and Commemorations of Occurrences, if there be any, displace the Seasonal Prayers.

Privileged Votives are of two sorts: (a) A Solemn Mass (or at least a sung Mass) for an important matter of public intention which is treated almost as if it were the Mass of a I Class Double. (In such a Mass the ordinary Feria is not commemorated but only important Occurrences, and not even these if in the same place the Mass of the day be sung.) (b) A Votive concerning which its own Rubrics or ecclesiastical authority gives some special privilege. (Cf. Votive Mass [9])

Since Votive Masses are ordinarily of the simple rite (even the Mass of our Lady on Saturday), when a Votive Mass is sung, the ferial tone is used unless it be a Solemn Votive for an important matter of public intention, or unless it be a Votive to which has been granted the privilege of the festal tone. Therefore, the pointings of the Prayers should be disregarded except on those rare occasions when the Votive Mass is solemn or privileged.]

§ *One of the following Votive Masses, as assigned to the various days of the week, may be said in Choir in place of the Conventual Mass, when the Office is of the Feria (except the Ferias of Advent, Lent, Embertide, Rogationtide, and Vigils), provided that in accordance with the Rubrics the Mass of an impeded preceding Sunday has not to be said, nor the Conventual Mass for the Dead.*

Collect 2 will be of the Feria, and the third is added from the Seasonal Prayers, in accordance with the Rubrics.

§ *Apart from the Conventual Mass on any free day, the Votive Masses, whether those assigned to the various days of the week, or the remaining Votive Masses set forth for various circumstances, may be said on any day allowed by the Rubrics. Also Votive Masses may be said of the Conception of the B.V.M., the Seven Sorrows of our Lady, as well as of all the canonized Saints in the Martyrology, the Mass being taken from the Proper or Common of Saints. (If they be not in the Kalendar, the Mass is said from the Common, at the Priest's discretion.) But the Masses on the day of the Election and Coronation of the Chief Bishop, and on the Anniversaries of such days, as also on the Election and Consecration of a Bishop, cannot be said as private Masses, but a Commemoration is made of them.*

NOTE, That in Eastertide is added Alleluia in these Votive Masses after the fashion indicated in parentheses.

NOTE ALSO, That if at any time or in any place a Votive Mass become a privileged Votive, or if it be said for an important matter of public intention, it shall follow the rules set forth in books dealing with such matters (e.g., as to the Preface with solemn or ferial Chant, the Gloria in excelsis, the Sequence, etc.).

[1.] A Mass for Monday.

OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

Mass Benedicta sit, as on Trinity Sunday, omitting the Gloria in excelsis but retaining the Preface (in Eastertide

adding Alleluia as prescribed by the Easter rite for the Introit, Offertory, and Communion), except:

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians. 2 Cor. 13. 11.

BRETHREN : Farewell, be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace, and the God of love and peace shall be with you. The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Ghost be with you all. Amen.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia and verse following, is said

TRACT. With our whole heart we confess thee, we praise and bless thee, O God the Father unbegotten, O only-begotten Son, O Holy Ghost the Comforter, holy and undivided Trinity. ✠. For thou art great, and doest wondrous things : thou art God alone. ✠. Thine be the praise, and thine the glory, and thine the thanksgiving, O ever-blessed Trinity.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. ✠. *Song of the Three Children.* Blessed art thou, O Lord of our fathers, and to be praised and exalted above all for ever. Alleluia. ✠. Let us bless the Father and the Son, with the Holy Ghost. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to John.

St. John 15. 26.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : When the Comforter is come, whom I will send unto you from the Father, even the Spirit of truth, which proceedeth from the Fa-

ther, he shall testify of me : and ye also shall bear witness, because ye have been with me from thê beginning. These things have I spoken unto you, that ye should not bê offended. They shall put you out of thê synagogues : yea, the time cometh, that whosoever killeth you will think that he doêth God service. And these things will they do unto you, because they have not known the Fâther, nor me. But these things have I told you, that when the time shall come, ye may remember that I tôld you of them.

[2.] A Mass for Tuesday.

OF THE ANGELS

INTROIT. *Benedicite Dominum. Ps. 103.*

O PRAISE the Lord, ye Angels of his, ye that excel in strength : ye that fulfil his commandment, and hearken unto the voice of his words (alleluia, alleluia). *Ps. ibid.* Praise the Lord, O my soul : and all that is within me, praise his holy Name. *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

O EVERLASTING God, who hast ordained and constituted the services of Angels and men in a wondêrful order : mercifully grant, that as thy holy Angels alway do thee service in heavên, so by thy appointment they may succour and defend us on earth. Through.

Gloria in excelsis is always said.

The LESSON from the Book of the Revelation of blessed John the Apostle.

Rev. 5. 11.

IN those days : I heard the voice of many Angels round about the throne and the living creatures and

the elders : and the number of them was ten thousand times ten thousand, and thousands of thousands, saying with a loud voice : Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive power, and riches, and wisdom, and strength, and honour, and glory, and blessing. And every creature which is in heaven, and on the earth, and under the earth, and such as are in the sea, and all that are in them, heard I saying : Blessing, and honour, and glory, and power, be unto him that sitteth upon the throne, and unto the Lamb for ever and ever. And the four living creatures said : Amen. And the four and twenty elders fell down and worshipped him that liveth for ever and ever.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 148.* O praise the Lord of heaven : praise him in the height. *V.* Praise him, all ye Angels of his : praise him, all his host.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps. 138.* Even before the Angels will I sing praise unto thee : I will worship toward thy holy temple, and praise thy Name. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps. 103.* O praise the Lord, ye Angels of his, ye that excel in strength : ye that fulfil his commandment, and hearken unto the voice of his words. *V.* O praise the Lord, all ye his hosts : ye servants of his, that do his pleasure. *V.* O speak good of the Lord, all ye works of his : in all places of his dominion, praise thou the Lord, O my soul.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *Ps.* 138. Even before the Angels will I sing praise unto thee : I will worship toward thy holy temple, and praise thy Name. Alleluia. *St. Matt.* 28. The Angel of the Lord descended from heaven and came and rolled back the stone from the door, and sat upon it. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to John.

St. John 1. 47.

AT that time : Jesus saw Nathanael coming to him, and saith of him : Behold an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile! Nathanael saith unto him : † Whence knowest thou me? Jesus answered and said unto him : Before that Philip called thee, when thou wast under the fig tree, I saw thee. Nathanael answered and said unto him : Rabbi, thou art the Son of God, thou art the King of Israël. Jesus answered and said unto him : Because I said unto thee : I saw thee under the fig tree, † believest thou? Thou shalt see greater things than these. And he saith unto him : Verily, verily, I say unto you : Hereafter ye shall see heaven open, and the Angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man.

OFFERTORY. *Rev.* 8. An Angel stood at the altar of the temple, having a golden censer in his hand, and there was given unto him much incense : and the smoke of the incense ascended up before God (alleluia).

SECRET.

WE humbly beseech thee, O Lord, that the prayers of thy holy Angels may assist us thy servants who

offer unto thee this sacrifice of praise : that this our offering may be acceptable in thy sight, and profitable unto us for our salvation. Through.

COMMUNION. Angels, Archangels, Thrones and Dominations, Principalities and Powers, heavenly Virtues, Cherubim and Seraphim, bless ye the Lord for ever and ever (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

OR Lord, who hast vouchsafed to accept this frailty of our service and hast fulfilled us with thy heavenly benediction : mercifully grant that the succour of thy holy Angels and Archangels, may effectually avail for the assistance of us thy servants. Through.

[3.] A Mass for Wednesday.

OF ST. JOSEPH, SPOUSE
OF THE B.V.M.

Mass Adjutor is said as on the Feast of the Patronage of St. Joseph (see Propers for Certain Moveable Holy Days, D 1.) according to the directions of the Rubric there given at the end of the said Mass. § If the Seasonal Prayers for asking the prayers of the Saints be said, the words of blessed Joseph should be omitted.

[4.] Another Mass for Wednesday.

OF THE HOLY APOSTLES
PETER & PAUL

OUT OF EASTERTIDE

Mass Mihi autem, for Days within the Octave of the Holy Apostles, as in the Proper of Saints after June 30th, except the Prayers which are those assigned to the Octave Day, July 6th; and except:

GRADUAL. *Ps. 45.* Thou shalt make them princes in all lands : they shall remember thy Name, O Lord. *℣.* Instead of thy fathers thou shalt have children : therefore shall the people give thanks unto thee.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣. Ps. 139.* Right dear are thy friends unto me, O God, and held in highest honour : their rule and governance is exceeding stedfast. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps. 126.* They that sow in tears, shall reap in joy. *℣.* He that now goeth on his way weeping, and beareth forth good seed. *℣.* He shall doubtless come again with joy, and bring his sheaves with him.

IN EASTERTIDE

Mass 9, Protexisti, from Common of Saints, excepting the Prayers, Epistle, Gospel and Preface, which are as in the Mass above.

OF ALL THE HOLY APOSTLES

OUT OF EASTERTIDE

Mass Mihi autem, as on the Feast of SS. Simon & Jude, Oct. 28th in the Proper of Saints, omitting the words Simon and Jude in the Secret and Postcommunion, with the Epistle and Gospel as in the Mass below.

IN EASTERTIDE

Mass with the Prayers as above, and the following:

INTROIT. *Protexisti. Ps. 64.*

THOU hast hidden me, O God, from the gathering together of the forward, alleluia : and from the insurrection of wicked doers, alleluia, alleluia. *Ps. ibid.* Hear my voice, O God, in my prayer : preserve my life from fear of the enemy. *℣.* Glory be.

EPISTLE. Unto to every one of us, *from the Vigil of the Ascension.*

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣. Ps. 89.* O Lord, the very heavens shall praise thy wondrous works : and thy truth in the congregation of the Saints. Alleluia. *℣. St. John 15.* I have chosen you from the world, that ye should go and bring forth fruit, and that your fruit should remain. Alleluia.

GOSPEL. Behold, we have forsaken all, *from Mass 16, Os justi, from Common.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 45.* Thou shalt make them princes in all lands : they shall remember thy Name, O Lord, from one generation to another, alleluia, alleluia.

COMMUNION. *Ps. 19.* Their sound is gone out into all lands : and their words into the ends of the world, alleluia, alleluia.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that these heavenly mysteries, which we have joyfully received on this commemoration of blessed *N.* thine Apostle ; may effectually avail for the glory of thy Sâints, and the forgiveness of the sins of us thy servants. Through.

§ *So also on Wednesdays a Conventual Mass may be said of the chief Patron of the Town or City, Diocese, Province, or Nation, or of the Titular of a particular Church, and of the Title or Holy Founder of an Order or Congregation.*

OF THE HOLY GHOST

INTROIT. *Spiritus Domini. Wisdom 1.*

THE Spirit of the Lord hath filled the whole world : and that which containeth all things hath knowledge of the voice (alleluia, alleluia). *Ps. 68.* Let God arise, and let his enemies be scattered : let them also that hate him flee before him. *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who didst teach the hearts of thy faithful people, by sending to them the light of thy Hôly Spirit : grant us by the same Spirit to have right judgement in all things, and evermore to rejoice in his holy comfort. Through the merits of Christ Jesus our Saviour. Who liveth and reigneth with thee, in the unity of the same Spirit, ône God, world without end.

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles. *Acts 8. 14.*

IN those days : When the Apostles, which were at Jerusalem, heard that Samaria had received the word of God, they sent unto them Peter and John : who, when they were come down, prayed for them, that they might receive the Holy Ghost : for as yet he was fallen upon none of them, only they were baptized in the Name of the Lord Jesus. Then laid they their hands on them, and they received the Holy Ghost.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 33.* Blessed are the people, whose God is the Lord Jehovah : and blessed are the folk that he hath chosen to him to be his inheritance. *V.* By the word of the Lord were the heavens made : and all the hosts of them by the Breath of his mouth.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V. (Here genuflect.)* Come, Holy Ghost, and fill the hearts of thy faithful people : and kindle in them the fire of thy love. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps. 104.* O send forth thy Spirit, and they shall be made : and

thou shalt renew the face of the earth. *V.* O how good and sweet, O Lord, is thy Spirit within us. *V.* (*Here genuflect.*) Come, Holy Ghost, and fill the hearts of thy faithful people : and kindle in them the fire of thy love.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* Ps. 104. O send forth thy Spirit, and they shall be made : and thou shalt renew the face of the earth. Alleluia. *V.* (*Here genuflect.*) Come, Holy Ghost, and fill the hearts of thy faithful people : and kindle in them the fire of thy love. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 14. 23.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : If a man love me, he will keep my words, and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him, and make our âbode with him. He that loveth me not keepeth nôtt my sayings. And the word which ye hear is not mine, but the Fathêr's which sent me. These things have I spoken unto you, being yet prêsent with you. But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my Name, he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you. Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you : not as the world giveth, give Î unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid. Ye have heard how I said unto you : I go away, and come agâin unto you. If ye loved me, ye

would rejoice, because I said : I go unto the Father : for my Father is grêater than I. And now I have told you before it come to pass, that, when it is come to pass, yê might believe. Hereafter I will not talk much with you : for the Prince of this world cometh, and hath nôthing in me. But that the world may know that I love the Father, and as the Father gave me commândment, even so I do.

OFFERTORY. Ps. 68. Stablish the thing, O God, that thou hast wrought in us : for thy temple's sake at Jerusalem, shall kings bring presents unto thee (alleluia).

SECRET.

SANCTIFY, O Lord, we beseech thee, these our oblations : that being enlightened by the beams of thy Holy Spirit, our hearts may be purified from all evil. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

PREFACE of *Pentecost.*

COMMUNION. *Acts 2.* Suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting : and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak the wonderful works of God (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE humbly beseech thee, O Lord, that thou wouldest send down upon our hearts the healthful Spirit of thy grace : and, that we may bring forth fruit unto thêe, pour upon us the inward dew of his blessing. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

To ask the grace of the Holy Ghost Mass is said as above, with these Prayers that follow:

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY GOD, unto whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid : cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of thy Holy Spirit ; that we may perfectly love thee, and worthily magnify thy holy Name. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that this our sacrifice may cleanse our hearts from every stain of sin : that by the power of thy Holy Spirit we may be made a dwelling-place acceptable unto thee. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, we beseech thee, Almighty God : that we thy servants, ever seeking diligently the grace of thy Holy Spirit, may be found worthy to be defended against all temptations, and to obtain the remission of all our sins. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

[8.] Another Mass for Thursday.

OF THE MOST HOLY SACRAMENT

Mass Cibavit eos, as given in the Proper of the Season for the Feast of Corpus Christi, omitting the Sequence and, except in Eastertide, the Alleluia at the end of the Offertory and Communion.

[9.] A Third Mass for Thursday.
OF THE ETERNAL HIGH PRIEST

INTROIT. *Juravit Dominus. Ps. 110.*

THE Lord sware, and will not repent : Thou art a Priest for ever after the order of Melchisedech (alleluia, alleluia). *Ps. ibid.* The Lord said unto my Lord : Sit thou on my right hand. *℣.* Glory be.

On the 1st Thursday of the month the Gloria in excelsis is said.

COLLECT.

GOD, by whose providence thine only-begotten Son was made a High Priest forever, that in him thy majesty might be glorified, and all men might find salvation : mercifully grant that so many as he hath called to be ministers and stewards of his mysteries ; may ever be found faithful in their vocation and ministry. Through the same.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Hebrews.

Heb. 5. 1.

BRETHREN : Every high priest taken from among men, is ordained for men in things pertaining to God, that he may offer both gifts and sacrifices for sins : who can have compassion on the ignorant, and on them that are out of the way, for that he himself also is compassed with infirmity. And by reason hereof he ought, as for the people so also for himself, to offer for sins. And no man taketh this honour unto himself, but he that is called of God as was Aaron. So also Christ glorified not himself to be made an High Priest

but he that said unto him : Thou art my Son ; today have I begotten thee. As he saith also in another place : Thou art a Priest for ever after the order of Melchisedec. Who in the days of his flesh when he had offered up prayers and supplications, with strong crying and tears, unto him that was able to save him from death, and was heard in that he feared ; though he was the Son of God, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered. And being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him ; called of God, an High Priest after the order of Melchisedec. Of whom we have many things to say, and hard to be uttered, seeing ye are dull of hearing.

GRADUAL. *Luke 4.* The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the Gospel to the poor. *℣.* He hath sent me to heal the broken-hearted.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣. Heb. 7.* But Jesus, because he continueth ever, hath an unchangeable Priesthood. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps. 10.* Arise, O Lord God, and lift up thine hand : forget not the poor. *℣.* Surely, thou hast seen it : for thou beholdest ungodliness and wrong. *℣.* The poor committeth himself unto thee : for thou art the helper of the friendless.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣. Heb. 7.* But Jesus, because he continueth ever, hath

an unchangeable Priesthood. Alleluia. *℣. Luke 4.* The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me, to preach the Gospel to the poor : he hath sent me to heal the broken-hearted. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to Luke.

St. Luke 22. 14.

AT that time : Jesus sat down, and the twelve Apôtles with him. And he said unto them : With desire I have desired to eat this Passover with you, before I suffer. For I say unto you, I will not any more eat thereof, until it be fulfilled in the kingdom of God. And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and said : Take this, and divide it among yourselves. For I say unto you, I will not drink of the fruit of the vine, until the kingdom of God shall come. And he took bread, and gave thanks, and brake it, and gave unto them, saying : This is my Body, which is given for you : this do in remembrance of me. Likewise also the cup after supper, saying : This cup is the new testament in my Blood, which is shed for you.

OFFERTORY. *Heb. 10.* Christ, after he had offered one sacrifice for sins, for ever, sat down on the right hand of God ; for by one offering he hath perfected for ever them that are sanctified (alleluia).

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that as thou hast given thy Son Christ Jesus to be our only Mediator and

Advocate : so for his sake thou wouldst make of these our offerings an oblation acceptable in thy sight, and of our souls and bodies a living sacrifice, well-pleasing unto thee ; in union with him, the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

PREFACE *of the Holy Cross.*

COMMUNION. *1 Cor. II. 24.* This is my Body, which is broken for you : this cup is the new testament in my Blood : this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

O LORD GOD ALMIGHTY, whose only Son hath made satisfaction for the sins of the whole world : quicken us, we beseech thee, by this our oblation and communion of his Body and Blood ; that we may become one with him in the charity which never faileth, and thereby bring forth the fruit which abideth for ever. Through the same.

[10.] A Mass for Friday.

OF THE HOLY CROSS

Mass Nos autem as given in the Proper of Saints for the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, Sept. 14th, except:

Out of Eastertide. COLLECT.

O GOD, who by the precious Blood of thine only-begotten Son hast vouchsafed to sanctify the Cross to be the sign of our redemption : grant us, we beseech thee ; so joyfully to honour that holy Cross, that we may evermore rejoice in thy protection. Through the same.

In Eastertide. COLLECT.

O GOD, who for our sakes didst send thy Son to suffer death upon the Cross, that thou mightest deliver us from the power of the enemy : mercifully grant to us thy servants, that we may attain unto the grace of his Resurrection. Through the same.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Philippians. *Phil. 2. 8.*

BRETHREN : Christ became obedient unto death, even the death of the Cross. Wherefore God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a Name which is above every name : (*here genuflect*) that at the Name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth ; and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia and verse following, is said:

TRACT. We adore thee, O Christ, and we bless thee : because by thy Cross thou hast redeemed the world. *V.* We adore thy Cross, O Lord, we commemorate thy glorious Passion : have mercy upon us, thou who didst suffer for us. *V.* O blessed Cross, which alone wast counted worthy to sustain the King of heaven and its Lord.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* Ps. 96. Tell it out among the heathen : that the Lord hath reigned from the Tree. Alleluia. *V.* Sweetest wood, sweetest iron, that bare so sweet a burthen : which

alone was counted worthy to sustain the King of heaven and its Lord. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 20. 17.

AT that time : Jesus took the twelve disciples apart in the way, and said unto them : Behold, we go up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man shall be betrayed unto the chief priests and unto the scribes ; and they shall condemn him to death ; and shall deliver him to the Gentiles to mock, and to scourge, and to crucify him ; and the third day he shall rise again.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord, that like as thy Son did offer himself upon the altar of the Cross to take away the sins of the whole world : so this our oblation may cleanse us from all our iniquities. Through the same.

POSTCOMMUNION.

ASSIST us mercifullý, O Lord our God : that, like as thou dost vouchsafe unto us to delight in honouring thy holy Cróss, so we may be defended by the perpetual succour of the same. Through.

[II.] Another Mass for Friday.

OF THE PASSION OF OUR
LORD JESUS CHRIST

INTROIT. *Humiliavit. Phil. 2.*

THE Lord Jesus Christ humbled himself unto death, even the death of the Cross : wherefore God also hath

highly exalted him, and given him a Name which is above every name (alleluia, alleluia). *Ps. 89.* My song shall be alway of the loving-kindness of the Lord : from one generation to another. *℣.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

OR LORD JESU CHRIST, who from the bosom of the Father in heaven didst come down to earth, and shed thy precious Blood for the remission of all our sins : we humbly beseech thee ; that in the day of judgement we may be found worthy to stand at thy right hand and hear thy voice : Come, ye blessed ones. Who livest and reignest with the same God the Father in the unity.

The LESSON from Zechariah the Prophet.
Zech. 12. 10.

THUS saith the Lord : I will pour upon the house of David, and upon the inhabitants of Jerusalem the spirit of grace and of supplications : and they shall look upon me whom they have pierced, and they shall mourn for him, as one mourneth for his only son, and shall be in bitterness for him, as one that is in bitterness for his firstborn. In that day there shall be a great mourning in Jerusalem, and one shall say unto him : † What are these wounds in thine hands? Then he shall answer : Those with which I was wounded in the house of my friends. Awake, O sword, against my shepherd, and against the man that is my fellow, saith the Lord of hosts : smite the shepherd, and the sheep shall be scattered : saith the Lord Almighty.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 69. Thy rebuke hath broken my heart, I am full of heaviness : I looked for some to have pity on me, but there was no man, neither found I any to comfort me. *V.* They gave me gall to eat, and when I was thirsty, they gave me vinegar to drink.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* Hail, gracious King : who alone didst pity our transgressions : obedient to thy Father, thou wast led to be crucified, even as a meek lamb to the slaughter. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Isa.* 53. Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows. *V.* Yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. *V.* But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities. *V.* The chastisement of our peace was upon him : and with his stripes we are healed.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* Hail, gracious King : who alone didst pity our transgressions : obedient to thy Father, thou wast led to be crucified, even as a meek lamb to the slaughter. Alleluia. *V.* To thee be glory, hosanna : to thee triumph and victory : to thee the crown of highest praise and honour. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 19. 28.

AT that time : Jesus knowing that all things were now accomplished, that the Scripture might be fulfillèd,

saith : I thirst. Now there was set a vessel full ôf vinegar. And they filled a sponge with vinegar, and put it upon hyssop, and put it to his mouth. When Jesus therefore had received the vinegar, he said : It is finishèd. And he bowed his head and gâve up the ghost. The Jews therefore, because it was the Preparation, that the bodies should not remain upon the Cross on the sabbath-day, (for that sabbath-day was an high day,) besought Pilate that their legs might be broken, and that they might be tâken away. Then came the soldiers, and brake the legs of the first, and of the other which was crucifièd with him. But when they came to Jesus, and saw that he was dead already, they brake not his legs : but one of the soldiers with a spear pierced his side, and forthwith came there out Blôod and Water. And he that saw it bare record, and his rëcord is true.

OFFERTORY. Wicked men rose up against me : without mercy they sought to kill me : and they did not spare to spit in my face : they wounded me with their spears, and all my bones are broken (alleluia).

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that by the mediation of the Passion of thy only-begotten Son, this sacrifice which we offer unto thee may evermore avail to quicken and defend us : Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

PREFACE of the Holy Cross.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 22. They pierced my hands and my feet : I may tell all my bones (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

O LORD JESU CHRIST, Son of the living God, who at the sixth hour for the redemption of the world wast lifted up upon the Cross of shame, and didst vouchsafe to shed thy precious Blood for the remission of our sins : we humbly beseech thee ; that, after this our life on earth, thou

wouldest grant unto us joyfully to enter the gates of Paradise. Who livest and reignest with the Father.

I WILL raise me up a faithful priest, that shall do according to that which is in mine heart and in my mind : and I will build him a sure house, and he shall walk before mine Anointed for ever (alleluia, alleluia). *Ps.* 132. Lord, remember David : and all his trouble. *℣.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

WE humbly beseech thee, O Lord, that of thy unbounded mercy thou wouldest grant unto thy holy Church a Pontiff who by his tender care towards us may ever find favour in thy sight : and, studying to preserve in safety thy people committed to his charge, may ever be honoured by us to the glory of thy Name. Through.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Hebrews.

Heb. 4. 16.

BRETHREN : Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need. For every high priest taken from among men is ordained for men in things pertaining to God that he may offer both gifts and sacrifices for sins : who can have compassion on the ignorant and on them that are out of the way, for that he himself also is compassed with infirmity. And by reason hereof he ought, as for the people, so also for himself to offer for sins. And no man taketh this honour unto himself, but he that is called of God, as was Aaron. So also Christ glorified not himself, to be made an high priest, but he that said unto him : Thou art my Son, to-day have I begotten thee. As he saith also in another place : Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchisedec. Who in the days of his

flesh, when he had offered up prayers and supplications with strong crying and tears unto him that was able to save him from death, was heard in that he feared.

GRADUAL. *Lev.* 21. He that is the high priest among his brethren, upon whose head the anointing oil hath been poured, whose hands have been consecrated for the priesthood, and that hath been clothed with the holy garments : ought in all things to be made like unto his brethren. *℣.* *Heb.* 2. That he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in things pertaining to God : to make reconciliation for the sins of the people.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣.* *Lev.* 21. Let the priest be holy, for I the Lord which sanctify you am holy. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps.* 132. Arise, O Lord, into thy resting-place : thou, and the ark of thy strength. *℣.* Let thy priests be clothed with righteousness, and thy saints sing with joyfulness. *℣.* For thy servant David's sake, turn not away the presence of thine Anointed.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣.* *Lev.* 21. Let the priest be holy, for I the Lord, which sanctify you, am holy. *℣.* *St. John* 10. I am the Good Shepherd : and know my sheep, and am known of mine. Alleluia.

GOSPEL. If ye love me, as on the Vigil of Pentecost in Proper of the Season.

OFFERTORY. 1 *Esdras.* 5. They shall not be partakers of the holy things until there arise up a high priest clothed with doctrine and truth (alleluia).

SECRET.

ASSIST us, O Lord, we beseech thee, with the abundance of thy mercy : that we, who devoutly offer unto thee these holy gifts, may be given to our gladness a Pontiff pleasing in the sight of thy majesty to be the governour of our holy mother the Church. Through.

COMMUNION. *Exod.* 29. The high priest that shall be set up shall put on the holy garments, and he shall come into the tabernacle of the congregation, to minister in the holy place (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that we, whom thou hast refreshed with the Sacrament of thy most precious Body and Blood, may be comforted by the loving-kindness of thy Divine Majesty : and that thou wouldest grant unto us a Pontiff meet to instruct thy people in all godlinèss ; and pour upon thy people a sweet savour of holiness. Who livest and reignest with the Father.

[13.] AT THE CONSECRATION OF A BISHOP

[According to the usual western rule, a Bishop is consecrated only on the Lord's Day or on the heavenly birthday of an Apostle or Evangelist, and the Mass of the Day is said, with the Prayers proper to the Consecration of Bishop (e.g., as in the Prayer-Book) under one Ending with the Collect and other Prayers of the Day; for which reason since the Prayer-Book assigns a proper Collect, Epistle, Gospel, and Postcommunion for the Consecration of a Bishop, these same may be said along with the Propers of the Mass of the Day, the Prayers thereof being added to those of the Prayer-Book under one Ending. However, by local custom, the Prayer-Book Propers for the Consecration of a Bishop are commonly used along with those of the Votive Mass of the Holy Ghost for Thursday, Spiritus Domini.]

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY God, who by thy Son Jesus Christ didst give to thy holy Apostles many excellent gifts, and didst charge them to feed thy flock : give grace, we beseech thee, to all Bishops, the Pastors of thy Church, that they may diligently preach thy Word, and duly administer the godly Discipline thereof; and grant to the people, that they may obediently follow the same, that all may receive the crown of everlasting glory. Through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

A Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to Timothy.

I Tim. 3. 1.

DEARLY beloved : This is a true saying, If a man desire the office of a Bishop, he desireth a good work. A Bishop then must be blameless, the husband of one wife, vigilant, sober, of good behaviour, given to hospitality, apt to teach ; not given to wine, no striker, not greedy of filthy lucre ; but patient, not a brawler, not covetous ; one that ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity ; (for if a man know not how to rule his own house, † how shall he take care of the Chûrch of God?) not a novice, lest being lifted up with pride he fall into the condemnation of the devil. Moreover, he must have a good report of them which are without ; lest he fall into reproach and the snare of the devil.

§ Another Epistle.

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles.

Acts 20. 17.

IN those days : From Miletus Paul I sent to Ephesus, and called the elders of the Church. And when they were come to him, he said unto them : Ye know, from the first day that I came into Asia, after what manner I have been with you at all seasons, serving the Lord with all humility of mind, and with many tears, and temptations, which befell me by the lying in wait of the Jews : and how I kept back nothing that was profitable unto you, but have shewed you, and have taught you publickly, and from house to house, testifying both to the Jews,

and also to the Greeks, repentance toward God, and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ. And now, behold, I go bound in the spirit unto Jerusalem, not knowing the things that shall befall me there ; save that the Holy Ghost witnesseth in every city, saying that bonds and afflictions abide me. But none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry, which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the Gospel of the grace of God. And now, behold, I know that ye all, among whom I have gone preaching the kingdom of God, shall see my face no more. Wherefore I take you to record this day, that I am pure from the blood of all men. For I have not shunned to declare unto you all the counsel of God. Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the Church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood. For I know this, that after my departing shall grievous wolves enter in among you, not sparing the flock. Also of your own selves shall men arise, speaking perverse things, to draw away disciples after them. Therefore watch, and remember, that by the space of three years I ceased not to warn every one night and day with tears. And now, brethren, I commend you to God, and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified. I have coveted no man's silver, or gold, or apparel. Yea, ye yourselves know, that these hands have ministered unto my neces-

sities, and to them that were with me. I have shewed you all things, how that so labouring ye ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, It is more blessed to give than to receive.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 21. 15.

AT that time : Jesus saith to Simon Peter : Simon, son of Jonas, ‡ lovest thou me môtore than these? He saith unto him : Yea, Lord ; thou knowest thât I love thee. He saith unto him : Feed my lambs. He saith to him again the second time : Simon, son of Jonas ; ‡ lovêst thou me? He saith unto him : Yea, Lord ; thou knowest thât I love thee. He saith unto him : Feed my sheep. He saith unto him the third time : Simon, son of Jonas, ‡ lovêst thou me? Peter was grieved because he said unto him the third time, ‡ Lovêst thou me? And he said unto him : Lord, thou knôwest all things ; thou knowest thât I love thee. Jesus saith unto him, Fêed my sheep.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accôrding to John.

St. John 20. 19.

THE same day at evening, being the first day of the week ; When the doors were shut, where the disciples were assembled for fear of the Jews ; Came Jesus and stood in the midst, and saith unto them : Peace bê unto you. And when he had so said, he shewed unto them his hânds and his side. Then were the disciples glad

when thêy saw the Lord. Then saith Jesus to them again : Peace bê unto you. As my Father hath sent me, even sô send I you. And when he had said this, he breathed on them, and saith unto them : Receive ye thê Holy Ghost. Whosoever sins ye remit, they are remittêd unto them ; and whose-
soever sins ye retâin, they are retainêd.

§ *A Third Gospel.*

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 28. 18.

AT that time : Jesus came and spake unto them saying : All power is given unto me in heavên and in earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have cômmand-
ed you ; and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the ênd of the world.

[SECRET.]

ACCEPT, O Lord, the oblations which we offer unto thee for all Bishops, the Pastors of thy Church : that thou mayest preserve unto them the bounty of thy loving-kindness. Through.]

WITHIN THE ACTION.

ALL glory be to thee, Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for that thou, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption ; who made there by his one oblation of himself once offered [*on behalf also of this thy servant (or on behalf also of me*

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Mark.
St. Mark 13. 33.

AT that time : Jesus said unto his disciples : Take ye heed, watch and pray : for ye know not when the time is. For the Son of Man is as a man taking a far journey, who left his house, and gave authority to his servants, and to every man his work, and commanded the porter to watch. Watch ye therefore : for ye know not when the master of the house cometh, at even, or at midnight, or at the cock-crowing, or in the morning : lest coming suddenly he find you sleeping.

And what I say unto you, I say unto all : Watch. *The Creed is said.*

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to accept these our oblations : granting unto *N.*, thy servant, that like as thou hast chosen him to be pastor and ruler of thy Church, so he may be governed evermore by thy defence. Through.

DEFEEND us, O Lord, we beseech thee, who have here received these heavenly mysteries : and grant that thy servant *N.*, whom thou hast chosen to be pastor and ruler of thy Church, together with the flock committed to his charge, may thereby be preserved and strengthened against all adversities. [15.] AT THE BENEDICTION
OF AN ABBOT

§ *Mass is said of the day except that under one Ending with the Prayers thereof the Prayers below are added, the Bishop and the Abbot Elect each making the appropriate alterations in the Prayers.*

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord, unto [*this*] (or *me*) thy servant, that [*he*] (or *I*) may both preach and practice those things which be rightful : and by the example of good works mould the lives of all them that be subject unto [*him*] (or *me*) ; and at the last from thee, the everlasting Shepherd, receive the recompence of life eternal. Through.

SECRET.

O LORD, be pleased, we beseech thee, to accept these [*our*] (or *my*) gifts ; and mercifully to protect this thy servant always and wherever [*he*] (or *I*) may be. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

MAY this holy Communion, we beseech thêe, O Lord : purify [*us*] (or *mê*) from all sîn ; and preserve [*this*] (or *mê*) thy servant in abundant grace. Through.

AT THE CONFERRING OF
HOLY ORDERS

[According to the usual western rule, Holy Orders are conferred on the Ember Saturdays or on the Saturday in the fourth week of Lent (Sitientes), and Mass is said of the Saturday; but if they be conferred on other days, Mass is likewise said of the day. The following Propers appointed by the American Prayer-Book, are to be used, but otherwise, as was said above concerning the Consecration of Bishops, the Mass is of the Day. However, by local custom, the Prayer-Book Propers for the Conferring of Holy Orders are commonly used along with those of the Votive Mass of the Holy Ghost for Thursday, Spiritus Domini.]

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY God, who by thy divine providence hast appointed divers Orders of Ministers in thy Church, and didst inspire thine Apostles to

choose into the Order of Deacons the first Martyr, Saint Stéphên, with others : mercifully behold these thy servants now called to the like Office and Administratiôn ; so replenish them with the truth of thy Doctrine, and adorn them with innocency of life, that, both by word and good example, they may faithfully serve thee in this Office, to the glory of thy Name, and the edification of thy Church. Through the merits of our Saviour Jesus Christ. Who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, now and for ever.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to Timothy.

1 Tim. 3. 8.

DEARLY beloved : Likewise must the Deacons be grave, not double-tongued, not given to much wine, not greedy of filthy lucre ; holding the mystery of the faith in a pure conscience. And let these also first be proved ; then let them use the office of a Deacon, being found blameless. Even so must their wives be grave, not slanderers, sober, faithful in all things. Let the Deacons be the husbands of one wife, ruling their children and their own houses well. For they that have used the office of a Deacon well purchase to themselves a good degree, and great boldness in the faith which is in Christ Jesus.

§ Another Epistle:

The LESSON from the Acts of the Apostles.

Acts 6. 2.

IN those days : Then the twelve called the multitude of the disciples unto them, and said : It is not reason that

we should leave the word of God, and serve tables. Wherefore, brethren, look ye out among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business. But we will give ourselves continually to prayer, and to the ministry of the word. And the saying pleased the whole multitude : and they chose Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Ghost, and Philip, and Prochorus, and Nicanor, and Timon, and Parmenas, and Nicolas a proselyte of Antioch : whom they set before the Apostles : and when they had prayed, they laid their hands on them. And the word of God increased ; and the number of the disciples multiplied in Jerusalem greatly ; and a great company of the priests were obedient to the faith.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Luke.

St. Luke 12. 35.

AT that time ; Jesus said unto his disciples : Let your loins be girded about, and your lights burning ; and ye yourselves like unto men that wait for their lord, when he will return from the wedding ; that when he cometh and knocketh, they may open unto him immediately. Blessed are those servants, whom the lord when he cometh shall find watching : verily I say unto you, that he shall gird himself, and make them to sit down to meat, and will come forth and serve them. And if he shall come in the second watch, or come in the third

watch, and find them so, blessed are those servants.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, so to work within us at this time by thy holy mysteries, that we may become worthy to offer our gifts unto thee. Through.]

POSTCOMMUNION.

ALMIGHTY God, giver of all good things, who of thy great goodness hast vouchsafed to accept and take these thy servants unto the Office of Deacons in thy Church : make them, we beseech thee, O Lord, to be modest, humble, and constant in their Ministration, to have a ready will to observe all spiritual Discipline ; that they, having always the testimony of a good conscience, and continuing ever stable and strong in thy Son Christ, may so well behave themselves in this inferior Office, that they may be found worthy to be called unto the higher Ministries in thy Church. Through the same thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ. To whom be glory and honour, world without end.

gency of life, that, both by word and good example, they may faithfully serve thee in this Office, to the glory of thy Name, and the edification of thy Church. Through the merits of our Saviour Jesus Christ. Who liveth and reigneth with thee and the same Hôly Spirit, world without end.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Ephesians.
Ephes. 4. 7.

BRETHREN : Unto every one of us is given grace according to the measure of the gift of Christ. Wherefore he saith : When he ascended up on high, he led captivity captive, and gave gifts unto men. (Now that he ascended, † what is it but that he also descended first into the lower parts of the earth? He that descended is the same also that ascended up far above all heavens, that he might fill all things.) And he gave some, Apostles ; and some, Prophets ; and some, Evangelists ; and some, Pastors and Teachers ; for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ : till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ.

† The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.
St. Matt. 9. 36.

AT that time : When Jesus saw the multitudes, he was moved with compassion on them, because they fainted, and were scattered abroad as sheep having no shepherd. Then saith

he unto his disciples : the harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few ; pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest.

§ *Another Gospel:*

† The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to John.

St. John 10. 1.

AT that time ; Jesus said unto the Pharisees : Verily, verily I say unto you, He that entereth not by the door into the sheepfold, but climbeth up some other way, the same is a thief and a robber. But he that entereth in by the door is the shephêrd of the sheep. To him the porter openeth : and the shêep hear his voice ; and he calleth his own shêep by name, and lêadeth them out. And when he putteth forth his own shêep, he goêth before them ; and the shêep follow him : for thêy know his voice. And a stranger will they not follow, but will flee from him : for they know not the vôiçe of strangers. This parable spake Jesus unto them : but they understood not what things they were which he spâke unto them. Then said Jesus unto them again : Verily, verily, I say unto you, I am the dôor of the sheep. All that ever came before me are thieves and robbers ; but the shêep did not hear them. **I** am the door ; by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture. The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and to destroy ; I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly. I am thê Good

Shepherd ; the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep. But he that is an hireling, and not the shepherd, whose own the sheep are not, seeth the wolf coming, and leaveth the shêep, and fleeth ; and the wolf catcheth them, and scattêreth the sheep. The hireling fleeth, because he is an hireling, and careth nôt for the sheep. I am thê Good Shepherd ; and know my sheep, and am known of mine, even as the Father knoweth me, and I knôw the Father ; and I lay down my life for the sheep. And other sheep I have, which are nôt of this fold : them also I must bring, and they shâll hear my voice ; and there shall be one flock, and one Shepherd.

POSTCOMMUNION.

MOST merciful Father, we beseech thee to send upon these thy servants thy heavênly blessing : that they may be clothed with righteousness, and that thy Word spoken by their mouths may have such success, that it may never be spoken in vâin ; Grant also, that we may have grace to hear and receive what they shall deliver out of thy most holy Word, or agreeable to the same, as the means of our salvation, that in all our words and deeds we may seek thy glory, and the increase of thy kingdom. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

III

[18.] FOR CONFERRING
THE

DIACONATE AND PRIESTHOOD
ON THE SAME DAY.

¶ *And if, on the same day, the Order of Deacons be given to some, and the Order of Priesthood to others; the Deacons shall be first presented, and then the Priests; and it shall suffice that the Litany be once said for both. The Epistle shall be Ephesians 4. 7, as before in this Office. Immediately after which, they that are to be made Deacons shall be examined and Ordained. Then one of them having read the Gospel, (which shall be either Saint Matthew 9. 36, as before in this Office; or else Saint Luke 12. 35, as before in the Form for the Ordering of Deacons,) they that are to be made Priests shall likewise be examined and Ordained. The Collect shall be as followeth.*

COLLECT, from the Prayer-Book.

ALMIGHTY God, giver of all good things, who by thy Holy Spirit hast appointed divers Orders of Ministêrs in thy Church : mercifully behold these thy servants now called to the Office of Deacon and these thy servants now called to the Office of Priêst ; and so replenish them with the truth of thy Doctrine, and adorn them with innocency of life, that, both by word and good example, they may faithfully serve thee in their Ministry, to the glory of thy Name, and the edification of thy Church. Through the merits of our Saviour Jesus Christ. Who liveth and reigneth with thee and the same Hôly Spirit, world without end.

[SECRET.]

WE beseech thee, O Lord, so to work within us at this time by thy holy mysteries, that we may become worthy to offer our gifts unto thee. Through.]

[POSTCOMMUNION.]

MERCIFULLY lift up, we beseech thee, O Lord, with thy continual help all those whom thou dost refresh with thy Sacraments : that we may receive the fruits of thy redemption from these thy mysteriës ; and also shew forth the same in our lives for evermore. Who livest and reignest with the Father.]

[19.] AT THE BENEDICTION OF AN ABBESS

§ *Mass is said of the day except that under one Ending with the Prayers thereof, the following are added:*

COLLECT.

OR Lord, who hast chosen unto thyself this thy handmaiden in the dedication of chastity : grant that she may effectually accomplish the work which she hath begûn ; and that she may offer unto thee a full and ready service, by thy continual help bring this her good beginning unto a perfect end. Through.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord : that these oblations may obtain perseverance in continual chastity for this thy handmaiden here present ; and that when the everlasting doors

are set open at the coming of the King of glory, she may enter with gladness into thy heavenly kingdom. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OR Lord, have respect unto the work of this thy handmaiden which she doth offer ûnto thee : and because among all the changes and chances of this mortal life, she putteth her trust only in thine over-ruling powêr ; grant that she may be neither overcome by any frailties of her own, nor by the adversities of this world. Through.

[20.] AT THE BENEDICTION AND CONSECRATION OF NUNS

§ *Mass is said of the day except that under one Ending with the Prayers thereof, the following are added:*

COLLECT.

OR Lord, who hast chosen unto thyself these thy handmaidens in the dedication of chastity : grant that they may effectually accomplish the work which they have begûn ; and that they may offer unto thee a full and ready service, by thy continual help bring this their good beginning unto a perfect end. Through.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord : that these oblations may obtain perseverance in continual chastity for these thy handmaidens here present ; and that when the everlasting doors are set open at the coming of the King of glory, they may enter with

gladness into thy heavenly kingdom.
Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O GOD, who dost make thy habitation in the pûre of heart : look down upon *these thy handmaidêns* ; and grant that what *they seek* in the continual discipline of *their lives*, *they* may receive in the abundance of thy consolations. Through.

[21.] AT THE BENEDICTION
OF A CEMETERY

§ *Mass is said of the day except that under one Ending with the Prayers thereof, the following are added:*

COLLECT.

O GOD, in whose mercy do rest the souls of thy faithful people : send thy holy Angel, we beseech thee, O Lord, to guard this Cemetery and the bodies of all that may be buried hereîn ; and deliver their souls from the chains of their sins, that they may rejoice with thy Saints for ever. Through.

SECRET.

O LORD, who thine own self wast buried in the sepulchre, and who by rising therefrom hast given unto thy faithful people the hope of the resurrection : grant, we beseech thee, in virtue of these gifts which we offer unto thee ; that this our sacrifice of salvation may bring unto the souls of thy faithful people who here do sleep in thee, the forgiveness of all their sins, and recompence and rest unto both their souls and their bodies. Who livest and reignest with the Father.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O LORD, our God, who hast given us faith to believe that in time to come all we thy people shall rise again from the death ôf the body : we beseech thee that this offering of thy holy gifts may in such wise please thêe ; that in thy mercy we may attain in this life to rise again from the death of sin. Through.

[22.] AT THE RECONCILIATION
OF A DESECRATED CHURCH
OR CEMETERY

§ *Mass is said of the day except that under one Ending with the Prayers thereof, the following are added:*

COLLECT.

O GOD, who hast said, My House shall be called a hôte of prayer : vouchsafe in such wise to cleanse and sanctify *this House and its Churchyard* (or *this Cemetery*) from its profane usâge ; that it may once more be a place wherein thou mayest meetly receive and graciously answer the prayers and vows of them that call upon thee. Through.

SECRET.

LET this offering, we beseech thee, O Lord, cleanse this place from every profanation, and render our supplications both here and everywhere acceptable unto thee. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O LORD, who hast made us partakers of these gifts of everlâsting healing : we humbly entreat thêe ; that *this Church and its Churchyard* (or

this Cemetery) may by thy blessing abide consecrate to thee, and likewise that our hearts may be free from sin and secure in thy service. Through.

[23.] MASS FOR BRIDEGROOM AND BRIDE

§ *If Matrimony is to be solemnized upon a Sunday or other Holy-day of Obligation, or upon a Double of the I or II Class, or within the Octaves of Epiphany, Easter, Pentecost, or Corpus Christi, or upon privileged Ferias and Vigils, then the Mass of the Sunday or Holy-day shall be said, with Creed and Gloria in excelsis, if appointed for that Mass, and with Commemoration of the Mass for Bridegroom and Bride, as follows (under one Ending with the principal Prayers of the Mass), with the rest according to the form prescribed for the Communion and Nuptial Blessing.*

But if the Blessing of the Marriage be done on some other day, upon which even a greater or lesser double Feast shall fall, yet this Votive Mass that follows shall be said, except upon the Commem. of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls' Day), upon which day both the Votive Mass and the solemn Nuptial Blessing are prohibited.

At the Solemnization of Matrimony, the Priest, if he is to say the Mass, is completely vested (including the wearing of the Chasuble), with the exception of the Maniple. After the exhortation Forasmuch as N. and N. have consented together, and omitting the Blessing, the Priest puts on the Maniple and begins the Mass in the usual manner. The Man and Wife remain throughout at the accustomed place before the Altar.

INTROIT. *Deus Israel. Tobit 7. 8.*

THE God of Israel make you one : and may he be with you even as he had mercy of two that were the only begotten of their fathers : grant them mercy, O Lord, and finish their life in health with joy (alleluia, alleluia). Ps. 128. Blessed are all they that fear the Lord : and walk in his ways. V. Glory be.

Gloria in excelsis is not said.

COLLECT, *from the Prayer-Book.*

ETERNAL God, we humbly beseech thee, favourably to behold these thy servants now (or *about to be*) joined in wedlock according to thy holy ordinance : and grant that they, seeking first thy kingdom and thy righteousness, may obtain the manifold blessings of thy grace. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

Prayer 2 is of the day; 3 of the Occurrence or of the Season, if such is to be said.

Epistle from the Prayer-Book:

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Ephesians. *Ephes. 5. 20.*

BRETHREN : Give thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ ; submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God. Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the Church : and he is the saviour of the body. Therefore as the Church is subject unto Christ, so let the wives be to

their own husbands in everything. Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the Church, and gave himself for it, that he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water, by the word ; that he might present it to himself a glorious Church, not having spot or wrinkle, or any such thing ; but that it should be holy, and without blemish. So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loveth his wife loveth himself : for no man ever yet hated his own flesh, but nourisheth and cherisheth it, even as the Lord the Church : for we are members of his body, of his flesh, and of his bones. For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall be joined unto his wife ; and they two shall be one flesh. This is a great mystery, but I speak concerning Christ and the Church. Nevertheless, let every one of you in particular so love his wife, even as himself. And the wife see that she reverence her husband. *And the Creed is not said.*

GRADUAL. Ps. 128. Thy wife shall be as the fruitful vine upon the walls of thy house. V. Thy children like the olive-branches round about thy table.

Alleluia, alleluia. V. Ps. 20. The Lord send you help from the sanctuary : and strengthen you out of Sion. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia and verse following, is said:

TRACT. Ps. 128. Lo, thus shall the man be blessed : that feareth the Lord. V. The Lord from out of Sion shall so bless thee : that thou shalt

see Jerusalem in prosperity all thy life long. V. Yea, that thou shalt see thy children's children : and peace upon Israel.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. V. Ps. 20. The Lord send you help from the sanctuary : and strengthen you out of Sion. Alleluia. V. Ps. 134. The Lord that made heaven and earth : give thee blessing out of Sion. Alleluia.

Gospel from the Prayer-Book.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to Matthew.

St. Matt. 19. 7.

AT that time : Jesus answered and said unto them : Have ye not read, that he which made them at the beginning made them male and female, and said : For this cause shall a man leave father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife ; † and they twain shall bê one flesh? Wherefore they are no more twain but one flesh. What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder.

OFFERTORY. Ps. 31. My hope hath been in thee, O Lord : I have said : Thou art my God : my time is in thy hand (alleluia).

SECRET.

OR LORD, we beseech thee, to accept this gift which, as ordained by thy holy law of matrimony, we present unto thee : and grant that this work begun by the bounty of thy goodness, may in all things be disposed according to thy will. Through.

PREFACE *as prescribed for the Mass of the day.*

§ *Having said Our Father, and before saying Deliver us, O Lord, we beseech thee, the Priest, standing at the Epistle side and turning his face towards the man and woman as they kneel before the Lord's Table, says over them the following (but NOTE, That the Prayer next following is omitted where the woman is past child-bearing):*

O MERCIFUL Lord, and heavenly Father, by whose gracious gift mankind is increased ; we beseech thee, assist with thy blessing these two persons, that they may both be fruitful in procreation of children, and also live together so long in godly love and honesty, that they may see their children Christianly and virtuously brought up, to thy praise and honour. Through.

Let us pray.

O GOD, who by thy mighty power hast made all things of nothing ; who also (after other things set in order) didst appoint, that out of man, created after thine own image and similitude, woman should take her beginning ; and, knitting them together, didst teach that it should never be lawful to put asunder those whom thou by Matrimony hast made one : O God, who hast consecrated the state of Matrimony to such an excellent mystery, that in it is signified and represented the spiritual marriage and unity betwixt Christ and his Church : look mercifully upon these thy servants, that both this man may love his wife, according to thy Word, (as Christ did love his spouse the Church, who

gave himself for it, loving and cherishing it even as his own flesh,) and also that this woman may be loving and amiable, faithful and obedient to her husband ; and in all quietness, sobriety, and peace, be a follower of holy and godly matrons. O Lord, bless them both, and grant them to inherit thy everlasting kingdom. Through the same.

Then the Priest, turning back to the middle of the Altar, says Deliver us, O Lord, we beseech thee, and the rest after the accustomed manner: and after he has received the Precious Blood, he communicates the man and woman: and proceeds with the Mass.

COMMUNION. Ps. 128. Lo, thus shall the man be blessed, that feareth the Lord : Yea, that thou shalt see thy children's children : and peace upon Israel (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

ALMIGHTY GOD, we beseech thee, let thy gracious favour accompany the ordinance of thy love : that those whom thou hast joined together in holy wedlock ; may by thy protection live in lasting peace. Through.

§ *Having said Let us bless the Lord, or if the Mass of the day require, Depart in peace, before blessing the people, the Priest, turning himself towards the Bridegroom and Bride, says this Blessing from the Prayer-Book:*

GOD the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Ghost, bless, preserve, and keep you ; the Lord mercifully with his favour look upon you, and fill you with all spiritual benediction

and grace ; that ye may so live together in this life, that in the world to come ye may have life everlasting. *R̄.* Amen.

§ *Then shall the Priest seriously admonish them to be faithful one to the other: to observe continence at times of prayer, and especially on Fasts and solemn Feasts: mutually to love each other, and to persevere in the fear of God. Afterward he sprinkles them with holy water, and having said Let this my bounden duty and service, he gives the Blessing: and reads in the accustomed manner the Gospel of St. John, In the beginning was the Word or some other Gospel, in accordance with the Rubrics.*

[24.] FOR THE PROPAGATION
OF THE FAITH.

INTROIT. *Deus misereatur. Ps. 67.*

GOD be merciful unto us, and bless us : and shew us the light of his countenance, and be merciful unto us : that thy way may be known upon earth, thy saving health among all nations (*alleluia, alleluia*). *Ps. ibid.* Let the people praise thee, O God : yea let all the people praise thee. *V̄.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who willest that all men should be saved, and come to the knowledge of the truth : send forth, we beseech thee, labourers into thy harvest, and enable them to speak the word with all boldness ; that thy word may run and be glorified, and that all nations may know thee, the one true God, and him whom thou hast sent, even Jesus Christ thy Son

our Lord. Who liveth and reigneth with thee.

The LESSON from the Book of Ecclesiasticus.
Eccclus. 36. 1.

HAVE mercy upon us, O Lord God of all, and behold us : and send thy fear upon the nations that seek not after thee. Lift up thy hand against the strange nations, and let them see thy power. As thou wast sanctified in us before them, so be thou magnified among them before us. And let them know thee, as we have known thee, that there is no God, but only thou, O God. Shew new signs, and make other strange wonders : glorify thy hand and thy right arm, that they may set forth thy wondrous works. Raise up indignation, and pour out wrath : take away the adversary, and destroy the enemy. Make the time short, remember the covenant, and let them declare thy wonderful works. Give testimony unto those that thou hast possessed from the beginning, and raise up the prophecies that have been in thy Name. Reward them that wait for thee, and let thy Prophets be found faithful. O Lord, hear the prayer of thy servants, according to the blessing of Aaron over thy people, that all they which dwell upon the earth may know that thou art the Lord, the eternal God.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 67.* Let all the people praise thee, O God : yea, let all the people praise thee. *V̄.* God shall bless us : and all the ends of the world shall fear him.

Alleluia, alleluia. V̄. Ps. 100. O be joyful in the Lord, all ye lands : serve

the Lord with gladness, and come before his presence with a song. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

TRACT. Ps. 96. Declare the honour of the Lord unto the heathen, and his wonders unto all people. V̄. For the Lord is great, and cannot worthily be praised : he is more to be feared than all gods. V̄. As for the gods of the heathen, they are but idols : but it is the Lord that made the heavens.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. V̄. Ps. 100. O be joyful in the Lord, all ye lands : serve the Lord with gladness, and come before his presence with a song. Alleluia. V̄. Be ye sure that the Lord he is God : it is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL accōrding to Matthew.

St. Matt. 9. 35.

AT that time : Jesus went about all the cities and villages teaching in their synagogues and preaching the Gospel of the kingdom and healing every sickness and every disease among the people. But when he saw the multitudes he was moved with compassion on them because they fainted and were scattered abroad as sheep having no shepherd. Then saith he unto his disciples : The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few. Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that he will send forth labourers into his harvest.

OFFERTORY. Ps. 96. Ascribe unto the Lord, O ye kindreds of the people : ascribe unto the Lord worship and power : ascribe unto the Lord the honour due unto his Name : bring presents and come into his courts : O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness (alleluia).

SECRET.

BEHOLD, O God our Defender, and look upon the face of thine Anointed, who gave himself a ransom for all : and grant that from the rising of the sun even unto the going down of the same, thy Name may be great among the heathen, and in every place a pure offering may be offered unto thy Name. Through the same.

COMMUNION. Ps. 117. O praise the Lord, all ye heathen : praise him, all ye nations : for his merciful kindness is ever more and more towards us, and the truth of the Lord endureth for ever (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, we beseech thêe, O Lord : that as thou hast fed us with this reward of our redemption ; so also this means of eternal salvation may avail for the furtherance of thy true religion. Through.

§ *Another Epistle.*

The Lesson from the former EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to Timothy.

1 Tim. 2. 1.

DEARLY beloved : I exhort, therefore, that, first of all, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving

of thanks, be made for all men : for kings, and all that are in authority ; that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty. For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour, who will have all men to be saved, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth. For there is one God, and one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus : who gave himself a ransom for all, to be testified in due time : whereunto I am ordained a preacher, and an Apostle (I speak the truth in Christ, and lie not ;) a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and verity.

[25.] FOR PROTECTION
AGAINST THE HEATHEN

INTROIT. *Exsurge. Ps. 44.*

UP, Lord, why sleepest thou? awake, and be not absent from us for ever : Wherefore hidest thou thy face? and forgettest our misery and trouble? Our belly cleaveth unto the ground : arise, and help us, and deliver us (alleluia, alleluia) *Ps. ibid.* O God, we have heard with our ears : our fathers have declared unto us. *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, in whose hand is the dominion of all kings and the governance of all kingdoms, look down in mercy and deliver all Christian peoples : that the nations of the heathen, which put their trust in the might of their violence, may be confounded by the strength of thy right hand. Through.

LESSON. Mardocheus thought upon, *from Wednesday after 2nd Sunday in Lent.*

GRADUAL. *Ps. 83.* Let the heathen know that thou, whose Name is Jehovah : art only the Most Highest over all the earth. *V.* O my God, make them like unto a wheel : and as the stubble before the wind.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps. 80.* Stir up thy strength, O Lord, and come and help us. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia and verse following, is said :

TRACT. *Ps. 79.* Help us, O God of our salvation, for the glory of thy Name : O deliver us, and be merciful unto our sins, for thy Name's sake. *V.* Wherefore do the heathen say : Where is now their God? *V.* O let the vengeance of thy servants' blood that is shed, be openly shewed upon the heathen in our sight.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said :

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps. 80.* Stir up thy strength, O Lord, and come and help us. Alleluia. *V.* *Ps. ibid.* Turn thee again, thou God of hosts, look down from heaven, behold and visit this vine : and the place of the vineyard that thy right hand hath planted. Alleluia.

GOSPEL. Which of you shall have a friend, *from the Mass Exaudivit, for the Greater & Lesser Litanies, after 5th Sunday after Easter in Proper of the Season.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 18.* Thou shalt save the people that are in adversity : and shalt bring down the high looks of the proud : for who is God, but the Lord? (alleluia).

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, to have respect unto the sacrifice, which we offer unto thee : that thou wouldst deliver them that fight for the honour of thy Name from the malice of the heathen, and stablish them with the protection of thy sure defence. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 119. My soul hath longed for thy salvation, and I have a good hope because of thy word : when wilt thou be avenged of them that persecute me? They persecute me falsely, be thou my help, O Lord my God (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

BEHOLD, O God our Defender, and deliver from the assaults of the heathen them that fight in thy cause : that we may be defended against all adversities, and serve thee evermore in perfect freedom. Through.

[26.] MASS FOR THE ENDING OF SCHISM

INTROIT. *Salvos nos fac. Ps.* 106.

DELIVER us, O Lord our God, and gather us from among the heathen : that we may give thanks unto thy holy Name, and make our boast of thy praise (alleluia, alleluia). *Ps. ibid.* O give thanks unto the Lord, for he is gracious : and his mercy endureth for ever. V. Glory be.

COLLECT.

OGOD, who dost bring into the way of truth them that are gone astray, dost gather together them that

are scattered abroad, and preserve them that thou hast gathered : we beseech thee, of thy mercy to pour out upon all Christian people thy grace of unity and concord ; that, all divisions being done away, they may be one flock, in one fold, under one Shepherd, and do thee worthy service. Through the same.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Ephesians. *Ephes.* 4. 1.

BRETHREN : I beseech you, that ye walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called. With all lowliness and meekness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love, endeavouring to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body, and one spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling. One Lord, one faith, one baptism. One God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all. But unto every one of us is given grace according to the measure of the gift of Christ : till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ : that we henceforth be no more children tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive : but speaking the truth in love, may grow up unto him in all things, which is the head, even Christ : from whom the whole body fitly joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, according to the effectual working in the measure of every

part, maketh increase of the body unto the edifying of itself in love. This I say therefore, and testify in the Lord, that ye henceforth walk not as other Gentiles walk, in the vanity of their mind, having the understanding darkened, being alienated from the life of God through the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart, who being past feeling have given themselves over unto lasciviousness, to work all uncleanness with greediness. But ye have not so learned Christ : if so be that ye have heard him, and have been taught by him, as the truth is in Jesus.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 122. O pray for the peace of Jerusalem : they shall prosper that love thee. *V.* Peace be within thy walls : and plenteousness within thy palaces.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps.* 147. Praise the Lord, O Jerusalem : praise thy God, O Sion. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps.* 76. In Jewry is God known, his Name is great in Israel. *V.* At Salem is his tabernacle and his dwelling in Sion. *V.* There brake he the arrows of the bow : the shield, the sword, and the battle.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps.* 147. Praise the Lord, O Jerusalem : praise thy God, O Sion, Alleluia. *V.* He maketh peace in thy borders : and filleth thee with the flour of wheat. Alleluia.

✠ The Continuation of the HOLY GOSPEL according to John.

St. John 17. 11.

AT that time : Jesus, lifting up his eyes to heaven, said : Holy Father, keep through thine own Name those whom thou hast given me : that they may be one as we are. While I was with them in the world, I kept them in thy Name. Those that thou gavest me I have kept, and none of them is lost, but the son of perdition, that the Scripture might be fulfilled. And now I come to thee : and these things I speak in the world, that they might have my joy fulfilled in themselves. I have given them thy word, and the world hath hated them, because they are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. I pray not that thou shouldest take them out of the world, but that thou shouldest keep them from the evil. They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. Sanctify them through thy truth. Thy word is truth. As thou hast sent me into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world. And for their sakes I sanctify myself, that they also might be sanctified through the truth. Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word : that they all may be one, as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us : that the world may believe that thou hast sent me. And the glory which thou gavest me I have given them, that they may be one, even as we are one. I in them, and thou in me, that they may be made perfect in one.

OFFERTORY. *Rom.* 15. God grant you to be like-minded one towards another : that ye may with one mind and one mouth glorify God (alleluia).

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, to sanctify these gifts which we present unto thee for the union of all Christian peoples : granting unto us in thy holy Church the blessings of unity and concord. Through.

COMMUNION. *I Cor.* 10. We being many are one bread, and one body : for we are all partakers of that one bread and one cup (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, that this holy Communion, which we have received in token of the union in thee of all thy faithful people : may likewise work in us effectually to the unity of thy holy Church. Through.

[27.] MASS IN TIME OF WAR

INTROIT. *Reminiscere. Ps.* 25.

CALL to remembrance, O Lord, thy tender mercies, and thy loving-kindnesses, which have been ever of old : let not our enemies triumph over us : deliver us, O God of Israel, out of all our troubles (alleluia, alleluia). *Ps. ibid.* Unto thee, O Lord, will I lift up my soul : my God, I have put my trust in thee : O let me not be confounded. *V.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

O GOD, who makest wars to cease, and by thy mighty arm dost overthrow the adversaries of them that

put their trust in thee : come to the help of thy servants who humbly call upon thy mercy ; that we, being delivered from the violence of the enemy, may evermore praise thee with thanksgiving. Through.

The LESSON from Jeremiah the Prophet. *Jer.* 42. 1.

IN those days : All the captains of the forces came near, and said unto Jeremiah the Prophet : Pray for us unto the Lord thy God. And the word of the Lord came unto Jeremiah. Then called he all the captains of the forces which were with him, and all the people from the least even to the greatest, and said unto them : Thus saith the Lord, the God of Israel, unto whom ye sent me to present your supplication before him : If ye will still abide in this land, then will I build you, and not pull you down, and I will plant you and not pluck you up : for I repent me of the evil that I have done unto you. Be not afraid of the King of Babylon, of whom ye are afraid : be not afraid of him, saith the Lord : for I am with you to save you and to deliver you from his hand. And I will shew mercies unto you, that he may have mercy upon you, and cause you to return to your own land : saith the Lord Almighty.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 77. Thou art the God, that only doest wonders : and hast declared thy power among the people. *V.* Thou hast mightily delivered thy people, even the sons of Jacob and Joseph.

Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* *Ps.* 59. Deliver me from mine enemies, O God : de-

fend me from them that rise up against me. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps.* 103. He hath not dealt with us after our sins : nor rewarded us according to our wickednesses. *℣.* *Ps.* 79. O Lord, remember not our old sins, but have mercy upon us, and that soon : for we are come to great misery. *℣.* Help us, O God of our salvation : for the glory of thy Name, O Lord, deliver us : and be merciful unto our sins, for thy Name's sake.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣.* *Ps.* 59. Deliver me from mine enemies, O God : defend me from them that rise up against me. Alleluia. *℣.* *Ibid.* As for me, I will sing of thy power : and will praise thy mercy betimes in the morning. Alleluia.

GOSPEL. As Jesus sat upon the Mount of Olives, *from Mass 8, Salus autem, from Common, ending at the asterisk with the words* All these are the beginning of sorrows.

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 18. Thou shalt save the people that are in adversity, O Lord, and shalt bring down the high looks of the proud : for who is God, but the Lord? (Alleluia.)

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to look upon this our sacrifice : that we, being preserved from all the violence of war, may ever

be established with thy sure defence. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 31. Bow down thine ear : make haste to deliver us (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

O GOD, the King of kings and Lord of lords, who dost heal us by thy chastisement, and by pardon dost preserve us : we beseech thee to shew forth upon us thy mercy, that peace and tranquillity being restored by thy power, we may use the same to the amendment of our lives. Through.

[28.] MASS FOR PEACE

INTROIT. *Da pacem. Eccclus.* 36.

GIVE peace, O Lord, unto them that wait for thee, and let thy prophets be found faithful : regard the prayer of thy servants, and of thy people Israel (alleluia, alleluia). *Ps.* 122. I was glad when they said unto me : We will go into the house of the Lord. *℣.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

O GOD, from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works dô proceed : give unto thy servants that peace which the world cannot give ; that our hearts may be set to obey thy commandments, and also that by thee we being defended from the fear of our enemies may pass our time in rest and quietness. Through.

The LESSON from the Book of the Maccabees. *2 Macc.* 1. 1.

THE brethren, the Jews that be at Jerusalem and in the land of Judaea, wish unto the brethren, the Jews

that are throughout Egypt, health and peace : God be gracious unto you and remember his covenant that he made with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, his faithful servants : and give you all an heart to serve him, and to do his will, with a good courage and a willing mind : and open your hearts in his law and commandments, and send you peace, and hear your prayers, and be at one with you, and never forsake you in time of trouble.

GRADUAL. *Ps.* 122. O pray for the peace of Jerusalem : they shall prosper that love thee. *℣.* Peace be within thy walls : and plenteousness within thy palaces.

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣.* *Ps.* 147. Praise the Lord, O Jerusalem : praise thy God, O Zion. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia, and verse following, is said:

TRACT. *Ps.* 76. In Jewry is God known : his Name is great in Israel. *℣.* At Salem is his tabernacle : and his dwelling in Zion. *℣.* There brake he the arrows of the bow : the shield, the sword, and the battle.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

GOSPEL. The same day at evening, *from the Mass of Low Sunday.*

OFFERTORY. *Ps.* 135. O praise the Lord, for the Lord is gracious : O sing praises unto his Name, for it is lovely :

whatsoever the Lord pleased, that did he in heaven and in earth (alleluia).

SECRET.

O GOD, who sufferest not any terror to confound the nations that put their trust in thee : vouchsafe to accept the prayers and oblations of the people of thine inheritance ; that by thy mercy all Christian lands may be established in peace, and preserved from the fear of their enemies. Through.

COMMUNION. *St. John* 14. Peace I leave with you : my peace I give unto you, saith the Lord (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

O GOD, who art the author of peace and lover of concord, in knowledge of whom standeth our eternal life, whose service is perfect freedom : defend us thy humble servants in all assaults of our enemies ; that we surely trusting in thy defence, may not fear the power of any adversaries. Through.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY GOD, who wouldest not the death of a sinner, but rather that he should turn from his wicked-

ness and live : look down in mercy on thy people that turneth to thee with pure devotion ; humbly beseeching thee that by thy mercy we may be delivered from the scourge of thy wrath. Through.

The LESSON from the Book of Samuel.
2 Sam. 24. 15.

IN those days : The Lord sent a pestilence upon Israel from the morning even to the time appointed : and there died of the people from Dan even to Beer-sheba seventy thousand men. And when the Angel stretched out his hand upon Jerusalem to destroy it, the Lord repented him of the evil, and said to the Angel that destroyed the people : It is enough ; stay now thine hand. And the Angel of the Lord was by the threshing-place of Araunah the Jebusite. And David spake unto the Lord when he saw the Angel that smote the people, and said : Lo, I have sinned, and I have done wickedly : but these sheep, what have they done? Let thine hand, I pray thee, be against me, and against my father's house. And Gad came that day to David, and said unto him : Go up, rear an altar unto the Lord in the threshing-floor of Araunah the Jebusite. And David, according to the saying of Gad, went up as the Lord commanded. And Araunah looked, and saw the king and his servants coming on toward him : and Araunah went out, and bowed himself before the king on his face upon the ground. And Araunah said : Wherefore is my lord the king come to his servant? And David said : To buy the threshing-floor of thee, to build an altar

unto the Lord, that the plague may be stayed from the people. And Araunah said unto David : Let my lord the king take and offer up what seemeth good unto him : behold here be oxen for burnt sacrifice, and threshing instruments, and other implements of the oxen for wood. All these things did Araunah, as a king, give unto the king. And Araunah said unto the king : The Lord thy God accept thee. And the king said unto Araunah : Nay, but I will surely buy it of thee at a price, neither will I offer burnt offerings unto the Lord my God of that which doth cost me nothing. So David bought the threshing-floor and the oxen for fifty shekels of silver, and David built there an altar unto the Lord, and offered burnt offerings and peace offerings. So the Lord was intreated for the land, and the plague was stayed from Israel.

GRADUAL. Ps. 107. The Lord sent his word, and healed them : and they were saved from their destruction. *℣.* O that men would therefore praise the Lord for his goodness : and declare the wonders that he doeth for the children of men!

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣.* Ps. 69. Save me, O God, for the waters have come in even unto my soul. Alleluia.

After Septuagesima, instead of the Alleluia and verse following, is said:

TRACT. Ps. 103. O Lord, deal not with us after our sins : neither reward us according to our wickednesses *℣.* Ps. 79. O Lord, remember not our old sins, but have mercy upon us and that soon : for we are come to great misery. *℣.* Help us, O God of

our salvation, for the glory of thy Name : O deliver us, and be merciful unto our sins, for thy Name's sake.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual is said:

Alleluia, alleluia. *℣.* Ps. 69. Save me, O God, for the waters are come in even unto my soul. Alleluia. *℣.* Zech. 8. I will save my people Israel in the evil day, and I will be their God in truth and righteousness. Alleluia.

GOSPEL. Jesus arose out of the synagogue, *from Thursday after 3rd Sunday in Lent.*

OFFERTORY. Num. 16. And the priest stood between the living and the dead, having a golden censer in his hand : and he put on incense, and made an atonement for the people, and so appeased the wrath of God : and the plague was stayed by the Lord (alleluia).

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, to succour us, who here present our sacrifice unto thee : that by thy mighty power we may be absolved from all our sins, and delivered from all the assaults of destruction. Through.

COMMUNION. St. Luke 6. A multitude of sick and they that were vexed with unclean spirits came to him : for there went virtue out of him, and healed them all (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

HEAR us, O God of our salvation : and deliver thy people from the terrors of thy wrath ; that by the bountiful goodness of thy mercy they

may evermore abide in peace and confidence. Through.

[30.] TO ASK THE GRACE
OF THE HOLY GHOST

§ *Mass of the Holy Ghost Spiritus Domini (Votive Mass for Thursday) is said, with the Prayers given at the end of the said Mass in place of those otherwise used.*

[31.] MASS FOR THE
REMISSION OF SINS

ASSIST us mercifully, O Lord, in these our supplications and prayers : and dispose the way of thy servants towards the attainment of everlasting salvation ; that among all the changes and chances of this mortal life they may ever be defended by thy most gracious and ready help. Through.

The LESSON from the Book of Genesis. *Gen. 28. 10.*

IN those days : Jacob went out from Beer-sheba, and went toward Haran. And he lighted upon a certain place, and tarried there all night, because the sun was set : and he took of the stones of that place and put them for his pillows, and lay down in that place to sleep. And he dreamed, and behold, the Lord said : I am the Lord God of Abraham thy father, and the God of Isaac ; the land whereon thou liest to thee will I give it, and to thy seed ; and thy seed shall be as the dust of the earth : and thou shalt spread abroad to the west, and to the east, and to the north, and to the south : and in thee and in thy seed shall all the families of the earth be

TRACT. *Ps. 91.* He shall give his Angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways. *℣.* They shall bear thee in their hands : that thou hurt not thy foot against a stone. *℣.* Thou shalt go upon the lion and adder : the young lion and the dragon shalt thou tread under thy feet.

In Eastertide, instead of the Gradual, is said:

WE beseech thee, O Lord, to have compassion on our prayers, and mercifully to accept the oblations which we offer unto thee for these thy servants : that in their journey thy grace may always prevent and follow them, and by the succour of thy mercy we may evermore rejoice in their effectual deliverance from all perils. Through.

COMMUNION. *Ps.* 119. Thou hast charged, that we shall diligently keep thy commandments : O that my ways were made so direct, that I might keep thy statutes (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, that this holy Sacrament, which we have received, may preserve thy servants that put their trust in thee, and evermore defend them against the assaults of their enemies. Through.

[33.] MASS FOR THE SICK

INTROIT. *Exaudi, Domine.* *Ps.* 55.

HEAR my prayer, O God, and hide not thyself from my petition : take heed unto me, and hear me (alleluia, alleluia). *Ps.* *ibid.* I mourn in my prayer, and am vexed : the enemy crieth so, and the ungodly cometh on so fast. *Ÿ.* Glory be.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, the eternal salvation of them that put their trust in thee : hear us, we beseech thee, who implore thy mercy for thy servants in their sickness ; that being restored to health, they may

give thanks unto thee in thy holy Church. Through.

If for one person only, the singular is used throughout.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed James the Apostle.

St. James 5. 13.

DEARLY beloved : † Is any among you afflicted? let him pray. † Is any merry? let him sing psalms. † Is any sick among you? let him call for the elders of the Church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the Name of the Lord : and the prayer of faith shall heal the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up ; and if he have committed sins, they shall be forgiven him. Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed.

GRADUAL. Ps. 6. Have mercy upon me, O Lord, for I am weak : O Lord, heal me. V. For my bones are vexed : my soul also is sore troubled.

GOSPEL. When Jesus was entered into Capernaum, *as on Thursday after Ash Wednesday in Proper of Season.*

O GOD, by whose ordinance the moments of our lives are numbered : receive, we beseech thee, the prayers and oblations of thy servants, for whom in their sickness we implore thy mercy ; that we, which are now afraid by reason of their peril, may yet rejoice in their health and safety. Through.

COMMUNION. Ps. 31. Shew thy servant the light of thy countenance, and save me for thy mercy's sake : let me not be confounded, O Lord, for I have called upon thee (alleluia).

POSTCOMMUNION.

O GOD, who art the only assistance of our mortal frailty : shew forth, we pray thee, upon thy servants in their sickness the might of thy succour ; that being delivered by the help of thy mercy they may be restored in safety to thy holy Church. Through.

[34.] A SHORTENED MASS
FOR THE DYING

As Ordered in the Prayer-Book

¶ *Forasmuch as all mortal men are subject to many sudden perils, diseases, and sicknesses, and ever uncertain what time they shall depart out of this life ; therefore, to the intent they may be always in readiness to die, whensoever it shall please Almighty God to call them, the Ministers shall diligently from time to time, but especially in the time of pestilence, or other infectious sickness, exhort their parishioners to the often receiving of the Holy Communion of the Body and Blood of our Saviour Christ, when it shall be publicly administered in the Church; that so doing, they may, in case of sudden visitation, have the less cause to be disquieted for lack of the same. But if the sick person be not able to come to the Church, and yet is desirous to receive the Communion in his house; then he must give timely notice to the Minister, signifying also how many there are to communicate with him; and all things necessary being prepared, the Minister shall there celebrate the Holy Communion, beginning with the Collect, Epistle, and Gospel, here following. [The foregoing Propers are used, except:]*

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY, everliving God, maker of mankind, who dost correct those whom thou dost love, and chastise every one whom thou dost receive : we beseech thee to have mercy upon this thy servant visited with thine hand ; and to grant that *he* may take *his* sickness patiently, and recover *his* bodily health, if it be thy gracious

Through.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Romans.

Rom. 14. 7.

BRETHREN: None of us liveth to himself, and no man dieth to himself. For whether we live, we live

unto the Lord : and whether we die, we die unto the Lord. Whether we live therefore, or die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ both died, and rose, and revived, that he might be Lord both of the dead and living. But why dost thou judge thy brother? or why dost thou set at nought thy brother? for we shall all stand before the judgement seat of Christ. The Mass of the Most Holy Trinity, or of the Holy Ghost or of the Blessed Virgin Mary, or of any canonized Saint in the Martyrology is said, with the following Prayers added under one Ending.

COLLECT.

GOD, whose mercies cannot be numbered, whose goodness passeth man's understanding, we render humble and hearty thanks to thy most gracious majesty for the gifts that thou hast bestowed upon us : humbly beseeching thy mercy, that like as thou hast as at this time heard the prayers of them that call upon thêe, so thou wouldest hereafter evermore dispose

the way of thy servants towards the attainment of everlasting life. Through.

SECRET.

GOD, who hast vouchsafed to hear the prayers of thy servants and hast preserved them from all perils : we beseech thee, mercifully to accept the savour of this our sacrifice of thanksgiving ; granting that we, being defended against all adversities, may devoutly serve thee in all good works and continually increase in thy love. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GOD, who sufferest not them that put their trust in thee to be afflicted beyond that they are able to bear, but dost ever incline thyself in mercy to the prayers of thy servants : we give thee thanks for that thou hast vouchsafed to receive our prayers and supplications, humbly beseeching thee that we, who have been partakers of this holy Sacrament, may thereby be made worthy to be defended against all adversities. from all sin, and run not into any kind of dangêr ; and walking in all godly conversation may not fear the power of any adversaries. Through.

OR LORD our Governour, whose glory is in all the world : we commend this nation to thy merciful care, that being guided by thy Providence we may dwell secure in thy pèace. Grant to THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, to *The Governour of this State*, and to all in authority, wisdom and

strength to know and to do thy will ; fill them with the love of truth and righteousness ; and make them ever mindful of their calling to serve this people in thy fear. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. Who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, ône God, world without end.

5. *For Congress, or for a State Legislature.*

PB COLLECT. *For Congress, to be used during their session.*

MOST gracious God, we humbly beseech thee, as for the people of these United States in general, so especially for their Senate and Representatives in Congrêss assembled : that thou wouldest be pleased to direct and prosper all their consultations, to the advancement of thy glory, the good of thy Church, the safety, honour, and welfare of thy peoplè ; that all things may be so ordered and settled by their endeavours, upon the best and surest foundations, that peace and happiness, truth and justice, religion and piety, may be established among us for all generations. These and all other necessaries, for them, for us, and thy whole Church, we humbly beg in the Name and mediation of Jesus Christ, our most blessed Lord and Saviour. [Who.]

PB COLLECT. *For a State Legislature.*

OR GOD, the fountain of wisdom, whose statutes are good and gracious and whose law is truth : we beseech thee so to guide and bless the Legislature of this Stâte ; that it may ordain for our governance only such things as please thee, to the glory of

O LORD, we pray thee, mercifully look upon this our sacrifice : and of thy great goodness grant us thy help in our time. Through.

PB POSTCOMMUNION.

WE pray thee, O Lord, for those to whom we entrust the authority of l^egislation : that all, and everyone of them, may serve truly in their several callings to the glory of God, and the edifying and well governing of the peopl^e ; remembering the account they shall be called upon to give at the last great day. Through.

6. *For Courts of Justice.* PB COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY GOD, who sittest in th^e throne judging right : we humbly beseech thee to bless the courts of justice and the magistrates in all this land, and give unto them the spirit of wisdom and understanding ; that they may discern the truth, and impartially administer the law in the fear of thee alone. Through him who shall come to be our Judge, thy Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. [Who.]

SECRET.

O LORD, we pray thee, mercifully look upon this our sacrifice : and of thy great goodness grant us thy help in our time. Through.

PB POSTCOMMUNION.

WE pray thee, O Lord, for the courts of justice and the magistrates in all this land : that all and

everyone of them, may serve truly in their several callings to the glory of God, and the edifying and well governing of the peopl^e ; remembering the account they shall be called upon to give at the last great day. Through.

7. *For our Country* PB COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY GOD, who hast given us this good land f^or our heritage : we humbly beseech thee that we may always prove ourselves a people mindful of thy favour and glad to do thy will ; bless our land with honourable industry, sound learning, and pure manners, and save us from violence, discord, and confusion, from pride and arrogancy, and from every evil way. Through.

SECRET.

O LORD, we pray thee, mercifully look upon this our sacrifice : and of thy great goodness grant us thy help in our time. Through.

PB POSTCOMMUNION.

DEFEND, O Lord, our liberties, and fashion into one united people the multitudes brought hither out of many kindr^eds and tongues : endue with the spirit of wisdom, those to whom in thy Name we entrust the authority of government : that there may be justice and peace at home ; and that, through obedience to thy law, we may shew forth thy praise among the nations of the earth. OLORD, we pray thee, mercifully look upon this our sacrifice : and of thy great goodness grant us thy help in our time. Through.

PB POSTCOMMUNION.

HEAVENLY Father, who hast filled the wôrld with beauty : open, we beseech thee, our eyes to behold thy gracious hand in all thy wôrks ; that rejoicing in thy whole creation, we may learn to serve thee with gladness. For the sake of him by whom all things were made, thy Son, Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

10. *For the King (when Mass is said amongst peoples ruled by a King).*

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY GOD, whose kingdom is everlasting and pòwèr infinite : have mercy upon the whole Church, and so rule and govern the heart of thy chosen servant N., our King and Governour, that he, knowing whose minister he is, may above all things seek thy honour and glôrÿ ; and that we and all his subjects (duly considering whose authority he hath) may faithfully serve, honour, and humbly obey him, in thee, and for thee, according to thy blessed word and ordinance. Through.

SECRET.

OLORD, we pray thee, mercifully look upon this our sacrifice : and of thy great goodness grant us thy help in our time. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, we are taught by thy holy Word, that the hearts of Kings are in thy rule and governance, and that thou dost dispose and turn them as it seemeth best to thy gödly wisdom : we humbly beseech thee so to dispose and govern the heart of N., thy servant, our King and Governour, that in all his thoughts, words, and works, he may ever seek thy honour and glory, and study to preserve thy people committed to his charge, in wealth, peace, and godliness. Grant this, O merciful Father, for thy dear Son's sâke. Who.

II. *For Bishops and other Clergy and their People.* PB COLLECT.

O LORD, we pray thee, mercifully, look upon this our sacrifice : and of thy great goodness grant us thy help in our time. Through.

PB POSTCOMMUNION.

O GOD, whose fatherly care reacheth to the uttermost parts of the earth : we humbly beseech thee graciously to behold and bless those who serve in the defence of our country ; defend them from all dangers of soul and body, and grant that both they and we, drawing nearer to thee, may be bound together by thy love in the communion of thy Holy Spirit, and in the fellowship of thy Saints. ACCEPT, O Lord, this sacrifice, where-by we implore thee to give the spirit of governance and a sound mind to all who are in places of authority : and bless all those who labour in schools of good learning. Through.

PB POSTCOMMUNION.

GIVE, O Lord, the spirit of governance and of sound mind to all in places ôf authority : and bless all those who labour to set forward good learning. Through.

24. *For a Child, or for several Children.*

PB COLLECT.

OR LORD JESUS CHRIST, who dost embrace children with the arms of thy mercy, and dost make them living members of thy Church : give *this thy child* grace, we pray thee to stand fast in thy faith, to obey thy word, and to abide in thy lôve ; that, being made strong by thy Holy Spirit, *he* may resist temptation, and overcome evil, and may rejoice in the life that now is and dwell with thee in the life that is to come. Through thy merits, O merciful Saviour. Who with the Father and the Holy Ghost livest and reignest ône God, world without end.

Another PB COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY GOD, heavenly Father, who hast blessed us with the joy and câre of children : give us light and strength so to train thê m, that they may love whatsoever things are true and pure and lovely and of good report, following the example of their Saviour Jesus Christ. [Who.]

OLORD, we pray thee, mercifully, look upon this our sacrifice ; and of thy great goodness grant us thy help in our time. Through.

PB POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that thy grace may always prevent and follow us : and mercifully accept these our oblations which for the remission of our sins, we offer unto thee, to the glory of thy Name ; humbly beseeching thee that by the intercession of thy Saints they may be profitable unto us for the relief of our necessities. RECEIVE, O Lord, we pray thee, this sacrifice of praise, which here we offer unto thee giving thee thanks for

the benefits that thou hast bestowed upon us, and humbly beseeching thee ever to continue towards us the same thy mercies. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who dost amend us by thy chastisement, and preserve us by thy pardon : grant unto us thy humble servants to enjoy such tranquillity of weather ; that we may henceforth rejoice in the bounty of thy comfort and ever make use of the same unto thy honour and glory. Through.

31. *In time of Murrain among Animals.*

COLLECT.

OD, who hast given even the dumb beasts to be a succour and comfort to man's labour : we humbly beseech thee that thou wouldest not suffer them to perish ; but grant that, forasmuch as the sustenance of man without them cannot but fail, so they may ever be profitable for our necessities. Through.

SECRET.

OR Lord, we pray thee, mercifully look upon this our sacrifice : and of thy great goodness, grant us thy help in our time. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, that thy faithful people, being filled with thy heavenly benediction, may be preserved both in body and soul : that they may render unto thee all meet and worthy service ; and evermore receive the benefits of thy mercy. Through.

32. *For the Celebrant or any Priest, or for an Ordination Anniversary.*

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and merciful God, graciously hearken unto the humble prayers of thy servant whom thou hast chosen to serve thee in thy heavenly mysteries, and that for no merit of *mine* own, but only of the infinite abundance of thy mercy : and make *me* to minister worthily in thy holy templê ; and in such wise that what *I* utter with *my* outward lips may by the power of thy sanctification be brought to good effect. OUR Lord our God, vouchsafe, we pray thee, to look down in mercy on these our oblations, which in atonement for our sins we offer unto thy Majesty : draw forth, we pray thee, from our eyes such streams of tears, as shall quench the flames that have been kindled in our souls by reason of our sins. Through.

ACCEPT, O Lord, we pray thee, this sacrifice which we offer unto thee for our salvation : that the thoughts of our hearts being purged from all uncleanness and preserved from harm, we may receive of thy great mercy the enlightenment of thy Holy Spirit. Through . . . in unity of the same.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GOD, who lightenest every man that cometh into this world, we pray thee to enlighten our hearts with the brightnêss of thy grace : that we may of thee be enabled to think such things as be good and pleasing unto thy Divine Majestÿ ; and love thee with the sincere affection of our hearts. Through.

38. *For the Grace of Continence.*

COLLECT.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that the fire of thy Holy Spirit may in such wise cleanse our reins and our hearts : that we serving thee in pureness both of body and sôul ; may be found an acceptable people in thy sight. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

SECRET.

ORDER, we pray thee, smite asunder the chains of our sins : that we who seek to offer unto thee our sacrifice of praise in perfect freedom and in innocence of heart, may by

thee be restored to that estate which thou didst bestow upon us at the first ; and like as thou hast vouchsafed to save us by thy grace, so grant that by thy pardon we may again be made partakers of salvation. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

ASSIST us mercifully, O Lord, our helper and defender : that, our heart and flesh being renewed by the strength of continence and the newness of chastitÿ ; we which have offered unto thy mercy this sacrifice of praise, may evermore be cleansed from all temptations. Through.

O GOD, whose only-begotten Son did by his longsuffering tread under foot the pride of the enemy of mankind : grant us, we pray thee, so rightly to call to mind the sufferings which he of his great goodness bare for our sâkes ; that after his example we may patiently endure all our troubles and adversities. Through the same.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to accept the gifts and oblations, which we devoutly offer unto thy Divine Majesty : humbly beseeching thee to grant that of thy bountiful goodness we may thereby receive grace to suffer patiently in all our afflictions. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, that we which have received these holy mysteries, may by the same be restored unto the grace wherefrom wê have fallen : that by thy constant protection both here and evêr ; we may be enabled to endure patiently in all the assaults of our enemies. Through.

41. *For the Grace of Charity.* COLLECT.

O GOD, who dost make all things work together for good to thêem that love thee : pour into our hearts, we beseech thee, the stedfast affection of charity ; that as by thy holy inspiration thou dost put into our minds good desires, so we may not be turned aside from the same by any temptations. Through.

SECRET.

O GOD, who by thy holy sacraments and commandments dost renew us after the fashion of thy likeness : we beseech thee to stablish our goings in thy paths ; that like as thou hast vouchsafed unto us the hope of obtaining thy gift of charity, so this oblation of our sacrifice may make us effectually to be partakers of the same. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that the grace of thy Holy Spirit mây enlighten our hearts : that, being renewed in the sweetness of perfect charity ; they may abundantly bring forth the fruits of the same. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

42. *For Friends or Benefactors.*

COLLECT.

O GOD, who by the grace of thy Holy Spirit dost endue the hearts of thy faithful people with the most excellent gift of charity : we beseech thee to keep thy *servants* (and *handmaids*) for whom we implore thy mercy, both outwardly in *their bodies* and inwardly in *their sôuls* ; that *they* may

love thee with all *their hearts* and with pure affection perform such things as are acceptable in thy sight. Through . . . in the unity of the same.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, to have compassion on thy *servants* (and *handmaids*) for whom we offer unto thee this sacrifice of praise : that by the merits of these holy mysteries *they* may obtain the grace of thy heavenly benediction, and be brought to the glory of eternal felicity. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OR Lord, who hast vouchsafed to feed us with these hōly mysteries : grant, we beseech thee, that like as we have offered unto thee these tokens of our salvation for the advancement in charity of thy *servants* (and *handmaids*) ; so they may be profitable unto *them* for the relief of *their* necessities, and for *their* continual peace. Through.

43. *For Enemies.* COLLECT.

OR God, who art the lover of peace and the preservêr of charity : grant unto all our enemies such true peace and charity, that they may obtain of thee the remission of all their sins ; and that we being armed with thy defence may be preserved from all their devices. Through.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to accept these our oblations : that by thy mercy we may be delivered from all the assaults of our enemies, and that they may receive of

thee the pardon of all their iniquities. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, that we, which have been partakers of this hōly Communion : may by thee be delivered from all our offensêds ; and defended against all the devices of our enemies. Through.

44. *For Prisoners or Captives.*

PB COLLECT. *For several persons.*

OR God, who sparest when we deserve punishment and in thy wrath remembêrest mercy : we humbly beseech thee, of thy goodness, to comfort and succour all prisoners, especially those who are condemned to die, and give them a right understanding of themselves, and of thy promisês ; that trusting wholly in thy mercy, they may not place their confidence anywhere but in thee. Relieve the distressed, protect the innocent, awaken the guilty ; and forasmuch as thou alone bringest light out of darkness, and good out of evil, grant to these thy servants, that by the power of thy Holy Spirit they may be set free from the chains of sin, and may be brought to newness of life. Through Jesus Christ our Lōrd. [Who.]

For one Prisoner. COLLECT.

OR God, who didst deliver thy holy Saint Peter from his bonds and suffer him tō depart unhurt : deliver, we beseech thee, this thy servant from his bōnds ; and by the merits of the same thy holy Apostle suffer him to depart unhurt from his present captivity. Through.

SECRET.

POUR out, O Lord, we pray thee, upon these our oblations the abundance of thy heavenly benediction : that, *this thy servant* being loosed from his captivity, we may speedily rejoice in his deliverance. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to hear the prayers of us who have here received this hōly Sacrament : and grant that the same may effectually avail to the deliverance of *this thy servant* from the bonds of *his* captivity. Through.

45. *For one going to Sea.*

PB COLLECT.

OETERNAL GOD, who alone spreadest out the heavens, and rulest the raging ôf the sea : we commend to thy almighty protection, thy *servant*, for whose preservation on the great deep our prayers are desirêd ; guard *him*, we beseech thee, from the dangers of the sea, from sickness, from the violence of enemies, and from every evil to which *he* may be exposed ; and conduct *him* in safety to the haven where *he* would be, with a grateful sense of thy mercies. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to accept these the prayers and oblations of thy servants : that *he* for whom we offer unto thee these holy mysteries, may by thee be defended against all adversities. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OLORD, who hast vouchsafed to sanctify us with thy heavenly mysteries : we humbly beseech thy Majesty ; that, as thou suffered us at thy holy Table to call to remembrance thy servants for whom we pray ; so thou wouldest mercifully grant that by the wood of the holy Cross *he* may be absolved from all *his* sins and delivered from all adversities. Through.

46. *For the Safety of the Living.*

COLLECT.

STRETCH forth, O Lord, we pray thee, on thy faithful people the right hand of thy heavenly succour : that they, diligently seeking thee with all their hêarts : may be found worthy to obtain those things that they have asked according to thy will. Through.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, to have compassion on our prayers, and graciously to accept the oblations of thy faithful people which we offer unto thee for their salvation : and to the intent that none may ask aught amiss or fail in his petitions, grant we beseech thee, that what we ask faithfully, we may obtain effectually. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, to thy faithful people stedfastly to cleave unto thee in faith and single-nêss of heart : that they being stablished in thy heavenly charitÿ ; may not by any temptations be parted from the fulness of the same. Through.

47. *For the Sick. (Several different Collects.)*

PB COLLECT. *In Times of great Sickness or Mortality.*

MOST mighty and merciful God, in this time of grievous sickness, we flee unto thee for succour : deliver us, we beseech thee, from our peril ; give strength and skill to all those who minister to the sick, prosper the means made use of for their cure, and grant that, perceiving how frail and uncertain our life is, we may apply our hearts unto that heavenly wisdom which leadeth to eternal life. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

PB COLLECT. *For a Sick Person.*

FATHER of mercies and God of all comfort, our only help in time of need : we humbly beseech thee to behold, visit, and relieve thy sick *servant N.* for whom our prayers are desirêd ; look upon *him* with the eyes of thy mercy ; comfort *him* with a sense of thy goodness ; preserve *him* from the temptations of the enemy ; and give *him* patience under *his* affliction. In thy good time, restore *him* to health, and enable *him* to lead the residue of *his* life in thy fear, and to thy glory ; and grant that finally *he* may dwell with thee in life everlasting. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

PB COLLECT. *For a Sick Child.*

HEAVENLY Father, watch with us, we pray thee, over the sick *child* for whom our prayers are offered : and grant that *he* may be restored to that perfect health which it is thine

alone to give. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

PB COLLECT. *For one about to undergo an Operation.*

ALMIGHTY GOD our heavenly Father we beseech thee graciously to comfort thy servant in *his* suffering : and to bless the means made use of for *his* cure ; fill *his* heart with confidence, that though *he* be sometime afraid, *he* yet may put *his* trust in thee. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

SECRET.

HEAR, O Lord, we beseech thee, these our prayers, as we call upon thee on behalf of *this* thy *servant* (or *child*) : and bestow upon *him* the help of thy merciful consolation. Through.

PB POSTCOMMUNION.

MERCIFUL GOD, givêr of life and health : bless, we pray thee, *thy servant* (or *this child*), and those who administer to *him* of thy healing gifts ; that *he* may be restored to health of body and of mind. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

48. *For a Person under affliction.*

PB COLLECT.

MERCIFUL God, and heavenly Father, who hast taught us in thy holy Word that thou dost not willingly afflict or grieve the childrên of men : look with pity, we beseech thee, upon the sorrows of thy *servant* for whom our prayers are offerêd. Remember *him*, O Lord, in mercy ; endue *his soul* with patience ; comfort

him with a sense of thy goodness ; lift up thy countenance upon *him*, and give *him* peace. Through Jesus Christ our Lôrd. [Who.]

PB SECRET.

WE beseech thee to hear us, good Lord : that it may please thee to strengthen such as do stand, and to comfort and help the weak-hearted, and to raise up those who fall. Through.

PB POSTCOMMUNION.

GOD, Almighty and merciful, who healest those that are broken in heart, and turnest the sadness of the sorrowful to joy : uplift thy *servant* who is cast dōwn ; though *he* be troubled on every side, suffer *him* not to be distressed, though *he* be perplexed, save *him* from despair. Through.

49. *For the Quick and Dead. Prayers as in the Mass of Ash Wednesday.*

50. *For the Conversion of a Sinner.*

COLLECT.

MERCIFUL and gracious God, favourably hear the sorrowful prayers which we do offer unto thee for one who knoweth thee not : to the end that *he* may be converted from the error of *his* ways, and be delivered from dēath ; that so where sin hath abounded, grace may much more abound. Through.

SECRET.

SUFFER not a soul to perish, O Lord, for which Christ died : for the same death we do commemorate in this Sacrifice, whereby we implore for this sinful person the grace of repent-

ance, and the remission of all *his* sins. Through the same.

POSTCOMMUNION.

OR LORD JESU CHRIST, our Good Shepherd, who dost feed with thine own Body those whom thou hast redeemêd with thy Blood : mercifully seek this thy lost shêep ; and bring the same back to the sheepfold, made ready for the green pastures of everlasting life. Who livest and reignest with the Father.

51. *For the spread of the Religious life, or for Religious.*

COLLECT.

GOD, who dost both inspire and perfect êvery good design : direct all who are called to the life of holy religion into the way of everlasting salvation ; and as they have left all, to dedicate themselves wholly unto thee, grant that they may ever think on heavenly things, and truly serve thee in the work of penance, in the spirit of poverty, and in all humility of heart. Through.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, to hallow by these holy things which we do offer unto thee, thy servants (or *handmaids*) whom thou hast consecrated from the world : that they may faithfully pay their vows unto thee, and with sincerity of heart wholly serve thy divine Majesty. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, that thy servants (or *handmaids*) who are gathered together in thy Name in the life of

holy religion, and who partake of this one holy Bread : may thereby be always of one mind, and provoke one another unto love and good wôrks ; that so by their holy conversation, the good savour of Christ may be everywhere spread abroad. Through.

52. *On the Anniversary of religious Profession.*

COLLECT.

O LORD, who hast chosen unto thyself *these thy servants* in the dedication of chastity : grant that *they* may effectually accomplish the work which *they* have begûn ; and that *they* may offer unto thee a full and ready service, by thy continual help bringing this *their* good beginning unto a perfect end. Through.

SECRET.

GRANT, we beseech thee, O Lord : that these oblations may obtain perseverance in continual chastity for *these thy servants* ; and that when the everlasting doors are set open at the coming of the King of glory, *they* may enter with gladness into thy heavenly kingdom. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O GOD, who dost make thy habitation in the pure of heart : look down upon *these thy servants* : and grant that what *they seek* in the continual discipline of *their lives*, *they* may receive in the abundance of thy consolations. Through.

53. *For Married Persons, especially on the Anniversary of their Wedding.*

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everliving God, who hast knit together thy servants in the covenant of wedlock : pour forth thy blessings upon them ; that agreeing together in unbroken love, they may serve thee in all godly conversation, and may be found worthy to be joined together in the everlasting joy of heaven. Through.

SECRET.

LET the offering of this Sacrifice, O God, obtain for thy servants the healthful gifts of thy grace : that they may take care to rule their house in all godliness, and may help one another to attain unto the everlasting heritage. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O LORD, who hast made marriage tō be honourable : be pleased also to keep undefiled the lives of these twain whom thou hast made to be of one flesh, and whom thou dost command to be of one spirit ; and by this heavenly Sacrament nourish them with the earnest of everlasting fellowship. Through.

54. *For a Birthday or Anniversary of Baptism.*

COLLECT.

BLESSED LORD GOD, who according to thy great mercy hast begotten us again to a lively hope of an incorruptible heritage : grant unto thy *servant*, the anniversary of whose *birth* (or *Baptism*) we do keep, that *he* may

ver, like as a new born babe, desire
the sincere milk of the wôrd ; and
that *he* may ever live and grow there-
y. Through.

SECRET.

O GOD, by whose unspeakable love
we are called, and do become
thy children : grant by thy power of
this Sacrifice, that *he* whose anniver-
sary we do keep, may ever be filled
with the Spirit of Adoption of sons,
and in the end receive the promised
blessing of our inheritance. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O LORD, to whom we have pledged
our faith, both by reason of our
birth into this world, and our re-birth
in baptism, which same we do ever
renew at thine altar, whereby we do
renounce Satan, and stedfastly purpose
to fulfil the law of Christ : grant that
we, who have now received the earnest
of that immortal life which thou hast
promised us ; may ever increase more
and more in that undefiled life, which
we have promised to keep. Through.

MASSES FOR THE DEAD

I

ON THE COMMEMORATION OF ALL THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED

On All Souls' Day any Priest may celebrate three Masses, in accordance with the Rubric on November 2nd. The following Mass shall be said as the first Mass, and by any Priest who celebrates the Mass only, or who celebrates with assistant. In the latter case he may anticipate the 2nd and 3rd Masses.

At the first and the second Mass, if the Priest be about to celebrate another Mass, when he has consumed the Precious Blood, he does not purify nor cleanse the Chalice, but places it on the Corporal, and covers it with the Pall; then, with hands joined, he says in the midst of the Altar: Grant that what we have received with the mouth, O Lord, etc., and then he washes his fingers in a vessel of water, saying: May thy Flesh which thou hast given for the world, which thou hast taken, etc., and thus he cleanses himself. And when he has so done, he removes the Pall and again places the Chalice on the Corporal and covers it, according to custom, first with the linen Purificator, then with the Paten on which the Host to be consecrated, and lastly with the Pall and the Veil. And a Chalice which has thus remained on the Altar from a former Mass is never set down anywhere except on the Corporal, nor is it wiped with a Purificator, until after the ablutions are made, for which reason at the Offertory it is moved toward the epistle side of the Corporal, and then the Host is offered in the accustomed man-

ner. Afterwards the Chalice is prepared (the Priest slightly raising it and pouring in the water and wine, taking care not to splash the sides thereof) without removing it beyond the Corporal, nor wiping it, and then it is offered in the accustomed manner.

AT THE FIRST MASS.

INTROIT. *Requiem aeternam.*

REST eternal grant unto them, O Lord : and let light perpetual shine upon them. *Ps. 65.* Thou, O God, art praised in Sion, and unto thee shall the vow be performed in Jerusalem : thou that hearest the prayer, unto thee shall all flesh come. *Then at once is repeated:* Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord : and let light perpetual shine upon them.

COLLECT.

O GOD, the Creator and Redeemer of all them that believe : grant unto the souls of thy servants and handmaidens the remission of all their sins ; that as they have ever desired thy merciful pardon, so by the supplications of their brethren they may receive the same. Who livest and reignest with the Father in the unity of the Holy Ghost ever one God.

The Lesson from the EPISTLE of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians. *1 Cor. 15. 51.*

BRETHREN : Behold, I shew you a mystery : We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, in a mo-

ment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump : for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality. So when this corruptible shall have put on incorruption, and this mortal shall have put on immortality, then shall be brought to pass the saying that is written : Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, † where is thy sting? O grave, † where is thy victory? The sting of death is sin ; and the strength of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

GRADUAL. Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord : and let light perpetual shine upon them. *V.* Ps. 112. The righteous shall be had in everlasting remembrance : he will not be afraid of any evil tidings.

TRACT. Absolve, O Lord, the souls of all the faithful departed from all the chains of their sins. *V.* That by the succour of thy grace they may be found worthy to escape the avenging judgement. *V.* And enjoy the bliss of everlasting light.

SEQUENCE. *Dies Irae.*

DAY of wrath, and doom impending,
David's word with Sibyl's blending :

Heaven and earth in ashes ending.
O what fear man's bosom rendeth,
When from heaven the Judge descendeth,

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that our supplications may be acceptable in thy sight : that the souls of thy servants and handmaidens, being delivered from all their sins, may be made partakers of thy heavenly redemption. Who livest and reignest with the Father.

After The Lord be with you shall be said: May they rest in peace. R. Amen. And the blessing shall not be given: but Let this my bounden duty and service being said, and the Altar kissed, the Gospel of Saint John: In the beginning was the Word, shall be read, as usual.

ABSOLVE, O Lord, we pray thee, the *soul* of *this* thy *servant* from every bond of sin : that at the general Resurrection at the last day *he* may find refreshment in the glory of thy Saints. Through.

7. *For a Woman Departed.*

COLLECT.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, of thy loving-kindness to have mercy on the *soul* of *this* thy *handmaiden* : that, being purged from all the defile-

ments of our mortal nature; *she* may be restored to the portion of everlasting felicity. Through.

SECRET.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that by this holy sacrifice, whereby alone we can obtain deliverance from our sins, the *soul* of thy *handmaiden* may be absolved from all *her* offences : that by the merits of this our bounden duty and service *she* may receive everlasting mercy. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that, forasmuch as thou hast suffered the *soul* of *this* thy *handmaiden* to receive the succour of this pledge of thy never failing mercy : thou wouldest grant unto *her* to enter into the fellowship of thy Saints in everlasting light. Through.

8. *For a Father and Mother.*

COLLECT.

GOD, who didst command thy people, saying : Honour thy father and thy mother : of thy loving-kindness have mercy on the *soul[s]* of *my father* [and *my mother*] and forgive [them] all [their] sins ; and *I* humbly pray thee that thou wouldest grant unto *me* to behold [their] *faces* in the glory of eternal felicity. Through.

SECRET.

ACCEPT, O Lord, *I* pray thee, the sacrifice which *I* offer unto thee for the *soul[s]* of thy servant[s] *my father* [and *my mother*] : and grant unto [them] to enjoy everlasting blessedness

in the land of the living ; and unto me that I may be joined unto [them] in the felicity of thy chosen. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, that this partaking of thy heavenly Sacrament may obtain for the soul[s] of my father [and my mother] rest and everlasting life : and that with [them] I may receive the crown of thy everlasting grace. Through.

9. *For a Father only, the Prayers are said as above with the changes necessary to make it read properly.*

10. *For a Mother only, the Prayers are said as above with the changes necessary to make it read properly.*

11. *For Dead Brethren, Kinsfolk, and Benefactors.*

COLLECT.

O GOD, who desirest not the death of a sinner but rather that all mankind should be saved : we beseech thee mercifully to grant that the brethren, kinsfolk, and benefactors of our congregation, who have passed out of this world, may by the intercession of blessed Mary Ever-Virgin and of all thy Saints come to enjoy with them everlasting blessedness. Through.

SECRET.

O GOD, of whose merciful kindness there is no end, favourably accept our prayers : and through this Sacrament of our salvation grant unto the souls of our brethren, kinsfolk, and benefactors, whom thou didst number among them that confess thy Name, the remission of all their sins. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

GRANT, we beseech thee, almighty and merciful God : that the souls of our brethren, kinsfolk, and benefactors, for whom we have now offered unto thee this sacrifice of praise, may by the operation of this Sacrament be cleansed from every stain of sin, and by thy mercy attain the blessedness of eternal light. Through.

12. *For Those who rest in a Cemetery.*

COLLECT.

O GOD, in whose mercy do rest the souls of thy faithful people : mercifully grant to thy servants and handmaids, and to all that here and in all places do rest with Christ, the remission of all their sins ; that, being delivered from every bond of iniquity, they may rejoice with thee in everlasting bliss. Through.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, graciously to receive these our oblations, which we offer unto thee for the souls of thy servants and handmaids and of all Christian people who here and in all places are asleep in Christ : that by this wondrous sacrifice they may be delivered from the dreadful bonds of death, and be found worthy to enter into everlasting life. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

O GOD, the light of the souls that put their trust in thee, mercifully assist our prayers : and grant unto thy servants and handmaids that here and in all places do rest in Christ,

to find a place of refreshing and the blessedness of thy rest, and to enjoy the glory of everlasting light. Through.

13. *For Many Persons Departed.*

COLLECT.

O GOD, whose nature and property is ever to have mercy and to forgive : have compassion on the souls of thy servants and handmaids and grant unto them the remission of all their sins ; that, being delivered from the bonds of this our mortal nature, they may be found worthy to pass into everlasting life. Through.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, that the souls of thy servants and handmaids may by this holy sacrifice, which thou hast ordained for the remission of the sins of the whole world, effectually attain to everlasting salvation. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION

O GOD, to whom alone it belongeth to heal the souls of them that are departed from this life : grant, we pray thee, that the souls of thy servants and handmaids, being cleansed from the defilements of this earthly life may receive a portion in the number of thine elect. Who livest and reignest with the Father.

14. *Other Prayers for many Persons Departed.*

COLLECT.

GRANT, O Lord, we pray thee, to the souls of thy servants and handmaidens thy perpetual mercy :

that, as they have hoped and trusted in thee, so this their hope and faith may be profitable unto them to life everlasting. Through.

SECRET.

WE beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to look upon these our oblations : that these things which we humbly offer to the glory of thy Name, may be profitable unto them that are departed hence for the remission of all their sins. Through.

POSTCOMMUNION.

ACEPT, O Lord, we pray thee, the prayers which we humbly offer unto thee for the souls of thy servants and handmaidens : beseeching thee to grant that, whatever defilements they may have contracted in their conversation in this life being pardoned by thy goodness, they may be made partakers of those unspeakable joys that thou hast prepared for thine elect. Through.

15. *For all the Faithful Departed, the Prayers as AT THE FIRST MASS above.*

THE FINAL BLESSING AND
SOLEMN DISMISSAL OF THE
BODY

commonly called

THE ABSOLUTION OF THE
DEAD

§ *At the end of Mass, if the Absolution is to be made, the Celebrant goes to the Epistle Corner, where he lays aside the Maniple and Chasuble and puts on a black Cope. The Subdeacon, between*

two Acolytes with lighted candles, carries the Cross as in Processions, two other Acolytes preceding them, one with the thurible and incense-boat, the other with the holy water and sprinkler. The Celebrant follows, having first made a reverence to the Altar, with the Deacon on his left. The Subdeacon with the Cross takes his stand at the feet of the body (or of the catafalque), between the aforesaid Acolytes holding candles, whilst the Celebrant stands at the other end at the head, but towards the Epistle side if his back be to the Altar, yet so as to face the Subdeacon's Cross; with the Deacon on his left, and near him the two other Acolytes carrying the thurible and holy water. Then, an Acolyte or Clerk holding the book, the Celebrant says at once the following Collect (no change of number or sex being made, even if it be said for many persons or a woman); which Collect, however, is omitted if the body be absent.

I. THE RECOGNITION OF THE BODY'S DIGNITY WITH PRAYER FOR REMISSION OF SIN'S PENALTIES

COLLECT. (*Omitted if the body be absent.*)

ENTER not into judgement with thy servant, O Lord, for in thy sight shall no man living be justified, except thou grant the remission of every sin. Therefore, we beseech thee, pronounce not thy judgement upon any whose cause the faithful prayer of Christian people commendeth unto thee : but grant, by the succour of thy grace, that each creature of thine may be found worthy to escape the avenging judgement, who upon earth

was sealed with the seal of the Holy Trinity. Who livest and reignest, world without end. *R.* Amen.

Then the Cantor beginning, the by-standing Clergy sing the following:

RESPONSORY. (*Which is always used.*)

DELIVER me, O Lord, * from everlasting death in that fearful day : * When the heavens and the earth shall be shaken : * When thou shalt come to judge the world by fire. *V.* I am in fear and trembling, until the sifting be upon us and the wrath to come. *R.* When the heavens and the earth shall be shaken. *V.* Woe is me, for the day of wrath, calamity and misery, the great day of exceeding bitterness. *R.* When thou shalt come to judge the world by fire. *V.* Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord : and let light perpetual shine upon them. *R.* Deliver me, O Lord, as far as I am in fear.

§ *Towards the end of the Responsory the Celebrant puts incense into the thurible, blessing it as usual, the Deacon ministering the boat. The Responsory ended, a Cantor with the first Choir says:*

Kyrie eleison. or Lord, have mercy upon us. *And the second Choir answers:*

Christe eleison. Or Christ, have mercy upon us. *Then all together say:*

Kyrie eleison. Or Lord, have mercy upon us. *Then the Priest says with the distinct voice:*

Our Father.

§ *And the rest thereof is said secretly by all. Meanwhile the Priest receives*

the sprinkler from the hand of the Deacon, and makes a reverence to the Altar; the Deacon accompanying him on his right, and holding the fore-edge of the Cope, he makes the circuit of the catafalque, sprinkling it with holy water, thrice on the right and thrice on the left. When he passes in front of the Cross he bows low, while the Deacon genuflects: afterwards he receives the thurible from the Deacon, and censes the catafalque in the same manner as he has sprinkled it. Having returned to his first position (the Deacon holding the book) he says, with hands joined:

℣. And lead us not into temptation.

℞. But deliver us from evil.

℣. From the gates of hell.

℞. Deliver their souls, O Lord.

℣. May they rest in peace.

℞. Amen.

℣. Lord, hear my prayer.

℞. And let my cry come unto thee.

℣. The Lord be with you.

℞. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

§ *If the body be absent, the Priest says the following Collect (which same is said in the singular number, or in the plural, as occasion demands; and if the name of a Priest or Bishop be mentioned, his rank is also named, as in the Collect below):*

COLLECT. (Said only if the body be absent.)

ABSOLVE, O Lord we pray thee, the souls of thy servants from every bond of sin, that though they be dead unto the world, yet they may live unto thee: and that whatsoever sins they may have committed through the

frailty of the flesh in their earthly conversation may be done away by the pardon of thy most merciful loving-kindness. Through Christ our Lord. ℞. Amen.

§ *In place of the preceding Collect, the Celebrant may say the Collect which was said in the Mass, or any other suitable Collect, using the short Ending. If, however, the body of the Departed be present, the Celebrant says the following:*

COLLECT. (Said only if the body be present.)

O GOD, whose nature and property is ever to have mercy and to forgive, receive our humble petitions for the soul of thy servant (or handmaiden) [or servant and Priest (or Bishop)] N., which this day thou hast commanded to depart out of this world: deliver him not unto the hand of the enemy, neither forsake him at the last; but command him to be received by the holy Angels, and brought to the country of paradise; that forasmuch as he hoped and believed in thee, he may not undergo the pains of hell, but be made partaker of everlasting felicity. Through Christ our Lord. ℞. Amen.

II. THE DISMISSAL PRAYERS.

Which done, the body (if it be present) is borne to its burial, the proper Antiphons and devotions being said, as prescribed in the forms for the Burial of the Dead: but if this cannot be done, the aforesaid forms (including, if desired, the Committal) may be said at this time. But first, before these other de-

votions which belong to the burial, is said (if convenient, during the procession to the grave) the following Antiphon:

In Paradisum

INTO the paradise of God * may the Angels lead thee ; and at thy coming may the Martyrs receive thee, and take thee into the holy City Jerusalem. May all the Choirs of Angels welcome thee ; and with Lazarus, once a beggar, may God grant thee rest eternal.

§ *But if the body be absent, or if the Absolution be not a part of the burial devotions, the Absolution of the Dead is always ended thus : the Celebrant, making a Cross with his right hand over the catafalque, says:*

℣. Rest eternal grant unto *him* (or *her* or *them*), O Lord.

℞. And let light perpetual shine upon *him* (or *her* or *them*).

Then the Cantors sing:

℣. May they rest in peace. ℞. Amen.

The Celebrant, again making a Cross over the catafalque, sings on one note:

℣. May *his* soul (or *her* soul or *their* souls) and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. ℞. Amen.

III. THE RETURN TO THE SACRISTY.

§ *Then the Celebrant begins the Antiphon, If thou, O Lord, and reciting the Psalm Out of the deep with the Clergy, the Cross going before, returns with the rest to the Sacristy. There*

the Antiphon, If thou, O Lord, being repeated by all, the Priest, before he unveils, says the following Prayers:

Kyrie eleison. Or Lord, have mercy upon us.

Christe eleison. Or Christ, have mercy upon us.

Kyrie eleison. Or Lord, have mercy upon us.

Our Father, *and the rest secretly as far as:*

℣. And lead us not into temptation. ℞. But deliver us from evil. ℣. From the gates of hell. ℞. Deliver their souls, O Lord. ℣. May they rest in peace. ℞. Amen. ℣. Lord, hear my prayer. ℞. And let my cry come unto thee. ℣. The Lord be with you. ℞. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. COLLECT.

O GOD, the Creator and Redeemer of them that believe : grant unto the souls of thy servants and handmaids the remission of all their sins ; that, as they have ever desired thy merciful pardon, so by the supplications of their brethren they may receive the same : Who livest and reignest world without end. ℞. Amen.

℣. Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord.

℞. And let light perpetual shine upon them.

℣. May they rest in peace. ℞. Amen.

§ *The Verse May his soul, the Antiphon If thou Lord, and the Psalm and Prayers, are not said, if the Absolution be made for all the Faithful Departed.*

IN those days : Eleazar, one of the principal scribes, an aged man, and of a well-favoured countenance, was constrained to open his mouth, and to eat swine's flesh. But he, choosing rather to die gloriously, than to live stained with such an abomination, spit it forth, and came of his own accord to the torment : as it behoved them to come, that are resolute to stand out against such things, as are not lawful for love of life to be tested. But they that had the charge of that wicked feast, for the old acquaintance they had with the man, taking him aside, besought him to bring flesh of his own provision, such as was lawful for him to use, and make as if he did eat of the flesh taken from the sacrifice commanded by the King, that in so doing he might be delivered from death : and for the old friendship with them find favour. But he began to consider discreetly, and as became his age, and the excellency of his ancient years, and the honour of his gray head, whereunto he was come, and his most honest education from a child, or rather the holy law made and given by God : therefore he answered accordingly, and willed them straightways to send him to the grave. For it becometh not our age, said he, in any wise to dissemble, whereby many young persons might think that Eleazar, being fourscore years old and ten, were now gone to a strange religion, and so they through mine hypocrisy, and desire to live a little time and a moment longer, should be deceived by me ; and I get a stain to mine old age, and make it abominable. For though for the present time I should be delivered from the punish-

ment of men, yet should I not escape the hand of the Almighty, neither alive nor dead. Wherefore now, manfully changing this life, I will shew myself such an one as mine age requireth, and leave a notable example to such as be young to die willingly and courageously for the honourable and holy laws. And when he had said these words, immediately he went to the torment.

When he put on the robe of honour, and was clothed with the perfection of glory, when he went up to the holy altar, he made the garment of holiness honourable. When he took the portions out of the priests' hands, he himself stood by the hearth of the altar, compassed with his brethren round about, as a young cedar in Libanus ; and as palm trees compassed they him round about. So were all his sons in their glory.
